MUSEUM OF SCIENCE AND SPACE PLANETARIUM: 3280 S.Miami Ave., Miami. 854-2222. "The Last Question," written by Isaac Asimov and narrated by Leonard Nimoy, examines energy sources in the galaxies and what would happen if energy ran out. Shows at noon, 1, 2:30, 4, 7, 8, 9:15, 10:30. Adults \$2, children and senior citizens \$1.

PLANET OCEAN: Rickenbacker Causeway, Virginia Key. 361-5786. Giant new facility explores the importance of the life-giving ocean. Six theaters and 100 theme exhibits explore every aspect of the ocean. 10am-4:30pm. Adults \$3, children 6-12 \$1.50, under 6 free.

SEAQUARIUM: Virginia Key. Visit Flipper, two two-ton killer whales and hundreds of varieties of fish. 9-5. Adults \$5, children \$2.50, under 5 free.

VIZCAYA: 3257 S.Miami Ave., Miami. 854-3531. Like a trip to Europe. Original Italian palace of the Renaissance period. 9:30-5:30. Adults \$3, students \$1.50, children 6-11 \$1.

There are many other sights in and around Miami. For more information, see KEY, WHERE, or WELCOME magazines.

WHERE TO GO FOR FOOD: There are many places to eat within a 10-15 minute drive of the hotel. Here are the closest:

WITHIN THE HOTEL

The coffee shop—open 24 hours a day, quick service, good food. Typical prices for such a place. Baked goods (baked on the premises) a must.

Boob's Steak Room—Delicious food. Entrees range from \$7.95 for chicken to \$11.95 for sirloin steak.

Poodle Lounge—Delicious luncheons. Prices a little high, but definitely worth it.

Club Gigi—I could wax poetic forever about this place.

It's a gourmet restaurant with gourmet prices (\$9.25 for Chicken Kiev, \$24 for roast rack of spring lamb for two), but the food is superb, the service a delight. Don't go if you're in a hurry because you'll be there at least two hours just enjoying.

OUT OF THE HOTEL

The Fontainebleau is on Collins Avenue where 44th St. would be if there were one. Arthur Godfrey Blvd. is the equivalent of 41st St. There are numerous places on Godfrey Blvd. to get both restaurant and grocery food. I'll list the places closest to the hotel and work my way away.

Yangtze Chinese Foods, 280 Arthur Godfrey Blvd. Fair to middling Chinese food. Soup and appetizers good, main dishes passable. Prices rather high.

Dutch Oven Restaurant. Average cafeteria fare with table service.

Manny's II. Walk in, sit down, have a bowl of kosher pickles and a bowl of coleslaw while you make your choice from the menu. Good sized portions, good food, fast service. Prices very reasonable. There's a breakfast special: juice, 2 eggs grits or potatoes, toast and coffee, 99¢ till 11am.

Hostess Pantry. Bakery and some deli foods.

Phil's Deli. Eat-in and take-out deli food.

Burger King. 910 Arthur Godfrey Blvd.

Kentucky Fried Chicken. Near Burger King.

The Forge, 432 Arthur Godfrey Blvd. Prices like Club Gigi's. Food supposed to be really superb. There's a 50-page wine list you can take with you as a souvenir; wine prices range from \$3.75 to \$10,000. The ambience is beyond words.

There is entertainment from 9pm to 4:30am.

LAST-MINUTE WORD: The Spa in the hotel will be open to all guests for a flat \$5. The sauna will be co-ed.

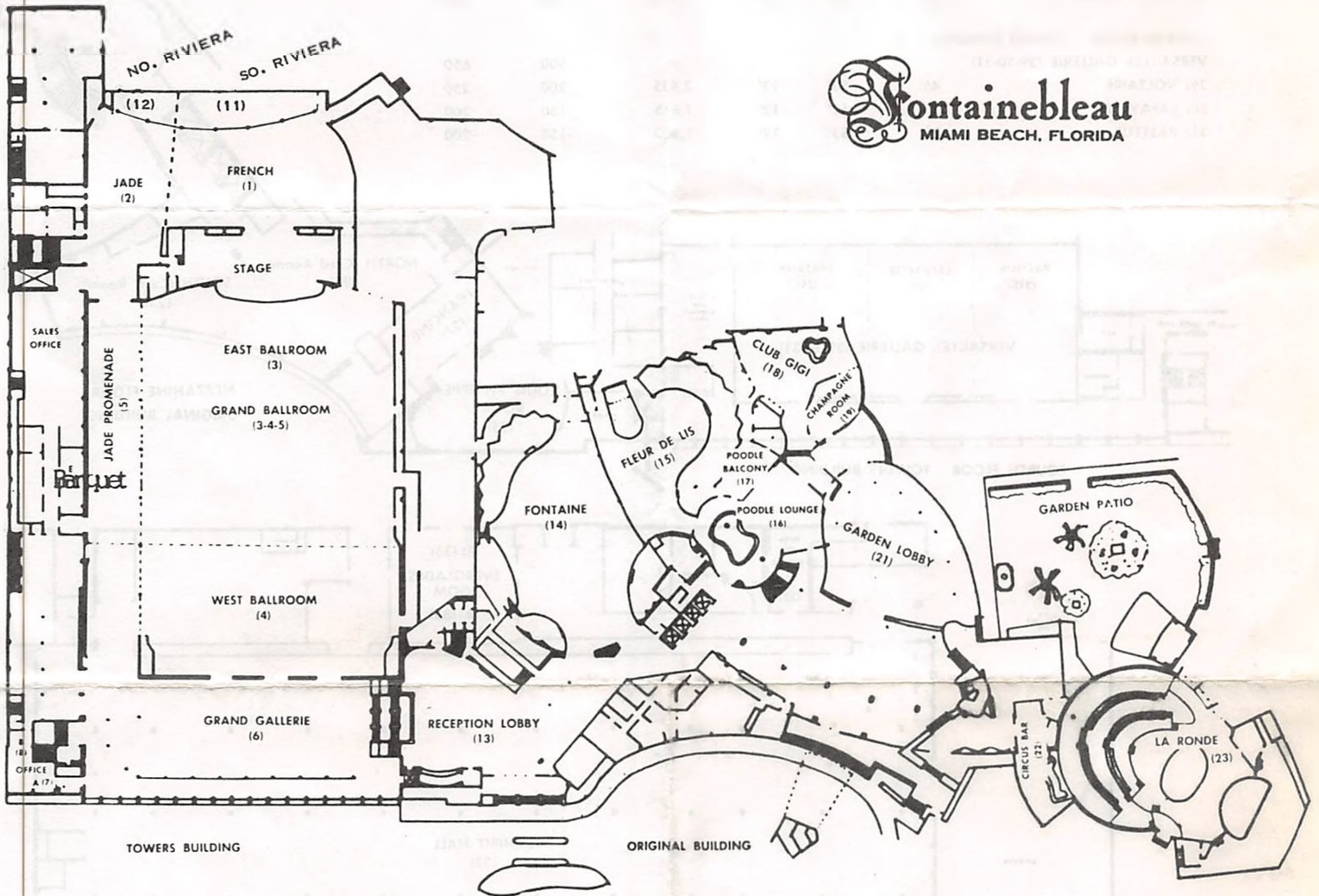

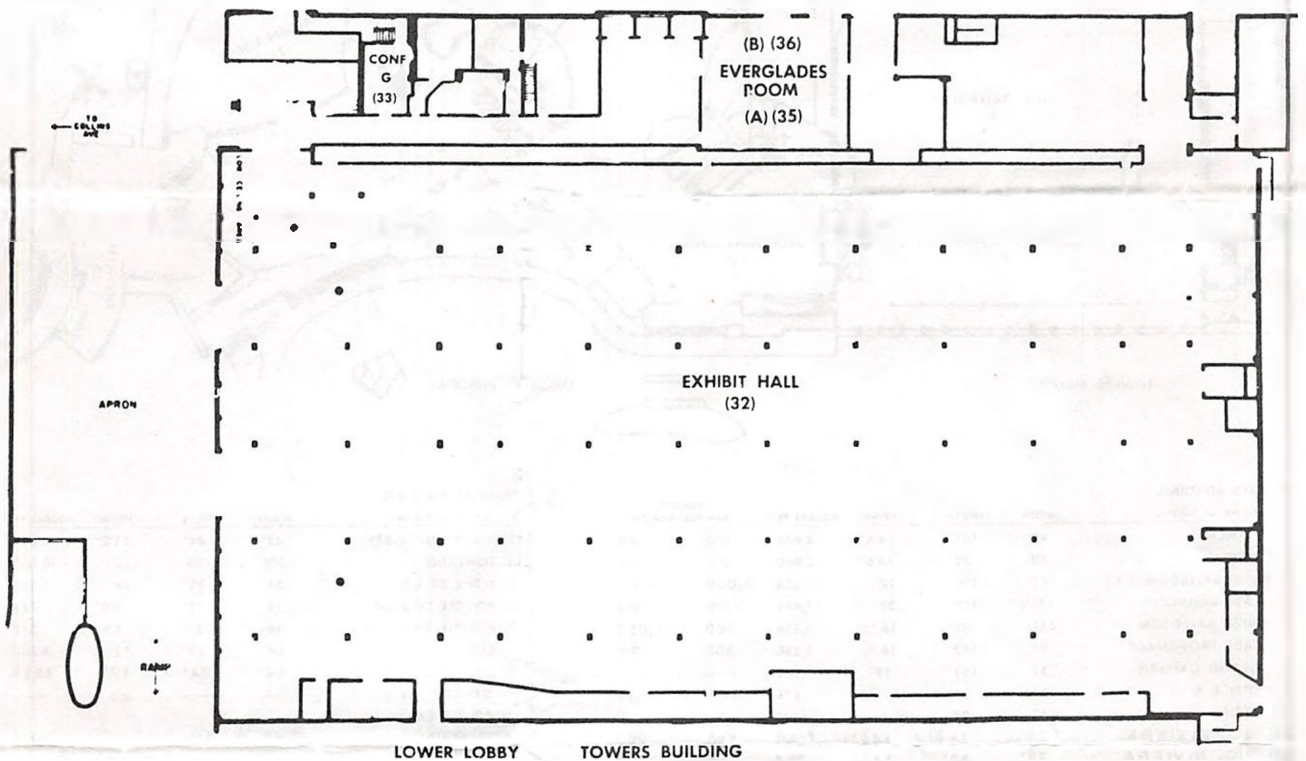
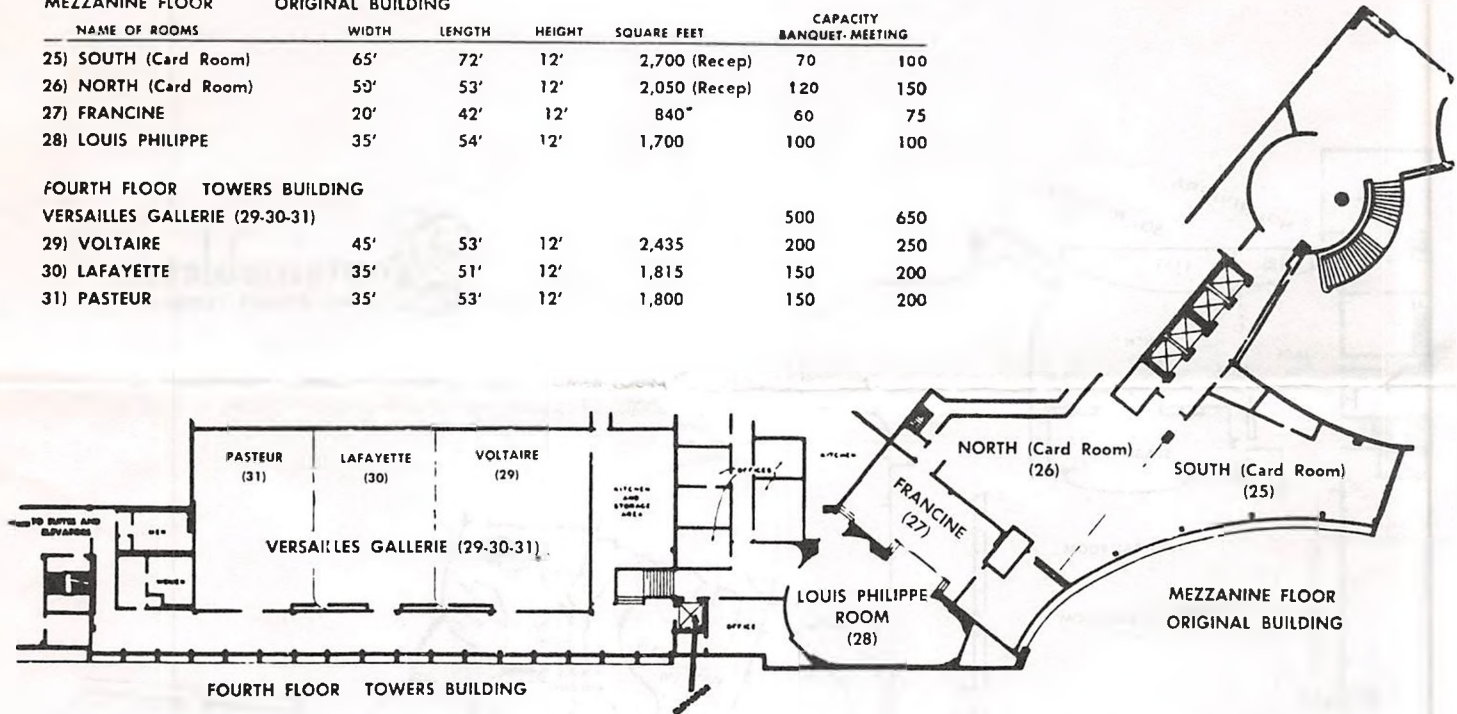
