**Supporting:** \$30 (to  $\overline{7}$ -14-88); **Attending:** \$70 (to 7-14-88). No mail memberships will be accepted after 7-14-88. At-thedoor: \$100, 9-1 and 9-2. \$75, 9-3. \$50, 9-4. \$25, 9-5 or by the single day. Children's memberships: \$25. Kids' memberships will be available to folks under 13 as of 9-5-88. They may attend our special Children's Programming, or all programming if accompanied by an adult with full attending membership. Kids receive no ballots nor publications. Babes-in-arms and children up to 7: free. To Convert: Both Supporting and Attending members receive all convention publications and the right to vote for the Hugo awards and in the 1991 site selection. Only Attending members, however, can enjoy the convention in person. To move up to Attending status, a Supporting member must pay the difference between what he has already paid and the cost of Attending membership at the time. (For instance, if you became a Supporting member by voting in the 1988 worldcon race, you've paid \$20. If you convert to Attending before 7-14-88, the cost will be an additional \$50. If you delay until the convention, you will owe another \$80. Naturally, if you paid \$30 for your Supporting membership, you will owe \$10 less.) Presupporters of the New Orleans in '88 worldcon bid may deduct \$5 from whatever membership they buy for themselves. Note: Nolacon II may no longer accept through-the-mail credit card memberships. We must restrict ourselves to personal checks, cashiers checks, travelers checks, and money orders.



## EDITORIAL



**Nolacon H** is less than six months away. Preparations are increasing, activity is building. It's madness—but we trust it'll be a happy madness come Labor Day!

Centered in this progress report is the 1988 Hugo Award nomination form. The Hugo is unique — no other literary award is given on the basis of a popular vote by readers. This is your chance to make your feelings known about the kind of SF you enjoy — so tear your form free, fill it out as best you can, ship it off as soon as possible. Jim and Susan Satterfield (P.O. Box 1046, Lee's Summit, MO 62063) are the Hugo Award coordinators. (If you have trouble figuring out whether a work is novella, novelette or short story, by the way, you might check the Locus poll or another source for the wordcount.) Feel free to duplicate and distribute the form, but remember, only Supporting or Attending members of Nolacon II may nominate. Please note the deadline — April 30th! Nominations must be postmarked by then.

You'll find a new category — and we think a new freedom — on the 1988 Hugo ballot. Article II Section 15 of the World Science Fiction Society Constitution gives the Worldcon committee the right to create a special, one-time-only Hugo category in its year. The Nolacon II committee has chosen to do so. The category's name? Other Forms. By Other Forms we mean any work in the field of Science Fiction or Fantasy appearing in the previous year (1987) which does not properly fit into any of the other Hugo categories.

Other forms sounds like a catch-all category, and, in effect, it is. It's boundless. Anything created in the SF field in 1987 qualifies — if it isn't covered by a traditional Hugo. Want to name a comic book/graphic novel to the Hugo lists? It should go under Other Forms; the fiction categories, we feel, belong to prose, and comics are far more than mere illustrated stories. Read an SF poem you wish to honor? Don't be fooled by word-count — a poem is not a short story, a novelette, or a novella: it's another form, and belongs on that list. Believe a game has Hugo-calibre? How about a song? (Not a recording, mind you — that would qualify under Dramatic Presentation.) Name it. All will find a place under Other Forms.

So: nominate, and vote. In this as in every category, use your intelligence, your imagination, your good taste. Remember you may nominate five works in any one category. The final **Hugo** ballot will appear in *Catch a Doubloon's* next issue. And the **Hugo Awards** will be presented on Sunday, September 4th, 1988, at **Nolacon II**.

As it was last issue, a housing reservation form is being included in this progress report. Complete it and submit it as soon as possible, if you haven't already; the New Orleans Convention Bureau is frantic, with 17 other conventions occurring before Nolacon, including a small soiree for the Republicans, but promises close, professional attention to our needs. In any event, get your reservations in, A.S.A.P.! We're told that acknowledgments will come forth in the spring.

The housing form runs on the same sheet as Sam Jeude's Access and Medical Questionnaire, which we urge all those who'll have special needs at worldcon to submit. We want nothing to get into the way of the best of good times at Nolacon II.

In other matters, a few requests. Nolacon needs fan art to spice up its progress reports — help! (Write to the publications department for preferred themes and subjects.) We also need photographs of Hugo Award ceremonies and winners from worldcons gone by — particularly the earlier years, before 1960. We also need (to repeat) pictures of the Nolacon II krewe during our bid for the 1988 worldcon — particularly, shots taken in our ConFederation party suite. Some priceless moments there should be shared with all of fandom.

We need immediate **change of address notices**. More than two hundred copies of our second issue had to be remailed — just because folks didn't tell us when they moved. We need your volunteer labor (forms still available, now being passed on to the proper departments), your good wishes, your suggestions, your hopes. Not to mention — your attendance next Labor Day!

Lastly, the Nolacon II committee would like to extend its deepest condolences to Mary Wismer on the recent death of her mother.



## Art show

#### The Hall

The Art Show for Nolacon II will be held in the New Orleans Marriott Hotel, September 1-5, 1988. We have the Exhibit Hall for the artwork and the adjoining LaGallerie for Auctions and Sales. In effect we have 30,000 square feet: the entire second floor of the hotel. The Hall and LaGallerie arrangement is very close to ideal.

### **Display Panels**

We will have rented sturdy light grey pegboard panels erected for artists' displays. No sweat, no strain, no delays. No need for artists to help put panels together. Or take them apart either. Cost will be \$32.00 for a full panel, 4' by 8', plus 10 per cent commission on sales.

#### Requirements

Flat art must be matted, mounted, framed or otherwise suitable for display. Humidity and air conditioning can cause flimsy or unbacked work to curl or bend.

Artwork may be in any medium, including photography, and should be your own composition. Nothing flammable or toxic, of course, and nothing requiring feeding, thank you. Likely themes are listed under **Awards**, below, and we leave content to your own good taste. The title and artist's name must be printed on the back of each piece, or securely attached to 3-D work and handcrafts.

Once entered by the artist or agent the artwork may not be withdrawn for private sale, or the minimum bid changed until the show closes at noon, Monday. Insurance while the artwork is in transit to and from the Art Show is the responsibility of the artist or agent. All artwork must have a title for positive identification.

#### **Print Shop**

We will accept one signed, limited edition print of each subject as an original to be hung and sold with artwork. An artist wishing to offer several prints may put a card/sign on his panel directing buyers to the Print Shop, which will be within the Art Show Hall, but run separately by A.S.F.A. For information send a self-addressed stamped envelope to

Three voice auctions will decide the buyer of every piece to reach six written bids. Auctions will run early and late Saturday afternoon, and another Sunday afternoon. Times will be posted. Each of the three auctions will be designated by a color. The appropriate number of pieces allotted to an auction time frame will be marked by that auction's color.

#### Awards

Ballots will be available for voting in ten categories. Ribbons will be awarded to both Professional and Amateur art. The categories: Science Fiction, Fantasy, Astronomical, Humor, 3-D Craftsmanship, 3-D Creativity, Use of Color, Monochrome, and Popular Choice.

There will also be an award for best *Harlequin* in both pro and amateur divisions

Artists may vote for their peers at their Special Viewing on Thursday evening. The convention membership will vote all Friday and until noon Saturday.



### DONALD A. WOLLHEIM

Donald A. Wollheim has excelled in almost every area of SF achievement. He was among the founders of science fiction fandom and was one of the pioneers of fan publishing. He has written 21 SF novels and a number of non-fiction works. As an anthologist he knows no peer, and his work with Avon, Ace and DAW Publishers, which he founded, has earned him credit kas "one of the most important editors in the history of science fiction." Discover and first book publisher of such SF greats as Philip K. Dick and Ursula K. LeGuin, "the Dean of Science Fiction" — also known as the Great Ghod "Ghu" — receives recognition long overdue as Professional Guest of Honor at Nolacon II.





### ROGER SIMS

Co-chairman of *Detention* (thanks, Lynn), Roger Sims achieved perhaps his most lasting fame in fandom at the fabled Room 770 party at the original **Nolacon**, in 1951. The "teddy bear" has been active in conventions and fanzine writing since sometime before the birth of the machine age, and is widely regarded as one of fandom's most gentle and genial spirits. A lifetime of jolly camaraderie will be celebrated as Roger serves as Fan Guest of Honor at **Nolacon II**.

### MIKE RESNICK

Mike Resnick's novels include Santiago, Tales of the Velvet Comet, and his latest work from Tor Books, The Dark Lady. Dedicated world travelers, Mike and his wonderful wife Carol have several times won Best of Show honors at worldcon masquerades. Owner of one of the nation's largest Kennels, Mike's terrific SF and warm wit made him the natural choice for Toastmaster at Nolacon II.



# Masquerade

The Fandom of the Opera — a.k.a. Drew Sanders — haunts Bourbon Street on Mardi Gras, 1988!

The Nolacon Masque will be using the now-traditional two divisions and three classes of competition — these are defined as:

Recreation Division — where the costume is taken from another visual source. This includes films, comics, book illustrations or covers, or television. The basis for judging is the accuracy of the re-creation to the original source. Contestants are encouraged to submit copies of the source materials (no originals, please!) to the judges to validate the authenticity of their work.

**Original Division** — where the costume is taken from an original idea, or where the design is taken from a description from any written source material.

The Original Division is divided into three "Skill Classes" with the classes being determined by success at previous Worldcon masquerades. These classes are defined as follows:

Novice — Anyone who has never won an award (other than an Honorable Mention) at a Worldcon Masquerade.

**Journeyman** — Anyone who has won at least once and less than three times in Worldcon Masquerade competition.

Master — Anyone who has won at least three times in Worldcon Masquerade competition.

Any entrant is allowed to compete in a higher class, and will then be judged by the standards and against the other entrants of that class. If the entry wins after competing in Master Class, the entrant must always thereafter compete as a Master.

There will be no microphones available to entrants on the stage at the Nolacon II Masque. Any sound to accompany an entry must be pre-recorded on cassette tape, or typed out for the Master of Ceremonies to read as the costume is presented.

The Master of Ceremonies for the **Nolacon II Masque** will be **Robert Silverberg**.

Presentation will be limited to 60 seconds, except by prior arrangement with **The Master of the Masque**. Additional time may be allocated according to the number of people in the group.

No costume previously entered in a Worldcon masquerade may compete, nor may any professionally made costume (purchased or rented), nor any costume which appeared in the halls of the Worldcon prior to Saturday evening.

No flash photography will be allowed outside of the photo areas.

Nothing may be worn, done, or brought which presents a real possibility of damage to the health or well being of the entrants, their costumes, or the audience. In any case of doubt, entrants should consult with **The Master of the Masque**.

Registration for the Nolacon II Masque will be done in advance, by mail. If there is any possibility that you will be competing, you can only do so by registering in advance. If it turns out that you won't be able to compete, you may then withdraw your entry.

Prospective contestants should send me the following information:

- (1) A working title for the entry.
- (2) The name and address of someone who will act as

representative for that entry. A telephone number will be useful, but is not mandatory.

- (3) The number of people expected to participate in that entry.
  - (4) The predominant color to be used in the entry.
  - (5) Any special requirements for the entry.

Acknowledgment of the receipt of the entry will go to the person designated. If no acknowledgment has been received within two weeks after the entry is mailed, you should assume that your letter got lost in the mail, and write again.

Registration will open on May 1, and close on August 6. Following this procedure will reserve a place in the com-

petition, pending confirmation of intent to compete made at the convention itself. There will be a Masque Information Desk at the convention where entrants may come to confirm that they will be competing. (Contestants who anticipate not being at the convention until Saturday can make separate arrangements by

mail.) Masque Information should also be informed of any major changes which have occurred in the entry since the last mail contact.

Participation in the Living Historical Costume Display should also be arranged by mail. Since there is no judging, I'm only interested in getting a rough count of the number of people interested, and I would like to prepare a presentation list so that we don't have a series of the same type of clothing being shown.

Please send a name and address to me at the address listed above. Include the era from which your Historical Costume is from, and an environment for it (i.e., "Court Dress for Regency England" or "Peasant Clothing from the French Revolution" or "Indian Headdress from Late 17th Century South-Western America" etc.)

Anyone interested in The Masque or any of the other **Nolacon II** costume functions is again invited to write to me to solicit copies of *Behind the Masque*, the **Nolacon** Costuming Newsletter. I anticipate having issue #2 ready by early April. It should include some information about the stage set-up which will not be available in the **Nolacon** progress reports.

# Programming

Nolacon's Programming Division has been busy since the last PR. Our massive promailing, covering the active membership of the Science Fiction Writers of America (and a selection of associates and nonmembers as well) has gone out, and has already generated a gratifying number of responses.

Keep those letters coming! Very shortly—probably at the beginning of April—we hope to have a more structured program outline for your perusal. This will be mailed to those who responded to the initial mailing, so if you want to be on the programming mailing list, please make sure you respond. But, since no net catches every fish, if we missed you, please write us posthaste.

In that same vein: even if you don't want to appear on any program item, but have some ideas as to what you might like to see, by all means share your ideas with us. It could be a new panel subject you've always wanted to see, or one which you think deserves wider exposure. In fact, we're particularly interested in the latter — good program items that were presented at local or regional conventions, but which merit larger audiences. Be as detailed as you like; suggest possible participants if any names particularly suggest themselves.

The Programming Division is particularly pleased to announce the association — as Mainstream Programming Development Unit heads — of Rick Foss and Mike Glyer. Rick can be written at: Ladera Travel, 2041 Rosecrans, Suite 103, El Segundo CA 90245, and Mike at 5828 Woodman Ave., No. 2, Van Nuys CA 91401. Dick and Nicki Lynch (4207 Davis

Lane, Chattanooga TN 37416) are in charge of Fan Programming; they are currently developing a comprehensive program covering history, development, care and feeding of Worldcons—from the first ill-advised stirrings of bid ambition to the exhausted Monday postmortems. Fred Patten (11863 W. Jefferson Blvd., Culver City CA 90230) has charge of Special Interests Programming. Those specialty groups interested in scheduling meetings or other program items can either contact Fred directly, or through the Nolacon address. Particular note: those clubs, organizations, etc., that would like to schedule meetings, parties, get togethers, what-have-you at the Con should waste no time in contacting us; while we have numerous meeting rooms, our facilities are not infinite.

Horror and Fantasy Programming is under the capable control of Rusty Burke (2501 Tanglewilde H-75, Houston TX 77063). I'll take this opportunity to repeat an announcement from last PR: Rusty is planning a Hyborian Legion Banquet at Nolacon, featuring Novalyne Price Ellis as speaker. Mrs. Ellis is the author of One Who Walked Alone, an evocative memoir of her friendship with Robert E. Howard. Connoisseurs of Howard and of Heroic Fantasy will not wish to miss this rare opportunity to not only gain insight into the character of Howard, but also to socialize with other students of the genre.

Children's Programming will be handled by Rick Norwood (Box 336, Mountain Home TN 37684.) Rick has some very interesting ideas in this area — increasingly important in recent conventions — but can use ideas and help.

The Film Program is being run by The Big Reel, Joe Grillot, noted equally for his booming voice, New Orleans accent, encyclopedic knowledge of SF and horror movies, and cheerful workaholic attitude towards anything having to do with running film programs. Joe is also looking for volunteers with 35 mm experience to help him execute the film program. Video Programming will include the Dimensional MasqueCompetition, run for experimental, avant garde films and video. Contact DM at 7015 E. Pasadena Avenue, Scottsdale AZ 85253 for details concerning submissions to the competition. Nolacon is particularly interested in running video material that is more offbeat than normally found on most con video programs; we do not want the Video Room turned into a mere adjunct of the Movie Room, running video copies of movies intended for (and better viewed on) the movie screen. Any particular suggestions you might have in this area would be welcomed; write us at the Con address.

Several Special Exhibits are also planned. Drew Sanders, our MasqueMaster, plans a costume exhibit, and the Laughlin/Potter photography exhibit noted last PR is still being developed. The most ambitious exhibit planned, however, is one featuring fantasy art done in connection with Mardi Gras — figures for floats, costumes, etc., most done by the city's most famous parade designer (as well as longtime fan and fan artist) Dany Frolich. Unfortunately, space prohibits our most extravagant fantasy: to bring entire floats into the exhibition hall!

In closing, I'd like to note the invaluable assistance rendered by my aide, second-in-command and general factotum, **Tom Hanlon.** Tom and I, as well as the rest of the Programming Division Staff, will spare no effort to make the **Nolacon II** programming unique and memorable.

What's more, unlike so many convention centers, this one isn't just a big, empty box. We think that con-goers will find its landscaping, architecture, and interior design as impressive as its size.

Directly across the street from the Convention Center is MagiCon's flagship hotel, the Peabody Orlando at Plaza International. The Peabody features 833 sleeping rooms, 60 suites, 58,000 square feet of meeting and function space, five restaurants, (ranging from the art-deco Bee-Line Diner to the elegant Dux), a double-Olympic sized swimming pool, a professionally-run day-care center, and a corps of trained mallard ducks.

Within one mile of the Convention Center are 12 more hotels, with a total of 4,000 sleeping rooms. Of course, a great Worldcon needs more than great facilities. Also essential is a capable, dedicated con committee. We're confident that we have that, too. Our committee members have held top positions in past Worldcons, and founded and chaired major local and regional conventions. We have acquired a wealth of useful experience, and continue to do so.

While MagiCon, like all other modern Worldcons, will recruit its staff from all over the country, our solid local base gives us the vital foundation for a first-rate con.

# Growing Like MAGIC

That's what we're doing. We are fast approaching 900 presupporting memberships. T-Shirt sales have sky-rocketed, and we've had to go to a second printing of the first issue of our bidzine. The bid parties we threw at Worldcon and NASFiC were our most successful to date, due in large part to the unbridled enthusiasm of all who attended. Our thanks to those who showed their support.

The MagiCon bid is not the only thing that is growing - the entire Orlando area is too. By 1990, Orlando will be host to two motion picture production studios, Walt Disney World Village's new Pleasure Island nighttime entertainment facility, and Typhoon Lagoon, a 50 acre, 50 Million dollar water thrill park. These are in addition to the theme parks that have already made Orlando famous.

### **B**UTTONS? WE DOAN' NEED NO FEELTHY BUTTONS (OR, READ THIS ARTICLE! THE LIFE YOU SAVE COULD BE YOUR OWN!)

Look at the logos below, Commit them to memory — please! They're here to help you — and other members of the convention — help people who need a little extra assistance. (There will be a test involving recognition of these logos, later this year!)

See this?




It's the Access Logo, and if it's on a Button, it indicates the person needs/is using Access. Do not hassle them, even if they look as healthy as a horse - something in their bodies isn't as strong as it is in yours. Access features at Nolacon II include: going to the head of a line at autographing (thereby saving weak knees, spines, and etc. that won't work for more than a few hours — to a few seconds!), allowing the person to enter a room ahead of the crowd (spares us that run-down feeling!), special seating (so the blind and vision-impaired can "see" an event, and the deaf "hear" speeches or presentations), use of hotel service elevators (again, to spare weak bodies), and separate entrances and exits at some heavily-attended events (again, to protect someone from being knocked down).

The best point about this logo is that it can be removed by anyone who wants to use some (but not all) Access features. So if you see a woman with a guide dog, or a man in a wheelchair, and they don't have an Access button on ... well, they're traveling "incognito" as a "normal" person.

A variant of this logo will be used for a special Nolacon II logo which will incorporate the convention's harlequin-and-doubloon theme. If you were at ConFederation, or CactusCon, you might have seen these illustrations, specially designed around those conventions' themes.

I've already seen the NOLa Access logo; you're gonna like it.

The Nolacon Access Logo Armband indicates the person is working as a Go-fer currently on duty. (Yes, Virginia, you'll see people wearing both button and armband. They're called "hard-working people" or "masochists" depending on what's going on!)

The Helper Logo Button



belongs to a person aiding someone with an Access button. They'll be found sitting next to the H/A button wearers at events, using whatever Access options (such as service elevators or maintenance corridors) the hotels allow, while they're with their H/A friend, or, in an emergency, running to find help.

If you see a sign with Access Logo and the words Handicapped Only,



that means you're not to use these corridors, seats, elevators or doorways. If you decide that being left-handed, having a hangnail, or suffering from a foot that's gone to sleep means you're handicapped - good luck. The dragon, err, gentleman who has volunteered to serve as our Security Head has a simple solution to such conceit: he turns offenders into users. Permanently.

For those who worry about such things: these buttons and armbands will not be licenses allowing the wearers to abuse federal, state, local or convention law, nor will they excuse obnoxiousness or a general lapse from humanity. They're a badge of honor (like a uniform, or a medal), which says "I love fandom so much I've decided to quit listening to my body and spend time with my friends, instead. When I need a little help, I hope you'll understand why I need it. And if you ever need my help, I'll be more than glad to help you!"

### 1988 HUGO NOMINATING BALLOT

### PLEASE READ THE FOLLOWING INSTRUCTIONS BEFORE COMPLETING THE HUGO NOMINATING BALLOT

In order to nominate or to vote on the final ballot for the 1988 Hugo Awards you must be either a supporting or an attending member of Nolacon II (but remember an attending membership allows you the fun and excitement of attending the awards ceremony itself).

Be sure to take your time when filling out the ballot. We are sending these out fairly early, giving you at least a month before the nomination deadline. Although we do ask that you not wait until the very last minute to submit your ballot, please take care and make certain that your nominations are ones you really want to make. If you have questions about the rules, write to us and we will do our best to answer. We will **NOT** answer requests for counting the words in a story. An easy way to estimate would be to count the words on a typical page and multiply.

We have provided spaces for author, title and publisher/publication for each written work; please fill each section out in its entirety. In the categories for shorter fiction, please indicate when as well as where each work was published. PLEASE PRINT OR TYPE YOUR BALLOTS.

In order to be eligible for the 1988 Hugos, all works must have been published during the period from January 1, 1987 to December 31, 1987. A work originally appearing in a language other than English is also eligible in the year in which it is first issued in English translation. A story, once it has appeared in English, is therefore only eligible once. Publication date, or, in the case of a dated periodical, the cover date, takes precedence over copyright date. A serial's date of appearance will be considered to be the date of the last installment. Individual stories appearing as a series are eligible only as individual stories, and are not eligible under the name of the series.

The Science Fiction Achievement Awards (Hugos) are defined as follows:

BEST NOVEL: a science fiction or fantasy story of 40,000 words or more.

BEST NOVELLA: a science fiction or fantasy story between 17,500 and 40,000 words in length.

BEST NOVELETTE: a science fiction or fantasy story between 7,500 and 17,500 words in length.

BEST SHORT STORY: a science fiction or fantasy story less than 7,500 words in length. BEST NON-FICTION BOOK: any non-fictional work relating to the field of science fiction or fantasy appearing for the first time in book form during the calendar year 1987.

OTHER FORMS: any science fiction or fantasy related work that does not technically fit within any of the other stated categories (i.e., scripts, graphic novels, etc.) published during the calendar year 1987\*

BEST DRAMATIC PRESENTATION: any production in any medium of dramatized science fiction or fantasy which has been publicly presented for the first time in its present dramatic form during the 1987 calendar year. In the case of individual programs presented as a series, each program is individually eligible, but the series as a whole is not eligible; however, a sequence of installments constituting a single dramatic unit may be considered as a single program (eligible in the year of the final installment).

BEST PROFESSIONAL EDITOR: the editor of any professional publication devoted primarily to science fiction or fantasy during the 1987 calendar year. A professional publication is one which had an average press run of at least 10,000 copies per issue.

\*This is a new category, as allowed under the rules of the WSFS Constitution. The committee does reserve the right to disallow any entry which it feels does not fit within the rules as laid out by the aforesaid constitution.

BEST PROFESSIONAL ARTIST: an illustrator whose work has appeared in a professional publication in the field of science fiction or fantasy during the 1987 calendar year.

BEST SEMIPROZINE: any generally available non-professional publication devoted to science fiction or fantasy which has published four or more issues, at least one of which appeared in the 1987 calendar year, and which in the 1986 calendar year met at least two of the following criteria: (1) had an average press run of at least 1,000 copies per issue; (2) paid its contributors and/or staff in other than copies of the publication; (3) provided at least half the income of any one person; (4) had at least 15% of its total space occupied by advertising, or; (5) announced itself to be a semi-prozine.


BEST FANZINE: any generally available non-professional publication devoted to science fiction, fantasy or related subjects which has published four or more issues, at least one of which appeared in the 1987 calendar year, and which does not qualify as a semi-prozine.

BEST FAN WRITER: any person whose writing has appeared in semi-prozines or fanzines.

BEST FAN ARTIST: an artist or cartoonist whose work has appeared in semi-prozines, fanzines or other public display during the 1987 calendar year. Any person whose name appears on the final Hugo Awards ballot for a given year under the Professional Artist category shall not be eligible in the Fan Artist category for that year.

ALL DEFINITIONS ARE BASED ON THE WORLD SCIENCE FICTION SOCIETY CONSTITUTION.

THE JOHN W. CAMPBELL AWARD FOR BEST NEW WRITER (sponsored by Davis Publications): any writer whose first professionally published science fiction or fantasy story appeared during the calendar years 1986 or 1987 (first publication is defined in the same manner as for the Hugo fiction awards).







### CONSTITUTION of the World Science Fiction Society, December 1987

#### Article I - Name, Objectives, Membership, and Organization

- Section 1: The name of this organization shall be the World Science Fiction Society, hereinafter referred to as WSFS or the Society.
- Section 2: WSFS is an unincorporated literary society whose functions are:
  - A. To choose the recipients of the annual Science Fiction Achievement Awards (the Hugo Awards),
  - B. To choose the locations and Committees for the annual World Science Fiction Conventions (hereinafter referred to as Worldcons).
  - C. To attend those Worldcons.
  - D. To choose the locations and Committees for the occasional North American Science Fiction Conventions (hereinafter referred to as NASFiCs), and
  - E. To perform such other activities as may be necessary or incidental to the above purposes.
- Section 3: No part of the Society's net earnings shall be paid to its members, officers, or other private persons except in furtherance of the Society's purposes. The Society shall not attempt to influence legislation or any political campaign for public office. Should the Society dissolve, its assets shall be distributed by the current Worldcon Committee or the appropriate court having jurisdiction, exclusively for charitable purposes. In this section, references to the Society include the Mark Registration and Protection Committee and all other agencies of the Society but not convention bidding or operating committees.
- Section 4: The Membership of WSFS shall consist of all people who have paid membership dues to the Committee of the current Worldcon.
- Section 5: Members of WSFS paying the minimum fee towards membership with their site-selection ballots shall be members of the selected Worldcon with the right to receive all generally distributed publications. Such members may convert to members with the right of general attendance at the selected Worldcon and its Business Meeting by paying, within ninety (90) days of site selection, an additional fee, set by the selected Worldcon Committee, of not more than the minimum voting fee and not more than the difference between the voting fee and the attending fee for new members.
- Section 6: Authority and responsibility for all matters concerning the Worldcon, except those reserved herein to WSFS, shall rest with the Worldcon Committee, which shall act in its own name and not in that of WSFS.
- Section 7: Every Worldcon Committee shall include the following notice in each of its publications:

  "World Science Fiction Society", "WSFS", "World Science Fiction Convention", "Worldcon", "NASFiC",

  "Science Fiction Achievement Award", and "Hugo Award" are service marks of the World Science Fiction Society, an unincorporated literary society.
- Section 8: Each Worldcon Committee should dispose of surplus funds remaining after accounts are settled for the current Worldcon for the benefit of WSFS as a whole. Each Worldcon Committee shall submit an annual financial report, including a statement of income and expenses, to each WSFS Business Meeting after the Committee's selection through the first or second Business Meeting after its Worldcon, at its option, to which it will also submit a cumulative final financial report.

### Article II - Science Fiction Achievement Awards (the Hugo Awards)

Section 1: Selection of the Science Fiction Achievement Awards, known as the Hugo Awards, shall be made as follows in the subsequent Sections of this Article.

- Section 2: Best Novel: A science fiction or fantasy story of forty thousand (40,000) words or more appearing for the first time during the previous calendar year. A work originally appearing in a language other than English shall also be eligible in the year in which it is first issued in English translation. A story, once it has appeared in English, may thus be eligible only once. Publication date, or cover date in the case of a dated periodical, takes precedence over copyright date. A serial takes its appearance to be the date of the last installment. Individual stories appearing as a series are eligible only as individual stories and are not eligible taken together under the title of the series. An author may withdraw a version of a work from consideration if the author feels that the version is not representative of what said author wrote. The Worldcon Committee may relocate a story into a more appropriate category limits.
- Section 3: Best Novella: The rules shall be the same as those for Best Novel, with length between seventeen thousand five hundred (17,500) and forty thousand (40,000) words.
- Section 4: Best Novelette: The rules shall be the same as those for Best Novel, with length between seven thousand five hundred (7,500) and seventeen thousand five hundred (17,500) words.
- Section 5: Best Short Story: The rules shall be the same as those for Best Novel, with length less than seven thousand five hundred (7,500) words.
- Section 6: Best Non-Fiction Book: Any non-fictional work whose subject is the field of science fiction or fantasy or fandom appearing for the first time in book form during the previous calendar year.
- Section 7: Best Dramatic Presentation: Any production in any medium of dramatized science fiction or fantasy which has been publicly presented for the first time in its present dramatic form during the previous calendar year. In the case of individual programs presented as a series, each program is individually eligible, but the series as a whole is not eligible; however, a sequence of installments constituting a single dramatic unit may be considered as a single program (eligible in the year of the final installment).
- Section 8: Best Professional Editor: The editor of any professional publication devoted primarily to science fiction or fantasy during the previous calendar year. A professional publication is one which had an average press run of at least ten thousand (10,000) copies per issue.
- Section 9: Best Professional Artist: An illustrator whose work has appeared in a professional publication in the field of science fiction or fantasy during the previous calendar year.
- Section 10: Best Semiproxine: Any generally available non-professional publication devoted to science fiction or fantasy which has published four (4) or more issues, at least one (1) of which appeared in the previous calendar year, and which in the previous calendar year met at least two (2) of the following criteria: (1) had an average press run of at least one thousand (1000) copies per issue, (2) paid its contributors and/or staff in other than copies of the publication, (3) provided at least half the income of any one person, (4) had at least fifteen percent (15%) of its total space occupied by advertising, or (5) announced itself to be a semiproxine.
- Section 11: Best Fanzine: Any generally available non-professional publication devoted to science fiction, fantasy, or related subjects which has published four (4) or more issues, at least one (1) of which appeared in the previous calendar year, and which does not qualify as a semiprozine.
- Section 12: Best Fan Writer: Any person whose writing has appeared in semiprozines or fanzines.
- Section 13: Best Fan Artist: An artist or cartoonist whose work has appeared through publication in semiprozines or fanzines or through other public display during the previous calendar year. Any person whose name appears on the final Hugo Awards ballot for a given year under the Professional Artist category shall not be eligible in the Fan Artist category for that year.

- Section 14: Extended Eligibility: In the event that a potential Hugo Award nominee receives extremely limited distribution in the year of its first publication or presentation, its eligibility may be extended for an additional year by a three-fourths (3/4) vote of the intervening Business Meeting of WSFS.
- Section 15: Additional Category: Not more than one special category may be created by the current Worldcon Committee with nomination and voting to be the same as for the permanent categories. The Worldcon Committee is not required to create any such category; such action by a Worldcon Committee should be under exceptional circumstances only; and the special category created by one Worldcon Committee shall not be binding on following Committees. Awards created under this Section shall be considered to be Science Fiction Achievement Awards, or Hugo Awards.
- Section 16: Name and Design: The Hugo Award shall continue to be standardized on the rocket ship design of Jack McKnight and Ben Jason. Each Worldcon Committee may select its own choice of base design. The name (Hugo Award) and the design shall not be extended to any other award.
- Section 17: No Award: At the discretion of an individual Worldcon Committee, if the lack of nominations or final votes in a specific category shows a marked lack of interest in that category on the part of the voters, the Award in that category shall be cancelled for that year. In addition, the entry "No Award" shall be mandatory in each category of Hugo Award on the final ballot. In any event, No Award shall be given whenever the total number of valid ballots cast for a specific category is less than twenty-five percent (25%) of the total number of final Award ballots (excluding those cast for No Award) received.
- Section 18: Nominations: Selection of nominees for the final Award voting shall be done by a poll conducted by the Worldcon Committee, in which each WSFS member shall be allowed to make five (5) equally weighted nominations in every category. Nominations shall be solicited for, and the final Award ballot shall list, only the Hugo Awards and the John W. Campbell Memorial Award for Best New Writer. Assignment to the proper category of nominees nominated in more than one category, and eligibility of nominees, shall be determined by the Worldcon Committee. No nominee shall appear on the final Award ballot if it received fewer nominations than the lesser of either: five percent (5%) of the number of nomination ballots cast in that category, or the number of nominations received by the third-place nominee in that category.
- Section 19: Notification and Acceptance: Worldcon Committees shall use reasonable efforts to notify the nominees, or in the case of deceased or incapacitated persons, their heirs, assigns, or legal guardians, in each category prior to the release of such information. Each nominee shall be asked at that time to either accept or decline the nomination.
- Section 20: Voting: Final Award voting shall be by mail, with ballots sent only to WSFS members. Final Award ballots shall include name, signature, address, and membership-number spaces to be filled in by the voter. Final Award ballots shall standardize nominees given in each category to not more than five (5) (six (6) in the case of tie votes) plus "No Award." The Committee shall, on or with the final ballot, designate, for each nominee in the printed fiction categories, one or more books, anthologies, or magazines in which the nominee appeared (including the book publisher or magazine issue date(s)). Voters shall indicate the order of their preference for the nominees in each category.
- Section 21: Tallying: Counting of all votes shall be the responsibility of the Worldcon Committee, which is responsible for all matters concerning the Awards. In each category, votes shall first be tallied by the voter's first choices. If no majority is then obtained, the nominee who places last in the initial tallying shall be eliminated and the ballots listing it as first choice shall be redistributed on the basis of those ballots' second choices. This process shall be repeated until a majority-vote winner is obtained. The complete numerical vote totals, including all preliminary tallies for first, second, ... places, shall be made public by the Worldcon Committee within ninety (90) days after the Worldcon.

Section 22: Exclusions: No member of the current Worldcon Committee nor any publications closely connected with a member of the Committee shall be eligible for an Award. However, should the Committee delegate all authority under this Article to a Subcommittee whose decisions are irrevocable by the Worldcon Committee, then this exclusion shall apply to members of the Subcommittee only.

#### Article III — Future Worldcon Selection

- Section 1: WSFS shall choose the location and Committee of the Worldcon to be held three (3) years from the date of the current Worldcon. Voting shall be by mail or ballot cast at the current Worldcon with run-off ballot as described in Article II, Section 21, and shall be limited to WSFS members who have paid at least twenty U.S. dollars (\$20.00) or equivalent towards membership in the Worldcon whose site is being selected. The current Worldcon Committee shall administer the mail balloting, collect the advance membership fees, and turn over those funds to the winning Committee before the end of the current Worldcon. The minimum voting fee can be modified for a particular year by unanimous agreement of the current Worldcon Committee and all bidding committees who have filed before the deadline. The site-selection voting totals shall be announced at the Business Meeting and published in the first or second Progress Report of the winning Committee, with the by-mail and at-convention votes distinguished.
- Section 2: Site-selection ballots shall include name, signature, address, and membership-number spaces to be filled in by the voter. Each site-selection ballot shall list the options "None of the above" and "No preference" and provide for write-in votes, after the bidders and with equal prominence. The minimum fee in force shall be listed on all site-selection ballots.
- Section 3: The name and address information shall be separated from the ballots and the ballots counted only at the Worldcon with two (2) witnesses from each bidding committee allowed to observe. Each bidding committee may make a record of the name and address of every voter. A ballot voted with first or only choice for "No preference" shall be ignored for site selection. A ballot voted with lower than first choice for "No preference" shall be ignored if all higher choices on the ballot have been eliminated in preferential tallying. "None of the above" shall be treated as a bid for tallying. If it wins, the duty of site selection shall devolve on the Business Meeting of the current Worldcon. If the Business Meeting is unable to decide by the end of the Worldcon, the Committee for the following Worldcon shall make the selection without undue delay. When a site and Committee are chosen by a Business Meeting or Worldcon Committee, they are not restricted by region or other qualifications and the choice of an out-of-rotation site shall not affect the regional rotation for subsequent years. If no bids qualify to be on the ballot, the selection shall proceed as though "None of the above" had won.
- Section 4: Bids from prospective Committees shall be allowed on the ballot by the current Worldcon Committee only upon presentation of adequate evidence of an agreement with the proposed sites' facilities, such as a conditional contract or a letter of agreement. To be eligible for site selection, a bidding committee must state the rules under which the Worldcon Committee will operate, including a specification of the term of office of their chief executive officer or officers and the conditions and procedures for the selection and replacement of such officer or officers. Written copies of these rules must be made available by the bidding committee to any member of WSFS on request. The aforementioned rules and agreements, along with an announcement of intent to bid, must be filled with the Committee that will administer the voting no later than the close of the previous Worldcon for a Worldcon bid, and no later than the end of the calendar year before the voting for a prospective NASFIC bid.

- Section 5: To ensure equitable distribution of sites, North America is divided into three (3) regions as follows: Western:

  Baja California, New Mexico, Colorado, Wyoming, Montana, Saskatchewan, and all states and provinces westward including Hawaii, Alaska, the Yukon, and the Northwest Territories; Central: Central America, the islands of the Caribbean, Mexico (except as above), and all states and provinces between the Western and Eastern regions; and Eastern: Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina, Virginia, West Virginia, Pennsylvania, New York, Quebec, and all states and provinces eastward including the District of Columbia, St. Pierre et Miquelon, Bermuda, and the Bahamas. Worldcon sites shall rotate in the order Western, Central, Eastern region, A site shall be ineligible if it is within sixty (60) miles of the site at which selection occurs.
- Section 6: A Worldcon site outside of North America may be selected by a majority vote at any Worldcon. In the event of such outside Worldcon being selected, there shall be a NASFiC in the region whose turn it would have normally been, to be held in the same year as the overseas Worldcon, with rotation skipping that region the following year. Selection of the NASFiC shall be by the identical procedure to the Worldcon selection except as provided below or elsewhere in this Constitution: (1) voting shall be by written ballot administered by the then-current Worldcon, if there is no NASFiC following the Worldcon that year, or by the NASFiC, if there is one following the Worldcon, with ballots cast either by mail or at the administering convention and with only members of the administering convention allowed to vote; (2) bids are restricted to sites in the appropriate zone; and (3) the proposed NASFiC voting fee can be set by unanimous agreement of the prospective candidates that file with the administering Committee before the calendar year in which selection occurs.
- Section 7: Each Worldcon Committee shall provide a reasonable opportunity for bona fide bidding committees for the Worldcon to be selected one year hence to make presentations.
- Section 8: With sites being selected three (3) years in advance, there are at least three selected current or future Worldcon

  Committees at all times. If one of these should be unable to perform its duties, the other selected current or

  future Worldcon Committee whose site is closest to the site of the one unable to perform its duties shall

  determine what action to take, by consulting the Business Meeting or by mail poll of WSFS if there is

  sufficient time, or by decision of the Committee if there is not sufficient time.

#### Article IV — Constitution and Powers of the Business Meeting

- Section 1: Any proposal to amend the Constitution of WSFS shall require for passage a majority of all the votes cast on the question at the Business Meeting of WSFS at which it is first debated, and also ratification by a simple majority vote of those members present and voting at a Business Meeting of WSFS held at the Worldcon immediately following that at which the amendment was first approved. Failure to ratify in the manner described shall void the proposed amendment.
- Section 2: Any change to the Constitution of WSFS shall take effect at the end of the Worldcon at which such change is ratified, except that no change imposing additional costs or financial obligations upon Worldcon Committees shall be binding upon any Committee already selected at the time when it takes effect.
- Section 3: The conduct of the affairs of WSFS shall be determined by this Constitution together with all ratified amendments hereto and such Standing Rules as the Business Meeting shall adopt for its own governance.
- Section 4: Business Meetings of WSFS shall be held at advertised times at each Worldcon. The current Worldcon

  Committee shall provide the Presiding Officer and Staff for each Meeting. Meetings shall be conducted in
  accordance with Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, the Standing Rules, and such other rules as may be
  published by the Committee in advance.

- Section 5: There shall be a Mark Registration and Protection Committee of WSFS. The Mark Registration and Protection Committee shall consist of one (1) member appointed to serve at the pleasure of each future selected Worldcon Committee and each of the two (2) immediately preceding Worldcon Committees, one (1) non-voting member appointed to serve at the pleasure of each future selected NASFiC Committee and for each Committee of a NASFiC held in the previous two years, and nine (9) members elected three (3) each year to staggered three-year terms by the Business Meeting. Of the nine elected members, no more than three may be residing, at the time of election, in any single North American region, as defined in Article III, Section 5. Elected members serve until their successors are elected. If vacancies occur in elected memberships in the committee, the remainder of the position's term may be filled by the Business Meeting, and until then temporarily filled by the Committee. There will be a meeting of the Mark Registration and Protection Committee shall determine and elect its own officers.
- Section 6: The Mark Registration and Protection Committee shall be responsible for registration and protection of the marks used by or under the authority of WSFS.
- Section 7: The Mark Registration and Protection Committee shall submit to the Business Meeting at each Worldcon a report of its activities since the previous Worldcon, including a statement of income and expense.
- Section 8: Except as otherwise provided in this Constitution, any committee or other position created by a Business
  Meeting shall lapse at the end of the next following Business Meeting that does not vote to continue it.
- Section 9: The Constitution of WSFS, together with an explanation of proposed changes approved but not yet ratified, and the Standing Rules shall be printed by the current Worldcon Committee, distributed with the Hugo nomination ballots, and distributed to all WSFS members in attendance at the Worldcon upon registration.


