Upcoming Movie Production News

Currently filming in Australia is a live action version of *Scooby Doo*. It stars **Freddie Prinze, Jr.** as Fred, **Matthew Lillard** as Shaggy, **Sarah Michelle Gellar** as Daphne, **Linda Cardellini** as Velma, and **Rowan Atkinson** as bad guy Mondavarious. Scooby Doo will be all CGI. Warner Bros.is comparing the movie to *Ghostbusters* and *Abbott and Costello Meet Frankenstein* with a very broad plot summary of "Scooby and the gang will be called upon to save the world"

Also filming is the **Sam Raimi** directed *Spiderman*. It stars **Tobey Maguire** as the web slinger and Peter Parker, **Willem Dafoe** as Norman Osborn/The Green Goblin, **Kirsten Dunst** as Mary Jane Watson, **J.K. Simmons** as J. Jonah Jameson, "Macho Man" **Randy Savage** as "Bone Saw" McGraw, **Rosemary Harris** as Aunt May, and **Cliff Robertson** as Uncle Ben. Also appearing in small roles are Raimi's buddy **Bruce Campbell** and Raimi's brother Ted.

Filming has begun on *Matrix 2*, which will bring most all of the cast back from the first movie and will feature **Keanu Reeves** as a superhero Neo as seen at the end of the first movie. Plans are to film a second sequel immediately after the first one, or right after the likely actor and writer strikes are settled. Look for it to open in December 2002.

GAMERS CORNER

Hello and welcome to the second issue of gamers corner. Today I'd like to review some of the d20 product released by my friends at Sword & Sorcery Studios and Necromancer Games. Oddly enough they're related. White Wolf was looking for a partner to break into the d20 market and Necromancer's slogan "Third edition rules, First edition feel" caught their attention. They collaborated on Sword & Sorcery Studios.

As I mentioned last issue SSS was first to release a monster book (Creature Compendium) and they followed up in February with "Relics and Rituals" a book of spells, magic items, ritualistic magic, and relics/artifacts. The rituals are simply cooperative magic with traditional trappings but they have some wonderful effects. The relics are ranged from a slightly overpowered weapon to items that should NEVER be held by PCs. About 40% of the content is specific to the Scarred Lands, a DnD world SSS is creating for its modules. The Creature Compendium has a Scarred Lands content of about 70% but with a little tweaking I have found that only 15% is totally resistant to use in other worlds. With similar tweaking R&R has the same usability. Necromancer Games released their first module at about the same time as the Players Handbook hit the shelves. It was a down-loadable item called "The Wizard's Amulet". They followed up with "The Crucible of Freya" and the first part of a multi-level dungeon that I think is Rappan Athuk but I left my copy at work and today is deadline (sorry Clark & Bill). I haven't been able to play these but I am familiar with them through prepping to run them. They run in magic typically between the sparseness of Greyhawk and the plenitude of Forgotten Realms. They mostly remind me of those days when I used to use the charts in the DMG (1e) to equip an opposing party. I have read elsewhere that "there is too much magic in these adventures." Know what? That is poppycock. The magic levels have such a first edition feel with high levels of dungeon crawling and good occurrence of monsters using the items they have. These modules bring back the excitement of your first dungeon experience while at the same time having the ease of the d20 system. This is a very good time to be a gamer.

Next month I was going to do some of White Wolf's product just to tie everything together but ... since they now have the contract for "Ravenloft" I will hold off until I can add that to the review. Musical Notes by Tom Tuerff

Well, one of the people who you see in the filk rooms at all the local cons has just put out a CD. The problem is, I can't review it objectively.

Because it's mine.

It's called "Something to Sell at My Gigs," and if you'd like to buy it (reviews so far have been really great and it's getting airplay in Pittsburgh --go figure), go to the "Gigs and CD News" link on my website: http://hometown.aol.com/nudeadguy

That's all the promotion I'm going to do here. But since I'm still waiting for someone, ANYONE, to send me a CD to review (please, God, or Goddess, or Grand Wazoo, get the Bringers' CD out soon!), I thought I'd tell you what I learned in the making of mine. A lot of you who play music regularly are probably thinking about making a CD to sell at cons or on line or at gigs of your own. Here are some of the things I learned in making my CD.

1. Determine your budget before you record. There are three parts to financing a CD project: recording it, producing it, and promoting it. A budget will help you figure out where you can record and for how long. Pretty basic but essential. There are hundreds of recording studios in your area. Chances are you can find

one that will fit your budget and do it all correctly. In short, have a good idea what it's going to cost so you don't go over budget.

- 2. Be prepared to go over budget. I did, you will. Trust me.
- 3. Plan to record more songs than you intend on using. I recorded the basic tracks for 12 songs. I ended up using 11 of them. This was due to a couple of things. First, I couldn't get the right instrumentation for the song I didn't use, plus it was clear from listening to the basic track that my heart just wasn't into it. If time and money hadn't been a problem, I had three others I wanted to record on top of that one.
- 4. Make sure at least one song on the CD is unbelievably commercial. Look at the songs you're recording and ask yourself, "If I was a radio programmer, which of these songs would I play?" The song on my CD that's getting the most airplay is a tune called "P.O.P.," which is light and funny and bouncy and tuneful and SHORT. That's a very important word, "short." If you don't have a commercial song, write one.
- 5. Be prepared for happy accidents. The studio I chose is usually used by loud punk rock bands. My engineer had never recorded an acoustic guitar before. However, this learning process turned out to be a great thing, because I'm sure getting a lot of good comments on how nice the guitar sounds on my album.

- 6. Use the best musicians you can afford. If you can't afford to pay them, buy them something nice. It helps if you have musical friends who play better than you do. But if you need to hire professional musicians, keep in mind that they can cost you up to \$100 an hour. Although some will be happy to see \$100 for the day.
- 7. Know when to stop. It's very easy to nitpick everything you do, because you want it to be perfect, but if you're on the clock, you're going to have to admit that some things are as good as they're gonna get. (I fell into this trap until my wife calmly but firmly said, "Tom, stop f**king with it and release the goddamn thing! Christ!")
- 8. Don't burn your own CDs. I know it's expensive to have a company do it, but there's a reason, folks. When you get your CDs from a company that makes them for a living, you know you're going to get a professional-looking product. You know it's going to work in every CD player in the country (you can't be sure of that with a burner). The company will shrinkwrap it for you and make it look as professional as possible. Some will even give you a bar code for free, so you can sell it anywhere. Do your homework and let somebody else do the dirty work.
- 9. Promote the sucker like crazy. My CD has a bona fide filk song on it, plus lots of songs that people request both at filksings and at my gigs. Find places to play other

than just conventions-coffeehouses, bars, you name it. Even if you just play open mike nights, find out where they are in your area and play and sing your heart out.

10. Sit back and watch the money trickle in. Face it-you ain't Britney Spears and you're not Capitol Records. Charge what the market will allow to make your money back as quickly as possible, but don't expect to get rich. The folk/filk audience is so small that most of us are in this just to make a little extra spending money, anyway.

11. When you make your CD, send it to me for review! That, of course, is a given, right?

CES by Jeff George

Here are some highlights from the 2001 CES show I just attended!

It's the world's premier technology education and networking event. More than 89% of the industry's buying power comes to CES. That's over \$72billion, and by the size of the crowd and the number of new products on the show floor, the 2001 International CES will be bigger than ever.

According to figures just released by the Consumer Electronics Association (CEA), sales of consumer electronics goods from manufacturers to dealers will surpass \$95.6 billion in 2001. This total will set a new annual sales record and represents a six percent increase over the 2000 total, making 2001 the ninth consecutive year of growth for the industry. In fact, CEA revised its yearend 2000 estimates of sales up to \$90.1 billion, a tremendous ten percent increase over the 1999 figure of \$81.9 billion. **Highlights:**

- * PAN or Personal Area Network is the latest innovation in Bluetooth access, where wireless technology is propelling us into a new dimension in connectivity. This small-form, low-cost radio solution works to connect all your wireless portables.
- * DVD-RW, supposedly all the major manufactures have agreed to a common format so they are all compatible (i.e not Beta Vs VHS, DIVX vs DVD, etc).
- * DVCR Digital Video Recorders the wave of the future, maybe. They were real cool though!

- * There were lots of demos of high definition TV, flat screens, plasma screens, and all sorts of stuff to make you drool and eventually empty your wallets to buy when they become available.

The big push at this year's show is DIGITAL and ways to expand the usefulness of a PC. Both Craig Barrett, Intel CEO, and Bill Gates of Microsoft showed off new ways to use your PC around the home with portable appliances that allow you to use your computer anywhere in the home. Intel even used the Blue Man Group in their presentation. Microsoft is pushing their Ultimate

TV system with adds a Digital Video Recorder to Direct TV plus added interactivity via WebTV. Dish Network will be coming out with a model with a DVR as well, but is not interested in adding an internet on your TV component other than their current arrangement with Web TV. They will be offering an internet capability for computers though.

The content providers are starting a new round of discussion on copy protection for their product. This includes but is not limited to preventing you from recording a show off cable if they so desire. The manufacturers are aware of the efforts by Hollywood to limit the advance of technology and are working to try to prevent the limitations they are trying to put on them.

The Twelfth Regeneration of Gallifrey One was the 12th annual Dr. Who (and SF/F) media convention held in Los Angeles, California. This year it ran Friday February 23 through Sunday February 25, 2001, at the Airtel Plaza Hotel in Van Nuys, CA. It is usually President's Day Weekend, but for some reason ended up a week later this year. It's been at this hotel since I've been attending the convention, about 5 years now (missing two years ago). 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Surviving Disney's California Adventure

Unless you've been under a complete media blackout, you must know that February saw the opening of a new theme park: Disney's California Adventure. D.C.A. is a mixed bag, a little bit classic Disney, a little bit average amusement park, neither fish nor fowl. I feel that in trying to be all things to all people Disney has sabotaged itself.

Located immediately south of
Disneyland, D.C.A. shares ticket booths
with its sister park, with the storefronts of
Downtown Disney to the west. Gigantic
letters spelling out C-A-L-I-F-O-R-N-I-A
greet as you enter the park. Walking
under a scaled down version of the
Golden Gate Bridge that supports the
Monorail as it glides overhead, you enter
the Sunshine Plaza facing a 50-foot-tall
sun backed by a fountain demonstrating a
constantly changing wave pattern.

To the right of the entrance is Condor Flats, part of the Golden State portion of the park with shops and eateries themed around transportation. The main attraction here is Soarin' Over California, arguably the most entertaining ride in the park. In Soarin', riders are given safety instructions by Patrick Warburton (He played Puddy on "Seinfeld", provided the voice of Krok in Disney's "The Emperors

New Groove" and will soon play "The Tick") and then board a hang-glider-like contraption that lifts them up for a banking, sloping flight over the California wilderness, rural, and urban landscapes. The ride ends with a night flight over the Disneyland Park. My only complaints are that if you are in the first row nearest the screen you can see the top of the screen, if you're in the second and third row you can see the dangling feet of the riders above you, and riders in the third row can see the bottom of the screen. Flaws in the original copy left permanent specks on the film, some of which appear to look like a Mickey Mouse head or (stretching the imagination) other hang gliders in the distance. I also wish that the "Imagineers" had softened the transitions between locations by using clouds. For maximum enjoyment, I recommend sitting in the #1 row as far to the side as possible.

Leaving Condor Flats, heading counterclockwise, we pass by the slightly hidden entrance which guests of the Grand Californian Hotel use to come and go from the park. This hotel is influenced a bit by Frank Lloyd Wright and a great deal in the Arts and Crafts style of architecture. Similar to the Wilderness Lodge in Orlando and the Sequoia Lodge in Paris, G.C.H. has an open, airy feeling with fine appointments and attention to detail, beginning with the stained glass sliding doors at the entrance, the Art Nuevo lamps at Registration, Mickey Mouse chandeliers and a gigantic stone hearth surrounding a room containing a fireplace.


Restaurants include The Napa Rose, an upscale restaurant with 200 seats and an extensive collection of California wines. The Storytellers Cafe is for family dining, with 290 seats, buffet and menu dining, and character breakfasts. The Hearthstone Lounge contains a full bar with baked goods and gourmet coffee in the morning. Finally, White Water Snacks is a poolside snack bar that serves pizza, hamburgers, hot dogs, soft drinks and hard liquor. The Napa Rose and White Water Snacks offer views of the new park. There are three pools designed to serve various needs: The main one containing a slide is the Redwood Pool, with a kiddie pool shaped like Mickey Mouse, and the quiet Fountain Pool. If you feel like a work out the Eureka Springs Health Club has an exercise facility with two spas, dry and steam saunas and two massage rooms.

In addition to the guest entrance to DCA, the Grand Californian has easy access to Downtown Disney containing shops and restaurants including the World of Disney (the largest Disney store on the west coast), the Rainforest Cafe, the House of Blues, the ESPN Zone, the Lego Imagination Center, and an AMC 12 Screen Theatre, plus many more.

Our room continued the Arts and Crafts theme with furniture and wood moldings from that architectural discipline. The bathroom included the normal amenities plus a hair dryer and a close-up mirror. The water closet employed a compressed air tank that was efficient, saved water, and about as loud as a shuttle lift-off. The shower curtain contained characters from Bambi, reminding us where we were. There was a mini-bar that registered each item as it was removed, so you don't want to pull out anything unless you are prepared to pay for it when you settle up at checkout. The Grand Californian Hotel contains 750 guest rooms and 38 suites. Prices range from approximate \$265 for courtyard views to approximately \$400 for park view concierge rooms with suite prices varying. While we were there our room price was \$250 one night and \$280 the next because we originally reserved the room for one night and the rate changed when we added the second night. The Disneyland Hotel with its 990 rooms or the Paradise (formerly the Disneyland Pacific Hotel) with its 502 rooms at the following rates: Standard Rooms: \$190 -\$255, Concierge: \$270 - \$310, Suites: \$350 - \$2,000. If cost is a greater concern over closeness to the park, you might want to consider non-Disney hotels. Information is available from the Anaheim/Orange County Visitors Bureau Lodging Directory.

Back in D.C.A, we come around a turn and see a towering grizzly bear garbed in a flotation vest, holding an oar. This is the entrance to the Grizzly River Run, a

The SF Tube Talk NATPE Experience

When I found out that this year's NATPE convention was going to be in Las Vegas, I made sure I got registered as press so I could check out the various new and returning SFTV shows as well as whatever other celebrities turned up.

First of all, what the heck is NATPE? It is (or used to be) an abbreviation for the National Association of Television Production Executives and started as a means for TV Executives to get together to share ideas with each other. According to the www.natpe.org web site, the organization's mission statement is "NATPE, the alliance of media content professionals, is the world's largest and most influential nonprofit television programming and software association dedicated to the continued growth and convergence of all content across all media."

The convention was held in mid-January in the mammoth Las Vegas convention center as well as a few events held in the Las Vegas Hilton convention center. The show is more than just about selling syndicated shows to the U.S. market. There were lots of companies there to sell to international markets and areas devoted to British programming, Canada, France, Spanish, animation and New Technology. Most of the major studios had big booths Very few of them were there looking for press publicity. Some did put press kits in the press room, but at the booths, they were mainly interested in doing business with their customers.

Official NATPE activities began first thing Monday morning with a 5K run that had **Kevin Sorbo** (the busiest Celb at the convention) as the Official Starter. After that there were some panels as well

as the ALTV Sessions (the Association of Local TV, not anything to do with "Weird Al"). At lunchtime was the 41st International Broadcasting Awards Luncheon, where awards were given for the World's Best Commercials. The awards were hosted by **D.L. Hughley** and **Mo'Nique** with Special Guest Presenters **John O'Hurley** (The Price is Right), **Kevin Sorbo** (there he is again) and **Judge Mills Lane. Mo'Nique** introduced **Kevin** as the star of An-dro-mee-da, which **Kevin** did seem a bit annoyed at. Tuesday morning the exhibit floor was

opened to all the attendees and the show was on. I concentrated mainly on the genre shows, trying to catch celebrities for photos and short interviews with mixed success.

Let's take a tour through the exhibits to see what was going on a various booths during the show.

Paramount - Lots of celebrities, but not much mention of Star Trek. They were promoting Becker going into strip syndication and had the entire cast there on Tuesday including Terry Farrel. Of interest to SciFi fans was the new movie review show, Hot Ticket, which will be hosted by Leonard Maltin and Todd Newton starting this fall.

Studios USA - With Xena and Cleopatra 2525 about to end, and not much emphasis on Invisible Man's syndicated run, the big news for Studio USA was selling a daily syndicated strip for Crossing Over with John Edward, which has been a steady ratings grabber for SciFi. USA did very well with the show at NATPE and signed up a good number of big stations to start airing the show this fall. All the trade press on it made it the surprise hit of the show.

Lion's Gate - Adrian Paul was there to promote *Tracker*, a new series that would he would star is as an alien bounty hunter, tracking down escapees from an alien prison. They all managed to escape through some sort of wormhole that deposited them all in Chicago. Paul's character goes there to track them all

down and teams up with Mel, a "hard-luck girl who is finally on the road to salvation as a cub reporter for a Chicago newspaper." According to most recent press reports, they've lined up 70% of the country, including the Chris-Craft station group which includes KUTP-45 in Phoenix.

Full Moon - William Shatner's Full Moon Fright Show was their main promotion. It will be a weekly movie series featuring movies from the Full Moon catalog with William Shatner hosting. They intend to have contests where viewers can win a chance to cohost the show with Shatner, appear in a Full Moon movie, or win a date with a Full Moon Scream Queen. Shatner was there signing autographs and talking up the show with station executives.

Promark - Distributors of The Secret Adventures of Jules Verne for U.S. Syndication. They had several props from the show, including a model of the airship and several HDTV monitors set up running the series in widescreen. They had the four main cast members each day, with Chris "Jules Verne" Demetral and his wife were hanging out at the booth pretty much all day Wednesday. I got a chance to talk with Chris for a while about the show and prospects for a second season. They haven't had a committment for a second season yet, but he was optimistic about it. He really enjoyed getting a chance to see the show in

HDTV at the booth.

New Line Televsion - They had a mock up of a burning building to promote a reality series about firefighters. They didn't have much in their booth to promote *The Lost World*, but they did have ads in all the trades about the show being renewed for a third season.

Alliance Atlantis - They were promoting CSI for international sales and had the entire cast there. They were also promoting the Canadian series *Starhunter*, for U.S. syndication. It stars **Michael Pare** as a bounty hunter who's trying to find his son as he hunts down criminals in space on a ship named Tulip.

MGM didn't have much at their booth to promote their genre shows. I did verify with them that the seventh season of *The Outer Limits* starting on SciFi in March would also show up in syndication.

Tribune Entertainment - Tribune is riding high on the success of Andromeda and formally announced it's renewal as well as Beastmaster and Earth Final Conflict. They had Andromeda cast members (Kevin Sorbo, Keith Hamilton Cobb, Lisa Ryder and Lexa Doig) at their booth a couple of times, mainly hanging around so attendees could get their pictures taken with them. They were also promoting the new series, *Mutant X*, and have gotten a good number of stations to sign up for that show. It will feature a group of genetically engineered humans fighting genetically engineered bad guys in a straight ahead superhero series. Not specifically based on The X-Men or the Marvel comic also titled *Mutant X*, but it is being co-produced with Marvel. Head writer will be **Howard** Chaykin, who has had experience with TV production (The Flash, Viper) as well as comics (JLA: The Secret Society of Super Heroes, Son of Superman, American Flagg, and Black Kiss).

Fireworks Entertainment - Coproducers for a bunch of shows, giving them international distribution, Fireworks had the Andromeda cast members on Wednesday afternoon. Since this appearance wasn't listed in all the trades, it was a much quieter spot. A couple of Brit reporters were there to tape interviews with them for a Sky TV show. They also had some very nice looking four page publicity brochures for *Andromeda*, which I managed to get a couple of them signed (one of them will be in the charity auction at the upcoming LepreCon 27 convention). When Sorbo saw it, he wanted to make sure he got some to take with him. He also asked about getting some of the large posters they had hanging from the rafters, intending to get some of them to his fan club for charity auctions.

Columbia Tristar Television - They had stars from *Sheena* and *VIP* there to meet their customers. Unfortunately, if you didn't have an appointment, you weren't able to get in.

Pearson Television - They had cast

from *Baywatch Hawaii*, plus **Andrew Dice Clay** and their Game show hosts at the booth. One of the shows they were promoting was *Colosseum*, starring **Andrew Dice Clay** as a New York fight promoter who time travels back to the heyday of the Roman Colosseum and ends up being the promoter there. Latest word from the trade press is that the show didn't get enough stations to sign up for it, so it won't be happening.

Freemantle Corp. - Freemantle was promoting *Black Scorpion*, for which they have international distribution rights. **Michele Lintel** was there as well as her stunt double, **Julie Michaels**, who was in the full Black Scorpion costume.

Other things of note at the show were some tapings of *Jeopardy* at the Las Vegas Hilton, including Celebrity Jeopardy. One session had **Kevin Sorbo** (yes, Kevin again) who went up against Jane Krakowski from Ally McBeal, and Mike Piazza of the New York Mets. Kevin hung in there, but had too much trouble early on getting used to the buzzer and Piazza prevailed. Kevin still got a \$10,000 check for his charity, A World Fit For Kids. Also appearing in another session was Seth Green (Buffy, Austin Powers), who was beaten by US Women's soccer champion Brandi Christain.

At the show, I ran into Marc Scott Zicree, who was there to talk to some of the studios about his projects, *CORE* and *Magic Time*, as well as talk to some of the producers about possible freelance work. While waiting for the doors to open for one panel, I talked with a VP for Glen Larson productions, who was there to talk with various people about a possible *Battlestar Galactica* revival (which does appear to be happening).

There was a lot of new technology companies there, including Real TV, AOL TV, Microsoft's Ultimate TV, Texas Instruments, Sun Microsystems, a bunch of HDTV companies, and many other smaller companies with various type of internet and production equipment.

Overall, it was fun to actually get to attend the convention instead of just reading the trade reports on it. If you'd like to see even more info and pictures, check out the full report, photos, and brochure scans at the SFTV website at www.sftv.org/natpe.



In an interview with Empire Online, Christopher Lee, Saruman in the Lord of the Rings films and Count Dooku in the upcoming Star Wars movie, said "I've said before that the Lord of the Rings, in my opinion - Star Wars speaks for itself, of course, it'll be titanic as a film, they all are and deservedly so - but the Lord of the Rings will, I think, create cinema history because I don't think anybody will have seen anything quite like it." Empire also reports that Lee has read the Tolkien trilogy every year since it has been published and he commented about acting in the movies that "One's dreams don't always come true." He added, "But this one has." New Line has set the premier of The Fellowhip of the Ring for December 19th, 2001. Star Wars Episode II is planned for a May 22, 2002 release date. **Upcoming Movie Previews (April** through mid-June)

First of all, there's a good number of genre movies coming over the next couple of months as we start to get into the summer movie season.

Just opened at the end of March is *Spy Kids*, which has gotten good advance buzz on it. It stars **Antonio Banderas** and **Carla Gugino** as a husband and wife spy team who are captured by their archenemy, Fegan Floop (**Alan Cummings**). Their kids, Carmen (**Alexa Vega**) & Juni (**Daryl Sabara**) come to their rescue. Also appearing in the movie are **Tony Shalhoub, Cheech Marin, Robert Patrick** and **Teri Hatcher.**

Also in April is the live action Josie and the Pussycats, which looks to be geared more towards teens who like today's music and may not have much appeal to those who remember the actual cartoon it is based on. Just Visiting is a time travel comedy based on a 90's French film about an 11th Century French Knight (Jean Reno) and his squire (Christian Clavier) who are transported to the present day by a wizard (Malcolm McDowell). Christina Applegate also stars as characters from both time periods. Lots of hi-jinks and fish out of water plot elements in what could be a fun movie to see. And, of course, there's Pokemon 3, which your kids probably know all about and want to have you take them to see it!

May's first big movie is *The Mummy Returns*, which is a sequel to the 1999 hit with **Brendan Fraser** (Rick O'Connell), **Rachel Weisz** (Evelyn Carnahan), **Patricia Velazquez** (Anck-Su-Namun), and **Arnold Vosloo** (Im-Ho-Tep) returning. Also appearing is WWF star **The Rock** as The Scorpion King. It is set ten years after the first movie when the mummified bodies of Im-Ho-Tep and Anck-Su-Namun have been brought to a Page 10

London museum. Rick and Evelyn's 9 year old son is caught in the middle as two ancient powers return to life and battle it out.

Also in May is the long awaited CGI/live action comedy *Shrek* from Dreamworks. It features **Mike Myers** as Shrek, an ogre who wants to be different. Instead of pillaging the countryside and terrorizing farmers, he wants to be a brave knight. Also appearing are **Cameron Diaz** (Princess), **Eddie Murphy** (The Donkey), **John Lithgow** (The Villian) and **Linda Hunt** (The Witch). A work in progress version of the movie was screened at the ShoWest trade show in March and got a very positive response.

Memorial Day weekend sees the bigbudget Michael Bev film Pearl Harbor, starring Ben Affleck, Cuba Gooding, Jr. and many others dealing with the events surrounding the bombing of Pearl Harbor. Also opening that weekend is the comedy Cats and Dogs, which stars Jeff Goldblum as Professor Brody, a scientist about to come up with a cure for allergies to dogs. However, what we find out is that cats and dogs have been fighting each other without humans realizing it and the cats set out to sabotage Brody's work. Providing voices for the cats and dogs are Tobey Macguire, Alec Baldwin, Susan Sarandon, Michael Clarke Duncan, Joe Pantoliano, and Jon Lovitz.

Opening in early June is *A Knight's Tale*, starring **Heath Ledger** as a squire in 14th century France who impersonates his deceased master in jousting tournaments. He rises in stature and nobility but he's doing it to take down an evil-doer. Also starring are **Mark Addy** as Ledger's friend and **Paul Bettany** as Geoffrey Chaucer (the writer of *The Canterbury Tales*, which reportedly inspired the movie)

Ivan Reitman's science fiction comedy **Evolution** has been moved up a month to June 8th. It stars David Duchnovy (which is why he hasn't been on The X-Files much this season) as a community college science professor who gets involved with his geologist buddy (Orlando Jones) who is investigating a recent meteor crash near a small New Mexico town. The meteorite contains alien organisms that immediately start evolving and threatening all life on Earth. It also stars Julianne Moore as a government scientist and Sean William **Scott** as a fireman. The four band together to find a way to stop the alien organism's evolving.

Also in early June is *Swordfish*, about a charismatic spy (**John Travolta**) hired by the CIA to enlist a computer hacker (**Hugh Jackman**) recently released from prison to help steal \$6 billion in unused government funds. In exchange, the hacker will regain custody of his daughter and start a new life. **Halle Berry** also

stars as an agent working for Travolta.

Mid-June sees the *Tomb Raider* Movie starring **Angelina Jolie** as sexy Indiana Jones like archeologist Lara Croft. Expect lots and lots of action and tight t-shirts. Opening the same weekend will be Disney's latest animated feature, *Atlantis: The Lost Empire*. Set in the late 19th century, Smithsonian researcher Milo J. Thatch (**Michael J. Fox**) is recruited to go on an underwater quest to discover the lost continent of Atlantis. Other voices include **Claudia Christian**, **Jim Varney**, **James Garner**, **David Odgen Stiers** and **Leonard Nimoy**. It is an action/adventure, not a musical.

across like she does on the show. Pozniak got on because of her work to get the US to recognize International Womens' Day; she's originally from Poland. Monaghan is also like on the show and would really like to sing opera. Egan was a hoot and full of character, unlike her character. She plugged the union's role in the potential upcoming writers strike. We went out for dinner to a pizza/Italian restaurant before returning to the hotel in the drench. I caught part of the Cabaret, a G1 regular event, where some of the "guests" perform or sing or do magic or whatever. The best part I saw was where Fisher played an editor for Shakespeare's Hamlet trying to convince him to shorten this or change that. It was quite good and funny; I can see why she was chosen for the audio CDs. Some of the other Saturday events missed were Queer as Fiction, Charity Benefit Auction for CdLS Foundation, Andromeda Rising, An Hour With Larry Niven and autographs. I also crashed before the dance started unlike last year where I was still awake and it was amazingly energetic. I also hit some of the parties this year, LosCon 28 particularly.

Sunday we went out for breakfast to a Denny's clone across the street from Coco's (which was packed). After checking out of the hotel we did some events. We missed Crusade with Woodward and Brooks, but we saw it last year. Willerth's video showing Babylon Park (both videos) was pretty interesting. They were definitely parodies and used some voices by his wife Pat Tallman (Lyta, B5) and Robin Atkins-Downes (Byron, B5). The State of Doctor Who Fandom would have been interesting, but we were still at breakfast. Fifty Years with Freas would also have been good, but was opposite Babylon Park. There was a film screening of Millennium's End that we caught part of. We decided to hit the road before it got too late and missed the Closing Ceremonies and High Tea following. We got home around 10pm as it was, but I much prefer to travel the day after con. Since this year it wasn't a holiday weekend we couldn't do that. Hopefully, next year will return to the regular dates. We also missed the Scottish Highland Games because of the date shift.

So, this year's con was fun and we got to see or meet more actors. We saw Daniel Dae Kim (Crusade), Carrie Dobro (Crusade). One rumor is that the final episode, tentatively titled "Endgame", will Open 23 years in the future after the ship has returned to the Alpha Quadrant with Tuvok in an asylum claiming that Admiral Janeway is an imposter. We'll also see the grown up daughter of B'Elanna Torres and Tom Paris, Miral, as well as Naomi Wildman's 9 year old daughter, Sabrina. According to Trek producer **Ken Biller** "...the finale will involve the Borg, which has always been Voyager's arch-nemesis. It's going to be a rip-roaring, slam-bang action adventure full of twists and turns and surprises....It's certainly been a challenge to end this series in a way that is both satisfying and surprising, Hopefully, we'll give you that."

Before we get to the finale, there's six more one hour episodes leading up to the finale. First up is "Q2", featuring the return of John de Lancie as "Q" as well as de Lancie's son, **Keegan**, as Q's teenaged son. Q brings his son to visit "Aunt Kathy", hoping that she'll teach him some virtues and help to settle him down some. Needless to say, he'll be more of a pain than his father ever was. Next up is "Author, Author", where the crew gains the capability for some direct communication with the Alpha Quadrant and are able to talk to the friends and family in real time. It features return appearances of Dwight Schultz as Reginald Barclay and **Richard Herd** as Admiral Paris. Since The Doctor doesn't have any family to communicate with, he uses the opportunity to pitch a holo-novel he has written to publishers that is the story "of a ship stranded on the other side of the galaxy with a strangely familiar crew; a crew that barely tolerates their holographic doctor who lives in virtual slavery".

"Friendship One" involves more interfacing with Starfleet when Voyager is asked to look for a 21st Century Earth probe, Friendship One, that should be near Voyager's current position. They find the probe, but find it being put to an unpredicted use by a Delta Quadrant civilization. "Natural Law" finds Seven of Nine and Chakotay marooned in a hostile alien environment. In "Destiny", Voyager comes across an imperiled Talaxian settlement, reuniting Neelix with his people. Rumors are that Neelix may stay with them once they are saved. In the final hour long episode, "Renaissance Man", The Doctor must become a master of disguise in order to save Captain Janeway, impersonating Janeway, Torres and other crewmembers in the process.

A New Enterprise

The rumors are flying fast and furious and by the time you read this there may have been an official announcement. As of press time, the only hard facts from Paramount is that the Fifth Star Trek TV series is planned for this Fall on UPN. Several long time production staff have

been working on designing the new series including Scenic Arts Supervisor Mike Okuda, Production Designer Herman Zimmerman, and Senior Illustrator John Eaves. Executive Producer Rick Berman has confirmed the series will be set in a different time frame than the current Trek series have been. What time period is still under wraps, officially.

As you might have guessed, there's been lots of rumors on the premise of the new series as well as some rumors on the lead casting. Most rumors tend to agree that it will be set on a spaceship named Enterprise, and the title of the series just may be "Enterprise" without any "Star Trek" in the title.

Some reports have set the series about 100 years before the original Star Trek series and others have claimed it would be about 100 years after the Current Trek series. Information from a casting call sheet has circulated on the internet and been referenced by TV Guide that indicates the show's captain will be Captain Jackson Archer who "exhibits a sense of wonder and excitement, as well as a little trepidation about the strange things he will encounter".

The latest rumors have Scott Bakula of **Quantum Leap** fame being up for the role. Also on the ship would be a Vulcan science officer T'Pau (in the pre-TOS version) or a Romulan officer (in the post Voyager version). The Chief engineer would be Charlie 'Spike' Tucker, a southerner with country charm, but little experience dealing with aliens. The medical officer would be the exotic alien Doctor Phlox, the helmsman would be Joe Mayweather, a mid-20's African American, the Armory officer would be Malcolm Reed, an early 30's by the book British soldier, and the communications officer would be Ensign Hoshi Sato, a late 20's exo-linguistics expert. Again, none of this has been confirmed by Paramount and could just be bogus info circulated to throw the fans off track.

X-Files - Mulder's Back (Finally)

With the first two episodes ("Deadalive" and "Three Words" in early April, we finally get Fox Mulder back on *The X-Files* show, although not Necessarily working on them in an official capacity. In "Three Words", Director Kersh turns the X-Files over to Doggett, leaving Mulder in an unknown position while he deals with his abduction and the aftermath. In "Empedocles", Agent Monica Reyes makes a return appearance that leads into the Investigation of some sort of entity that moves from body to body. There's some Mulder And Scully scenes that end with Scully having some sort of attack and a trip To the hospital. In "Vienen", we have a return appearance by the Black Oil When a mysterious death on an oil rig in the Gulf of Mexico. Doggett is Assigned to investigate, but Mulder beats him there. The next episode, currently untitled, features a nod to the X-Files fans in the person of Agent Leyla Harrison, who has been wanting to work on the X-Files and

began as an accountant with the FBI and has been following Mulder and Scully's work. She is teamed up with Doggett when Scully begins her leave of absence, and she and Doggett investigate some sort of reptile creature and they (or just Doggett) end up getting trapped and Mulder comes to the rescue. For "Essence", the first half of the two part season finale, Scully's mom introduces her to a "helper" that comes highly recommended who is to help Scully with the final part of her pregnancy. Of course, the helper has some connections to the doctors involved with Scully's pregnancy and when confronted by Mulder, Skinner and Doggett, insists that she is there to help protect Scully and her "special" baby. She indicates that the baby is the perfected result of the human/ alien hybrid. As for the season (series?) finale, the truth about Scully's baby should finally be revealed, although as of press time, there's been zero info about what may or may not happen. In any case, it will be leaving the show at a point that could continue into a ninth season with limited, if any, presence of Mulder, but likely with Doggett, Scully and Agent Reyes. If FOX doesn't come to terms with **Chris Carter**, they can always just move on to movies. I'd be willing to bet that FOX does everything they can to keep the X-Files on the air.

As to the **Lone Gunmen** spinoff, the initial ratings for it's debut were not bad, but have slid significantly and the Friday debut was not very strong, just slightly about what Freaklylinks had been getting. Assuming FOX doesn't pull the series, we can look forward to the episode "Planet of the Frohikes" with the Gunmen finding a super-intelligent monkey that had been engineered during the Cold War to be a special assassin that now wants to be free. Other episodes will see a very comical appearance by Mitch **Pillegi** as Skinner, a guest appearance by Michael McKean as the Area 51 head Morris Fletcher seen in the X-Files "Dreamland" episodes. The season finale will reveal more about Eve Harlowe and may also feature a guest appearance by another X-Files cast member.

Elsewhere on FOX, Dark Angel will up the ante a bit, finally bringing Lydecker's boss, Madame X, into the show. She will be played by Nana Visitor. According to comments made by the producers and reported in an Entertainment Weekly article, a second season is not certain for the show. Ratings have leveled off and it has been an expensive show to produced, running over budget a lot of the time. Upcoming episodes include "Shorties in Love" where Original Cindy's old flame returns to town, not knowing that her mysterious past is about to catch up with her, "Pollo Loco" where an escaped X-5 is discovered to be a serial killer and Max must try to stop him from killing more people. It is also the first appearance by Nana Visitor. "I and I Am A Camera" sees an apparent stalker turn into a

seemingly superhuman ally when Max and Logan investigates a string of unexplained murders.

Buffy & Angel

The WB's dynamic duo of *Buffy* and *Angel* may end up on different networks next season. FOX Televisions contract with the WB expires after this season and FOX and The WB were unable to come to terms on a contract renewal and FOX is now free to shop the show to other networks, including its own. At press time there was no new info on the situation, so look for some sort of announcement by the time the networks announce their fall schedules in May.

In the meantime, both shows will be heading full steam towards their season finales. On *Buffy*, the season finale is also the 100th episode of the series and it looks to be a big finale with lots of guest stars and a big climax to the season-long arc, including, reportedly, a big crossover with Angel. From various reports, here's what you can expect on the remaining Buffy and Angel episodes this season. After laying their mother to rest, Buffy and Dawn must deal with their father, who wants to take Dawn back with him. Xander and Willow travel to Los Angeles to notify Angel about the death of Buffy's mom, however they aren't able to find Angel and end up in the demon karaoke bar. Cordelia runs into Harmony in Los Angeles, not realizing she is now a vampire, and Angel learns about Joyce's death from Harmony, leading to a trip to Sunnydale to comfort Buffy. Spike's Buffy Robot is completed and it poses as Buffy. Anya is offered a chance to get her demon powers back. Over in L.A., Cordelia starts getting visions more often and more intensely, leading to concerns about her state of health. Gunn is also pressured to leave Angel Investigations and go back to protecting his turf. After receiving a new hand, Lindsey discovers it is tainted and part of a plot by Wolfram and hart to discredit him. Rumors on the final episodes are all over the place, but it's pretty certain that we'll learn the full details about Ben, Glory and Dawn. It looks likely we'll see a return visit by Oz (Seth Green) as well as most of the Angel cast joining the Scooby Gang in the final confrontation with Glory.

The WB put *Roswell* on hiatus to see how *The Gilmore Girls* would fare on Monday nights. It will return in mid-April to finish out the season, which could be its last if ratings don't pick up for the final episodes.

In "Off the Menu", an experiment goes terribly wrong and several members of the gang are held hostage by a familiar face and a stunning revelation occurs about one of the aliens. "Heart of Mine" sees some of the gang coming to terms with each others and their relationships while the rest consider their future. In "Cry Your Name" an unthinkable tragedy befalls the group and they must come together in its aftermath. "Its Too Late &

Its Too Bad" sees Liz determined to find out the truth about things while some of the group deal with heartfelt revelations, hidden insecurities and thoughts of leaving Roswell.

Back on UPN, they're finally going to start airing their mid-season genre shows in April. "Special Unit 2" will take over the "7 Days" time slot starting April 11 and "All Souls" will start airing on Tuesday nights on April 17th. It will air opposite "Angel" and "Dark Angel", at least it doesn't have the word Angel in it's title. As mentioned in the last issue, "Special Unit 2" is about a special Chicago police force going after gargoyles and other creatures still around. "All Souls" is about a haunted hospital with plenty of strange things going on.

Also, in case you were wonder what has happened to "The Tick", FOX has held it back for the summer or fall as strike insurance. They do have nine half hour episodes made and we'll get to see them eventually.

Xena's Turning Japanese

Moving to syndication land, we've got the final episodes of Xena: Warrior Princess to look forward to, and they're doing some interesting things with some of them. Starting off is this year's clip show, "Send in the Clones", with Claire Stansfield appearing as a Xena fan in the near future that brings Xena and Gabrielle back to life via cloning. "The Last Centaur" will bring back the ghost of Ephiny and we'll see her grown up centaur son, Xenon, who Ephiny isn't happy about how he's been behaving and asks Xena to straighten him out. "Soul Possession" will be a flashback episode with a framing sequence featuring the

modern day Xena fans first seen in "Deja Vu All Over Again". They discover a lost scroll from which we'll learn what happened to Gabrielle between "Sacrifice II" and "A Family Affair". After that is an alternate timeline episode, "When Fates Collide", which answers the question "What would have happened if Caesar hadn't betrayed Xena?". We'll see Caesar, Brutus, Alti, and Joxer. "Many Happy Returns" is a comedy featuring Alexandra Tydings as Aphrodite. To end out the season and the series is a two part episode with the working title of "Japan" in which Xena and Gabrielle journey to Japan for their final TV adventure.

Also ending its run is Cleopatra 2525, which theoretically has just one more episode left to finish up the series, likely airing in May. The last new episode, "The Voice", left the team ready to face a massive Bailey invasion.

Elsewhere in Syndication, Andromeda will resume new episodes in mid-April to finish out its first season. They have already started filming the second season, planning on getting a plenty of episodes in the can before the likely Actor's Strike. Leading off the new episodes will be "The Devil Take the Hindmost" where Dylan and Rev Bem get into a battle with some slavers and we learn a lot about Rev and the Wayist philosophy. "Star-Crossed" features Michael Shanks (Stargate SG-1) as the avatar of another sentient ship who Andromeda falls in love with, only to be betrayed. Next is "Fear and Loathing in the Milky Way" sees Harper taken away from the ship and we learn that he can be dangerous when in trouble. Rumored to feature a return appearance of the Nightsider villain from the pilot, Gerentex. "The

Honey Offering" will focus on Tyr and the Nietzscheans. "It Makes a Lovely Light" features Beka Valentine and explores her character and skills as a pilot as well as exploring "why slipstream is basically more of an art than a science. It goes to all sorts of interesting places,' according to producer Robert Hewitt Wolfe. The season finale, "...Its HourCome Round at Last", will see the return of the mysterious "Enigma" first seen in "Harper 2.0". We'll learn more about him and his connection to the



Magog. We'll also learn more about Trance Gemini, some of it possibly related to Enigma.

SciFi Prime Reshuffled and the Short Crusade

Over on the cable networks, SciFi's Monday prime lineup didn't last very long, with The Invisible Man moving back to Friday nights and First Wave, Jules Verne, and Black Scorpion moving to Saturday nights. Joining the Friday lineup are all new episodes of The Outer Limits as well as the continuing adventures of Farscape in it's third season. As expected on Farscape, Aeryn Sun didn't stay dead very long, but it is a good bet that Zhaan's sacrifice to save Aeryn will turn out to be fatal. The ratings for both Black Scorpion and Jules Verne have

not been good and likely won't be improving with the move to Saturday nights. SciFi has already announced that the fourth season of Lexx will take over Jules Verne's slot in late July. The Invisible Man will go right into its second season in early April. SciFi will be starting the second season of their short film series *Exposure* in April. Look for more offbeat and bizarre productions to turn up late on Sunday

Starting April 9th, Monday through Thursdays at 8 pm ET/PT, SciFi will air the thirteen episodes of the Babylon 5 spinoff Crusade right after the daily repeats of *Babylon 5*. They look to be airing in the order that creator J. Michael Straczynski has asked for, so don't bother with worrying about the changes in uniforms between some episodes.

Just as this issue was going to press, SciFi has announced the production of a new Babylon 5 TV movie titled "Babylon 5 - The Legend of the Rangers". It is being written and produced by J. Michael Straczynski and will take up the story of the legendary Ranger fleet as they attempt to restore order to hundreds of civilizations devastated by the Shadow War. According to Straczynski, it will take place just under three years after the events of "Objects at Rest". There is currently one Babylon 5 character in the script, a "fan favorite". The movie will also serve as a pilot for a possible series. Where Babylon 5 was strong drama with action/adventure elements, Straczynski says the movie and potential series will be "a little more skewed toward adventure with underlying drama (which is about what you'd expect from the Anla-Shok). It's got some great characters, and it's a lot of fun." Filming is scheduled for mid-May and it will likely air later in the year. Considering that the repeats of Babylon 5 have been getting equal or better ratings than most of SciFi's first run shows, its very likely a new series will result from this.

SciFi Soundtracks

For those of you who like to listen to the music from your favorite shows, GNP Crescendo has had several SF TV related releases in the last few months in addition to their large catalog of Star *Trek* music. They've just released a CD with the soundtrack from the SciFi miniseries "Frank Herbert's Dune" with music by Graeme Revell. Recent releases have been "Lexx: The Series" with music by Marty Simon, "Farscape" with music By SubVision (Chris Neal, **Braedy Neal and Toby Neal) & Guy** Gross, and a soundtrack CD for the "Robocop: Prime Directives" miniseries with music by **Norman Orenstein**.

Next issue we'll take a look at some of the new shows turning up on SciFi this summer, including a new Robocop movie miniseries and preview some of the new fall shows, including "Smallville".

white-water raft ride that would not be smart to ride unless it was summertime and you wanted to wet down and cool off. You enter round rafts from a moving circular platform, belt yourself in and wait as you lazily drift toward the lift belt. Rising up the belt affords a close-up view of the peak that is supposed resemble a grizzly bear (or a howling wolf) and soon you are playing Soaking Roulette or who's-going-backward-over-the-falls. I've ridden Roaring Rapids in Six Flags Magic Mountain and I found that to be a wetter and more thrilling ride than Grizzly River Run. Still, I wouldn't advise you to take an unprotected camcorder along for the ride.

The next stop would have been the Redwood Creek Challenge Trail, but onand-off rains closed this attraction. From what I've been able to gather, it's a place with rope bridges, forts, and climbing structures reminiscent of Tom Sawyer's Island in Disneyland, but with easier access. Also in this section is the Ahwahnee Camp Circle where storytellers present legends and myths of the people indigenous to California.

Heading toward Golden Dreams, I encountered one of the street performers, a mobile vine. The performer wears stilts, garbed in a camouflage costume covered with ivy leaves. With amazing flexibility and dexterity, the performer stuck a variety of poses that can only be described as a human topiary.

Golden Dreams is a 23-minute theatrical presentation that tells the struggles and aspirations of California's ever varying population. Hosted by Whoopi Goldberg as Califia, the "spirit of California", her image is projected onto the three-dimensional faces of two statues that bracket the film screen in a method that was first utilized in the graveyard set of the Haunted Mansion in Disneyland. The film also portrays Goldberg in various roles as a nexus for change in the history of the state. It's a moving film and more realistic and darker than most Disney productions. Golden Dreams had its operating problems, probably due to the image projection system.

Entering the Palisades Pier area, my eye falls on the Golden Zephyr. However, it wasn't operating during my stay and its swinging rocket-cars appear to be from an off-the-shelf ride that you'd probably be able to find at most state fairs. Next door is the Jumpin' Jellyfish, a ride for small children or fearful adults. Across the way is the Mulholland Madness, a mid-sized roller coaster that could be called a latter day version of the Mad Mouse coaster found in many older amusement parks. Recreating the L.A. streets twists and turns, you are in a speeding car carrying four people to their apparent doom. I enjoyed it more than once.

Several food vendors are located in this corner of the park with such catchy names as Catch A Flave, Malibu-Ritos, and Pizza Oom Mow Mow. I didn't eat at any of them but I did notice that their prices were the usual high priced amusement park fare.

The Orange Stinger appears to be a giant orange rind with bumblebees buzzing within. You secure yourself into a swinging chair (State fair ride) and the ride operator spins you around and around. Been there, rode that.

The S.S. Rustworthy is a play area that resembles a fireboat complete with water guns and will be a big hit when summer heat needs to be beat.

Next stop is the Maliboomer, the best thrill ride in the park. The ride consists of three towers with four rows of ejection seats in which you are strapped down and divested of any and all objects that might tear loose. After a period of anticipation designed to raise the blood pressure of the riders, you are launched 180 feet straight up and press against the restraints when you reach the top. You start to drop back down and feel the sensation of weightlessness just before you bounce. Another off-the-shelf ride that can be a precursor to an even bigger thrill: The Big Shot atop the Stratosphere Tower in Las Vegas is perched at 1,149 feet.

Games of the Boardwalk are your typical ring-tossing-basketball-shootingbaseball-pitching games of "skill" that are designed to separate you from your money. Not much different from those at any fair and the prizes aren't even Disney characters.

The Sun Wheel is similar to a Ferris wheel with two types of enclosed cars, one fixed to the outer edge only, the other rides within an oval-shaped track that swings the car as the wheel revolves. It's a slow moving, slow loading ride that affords a good overview of the park.

Fabricated out of brass and fiberglass are the whimsical sea creatures of King Tritons Carousel. The animals travel upand-down while a calliope plays Beach Boys tunes. It's a mild ride that will be fun for families with younger children.

The California Screamin' is the parks signature roller coaster and it's pretty good. Designed after the traditional wooden coasters of the 1920's you'll find a few notable exceptions. Instead of a chain lift hill, you're launched at 55 mph along 215 feet of track up the first hill through a series of banking turns at a maximum angle of 76 degrees. The height tops out at 120 feet with a drop of 108 feet along a track that is 6,072 feet in length, with an ovoid loop backed by a Mickey Mouse silhouette on steel track that weighs nearly 6 million pounds.

Leaving the south end of the park and heading back into the Golden State section, we took the tour of the Boudin Bakery, hosted on video by Rosie O'Donnell and Colin Mochrie (from ABC's "Whose Line is it Anyway?") showing how the San Francisco bakery creates it's world-famous sourdough French bread based on its 150-year-old recipe. One of the employees told us that they give away bread samples randomly throughout the day, but give away much

more just before closing. The Mission Tortilla Factory tour is simpler and shorter with a fresh baked tortilla at the end. The Golden Vine Winery hosts a wine tasting and gives a film presentation on wine making. The Bountiful Valley Farm grows seasonal fruits and veg-

Just past the farm is It's Tough To Be A Bug!, the 3-D theatre-style attraction cloned from the original that resides in the Animal Kingdom in Orlando. Developed before the release of the film, "A Bug's Life", It's Tough To Be A Bug! is hosted by Flik (voiced by "NewsRadio" actor Dave Foley with a brief appearance by the malevolent Hopper (voiced in the film by Kevin Spacey.) This attraction employs something for four out of the five senses including the smell of a "stink bug" and the feel of bugs leaving the theatre via the backs of the benches upon which the audience is seated. I find it superior to the Disneyland attraction, Honey, I Shrunk The Audience.

The Hollywood Pictures Backlot is the smallest of the themed "lands" and contains the best and the worst attractions in the park. Disney Animation is the best, containing a trimmed down version of the animation section of the Disney/MGM Studios in Orlando. Walter Cronkite and Robin Williams host "Back to Neverland", a live-action and animated film with Williams in the role of one of the Lost Boys. The short film explains the process of making an animated film and uses the comic talents of Williams to good effect. An interactive exhibit builds on the knowledge acquired in the previous exhibit. It allows you to create an animated strip of paper, do a voiceover of a Disney film snippet, and asks you questions to determine which Disney character you are most like. Next is a visit to an animator's "studio" where an actor interacts with animated characters and living animators on television monitors to demonstrate the development of an animated character, in this case, Mushu the dragon (voiced by Eddie Murphy) from "Mulan."

The Hyperion Theater is a 2000-seat venue designed for live performances. We saw Steps in Time in which a hip Fairy Godmother shows a teenage boy that dreams can come true. The dancing and singing were fine, the acting was good, but the plot was so thin that I found myself not caring about any of the characters.

The Hollywood Backlot Stage is an outdoor area for street performers. There was never anyone in evidence during our visit.

Jim Henson's MuppetVision 3-D is another transplant from the Disney/MGM Studios in Orlando. Crowds were small and we sat up front to observe the audioanimatronic penguin band. It's best to observe the 3-D film effects mid-theater or further back. If you've never seen this attraction in Orlando or if you're a Muppet fan, this is a must-see!

Finally, we come to Superstar Limo,

purportedly a tongue-in-cheek look at that wacky tinsel town known as Hollywood. You're supposed to be the next big star on your way to your film's premier and along the way you spot stars like Regis Philbin, Melanie Griffith, Antonio Banderas, Cindy Crawford, Drew Carey, Tim Allen, and Cher. This ride earns my vote for worst ride in the park. I can't fathom under what circumstances it was designed or approved. It should be the first ride to be replaced.

Weather during our stay was intermittent rain that probably contributed to the sparse crowds. Other factors may have been the media hype that would tend to scare off those who anticipate mega-mob scenes at a park opening or the anticipated breakdowns that can plague a new park or the fact that Disney suspended the selling of Annual Passes except under specific circumstances. A three-day Park-Hopper pass for \$111.00 per adult was available to hotel guests. Things may pick up this summer when Disneyland hits peak capacity. While I generally enjoyed my stay, there was no experience that was so unique that it would draw me back anytime soon.

The King Of Beasts Rules Over L.A. Theatre Scene By Shane Shellenbarger

The lion is often called the king of beasts and Disney's, 'The Lion King' is defiantly able to 'lord' its stature over the other touring Broadway shows. Staged at the beautifully renovated Pantages Theatre, 'The Lion King' is visually stunning and emotionally satisfying. 'The Lion King' tells the coming-of-age story of a young lion cub named Simba as he experiences the life altering adventures and struggles that force him to accept the responsibilities of adulthood and his destined role as king. Having seen the animated movie only marginally prepared me by making the plot and music familiar to me, after that, everything else was a departure to a strange and wonderful place.

The opening parade of animals through the audience onto the stage is a show starter par excellence.

The costume design by Julie Taymor is

a fascinating fusion of actors and characters that forces the audience in a dilemma: to whom do you pay attention? Taymor, along with Michael Curry, also designed the masks and puppets, and they maintain the surrealistic atmosphere that permeates this musical play. Having so many creative irons in the fire can only enhance Taymor's direction, allowing her to understand the best ways for the cast to maximize the use of their costumes, their movements, and the scenery.

Unlike one-person plays that are often held on bare stages with few props that allow the audience to concentrate on the performance of the actor, 'The Lion King' has too many things going on at once. The characters aren't restricted to the cast, but are also contained in the props, scenery, and stage that the cast uses and moves through. Headdresses of grass swing and sway upon the heads of

dancers. Characters of light and shadow are created with suggestion and substance. Drought is woven from the fabric of cloth, a hole, and a tilted stage. No one element of the production overwhelms another, but all ingredients are combined to produce a most satisfying theatrical experience. My only complaint was in the purely technical flaw of sound reproduction, but even that problem couldn't dim the brilliance of this show. Even if you didn't care for the animated film, you MUST see this musical before its run ends on October 1st, 2001.

In Our Book

Babylon 5: The Passing of the Techno-Mages Book 1: Casting Shadows by Jeanne Cavelos based on an original outline by J. Michael Straczynski Paperback; Del Rey; \$6.50

Casting Shadows is the start of the third Babylon 5 novel trilogy from Del Rey. This trilogy follows the techno-mages through the a good chunk of the Babylon 5 storyline and the first book looks at events that happened before we first saw the techno-mage Elric in the second season Babylon 5 episode "The Geometry of Shadows". The book focuses on Elric and his apprentice Galen, who we later meet in the Babylon 5 movie "A Call to Arms" and learn more about during the short-lived Crusade series.

The book covers several months that occur at the same time of the first season of Babylon 5. We see Galen preparing for his initiation into becoming a technomage. As an apprentice, he gets his powers from a chrysalis that is attached to him during his training. When he becomes a full techno-mage, he will have the technology merged with him. We learn a lot about how they make some of their "magic" as well as what they have to go through in order to become a techno-mage. Through the course of the book, Galen finds out some of the secrets of the techno-mages as well as some dangerous powers that he alone has the capability to unleash. He also falls in love with Isabelle, another apprentice who he joins on a fact-finding mission about The Shadows that goes terribly wrong.

Through the events of the novel, we learn why the techno-mages were leaving known space and we see the events happen that effect Galen strongly that are only hinted at in a couple of the Crusade episodes. Knowing now the details of those events, we now know why it was so important for Galen to find the Well of Forever.

Cavelos captures Galen and Elric quite well in the novel and gives us a Detailed look into the lives and society of the techno-mages. She also weaves in a few references to events going on elsewhere in the Babylon 5 universe to give us a feeling of how the novel fits into the Babylon 5 storyline. Straczynski has said that he feels this trilogy is the best of the three. If you enjoyed the previous two trilogies, you should waste no time in picking up the start of this one. - Lee Whiteside

Cryptonomicon by Neal Stephenson Perennial, 918 pp., \$16.00

A ripping good yarn about the search for World War Two Axis gold. Well, it's a lot more than that. It's the author's masterpiece, his magnum opus wherein he covers the topics that are most important to himself. Any science fiction reader interested in computers would enjoy this historical novel. Although not science fiction, it has that cynical, cyberpunk sense. Three story lines are intermixed. The creation of a Japanese cache of war gold in the Philippines is one. Several adventures detail the Allies' secret cryptography operations in World War Two. The grandchildren of the WWII bunch pursue computer encryption. Their business schemes for an island data haven get sidetracked into a quest to recover the gold. Besides the adventures, you get to learn about Turing machines, mathematics, and making secret codes. The 'Cryptonomicon' itself is a WWII cryptography manual which is continually updated over the years. A ten-page mythological analysis of WWII is one of the more interesting digressions. But this is no dry, academic plod. The biting, frequently humorous wit makes me chuckle. And the ending is a spectacular piece of symbolism. - Michael Griffin

Slayer: The Revised and Updated Unofficial Guide to Buffy The Vampire Slayer by Keith Topping Paperback; Virgin Books; \$7.95

As with any popular show, in addition to any official guide books, there are also unofficial guide books and Buffy The Vampire Slayer is no exception. With Slayer, Keith Topping has put together a guide in the tradition of Andy Lane's Babylon File books, taking a detailed look at each episode with a British perspective. The update guide covers to the end of Season 4 of the series, whereas the first edition went to the end of season 3. Make sure you are getting the latest edition, since copies of the first one are still on the shelves.

For each episode, Topping does a one or two paragraph summary of each episode plus listing the guest star, writer, director and US and UK original transmission date. Following this, he then devotes two to four pages of commentary on the episode, broken down into several specific categories. These include: "Dreaming is Free", where dream sequences are analyzed and the season 4 finale "Restless" takes up a whole page for this section; "Denial, Thy Name in Joyce" where instances of Buffy's mom ignoring her daughter's activities are pointed out; "References" details pop culture references; "It's a Designer Label" which points out fashion statements and gaffes; "Bitch" where the girls being really nasty are identified; "Awesome!" where the cool monsters and other neat things are pointed out; "Logic, Let Me introduce You to this Window" which notes the bloopers, plot holes and other continuity glitches; "Quote/Unquote" where the best bits of dialogue are noted; and, of course, "I Just Love Your Accent" where TopIn Our Book (Cont'd from page 18) ping discusses Buffy's "charmingly Californian view of the British". Topping usually adds some Notes, Critques, and Soundtrack references for each episode as well.

Overall, it's a fun way to revisit the series when you don't have access To your VCR. It's also fun to look for things pointed out in the guide as You re-watch an episode. It is much more organized than the official Watcher's Guide, and a lot more fun, too. - Lee Whiteside

Rules of Conflict! by Kristine Smith Eos, 373 pp., \$6.50

This is unlike any science fiction novel I have read. It is a rhyme wrapped in a mystery contained in an enigma. The rhyme:"One of Six for Tongue of Gold, Two for Eyes and Ears, Three and

Four for Hands of Light, Five and Six for Earthly Might." Captain Jani Kilian is Two of Six, the Eyes and Ears of a cultural exchange team. The mystery: who killed the human leaders on a planet during a massacre by the alien idomeni. The enigma: why is the military covering up that Jani killed her commander then. The story uses office politics in Earth's military bureaucracy, eighteen years after the event. Jani is a paper documents examiner, which gives her diplomatic power with the idomeni. How archaic yet exotic. I think the main thing that makes old science fiction become outdated isn't the technology but gender relations, what used to be called sex roles. It isn't so jarring that starship computers ran on vacuum tubes. It's that the women were meek little helpers of the men. All this has changed. Make the hero into a woman, allow swearing in thought and dialog, and you've got Smith's modern brand of science fiction. Jani is bioaugmented with idomeni genes, and this gives her superpowers and life-threatening medical problems. Which serves the conflicting purposes of her friends and enemies, both human and alien. Intriguing intrigues. - Michael Griffin

> The Fox Woman By Kij Johnson Tor, 380 pp, \$14.95

I will admit I was snagged by the title and cover art. I decided to review this book because it is so different that some readers may pass it by and thereby miss something extraordinary.

Kitsune is a female fox who lives under an abandoned house with her brother, mother and grandfather. The family who owns the house comes back. Yoshifuji has lost his position in government and has come back to his family home to meditate. His wife, Shikujo, is not very happy at living in the wild country but since she is determined to be the most perfect wife possible, she will not allow

her husband to see her unhappiness. Their son is the happiest, being able to play in the dirt and chase butterflies.

Kitsune and her family are soon run out of their comfortable den. They should leave and find a new, secure den but Kitsune is consumed with curiosity about the humans. She begins to watch Yoshifuji and even attempts to read the poetry he writes and leaves lying out one night. Her grandfather tries to convince her that her curiosity is dangerous but it's too late for Kitsune, she's fallen in love with Yoshifuji.

Yoshifuji's fascination with the family of foxes who live in the garden is grating to his wife. She sees the foxes as harbingers of bad luck. Japanese culture was full of stories of foxes who spirited off unsuspecting humans and she worries for her husband and son. Eventually, she returns to the capital with her son, unable to cope with her husband's growing obsession with the foxes or her own dreams about a fox lover.

Grandfather fox, seeing that his granddaughter is hopelessly in love with the human, consents to help her become human. His love for his granddaughter drives him to help her realize her love rather than live unrequited. The process requires the entire fox family to become human; something Kitsune's brother and mother rebel against.

One night, Kitsune, as a lovely human woman, lures Yoshifuji into her home and the family contrives to keep him there by means of an elaborate fantasy that Yoshifuji wants to believe in. His memories of his wife and his other life become vague and unimportant. His world is now his lovely new wife, her brother as his companion and the most beautiful and perfect home he has ever seen. He regains his position with the government and his joy is complete with the arrival of his new son.

The reality is that the foxes are still foxes and the perfect home is a dirt den under the garden. The magical part of this story is whether you believe Kitsune is actually a woman or still a fox; even she isn't sure. Shikujo is called back from the capital with the news that her husband is missing and she discovers that being the perfect wife is not the best way to love her husband. Kitsune fights desperately, calling on the gods to help her, to preserve her fantasy and her husband and son. The question is which life does Yoshifuji want?

The story is presented by diary entries by Yoshifuji, Shikujo and Kitsune. The prose is lyrical and tastes very Japanese. Through this medium I learned something about Japanese culture that I had not understood before; the significance they put on appearance reaches deeply into their communication with each other. The choice of words, paper and style contribute to the message and because of the extreme formality, people and their real feelings often get separated.

This is what Yoshifuji and Shikujo also learn.

A lovely story; well developed and creatively presented. If you enjoy the mystical side of Japanese culture or are intrigued by something different, read this book. - Catherine Book

The Lust Lizard of Melancholy Cove By Christopher Moore Avon Books, Inc., \$13.00, 304 pp

Another tidbit from Christopher Moore!! (see last Connotations) I love this guy's stuff; original doesn't begin to describe it. This serving stars a town constable, Theo, who grows his own pot in a garden and a Xena-type wannabe, Molly, who had a brush with fame as Kendra, Warrior Babe of the Outland (B movies). The so-called villain in this opera is Steve, a sea-monster who is thousands of years old, maybe more, who gets turned on by depression.

You see, a woman killed herself and her psychiatrist, Val, gets a case of conscience. Val's method of treatment consisted primarily of prescribing lots of drugs to cure whatever ailed her patient but, after the suicide, decides that she really needs to actually treat these people so pulls all the prescriptions. The result is a town full of depressed people. This miasma of depression is like a smorgasbord for Steve. But Steve hasn't been topside for a millennia and mistakes a gas tanker for local wildlife. His attempt to get it on with the big silver momma results in a need to hide himself while he heals parts of his body. He has the amazing ability to camouflage himself as anything and he picks a mobile home, right next door to Molly. After Molly watches him eat the paperboy, she steps in to rescue two ladies from the local church and ends up becoming Steve's girlfriend.

Adding to the fun is Steve's biological mechanism of making his prey horny as hell to draw them close enough to eat them. This has an interesting effect on the town in general. It affects an old blues singer, who had an encounter with one of Steve's relatives some years back and watched his best friend get eaten and the local pharmacist, who gets his jollies wearing a snorkel and fins while getting it on with dolphins.

There is also a real plot behind all these insane characters that involves discovering who really murdered the apparently suicidal woman and what mysterious things are happening on a nearby ranch and what does the sheriff have to do with any of it. The fun is watching the characters play their parts. The hook in the story is that nothing would have come of the murder if Steve had not visited Pine Cove. If you have a sense of the ridiculous, you'll love this story. - Catherine Book

Intrigues: Book One of the Blending

Enthroned by Sharon Green; Eos; \$6.50; 418 pp

Honest, don't try this at home.

I started a book that's about number
SEVEN in a series of interesting
characters. They're a mix of magics; each
has a strong talent and when the six get
together, they can combine their strengths
in interesting ways.

Now, I know an author can't recapitulate the whole darn tell from the beginning in every book, it would really fry the regular readers of the series. But like I said at the beginning,: Don't do as I did! Start the series at the proper beginning. It's called: The Blending: The Convergence. You'll be a much happier (and knowledgeable) camper by the time you reach this tale! - Sue Martin

Shrine of The Stars: The Third Book of Confluence by Paul J. McAuley Eos; \$18; 372pp.

Now, I did this series correctly: I've read the previous two wonderful novels and really enjoyed this third one...though of course, there's been a year's gap between Book Two and Three.

This is a mighty fine book. Once again McAuley takes us to the wonderful rich and vibrant world of Confluence, the artificial world constructed by the long_since disappeared Preservers who had peopled it with 10,000 bloodlines. Our Hero Yamamanama, is the last of the Builders, or so he has been told and it is his Destiny to shake the world of Confluence out of it's stupor and the strangle hold of the bureaucracies that have encrusted society into stiffness like an over_abundance of barnacles.

Yama, as he is called, is the voice of reason throughout, constantly question the rules and the nature of the world around him. His Quest is to not only find

You can tell by my use of capitals, that this is a Siddhartha kind of tale. Or maybe, more of a tropical and humid Titus Groan.

In this third novel, Yama, once again a prisoner of the evil Dr. Dismas, must try to escape and continue his journey, while his loyal followers Tibor and Pandaras seek to rejoin him. In the travels of these characters we get into the inner bowels of Confluence where it's working machineries are, and we discover just what the world's myriad "shrines" are all about. We meet more new and fascinating denizens. And Yama, more than previously, realizes what he's supposed to do for Confluence.

Again, McAuley's rich imagination and story_telling carry you along. This is such an amazing and eccentric collection of life forms and cultures, bizarre (without being too gross) rituals and arcane strictures. It's refreshingly different.

My only caveat: It sort of wandered in ever smaller circles at the end. Much as a three book series cries out for a good strong finish, this series ended a little soft and vague. Not in its conclusion really, which is full circle from the beginning and a decent enough way to ends the story, but that it just drifts and ends with a small bump at the shore. I wish it had been more emphatic.

Nevertheless, this is great series and well worth the price of hardbacks. _ Sue Martin

Gilgamesh by Stephen Grundy; Morrow \$26; 575 pp.

Have you ever read the "oldest human epic" (this would be the original Gilgamesh)? I did, in a Penguin edition about 20 years ago. It's not very long, as some of it's missing.

Basically, it is a tale of a king of Uruk (in Sumeria, Mesopotamia) Gilgamesh, ("two-thirds god; one third man") the

strongest human around and Enkidu, a man fashioned by the gods to be his counterpart, to rival and humble the impetuous young king.

The tale covers some of their adventures subduing a monster in a great cedar forest nearby, killing the Bull of Heaven, after the goddess Ishtar comes to Gilgamesh and offers herself. He spurns her. And then Gilgamesh's beloved Enkidu falls ill and dies after twelve miserable days. Gilgamesh, bereft, tries to win Enkidu back from the dead, by storming the Netherworld to take Enkidu back to the land of the living, but to no avail.

He returns to Uruk a chastened man. This is it in a nutshell. Grundy obviously expands the story and makes it richer, toying with the characters (and the spelling of their names). He makes Enkidu and Gilgamesh, not only best friends, but lovers too. This proves support for the last hundred pages of the book, fifty of which cover Enkidu's painful, slow death and Gilgamesh's agony as he tries everything to wrest his beloved back from the dead.

Beside Enkidu, there is the Shamhatu, a priestess of Inanna (Ishtar) who helps lure Enkidu to civilization and who is the strong steady heart of the story. She constantly tries to leash in Gilgamesh who is much like an exuberant puppy; happily involving Enkidu in all his plans and laughing in the face of the god's desires and attendant rituals.

But Destiny doesn't like it's tail pulled, even by a larger-than-life character like Gilgamesh.

I liked this book. I love books about the Far East, especially in ancient times. And Grundy did a wonderful job evoking the time and place. There are battles and treachery and sex; and it makes for a very entertaining historical fantasy. It makes me want to go and find my copy of "Rhinegold," Grundy's other novel (which sounds like it is a retelling of the legend of Siegfried and the Rhine Maidens and all that Wagnerian drama).
