GENERAL INFORMATION

A WORD ABOUT YOUR I.D. ARM BAND

Your I.D. arm band is your "ticket" to MidAmeriCon. It is required for entry to programming events and displays. It is made of non-allergenic material and is impossible to lose as it can be removed only by cutting. Actually, there is no reason to remove it for the entire run of the convention; you can shower or swim or anything else with it on. If, however, there is a need to remove it—because it doesn't fit with your masquerade costume, or you have to attend your brother's wedding Saturday morning—simply come to the registration desk and they will cut it off and register you as having removed it. Then pick up your new one when you need it.

YOUR NAME BADGE

If this is your first convention you may be wondering about the necessity of a name badge. It is to identify you to other fans. You don't have to wear it if you don't want to, but it is customary so other people will know who you are without having to ask your name or your having to introduce yourself. Fans are very friendly and gregarious but the lack of a name badge immediately sets up a barrier to communication. If you recognize a name on a badge (an author or a fan) don't hesitate to strike up a conversation. That's why everyone is wearing a name badge.

CLOSED-CIRCUIT TV

MidAmeriCon's closed-circuit TV will be on channel 12. Due to renovations the Muehlebach's system is no longer compatible with that of the Phillips. Regrettably, closed-circuit TV will be available only in the Muehlebach. If you aren't staying in the Muehlebach and can't find a friend in whose room you can watch, TV viewing lounges have been set up in rooms 471 and 473.

BABYSITTING

Babysitting services at no charge will be available in the Oxford Room on the third floor of the Phillips House. The hours are 2:00 pm to 11:00 pm on Friday and Saturday, 12:30 pm to 11:00 pm on Sunday. There will be no service on Thursday or Monday.

ICE AND SOFT DRINK MACHINES

Due to delays in renovation the Muehlebach's supplier has not delivered all the scheduled ice machines. They have set up the room directly across the hall from the film room as an ice station. Soft drink machines will be in plentiful supply on the convention floors. (Check "The Bullshead" for later developments.) The Phillips is also installing extra ice and soft drink machines for us. The Royal Room, just off the lobby of the Phillips will be filled with drink and food vending machines.

GAMES

The Phillips is installing a game room in room 521. We don't know at this time exactly what will be in there, but it will be an assortment of electronic games and pinball machines. Everyone is welcome to use them.

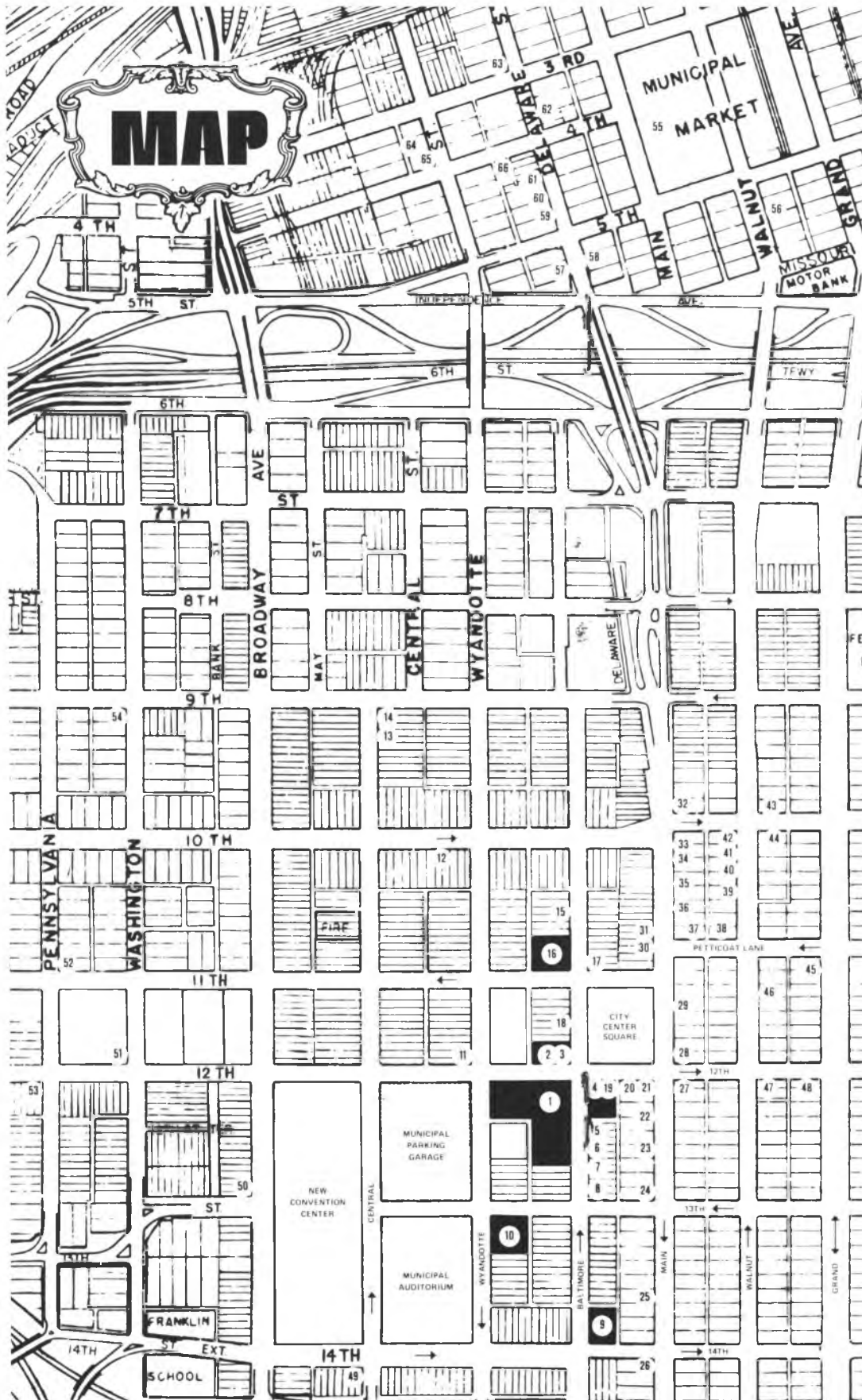
