Japanese director Hayao Miyazaki (Totoro, Princess Mononoke), repopulates the world of Sherlock Holmes with anthropomorphic dogs. This is a two sided DVD with the Japanese soundtrack/ version on one side and the English soundtrack/version since the English versions have about 1 minute of extra footage in each episode.

The first four episodes of Sherlock Hound were originally done in 1981 as a Japanese produced show for Italian TV. It gained new life in 1984 with an additional 20 episodes produced for the TV Asahi network.

Games to Put the "Family" **Back Into Family Game Night**

A grown up can simply only handle playing Candy Land so many times before they die of boredom. However, finding games that are easy enough for the kids to play, yet still offer just enough strategy to keep mom and dad eager to play is no easy task.

Luckily for us our very own US based Rio Grande Games, has released English versions of three very impressive games offering a decent level of strategy without becoming overly complicated. Each game is declared suitable for ages 10 and up; however, assuming your child doesn't still run the risk of eating small pieces (Or your husbands for that matter) you should, with a little help, be able to play with children as young as 8 or more.

I know what you're thinking, if an eight year old can play it how good can it really be? We for starters let's look at the latest 2001 Spiel Des Jahres winner (that's German for game of the year) Carcassone by Klaus-Jürgen Wrede. Note that this was not the children's game of the year, but THE game of the year.

In this tile lying game players are building the French city of Carcassone. Each player begins his/her turn by drawing a random city tile and then adding it to the steadily growing city. They then have the option of placing one of their followers onto that tile in effort to score as many points as possible.

Roads score one point for every tile they pass through; cities score two points per tile they cover (plus other bonuses for shields), cloisters (little church buildings) score one point for every tile that borders immediately around them, and farms score four points for each complete castle they connect to.


Sound simple? Well, each player only has 8 followers whom they do not get back until their roads, cities, or cloisters, or farms are completed (For farmers which score the most points that is the end of the game). Still Simple? Well points for each item are only scored for the player with the most followers in each city, on each road, or in each farm area. Ok, still simple? You cannot simply place a follower into a city with another player's follower. You must place them in their own individual scoring area and then later play tiles in effort to connect the areas together.

This all amounts to perhaps the most fun, lighter strategy game currently available and all for about \$20.00. All new copies are supposed to come with a free promotional expansion known as "The River Expansion" (make sure this has been printed on the front of the game box as

some chain stores are still selling through old warehouse stock). This expansion basically gives you a larger area to build off of at the beginning of the game. Also look for a really neat expansion coming this summer from Rio Grand entitled "Carcassone Expansion."

This is different than the River Expansion. It includes pieces for a sixth player, One large follower that scores a time three bonus, Cathedral tiles that double the score of a city (but make a non complete city worthless), and an Inn tile used for adding a bonus to roads. On a lighter note we must bring up one of my personal favorites Frank's Zoo from a German couple otherwise known as



Doris and Frank. This is a trick taking card game with both basic and advanced rules. While the advanced rules may be slightly confusing the basic rules are good enough

to make the \$10

cost of the game a great addition to any family game night. This is currently our group's favorite finisher game (the game we play when our brain's are fried from playing too many intense strategy games). In Frank's

zoo players are simply trying to empty their hands of all of their animal cards first. However. animals range

from the all-powerful killer whales to the near worthless mosquitoes. Each animal is clearly pictured thinking about all of the animals it is afraid of (of course the killer whale simply isn't afraid of anything).

The skill of strategy enters play about mid game. There are only five of each creature, most have several weaknesses; however, some have only one. Now remember who has what left and watch out for the chameleon that acts as the wild card and can count as anything as long as he's played in a pair. Oh and remember those mosquitoes? They have a funny little habit of thinking they're elephants just when you least expect it.

It will definitely take a few tries to master the feel of this zoo. Just as a warning you might want to buy at least two copies as over the last few years my copies always manage to leave with our company as they found it just too fun to live without.

Finally we cannot forget Elfenland by Alan Moon. Although this game leans more towards the 10 + age range, it simply cannot be over looked. It was the Spiel Des Jahres winner in 1998 and it is still currently selling strong.

In Elfenland players are trying to visit every city on the board and manage to return to their home city before the end of four turns. Players visit each city by moving their personal large traveling boot marker by playing cards.

At the beginning of each round players look at the eight cards they have been given. They then take turns drawing tokens that hopefully match the cards they have drawn. Afterwards they take turns placing them over various terrain types. For instance large traveling pigs may only be used to travel over plains or through forests. The other players are going to

need to travel across the same areas as you do, so eventually they may play tiles that are less than desirable for you.

Don't worry because you can always caravan to pass through any terrain with a token for the huge cost of only three cards. Of course you can always raft down a river, or use your fallen tree to make travel harder for that opponent. It's really all up to you.

After everyone has moved through their cities and collected their town pieces, all of the tiles are removed, new cards are drawn and the round begins again. Players loose one town piece for every city they are away from their home city, and the player with the most town pieces wins.

There is also an expansion for this game, but it significantly increases the playing time and may be to complicated for younger children. It does, however, add in the magician that let's each player magically teleport to any city on the board - but only once per game.



Musical Notes

Celia Farran: Fire in the Head (***, self-produced)

Science Fiction fans come in all shapes, sizes and beliefs. And aside from SF, it can be argued that we don't really have all that much in common, except for one other thing: almost all of us like Irish music. The five or six of you who don't can stop reading now.

With that, I present to you **Celia Farran**, a fine singer of Irish descent who hails from that great old Irish town of Milwaukee, WI. (Okay, Big Bend, actually, but close enough.) It's not surprising that a city usually associated with beer has a big Irish population. What's surprising is that I hadn't heard of Farran before.

"Fire in the Head" is a combination of traditional and original tunes performed on guitar with occasional other accompaniment. When you perform songs everybody's heard before, it helps to come up with arrangements that make them your own, and Farran succeeds in spades here.

The album kicks off with "*Maggie*," a song I've heard everybody from Irish bands to bluegrass bands to as a slow, mournful tune. Farran plays it up and fast, almost turning it into a different song.

From a filk standpoint, Farran has a great song of her own on here called "Gnomes," about a human who suddenly finds himself turned into a gnome.

Farran has a very nice voice, similar to **Heather Alexander** although not quite so husky, and perfect for the material here.

I got this CD from **Celia Farran** herself, when she stopped by Fiddlers' Dream open stage one Thursday night after playing a gig for one of the local Irish societies. She implied that she will be back sometime, and I suggest you check her out. Screening Room

The Time Machine Dreamworks, 96 min, PG-13

If you are expecting a remake of the 1960 classic with Rod Taylor you won't find it here. What you will find is a love story, an adventure and a tale of hope.

Alexander Hartdegen (Guy Pearce) has a nice ,home, a job he enjoys and a woman he loves (Sienna Guillory) until tragedy strikes. Determined to change things Alex locks himself away in his laboratory for four years building a time machine. But he finds he cannot change the past and decides to seek his answer in the future, stopping first in 2030 and then the extreme future, 800,000 years into the future. There he is both heartened to find the gentle Eloi and horrified to find that they are hunted by the savage Morlocks.

While there are some elements that seem to be missing (why does the Uber-Morlock decide to let Alex return to the past) some things are better handled than in the earlier film. In particular, Alex's motivation for building the time machine makes much more sense than the simple scientific curiosity of the George Pal film. And the actual time machine is gorgeous, all the whirling gears and lights make it seem plausible. We have the shop window that shows us the passage of the years (a tribute to George Pal's 1960 film) and the added delight of Vox (Orlando Jones), the automated hologram that holds all humanity's knowledge, a dispenses it in a throughly supercilious manner. The Eloi village is beautiful to behold, especially the night scenes. The whole film is a visual treat from 1890's New York to the world of the Eloi and even the underground world of the Morlocks.

I recommend this film. I would enjoy seeing it a second time in the theater and will definitely purchase it when it comes out on DVD. - **Stephanie L Bannon**

Ice Age Fox, 81 min, PG

A 20th Century Fox digital animation. Directed by Chris Wedge. Starring voices of Ray Ramano as Manny, John Leguizamo as Sid, and Denis Leary as Diego.

It's good to see Fox getting back into animation features, after they closed thier local animation studio it looked like Disney/Pixar would have no competition at all. It's just too bad that their first effort was somewhat lackluster.

The plot centers around an irascible wooly mammoth (with a heart of gold, natch...), a goofy and hapless tree sloth that can't take no for an answer, and a sneaky saber-toothed tiger with a hidden agenda. These three band together to save a human child and to escape a coming ice age that seems to be moving with the speed of a Mack truck. So you take characters from Shrek and a plot device from Monsters Inc., throw in some ice and put the blender on high. Voila!! Anime slushee! It probably only looks derivative. Nobody would actually just pull components from two highly successful films just to cash in, would they? Nah.

That's just me being irascible but with a heart of gold.

ET: The Extra-Terristrial -20 anniversary Universal, 120 min. PG

Having not seen ET in the theater and only parts of it on video this gives me a unique perspective to write from. That said here we go.

Twenty years would usually give a very dated feel to a film. ET holds it's own. You do not seem to be watching an old film, as Star Wars feels. Speilberg manages to keep us in a current time frame just by redoing minor details, not a major overhaul. We now see the law enforcement carrying Walkie Talkies instead of guns. Less traumatic to young viewers? I would have to agree, although it is P.C. We now see the inside of the spaceship, ET in the tub and instead of the terrorist line on Halloween we hear "you're not going to go as a hippy", a good choice due to how people are feeling right now, but also P.C.

Thanks to CGI we now see better facial movement for ET, a more realistic Bikeacross-the-moon, and a new set of flying bike scenes with actor look-a-likes instead of puppets. Yes, they did do some refilming of the bikes with replacement actors. After all have you seen Henry Thomas and Robert McNaughton lately, it would be a real challenge to shrink them in CGI.

As a movie I would say it's an adults as well as a kids film. Many parents will want to see it for themselves, not the kids. It's fun, suspenseful, makes you happy and sad all throughout the film. You get to see more of a kids perspective of the world, something we can all learn from. There is not the constant explosions, violence and language that has become the hallmark of modern film. Speilberg & Mathison relied on a script that can hold it's own. They do not need to cover up poor writing and big gaps in plot with effects and violence. Also there is only one line that could worry some parents.

Everyone who has never seen this at a theater should, you cannot get the full effect from the TV set. The visual and sound are sharp and effectively cleaned up for our current time frame. The acting is good and consistent and the characters developed well throughout the film. The flow of the film goes smoothly. All in all I had a great experience. - **Richard Bolinski**

The Count Of Monte Cristo Touchstone, 132 min, PG-13

The Count Of Monte Cristo is the classic Alexandre Dumas story of an innocent man, wrongly imprisoned, and the vengeance he visits on those who betrayed him. Jim Caviezel stars as Edmond Dantes, a sailor who is falsely accused of treason by his best friend Fernand (Guy Pearce) who covets Edmond's fiancee Mercedes (Dagmara Dominczyk). Condemned even though the magistrate knows he is innocent, Edmond finds himself imprisoned in the infamous Chateau D'Ilf. Richard Harris appears as a priest and fellow prisoner who not only gives Edmond hope of escape as they tunnel towards freedom, but also educates Edmond in everything from math and civics to martial arts and table manners.

Escaping after thirteen years of imprisonment, Edmond retrieves the treasure the priest's former employer had hidden on the island of Monte Cristo. Using the treasure he goes to Paris as the wealthy and mysterious Count of Monte Cristo. Introducing himself into the midst of French nobility he thus sets into motion his plans for revenge.

At slightly over 2 hours this film's pace is slow. The scenes in the prison are realistically drab and colorless, though the cells seem incredibly clean and the guards incredibly inattentive. Parts of the film are visually stunning, the barren landscape and high cliffs of the prison island, the deserted villa and it surrounding field, the carnival in Rome, and, the piece de resistance, the Count's introduction to Paris high society which includes fireworks, a hot air balloon, servants in golden turbans and exotic garb for the Count.

This is not an action film, those expecting something along the lines of *The Three Musketeers* will be disappointed. What we have here is a character study as Edmond grows from an innocent and trusting young man into a cynical revenge driven man and finally into a man who recognizes the folly of revenge as it almost costs him all he holds dear. All in all it was an enjoyable evening at the theater and, while I won't go see it again in the theater, I look forward to its release on DVD. -**Stephanie L Bannon**

Gallifrey One, A Review by Mike Willmoth

As many readers know, Gallifrey One is the home planet for Dr. Who, that infamous BBC science fiction character that their long-running show is named after. It is also a media convention in the Los Angeles, California, area held every year around Presidents' Day Weekend. Recently, it has been at the Van Nuys airport (Airtel Plaza Hotel). This year was no exception. It ran Friday February 15 through Monday February 18, 2002.

Seeing as how it was their 13th annual convention, the official title was The 13th Floor of Gallifrey One. Chairing the event for the first time was Diana Dougherty and Programming was headed by Shaun Lyon. Guests-of-Honor were Frazer Hines (Jamie McCrimmon, DW companion), Carole Ann Ford (Susan Foreman, DW granddaughter) and Anneke Wills (DW companion). They also featured Virginia Hey (Farscape - Zhaan), Mira Furlan (Babylon 5 - Delenn), Judson Scott (Babylon 5 - Knight One), Gordon Michael Woolvett (Andromeda - Harper), Maggie Stables (Professor Evelyn Smythe, DW audio companion), Celeste Yarnall (Star Trek: The Original Series Yeoman Martha Landon), Bob May (Lost in Space the robot), Julie Caitlin Brown (Babylon 5 - Na'Toth), Marjorie Monaghan (Babylon 5 - Number One Mars Resistance), Mojo (past LepreCon GoH and upcoming CopperCon GoH), Beata Pozniak (B5 - President Luchenko), Carrie Dobro (Crusade - Dureena), Stephen Austin (B5 - Pak'mara Ambassador), Ashley Miller (Andromeda writing staff), Jill Sherwin (Andromeda story writer), and a whole slew of other folks.

Because of our schedule this year we couldn't stay for the whole Monday schedule. So, my family and I drove over from Phoenix in about 6 hours on Thursday afternoon. After checking into the hotel I wandered around to find anyone who might be doing something con-related, but there wasn't much yet. I refreshed myself with the layout of the function space. The hotel has space on the ground floor with most of the rooms in the south section and some in the north. To the south is the large programming room the con called Hellmouth. Next to that was the Art Show in Summers Gallery. Across the hallway were the Video Lounge (the Library), Green Room was, of course, in Lorne Green Room, The Initiative held more programming, Pylea had the con office and the freebie tables along with fan tables out in the open in the Cemetery. Registration was near the hotel's reg desk in Wolfram & Hart, Consuite in Caritas and another Initiative across from Consuite for more programming (which I found later was a typo, but can't remember the darn room

name). Across the courtyard to the north were UC Sunnydale (programming) and The Magic Box for Dealers Room. They also had autographing tables in the foyer outside the latter two.

BBV Presentation #1 started programming along with Episode II: Attack of the Lucasfilm Marketing Machine. Various Doctor Who videos ran all weekend in the Library. GoHs talk came next along with Hogwarts Academy High. Dan Freedman talked about BBC Online's new DW internet webcast story and We're Talkin' Time Lords covered how these characters evolved over the years. I especially enjoyed Chronotrip which was a new documentary from director/producer Jeff Cioletti and Far Away Discourse Productions exploring science fiction, science and metaphysics of time travel. Cooler Britannia discussed British tv, Eric Hoffman presented a GoH Retrospective, Opening Ceremonies gave their new chair a chance to embarrass herself in public big time up on stage, the Ice Cream Social of Doom was cleared out by the time I made it by and the Haunted House Party (complete with maze entrance and screaming demons) was interesting for awhile until the folks I knew had wandered off and there was no one to really chat with.

I visited Consuite without much fanfare, so to speak. They had candy corn and other Halloween treats with some chips and dip, cookies, peanut butter for sandwiches, and soft drinks. Occasionally, throughout the con, they had hot food, but I usually missed it being too early to serve or too late to find. For dinner we went offsite to Dr. Hogly Wogly's Tyler Texas Style Barbecue for beef brisket and ribs. I stopped in the Art Show during setup and asked for a bidder number, but they weren't ready to hand them out yet and I never got back. As it turned out my wife did and we came home with numerous pieces of artwork. I found only one party Friday night and it was primarily a Buffy the Vampire Slayer fan group.

Saturday offered more serious program options. David J. Howe presented a look at the new DW novella series. Into the Mines of Moria discussed the Lord of the Rings movie versus the books. Denizens of rec.arts.drwho, Jade Pagoda and the Yahoo groups gathered for a reality mixer. The Ladies of Babylon (Brown, Monaghan, Dobro and Pozniak) talked about their experiences working in the B5 universe. Reeltime Pictures showed a documentary about last year's Gallifrey con. Mojo talked about more amazing special effects as he's now freelancing his work and creating a coffee table book of shots. Mira Furlan was supposed to do a Q&A, but had a sick child and only signed autographs. Writing SF for TV had Marc Scott Zicree (Outer Limits) and his wife Elaine (also OL), Carleton Eastlake (OL), Emily Skopov (Xena, Andromeda) and Jim Swallow (ST: Voyager) chatting about writing for American SFTV. Into the BBC

Archives brought up details about what they have, what's missing, DVDs, etc.

My Babylon Memories had some of the minor actors talk about their B5 experiences. Paul Cornell talked about writing in a workshop-type discussion. Several groups showed their fan videos. Andromeda tv show had a fan gathering that I missed, but heard good things about afterward. Virginia Hey gave a Q&A and was very nice, learning about her makeup problem, etc. Big Finish Productions actors discussed their audio company. Hitchhikers' Guide was shown on DVD. Companions Who Never Were talked about characters who never became companions and were compared to those who were. After Japanese food for dinner (wonderful soy-based soup with pork and vegetables) at Kyushu Ramen I caught most of the Cabaret entertainment, leaving only when the energy seemed to die down. The dance was quite lively and I watched it for some time from the shadows and chatted with others who didn't dance. There must have been 4 dozen folks on the floor, including Phoenix's own Chiglet. And tonight at least there were parties, including ConDor (the following weekend in San Diego) with a Mardi Gras theme complete with beads and Cajun cuisine. The other party next door was watching the Olympics and wasn't very interesting at all, but had good drink. Sunday brought what I thought would be Video Trailers, but turned out to skip that entirely and show some bizarrely boring stuff from BBC previews. I had to leave early since it was driving me nuts! Farscapin' Across the Universe offered a discussion into this strange, but successful, TV show. Bob May talked about his robot experiences on Lost in Space and Fan-dromeda talked more about the second season of this sf show. The Andromeda Writers Panel was combined with the Woolvett Q&A as they also showed up with Keith Hamilton Cobb (Tyr) from the show. The questions were rather thoughtful and covered the changes since former Executive Producer Robert Hewitt Wolfe departed, Trance's new color scheme, Kevin Sorbo's input into the writing, and the future of the show in general. All in all I was inspired for its future and found the two actors in person to be very much like that on screen with their unique chemistry. Angel Investigations talked about the Buffy clone show. Hey did another Q&A. A Charity Auction benefitted the American Red Cross.

After dinner for pizza at Ameci's we headed back for the Costume Contest with a few good entries, mostly no big deal. The Weakest Time-Link was a parody on the popular tv show. They had another dance which was not as well attended as Saturday, but still interesting to behold. The funniest thing was when a kid fell to the carpet in the doorway so someone could outline him with masking tape. It seems they had a problem keeping folks from standing near the doorway and

thought this would help rid them of the fire marshal problem. It didn't work well. There wasn't much in the way of parties, but I stumbled across the Slipstream Suite. It was so titled because of the web site www.slipstreambbs.com which discusses the Andromeda tv show. I introduced myself and was welcomed in by Lil. She then asked me my impressions of the show, how it was changing, etc. Discussion ensued with several members getting loud and boisterous. In the end the suite was shut down after several arguments. I understand that they moved to a private room afterward, but I wasn't invited to attend so I just left. After visiting the site I've found they've patched things up and gone on with friendly discussions, but it was rather interesting for awhile.

Monday we had to head home, so didn't get to catch much. They held a Cricket Match since it only rained once during the entire con. More GoH Q&As. The Art Show Auction was a success. DW Book Roundup: Fans' Point of View talked about the various BBC novels over the years. An Enterprise of Paramount Importance covered the new Star Trek show and the Closing Ceremonies wrapped up the con after we left. We arrived home in the mid evening to chores and getting back to normal life once again.

In the Dealers Room they had Alien Entertainment, Ambrosia Comics & Collectibles, Beata Pozniak, Big Finish Productions / Ministry of Sound & Vision, Bob May & Company, BBV Productions / Bill Baggs, Cargo Cult Books, Celestial Pets / Celeste Yarnall, Earthdaughter Arts, Jerry Ohlmeier's Movie Memorabilia, John McElroy Books, Katarra Kreations, Sci-Fi Zone, Therri Moore Designs and A Wrinkle in Time. We bought some books (B5: Technomage trilogy), t-shirts (mostly B5) and some nutrients for our pets from Celeste. We hope to switch our pets off processed foods entirely with any luck. Art Show had Anneke Wills, Barbara Fister-Lilitz, Susan Gleason, Mary Hanson-Roberts, Sherrie Holbrook, M.J. Videophile

Robinson Crusoe Buena Vista, 105 mins VHS \$103.99, DVD \$32.99, PG-13

I'll admit up front that I have no idea if this is a faithful adaptation of the book since I read Robinson Crusoe so many years ago I'd rather not go into it. This film is a 1996 release that I don't remember seeing in the theaters.

We begin the actual story of Robinson Crusoe (Pierce Brosnan) in Scotland where he fights a duel with and kills his best friend over a woman they both love. Fleeing Scotland to avoid the retribution of his friend's family, Robinson sets out to sail around the world on a great adventure. All goes well for the first year but then there is a tropical storm that wrecks the ship and maroons Robinson alone on an island. He scavenges all the necessary items for survival from the shipwreck including the captain's dog and sets about learning how to survive.

After he has been on this island for a year natives show up and he intervenes as they perform human sacrifice to their god. Only one victim escapes and eventually he becomes first Robinson's servant and then his friend, Friday (William Takaku) They learn from each other and eventually each is willing to give his life for the other.

The story is ok but seems to address most issues in a rather superficial manner. For some unexplained reason the natives leave Robinson's island alone for over a year then they tend to drop in with great regularity. The relationship between the two men is probably realistic since Friday is not automatically submissive to Robinson at all times, they have several disagreements, the most divisive is over religion. That Robinson comes to question his Christian faith and accept that there may well be other paths to god, though realistic for his situation, might be offensive to some. All in all I'd give this a B+. - Stephanie L Bannon

Freshman Cassie (Melissa Sagemiller), her boyfriend Sean (Casey Affleck), her best friends Annabel (Eliza Dushku - Faith from Buffy the Vampire Slayer) and Matt (Wes Bentley) celebrate the beginning of college. On the way home they are involved in a terrible car accident.


Cassie starts college but she is haunted by visions of the frightening men she saw at the party as well as being in the hospital and undergoing surgery.

Was it really an accident? Who really survived? Is college and illusion? There are strange people in masks following Cassie, we skip back and forth from college to the hospital and we can't be sure what is real and what isn't.

This seems rather typical of the genre, ok for a viewing but probably not a repeat viewing. It is notable for Buffy The Vampire Slayer fans since Eliza Dushku plays the part of Annabel. The cover states that this version is different from the theatrical release but since I didn't see it in the theater I can't say what has been added. The DVD has a lot of extra features that include deleted scenes, a "Making Of" featurette, the obligatory theatrical trailer and an animated storyboard. -**Stephanie L Bannon**

We also learn about the gang's rivalry with the Ashely's during the annual Thanksgiving canned food drive. Then, while Principal Prickly goes in search of help, Ms Minster shares a story with Ms Grotke about the time Spinelli spent the weekend with her. When Principal Prickly returns having failed to find help Ms Minster defends the kids by reminding the other two about the just completed Christmas show in which the kids all learned about the true spirit of Christmas through Mikey's efforts to prove Santa's existence to his friends.

Robert Goulet provides Mikey's singing voice and other voice talent includes James Earl Jones and Dabney Coleman.

Extras on the DVD are a 3 part "Special Report" in which ? tells us about Mistletoe ,Mikey tells us about Santa and ? tells us about Christmas lights.

Parents who want their kids to keep on believing in Santa may want to avoid this one or at least you may want to monitor the youngest viewers during the final segment since it does give away that there is no real Santa Claus but this should be a favorite for the older kids. - **Stephanie L Bannon**

Cinderella II Dreams Come True Disney Home Video, 73 min VHS \$26.99, DVD \$29.99 G

This is sort of what happens after the fairy tale ends, (though not quite as interesting as what happens in Sondheims' "Into the Woods"!). This is divided up into three short stories as the mice Jacques, Gus-Gus and Mary decide, with the help of the Fairy Godmother, to make Cinderella a book about some of the things that have happened to all of them since she moved into the castle.

The first episode is about the day she and the prince get back form their honeymoon. He has to attend to things of state and she has to put on her first royal feast. And of course there is an officious housekeeper named Prudence who tells Cinderella "how things are done" The king likes this, the king likes that. Cinderella has her own ideas of course and instead of the stuffy old boring royal feast, why she brings in some down home country sounding music and the commoners and thank goodness, chocolate pudding instead of stewed prunes for dessert! The ball is a big hit naturally.

The second tale takes place as Cinderella is helping to arrange the annual Spring festival and Jacques the mouse has a bad day trying to help Cinderella and getting stomped on and chased by the palace cat, a large white Persian female cat named Pom Pom, and feeling utterly useless. He makes a wish the Fairy Godmother hears and grants: he gets to be human. This works for awhile until he really needs to save the day and he has to do it as a mouse...discovering needless to say that "It is better to be a mouse than a man!"

The third tale was rather sweet: One of Cinderella's stepsisters, Anastasia, falls in love with a town baker. The stepmother thinks he's beneath them, she must try to snag a count or a duke. Cinderella, who is in town and sees the couple's first meeting, takes Anastasia to the palace and gives her a make over..and Lucifer the cat falls for Pom Pom and the mice give him a make over. And what's that old expression: the path of true love never runs straight??" Anyway..it does end happily at yet another party at the palace. (These are partying royals)

Overall the tales are decent: pluck, following your heart and doing things your way and not letting others telling you what to do. Cinderella however seems to like running around in her blue laundry dress from the first movie..somehow she doesn't want to dress as a princess. Too stuffy I guess. - **Sue Martin Jo Martin** (age 10) says:

I liked the tape because there were lots of parts that were funny: the king and the pudding and prunes and when Jacques hits his head on the branch of a tree .It was a good movie because Cinderella didn't have to clean any more and she changed some things around the palace.

Tremors 3 Back To Perfection Universal, 104 mins VHS \$14.98, DVD \$26.98, PG

This time around we are back in Perfection Nevada where it all began. Burt Gummer (Michael Gross) has returned to Perfection after another Grabboid killing trip to find that Jack Sawyer (Shawn Christian) has started "Grabboid Torus" complete with a fake Grabboid attack to thrill the tourists. In true sequel fashion in the midst of one tour we have a real attack - the Grabboids are back!

Burt bands together with Jack, storeowner Jodi Chang (Susan Chuang) who inherited the store from her uncle who was killed in the first movie, artist Nancy Sterngood (Charlotte Stewart) and a grown up Mindy (Ariana Richards) to save Perfection not only from the Grabboids but from the US government, that has put the Grabboids on the Endangered Species list. Even Melvin Plug (Bobby Jacoby) returns as a land developer.

Mists Of Avalon Turner Home Video, 183 mins, VHS \$14.94 (release 5/7/02), DVD \$19.98, NR

This version of the Arthur legend is based on Marion Zimmer Bradley's book. I'll admit up front that I have not read the book so I viewed this movie from a totally unbiased point of view.

We have here a retelling of the Arthur legend that focuses on the women in Arthur's life. The main character is Morgaine (Julianna Margulies), half sister of King Arthur. As a child she see her aunt Viviane (Anjelica Huston) scheme to bring Uther Pendragon (Mark Lewis Jones) to the bed of her mother, Ygraine (Caroline Goodall). After the death of Ygraine's husband she marries Uther and soon thereafter Arthur is born. Morgaine is a devoted older sister to her beloved brother but they are separated when Arthur is quite young - he goes off to live with Merlin (Michael Byrne) while Morgaine goes to Avalon to learn the ancient ways from her aunt Viviane, the Lady of the Lake. Viviane is trying to ensure the survival of the old religion even as Christianity spreads into the land.

During a pagan ritual Morgaine is impregnated by Arthur, though at the time each is unaware of the identity of the other. Morgaine's other aunt, Morgause (Joan Allen) takes in the pregnant Morgaine and then suggests that she raise the child. Morgause curses Gwenwyfar so that she will never bear children while she plots to use Modred (Hans Matheson), Arthur and Morgaine's son, to achieve power for herself. When Morgaine returns to the court of her brother, King Arthur, and his Queen Gwenwyfar (Samantha Mathis).she finds Gwenwyfar in despair because she is unable to give Arthur an heir. Jealous of Arthurs's affection for his sister, Gwenwyfar schemes to force Morgaine to leave court by arranging a marriage for her.

We have all the plot twists of a sprawling family soap opera; love, betrayal, sex, politics, and sibling rivalry along with magic and mysticism. The film held my interest and I will most likely watch it again. It reflects a more positive portrayal of pagan religions than one usually sees though, of course, it wasn't overly accurate. The costumes were gorgeous but not particularly accurate for the time period being covered and the male characters could have been better developed.

The DVD contains extras such as Additional Scenes, a Gallery of Photos, Storyboards and Costume/ Production Designs, and a Camelot Characters Family Tree. - **Stephanie L Bannon**

the Rings: The Fellowship of the Ring is still taking in \$2 to \$3 million a week and is just under \$300 million and will likely get a boost with the addition of the *Two Towers* preview and Oscar publicity.

Arnold Schwarzenegger has signed on to produce and star in a remake of the 1973 movie *Westworld*. He will take on the role of the robotic killer cowboy played by **Yul Bryner** in the original movie. Arnold is also going to reprise his role of Conan in a new *Conan The Barbarian* film in which he will be paired with a younger swordsman. Also on Arnold's plate is *Terminator 3: Rise of the Machines* where he will be joined by **Shane West** (*Dracula 2000*) as a grown up John Connor.

Following the recent run on television, MGM will now be producing a feature *Outer Limits* movie. Writer **Gerald DiPego** and his sons **Justin** and **Zachary** have signed a deal with MGM to write a film based on the series. They are hoping it might turn into a film franchise. **Mark Victor** and **Michael Grais** of Victor/Grais and **Pen Densham, Guy McElwaine** and **John Watson** of Trilogy Entertainment Group will be producing.

In a recent interview, **Will Smith** said that the upcoming *Men in Black II* will have even more humor in it than the original. Part of that is that his and **Tommy Lee Jones's** character already know each other as this movie starts and they hit the ground running comedically. "With this film, we found really interesting, warm and funny comedic moments more quickly than we were able to do in the first film," Smith said.

After along development process, it appears that a film adaptation of **Arthur C.**

notorious city of Gomorrah, where an evil ruler is determined to lay waste to all the nomadic peoples of the desert. The few remaining tribes, never natural allies, have to unite or perish. Knowing their enemy relies on the visions of a sorcerer, they hire a skilled assassin, Mathayus (**The Rock**), to eliminate the visionary. After infiltrating the enemy camp, Mathayus discovers that the sorcerer is in fact a beautiful woman (Kelly Hu). Rather than eliminate her, he takes her deep into the desert badlands, knowing that the ruler's henchmen will stop at nothing to rescue her and bring her back. Seriously wounded in the ensuing battle, Mathayus must find the strength to lead his scrappy band of allies back to Gomorrah for a final confrontation. Jason X - The terror of Crystal Lake is back! This time he's not just slaughtering nubile campers in compromising positions. It is the year 2455, a professor takes his students on a field trip to the planet Earth, where they discover a cryogenically frozen Jason and transport him back to their spaceship. Jason Voorhees, the silent goalie-masked killer, has been on ice for a few hundred years, but through a catastrophic accident, the he is awakened and more than willing to pick up where he left off - finding new and interesting ways to murder people.

Spiderman - Based on the legendary flagship character of Marvel comics, this is the story of Peter Parker, a high school student living with his Aunt May and Uncle Ben after the death of his parents when he was just a baby. He's an avid student with a much-less-than-stellar social life and a knack for bad luck. While attending a scientific demonstration, a freak accident bombards a stray spider with radiation, and that same spider finds its way onto the unsuspecting Peter's body and bites him, miraculously granting him incredible spider-like abilities; in effect, making him into the amazing Spider-Man. Peter will find that there's a thin line between an ordinary man and an extraordinary hero; and he'll have to be the one to cross it.

Star Wars Episode II: Attack of the Clones - Ten years after the events of The

Phantom Menace, not only has the galaxy undergone significant

significant change, but so have our familiar heroes Obi-Wan Kenobi (Ewan McGregor), Padmé Amidala (Natalie **Portman**) and Anakin Skywalker (Hayden **Christensen**) as they are thrown together again for the first time since the Trade Federation invasion of

Naboo. Anakin has grown into the accomplished Jedi apprentice of Obi-Wan, who himself has transitioned from student to teacher. The two Jedi are assigned to protect Padmé whose life is threatened by


a faction of political separatists. As relationships form and powerful forces collide, these heroes face choices that will impact not only their own fates, but the destiny of the Republic.

way around a card deck and keeps popping up in the agents' investigation." Also appearing are **John Kapelos** (*Forever Knight*) and **Ray McKinnon** as "Mad Wayne" in a case involving the "*Triple Zero Killer*."

The remaining episodes start to tie up some loose ends and focus on the ongoing storylines. First of these is "Jump the Shark", featuring The Lone Gunmen in a follow up to their spinoff series. Appearing will be Michael McKean as Morris Fletcher, Stephen Snedden as Jimmy Bond and Zuleikha Robinson as Yves Harlow. The episode deals with an investigation into an attack on an immunologist researching a cure for cancer using shark cartilage. Yes, "Jump the Shark" is the term used to indicate that a TV series has gone too far, as when Fonzie jumped a shark on water skies on Happy Days. In "William", Scully must make a decision about the future of her son, William. When a disfigured, monster-like man called The Breather injects something into William's brain, they must find out what he did and what relation he has to Mulder. This episode is co-written and directed by David Duchovny. Next is "Release", which deals with the death of

Doggett's son, Luke when a Quantico cadet investigating a recent string of murders comes across information that may lead Doggett to his son's killer. As for the two hour finale, *"The Truth"*, Mulder will be re-united with Scully and there will be some resolution to end the TV series. It will obviously leave things open for follow-on theatrical movies. As of press time, there has been ZERO information leaked so far about the finale, so tune in and watch to see what happens. **Enterprise Warps On**

UPN's Enterprise will have 26 episodes this season, so there's still plenty left to air. First up in April is "Oasis", which has the Enterprise crew helping the survivors of an alien shipwreck, including an attractive female named Liana, who develops feelings for Trip. Rene Auberjonois (Odo) and Tom Bergeron (Hollywood Squares) guest star. "Detained" will guest star Dean Stockwell, Scott Bakula's co-star on Quantum Leap. Archer and Mayweather are trapped in a detention center where members of the Siluban race are being detained. While there, Archer learns that only a small number of Silubans are part of the genetically engineered group known as The Cabal. Stockwell plays General Grat, who is in charge of the detention center. In "Vox Solis", an alien life form

nests in one of the Enterprise's cargo bays and begins to capture crew members, ensnaring them in it's gushy web. "Fallen Hero" has the Enterprise dispatched to pick up a Vulcan ambassador to the planet Mazar that has been expelled for misconduct. Not much is yet know about "Desert Crossings" other than that three "Sailors of the Year" from the U.S.S. Enterprise aircraft carrier will be making appearances in the episode. In the next to last episode of the season, "Two Days and Two Nights", some of the Enterprise crew take shore leave on the pleasure planet Risa with varying results. As for the season finale, it hasn't started filming as of press time and no information has leaked about it yet. It is expected to deal with the Siluban and the temporal cold war and could end with a cliff-hanger. Or it may not. Only time will tell.

Over in the Buffyverse (is it really all in Buffy's Imagination?), things start picking up fast as the events of the season so far start to build on each other. Anya wants to wreak vengeance on Xander but can't bring herself to do it and enlists the help of someone else. The Scoobies realize that the Trio (Warren, Jonathan and Andrew) have set up cameras to monitor them all around Sunnydale including Buffy's house and The Magic Box. When they track down the source of the cameras and they view some of what has been recorded by them, the results are devastating. In the next episode, when Andrew and Jonathan are arrested, Warren goes it alone and does something really bad at the end of the episode. That action leads to Willow going back to magic in a very Dark way. Spike has also gone to Africa hoping to get the inhibitor chip removed from his brain. The last two episodes look to deal with the ramifications of Willow's change and the possible freeing of Spike from his leash.

Angel has been put on hiatus while The WB runs off the remaining episode of Glory Days. When it returns in mid-April, there should be a straight run of the last six episodes of the season. Needless to say, Angel will be looking for some way to get his son back from Holtz, both of whom are now in a different dimension. Wes does survive but gaining forgiveness from the Angel Investigations crew is not easy. Cordelia is especially upset with Wes and gives him the extreme cold shoulder. Angel does realize that he needs Wes to help figure out a way to get his son back. This leads to a confrontation with Justine, now in charge of Holtz's gang, and the

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possibility of Justine being able to provide info that will help them to follow Holtz. Expect the last several episodes of the season to take place in that dimension, but it will be a much darker trip than the one they took to Pylea last season.

Also in hiatus-land is *Roswell* on UPN, although the replacement sitcoms have tanked so bad that I'd not be surprised to see Buffy repeats show up in that time slot during April. Once Roswell returns in late April, it will likely be for the running of the final episodes of the series. UPN has cut the season order down to 18 episodes. In the final episodes, they will be dealing with the recent events including Jesse learning the truth about them and Liz and Maria returning to Roswell. In the next to last episode, "Four Aliens and a Baby", Tess will return with her and Max's baby and in the final episode, "Graduation", they will have to avoid being captured by the FBI at their graduation ceremony before they can go their separate ways.

In Smallville, out other alien teenager is finding there's more to life than just Kryptonite mutants of the week, although the green rocks still have a major influence on things. In "Stray", a runaway kid is taken in by the Kents. It turns out he has the ability to read minds and his guardians are wanting him to use that ability to obtain LutherCorp access codes. When he reads Martha Kent's mind, he learns the truth about Clark. In "Reaper", we finally meet Whitney's ailing father and also deal with the giving and taking of life. Meanwhile, Lionel Luthor's lackey, Dominic, comes to Smallville to check up on Lex and The Kents. In "Drone", Clark is running for a class officer position and this week's mutant has the ability to control bees. In all of these episodes, expect ongoing secondary plots with Lana and her venture with Luthor. Also, expect some sort of major event in Lex's life that starts to turn him towards the dark side.

Back over on FOX, *Futurama* will have a very fannish episode as its season finale the first weekend in May. Titled

"Where No Fan Has Gone Before", it features the voices of most of the original Star Trek crew and deals with Fry learning that all Star Trek episodes have been banned because the fans become so powerful they threatened world governments. Fry sets out to recover the lost episodes from a forbidden planet. FOX has not ordered additional episodes of the series, but has not officially canceled it. With the rate they have been airing new episodes the last couple of years, FOX actually has enough of a backlog of Futurama episodes that they can make it through next season without ordering any new ones.

To finish up the season on *Dark* Angel, series co-creator James Cameron has come on board to direct the season finale. After finding himself between projects, Cameron decided to direct the episode. Of course he will have to force himself to work with only a \$3 million budget and an eight day shooting schedule. Will this make him "King of the TV World" and save the show from cancellation? Leading up to the finale we will see Joshua befriend a blind girl and but when he protects her from some baddies and takes her into the sewers he is accused of kidnapping her and must evade the police. Joshua also provides the blood for a transfusion that Logan needs. In "She Ain't Heavy" we will meet Sam, a clone of Max, who has been living a normal, domestic life. That gets interrupted when White confronts Sam about her past and Sam then goes off in search of Max. In the two-part season (series?) finale, Max learns that there are runes imbedded in the transgenics that supposedly convey a message from "father". Throughout the final episodes, the rest of the world will learn about the existence of the mutants and their future existence is seriously threatened.

Over on ABC, the fantastic elements in *Alias* are slowly surfacing as we learn more about Rambaldi's prophecies and their relation to Sidney. After learning that her mother may still be alive, Sydney asks Sloane for help in finding her while the CIA has Jack see a psychiatrist to help him deal with the news. Meanwhile, Will and Francie become suspicious of Sydney's activities when they find one of her airline ticket stubs. Expect something big in the season finale and most likely a cliffhanger since the series has been picked up for a second season on ABC already.

Also on ABC in May will be the sixhour *Dinotopia* miniseries, based on the **James Gurney** books. ABC supposedly has liked what they've seen so far and have committed to a weekly *Dinotopia* series next fall.

The story of the miniseries deals with two 18 year-old spoiled brats, Karl (**Tyron Leitso**) and David (**Wentworth Miller**) end up in the strange land of Dinotopia when their father's plane crashes there. They meet up with the rogue Cyrus Cabb (**David Thewliss**), Marion (**Katie Carr**), the daughter of Mayor Waldo (**Jim Carter**) of Waterfall City and Rosemary (**Alice Krieg**), the mayor's estranged wife who is revered as a matriarch in Dinotopia. Karl and David learn that Dinotopia is powered by an incredibly bright Prime Sunstone. When that life-sustaining object begins losing its luster, it appears that the end is near - unless Karl and David can enter and survive the suicidally dangerous World Beneath. The first part of the miniseries will air on Sunday, May 12 at 7 pm ET/PT, 6 pm CT/MT.

Debuting on Wednesday night in late March on FOX was Greg the Bunny. A somewhat surreal show with a blend of live action and puppetry where the puppets are as real as the humans. It stars bunny puppet Greg as a wide-eyed innocent who falls into the world of the children's show "Sweetnuckle Junction" -- populated by neurotic puppets and the humans who both love and abuse them. Humans starring are Seth Green (Buffy's Oz and Austin Power's Scott Evil) as Greg's roommate Jimmy and Eugene Levy as the show's producer Gil Bender. It looks to be offbeat and likely won't go over well with the general viewing audience, so catch it while you can.

In the cable realm, after a long break we finally have new Stargate SG-1 episodes on Showtime and new Farscape on SciFi along with the debut of J. Michael Straczynski's Jeremiah. First up is Farscape, which SciFi will be running the final four episodes of season three beginning April 5th. In "I - Yensch, You -Yensch", Dargo and Rygel meet with Scorpius to arrange a truce so that Crichton can help Scorpius perfect the wormhole technology. Things go awry when they are attacked by thugs looking to burn down the restaurant they are meeting at. Meanwhile, Talyn is getting more erratic and destroys a hospital ship, which forces Craise and Aeryn to shut down Tayln. In the two-part "Into the Lion's Den", the Farscape crew arrives on Scorpius' flagship with the appearance of helping Scorpius but with the actual intention of sabotaging the wormhole research. As can be expected, lots of things get blown up by the end of the twoparter. To say much of anything about the season finale, "Dog With Two Bones", would give away some of the events in the previous episodes. There is a burial in space and a surprising revelation about John and Aeryn. Of course it ends with a cliffhanger, with John Crichton rightly exclaiming "You have got to be kidding me!".

Over on Showtime, new episodes of Stargate SG-1 have resumed and we'll get new episodes pretty much every week until the end of the season in late May. In "The Warrior" A charismatic Jaffa leader tries to rally his people against the Goa'uld, and seeks to forge an alliance with Earth. "Menace" sees SG-1 discover a world controlled by Replicators, and a young girl who may hold the secret to the salvation of the Asgard. In "The Sentinel", SG-1 must turn to a pair of convicted criminals to save a world from annihilation by the Goa'uld. "Meridian" sees Daniel seriously injured as an alien civilization is threatened with extinction when they attempt to build a weapon of mass destruction. The season finale, *"Revelations"* will feature the return of Thor and the Asgard and a confrontation between Osiris and Carter. New cast member, **Corin Nemec** (Jonas Quinn), will appear in the final two episodes and will continue on in the new season as a regular, replacing the departing **Michael Shanks.** The first weekend of June on SciFi will see the debut of *Stargate SG-1's* sixth season (moving from Showtime) and the fourth season of *Farscape*.

Jeremiah debuted on Showtime with lots of publicity and reportedly good ratings. As Straczynski had mentioned, he does make more use of adult language and situations with the freedom that Showtime offers, although this may make it more difficult for the series to find other outlets for airing after its Showtime run. Episodes coming up in April include "The Bag", guest starring Jake Busey, where the son of a medical doctor has set up what may turn out to be a dubious medical practice of his own, traveling with his brother from town to town and exploiting people...and finds that his past catches up with him; "City of Roses" where Jeremiah and Kurdy travel in search of more information on the Big Death and Valhalla Sector, and along the way discover some potentially dark secrets about the fate of Kurdy's parents in the last days of the Big D; and "Firewall" as Jeremiah and Kurdy learn something of vital importance about Valhalla Sector, and Markus has to make a decision that could lead to any number of deaths. As the series was about to debut on Showtime, executive producer J. Michael Straczynski had this to say about the show: "The show is often a bit of a romance, there's lots of humor, lots of action, there's an overarching mystery and an arc to it...it is, at times, oddly a show about small victories and gemstones

about small victories and gemstones found amid gravel. I can't think of any other series quite like it in tone and attitude and look and design. It's allowed me to do some things, and write some stories, I could never get on broadcast TV in a million years, particularly "And the Ground, Sown with Salt." I'm quite proud and pleased with it, and I think it's worth checking out."

Back on SciFi, we've got the final episodes of *Lexx* airing in April. Expect the final episodes to be as offbeat and whacked out as the rest of the season has been. In "*Viva Lexx Vegas*", the Lexx crew visits the King Tut hotel and Xev adopts the wrestling personality of Cleopatra while Stan deals with an ancient Mummy and a mobster clan. "*The Trip*" sees Xev and Stan eat mind-altering berries taking them on a wild ride through The Lexx. A gigantic Lyekka returns in "*Lyekka vs. Japan*" and does battle with Kai while Stan attempts to destroy the approaching alien mothership and save Earth. The

series finale "Yo Way Yo" has Prince visit the Lexx warning of "Earth's date with destiny" and emotions abound as Kai begins to feel again and the Lexx's health is ailing once more. There have been some mentions of a possible spinoff series of *Lexx*, but nothing has been announced as far as I've been able to determine.

Launching on cable in June will be two new series. Showtime will debut Odyssev V in June as a replacement for Stargate SG-1. It stars Peter Weller (Robocop, Buckaroo Banzai) as the leader of a team of astronauts who after discovering the Earth destroyed by some sort of catastrophe, use alien technology to travel back in time five years in the hopes of prevent Earth from being destroyed. The USA Network will debut The Dead Zone in June on Sunday nights. Based on the Stephen King novel, it stars Anthony Michael Hall as Johnny Smith and Nicole deBoer as Sara and is produced by former Trek producer Michael Piller.


On the syndicated front, we've got the last batch of new episodes for the season for most of the syndicated series, many of which will be heading out to pasture this year. Andromeda will wrap up it's second season with episodes wrapping up some of the ongoing storylines to enable the series to take on it's more standalone role next season under new executive producer Robert Engels. "The Fair Unknown" is expected to have the reappearance of The Vedrans, the Centaur like race that founded the Commonwealth. In "The Knight, Death, and The Devil" the Andromeda discovers a prisoner of war camp full of High Guard starships. Christopher Judge (Stargate SG-1's Teal'c) and Michel Hurst (Hercules' Ioalus) will make guest appearances as ship avatars. In "Belly of the Beast", the Andromeda is swallowed by a space monster. "Immaculate Perception" returns to things Nietchzian when Try discovers he may be a father. "The Things We Cannot Change" is the first Andromeda clip show where Dylan is sucked out into space in an EVA suit and Dylan dreams about a future with a wife and kid as well as likely flashes back to events we've seen in the series. In the season finale, "The Tunnel at the End of the Light", they meet up with a totally unknown alien race from another universe. This episode reportedly ties up the refounding of the Commonwealth arc.

Fighting it out with *Andromeda* and *Mutant X* for the top spot in syndication action hours has been the syndicated run *of Stargate SG-1*, nearing the end of season four. The remaining season four episodes include "*Prodigy*", where Samantha Carter deals with a promising Air Force Cadet who is getting bored by her studies and O'Niell and Teal'c deal with a dangerous life form discovered at a research site. "*Entity*" sees an alien

computer life force take over the base's computer system and Carter. "Double Jeopardy" sees the SG-1 team reunited with their robot doubles in a fight with the system Lord Cronus. In the season ending cliffhanger "Exodus", the SG-1 team helps to evacuate the Tok'ra to a new base -- but matters are complicated when a spy reveals their location to Apophis. The team then attempts a daring plan to take out the Goa'uld's powerful fleet..

Earth: Final Conflict is ending it's fifth and final season, leading up to the final "Final Conflict". Rene and Captain Michaels' attempt to destroy the weapons system on the mothership in "Honor and Duty". Rene is put on trial by a vigilante group for opening the original Atavus stasis chamber in "Subversion". Rene must race to get an antidote for Street, who is turning into an Atavus hybrid in "Street Wise". Rene and Captain Michaels run into trouble at a hybrid vaccine facility in "The Journey" and Rene gets a blast from the past while engaged in the "Final Conflict" with the Atavus. Also ending will be **Beastmaster**, and Dar will be doing battle with Balcifer through the final episodes, attempting to complete his quest so that he can save the world from Balcifer's eternal darkness and free his family from the Crystal Ark. Sheena has already ended its season, which consisted of only 13 episodes, and Relic Hunter is slated to end this season as well.

Both *Mutant X* (second) and *The Lost World* (fourth) will continue on to next season. There's not much info on the remaining episodes of this season for either series, however. It is unknown if **Adrian Paul's** *Tracker* will continue, but there's still nine episodes left to air this

season and the show's ratings have been steadily increasing as the season has progressed.

In the Works

In Mid-May, the networks will announce their fall schedules and what new shows they have picked up and which ones they have renewed. Here's some of the shows you may be seeing this fall. Pilot commitments include *Paranormal Girl* (ABC) about a 15 year old girl with psychic abilities who is recruited by the FBI to solve crimes. *Miracles* is about a paranormal investigator for the Vatican who after spending years debunking supposed miracles begins to lose his faith. The Time Tunnel (ABC & FOX) - in development both at ABC and FOX, the former based on the original book by William Fitzgerald Jenkins (aka Murray Leinster), the latter based on the 1960's Irwin Allen TV series. FOX is definitely doing a pilot, ABC may not. Eastwick (FOX) - Based on the John Updike novel and the "Witches of Eastwick" movie. It focuses on the three witches and their teenage sons. Arthur (NBC) A look at a teenaged Arthur and Lancelot before Arthur became king of

England. *Carrie* (NBC) A pilot movie based on the 1976 movie of the same name.

Future Tense (NBC) A drama that explores the legal and moral issues caused by technology.

Lost in Space (NBC) A pilot movie based on the 1960's TV series.

Birds of Prey (The WB) Based on the DC comic book that features Barbara Gordon aka Oracle aka Batgirl (**Dina Meyer**), The Huntress (**Ashley Scott**) and a teenaged Black Canary (**Rachel Skarsten**). This looks to be a good bet to make the fall schedule to be paired up with *Smallville*. *The Lone Ranger* (The WB) A modern update of the classic series.

Lost in OZ (The WB) **Melissa George** as Tina Vittori, a 22 year old Kansas college student who is carried away to OZ by a tornado where she leads a revolt against the Emerald City powers that be.

Beauty and the Beast (UPN) A remake of the 1987 CBS TV series.

Black Star (UPN) Described as *Top Gun* in Space.

The Twilight Zone (UPN) A new take on the classic series from **Pen Densham**, who also updated *The Outer Limits* in the 90's. Shows with commitments beyond a pilot include:

The Kingdom (ABC) a two hour movie plus 13 episodes produced by **Stephen King** based on a 1994 Danish miniseries about a haunted hospital built on an ancient graveyard. There hasn't been much news about it lately, so it may have been delayed.

Firefly (FOX) is from *Buffy* and *Angel* creator **Joss Whedon** and is set aboard the spaceship Serenity, a firefly class ship. It has a thirteen hour commitment from FOX and stars **Nathan Fillion** as Captain Reynolds, **Alan Tudyk** as Wash, the ship's pilot, **Adam Baldwin** as Jayne, a mercenary, **Jewel Staite** as Kaylee, the ship's mechanic, **Summer Glau** as River, a super-genius, **Gina Torres** as Zoe, a mercenary and **Ron Glass** as Book, a priest. It's a good chance FOX may put the series into *The X-Files* former Sunday night time slot.

Mixed Media: Translation from the printed page to the silver screen By Shane Shellenbarger

Recently, I was discussing the film adaptations of "Harry Potter and the Sorcerers Stone" and "Lord of the Rings: Fellowship of the Ring" with some friends and I complained about not being "grabbed" by either film and being unable to put my finger on why that was. One friend opined that after I'd read the books I'd already played the film in my head and that no film production could live up to my imagination. Maybe that is a partial answer, but I've come to the conclusion that it's mostly due to a lack of character development in the films.

Every character has a history, a backstory with which the audience can identify either because something similar happened to them or because they're glad it hasn't happened to them. What child hasn't feared that they would lose their parents or wished that they would gain magical powers or objects? In her books, Joanne Rowling gives flesh to Harry's fears, doubts, and inner dialogues. Rowling makes the reader feel the loss of Harry's parents, the depression of living with the Dorsey's, the claustrophobia of being crammed in a closet under the stairs, and who among us hasn't had to deal with a bully like Dudley? On the screen, Harry comes off as rather bland and less sympathetic, while his friends, Hermione and Ron, are much more interesting. The film is all about appearance and very little about substance. Harry's life in the books is much rougher than in the movie. I'll grant you that films are not books and books are not films. It's a bit like comparing apples to oranges when you compare a 153 minute "Harry Potter and the Sorcerers Stone" film to a book that took Vocal Artist Jim Dale 8 hours to read. "Fellowship of the Ring" is 178 minutes in the theatre and the audio book narrated by Rob Inglis is 20 hours and 30 minutes in length. The film Bilbo Baggins shares much of the same problems with the celluloid Harry Potter. Without the background of "The Hobbit", "Lord of the Rings: Fellowship of the Ring" is a skeleton of a film, pretty pictures lacking the heart of the book.

J.R.R. Tolkien's creation of Middleearth first sprang forth when he wrote "The Hobbit" in 1937 followed nearly two decades later with the trilogy series, "The Lord of the Rings" 1954-1955. Previous film adaptations include the Rankin/Bass animated version of "The Hobbit" in 1978, Ralph Bakshi's 1978 rotoscoped animated feature, "The Lord of the Rings" which included elements from the first two books of the series ("Fellowship of the Ring" and "The Two Towers"), and the 1980 made-

for-tv animated movie, "Return of the King", again by Rankin/Bass. All three are currently available for purchase as a set, but I would strongly advise you to rent these versions before you buy them as I consider them all flawed and inferior to the 2001 Peter Jackson live-action computer animated film. Another item of interest is National Geographic Beyond the Movie: The Lord of the Rings: The Fellowship of the Ring, a behind-the-scenes look at the Jackson film.

While both "Harry Potter and the Sorcerers Stone" and "The Fellowship of the Ring"are still in the theatres at this writing, May 28th, 2002 is the release date for "Harry Potter and the Sorcerers Stone" on video in both VHS and DVD. Certainly, I'll continue to watch both series, I'm even looking forward to them in the hope that they will become more than echoes of the rich characters I've come to love from the books.

Case File I presents the first five episodes: The Four Signatures (He's The Famous Detective), The Crown Of Mazalin (The Evil Genius, Professor Moriarity), A Small Client" (Little Martha's Big Mystery), Mrs. Hudson is Taken Hostage and The Adventure of the Blue Carbuncle" (Blue Ruby).

In The Four Signatures Sherlock Hound meets Dr. Watson for the first time as the ferry they are both passengers on is attacked by a band of Barbary pirates.

Episode 2 is The Crown of Mazalin which introduces Professor Moriarty as Sherlock Hound investigates the theft of the Crown of Mazalin.

The third episode is A Small Client in which Sherlock Hound and Lestrade search for a child's missing father.

In episode four, Mrs. Hudson is Taken Hostage, Moriarity plots to kidnap the beautiful Mrs Hudson and use her to force Sherlock Hound to steal a work of art so Moriarity can have Sherlock locked away as a criminal.

The final episode on this DVD is The Adventure of the Blue Carbuncle in which Moriarty steals a priceless gem only to lose it to a young pickpocket named Polly.

These are delightful! Both kids and adults will enjoy them. The stories are well told and the characters have some depth. Professor Moriarity's various gadgets are wonderful. The seasoned Sherlock Holmes fan should enjoy these and they would serve as a good introduction to Sherlock Holmes for young children. I can't wait to get Case File 2 - Stephanie L Bannon

Ah! My Goddess: The Movie Pioneer, 115 min VHS \$24.98, DVD \$29.98, 13+

Oh My Goddess! was a popular fivepart series in 1993-94 that told the story of how Keiichi Morisato acquired the goddess Belldandy as a girlfriend. Now, three years later we find Belldandy and Keiichi live together at Tariki-honganji temple with Belldandy's older sister Urd (goddess 2nd class) and younger sister, Skuld (goddess2nd class). Keiichi is a student at the Nekomi Institute of Technology and a member of the Motor club where he and Belldandy race on motorcycles together.

Belldandy's former mentor disappeared long ago when he attempted to overthrow the goddesses system. He has been imprisoned every since though Belldandy was unaware of his activities or why he disappeared. Then, one evening, Celestin briefly reappears and, with a kiss, he places a spell on Belldandy which results in virus being spread through the Goddess System's network as well as making Belldandy lose all memory of Keiichi. As the goddesses work to save the Goddess System, Urd, Skuld, and Keiichi work try to help Belldandy regain her memory. The new member of the motor club, Morgan Le Fay, a fairy princess in disguise, pretends to be a student at Nekomi Tech but even as she tries to get closer to Keiichi and Belldandy we see she has ulterior motives.

Will the Goddess System survive? Will Belldandy's memory be recovered? Will the lovers be reunited?

I haven't seen the series that preceded this movie but it really doesn't hinder the viewing of this film. I found the animation beautiful and the story was interesting, it held my interest through to the end. The 13+ rating seems to stem from a certain amount of nudity. There is, of course, the typical Anime violence. I heartily recommend this movie and will look for the series that preceded it. - Stephanie L. Bannon

NieA Under 7 Volume 3: Sayonara Blues Pioneer, 75 mins, \$29.98.13+ NieA Under 7 Volume 4: Under Seven Blues Pioneer, 75 mins, \$29.98.13+

If you have watched the first two disks in this series I'm sure you are as hooked as I've become. I enjoyed them the first time around but they were even more enjoyable on second and third viewing. This is a wonderfully funny series with a few serious undertones thrown in for good measure

Volume 3 contains episodes: 8. Melancholy and Cast Off Summer Bath, 9. Close Encounter and After the Rain Bath, 10. Glow of the Firefly and Nocturne Bath. Mayuko has become very frustrated



with her busy life (work and school) and vents her frustrations on her non-working roommate NieA. The cycle continues since NieA is oblivious to Mayuko's frustration and abuse thus making Mayuko angry all over again until Genzo reminds Mayuko of childhood times when she was told stories and was happy.

Meanwhile,. NieA still has problems with her fellow aliens, and attempts at reconciliation with Mayuko keep meeting with disaster. And NieA is still hearing strange voices apparently from the Mother ship.....then one night as Mayuko works late, NieA disappears.

Volume 4 concludes the 13 episode series with episodes 11 NieA Under Seven Bath (Former part), 12 NieA Under Seven Bath (Later Part) and 13 Time Flows By Enahana Bath. Mayuko worries about NieA who still hasn't come home even as she begins to question whether she is happy with her present life as a cram student. Kotomi tries to decide if she must sell the bathhouse which depresses everyone. Then when Mayuko tries to report NieA missing she is told that Under 7 aliens don't exist.

When Mayuko's mother sends her a packet of photos she realizes that she lived in the bathhouse as a child. As she goes to bathe NieA reappears with no explanation, a typhoon strikes and the Mother Ship disappears as if it had never been there.

There are still the strange interludes with the Indian guy in the turban between the episodes which don't appear to have anything to do with the actual story. Those of us watching were split over their value with slightly over half of us preferring to fast forward past them. While the earlier episodes were close to slapstick the later episodes are more serious in nature with the characters dealing with real problems in a realistic way. Over all this is a series I will watch again with pleasure. -Stephanie L. Bannon

Amazing Nurse Nanako2: Firecrackers Pioneer, 60 min, \$29.98, 16+ Amazing Nurse Nanako3: The Last Spiral Pioneer Entertainment, 60 min, \$29.98, 16+

These two DVDs are genre and animation. Now I've said the best things I can about them. represents an unusual opportunity for those of us who study science fiction, and will-we hope and expect-amount to a landmark in the history of science-fiction criticism. Please do bear in mind that editorial procedures for this issue are the same as for PMLA normally. David Brin writes: "The title of my new novel-the most original thing I've done in years—is Kiln People. Take the notion of golems-temporary clay people (not clones). Using a "home copier," you ditto your memories and a genuine imprint of your soul, then at day's end you download the golem's memories. As a citizen of this future, you've done this a zillion times and take it for granted. You live your life in parallel, sending expensive "study golems" to the library while cheap models clean the house and your real body works out at the gym. Two-thirds of the population is clay, has no rights, and doesn't think it's unfair. Huge fun. Bad puns like "psycho-ceramics." Golem blanks come in ceram-wrap. Get it?;-) *Forgiveness* is a 90-page hardcover graphic novel (or in French, as "Band Dessinee"...a posh word for a high-class comic!) that is set in the Star Trek universe, based on a story I first envisioned in the 1960s! This is my first graphic novel, collaborating with the famed artist Scott Hampton. Another graphic novel will appear in mid-2002, much darker and foreboding. In fact, it is the darkest thing I have ever written, based on a novella of mine that came in second for a Hugo Award, about a parallel world in which the Nazis win World War II. It is called The Life Eaters. Also on the horizon for summer 2002: Contacting Aliens: The Illustrated Guide to David Brin's Uplift Universe. This will be a wonderfully fun tour of the many alien races that people have enjoyed in books like Startide Rising and The Uplift War. I'm currently working on my first "Heinleinian Juvenile" novel...this one about some rather unpleasant aliens who decide that, because humanity did them a favor, they owe us a gift. Where Late The Sweet Birds Sang By Kate Wilhelm Tom Doherty, trade pb, \$13.95

This review may be wasted on many of you who are completely familiar with Kate Wilhelm's many stories; but, if I can tempt a youngster into trying her stuff then my time is worth it. Ms Wilhelm has been writing at a steady pace since at least the 1950's, both mysteries and SF, is married to Damon Knight and helped start the Clarion workshops. Her work has been a challenge to both publishers and booksellers who try to pigeonhole her. This particular book is my personal favorite and is a timely subject.

Where Late... is a story set near the end of the 20th century when it becomes evident to everyone that pollution levels have reached an irreversible point; plants and animals are dying and world-wide panic sets in. One far-sighted family with great resources decides to do what they can to preserve their own family in a remote valley (somewhere near Virginia, I think). David, a young geneticist, comes home to the family farm to find his elders deep into clone research in an attempt to renew the dwindling animal population. Many species had become sterile. While the outside world crumbles around them with food riots, invasions and finally nuclear weapons, they discover what the governments are hiding: humans are also becoming sterile. David's uncles decide they must take the next step and try to clone humans, too. The plan is to produce sufficient generations of clones to bypass whatever is causing the sterility and then be able to reproduce normally.

The clones discover what multiplebirth children have always known: a strong empathic, almost telepathic link to their sisters and brothers. The "elders" are dwindling and the younger, stronger clones are now managing the cloning processes when David begins to suspect their research is moving in a different direction. When he discovers their true plan, he is horrified and tries to destroy the laboratory. He is exiled from the colony. The clones have decided they are the next evolutionary step and do not wish to return to the "human" condition. They plan to maintain the entire population by cloning only. As the generations progress, a completely different society emerges, isolated in their valley.

The conflict in the story comes when the new Elders realize their supplies have reached a critically low level and they must explore the cities and try to find replacements; most critical are certain supplies necessary to maintain the cloning processes. They send out a team to Washington, D.C. The five men and one woman come from separate clone groups and are away from their brothers and sisters for the first time in their lives. The separation is agony for them, they nearly die before they can return. And each of them is permanently scarred from the experience of being an individual for the first time. Molly finds she cannot go back to her previous existence, she actually wants to be alone some of the time and discovers her link to her sisters is weakening. Ben also discovers his connection to his brothers isn't as strong and when Molly is exiled, he finds he'd rather spend time with her alone than with his brothers. When Molly discovers she's pregnant, she hides from the colony; but when the baby is five, they are discovered. Since fertile females are still rare and necessary to the breeding program, she is drugged and conditioned and placed with other breeders. Mark, her son, is raised in the colony. Mark is a single individual in a colony of clones; an alien to them. However, as the repercussions of that first survey team continue to baffle the scientists; they begin to consider how Mark's uniqueness may help them overcome their problems. Mark's uniqueness, his individuality, may give them answers they don't anticipate.

Ms. Wilhelm's writing is clear, concise and evocative. I have seldom read stories that ring so clear in my head. - **Catherine Book**

The Fiery Cross by Diana Gabaldon Delecorte Press, 979 pages, \$27.99

The Fiery Cross is the fifth volume [not counting the Outlandish Companion] of the Outlander series of time-travel historical novels.

Jamie Fraser, and his wife, Claire formerly of the 20th century, have settled in the Carolinas on a land grant from the British Governor. Hence, they owe him duty, when the militia is called up to suppress the Regulators rebellion. They have been joined by Jamie and Claire's daughter, Brianna and her husband Roger McKenzie. Roger is hanged as a regulator after being framed by the jealous husband of a women he saved in a previous volume {no good deed goes unpunished}. Roger's nemesis is the son of Jamie's nemesis from the first volume. Roger is saved by a bad knot, and Claire's surgery

As The book progresses toward the American Revolution, Stephen Bonnet, the Irish Pirate who raped Brianna in the previous volume and left her with a child, returns and attempts to kidnap Brianna and her child. He wants to force her great aunt Jocasta to give him hidden Jacobite gold. No reader has ever accused Ms. Gabaldon of having only one simple plot line. Jamie and Claire, Brianna and Roger must all juggle beliefs, loyalties, and some

knowledge of history that hasn't happened, as the years just before the revolution pass.

The first quarter of the book contains enough exposition to slow it down but does not lose the readers interest. It sets up the roller coaster ride that the rest of the book travels at pace. You'll want every detail. This reviewer feels that The Fiery Cross is the best since the first volume, and would call it a must for Gabaldon fans. Even if it is your first Gabaldon adventure, it will send you back for the rest. At a recent book signing, the author stated there are two more to go. I'm looking forward to them. - .**Pam Allan**

The Skies Of Pern by Anne McCaffrey Ballantine, 384 pages, \$25.00

The Skies Of Pern is the 13th book of Ms. McCaffrey's Pern series.

Technology has begun a return to Pern. Aivas, the computer brought by Pern's colonists [Prior to meeting threadfall] has been rediscovered. The dragons and their riders have blown the errant spore carrier out of orbit. This will be the last threadfall. New medical care and tools are making their way into society. A group of Pern residents, called Abominators, want everything back the way it was, and all traces of Aivas' knowledge destroyed. They are attacking anyplace the knowledge is used. The Dragon riders will be looking for work after this threadfall. Pern is changing.

The remaining satellite, the remains of the Yokohama, tracks an incoming comet that impacts Pern, and the dragon riders evacuate the holds, saving the residents. Can they save Pern, themselves and cope with both the changes, attacks, and everything else coming at them at once?. Will the dragons themselves hold the Key?

This is the best Pern novel in years and will be on the must get list of all McCaffrey fans. Good plot and subplots, characters, and fast movement in the Pernian Ambiance. A winner. - **Pam Allan**



Of course there is a minor problem of Ogres, Bugbears, and Hobgoblins to fill out the ranks of Kobalds and other assorted nasties. Why are all these bad guys, who normally can't stand each other, working together? Did we forget to mention the evil priest/mages of Chaos.

They do make life interesting. and don't forget the undead. Why waste a soldier just because he's dead. Thankfully, the good guys have a priest mage, elf warrior mages, a dwarf, and ,Oh yes, a light-fingered lock picker and a 10 year old orphan taken from the original set of bandits.

The Story line is predictable, but the characters better drawn than usual. Some of the detail is quite engaging. It makes a very pleasant read. - Pam Allan

Chosen of the Gods Kingpriest Trilogy, Volume One by Chris Pierson Wizards of the Coast, 344 pages, \$6.99

Once again the forces of darkness are on the rise. Using lies and deception They seek to corrupt the ruler of mighty Istar. But Istar's ruler is the Kingpriest, chosen of the gods. Can he be corrupted? and if he can what hope is there for lesser men?

Set in the fantasy world of Krynn this is a tale of intrigue, suspense and war. With the old Kingpriest dying and the border lands wracked by plague and revolt, many act to seek justice but a few act to gain power. How far are those few willing to go? And how many of them follow the dark path? But all is not lost for a prophetic dream has lead the high priestess of Paladine to the Lightbringer, the true chosen of the gods.

Chris Pierson is a talented writer who has written a very good story. Chosen of the Gods quickly grabbed my attention and held it for the whole book. For people looking for a well paced action/ suspense novel this is a very good choice. - William B. Whitmore

The Lion Clan War Seventh Scroll by Stephen D. Sullivan Wizards of the Coast, 282 pages., \$6.99

Can the clans of Rokugan put aside their blood feuds and political intrigue long enough to defeat the demon Fu Leng? Mr. Sullivan's talent is obvious. From the detailed mythology to the intense interpersonal relationships between the characters this author shows great talent. He has written a good sword and sorcery hack and slash with believable battle scenes. His story is fast paced and tightly knit and shows great skill as a writer.

Unfortunately This is the seventh and final novel in a series and it is definitely not a stand alone. Because I have not read the other novels in the series I frequently found myself lost. His detailed mythology assumes that you know what happened in prior books to explain why demons are loose in the world. The intricate web of lies, deceit, and blood feud between the characters is complex and obviously built with great care but without having read the prior books I was unable to figure out why the conflict existed.

While I am sure that people who have read the series will eagerly buy this concluding story I would strongly recommend that anyone thinking of buying this novel first read the others in the series. - William B. Whitmore

The Big Engine omnibus of the "Hooded Swan" series, Swan Songs, should also be out real soon now, as should the Cosmos edition of Salome and Other Decadent Fantasies.
