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

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SF Tube Talk **TV News & Previews** By Lee Whiteside

It's the time of the year for holiday specials and lots and lots of repeats. However, there are a few new things airing if you look for them and lots of new episodes in January on cable.

Enterprise will have one lone new episode following November sweeps in early December with "Precious Cargo" where Trip Tucker boards an alien cargo vessel to help repair a stasis pod holding a beautiful woman in suspended animation. When the woman accidentally awakes, she reveals she's not a passenger, but a prisoner. No, her name is not River. Coming up after the holiday repeat season in mid-January will be "Catwalk:" where the entire crew takes shelter for several days inside the maintenance shafts inside the warp nacelles when a lethal neutronic storm approaches faster than Enterprise can escape. They also provide refuge to a group of aliens who aren't entirely upfront about themselves. In "Dawn", Trip crash-lands on a moon in Arkonian territory. Archer must work together with the Arkonians, a militant race not on good terms with the Vulcans, to rescue Trip.

Elsewhere on UPN in the Buffyverse, look for lots of repeats through December and January. Rumors are the Big Bad that has been playing with Spike is "The First", and that we will be seeing a return of the Harbingers seen in the Christmas episode "Amends" and we may have another Holiday themed episode in December. Following that, other rumors are that Warren appears to Andrew, sort of like Obi-Wan's ghost to Luke, and that Giles will return to Sunnydale either with or at the same time as a group of Slayers in training who have come to Buffy for help following a major attack on the Watcher's Council. As for the other two new shows on UPN, Haunted and Twilight Zone, the former has been pulled from the schedule in mid-November and it is unknown if it will return to the schedule and the latter has been picked up for the full season of 22 episodes but there is little advance info on what we'll see on the series. Expect more stories with twisty endings and lots of notable (and some not so notable) guest stars in the episodes.

Moving over to The WB's corner of the Buffyverse, things look to get much darker on Angel in a big way. According to an interview with Angel producer Jeffrey Bell, when Angel and company realize the nature of the Big Bad they revert Angel to his Angelus persona, keeping him caged until needed. According to Bell, the Big Bad "is not someone we've met before. He's not human; he's

the toughest thing Angel has ever faced. He's smart, he's strong, he's cruel." But when Angelus escapes from his cage, Faith the Vampire Slayer is brought it to try to capture him. Look for this to start happening when new episodes return sometime in January.

Smallville has been doing gangbusters in the ratings for the WB, apparently gaining new viewers over the summer with the double repeats each week. There's even been some episodes without Freak of the Week Kryptonite villains. Upcoming episodes include "Visage" which sees the return of Lana's former boyfriend, Whitney as well as a return appearance by the shape-shifting Tina Greer from the first season's "X-Ray" episode. The other likely new episode before sweeps is "Suspect" where Pete gets injured (again) when his car explodes, Johnathan Kent goes on a drinking binge prompted by Lionel Luther and ends up shooting Lex's dad.

In the other comics adaptation on The WB, Birds of Prey debuted to strong ratings but has dropped off significantly for subsequent episodes. Unless that trend ends, the show may have trouble making it the full season. They are beginning to bring in more comics-related elements such as the real Black Canary showing up and coming up in December will see Lady Shiva making a visit to New Gotham. Shiva is one tough assassin and she's come to take on Batgirl, not knowing her current condition. Other upcoming episodes with only title information known are "Nature of the Beast" and "Gladiatrix".

Over on FOX, the Friday night duo of Firefly and John Doe have not been

tearing up the ratings so far and if not for FOX's willingness to stick with both shows and give them a chance to find an audience, they likely would have both been gone by now. John Doe has been doing the best of the two, but has leveled off at the bottom of what is probably acceptable to FOX. Likely the only reason Firefly has not been pulled (assuming it hasn't had that happen after press time) is Joss Whedon's name on it and his former partner Gail Berman in charge of FOX programming. While not yet having

Currently filming is the next Looney Tunes movie mixing live action with Bugs Bunny, Daffy Duck and the rest of the Warner Bros. classic cartoon crew. Looney Tunes: Back in Action will be released in November of 2003 and will star Brendan Fraser, Joan Cusack, Timothy Dalton, Jenna Elfman and Heather Locklear and is being directed by Joe Dante. Of special interest to genre fans is a segment where they visit Area 52 and moviegoers will get a tribute to 50's movie monsters including The Man from Planet X, Robot Monster, Metalunan's from The Island Earth and Robby the Robot. Dante explains that Area 52 is a place so secret that they invented Area 51 to cover it up. How the Looney Tunes characters fit into this was not revealed. To build anticipation for the new movie, Warner Bros. is also creating some new Looney Tune shorts to screen in front of Warner Bros. movies including a Duck Dodgers short called Attack of the Drones which will spoof recent science fiction films such as Star Wars, The Matrix and Men in Black. According to producer Larry Doyle, "Daffy creates an army of robots based on himself to fight something, but the short isn't really about the fight, which ends very quickly, it's about letting the robots loose after they've been victorious."

In the latest news in the ongoing Warner Bros. Superhero movies, an early draft of J.J. Abram's Superman script was leaked and was met with a very negative reaction after being reviewed on the Ain't It Cool News web site. Director Brett Ratner has since indicated that the script has gone through many changes since that early draft and many of the things that fans objected to are no longer part of the movie. The movie is being envisioned as a trilogy and Ratner intends to do more than just remake the Richard Donner films and that "it's not going to be camp, it's going to be a bit more psychological." He also intends to have an unknown in the title role and surround him with good actors. Ratner has confirmed that Anthony Hopkins, who he worked with for *Red Dragon*, will take on the role of Superman's father, Jor-E1.

Wrapping up filming after having been delayed by the floods in Prague is The League of Extraordinary Gentlemen. It is based on the graphic novel by Alan Moore which brought together many 19th Century fictional characters. Starring is Sean Connery as Allan Quartermain, Peta Wilson as Mina Harker, Tony Curran as The Invisible Man, Stuart Townsend as Dorian Gray, Shane West

as Thomas Sawyer, Naseeruddin Shah as Captain Nemo and Jason Flemyng as Dr. Henry Jekyll. The movie will not follow the plot of the graphic novel, though, with the group being brought together to fight "The Fathom" whose plans for world domination is to turn the world's nations against each other in something called a "World War".

Previews of December & January Movies

Solaris - Upon arrival at the space station orbiting an ocean world called Solaris, a psychologist discovers that the commander of an expedition to the planet has died mysteriously. Other strange events soon start happening as well, such as the appearance of old acquaintances of the crew, including some, like the psychiatrist's wife, who are dead This is based on the classic Russian science fiction film of the same name and stars George Clooney. From the trailers you'd hardly know it was a science fiction movie.

Treasure Planet - A Space Age animated update of Robert Louis Stevenson's Treasure Island. Looks like they are trying some of the same stuff that FOX tried with *Titan A.E.* It's got the Disney name on it, so it will likely do better. Wes Craven Presents: They - After witnessing a horrible incident, a graduate student (Laura Regan) struggles to find the link between her childhood fear of the dark and the night terrors she now suffers, and must confront what may or may not be real.

Star Trek: Nemesis - Starting out with the wedding of Riker and Troi, the tenth Trek feature film will feature a big conflict with Romulans bent on destroying Earth. The leader of them is Shinzon (Tom Hardy), a clone of Picard that rose to power following the end of plans to use him to replace Picard. Look for lots of action, some romance and possibly the destruction (or very heavy damage to) of the latest version of the Enterprise. Paramount has been billing the film as "A Generation's Final Journey Begins". The key word in that tag line is "Begins" since if the movie does decent, Paramount

of Gollum. New cast for this movie include Brad Dourif (Wormtounge), Bernard Hill (Theodon), Miranda Otto (Eowyn), Karl Urban (Eomer) and David Wenham (Faramir). Bringing Fanghorn to life with his voice will be John Rhys-Davies. Most of the actors have made return trips to New Zealand for additional filming made possible by the success of the first movie. Pinnochio - Written by, directed by, and starring Roberto Benigni, this Italian produced film is the classic story of a wooden puppet come to life and his journey to become a 'real boy'. Despite guidance from the beautiful Blue Fairy (Nicoletta Braschi) and the love of his father, Gepetto (Carlo Guiffre), Pinnochio's curious spirit leads him into one wild adventure after another distracting him from his goal, and distancing him from his loved ones. Left Behind II: Tribulation Force -Based on the New York Times bestselling series of Christian novels written by Tim LaHaye and Jerry B. Jenkins, this action-packed sequel to the enormously popular Left Behind features many of the same cast members, including Kirk Cameron as journalist Buck Williams, and former Marlboro Man Brad Johnson as pilot Rayford Steele. Chaos and anarchy thrive as greifstricken survivors continue to search for

the millions of people who vanished after the rapture. The rebel group "Tribulation Force" must spread the word that the United Nations President is in fact the Antichrist responsible for the world's current state of demise. Cowboy Bebop: The Movie - Set on Mars in the year 2071, it is based on the animated television series by Japanese director Shinichiro Watanabe. It is scheduled to open wide in January, but that may still change. Darkness Falls - Kyle Walsh (Chaney Kley) returns home to confront his troubled past and save his childhood sweetheart Caitlin (Emma Caulfield) and her younger brother Michael (Lee **Cormie**) from an unrelenting evil that has plagued the town of Darkness Falls for over one hundred and fifty years. The Sin Eater - A conflicted, rebellious priest travels to Rome to investigate the strange death of his mentor. The young priest, a troubled artist with whom he shares a turbulent past, and his closest friend and colleague discover the mysterious death may be the work of the Sin Eater, an ancient figure who plays God on earth by absolving the unforgivable of their sins outside the Church, allowing great evil to go unpunished. Stars Heath Ledger, Mark Addy, Peter Weller and Shannyn Sossamon.

committed either way on additional episodes for either show at press time, FOX has ordered three more scripts from each series so that if they do pick either of them up, they have scripts ready to go. Coming up in December will likely be three episodes, including FOX finally airing the original two hour pilot on December 20th. First up should be "War Stories" followed by "Heart of Gold", neither of which has had much info leak about them. The two hour pilot, "Serenity", will provide answers to some of the questions viewers have been asking since the show started. It covers how Book, Simon and River came to be on Serenity, explaining references to the "girl in the box" made in some episodes and some ads for the show. In the episode, Book and Simon join up with the Serenity crew as well as an undercover alliance agent who tries to bring Simon in and his mysterious cargo (his sister). Meanwhile, Captain Mal and crew have salvaged some cargo from a derelict ship and are making arrangements to sell it off. They have to deal with the alliance agent, reavers and a double-crossing customer before its all over.

Finally debuting on ABC on Thanksgiving is the weekly series *Dinotopia*. Seeing as ABC has completely avoided November sweeps and has scheduled it when everyone else is in repeats, it doesn't appear they have a lot of confidence in it.

Following the end of Monday night football, ABC will debut a full night of new shows with some genre connections on Monday nights in late January. Kicking off the night will be Veritas, a new Indiana Jones style series from the creators of Lara Croft: Tomb Raider. From the ABC press release: "Ancient relics. Hidden tombs. Religious icons. Boring stuff for 17-year-old rebel Nikko Zond. But when he's kicked out of yet another boarding school and delivered to his archeologist father, Nikko (Ryan **Merriman**) starts to learn the truth about Solomon Zond's (Alex Carter) life work. Behind the academic cover, Zond's "company" is investigating the mysteries of the ancient world, and protecting its secrets at all costs. Together, father and son are swept up in a race to uncover this past before a mysterious brotherhood can stop them. The Veritas team includes: The highly intelligent and mysterious Vincent Siminou (Arnold Voslo - "The Mummy"), Solomon's closest confidant and protector; Calvin Banks (Eric Balfour), a high strung but brilliant bythe-books archaeologist; and Maggie (Cynthia Martells), a cool and sophisticated computer scientist. And charged

with the difficult task of trying to keep Nikko out of trouble is Juliet Droil (**Cobie Smulders**), a beautiful and brilliant former student of his father's who will be Nikko's tutor and friend. "

Following *Veritas* will be the new *Dragnet*, produced by *Law and Order's* **Dick Wolf. Ed O'Neill** will be Joe Friday and **Ethan Embry** will be his partner, Frank Smith. The show will keep some familiar elements from the original series, including the music, and will make use of Joe Friday's voice overs to give the viewers his thoughts while he is investigating or questioning a suspect.

Rounding out the night will be "Miracles", where Skeet Ulrich (Scream, As Good As It Gets) stars as Paul Callan, a seminarian assigned to investigate modern-day "miracles." Callan is good at his job of finding a scientific basis for purported acts of God, but everything changes when he witnesses something that can't be explained away. Teaming up with a mysterious organization that leads their own investigations into the paranormal, Paul will continue his quest amid a dizzying and often frightening realm of possibilities. Often inspirational, sometimes terrifying and always breathtaking, Miracles journeys into a new dimension of drama, opening doors and seeking answers as it goes. "Also starring is Hector Elizondo

as Father Bellamy, **Angus MacFadyen** as Father Alva Keel and **Marisa Ramirez** as a secretary for Sodalitas Quaerito, a mysterious group dedicated to the study of the paranormal. The series show runner is **David Greenwalt**, who left "*Angel*" to do this show. *Dragnet* and *Miracles* will debut on January 20th and *Veritas* debuts on January 27th.

Over in syndication, as expected, Andromeda has done away with most of the continuing storylines and put the Commonwealth on the back burner so Dylan Hunt and company can galavant around the universe helping people. In spite of this change in direction, they have had some decent episodes and it seems that the writers such as Zack Stentz and Ashley Edward Miller have worked to keep the episodes they've been writing more in line with what the show has been about. The Andromeda will be adding some crew to the ship at some point in the season and it looks like the season will end with a big confrontation with an as yet unknown foe. Most of the syndicated shows will continue with repeats until late January, so catch repeats of any shows you missed.

Over on Cable, there are new shows to watch, especially in January when *The Dead Zone* returns to USA Network, *Stargate SG-1* and *Farscape* resume new episodes on SciFi with the debut of the

Tremors series based on the movies. But first is the big event on the SciFi Channel the first two weeks of December when SciFi is literally taken over by "Steven Spielberg Presents Taken". Airing a two hour movie each weeknight from Dec 2nd through Dec 13th, the 20 hours of the Taken miniseries will end up filling up 118 hours of time on the channel over those two weeks with extra repeats include two ten hour marathons on Saturday and Sunday December 14th and 15th.

The miniseries tells the story of several generations of three families involved with alien abductions in the second half of the twentieth century. When a alien ship crashes near Roswell, leaving four dead aliens and one live one on the loose, the destiny of the three families begins to take shape. Eric Close (Dark Skies, Now and Again) is John, the surviving alien who disguises himself as human and when he encounters lonely housewife Sally Clarke (Catherine **Dent**), he seduces her and fathers a half alien/half-human son, Jacob Clarke. Over the course of the miniseries, Sally tries to reunite herself with John. Her son, Jacob Clarke (Chad Donella), and his daughter, Lisa (Emily Bergl) end up being abducted multiple times for study by the aliens. Also encountering aliens during World War II is fighter pilot Russell Keys (Steve Barton), who's plane is abducted and when he returns home, both he and his son, Jesse Keys are also abduction targets. Eventually, Jesse's son Charlie (Adam Kaufman) and Jacob's daughter Lisa are united and paired off while abducted resulting in Allie Keys (Dakota Fanning), who is the focus of the miniseries, narrating it and being an alien/human hybrid that may hold the key to changing the world. The other family is headed up by Captain Owen Crawford (Joe Gretsch) of the Army's intelligence department, who uses the Roswell crash investigation as a means to further his career and his two sons take very different paths in the story. Eric (Andy Powers) tries to further his fathers investigations into the alien threat while Sam (Ryan Merriman) ends up befriending the aliens. Eric's daughter, Mary (Heather Donahue) continues the work of her father and grandfather. The other major character is Chet Wakeman, played by Matt Frewer, who is the head of a cancer research institute that is really a front for him being the head of a government agency investigating the alien abductions.

The miniseries is definitely one of the biggest ever done for television, not just for cable. SciFi has a lot riding on it and it is expecting it to draw big numbers. It is a big risk assuming people will want to commit to that much of a TV viewing commitment between the two major holidays. It is likely that with all the

additional airings, the series will build in the ratings and end up being the success they hope it will be. Personally, I think it will be worth watching, although it might be best to tape it and watch it over a month or so instead of all of it in two weeks. Just watching it on tape would save you five hours by scanning through all the commercials and promos that will air during it.

Following the Taken deluge, SciFi's regular programming will return for new

episodes in January. Farscape will be continuing with the remainder of it's fourth and final season (unless someone else picks it up). Producer David Kemper has promised that the remaining episodes are some of the best they've ever done and that what can save the show is for viewers to watch it when it returns and give it respectable enough ratings that another network will want to pick it up. What may help is that when Farscape returns on January 10th, it will be in the 8 PM ET/PT time slot and not the 10 PM ET/PT time slot that saw it's ratings decline even with Stargate SG-1 as its lead-in. Having been absent from SciFi's schedule since August, Farscape will return to the schedule with an 11 episode marathon of the first half of season four (followed by a minimarathon of X-Files Christmas episodes) on Christmas Eve, Dec 24th, starting at 8 am ET/PT. SciFi will also air the last three of these episodes on Jan 3rd starting at 6 PM ET/PT. As usual, not much actual information has been leaked about the episodes, but from the ending of the last new episode, Unrealized Reality, it looks like Crichton has finally made it back to Earth and more than likely, Moya will follow.

When SciFi picked up Stargate SG-1 for it's sixth season, it had been announced that it would be the final season of the series. It has been doing very well in the ratings (including multiple repeats) and has become SciFi's highest rated series, so SciFi and MGM started talks to keep the series going. The main sticking point however, was Richard Dean Anderson's desire to not spend another year in Vancouver and be able to spend as much time with his 4 year old daughter as he could. MGM and SciFi were able to come to terms with Anderson and have announced that there will be a seventh

season of the series after all. As an added extra bonus for long time Stargate SG-1 fans, they also announced that Michael Shanks will return to the series as a regular. How they will bring back Daniel Jackson from his higher plane of existence was not revealed, however.

As with Farscape, Stargate SG-1 will resume new episodes of its sixth season on January 10th following a three episode

mini-marathon on January 3rd of the last three new episodes aired. As we saw at the end of Prometheus, the Asgard Thor has shown up to take O'Neill and crew to the Asgard home world to help save the Asgard home world from Replicators in "Unnatural Selection". Following will be "Metamorphosis" where SG-1 joins a Russian team in attempting to save a planet's inhabitants from strange Goa'uld experimentation. In "Smoke and Mirrors", a sniper assassinates Senator Kinsey, and SG-1 is stunned when a video camera captures Colonel O'Neill's face as the perpetrator. "Sight Unseen" looks to be more of a humorous episode when a civilian claims that he can see aliens, the team must investigate strange new visitors to Earth.

Rounding out Friday nights on SciFi in the 10 PM ET/PT time slot vacated by *Farscape* will be the new series, *Tremors*, based on the movie trilogy that has done well in multiple repeat runs on SciFi and the USA Network. Michael Gross stars as survivalist Burt Gummer, a role he made famous in the three Tremors films. The cast also includes Victor Browne, Gladise Jimenez, Lela Lee, Marcia Strassman and Dean Norris. The series' executive producer are David Israel, Nancy Roberts, Brent Maddock

SciFi will debut two new movies in January. The first, *Dragon Fighters*, stars **Dean Cain** where "It's a real reign of fire as helicopter gun ships fight a genetically modified dragon in the most startlingly real depiction of these mythic beasts ever put on film" (SciFi's description, not mine). It debuts on Saturday, January 4th. Next is *Control Factor*, debuting Jan 18th, stars **Adam Baldwin** (*Firefly, The X-Files*), **Elizabeth Berkley** (*Showgirls*) and **Tony Todd** (*Candyman*) in a paranoiac thriller of government mindcontrol and the ordinary citizens out to stop it. Possibly starting in January (although no announcement on when has been made) is the second season of *Justice League* on the Cartoon Network. Guest characters look to be Aquaman, Lois Lane, the Green Lantern Corps, the New Gods and Dr. Fate with villains including Lex Luthor, The Joker, Amazo, Despero, Braniac, Darkseid, Eclipso and Ichthultu.

Also in the works for later in 2003 on both the Cartoon Network and Kids WB! is a new animated Teen Titans series. It will feature Robin, Cyborg, Beast Boy, Starfire and Raven in all-new adventures. The Cartoon Network press release describes the show as "Teen Titans, set in a future of intergalactic strife and interplanetary battles, features five teen superheroes each with special powers, led by the Boy Wonder Robin. This group unites to form a defensive force to protect the Earth from a new generation of villains. An eclectic group, their powers complement each other so that when they band together, they become a superb fighting force. Their personalities, on the other hand, often clash. Discovering how to control their powers, these Teen Titans must learn to work and grow as a team while dealing with the trials and tribulations of being teenagers." The series was developed for Warner Bros. by none other than Peter David, who currently writes the Young Justice comic for DC, which will likely serve as a reference for the tone of the Teen Titans series. David also

Star Wars II: Attack of the Clones 20th Century Fox, 142 min, PG VHS \$24.98, DVD \$29.98

By now we are all familiar with the story of Attack of the Clones. Ten years after *Episode I*, Padmé Amidala (Natalie Portman), is now a senator and actively resisting the creation of a Republic Army. Anakin Skywalker (Hayden Christensen) is resentful of his stern Jedi mentor, Obi-Wan Kenobi (Ewan McGregor), tormented by the loss of his mother and we see the beginnings of his emerging "dark side" while he protects his new love, Amidala, from would-be assassins.

Star Wars: Episode II, Attack of the Clones is a truly superior DVD, the picture and sound are spectacular, probably because the film was shot entirely in digital. Extras on disc one are a commentary track compiled from various people, including George Lucas, producer Rick McCallum, editor Ben Burtt, and ILM animation director Rob Coleman. Disc two has eight deleted scenes with optional introductions. The most interesting is a scene of Padmé addressing the Senate to oppose the creation of a Republic army. There are three great documentaries: From Puppets to Pixels, State of the Art: The Previsualization of Episode II and Films Are Not Released, They Escape as well as a bunch of other stuff.

Simmons, and CGI Spider-Man, an gag/outtake reel,"Spider-Man: The Mythology of the 21st Century" historical documentary and much more.

This is the perfect story for computeranimation and the story is actually richer than most animated films and the humor makes *Shrek* a sure fire winner


The DVD extras include the Behind-

San Diego Comic-Con International 2002: I Wish I Were Cloned Part 2

Okay, you've got that Comic-Con International in San Diego is enormous! The 2002 event had over 63,000 attendees, exhibitors, and professionals. The committee put together about 600 hours of panels films, Japanimation, gaming, and special events. Some of those events included special appearances by Hollywood stars Chase Masterson, Elvira, Ron Perlman, Emma, Asia, Gene Simmons, Hilary Swank, The Geeks from Comedy Central's Beat the Geeks game show, Lucy Liu, Ray Park, Jason Lee, Matthew Fox, Mark Hamill, and Arnold Schwarzenegger. Directors, writers, producers, and behind-the-scenes specialists were also in attendance and abundant: Stan Lee, Ron Shusett, Mike Mignola, Guerillmo del Toro, Richard Taylor, J.J. Abrams, Stan Winston, Steve Oedekerk, Bob Gale, Steve Sansweet, Al Gough, Miles Millar, Craig McCracken, Richard Taylor, Chris Columbus, Joss Whedon, J. Michael Straczynski, Mark Steven Johnson, and Bryan Singer.

Now what you need to understand is the diversity and eclectic nature of the opportunities for enlightenment and entertainment at this convention. Literature, film, television, animation, Manga, acting, writing, art, ethics, philosophy, psychology, politics, games, and (of course) comic books are all represented. 5:30 p.m. The Rise, fall, and Rise of *Star Trek*

Free Enterprise's Mark A. Altman and Robert Meyer Burnett, *FilmThreat.com*'s Chris Gore, and *Talk Trek*'s Daren Dochterman.

Slamming *Star Trek* has become an annual event for this group of fansturned-pros. After all, you always hurt the one you love and these people have a fierce love of *Star Trek* and they understand its strengths and weaknesses.

Chris Gore started the ball rolling by stating the obvious: *Enterprise* is boring and the technology doesn't make sense in light of The Cage, Where No Man Has Gone Before, and the classic Trek episodes that followed. Jeff Bonz followed up with this question: What other show begins a scene while the crew is having dinner and goes to commercial break before the Universe is threatened with destruction? Robert Burnett flatly stated that the show needed to carry forward the interest of the viewers by developing more serialized stories like The Andorian Incident and Shadows of *P'Jem* to which Mark Altman replied that Paramount was afraid of serialized

episodes because syndicators fear that the average viewer won't know what's going on if they haven't viewed all of the episodes. Altman stated some stories with a central issue like *Dear Doctor* work well while others like *Detained* don't work very well at all. The panel agreed that the show needs more drama and less of the soap opera.

Just then, **Chris Gore** dons a pair of safety goggles, brings out a hammer and a toy model of the Enterprise-D, which he proceeds to smash. "**Rick Berman**, thanks for destroying my childhood," **Gore** cries out as he pummels the plastic starship into pieces. The audience applauds.

Since this is a multi-media event, we're treated to **Daren Dochterman** doing the "E Plebb Neesta "(We The People) speech from the classic *Trek* episode *The Omega Glory* which he had performed on a public access cable show. Following that, **Dochferman** faithfully recreates Kirks musings about Gorns and gunpowder from the episode, *Arena*. **Dochferman** also treated the audience to a dead-on impersonation of the Great Bird of the Galaxy, **Gene Roddenberry**.

Each of the panelists took their turn at answering the question, "What would get you excited about *Enterprise*?" Burnett said, "If Paramount hired a great writing staff." Gore said, "If it (Star Trek) went away for twenty years." Daren Dochferman said, "They need to hire a writing staff that doesn't HATE the original series. They need to actually show the origins of the classic series." Altman said, "By trying to make it a family show they are playing it too safe. Also, the Temporal Cold War storyline will only work if at the end of the series the show is explained as an alternate timeline. And, why doesn't Archer ever mention the Cold War to his superiors?" Burnett stated that Enterprise should have been The Right Stuff of Star Trek. As a group they agreed that Bakula's Archer is too" touchy-feely" and that he doesn't give orders, but instead he makes suggestions, where as in the classic series Kirk states, "When this becomes a Democracy, I'll let you know."

Burnett was also bothered by the sequence of clips used in the opening montage: they're not in chronological order. The group also mused about the fans tendency to give the New Trek series the benefit of the doubt for a couple of seasons when the classic series got things right the first year. Burnett felt that it should have taken the entire first season to get the Klingon back to Kronos. **Jeff Bonz** complained that Archer is constantly in real-time conversation with Admiral Forrest and the panelists all wanted to know why the Vulcans are portrayed as either vapid or villainous.

The capper of the panel came when volunteers were taken from the audience to portray various cast members from the upcoming *Star Trek: Nemesis*, tenth in the series of movies. We can only hope that the movie is every bit as funny as played by these people. It could happen, since they were reading from a script downloaded from the Internet.

Nancy Holder (writer, Buffy the Vampire Slayer: *The Journals of Rupert Giles*), Jeff Mariotte (writer, Angel: *Endangered Species*), Peter David (writer, Of Stuff), Andy Mangels (writer, *Star Trek: Lost Era "Book One: Excelsior"*), Rebecca Moesta (writer, Buffy the Vampire Slayer: "Little Things"

Peter David got this panel started by relaying some of his experiences of writing Star Trek novels. He said that in his novels he tries to do things that would be too expensive to portray on television or on film. He gives each of his Star Trek: New Frontier novels a budget of \$500,000,000.00. Some of his run ins with the-powers-that-be at Paramount are the stuff of legend. Once, David wrote a reluctant Ryker as saying, "I'd rather walk Neutral Zone border patrol in my underwear." The note he received from Paramount stated, "It has not been established that our characters wear underwear. When Enterprise showed the first episode, Broken Bow, which contained a decontamination scene depicting T' Pol and Tucker in their skivvies, editor John Ordover called Peter David and advised him that underwear had now been established on Star Trek. David told how the first edition of Vendetta (also known as the big book of Borg) contained the following disclaimer: This book is a work of fiction by Peter David and does not in some ways reflect the Star Trek Universe as conceived by Gene Roddenberry. Paramount insisted that Pocket Books print that disclaimer because **David** had written a female Borg character. This was before the Borg Queen and before 7 of 9. David hopes that should Vendetta go back to press the disclaimer will be removed. David was once told by a Paramount flunkey that, "What happens in the series is Star Trek fact and what happens in the books is Star Trek fiction." As an aside, David feels that New Frontier has benefitted from Voyager backlash.

Andy Mangels said that he footnotes his novels to avoid the license holders' objections. **Rebecca Moesta** told us that when she and husband, **Kevin J. Ander**son wrote in their *Young Jedi Knight* series that someone was "seduced by the Dark side of the Force" comments came back that they were anthropomorphizing the Force, that the Force couldn't seduce anyone. She pointed them to the relevant scene in *Star Wars: A New Hope*. When writing his *X-Files* novel, **Kevin J. Anderson** was asked to remove Mulder's sarcastic comments because "Mulder doesn't have a sense of humor." The audience got a good laugh out of that observation.

The authors continued to relay the problems of writing novels and short stories based on television series that hadn't been on the air yet: In their first Angel book, Jeff Mariotte and Nancy Holder called him "Angelus" when the television series had established his first name as Liam. Diane Carey wrote the first Star Trek: The Next Generation novel, Ghost Ship, and was immediately raked over the coals for her poor characterization because the readers didn't realize that Carey based her work on material developed early in the process of creating the characters. Paramount stopped Peter David from having Ryker propose to Deanna at the end of Imzadi II because it had been determined the two would never marry (watch the first ten minutes of ST: Nemesis.)

In conclusion, Peter David will novelize The Incredible Hulk film as he did Spider-Man (over 250, 000 copies sold,) Endangered Species: Angel is the latest from Nancy Holder and Jeff Mariotte, ST: TNG: The Gorn Crisis is the newest novel from Rebecca Moesta, and Andy Mangels will soon publish Animation on DVD: The Ultimate Guide and ST: Deep Space Nine: Mission Gamma Cathedral with Michael A. 

G. Harry means even more to rocketeers. A veteran of the engineering side of the early ballistic missile projects, he practically invented model rocketry as a hobby. G. Harry was the founder and first president of the National Association of Rocketry. His "Handbook of Model Rocketry" was the first comprehensive publication in the field and, many times updated, remains its holiest writ for safety and practical information.

Each year since G. Harry's death in 1997, the Superstition Spacemodeling Society (SSS) has dedicated its October launch to his memory. The memorial launch has grown into a social event that attracts flyers, spectators, and vendors from all over Arizona and surrounding states. A small city of easy-up pavilions rises overnight on a patch of cow pasture at the Rainbow Valley launch site in rural Maricopa County, Arizona. The spectators stay on one side of a flight line marked by flagged ropes while the launch systems (clever home-built modern sculptures of wire, car batteries, switches, pipe, rod, and carpentry) are set up on the other side, a safe distance away. Experienced rocketeers at the launch table inspect each rocket for safety before it is approved for flight. An announcer with PA system gives the crowd details of each

flight, and calls the countdown.

Solid-fuel rocket motors are rated by letter designations, with each letter class having twice the total kick (technically

"total impulse") of the previous letter. The rocket kits you see in hobby and toy stores are generally powered by motors rated from A to D. At SSS launches, you can see launches driven by motors rated as high as M. Do the math, it's awesome! For high-power launch events like these, the club obtains a special waiver from the Federal Aviation Administration.

The G. Harry Stine Memorial Rocket Launch is SSS's biggest event of the year, but far from its only outing. SSS rocket launches are held at the Rainbow Valley site on the second Saturday morning of each month. Spectators of all ages are very welcome and it makes a fine day's free family entertainment. This is Arizona, so bring plenty of cold water and sunscreen. A shade canopy or beach umbrella comes in handy too.

The Costume Closet

Some people really do have monsters in their closets. Mine has a giant fly, a nightmare puppet, sorcerers fair and foul, a mutant killer whale, a mythical Klingon, and no fewer than three Dark Lords of the Sith.

It's okay, I'm a costumer.

Welcome to the Costume Closet, ConNotations' new column featuring articles by members of the local SF and fantasy costuming community. In the coming issues, expect to see opinions, how-to's, Q&A, humor, and a bit of history.

For starters: Some of Randall's Highly Opinionated Thoughts on Hall Costumes.

You will see costumin' humans at SF conventions in essentially two venues: on stage at the masquerade; or roaming the hallways. Logically enough, these are called "Stage Costumes" and "Hall Costumes."

Stage costumes are presented at the Masquerade, which is a featured event usually held on Saturday evening. Stage costumes are meant to be seen only once by a particular audience, so the goal is to make a brief but strong impression on the spectator. Stage costumes are often larger than life, with bold features like latex makeup applications, lighting effects, broad wings, long trains, or tall headdresses. They will be worn only for a couple of hours, so stage costumes aren't designed for comfort. The model is willing to put up with a bit of pain or heat for art's sake. Stage costumes will be seen at a distance, so fine detail is often ignored in favor of broad impact. The stage already has the audience's full attention, so stage costumes are presented with a narrative introduction by the master of ceremonies, music, a short sketch, dance moves, or maybe a joke.

Hall costumes are an entirely different animal. They are worn by the casual congoer for every convention activity. Hall costumes are meant for direct interaction with other fen, all day long. Practicality, comfort, and detail are the major priorities for a hall costume.

A good hall costume should be practical to wear. You should be able to move freely through all of the tight spaces of the con. A five-foot headdress may look cool, but you could find yourself swinging from the ceiling fans! A flowing cape is good, but only if you learn to control it without knocking down half the inventory in the dealer room. Thank the gods and the ADA that revolving doors are no longer common!

A hall costume needs to be sturdy and comfortable since you will be wearing it

for many hours at a time, perhaps for many years and cons to come. It jolly well needs easy restroom access!

A hall costume will support a higher level of detail than a stage costume. People will see you at arm's length, not twenty feet. Hall costumes therefore make better canvases for display of fine bead and needlework, jewelry, or hand props.

So what works for a good hall costume? Media recreations (characters or clothing from film, television, animation, and comics) are one obvious choice. These have several advantages. One advantage is recognition. Most people will immediately know what fictional universe you inhabit, if not the specific character. This has a downside as well since there are people who appoint themselves to criticize small details. Blow these people off! How much work went into their own non-costume? Beware, media costumes tend to attract the attention of muggle news reporters.

The media companies will sometimes help you (so long as you aren't making any money). Some Star Trek and Star Wars costumes can be purchased off the rack from authorized vendors. Film production companies sometimes work with publishers to make sewing patterns available. You can get patterns for Hogwarts school robes at any fabric store. Technical manuals, visual guides and fan web sites can provide valuable reference material.

Historicals are another good category for hall costumes. Bring out your duds from the SCA, renfaire, regency dance, wild west show, or Victorian tea party. Being real clothes from a real time, these fit the practical and comfortable criteria very well.

Closely related to historicals are fantasy and role-playing game costumes. These usually take some basic historical outlines, like a medieval or ancient culture setting, and add fantastical elements like artistic weapons, armor, and jewelry.

Strikingly slinky club wear, like one might find in the back of the Frederick's catalog, is popular among the femmefen after dark on Saturday. This look deserves an article of its own. As a fortyish, hairy, pot-bellied guy, I haven't done much work in the category myself.

Your hall costume can be a complete original, not derived from any imagination but your own. My basic Friday evening duds are usually a field uniform from some band of space traders/mercenaries/pirates whose story has not yet been written. This lets me combine some of my favorite clothing elements that are not usually found together, like pocket vests, puffy-sleeved shirts, hiking boots, berets, and capes. Don't expect the other con-goers to recognize your "look" at first, but keep your explanation brief. After a few cons, your persona can become as natural and well known as your real world identity.

Final thought: Mind your manners! When you wear a costume, you

become memorable. People will remember rudeness and discourtesy from a costumed person for years when the same behavior would not have been noticed from someone in street clothes. The hall costumer should compensate with warm courtesy, even (especially) when playing a villain. You may be one of the Padishaw Emperor's hand-picked Sardaukar guards, but this does not give you the right to shove people in the hallway or stick a prop lasgun in someone's back! Cluelessly rude people in mundane clothes will tug at your props and ask the same fool questions over and over. Smile with patience and show strangers that you are above this.

Just do it! Disguise de limit! Randall Whitlock has directed three Coppercon Masquerades, serves as president and webmaster for the Southwest Costumers Guild (www.southwestcostumersguild.org and hawks his medieval/ren/highlandinspired clothes and sewing patterns at www.moirandalls.com. His stage costumes run to visual puns (Dances with Werewolves, The Dookus of Hazzard) while his hall costume efforts have included assorted originals and recreations from Star Trek, Star Wars, and Futurama.

Snugglarea by Dan Weiss

If Monty Python, Philip K. Dick, and Franz Kafka had collaborated on a novel, it might have been a lot like Snugglamea. On the other hand, it might have turned out to be something completely different.

Snugglarea, in fact, was authored by mild-mannered novelist Dan Weiss, an avid chess player with a fondness for black raspberries.

Boldly published by Black Plankton Press, this unusual novel was first turned down by some of the larger, tamer houses. Bantam Doubleday Dell, for instance, wrote in their rejection, "Mr. Weiss is quite a storyteller, and he has a good sense of humor. Unfortunately, Spectra [one of the conglomerate's imprints] hasn't had much luck with this particular subgenre of science fiction. I guess you'd call it 'humorous science fiction'?"

Call it what you like, *Snugglarea* rises above conformity and weirdness. This book could be a nightmare if it wasn't so funny; it could be a comedy if it wasn't so bleak. As it is, *Snugglarea* doesn't fit into any pigeonhole. Here at Black Plankton Press, we let the other guys appeal to the birdbrains.

"Life used to be so simple; there were only amino acids and the beginnings of slime. But now everything is organized to the point where there is a depressing lack of life in a world filled with billions of people. Sally—the person I dream about most—is in storage on Earth, while I'm stuck here in orbit, working for Entertainment—the most fertile field in our sterile world—struggling to broaden the horizons of titillation" *—from the opening of Snugglarea*

In Our Book


The Briar King by Greg Keyes Del Rey Books, 560 pages, \$24.95

Greg Keys is best known for his Age of Unreason series that is an alternate history fantasy of fairly epic proportions. With the Briar King he starts a new four book series, The Kingdoms of Bone and Thorn, with a more self contained fantasy world with a connection to our reality. At the base of this world, Keyes theorizes that humans, including the lost Virginia Roanoke colony, were taken to another world and we are now dealing with their descendants thousands of years down the line. The humans were enslaved by the Skasoli until they and The Sefry rebelled and wiped the Skasoli out, save for one survivor that has been imprisoned for millennia. Keyes brings to life a wide variety of characters to fill in this world, a rebellious princess and her ill-fated family, a young knight, a kingsman and his companion, a novice priest, and a sword wielding rapscallion. Around the prophesied return of the mythological Briar King the story deals with betrayal in the ruling family leaving Princess Anne needing to stay alive to be able to save her world and what happens when the paths of the other characters meet up with hers. Anne and the other younger characters must grow up fast as their world turns upside down and the other characters must draw on their experience during their individual battles which all end up connecting together by the end of the book.

The fantasy element is very strong, including the mysterious Sefry, the beings that come to life in advance of the Briar King's awakening, and the magic used for both good and sinister purposes. The characters are rooted enough in a world we can recognize to make them interesting and believable. Being the first book in the series, it ends with you wanting the next book right away but it does resolve a good number of story threads so that the ending is still satisfying. The Briar King has been praised by many well-known fantasy authors, and well deserves it. -Lee Whiteside

Empty Cities of the Full Moon by Howard V. Hendrix Ace Books, 441 pages, \$14.95

This story blends a number of familiar elements in a very unfamiliar format. John Drinan is an astronaut above the earth when a strange blast of light sends him into a different dimension. He finds that he and most of his family do not exist on this world because his parents



died at crux point in history. He and others we meet in this book live through an apocalypse caused by a virus. The earth becomes 90% depopulated in a very short period of time. The virus begins as an attempt to correct mental instabilities and through a recombining with other factors, becomes mankind's death knell and salvation. An extremely rich man, whose contribution to the pandemic is questionable, rescues those immune to the virus and establishes an island sanctuary in the Bahamas. Thirty years pass, and his granddaughter, Trilla, and her lover have questions about the origin of the pandemic and why a cure hasn't yet been found. Their questions cause them to leave the island community and flee to



the mainland where they find the survivors of the plague are not quite what they expected. The plague's survivors are known as the Werfolk and their abilities to shape-shift and soul-fly are now part of a new culture. Through a series of adventures they meet various people who all had a part in determining or predicting the course of the plague. The fellowship grows in number as they get closer to discovering the truth that Trilla's grandfather sacrificed a world to protect.


All that sounds pretty good and exciting, doesn't it? Ok, here's the first problem: Mr. Hendrix writes in the third person present. Think about it - since most of us are accustomed to third person past, it is a bit uncomfortable and not as easy to give the reader background information. The second problem is that Mr. Hendrix is obviously a very well educated, intelligent person; however, his erudition gets in the way of a good fiction read. He has ideas and hypotheses that he obviously wanted to see in print; most of which are incomprehensible to the likes of myself (and I've been to college!) He fills the book with excruciatingly long passages describing the scientific basis and/or theory that supports his plot devices. Perhaps to someone with a PhD in Biology and/or genetics, this would be fascinating stuff; for me, I just wanted an enjoyable read.

Mr. Hendrix combines a little adventure, lots of science and loads of mystical elements. I think he tries too hard and its difficult to follow the plot threads. He has a grand vision to present at the climax but by the time I got there I was ready to see all the loose threads gathered up and an explanation that satisfied and all I got was more scientific jargon and overblown explanations that were still incomprehensible. Read it for the challenge if you're so inclined, but it is not on my recommend list despite the glowing reviews this book garnered.- **Catherine Book**

Ill Met By Moonlight by Sarah S Hoyt ACE, 278 pages, \$21.95 All Night Awake by Sarah A Hoyt ACE, 311 pages, \$21.95

What if the "dark lady" of Shakespeare's sonnets, his inspiration, were an elf princess? Or the elf prince Quicksilver, who could shape shift into his female form, Silver?

This is the starting idea of this pair of hardback novels. We get an extended story for the playwright's ideas and the missing years when he went to London. The first books, *Ill Met By Moonlight*, introduces Will to the world of the supernatural. His wife and daughter are kidnaped by Sylvanus, evil brother of Quicksilver and usurper of the elven throne. The story posits a happy marriage



between Will and Nan Shakespeare. In an author's note, Hoyt persuasively argues that the slightest of historical evidence has been misinterpreted for claims of an unhappy union.

She takes greater liberties in the sequel, *All Night Awake*. Will finally goes to London to seek his fortune in the theater, and falls in with the reigning playwright, Christopher Marlowe. It turns out that the female elf Silver has had relations with both men. And her comes Sylvanus, back for revenge after his defeat in the first book. As a ghostwerewolf, Sylvanus possesses Marlowe, terrorizes London and threatens to undo the fabric of reality. Can Will and Quicksilver save the world?

These books are a treat for anyone interested in such times or the classic. - **Michael Griffin**

Ill Met By Moonlight by Sarah A. Hoyt ACE books, 298 pages, \$5.99

The King and Queen under the hill have been murdered and so starts a story of intrigue and deceit. Quicksilver, the true heir to faire seeks his rightful throne. By trying to recruit a young Will Shakespeare to be his instrument of vengeance he does the unthinkable and falls in love with a mortal.

Drinking Midnight Wine by Simon R. Green ROC, 290 pages. originally published in Great Britain \$5.49, Science Fiction Book Club

Toby is a shop clerk, a boring job in a boring life. The only light in his life is the train ride home he shares with the same boring lot of commuters with one shining exception, a gorgeous woman who probably didn't even realize he existed. Until one rainy afternoon... Toby was just about to courageously speak to her to offer her the use of his umbrella when, in her impatience to be out of the rain, she opened a door that wasn't there before and disappeared through it. Toby does the bravest thing he's ever done in his life to this point and follows her through the door - into sunshine! But this isn't even the strangest event that will happen to him. Toby eventually discovers he has left his home in Veritie and entered Mysterie. It looks like the same town but the people are quite different. People like Jimmy Thunder, God for Hire, descended from Thor. The half-werewolf, Leo Morn, who lives in both worlds. The Waking Beauty who will send them all into a great adventure to save both worlds from Nicholas Hob, the Serpent's Son, who is about his father's business destroying the world. And, of course, the mysterious woman, Gayle, he followed to this world. Discovering who and what she is will be the answer to saving the world. For Toby has been recognized as Humanity's Champion, a role he does not want and tries to duck until he realizes that Gayle's opinion of him is more important than keeping safe. He is, however, terribly unprepared for the responsibility.

This is a very entertaining and charming story. Mr. Green is very deft in his characterizations and location descriptions. The plot is good and strong. I think there was one place where I felt the story lagged a bit but it picked up again so quickly, I forgave it. I enjoyed the characters and thought them true to type. I was actually worried for a time that Toby might fail but the tone of the book was so positive that I was sure the author would have a satisfactory conclusion and he did not disappoint. I even enjoyed the ending; which, from time to time, is the author's downfall after a good story. The single thing I did not appreciate was the last paragraph and last sentence. Prince of Shadows by Curt Benjamin Daw, 511 pages, \$6.99

Prince of Shadows is the first volume of the Seven Brothers series. It does stand alone.


