TV News & Previews By Lee Whiteside

We're into the final stretch of the 2002/2003 season with lots of season and series finales on their way plus a few debuts on cable. I've got news on all your favorite shows plus some info on pilots in production that might turn up on TV screens this fall.

This will definitely be the final season of Buffy The Vampire Slayer, ending with the series finale on May 20th. There had been talk about continuing on with Sarah Michelle Gellar in the title role but she officially announced that this would be her final season with the show. There are discussions going on between UPN and FOX about possible spinoffs that could happen, everything from Faith, Willow, Giles or Dawn taking the lead and continuing the adventures or some of the cast moving to Los Angeles to join up with Angel (assuming it gets renewed). No one is committing to anything as of yet, and at press time they are still filming the final episodes so they may not yet know which characters will be around to be available for a spinoff .Of course, being dead in the Buffyverse doesn't always mean you are out of the picture.

How things will all end up is a tightly guarded secret but the spoiler sites will likely dig up some juicy tidbits once the episodes have been filmed. In the meantime, here's a rundown of what is coming up on Buffy and Angel. In Sunnydale, Willow will bring Faith (the true Vampire Slayer) back from Los Angeles to help out in the fight against The First. Also showing up in Sunnydale will be Caleb, a former man of God who's turned to the dark side and now follows the First. He will cause lots of problems for Buffy and the Slayers in Training. Playing Caleb will be a familiar face to Whedon fans, Nathan Fillion (Captain Mal on Firefly). Whedon told Variety that "Nathan Fillion has a leading man's looks, but he's actually horribly evil, so he makes Caleb the epic foil for Buffy that he needs to be. Caleb calls himself a preacher, but his habit of murdering girls and his alliance with the darkest evil known to man makes him exactly the sort of guy whose ass Buffy needs to kick." The Scoobies will discover another seal to the Hellmouth that Caleb and The First are protecting and looking to activate. Faith will make a very strong impression on the Slayers in Training, usurping Buffy's command of them, taking them on a field trip to the Bronze and getting them in trouble. There's little leaked about how things will play out at the end of the series, but expect a few surprise appearances in the final episode and most likely a few casualties before the end.

Over in Los Angeles, The Big Bad controlling (or impersonating) Cordelia will be played by yet another Firefly refugee, **Gina Torres.** Following Faith's departure for Sunnydale, expect to see a return appearance or two by **Gwen Raiden** as Angel and crew try to find out who The Beast's boss actually is and likely get things resolved in time to turn up in Sunnydale for the final *Buffy* episode. As to whether *Angel* will continue past this year, The WB hasn't given any strong indication of what their plans are and they will likely look closely at how the series does down the final stretch of new episodes that started with Faith's appearance.

Back in Kansas on Smallville, the final February episode, Rosetta, guest starring movie Superman Christopher Reeve drew in Smallville's best numbers ever. The show has been performing very well this season and there's a good chance that The WB may move it to a new night in the fall. Smallville will resume new episodes in mid-April in a run to mid-May for the season finale. Over the course of those episodes, Lex's relationship with Dr. Bryce continues apace and may result in wedding (or attempt at such) by the season finale. Specific episodes include "Visitor" where another young man shows up in town with powers similar to Clark's including an item that may hold more information about Krypton, "Precipice" has Clark defending Lana's honor too aggressively with a local frat boy who then sues Clark over his injury. Also, the new Sheriff in town notices Clark's frequency of appearances at crime and accident scenes and will be keeping a close eye on him. In "Witness", some jocks enhanced by Kryptonite hijack a truck of refined meteor bars and in "Accelerate" Lana, Clark and others start seeing what appear to be ghosts. Rounding out the season will be "Calling" and "Exodus", for which nothing is yet known.

Debuting at the end of March on Sunday nights on The WB is The Black Sash. The WB describes the series as such: "Martial arts star Russell Wong (Romeo Must Die) stars in this unique drama as an ex-cop who sacrificed everything and must now rebuild his own life as a teacher and mentor to a diverse group of teenagers. From the writer and executive producer of The Karate Kid and Kiss of the Dragon, and the executive producers of Smallville, The WB's Black Sash features a multi generational cast, dazzling martial arts and stories of hope and redemption. As an undercover narcotics cop, Tom Chang (Wong) paid a high price for staying true to his values. Framed and wrongly incarcerated in Hong Kong for allegedly smuggling heroin, he loses his career, his wife and the right to see his daughter. All he has left are the blazing skills of a master martial arts combatant. Now, after five years in a Hong Kong prison, Tom has come home to San Francisco, intent on restoring his life." Also starring in the series is Mako as Master Li, Tom's mentor along with a group of teens and young adults that Tom teaches the ways of martial arts as he also fights to regain his family. The WB has ordered six episodes and it will air on Sunday nights following *Charmed*.

Back to UPN and the Star Trek Universe, *Enterprise* continues to draw decent, but not spectacular ratings. It sounds like there will be some changes coming soon in the show, possibly due to pressure to make the show more exciting and a better draw. In recent interviews,

Movie News By Lee Whiteside

Box Office Report - Daredevil debuted with a strong opening weekend (for a winter release), taking in \$45 million over President's Day weekend but tapering off pretty quickly and looking to end up with a bit over \$100 million. That's good enough for there to be a second Daredevil movie in development as well as a solo movie for Jennifer Garner as Elektra. As expected, Lord of the Rings: The Two Towers has had longer staying power with over \$330 million US as of mid-March surpassing the *Fellowship of the Ring* by \$20 million while Harry Potter and the Chamber of Secrets having ended up with a bit over \$260 million US, about \$55 million below the first Harry Potter movie. They will both likely add a few more million when they hit the second run theaters but look to have pretty much run their course in the theaters. Unlike with Fellowship of the Ring, there will not be an extended preview of the third LOTR movie, The Return of the King, attached to The Two Towers to draw in some additional box office. It was considered, but Peter Jackson and crew are busy preparing the extended version of The Two Towers for DVD release later this year and getting the final movie finished and didn't want to take the time to put together a special feature. The Agent Cody Banks movie with Frankie Munz opened strong in mid-March and it's studio has already committed to a second movie. It will start filming in Europe in April after Munz is done with his current season of Malcolm in the Middle

Trying to keep up with the Superman rumors is getting to be a super-human task. Rumors about Brett Ratner departing for Michael Bay have been denied and not come to pass, however the latest rumor about Ratner is that his contract with Warner Bros. has expired and they either need to negotiate a new one with him or find a different director. Josh Hartnett and Paul Walker have both declined the chance to play Superman, apparently not wanting to tie themselves down to a three movie, seven year, commitment Other actors reported in the running include Brendan Fraser (The Mummy) and Matthew Bomer (The Guiding Light). Jerry O'Connell (Kangaroo Jack, Sliders) has indicated that he has tested for the role and would be interested in taking it on while David Boreanz (Angel, Buffy the Vampire Slayer) ended up rumored to be up for the role but denied ever being in contention when he was asked about it. As for other characters, Rob Lowe (West Wing) has been rumored for the role of Lex Luthor and rumored contenders for Lois Lane include Lara Flynn Boyle, Catherine Zeta-Jones, Cameron Diaz, Lucy Liu and Julianna Margulies. At press time, Brett Ratner announced that he would not continue with the Superman movie, stating "I have chosen to withdraw as

director of *Superman*. The difficulty of casting the role of Superman has contributed to my decision. I appreciate the efforts of Warner Brothers and the entire production team during this process."

Catwoman continues in development with a new script re-write in progress following the departure of **Ashley Judd** in order to do an extended Broadway run. According to trade paper reports, **Halle Berry** will now take on the role with French Director **Pitof. Berry** is also set to star in the **Joel Silver** produced WB supernatural film *Gothika*, with **Robert Downey Jr.** and **Penelope Cruz**. Rumors are that **Nicholas Cage** is in training to take on the role of Prince Namor in a *Sub-Mariner* movie.

In official movie news (yes, there is actual confirmed news to report), Alfred Molina has been cast to play Doctor Octopus in the *Spiderman* sequel. Molina has recently received many awards and nominations for his role as artist Diego Rivera in the movie *Frida*.

Also announced is that **Alex Tudyk**, Wash in TV's *Firefly*, will play the animation reference for the robot character of Sonny in the movie adaptation of *Isaac Asimov's I*, *Robot*. **Wil Smith** plays a detective investigating a crime that may have been committed by the robot Sonny. The movie will be directed by **Alex Proyas** (*Dark City*) and starts filming in May. *The Hellboy* movie has started filming in Prague. **Guillermo Del Toro** wrote and it directing the movie starring **Ron Perlman**, **Selma Blair**, **John Hurt** and **Jeffrey Tambor**. Look for a Summer 2004 release.

For the third Harry Potter movie, *Harry Potter and the Prisoner of Azkaban*, Michael Gambon has taken on the role of Professor Dumbledore, replacing Richard Harris who passed away late last year. Gary Oldman plays Sirius Black, an evil Wizard who has escaped from the Azkaban prison. Filming is currently underway for the movie planned for a Summer 2004 release.

Production on *Mad Max: Fury Road*, the fourth Mad Max Movie with **Mel Gibson** and **George Miller** directing has been delayed until the fall due to the prospect of an Iraq war. With the logistics required for the movie, the producers decided to hold off production until the global climate is more secure.

In other casting news, **Chris Owen** will play King Arthur in a **Jerry Bruckheimer** produced, **Antoine Fuqua** directed take on the King Arthur legend (cont'd on page 4)

for Disney. They are in negotiations with **Stephen Dillane** to play Merlin.

Tomb Raider 2 More Realistic. In a report from SciFi Wire, **Jan de Bont**, the director of the upcoming *Lara Croft Tomb Raider: The Cradle of Life*, said that the movie will be based more in reality, concentrating on the ancient and modern worlds and less fantasy based than the first movie. They have gone all over the world for locations, including the crater of an active volcano and there will be double the action in the movie. Look for it to hit the theaters on July 25.

Production is gearing up on the live action Thunderbirds movie, based on the Gerry Anderson Supermarionation series from the 1960's (currently airing on Tech TV). The Tracey sons will be played by mostly unknown kids and teenagers. Playing father Jeff Tracey will be Bill Paxton, Sophia Myles will be Lady Penelope, Ron Cook will be Parker, Penelope's driver, Ben Kingsley will be The Hood, and Anthony Edwards will be Brains. According to an interview in SFX Magazine, Thunderbirds creator Gerry Anderson has not been contacted by the producers of the movie and is not involved with it at all. Directing will be Jonathon Frakes.

Scheduled to start filming in July is *Brothers Grimm*, being directed by **Terry Gilliam. Matt Damon** and **Heath Ledger** will play the brothers who "travel the countryside pulling off exorcisms but soon come upon a real fairy tale curse requiring genuine courage," according to the Hollywood Reporter. Also appearing as villains will be **Robin Williams** and **Jonathan Pryce**.

Movie Previews for April and May, 2003

After a relatively dry spring, things start to pick up for genre movies in April and May (especially May!). Here's what to look forward to in the theatres in the next couple of months.

House of 1,000 Corpses (April 11) -Finally being "unleashed" into theatre's on April 11th (in a limited release to 50 cities, Phoenix likely included) will be Rob Zombie's House of 1,000 Corpses. Originally planned to be released in 1991 by Universal Studios, they dropped the movie when they felt it could only be released with a NC-17 rating and didn't want any part of it. Rob Zombie then shopped it around and finally found a distributor for it with Lion's Gate Films. Supposedly the movie has gotten a "R" rating, creating a new category of "sadistic violence/gore" from the MPAA. The movie is set in the 1970's and follows two young couples who get stranded in rural Texas when they are seeking the mysterious "Dr. Satan". They take refuge from a storm in a creepy mansion that is a literal house of horrors. Expect lots and lots of blood and gore.

Bulletproof Monk (April 16) For many years, a mysterious monk with no name (**Chow Yun-Fat**) has zigzagged the globe to protect an ancient scroll - the Scroll of the Ultimate - which holds the key to unlimited power. Now the monk must find a protege, the scroll's next guardian. Kar (**Seann William Scott**) is an unlikely candidate, a streetwise young man whose only interest is himself. But when he saves the Bulletproof Monk from capture, the two become partners in a

scheme to save the world from the scroll's most avid pursuer. Together with the help of a sexy and elusive young woman named Bad Girl (King), they seek out and face the ultimate enemy in a spectacular final battle. The movie is based very loosely on a 1999 comic miniseries published by Image Comics.


Identity (April 25) This is the story of ten complete strangers who are stranded at a remote desert motel during a raging storm who soon find themselves being murdered... as their numbers thin out, they turn on each other, as each tries to figure out who is the killer. Stars include John Cusack, Jake **Busey**, Rebecca **DeMornay**, Clea DuVall, and Ray Liotta.

X2 (May 2) - The Summer movie season kicks off in early May with the second X-Men movie. All of the main cast from the first movie are back plus a bevy of new mutants including Nightcrawler (Alan Cumming), Deathstrike (Kelly Hu), Iceman (Shawn Ashemore), The Beast (Steve Bacic), Colossus (Daniel Kurdman) and others who will likely only be seen in glimpses but will likely turn up in later films. In addition to dealing with Magneto and his Mutants, the X-Men do battle with William Stryker (Brian Cox) who is out to destroy all Mutants. From the previews, expect to see Wolverine finding out more about his origins, the mutants fighting off an attack

on their academy, the return of Senator Kelley (**Bruce Davison**), and lots of special effects comic-book action.

The Matrix: Reloaded (May 15) - X2 will have the top spot for two weeks and then the first of two sequels to be released this year for **The Matrix** takes over the box office for several weeks at least. The official description of the movie is "Neo, Morpheus, Trinity, and the rest of their crew continue to battle the machines that have enslaved the human race in the Matrix. Now, more humans are waking up out of the matrix and attempting to live in the real world. As their numbers grow, the battle moves to Zion, the last real-world city and center of human resistance. "Expect a real nasty cliffhanger, but we'll only have to wait until



November for the resolution. In conjunction with the two movies, they have produced a series of animated film shorts the be collected on DVD in June called Animatrix. The shorts will tell stories within the Matrix universe and will be released initially via the web via www.whatisthematrix.com (with one having been attached to the movie Dreamcatcher).

Pokemon 5 (May 16) - Opening in limited release (and completely



overshadowed by some other movie opening that weekend) will be the fifth Pokemon movie. Ash and Pikachu travel to the Water Capital of the world, Alto Mare, where they meet two new Pokemons, the brother/sister pair of birds called Latias and Latios who protect a treasure called the Droplet of the Heart,

which is the target of a pair of thieves, Zanna and Rion. As the town gets accidentally flooded, the Droplet becomes endangered... can Ash save the day?

Bruce Almighty (May 23) Jim Carrey is Bruce Nolan, a human interest TV reporter in Buffalo, N.Y. who is becoming disenchanted with life despite his popularity and a loving girlfriend (Jennifer Aniston). When he has the worst day of his life, he rants and raves against God, only to have God show up (Morgan Freeman) and endows Bruce with His divine powers and challenges

> him to do a better job. Finding Nemo (May 30) The latest Pixar (Toy Story, Monster's Inc) effort is about two fish (Marlin and his son, Nemo) who get separated from each other in The Great Barrier Reef. Nemo is captured and ends up in a fish tank in a dentists office while his dad sets out

to rescue him. If you thought the cast of characters in Toy story was pretty loopy, the characters in this one, especially the ones trapped with Nemo in the fish tank, have been described as on a par with **One** Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest. Definitely a kid's movie that adults may enjoy just as much, if ot more.


SF Tube Talk (Cont'd from page 3) producer Rick Berman has indicated that the season-ending cliffhanger will send the show in a new direction that will significantly change the mission and tone of the show next season. To get there, we'll see the following episodes when the show resumes new episodes at the first of April. "The Crossing" sees the Enterprise swallowed by an otherworldly vessel occupied by non-corporeal creatures who invade the bodies of crew members and trade consciousnesses with them. In "Judgement", Captain Archer stands accused before a Klingon tribunal of conspiring against the Empire, and his only hope of escaping a death sentence or life in the dilithium mines of Rura Penthe is an aging and disenchanted Klingon lawyer with little energy or enthusiasm for the case. Guest starring and donning a Klingon headpiece will be J.G. Hertzler (General Martok on DS9).

Ensign Mayweather takes a trip to his home ship, the E.C.S. Horizon in "Horizon", and finds out things haven't been the same since his father, the Ship's captain, died. Especially when the ship comes under attack by an unknown alien species. In "*Breach*", Enterprise is asked to evacuate a team of Denobulan geologists from deep underground in a planet that has been taken over by a military faction. Phlox also has to deal with an Antaran who refuses treatment from Phlox due to bad blood between

their races. In "Cogenitor", while studying a star in the early stages of going supernova, Enterprise encounters a race called the Vissians (whose captain is played by Andreas Katsula, Babylon 5's G'Kar). The two crews get along famously, until Trip Tucker gets a little too curious about a member of the species' third gender - a nameless individual called a 'cogenitor.'" The big sweeps episode looks to be "Regeneration" where a team of Starfleet researchers finds a damaged Borg sphere buried in the Arctic. Of course, when the scientists unearth the Borg drones, they start getting assimilated. Next will be a mostly flashback episode about the testing of the Warp Five engine and Tucker and Archer making a test flight without Starfleet's knowledge. There will be a double bill of new episodes on May 21st to end the season with. First will be Bounty, where Archer is captured by a bounty hunter when the Klingon's put a bounty on Archer's head. Following that in the second hour of prime-time will be the previously mentioned season finale.

Twilight Zone on UPN has continued to do fair to so-so ratings, having gotten a boost for the Bill Mumy episode "It's Still *a Good Life*". There's not much info on upcoming episodes. Look for **Keith** Hamilton Cobb and Gordon Michael Woolvett of Andromeda making an appearance in the episode "Cold Fusion" when the show resumes new episodes in April. Unless something happens, don't

expect UPN to renew the show for next season.

On Alias, the post-Super Bowl episode did a series reset, taking down the Alliance and SD-6, allowing Sydney and Vaughn to work together openly but also allowing Sloane free reign to do what he really wants to do. Series creator J.J. Abrams admitted that they did it partly to simplify the show to make it easier to come into fresh plot lines. It appears to have worked to some extent, giving the series an additional ratings boost during February series and an early commitment from ABC for a third season. FOX has also given 24 a third season commitment already. The series has been performing very well, especially with American Idol as a lead-in recently. It's been fun to see a lot of actors from other shows turn up in the series, like Michelle Forbes (*ST:TNG*'s Ensign Ro) and Daniel Dae Kim (Crusade and Angel). FOX is also maybe going to air the remaining episodes of Futurama before the season is over, but they may end up with a few to air this summer. John Doe has continued to do fairly well for FOX on Friday nights and may just be a keeper for next season. ABC's new Monday night shows, Veritas: The Quest and *Miracles*, took an early exit during February sweeps in favor of reality show repeats, but have resumed airing episodes through March and likely into April (unless they get pulled for lower ratings). *Miracles* will likely go down as yet another show that really doesn't work on network TV but could have thrived on cable while Veritas: The Quest will likely be quickly forgotten.

Over on cable, SciFi ended its series run of *Farscape* and the current season of Stargate in late March. Leading up to the finale, the ratings for Stargate have been good and it continues to be SciFi's highest rated series, while Farscape trailed by several tenths of a ratings point, not coming up with any sizeable ratings improvement to help the show find another home. Efforts to keep the show alive will continue at www.savefarscape.com, however. Besides getting featured on the BBC's website when they aired the final episode, the Save Farscape crew also arranged for ads on local cable networks and The Dish Network during the series finale to alert fans to the status of the show.

The season finale of *Stargate SG-1* saw Michael Shanks as Daniel getting involved with events on our plane of existence which will lead to his return as a regular in Season Seven, starting in June on SciFi. I'll have more about the new season next issue. For those watching season five of Stargate for the first time in syndication, you'll finally get to see the episode "Meridian" that introduced Corrin Nemec as Jonas Quinn and saw Daniel Jackson ascend to a higher plane of existence in May. Other episodes airing for the first time outside of Showtime will be "Menace", which introduces a young woman who has a surprising connection to the replicators, "The Sentinel" in which SG-1 enlists a pair of criminals to help save a world from the Goa'uld, and "Revelations"

where SG-1 must come to the rescue of the Asgard when their secret base is attacked by the Goa'uld. This will finally get Stargate SG-1 fans who didn't watch the show on Showtime fully up-to-date with the series.

Debuting on SciFi at the end of March and running through April and May is *Tremors: The Series*. There's not much episode specific info to report on the show. Debuting on SciFi on April 4th is their reality series *Scare Tactics*, hosted by **Shannen Doherty**, is a "hidden-

camera show that turns fears into realities by placing ordinary people in situations inspired by science-fiction and horror films." The show has already garnered publicity for being sued by one participant who claims she suffered injuries when the limo she was riding in was attacked by a monster as part of a Scare Tactics stunt. This may not last too long with SciFi's viewers already having rejected *The* Dream Team, which was quickly moved to a 9 am time slot after getting really bad ratings in it's 11 p.m. nighttime slot.

Also starting up on Wednesday nights on SciFi will be the 1997 FOX series Roar, starring a young Heath Ledger as Conor, a 20year old orphaned Celtic prince in 400 A.D. who is destined to unite the Celtic clans to rid the island of the invading Romans. FOX aired the series in the summer of 1997 but left five episodes unaired and this will be the first time the entire series has aired in the U.S. The series features a fair amount of magic and sorcery as Conor and crew fight against the evil Queen Diana and her 400 year old sorcerer Longinus. Definitely worth checking out, especially now that the entire series can be finally seen. I'm looking forward to seeing it much more than the Tremors series.

Elsewhere on the cable remote, USA network is finishing up it's second series of *The Dead Zone* (with episodes repeating a week and a half later on SciFi) a week early. The last two episodes will be "*Playing God*", guest starring **Ally Sheedy** (fellow bratpacker star of **Anthony Michael Hall**), where Johnny Smith gets together with some high school friends to support one who is waiting for a heart transplant. During the get-together, Johnny realizes one of his other former classmates will end up being the heart donor and he has to decide what, if anything, he should do bout it. In the season finale, "*Zion*", we get a glimpse into Bruce's life when he and Johnny go to Indianapolis for the funeral of Bruce's father, played by **Louis** a**Gossett, Jr.** When Bruce touches his father's body at the same time as Johnny touches Bruce, giving Bruce a "Dead Zone" experience with his father. Also produced but not scheduled to air is *The Hunt for Osama*, which likely has been pulled due to the current political climate. In the episode, Johnny is recruited by a secret branch of the CIA to use his abilities to help them track down Osama Bin Laden. When we will see the episode is unknown.

Over on Showtime, after having scheduled the final episodes of Odyssey 5, they unscheduled them and have not yet indicated when they will air. The same for the second season of Jeremiah. It is possible they might turn up on the Showtime schedule in May, but June is more likely. Showtime will have one new genre show, Dead Like Me, likely starting in July. Ellen Muth is a slacker teen named George who meets an untimely death only to find that her job in the after-life is that of a Grim Reaper, whose job is to shepherd souls to their afterlife destinations. Also starring as other Grim Reapers are senior reaper Rube (Mandy Pantinkin), bubbly Betty (Rebecca Grayheart), regular guy Mason (Callum Blue), and Roxy (Jasimine Guy), a "no-nonsense reaper who moonlights as a meter maid for extra cash"

Over on the Cartoon Network, their big news is that they will be airing a *Star Wars: The Clone Wars* cartoon series starting this fall. The series will consist of twenty 2-3 minute shorts that will air between other Cartoon Network programming. It will tell stories set between *Star Wars: Episode Two* and *Star Wars: Episode Three. Clone Wars* will be produced at Cartoon Network Studios by a team led by **Genndy Tartakovsky**, the creator of *Samurai Jack* and *Dexter's Laboratory*. The Cartoon Network description of the series is "As Clone Wars unfolds the valiant Jedi Knights lead the Republic's Clone Army against many new and ruthless adversaries across the galaxy. These new characters, epic battles and intricate stories will add an exciting new dimension to the Star Wars saga." Cartoon Network will also have a new weekly series of *Duck Dodgers*, featuring Daffy Duck, Porky Pig and Marvin the Martian premiering in July with the previously announced *Teen Titan* series starting in August. New episodes of the *Justice League* will not start airing until October.

And finally, as has been the case of late, there's not much news on upcoming episodes of the various first-run syndicated series. *Andromeda, Mutant X* and *She Spies* have all been picked up for another season. According to his official website, *Andromeda's* **Keith Hamilton Cobb** has left the show, although they have an option to use him for four episodes. Rumors are that Dylan Hunt will have a new crew member who will function as a sidekick along the lines of Iaolus on *Hercules*.

SciFi has announced some of the cast for the *Battlestar Galactica* four hour miniseries that will air this fall. Edward James Olmos ("*Blade Runner*") will play Commander Adama, Mary McDonnell ("*ER*") will be President Laura Roslin, Jamie Bamber ("*Band of Brothers*") is Lee "Apollo" Adama, and Katee Sackhoff ("*The Education of Max Bickford*") is Kara "Starbuck" Thrace. The re-imagining is described in the initial press release as "After decades of peace with the Cylons (robots built by humans but with enough intelligence to turn against their designers), the humans of Kobol are virtually annihilated in a sneak attack. With a small remnant of humanity surviving aboard the last remaining Battlestar, Commander Adama and President Laura Roslin opt to make a run for it in the Galactica, hoping to reach the humans' legendary home world of Earth, while pursued through space by the fanatical, now humanoid Cylons... The script was written by Ron Moore (TNG, Roswell), will be directed by Michael Rymer (Queen of the Damned) and is Executive Produced by David Eick (American Gothic, Hercules: The Legendary Journeys). Females will play a larger role. Starbuck is a ballsy female fighter pilot and Lieutenant Sharon "Boomer" Valerii will be a rookie pilot not as sure about herself. The Cylons will be more technological in the mini-series, including a sexy humanoid one called "Number Six" that seduces Gaius Baltar. Colonel Tigh, the Galactica's XO, is a heavy drinker with an adulteress wife. This will definitely be more adult than the original series and has already been coming under attack by long-time fans who wanted to see a revival with original cast members. For lots of details and indepth coverage of the mini-series, check out www.battlestargalactica.com.

For upcoming developments, the networks have a good number of genre shows going to the pilot stage. How many of them will make it onto the fall schedule will be determined in early May when the networks decide who will get picked up for a series. Following is a summary of the pilots that might get picked up, some of which definitely are more interesting than others. Thanks to thefutoncritic.com for most of this info.


Century City (CBS) A legal drama set in 2053 created by Paul Attanasio (Homicide: Life on the Street) and Katie Jacobs. Cast includes Hector Elizondo ("Chicago Hope"), Nestor Carbonell ("The Tick"), Ioan Gruffudd ("Horatio Hornblower"), Eric Schaeffer ("First Years"), Viola Davis ("Antowne Fisher") and Kristin Lehman ("Go Fish")

Chasing Alice (WB) A female inspector from Scotland Yard (**Sophie Winkleman**) who moves to New York to find her missing sister, Alice; along the way, the character encounters characters inspired by the "*Alice in Wonderland*" mythology.

Family Curse (WB) From Dan Angel & Billy Brown ("Night Visions"), Mel Gibson, Bruce Davey, Greg Coote & Jeff Hayes. It is about married archeologists and their teenage kids, who must track down creatures from folklore they accidently release from a pandora's box. Cast includes Ted McGinley ("Married... With Children"), Lindsay Frost ("The Ring"), Brian Sites ("Eight Simple Rules") and Britt Irvin ("Taken").

Fearless (WB) - Rachael Leigh Cook ("*She's All That*") has the lead role in a drama based on Francine Pascal's series of young-adult novels about a girl born without the gene for fear. Also cast are

Joan of Arcadia (CBS) Present day Joan of Arc sees God in a different form each week. Produced by **Barbara Hall** (*Judging Amy*)

Future Tense (NBC) From Javier Grillo-Marxuach ("*The Chronicle*," "*Charmed*") and Joel Silver ("*the matrix*"). It revolves around an elite law enforcement unit in the future.

Heroine (FOX) described as a cross between "*Run Lola Run*" and "*Groundhog Day*," the drama revolves around a woman who graduates from college and discovers that she's able to save lives by changing the course of events. Stars Eliza Dushku (*Buffy*, *Angel*) and Shawn Reaves (*Auto Focus*). Produced by Rob Cohen (*XXX*) and others. Looks to be a good bet for a pickup. Fox has supposedly ordered additional scripts beyond the pilot.

Kamelot (UPN) Drama in which King Arthur is resurrected as a hip revolutionary who reigns supreme in a Camelot-like future society.

Maid of the Mist (FOX) It's described as "Amelie" meets "The Royal Tenenbaums," and features a twenty something woman (Caroline Dhavernas) to whom inanimate figures offer cryptic info on how she can intervene in the lives of others. Todd Holland ("Malcolm in the Middle") and Bryan Fuller ("Star Trek: Voyager") are behind the series.

N.Y.P.D. 2069 (FOX) From Steven Bocho (*NYPD Blue*) - A drama that revolves around a present-day New York City cop (Josh Hopkins) who finds himself transported to 2069.

The Ripples (NBC) - **Diane Farr** (*"The Job"*) and **Adam Arkin** star in a comedy about a couple who has been married for 4,000 years -- and their 3,985-year-old son, who looks like he's 15.

Spellbound (NBC) A romantic

comedy about a male witch (**Richard Ruccolo**) who falls in love with a mortal (**Andrea Anders**).

Still Life (FOX) Family drama told from the point of view of a recently deceased 20-year-old son (Jensen Ackles). David Keith ("Daredevil"), Audrey Marie Anderson, ("Providence") and Susanna Thompson ("Once & Again") also star.

Tarzan (WB) A contemporary take on Tarzan (WB) A contemporary take on Tarzan (**Travis Finmel**) who as a young man is brought from the jungle to his childhood home, New York, by his uncle, the head of powerful Greystoke Enterprises, and centers on Tarzan's relationship with Jane (**Sarah Wayne Callies**), a fiery police detective. Also stars **Miguel Nunez, Jr.** (*"Juwanna Mann"*), **Sarah Jane Potts** (*"Felicity"*), and **Mitch Pileggi** (*"The X-Files"*)

Then Came Jones (ABC) A western set at the turn of the century when technology is taking over. Stars **Melissa Gilbert** and **Sean Patrick Flanery**. Might have some fantasy/sci-fi elements.

Weapon X (UPN) A geeky N.S.A. tech guy (**Christopher Gorham**) who's accidentally infected with "nanobot" technology that turns him into the agency's top weapon. Also stars **Marina Black** as Gorham's love interest.

Young MacGyver (WB) A new version of the 1985-92 ABC series focusing on MacGyver's nephew (Jared Padalecki) who is brought into the fold of the Phoenix Foundation, the good-guy organization his uncle belonged to, on a lark. Also cast are Kiele Michelle Sanchez ("That Was Then") and Ron Canada ("Philly").

SFTV on DVD - The Dam Breaks - An Overview of SciFi & Fantasy TV on DVD

We've finally gotten to the point where there's plenty of genre TV series being released on DVD that fans have to really start making decisions about what they want to buy. With the home DVD market taking off faster than any other new home entertainment technology, it has gotten to where the market is big enough that a studio can likely make more money from putting a series out on DVD than they can bring in through syndication. With scheduled releases and those that have already hit the stores, we're just beginning to see the start of TV fans dreams come true. Some studios are asking fans online which series they would like to see on their web sites and making use of feedback from sites like tvshowsondvd.com to help decide what shows to release next.

The leader has been FOX, which was the first studio to starting bringing one of their series to DVD with *The X-Files*. Starting with Season Six, FOX began releasing *The X-Files* in wide-screen format. Season 7 will hit the stores in mid-May. FOX has also started releasing many of their other genre series, with *Buffy the Vampire Slayer* and now *Angel* coming out about every six months. *Buffy* Season Four will hit the stores in June and Season Two of *Angel* soon after that. Just out from FOX is *Futurama* Season One (March) and *Dark Angel* Season One is due in mid-May.

Paramount started their *Star Trek* TV franchise with DVDs of the original series with two episodes per release spread out over a couple of years. Starting with *Star Trek: The Next Generation*, they released season sets on a schedule to put the entire series out in one calendar year. They are repeating this schedule with *Star Trek: Deep Space Nine* this year and will likely do so next year with *Star Trek: Voyager*. It is likely at some point they will release season sets of the original series as well as the animated series.

ADV films took on *Farscape* as a test to expand beyond their Anime releases and have been successful with that series. Their initial releases of *Farscape's* first season were similar to Paramount's handling of the *Original Trek*. However with season two, they have started doing two-DVD releases with four or five episodes in a release. They also picked up *Andromeda* and have been releasing it in that format, too. Their next releases will be *Farscape* Vol 3.1 in early April. ADV recently announced that they will also be releasing *Mutant X* and *Beastmaster* on DVD starting later this year.

Acorn Media has been busy releasing Lexx to DVD, putting three to four episodes on each single DVD release and are currently up to Season 4, Vol 2. Other short-run series such as *Kindred: The* Embraced, Ultraviolet, and Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy have seen DVD releases. MPI Home video is releasing Dark Shadows on DVD in 4 DVD collections with 40 episodes per set. That's still going to take a lot of DVDs to release the entire series.


For classic shows, A&E Home Video has been making use of the ITV Catalog releasing The Prisoner, The Avengers, The New Avengers, the Saint, Secret Agent Man (aka Danger Man) and working their way through all of the Gerry Anderson productions, live action (UFO, Space: 1999) and Super Marionation (Thunderbirds, Fireball XL-5, Stingray, and Captain Scarlet and the Mysterons). There's also been Season One of The Outer Limits from MGM . Image Entertainment has been releasing Twilight Zone in various collections plus there is a gold collection that contains all 156 episodes in chronological order over 49 DVDs for \$399 list.

One of the more anticipated series on DVD has been **Babylon 5**. Warner Bros did an initial release of the re-mastered pilot "*The Gathering*" with the "*In the Beginning*" TV movie as a test and based on the response gave the go-ahead for a Season 1 Box set. That was released late last year and did much better than Warner Bros. expected. Look for Season Two in late April and the remaining seasons about every six months or so.

MGM has also been releasing Stargate SG-1 in widescreen format about one season set a year (with individual multi-episode DVDs) separately. Season Three is scheduled for June. Anchor Bay has started releasing Highlander: The Series (Season 2 -July), Xena: Warrior Princess (Season 1 - April, Season 2 - Sept) and Hercules: The Legendary Journeys (Season 1 -June).

For British SciFi fans, BBC Video has been releasing selected episodes of *Doctor Who* including the full Tom Baker Season with the Key to Time and will continue to release two/three stories every few months for the near future. They have also started releasing *Red Dwarf*, with the first two series having been released in February.

All of these releases have varying degrees of extras. Some have no commentaries, some have commentary on selected episodes and some, like *Red Dwarf*, have full cast commentary on every single episode. Future *Highlander* series releases will have out takes and deleted scenes culled from dailies that were kept by producers on the show. Others include bloopers, archival features as well as more in-depth features with recent interviews of cast and crew. For the true fan of a series, these DVD sets make for a much better way to be able to rewatch their favorite episodes.

Bull puts forth her theory that most writers (including herself) write from instinct and that all stories can be boiled down into three types with some crossovers and overlapping: 1) The Brave Little Tailor http://www.fln.vcu.edu/ grimm/schneider_e.html, 2) Boy Meets Girl like Romeo and Juliet http:// www.wsu.edu:8000/~brians/love-in-thearts/romeo.html, 3) The Man Learns A Lesson such as King Midas http:// www.phrygians.com/midas.html and The Gift of the Magi http://www.auburn.edu/ ~vestmon/Gift_of_the_Magi.html. Bull stated that the three prime elements to any story are 1) Plot, 2) Relationships, and 3) Transformation (or lack thereof.) Bull believes that a good story contains all three elements in proper balance. An audience member offered the 4th element: A wider reference. The well-read reader will pickup on veiled references by the author, such as the repeated retelling of the story of Christ, or on a more pedestrian level it might be called the "injoke" story where only certain readers will be in on the joke.

The two writers' then began to examine the elements that make up a story such as the beginning, jumping off points, and the author's goal in telling the story. What question or theme does the author wish to explore, is the character fictional or historical, what will the dialogue sound like in the readers mind, what is the setting, what is the plot?

Shetterly commented that a story should have implications, but don't be blatant about sending your message. "If you want to send a message, use Western Union."On the web, this quote is attributed to:

Jack Warner (Warner Bros. 1892-1978)

1959) D.W. Griffith (Director, 1875-1948)

Shetterly continued, saying that if you want to send a message, write an essay. Bull turned to the subject of point-of-

view. "My character doesn't know

something and he needs to find out or he

knows something and needs to have his knowledge tested. The information is filtered through a characters biases and their senses," Bull said.

Shetterly indicated The Maltese Falcon and The Big Sleep as good examples of P.O.V. He said that Aristotle's On Poetics gave one of the finest and simplest explanations on how to write: Start at the beginning, work toward the middle, proceed to the end and finish the story.

McFarlane

Moderated by Larry Marder, president, McFarlane Toys

McFarlane grabbed up a wireless microphone and plunged ahead for what turned into a frenetic hour. He thanked the audience for their enthusiastic welcome and for making possible the tenth anniversary of Spawn. He also stated that this was the twentieth anniversary of his first pilgrimage to the San Diego Comic-Con. He hasn't been to Comic-Con in five years because the dates have always fallen during the time he takes his family from their Phoenix home for a month long vacation in Canada.

McFarlane wanted to give the audience some background into his comic book work. In 1984 he got his first job after six hundred submissions. He viewed rejection letters as a way to get the autographs of his favorite editors. That first job was a ten-page backup in Coyote written by Steve Englehart as part of *Epic*, a Marvel Comics line of comic books. He next worked on Infinity, Inc. with Roy Thomas in 1985, commenting that books containing teams drove him crazy. McFarlane said that when he started working with Peter David and read one of David's plots McFarlane suggested that the issue be split in two so that he could draw the Hulk big.

McFarlane's talk had a stream-ofconsciousness quality to it that allowed for interesting detours such as this bit of advice: Never follow a class act. Don't follow Frank Miller, Jim Lee, Jack Kirby, Neal Adams, Jeffery Scott Campbell, or any hot artist. Before he began working on Spider-Man several editors at Marvel told him that the Spider books were inconsistent, a shambles, and that he should stay away from them. McFarlane told the audience that telling him what to do is what caused him to leave home at seventeen and that telling him "no" just makes him want a thing even more.

For McFarlane, the fun of Spider-Man was in finding the artistic voice for the character. For McFarlane, John Romita, Sr was the Norman Rockwell of Spider-Man. When McFarlane started on the book the emphasis was on spider-MAN, heavy emphasis on the MAN. He wanted to flip that and put the emphasis on the SPIDER. He started by enlarging the costumes eyes, adding more webbing on the suit, changing the blue to a blacker color, and he returned to the webbing in the armpit that had been originated by Steve Ditko. McFarlane especially wanted to modify the webbing. Before he came on the book, Spider-Man's webbing usually appeared as three lines with "X's" in-between each line, which he felt looked unconvincing. When the webbing was shot toward camera, McFarlane wanted webbing that was more organic and natural, webbing that would appear as if a man-sized spider had actually spun it. While drawing on a 2-d plane, McFarlane attempted a three dimensional appearance through the use of foreground, mid-ground, and background work

McFarlane emphasized that static shots require motion, which is one of the reasons that he gave Spawn a cape, the other being that it allowed him to "cheat" the anatomy. He feels that there is a fine line between cheating and style. When Spider-Man is swinging through New York the view is mostly of Spider-Man and just bits and pieces of the cityscape. McFarlane would bring in the border an inch and that would create the illusion that Spider-Man was bursting out of the panel and it also meant that he had one less inch all around to draw. When he was writing, penciling, and inking Spawn he began to feel that he was cheating too much. Other factors in his life were taking away too much time from his art so he brought in Greg Capullo on the theory that one less job would give him more free time. Alas, it was not to be. "Capullo's pencils were so detailed that I had to add more inking and it took me even longer to do an issue," McFarlane said

McFarlane began to talk about being one of the founders of Image Comics. "Image is ten years old when the competition didn't give us a year," he stated with more than a bit of pride. He then proceeded to explain how Image works differently than Marvel, DC, or Dark Horse. A writer/artist team submits and idea to Image and publisher/founder Jim Valentinto reviews the work and if he likes it the proposal is passed around the office and if it passes that level of scrutiny it goes to the weekly staff meeting. If the proposal is accepted Image will require a flat fee to offset the costs of solicitation to distribution outlets, printing, shipping, accounting, etc. However, the creators retain all rights to the material. Image doesn't fund the artists, but neither do they own any part of the idea.

McFarlane told the story of his run in with a Wal-Mart buyer at Toy Fare. Year after year the buyer would walk past McFarlane's line of horror toys like Clive Barker's Tortured Souls series, just shake his head and say, "Todd, if only you would use your powers for good." When McFarlane started his sports series of figures the Wal-Mart buyer hailed him as a superhero. In addition to NHL and NBA releases for 2003, McFarlane Toys will be putting out Alien, Predator, a H.R. Giger line, and a Spawn Reborn series of figures. McFarlane's philosophy is to lead in the direction that the competition isn't heading and his motto could well be this: Non-traditional toys in non-traditional places, such as Virgin Records. McFarlane feels that he may have hit a fork in the road and he's unsure which path to take. Does he expand the safe line of toys such as sports or does he continue to sell the less main stream and the more outrageous series of figures like Tortured Souls? If the audience reaction to the latter were any indication, my money would be on the odd and unusual.

McFarlane threw the floor open to questions from the audience and here are his rapid-fire answers: His current drawings are aimed at final product sketches for his toy lines. He has a sketchbook filled with over two hundred monster heads. He's enthusiastic and supportive of the work of young artists. If a toy line was dropped it's because it didn't sell or because a store buyer didn't continue to buy that toy line, but it may be available at an alternative outlet. Color variants in the toy line are almost exclusively due to the factory not taking care and they drive him crazy. McFarlane has no plans to do a Pinhead figure. Following the HBO third season ender Spawn's alter ego, Al Simmons, will return, but with limitations. HBO has taken the fourth season of Spawn inhouse and McFarlane will be closely involved.



Lord of the Rings: The Two Towers by Marguerite T. Murray

The Two Towers is the second of the three Lord of the Rings movies to be released. Filming he middle of a threepart novel is not an easy task. The first movie held together well as reasonable story even though it, of necessity, did not reach a definitive conclusion. It covered the activities of the united Fellowship. The Two Towers lacks this edge. It covers the separated activities of various fellowship members from the end of The Fellowship to the beginning of The Return of the King. It did not give you any feeling of having a beginning, a middle, and an end. This is inherent in the source book and not the fault of the movie makers.

The film was extremely well executed, but it did not follow the book nearly as well as The Fellowship. The added scene with Arwen and Elrond was unnecessary and interfered with continuity. The added scene with Elrond mind-speaking Galadriel was very distracting and contributed nothing to the story. From a technical perspective, the Battle of Helms Deep was executed flawlessly, but it should have been closer to the battle in the original book. The extensive changes in terrain and strategy were unnecessary. The battle as written would have filmed just as well. Certain elements left out of The Two Towers are carried into The

The Costume Closet



Dark Fantasy Costuming by Tasha Cady

The theme for the Masquerade at this May's LepreCon 29 (See ad in this issue) is "Dark Fantasy." Here Tasha analyzes the concept of Dark Fantasy and makes some suggestions for Dark Fantasy Costumes.

Dark Fantasy turns "heroic" fantasy on its head. The people/things normally considered "bad guys" become the heroes.

Dark Fantasy should not be confused with normal fantasy that has dark elements. Tolkien is not Dark Fantasy. Sauron and the orcs are definitely evil. They are not sympathetic characters at all. Neither would the *Thomas Covenant* series be considered Dark Fantasy, despite the fact that the protagonist could be considered something of a "bad guy". He is not heroic. We don't admire him. Sterling's *Draka* series could be considered Dark Science fiction. He calls it a "distopia." The "bad guys' definitely win.

There is overlap between Dark Fantasy and other sub-genres. Because the protagonists of Dark Fantasy are often the creatures of nightmare, there is an overlap with Horror. The elements of the fantastic/unearthly in Dark Fantasy overlap with Gothic. However, the emotions evoked by Dark Fantasy are not necessarily scary, terrible or horrific. Neither is the setting limited to the ruinous castles in remote locales so prevalent in Gothic tales.


Where you draw the line between Dark Fantasy and other types of fantasy partly depends on your own world-view. Dark Fantasy takes the normally repressed side of our nature and brings it to the fore. How comfortable are you with the story's hero/heroine engaging in "forbidden" sex? Should the protagonist be (relatively) pure? Does the end justify the means when the "good guys" use coercive magic? or is coercion always bad?

Having given some idea of what Dark Fantasy is, and isn't, we can try to describe how to costume in the genre. This is as difficult as the original definition. Dark Fantasy can be "period", contemporary, futuristic, or simply "other". It is easiest if you try to recreate a specific story. That will define the setting, and thereby the fashions of the story. Ann Rice and Laurell Hamilton come to mind as eminent authors of Dark Fantasy. What is your skill level and interest for making a costume? Do you feel up to panniers or cravats? Rice's vampires, and their friends and victims, exist in many eras: the French Revolution to modern times. Movies based on her books include Interview with the Vampire, The Vampire Lestat, and Queen of the Damned. Hamilton's stories all have modern settings. Her descriptions of what her characters wear is very detailed in places, if you want to do a recreation.

However, given the previous caveats, a few ideas on generic Dark Fantasy costuming are possible. First, this is <u>Dark</u> Fantasy. Go for dark colors. Not just black. Purples and deep blood reds evoke a similar atmosphere. Think of white, for an innocent victim, or a predator pretending innocence. Another option would be a pale green, possibly with yellow overtones. Green is the traditional color of magic and poison. The Queen of Elfland is usually described as dressed in green. In Dark Fantasy there may be elves, but Tolkien's elves would deny any kinship with them. Elves in Dark Fantasy tend to be evil, erotic or both.

Erotic is another aspect of generic Dark Fantasy. Given the strong puritanical residue in our culture, blatant eroticism is "bad". But Dark Fantasy lets us enjoy the "bad". Figures of fear – vampires, were-wolves, shape changes, etc become sympathetic characters or even heroes. The fascination with the "forbidden" is at the heart of dark fantasy and Dark Fantasy costuming.



Whether you read comics or not, it's worth mentioning as a prelude to this column, that while the comics community has a reputation both within and outside the medium as being ridiculously negative and critical. I'm here to tell you, though, that when the \$#%& drops, we take care of each other.

I'm not talking about the big company execs hugging "superstar" creators in front of hundreds of drooling conventioneers-I mean that comics readers (and creators) relate to one another in a way that doesn't make sense to people that don't read comics. This relationship is not a bond out of some assumed lonely necessity, but rather a common interest in something that many of us feel is a genuine and original form of art. We take care of each other to preserve the medium, but we give a damn about each other, both from the fan's perspective and the creators', if only because we simply love comics.

Example: In April of 2002, Top Shelf Productions' book trade distributors filed Chapter 11 Bankruptcy, leaving Top Shelf in a position to suspend publishing for a long, long time; perhaps for good. Top Shelf happens to employ some of the best creators the industry has to offer, (including one of my personal heroes, James Kochalka) and they produce several of the very best comics in the industry. As these events unfolded, Chris Staros, one of the big guys behind the company, posted an honest call for help on the internet, and in under 12 hours, thanks to comics readers, Top Shelf overcame a \$20,000 hurdle and are publishing award-winning independent comics right this second.

Okay-I'm off my "the people that love heroes are heroes, too" soapbox. Moving along...

A few months ago, a couple of young fellas in New York were looking to get their creation, *Teenagers From Mars*, into comic book stores. Let me back up here and tell you:

Teenagers From Mars is this: a John Hughes-ish story about a group of wayward teenagers meandering through life in a little Southern town called Mars. The book reminds me of *Catcher in the Rye* rendered in sequential art (which means I really like the series since *Catcher* is my favorite book). The characters and the town are vibrant and so real it's ridiculous; both writer and artist capture the details of misdirected adolescence brilliantly and the read is exciting and very, very real.

Samurai Comic's own evil genius, Mike Banks, (thanks to customer extraordinaire and international man of leisure Greg Dunnion, who told us about the book), helped to get Diamond Comics to begin carrying Rob and Rick's little book, and since then, it's been a smash independent hit, garnering fans and acclaim throughout the industry. So here at Samurai, we feel like a tiny piece of the Teenagers from Mars puzzle-they're living the dream, and we helped 'em get there a tiny bit-the guys have sent out pins and signed books for our customers, and they've been really appreciative. But that's not the story here-it's just a precursor to what you're about to read, and I'm sorry to say, it ain't happy news.

TFM artist Rob G, who is also penciling an upcoming Batman project for DC with TFM writer Rick Spears, lost all his possessions in an apartment fire on Wednesday, January 22. Thankfully he, his roommate, and his cat all made it out alive, but as for everything else, including the Batman story, all the TFM art, and Rob's comics and computer, nothing was saved.

<u>This guy IS US</u>. He's young and he's making comic books for a living-a talented individual starting a very successful career in an industry he loves. What else is there to say but: let's help?

After I read about Rob's misfortune online, I felt very happy to be a part of this community because of all the incredibly kind offers of help from readers around world (yes, **world**-a publisher from Italy's even offered help). Check out what his dad had to say following this www.newsarama.com posting and feel the love:

I am Rob's dad, or "Pops," as he likes to say. I just want say that I've discovered on this message board that Rob, who is one of the finest human beings I know, is clearly in good company, with people like you. Your expressions of kindness, generosity and concern for Rob, especially those who are yourselves in a hard place, is so awesome that I can't find the words..... I can tell you that what you and the many others that have given kind and helping hands in the last couple of days has had a very profound effect on Rob. I think you have restored his belief that there are many good people left on this planet, after all. And you did that for me, too. Thank you all, ten thousand times. Dave Goodridge

Signs Walt Disney, 106 mins, PG-13 VHS \$22.99, DVD \$29.99

Mel Gibson is a widower living on a rural Pennsylvania farm with his two children (Rory Calkin, Abigail Breslin), and his brother (Joaquin Phoenix). One fateful morning large crop circles appear in his cornfield and the family dog tries to attack his young daughter. Soon they learn that the crop circles have mysteriously appeared all over the world. By the next day the circles are followed by the appearance of alien spacecraft. We watch as the lapsed minister confronts both his own personal crisis of faith as well as the threat to his family posed by the aliens.

This is possibly the most realistic vision of an alien invasion I've seen and certainly the most frightening. There are no whizz bang special effects, aside from the aliens themselves, but the atmosphere is taut as the tension grows towards the climax, sort of an Alfred Hitchcock's The Birds meets War of the Worlds. The family behaves much as you or I might. The children are glued to the TV watching worldwide coverage of the crop circles, the first sighting of an alien and the hovering space craft. Their father at first tries to pass off the circles as a hoax and then does his best to keep his children from being frightened and then desperately striving to keep them safe as it becomes obvious the aliens are hostile.

This is one of the best movies I've seen in a while, it will certainly remain a favorite. I urge you to add this to your collection. The DVD includes Making Signs - Exclusive six-part documentary exploring the movie from idea to marketing and five deleted scenes. The deleted scene "The Third Story" should have been included in the movie in my opinion. - **Stephanie L Bannon**


Reign of Fire Touchstone, 102 mins, PG-13 VHS \$106.99, DVD \$29.99

Stephen King's It Warner Bros, 187 mins, NR VHS \$14.95, DVD \$19.98

After viewing *Stephen King's It* you will never view clowns quite so nonchalantly again.

With *It* we have two connected stories. Part one brings us the story of the seven kids who meet and form The Losers Club and the fateful summer they took on Pennywise the Clown, a force of pure evil, in their Maine home town. As part one ends the kids have defeated Pennywise but promise to reunite if he ever returns.

In part two we skip forward to present day Derry, the kids have all grown up and moved on, except for Mike Hanson (Tim Reid) who has stayed in Derry and become the town librarian. When a series of child murders and mutilations makes it clear to him that Pennywise has returned Mike contacts the other members of the Losers Club and one by one they return to Derry to take on Pennywise and put an end to the evil once and for all.

The story is one of King's better efforts and it translates to the mini-series format well. With Tim Curry as Pennywise the Clown, Henry Anderson (Richie Tozer), Dennis Christopher (Eddie Kaspbrak), Richard Masur (Stan Uris), Annette O' Toole (Beverly Marsh), John Ritter (Ben Hascom), and Richard Thomas as (Bill Denbrough) we have an exceptionally strong cast.

The only extra on the DVD is the feature-length Audio Commentary by Dennis Christopher, Tim Reid, John Ritter, Richard Thomas, and Director Tommy Lee Wallace but it is still highly recommended as an addition to any fan's collection. - **Stephanie L Bannon**

Battle Beyond The Stars New Concorde 103 mins, PG VHS \$14.98 , DVD \$19.98

This space opera version of *The Seven Samurai* is definitely a B-film complete with cheesy special effects but it is still a fun romp for a lazy Sunday afternoon as Roger Corman delivers clever dialogue (script by John Sayles) and some surprisingly good performances.

Our story finds the evil dictator Sador (John Saxon) threatening the planet of Akira with his super weapon, the Stellar Converter. Akira's pacifist population is unfit to fight Sador but young hero Shad (Richard Thomas) decides to fight back even if no one else will. He borrows the ship of notorious mercenary Zed the Corsair and goes off to recruit a band of mercenaries, each of whom has a personal reason to join the fight. He manages to hire a lizard-like humanoid (Morgan Woodward), a space cowboy (George Peppard), a zaftig female warrior (Sybil Danning), and brooding killer-forhire Gelt (Robert Vaughn, reprising his Magnificent Seven role). With its strong cast, script by John Sayles and Roger Corman touch *Battle Beyond the Stars* (including space ships designed by *Titanic* director James Cameron) is a delight for repeat viewers as well as newcomers.

The DVD has been digitally remastered and features commentary by scriptwriter John Sayles and assistant production manager, Gale Anne Hurd (*Terminator 2* producer) as well as theatrical trailers. - **Stephanie L Bannon**

Highlander Season One Anchor Bay. NR DVD \$89.95

The first Highlander the film, starring Christopher Lambert as Connor MacLeod hit theaters in 1986. Six years later we got Highlander The Series starring Adrian Paul as Duncan MacLeod, a clansman of Connor. For those unfamiliar with the premise, Highlander (both movies and series) tell the tale of a race of Immortals who battle one another throughout history. They compete by taking the heads of other Immortals, thus gaining all that Immortal's knowledge and power, with the ultimate goal being to be the last one standing. "There can be only one!"

This set of 9 discs brings us the complete first season, all 22 episodes, in their longer form (48 minutes) which includes footage shown in Europe and Canada but not in syndication here in the USA. Each episode has commentary by producer Bill Panzer as well as "Watcher" notes. Disc 8 includes nearly 20 minutes of Bloopers while disc 9 has all the first season scripts in Flash format. Additionally there is a half hour documentary that was used to promote the series before it debuted in 1992.

This is a must have set for the Highlander fan. While this set was released last year on the Official Highlander site, www.highlanderofficial.com, reports seem to indicate that the Anchor Bay version is a higher video quality and much less expensive plus it is a more compact package.(With the original Davis/Panzer release apparently all the disks had their own box which made the entire set an most a foot wide, just a touch smaller than the original VHS box set) In checking the site today I note they are selling the Anchor Bay DVDs now for the stated \$89.95 price.

I eagerly await Season 2. The official website indicates it is now available (although the bbs implies that nobody has actually _received_ one yet ...) They also have all six seasons on VHS plus the only season of Highlander: The Raven -**Stephanie L Bannon**

Lotsa stuff this month, so let's get going: **Dr. Demento's Hits from Outer Space** (Laugh.com)

This is the first release by Dr. D on George Carlin's new Laugh.com label. And while the good doctor thankfully forgoes yet another release of *Purple People Eater* in lieu of songs from the last 25 years, the package is still somewhat wanting. Which is not entirely his fault. Laugh.com, in an effort to put out budget-priced CDs, spends very little in the way of printing, so an accordion foldout of short bios about the artists that accompany the Doctor's other CDs is not to be found here.

That said, the musical selection is very good, and there's a very exciting local connection. The CD contains not one but two songs by Phoenix's own **Leslie Fish**. *Carmen Miranda's Ghost*, a song about the title character inhabiting a spaceship, and the ultimately inescapable, inevitable *Banned* from both appear here. This Argo is short as versions of this song go, clocking in at well under ten minutes. And the bluegrass accompaniment by the Dehorn crew is unexpected and wonderful.

Along with Leslie, you get just a few too many Star Trek songs, some Star Wars songs, and a couple of really weird things, like Boots Walk's bizarre *They're Here* and the *Ballad of William Robinson*, by none other than **Bill Mumy**, who of course would someday go on to become half of Barnes and Barnes and a Dr. Demento staple. This CD is definitely entertaining but I think Dr. D. could have thought a little harder about the song selection, at least as far as the Final Frontier goes...

Four Shillings Short: Of Labour and Love www.art.net/4ss)

The latest release from California's **Aodh Og O Tuama** and wife **Christy Martin** may be their best set yet. This studio CD really showcases the amazing musical fusion that these two are so ably capable of in concert. I don't know which

side of the political spectrum you fall, and I don't much care, but this is a band that is very much on the left at times. Which leads me to my favorite song here, *Have a Nice Day* by **Mark Graham**, a tune that could embarrass a fundie at 100 yards. **Christy Martin's** musical talent is indeed incredible. 
The Bringers and Friends: Ramblers and Rovers (self-produced) Michi Regier: Curved

Video Game History 101: In The Beginning By Shane Shellenbarger

The birth of the modern video game arrived on a day in 1958, when Tennis For Two was born. The proud parents, William Higinbotham and the physicist's team were working at Brookhaven National Laboratory in Suffolk County, Long Island, New York. Brookhaven was also the home of the Brookhaven Graphite Research Reactor and the Cosmotron, the first billion-electron-volt particle accelerator that would later go on to achieve a Nobel Prize-winning discovery. The problems for Higinbotham were the Russians and 50's horror films: the Cold War was heating up and atomic radiation was being blamed for everything from giant ants to the end of the world. The community that surrounded BNL was generally of the opinion that the Laboratory posed a clear and present danger to the health and welfare of the people in the area. BNL attempted to allay the fears of the local public by hosting a visitor's day where the interesting - but non-threateningresearch being conducted could be demonstrated. The guests came, were generally bored by the blinking lights and whirring sounds generated by the mainframe computers, and they left. Their blasé attitude inspired Higinbotham into action. "I knew that from past visitor's days that people were not much interested in static exhibits, so for that year, I came up with an idea for a handson display-a video game," said the late Willy Higinbotham. Using his background as an advanced radar systems physicist for the Manhattan Project, Higinbotham gathered together his team to create the necessary elements for what he would ultimately name Tennis For Two.

They programmed the trajectory of a blip of light on an analog computer, and then added two control boxes, each with a "serve" button and a knob to control the movement of the ball, and the game was displayed on a 5" monochromatic oscilloscope screen. Debuting in the Instrumentation Division display at the next visitor's day the game was an instant hit with people waiting hours to play. Higinbotham never marketed nor patented the device, and while it was programmed on a computer and used an oscilloscope, there can be little doubt that Tennis For Two was the early ancestor to the video game that started the fad that hasn't faded, Pong.



The next major step along the road involved the contribution of the pulp space opera writer, E.E "Doc" Smith. That's not to say that Smith set out to invent video games or even that he knew that his writings were inspiring those people who would be inventing video games, but without Smith and his literary legacy the landscape of modern video games, a multi-billion dollar industry, might not exist. "Doc" Smith's Lensman and Skylark novels were a major influence in 1961 on three MIT students, Wayne Wiitanen, Stephen "Slug" Russell, and J.M. Graetz. Combine Smith's imagery, the imagination and technical innovation of three college students, and the 4 bay PDP-1 solid state minicomputer donated to MIT from Digital Equipment Corporation and you get the worlds first video game to use stratagems: Spacewar! When the trio wasn't discussing Bergenholm Inertialess Drives, DeLameters firing simultaneously at zwilnik strongholds, and incomprehensible gigawatts of energy flooding force screens as they flared into the ultraviolet, they devoured the latest Toho releases that depicted atomic monstrosities breathing radioactive death over a fleeing Japanese populace. That was the atmosphere in which fermented the ideas that became the forty pages of paper-punched program code inputted into the PDP-1 when it was first translated from TX-O after it was created and translated from MACRO and FLIT. In addition to Wiitanen, Russell, and Graetz, contributions were made by LISP specialist Dan Edwards; MIDAS (successor to MACRO) writer Robert A. "RAS" Saunders; and Peter Sampson, who got the PDP-1 and Tixo to play

After the software was written and tested, hardware problems needed to be resolved. Try to imagine two QUAKE players hunched over one keyboard where one incorrectly pressed key would restart the game and you'll have some idea what challenges the developers faced. Members of the Tech Model Railroad Club, Bob Saunders and Alan Kotok, made their way to the TMRC room and scavenged materials. Some cobbling time later, two control boxes were created. Add a CRT and connect everything to the PDP-1 and the boys were in business.

Bach.

A simple yet elegant game, Spacewar! originated with two spaceships, a depleting fuel supply, and phosphor dot torpedoes. It evolved when later elements included accurate constellations with fifth magnitude and higher stars, a gravitywell "Heavy Star", and Hyperspace. Players could use the gravity-well in combination with their propulsion system to whip around the Sun and catch their opponent unawares. Of course, when both players used the same move it produced the "CBS opening" display as both ships turn slightly away from the Sun, use their thrusters, and then rotate their ships back into a position to fire torpedoes at the enemy player.

The game became so popular and interrupted the computer lab so much that it could only be played during lunch hour and after 5 p.m. Students and faculty alike came from all over MIT to see what the fuss was all about and then stayed to wait for their crack at the game. It fit like a hand in a glove that Spacewar! would be a part of the annual Science Open House in May of 1962. Scoring was added to limit matches to a certain number of points and a laboratory CRT was connected to the computer as a secondary display to provide a view for anxious onlookers. In that same month, at the first DECUS (Digital Equipment Computer Users' Society) meeting, J.M. Graetz presented the first paper on the subject, entitled "Spacewar! Real-Time Capability of the PDP-1." This may have been a form of justification of the hundreds of hours spent on the game. Russell considered ways of commercializing the game, but given the cost of the system, he and the rest of the innovators settled for disseminating it to everyone they could think of who had access to a computer or a programmable CRT. Spacewar! went on to take up

residence on nearly every PDP built by DEC, made it as Atari founder, Nolan Bushnell's Computer Space into the 1973 film "Soylent Green", and released to arcades everywhere in 1978 by Cinematronics as Space Wars. Modifications would later spawn games like Asteroids, Lunar Lander, and Tempest, but that's another story for another time. http://www.lucyfan.com/cbseye.html http://www.pong-story.com/thefirst.htm http://www.pong-story.com/atpong1.htm

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In Our Book

Star Wars: New Jedi Order Series Destiny's Way by Walter Jon Williams October 2002; 480 pages

With the fourteenth installment of the New Jedi Order series by Del Rey, Destiny's Way has a rounded out cast of twenty-four characters as well as their intertwining subplots. This book has several themes running through the story; the most significant themes concern the destiny of Jacen Solo and the turning point of the war with the Yuuzhan Vong.

As the story unfolds, the reader learns that the New Republic is still fighting skirmishes and introducing new ways to circumvent the Yuuzhan Vong advantage. The New Republic government is falling apart as elections begin for a new Chief of State. The Skywalkers, Solos and their comrades begin to collaborate on how to preserve the tattered government and win against the Yuuzhan Vong as odds dictate against an amicable solution. Resentment between the military officers and government officials escalate, causing desperate friends to resolve! the issues with the military, politicians, and Jedi.

After elections, the Jedi Council reforms, with some modifications, and becomes the High Council; all the while, a secret biological weapon is being developed for future use by the New Republic. Later the High Council rejects the use of such a weapon but the Chief of State overrides their vote with his authority. Master Skywalker again finds himself in the political arena in order to diffuse a dangerous situation.

Amid the chaos, Jacen Solo returns to the loving embraces of his friends and family after his escape from the Yuuzhan Vong with his friend and teacher, Vergere. Many are skeptical of her motivations and Vergere becomes a prisoner of the New Republic.

In his quest to understand Jacen, his ordeal, his new friend, and the Force, Master Luke Skywalker questions Vergere in her prison cell intensely. There in confrontation with the avian, Luke finds a perspective he had not realized before about the nature of the Force and himself. Though not convinced of her intentions, Luke has the avian stay in the Skywalker apartment and far away from Jacen Solo.

After taking an imposed, but well needed, vacation by Master Skywalker, Jacen then reenters the war. With Jacen directing the battle from his mind, the Jedi fighter pilots melding with one another in coordination, the New Republic sets a trap for their invaders. The bait of Jaina and Jacen Solo proves to be wise as the Yuuzhan Vong fall into the ambush easily. A decisive victory for the New Republic forces echoes loudly and the Yuuzhan Vong flee from their failure.

Walter Jon Williams does a wonderful job explaining the answers to many of the questions that have arisen in the New Jedi Order series. There are a few surprises and returning characters. In addition to seeing Mara in action, Lando and Karrade being inventive businessmen, and the makings of a romance between Jacen and Danni Quee, the reader is not disappointed save one: Ben Skywalker. Holovids and pictures of the youngster is not enough, will Luke and Mara ever become participants in their baby's life? Readers, especially this one, would like to see this family dynamic developed.

I read this book in less than two days. However as with any novel, too many subplots and characters causes the story to feel slow in places and much needed character interactions are written as exposition. Overall, the novel is well written and enjoyable. Entertaining and enlightening, I recommend this novel to anyone reading in the Extended Universe. - Dawn Mullan

Star Wars: New Jedi Order Series Traitor by Matthew Woodring Stover Del Rey July 30, 2002; 292 pages

This book is the thirteenth addition to the New Jedi Order series in the Star Wars Extended Universe. Devoted mainly to Jacen Solo and a cast of five other characters, this story is not only intriguing but also perplexing. Fluid and omniscient, the author, Matthew Woodring Stover, demonstrates an acute knowledge of the Star Wars Universe as well as the ability to entertain and mortify concurrently.

From the first page, the book entices the reader to learn more about Yuuzhan Vong culture, religion, and politics. We learn that the Yuuzhan Vong are a highly religious people whose main goal is to suffer. Pain intensive activities are especially pious for the Yuuzhan Vong. These aliens believe suffering brings them closer to their gods.

Their belief system suppresses original thought and creativity. The religion has evolved into a severe controlling entity producing a strict caste system, an oligarchic regime of priests, shapers, and warlords. Those Yuuzhan Vong, who are found unworthy of glory by reason of failure or physical deficiency, become members of the lowest caste called the Shamed Ones. These lowly subjects are the slaves of the society leading some Shamed Ones to resent their upper caste contemporaries.

One ally to the aliens is a strange avian-like creature and Jedi Knight, named Vergere. Throughout the story this mysterious and treacherous being tortures Jacen Solo, so that he may extend his current comprehension of the Force. Both physically and philosophically, Vergere employs her unique and devious means of instructing the young Jedi Knight. The Yuuzhan Vong believe Vergere is teaching Jacen their True Path. she is – but not the path he was expected to take. She leads Jacen to the path he must take to fulfill his destiny.

As he grows more mature by the hour, the young Solo son learns about the strange alien species that has declared war on his galaxy. Even though he suffers many unforgivable and heinous experiences, he finds he does not hate the Yuuzhan Vong nor does he resent his tormentor, Vergere. In the midst of his torture and refinement, Jacen Solo begins to understand his true nature. With his lessons learned, Jacen and Vergere escape to the New Republic.

Matthew Woodring Stover handles many subplots converging onto one another creatively with a passion and detail unrivaled in the Extended Universe. The novel is a strong psychological thriller as well as a science fiction novel. Traitor did not leave the reader confused. Rather, the reader becomes more infatuated with every turn of the page and is committed to reading the entire book instantly. - **Dawn Mullan**

We are not amused, Sir Guillaume by Scott Farrell Shining Armor Enterprises, \$12.99

I have sometimes heard short, humorous essays described as, "Good bathroom reading." This is literally the case with We are not amused, Sir Guillaume. The folks selling the book at the recent "Estrella War" posted excerpts inside the doors of the porta-johns, at reading position for those comfortably seated. Excellent advertising, and handy if the T.P. runs out. Sir Guillaume (who has served as Baron of Califia and King of Caid) is sort a "Dave Barry" among the medieval re-creationists of the Society For Creative Anachronism (SCA). The book is a collection of his humor columns from the Caid newsletter, "Crown Prints."

The stories are rollicking accounts of SCA life and fractured medieval histories, always with a warm heart and returning to the ideals of chivalry and friendship. My copy should properly be called "Kung Pao Guillaume," because of the stains from the many spit-takes it induced during lunchtime reading.

Night Watch by Terry Pratchett Harper-Collins Hardback \$24.95

A friend passed me a reviewer copy of this, Terry Pratchett's latest Discworld novel. I guess I'm morally obligated to write a review. Don't worry, the hard cover edition is already on the shelves.

Things are going very well for Sam Vimes, commander of the Anhk-Morpork City Watch. Since we first met him years ago in *Guards Guards* he has been elevated to Duke and built the city watch from a dispirited bribe mill into an effective and honest police force. He and Lady Sybil are expecting the birth of their first child at any moment. Still, Vimes sometimes longs for the old days, when he was just a plain copper who knew every brick of the city streets by its feel beneath his boots. Be careful what you wish for, Sam. In hot pursuit of a coldblooded cop-killer across the rooftops of Unseen University's library of magical books, lightning strikes nearby. Vimes awakes to find himself in the city as it was thirty years ago, right before a dangerous period of civil unrest - and the killer has traveled with him!

Vimes must assume the role of his mentor, Sergeant John Keel, and with the help of sweeper Lu Tze of the History Monks (seen in *Thief of Time*), must make sure that history follows its proper course.

I enjoyed the book thoroughly, as I have the entire Discworld universe. Mr. Pratchett never seems to run out of ideas in his highly varied world. Sam Vimes and the coppers of the watch are some of my favorite characters. With them, Mr. Pratchett has built an excellent series of police procedurals, adapted to humor fantasy. **Randall Whitlock**

Wondrous Beginnings Edited By Stephen H. Silver and Martin H. Greenberg DAW, Approx. 316 pages, PB \$6.99

Wondrous Beginnings, a DAW January 2003 mass market paperback, is a Wonderful collection of first Science Fiction publications by well known authors in the field. Most authors, Orson Scott Card, for example, wrote stories almost exactly like their later output.. Others like Barry Malzberg wrote stories quite unlike their later efforts.

Stephen H. Silver provides a wonderful introduction to the book. He compares the Launch of an author's career to the launch of ships through history, the Vasa, The Shuttle Columbia and the HMS Beagle. He holds the unspectacular launch of the Beagle to be very like that of a new author for much time passed before the Beagle achieved fame. He draws the distinction between first publication and first sale. Some authors have sold up to two stories only to have their third sale actually achieve print first. That is their first publication.

Take note of L. Sprague de Camp's "Isolinguals" for it has been reprinted only once before. It may be new to many fans. It contains themes which de Camp re-visited in "A Gun for Aristotle" and "Lest Darkness Fall."

The stories are all readable. Most are excellent. The book includes an introduction by the author if he or she is still with us. If the author is unavailable, someone close to the author writes it. In the back of the book are mini-bios of all contributors.

Authors included are Murray Leinster, Ann McCaffrey, Hal Clement, Arthur C. Clarke, Gene Wolfe, George R.R. Martin, Howard Waldrop, Jack McDevitt, Jerry Oltion, Lois McMaster Bujold, Stephen Baxter, Catherine Asaro, Michael A. Burstein and Julie E. Czerneda.

The book is fascinating for the capsule of insight it gives into the history and

Cold Streets By P.N. Elrod Ace Books, Approx. 316 pages, PB \$6.99

Cold Streets, an Ace Books January 2003 mass market paperback, is a Gritty Detective novel set in Depression Era Chicago at the Lady Crymsym Night Club. Our Detective/Nightclub owner is one Jack Fleming, a Vampire. The book evokes all the wonderful imagery of the period's night life, all the action and suspense of the period Detective novel and all the horror associated with Vampires and the supernatural.

Jack combines his two vocations well. The action is continuous throughout. Our detective gets no break. He solves a kidnaping, resolves personnel problems at the Nightclub, confronts the New York Mob representatives and on and on. The action carries you from start to finish. You can't put the thing down.

The characters are well drawn. The Bohemian performers at the club are especially satisfying. Bobbi Smythe, the nightclub singer/girlfriend, Adelle, the former silent screen star(now in clubs and on radio), Faustine Petrova (Russian Ballerina), Myrna (the dead barmaid) and others. The gangsters are believable. The brutal kidnapper, Dugan is villain anyone would love to hate.

Angelica by Sharon Shinn ACE, 496 pages, \$23.95

Over two hundred years ago the god Jovah brought the people to Samaria and enjoined them to live in harmony. For two hundred years the Angels, city dwellers and the nomads have tried to follow the strictures of god. They gave up all technology to prevent the development of the weapons. They hold the Gathering each year so that all the different people could meet and mix.

All was well until suddenly small groups of people started to be incinerated. How was it being done? Who was doing it? How could the people protect themselves? No one knows and everyone is afraid.

Angelica is a return to the world of Samaria, home of the Archangel trilogy. A rich and well textured world, interesting and likable characters, and the masterful interweaving of the two suspense filled plot lines makes Angelica an excellent novel. Sharon Shinn's newest novel is a welcome addition to my library and I would recommend it as a good fantasy novel. The press release that came with this book claims that it is "A rich fantasy with crossover appeal to romance readers." The Other Wind by Ursula K. Le Guin Ace Trade Paperback, 273 pp, \$13.95

The Other Wind is a continuation of the Earthsea series and is the first new Earthsea novel in over a decade. Alder, a maker, fears sleep because of dreams of his deceased wife reaching out to him across the wall that divides the living from the dead. He realizes that the dead want him to free them from the prison of not being reborn. He seeks advice from Ged, the former archmage, who, in turn sends him to the king to organize the mages to deal with the incipient change. The dragons are now returning, enraged that their contract with humankind has been broken. Alder must remake the world, free the dead to be reborn, and the dragons to return to the other wind.

Like any work of Le Guin's, *the Other Wind* speaks to us on many levels, not only the relationship of man to magic, to power, and materialism, but to the very meaning of life and death. Is it a tome where philosophy is argued to death and the reader to sleep? Or is it a tale that holds your interest and carries the reader to the conclusion with quiet passion. Obviously the latter, but with depth in passing that makes one think, and dream. This is a must have for anyone who loved the Earthsea series. If you haven't read them, you'll want to go back and do so. Writing this pure, and truthful demands it. In a five star rating system it deserves a 10. - **Pam Allan**

The Sword of the Land by Noel-Anne Brennan ACE, 368 pages, \$6.99

Princess Rilsin is eight years old and her world is being turned upside down. Her cousins the Milisin's have staged a coup and now her whole family is being slaughtered in a civil war. The last surviving Becha she is spared the fate of the rest of her family and is raised in the Milisin household. She is oath bound and trained to become her cousins first minister. But as they grow it becomes obvious that her cousin is not fit to rule. What can Rilsin do? The very land sings in her blood calling out to her for help, but she is oath bound to support her cousin. How can she heal the land? How can she help the people? How can justice be restored?

sword and sorcery novel. It has a well constructed story line, interesting characters and a distinct "Arthurian" flavor. This is not a gore soaked hack and slash. It is a realistic moral dilemma where Rilsin has the hard task of choosing the "least bad" of her many very bad options. This book was enjoyable to read and I would recommend it to all. -**William B. Whitmore**

The Speed of Dark by Elizabeth Moon Ballantine Books, 340 pp, \$23.95

The Speed of Dark is a departure from Elizabeth Moon's usual excellent science fiction although it takes place in the future. Lou Arrendale was born to reap the benefits of a medical science where genetic defects can be removed at birth. As one of a small group of high functioning autistic adults, he is a productive worker with a pharmaceutical company defining fractal patterns into programs, a talent inherent in the very defect that defines his autism. He has friends, a car, and a passion for fencing. He lives a contented, low key, independent life and tries to be as normal as possible. A new manager comes in and wants to remove all the supports necessary to employ the autistic workers, despite their high productivity. He wants them to take an experimental treatment

that may reverse the effect of autism in adults. He wants them to be just like everyone else. "Normal" [whatever that is] Lou must decide if he wants to take the treatment and if he does who will he be. Will he lose the way he views the world, and the very essence of who he is.

This a brilliant book, provocative, told poignantly through the eyes and mind of an autistic person as he struggles to define his identity and the act of changing into the unknown person he might become. Well written, and thoughtful, its theme is universal. It is also a darn good read. I recommend it highly to all those readers in need of something beyond space opera. - **Pam Allan**

Redshift edited by Al Sarrantonio ROC, 665 pages, \$7.99

Redshift is the best collection of short stories I have ever read. The Theme of this collection is "extreme visions of speculative fiction" and Mr. Sarrantonio has collected 30 new stories for this book. With authors ranging from Michael Moorcock to Ursula K. Le Guin to Joyce Carol Oates this book covers a wide range of writing styles. In On K2 with Kanakaredes by Dan Simmons we go mountain climbing in the Himalayas with a friendly alien. 

Musty Tomes

Wild Cards edited by George R.R. Martin Bantam, 408 pp \$14.00, oversized softcover, I-Books

Wild Cards was originally published in 1986. Recently, these treasures have been reissued in the softcover oversized paperback. This is the very first book of what looks like an infinite series. Martin teamed up with a group of writers to produce what has been termed a "mosaic" book. Essentially, it is a novel composed of short, interrelated stories written by different writers. What is remarkable is how seamless the stories are and difficult it can be to determine where one writer left off and the next began.

In 1946, a group of aliens decided to test out a new virus on Earth before using it on their own planet. One of their own argued against the ethic of it and tried to stop them. He was not successful. The virus was released over New York City. And the world was never the same.

The virus opened up the human mind and caused changes - really dramatic changes in many. It caused death to many more. The ones that lived had to learn to live with those changes. Some of the changes were beneficial, even miraculous. Some were horrible beyond belief making monsters of the victim. Others were relatively mild and innocuous. But it seemed random chance that defined the degree. A turn of the cards, so to speak. And so the ones who benefitted were named Aces and the less fortunate were Jokers. The Aces became Super-Heroes and the Jokers were relegated to a ghetto.

And so we are introduced to Dr. Tachyon, the alien prince who tried to stop the experiment and Croyd Crenson, the Sleeper, whose wild card changes every time he falls asleep so he tries not to sleep for as long as possible. We also meet The Turtle, a mysterious man who flies inside a metal shell and becomes a great hero only to fall into disrepute. There was Golden Boy who was a real Superman and poor Blythe, also named "Brain Trust" who took people's memories and abilities. And as the series progresses chronologically, so do the players. These are absolutely wonderful and addicting stories. If you have never found them before, take advantage of these new issues to get acquainted. Anyone who has ever loved comic books and heroes will find these stories irresistible.- Catherine Book
