## **Nothing But Promises**

### LEN J. MOFFATT

T IS OFTEN said that Anything can happen at a Convention. That's one of those statements that can easily be labeled 'trite but true', as any veteran conventioneer will tell you. Consequently, any predictions by me or anybody else as to what will happen at SOLACON would be pretty ridiculous.

However, we do have plans, and a schedule for them, the success of which depends as much on you and the people who have made promises to us as it does on the Convention Committee. Hmmm... Another one of those 'trite but true' statements. Let's talk about...beginnings.

The first question that arises when a Committee sits down to plan a Convention program is: What kind of a program do we want to present? Immediately, somebody says, 'It will have to be a fannish program, of course. After all, SOUTH GATE IN '58 is a traditionally fannish slogan!

'Well, yes,' says somebody else. 'But not completely fannish...'
'You
mean SOUTH GATE IN '58 is not a completely fannish slogan? Why,

'No, no! I mean that our program should not be completely fannish. Lots of people attending the Convention will not be fans or even faaans. If we go All Out Fannish we may lose some of our best customers. Don't forget it is a World Science Fiction Convention, and those two words, World and Science Fiction, are very important.'

'That's

three words! World, Science, and Fiction...!

"Well...pshaw. I mean we will have to have a program that will be of interest to as many interested people as possible."

'But you can't please everybody! '

No, but

you can try to please as many as possible by having a well-balanced program, with something on the schedule for each of the various types who attend Conventions. Something for the pros, and something for the fans, and something for the readers who like conventions but aren't interested in fanning or writing for the promags, and something for the part-time readers whose other interests include science without the fiction, and...'

BANG!!! (That's the Chairwoman's gavel.)

The discussion grows more orderly. It develops that a balanced program is the ideal solution, as it is obvious that actifans, pros, readers, etc., do have cross-interests. That is, a pro session will be of interest to many fans and readers, a fan session to pros and readers, and so on. Why, man, this is a breeze. No strain to building a program.

## **Nothing But Promises**

All you have to do is fill up yay many hours, and that main problem is not having enough hours to fill. There would be more, of course, if it were not that morning programming is generally considered very bad planning, and the Committee agrees on this. There must be free time for the delegates to get together informally, visit, yak, have parties, recover from parties, publish one shots, collect autographs, campaign for next year's Con, general rioting and mayhem, taking pictures (i. e. photo snapping, not stealing from the display room), making tapes, looking at displays, shopping for rare books and members of the opposite sex, catching up on one's reading so one can understand the panel discussions, passing out quote cards, passing out, writing letters home, or to Willis, or to Horrocks, baiting Bloch, going to the w/c, etc.

Suffice to say that the SOLACON Committee soon filled up the available program hours. Some items are traditionally a part of every Convention program, such as the Auction, the Masquerade Ball, and the Banquet. Scheduling these items was no trouble at all.

As most of you know, three local groups are participating in the program: the Los Angeles Science Fantasy Society will present a futuristic Fashion Show; the Pacific Rocket Society will have a demonstration and film, and will play host in the Assembly Room, and the Little Men of Berkeley are to present a play (thanks to Karen and Poul Anderson) entitled Alice in Thrilling Wonderland.

Three different panels at least: one by three well-known local scholars and debaters; a different and refreshing kind of pro panel; and one made up of fans known to most of you, which should delight the hearts of All and Sundry (Tom All and Sam Sundry, two fake fans from Pratt Falls, Nebraska)...

There will be individual speakers too. Let me drop a few names. Guest of Honor Richard Matheson, Toastmaster Tony Boucher, an eloquent TAFF Ambassador, and all the editors we can catch will hold forth before, during, and after the Banquet. Earlier in the festivities will have been a major address by Ray Bradbury, among others.

The WSFS Business Meeting will be on Sunday. Dallas, Chicago, and Detroit are competing for the 1959 WorldCon. Need I say more? The Westercon Business Meeting will be Monday afternoon, to select the site of the 1959 West Coast SF Conference. Any Bidders?

The National Fantasy Fan Federation will present a 15-minute program, and there will be meeting rooms available for fan clubs and groups to use for their own special meetings.

All the persons and items we are announcing have been promised to us, so what have we got to offer? Nothing but promises.

## Rules of the World Science Fiction Convention in 1958

#### GENERAL:

A. The Business Meeting of the 16th World Science Fiction Convention will be conducted in accordance with Robert's Rules of Order as modified by these Convention Rules, except that in the absence of controversy, formalities of procedure need not be strictly adhered to.

#### CONVENTION SITE FOR 1959:

- A. A group submitting a bid for the 1959 WorldCon shall submit in writing, to the SOLACON Secretary, at least thirty days before the Business Meeting, the name of the proposed site, names and addresses of the proposed officers and members if its committee, and the name of the group bidding.
- B. Nominating speeches shall be allowed a maximum time of ten minutes for each group placing a bid. Bids shall be placed in the name of the proposed Convention site.
- C. Seconding speeches shall be limited to two for each group placing a bid, with a meximum time of three minutes for each individual speech.
- D. Voting procedure to select the 1959 WorldCon site will be by ballot, except in the event that only one bid is placed.
- E. Should two ballots be required to select the 1959 WorldCon site, only the top bids which together received the majority of votes shall be placed on the second ballot.

#### BY-LAWS AND RESOLUTIONS:

- A. The SOLACON Committee will appoint a Rules Committee, and the membership present at 7:00 pm, Friday, August 29, 1958, will be asked to approve this appointed Rules Committee.
- B. The Rules Committee will include the Chairwoman, Secretary, and Treasurer of the SOLACON, and a parliamentarian or legal advisor.
- C. The Rules Committee will meet at some time before the Business Meeting to consider the written proposals for amending the By-Laws or for Resolutions, for inclusion in the agenda of the Business Meeting.
- D. Any proposed changes in the By-Laws of the World Science Fiction Society, Inc., must be submitted in writing to the SOLACON Secretary by 7:00 pm Friday, August 29, 1958. Membe Members proposing changes in By-Laws must be present at the Business Meeting. Discussion of By-Laws will be limited to these written proposed changes.
- E. Resolutions must be submitted in writing to the SOLACON Secretary by 7:00 pm, Friday, August 29, 1958. Members proposing Resolutions must be present at the Business Meeting. Discussion of Resolutions will be limited to these written proposed Resolutions.

### NOMINATIONS FOR DIRECTORS: OF THE WSFS, INC.

- A. Two new Directors will be elected at the Business Meeting to replace those whose terms of office expire at that time.
- B. Nominations for these two new Directors must be submitted in writing to the SOLACON Secretary by 7:00 pm, Friday, August 29, 1958, and must be signed by the nominator and the nominee.
- C. Voting procedure will be by ballot in the same manner as that for the 1959 WorldCon site.
- D. Both nominator and nominee must be members in good standing of the World Science Fiction Society, Inc.
- E. Nominating speeches will be limited to one and one-half minutes each nominator.



THE REGISTRATION desk is on the third floor, overlooking the Hall, to the right coming off the elevator.


THE HOTEL Coffee Shop is open from 7am to 8:30 pm, maybe later.


