The New Harry Potter Book - Harry Potter and the Order of the Phoenix

Harry Potter and the Order of the Phoenix, by J.K. Rowling, the fifth in the best-selling series has been scheduled for release on Saturday, June 21, 2003. Look for a lot of bookstores to have special sales starting at midnight for those who can't wait until the morning. Following is a preview of the book from the publisher:



SF Tube Talk

TV News & Previews By Lee Whiteside

This time we've got info on what we'll see on the broadcast networks this fall in the way of new and returning shows plus lots of info on the new shows starting this summer on the cable networks.

At press time, the broadcast networks just finished their annual up front presentations to advertisers announcing their plans for the fall. Fans of several shows had to wait until these presentations to find out if their favorite show was coming back or not. Here's a rundown of what's new and returning next season.

The WB will be bringing back Smallville, Charmed, and Angel and adding two new partially genre shows to their mix. They will be moving Smallville to Wednesday nights at 8 pm ET/PT, 7 pm CT/MT and keeping *Angel* in the second hour of prime time on Wednesday. Charmed will stay in it's current time slot on Sunday nights. The new shows with some genre elements will be Tarzan and Jane on Sunday nights following Charmed and Fearless on Tuesday nights following The Gilmore Girls. Fearless will also get repeats on Sunday night leading off their Easy View repeat block at 5 pm ET/ PT, 4 pm MT/CT and the WB will air episodes from the first two seasons of $\it Small ville$ in the 7 pm ET/PT, 6 pm CT/MT time slot as Smallville: Beginnings.

From the WB Press Release: "Tarzan and Jane" This thrilling, contemporary twist on the timeless legend of Tarzan turns the popular tale into an urban adventure, an intriguing mystery and, most of all, an unconventional love story. From the day two decades ago that young John Clayton's parents died and left him alone in the African jungle, he was raised by apes and has emerged as the fearless Tarzan (newcomer Travis Fimmel). Captured by his billionaire uncle, Richard Clayton (Mitch Pileggi, "The X-Files"), the CEO of powerful Greystoke Industries, Tarzan is returned, against his will, to his family's home - New York City. Resisting captivity, he escapes into the concrete jungle of New York City where he encounters the strong-willed NYPD detective Jane Porter (stage actress Sarah Wayne Callies). Jane's perfectly ordered life is turned upside-down by Tarzan's dangerous yet profoundly untainted morality. Romantically involved with another member of the force, Detective Michael Foster (Johnny Messner, "Tears of the Sun"), Jane is left to choose between reason and instinct, civilization and pure humanity, her head and her heart. Miguel A. Nunez, Jr. ("Juwanna Mann") and Sarah-Jane Potts ("Felicity") also star. "Tarzan and Jane" is from executive producers Laura Ziskin ("Spider-Man," 'Pretty Woman"), David Gerber ("The Lost Battalion"), P.K. Simonds ("Party of Five," "Beauty and The Beast"), writer/ co-executive producer Eric Kripke ("Truly Committed") and director/

executive producer **David Nutter** ("**Smallville**," "**Without A Trace**") for Warner Bros. Television Production Inc.

"Fearless" This youthful ensemble crime drama uncovers the FBI's best-kept secret: an elite Special Investigations Unit (SIU) staffed with the finest young agents to infiltrate and apprehend society's dangerous new class of young criminals. Born with a genetic defect, 23-year-old agent Gaia (Rachael Leigh Cook, "She's All That") lacks one of the most basic human instincts: fear. While her partners Ryan (Eric Balfour, "24," "Six Feet Under") and Harmony (Bianca Lawson, "Dawson's Creek," "Save The Last Dance") suspect she has a secret, they have no choice but to trust her. Whether her rare mutation is an important asset or a deadly liability for the unit remains to be seen. Ian Somerhalder ("The Rules of Attraction," "Young Americans") and Erich Anderson ("Unfaithful," "Felicity") also star. Fearless is from executive producers Jerry Bruckheimer ("Black Hawk Down," "Pearl Harbor"), Jonathan Littman ("CSI," "Without a Trace"), Jeremy Littman ("Law & Order," "Strong Medicine"), Vincent Ngo and Evan Charnov for Jerry Bruckheimer Television and Warner Bros. Television Production Inc.

As for Angel, the season finale set things up for the new season with Angel and crew taking over Wolfram and Hart. As expected, Charisma Carpenter will not be returning as a regular cast member and her character Cordelia Chase will either remain in a coma or make occasional guest appearances once she recovers. Joining the show as a regular will be James Marsters as Spike. How he will fit into the new setup is unknown, especially following the Buffy finale, but it should be interesting. The door is also open for other Buffy characters to turn up on the show as well. Joss Whedon has said he will be devoting more time to the show now that it is the only one he has on the air and other writers will come over from Buffy as well. According to co-creator David Greenwalt, the new setup with Wolfram and Hart will

not always be a smooth relationship. "Obviously, they wish to corrupt all our people," Greenwalt said in a zap2it.com interview, "and all of our people wish not to be corrupted. Some of them will be corrupted, some of them won't be. Gunn is going to become the coolest. You'll be seeing him in beautiful suits. And you know, Fred has never had money and a car and a place of her own before, so she's going to be living a little wilder than ever. Lorne is in heaven, because he gets to talk to Michael Jackson and all the entertainment people. Angel has got eyes (cont'd on page 5)

Movie News By Lee Whiteside

It's the all comic movie news report (since that's pretty much all of the genre movies with any recent news) this issue!

In pre-production with filming set to start this summer is "Son of the Mask", a sequel to "The Mask". Jim Carrey, the star of the original movie, will not be involved this time. It will focus on the mask of Loki and will pass through several hands in the movie, not just one central character. In negotiations to play one of these, a struggling cartoonist who is coping with fatherhood, is Jamie Kennedy (The Jamie Kennedy Experiment) plus Alan Cumming (X2) is likely to be playing Loki.

X2 opened to gangbuster box office, taking in \$150 million domestically in the first ten days. In an interview with production designer Guy Dyas on countingdown.com, he revealed a bit about what we can expect for X3. He indicated that The Beast and Colossus will likely turn up in the next movie in major roles and that the X-Men Danger Room will likely be used, having been designed for the second movie but was cut from it. Look for X3 in the summer of 2005.

As expected, *The Matrix: Reloaded* opened to record breaking numbers, taking in the highest ever Thursday opening day amount with \$42 million and an opening weekend take of \$92 million in the US, giving the movie a total of \$134 for it's four day opening weekend. By mid-week it was already close to catching up to X2, which slowed down considerably and was at \$176 million after it's first three weekends. And that is just the start for *The Matrix*. June 3 sees the release to home video of the animated short film collection Animatrix, which features nine anime films from 7 of the world's leading Anime directors that provides a visionary fusion of CG-Animatrion and Japanese Anime. The shorts are all tied into the world of the Matrix, some of which have

been previewed online and in theatres. But, that's still not all for *The Matrix: Reloaded*. On June 6th, a IMAX version of the movie will debut on more than 35 IMAX screens across the country and in November, *Matrix: Revolutions* will open at IMAX theatres the same day it opens in regular theatres.. Unlike *Attack of the Clones* or *Apollo 13*, which had to be shortened to two hours, this will be a full length version of the movie on the giant screen. IMAX technology now allows longer movies and they won't have to shorten the *Matrix* movies to make them fit into a time limitation

According to a Marvel press conference, a Fantastic Four movie is on the fast track to be out in November of 2004. Marvel chief Ava Arad has indicated that he would like to see George Clooney in the role of Reed Richards and that serious negotiations and in progress with the actor. Directing the movie looks to be Peyton Reed (Bring It On), who indicated in one interview that they don't have a script ready to film yet and that **Mark Frost** is currently working on a draft. Also in the works for 2004 for Marvel are *Iron* Fist, directed by Steve Carr and starring Ray Parks as a martial artist who "fights evil with his consummate fighting skill backed with the ability to strike with a punch of superhuman force", The Punisher, starring Thomas Jane (Dreamcatcher) and directed by first-time director Jonathan Hensleigh, and Blade 3

bringing back **Wesley Snipes** for the third go at the vampire hunter role.

Of course there is also *Spiderman II*, bringing back **Tobey Maguire** as Peter Parker, **Kirsten Dunst** as Mary Jane Watson and featuring **Alfred Molina** as Dr. Otto Octavius aka Dr. Octopus. According to a report in the Los Angeles Times, **Maguire** at one point was dismissed from the movie due to back problems following his role as a jockey in "*Seabiscuit*". According to the report, **Macquire** assumed that they would work

the *Spiderman* filming schedule around his needs, allowing him time to heal before he had to do anything he couldn't handle. The producers and the studio didn't think that way and planned to go ahead without him and get a new actor, Jake Gyllenhaal. Macquire blames himself for miscommunication that made the situation worse. Macquire got support from Universal chief Ron Meyer (who is the father of **Macquire's** girlfriend) in encouraging him to fight for the role and also helping with dealing with the Columbia chief Amy Pascal. Producer Joel Silver helped Macquire arrange for a doctor (who also treated Keanu Reeves on the first *Matrix* movie) to review the movie storyboards with a stunt coordinator showing that *Macquire* could handle the job. Following a physical exam and harness tests, *Maguire* was back on the movie, albeit a bit more humble following his experience.

In the continuing *Superman* movie saga, director **Brett Ratner** did end up leaving the project and Warner Bros. is now looking for another director (and still looking for a super actor). Latest rumors are that **McG** (*Charlie's Angels*) and **Jonathan Frakes** are being considered for the directing job. In other DC movie news, *Wonder Woman* has a new screenwriter in **Philip Levens**, who has been writing for the *Smallville* TV series.

Filming starts in June for the fourth movie based on The Crow, called "The Crow: Wicked Prayer". Edward Furlong plays ex-con Jimmy Cuervo who is murdered along with his girlfriend, Lily (Emmanuelle Chriqui), by Luc Crash (David Boreanaz) and his satanic gang, Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse, as part of a ritual for Crash to become an immortal demon. Cuervo comes back as The Crow to avenge their deaths.

Movie Previews for June and July While June is a bit slow for new genre releases, July is one of the busiest genre months in a long time. Check the calendar for the scheduled release dates. open, always looking for the screwing, but meanwhile, they can use the full faith of Wolfram & Hart to help the people they need to help."

UPN has dropped *The Twilight Zone* in favor of *Jake 2.0*, which will take over the 9 pm ET/PT, 8 pm CT/MT slot that *Twilight Zone* spent last season in. The network is also expanding their comedy block so *Jake 2.0* is the only new drama on the network.

From the UPN Press release on Jake 2.0: "Jake 2.0" stars Christopher Gorham ("Felicity") as Jake Foley, a computer technician who is transformed into a secret agent for the National Security Agency (NSA) after he is accidentally infected with nanites based on the real life, beyond-state-of-the-art nanotechnology that reduces the size of a computer to the molecular level. Upon the discovery of his new mind-boggling powers, he begins to operate at an atomic level -- possessing superhuman strength, lightning-fast speed, heightened hearing, magnified vision and the telepathic abilities to communicate with computers. The NSA soon realizes he is an untested asset and forms a Special Ops team with him at its core. *Jake 2.0* also features Jake's love interest, Congressional staffer Sarah Heywood (Marina Black, "Six Feet Under"); Jake's roommate Darin (Matt Czuchry, "Young Americans"); senior agent Kyle Duarte (Philip Anthony-Rodriguez); senior agent Louise Beckett (Judith Scott, "C.S.I.: Crime Scene Investigation"), and research doctor Diane Hughes (Keegan Connor Tracy, "Final Destination 2"). Jake 2.0 is produced by Roundtable Entertainment in association with Viacom Productions, Inc. Executive producers are **Gina Matthews** ("What Women Want"), Grant Scharbo ("Deep Core") and Silvio Horta ("The Chronicle").

The season finale of *Enterprise* has set things up for a new direction for the series with Archer and crew taking off into The Delphic Expanse with a refitted ship in order to protect Earth from the alien menace, the Xinti, introduced in the finale. According to Scott Bakula "...the idea of this peaceful exploration that we took off with is changed forever." In one interview from **Rick Berman**, he indicated "I think our final episode of the season is going to be quite startling because we're going to do a cliffhanger that will put a new twist on the series as it enters its third year. ...we're not talking about a tiny change. We're talking about a change that is going to, to some degree, alter our mission and, to some degree, change the tone of the series. We're going to be dealing with some new, non-Starfleet people coming on the ship [who will] add a little muscle for the potentially violent situations our crew will be coming up against."

ABC is regrouping after their failures with their new genre dramas last season (*Push, Nevada, Dinotopia, Veritas: The Quest* and *Miracles* all went down in short order) and they will not have any new genre shows on their fall schedule. For midseason, they do have *Stephen King's*

Kingdom Hospital which will likely begin airing January. From the ABC press release: Using the Danish miniseries "Riget" (a.k.a. "The Kingdom") as a point of inspiration, master of horror Stephen King gives this story a unique and menacing American touch. **King** himself describes it as "ER" crossed with "The Shining." Kingdom is a hospital whose bizarre population includes a brilliant surgeon who lives in the basement, a nearly blind security guard and a nurse who regularly faints at the sight of blood. But when patients and staff hear the voice of a girl crying through the halls and a patient destined for life as a paraplegic miraculously recovers, they are dismissive of any suggestion of mysticism or unseen powers... at their own peril.

Returning for its third season will be *Alias*, sticking to its current Sunday night time slot. It appears to be upping the genre element with the season finale seeing the completion of the Rambaldi machine by Sloane but no revelation on what it does. However, the ending with Sydney awakening two years in the future has some fans speculating that time travel is involved. We're going to have to wait until September for any answers.

NBC, as usual, has no genre shows on tap, sticking with their comedies and Law and Order franchise. CBS has one genre related show in Joan of Arcadia, a modern day Joan of Arc, that will air Friday nights at 8 pm ET/PT, 7 pm CT/MT. CBS describes it as "Not your typical family show. Not your typical family. Will Girardi (Joe Mantegna) is the new police chief of Arcadia, California. Helen (Mary Steenburgen), his smart, tough wife, is trying to get their 19-year-old son Kevin (Jason Ritter), who was disabled in a car wreck a year earlier, to take an interest in life again. Luke (Michael Welch), their other son, is a nerdy 15-year-old who thinks he has it all figured out. And Joan (Amber Tamblyn), their 16-year-old daughter, is a typical teenager oblivious to her treacherous surroundings. But family life in the Girardi household has just become a bit more complicated: God has decided to talk to Joan. And that's not something a teenager wants to handle. Joan of Arcadia traces the overlapping lives of the Girardis as it focuses on the family's evolution and on Joan's now even more interesting journey toward womanhood. God help her. God help the

FOX is coasting on the success of their reality series and has a slew of new dramas for this season, cancelling *Firefly* (with three episodes unaired), *John Doe*, and *Futurama* (although they still have around eight episodes left they will likely burn off this summer).

For the fall, they will introduce *Tru Calling* starring *Eliza Dushku* (Faith on *Buffy the Vampire Slayer*) on Thursdays at 8 pm ET/PT, 7 pm CT/MT. Squaring off against the final season of *Friends* on NBC may not be the smartest move, but if FOX sticks with the show, it might have a chance to get an audience. For midseason, FOX plans *Wonderfalls* and *Still Life*. From the FOX press release on these new shows:

Tru Calling - What would you do if you could relive a day? If you're Tru Davies (Eliza Dushku "Buffy the Vampire Slayer"), you'd save lives. Tru is a smart, sexy recent college graduate who - when her high-powered medical internship falls through - finds herself working the midnight shift at the New York City morgue. One night, Tru questions reality when she thinks she hears a beautiful murder victim asking for her help. But the next morning, our heroine wakes up to find that she is back at the beginning of that very same day – twelve hours before a murder that only she knows about is set to take place. With the broadcast season over with, the cable channels start picking up the slack in the genre series. June sees the start of Season Seven of *Stargate SG-1* and the return of *Tremors: The Series* from hiatus on the SciFi Channel as well as the debut of Showtime's *Dead Like Me*. July sees the continuation of the second season of *The Dead Zone* and possible the start of season two of *Jeremiah*.

SciFi's new Friday lineup of Tremors: The Series, Scare Tactics and Cleopatra 2525 didn't hold up very well once the broadcast networks started their sweeps. With sagging ratings, SciFi quickly pulled *Tremors* and *Cleopatra 2525*, bringing back repeats of *Stargate SG-1*'s sixth season, but leaving Scare Tactics on. They also moved up *Roar* two hours on Wednesday night. In June and early July, **Roar** will be airing the remaining episodes of the series that were never broadcast in the US in its original run on FOX. Tremors will return to the channel on June 20th, moving to the 8 pm ET/PT time slot preceding Stargate SG-1.

Stargate SG-1 season seven starts in full force on SciFi Channel on June 13th. SciFi will start of the night with a one hour Stargate SG-1: The Lowdown special which will recap the events of the last couple of seasons to get viewers ready for the new season which sees the return of Michael Shanks as Daniel Jackson which was set up in the season Six finale. Following the special, SciFi will air the first two episodes of the season that night with Fallen and Homecoming where SG-1 discovers Daniel Jackson alive and living on an alien world, with no memory of who he is and then they return to Jonas Quinn's home world where they discover the Gou'ald are after its naquadria. In Fragile Balance (an episode that has been in the works for a couple of seasons),

a teenage boy shows up at the SGC claiming to be Jack O'Neill -- while the real colonel has gone missing. In Orpheus, Teal'c and SG-1 must risk everything to rescue his son and his mentor from a Jaffa prison. In Revisions, the team gates to a climate-controlled environment amidst a toxic wasteland, whose people are all linked to a central computer. Lifeboat sees Daniel's mind taken over by disembodied crew members when SG-1 finds a crashed alien space ship. Space Race has SG-1 help an alien spacecraft compete in a race, but they soon learn that there may be more at stake than the finish line. In Avenger 2.0, an SGC scientist creates a computer virus to be used to disable enemy Stargates -- but succeeds in shutting down the entire gate network.

SciFi has announced a big development slate with several dramas and reality shows in the works for next year and beyond. The most likely series to make it to air is Stargate: Atlantis, which would follow on from the end of Stargate: **SG-1** where a secret base left by the originators of the Stargate is found in the most unlikely of places-on Earth buried within the ruins of the legendary civilization Atlantis. The implications of this discovery lead the team to a distant universe, where they find a primitive human civilization threatened by a sinister new enemy. Other series in development include Dead Lawyers where sleazy lawyers come back from the dead to defend those they screwed over; The Divide, about a late night radio psychic, his dead twin sister, and the local coroner team up to fight crime; Legion, about a man who sells his soul to the devil to save his daughter's life and discovers the price he pays is to leave his family and travel the earth destroying the minions of darkness, and perhaps free himself from eternal damnation; Painkiller Jane, about a marine officer who is exposed to a biochemical weapon that changes her genetically, endowing her with incredible self-healing powers; Suture Girl, based on a *Spawn* character that is a beautiful former advertising executive that after being violently murdered by a serial killer is literally stitched back to life and imbued with special powers by a mysterious gypsy woman.

Miniseries in the works include a four hour remake of "The Thing" and "6 Days 'til Sunday", a six hour series in which J.T. Neumeyer stumbles upon a mysterious briefcase foretelling his own gruesome murder -- in just six days. Movies in the works include Dragon Storm, Idaho Creature Incident, Ghost Monkey, Snakehead Terror, Phantom Force, Gargoyle, and Interceptor Force III. I think the names say enough for these Saturday night action movies. Also in development is a slew of reality type shows with an unreal twist.

Mad Mad House puts a group of diverse individuals (A Trekkie, a Vampire, a Zen Master, a witch, and others) into a Real World type house where "Joe Normal" people are brought in to live with

them and compete for prizes. *Life on Mars* will simulate a group of two colonies of people living on Mars with them competing with each other for survival. Other series include *Lab Rats* (using humans as Lab Rats), *Psychic Investigators* (real-life psychics investigating crimes), and a *Halloween Illusionist Special*.

Movies coming up on SciFi in June and July include *Encrypt* (June 14) where a former Army captain mounts a

Showtime has scheduled *Dead Like* Me for Friday nights at 11 pm starting on June 27th. From creator **Bryan Fuller** ("Star Trek: Voyager," "Carrie") comes this comically offbeat original series about Georgia "George" Lass (Ellen Muth), a disaffected teenager who's surprised to discover that an afterlife really exists after she's struck and killed by a piece of the MIR space station that hurtles to Earth. There, she finds that she's been assigned to be a "reaper," delivering souls to their eternal reward under the watchful eye of her by-the book boss Rube (Mandy **Patinkin**). Other reapers are Betty (Rebecca Gayheart) who is a "bubbly and oft-times bubble headed beauty", Roxie (Jasmine Guy), a "no-nonsense reaper who moonlights as a meter maid to pick up extra cash", and Mason (Callum Blue), a "regular guy who attempts to help George in her transition." George must learn to cope with her new life, adjusting to all the

problems and anxieties of a young woman on her own, albeit "undead", and learning more about life now than when she was

For those of you wanting to see the final six episodes of Odyssey 5, Showtime has still not scheduled them and may never air them at this point. It is possible they may air in July, but Showtime has not made any announcements. July is likely (although, again, no official announcement has been made by Showtime) to see the return of Jeremiah for its second season on Showtime, possibly paired up with Dead Like Me. As the second season starts, Jeremiah, Markus and Erin are still being held captive at Valhalla Sector. Jeremiah spends some surprising time with his father, Devon, and is shown around by Devon's assistant Libby (Joanne Kelly). Kurdy is still free but being hunted and he meets up with a mysterious stranger, Mr. Smith (Sean Astin - Sam in Lord of the Rings) who has some cryptic messages for Kurdy. Kurdy must work with Chen Lee, Theo, and Markus's secret love Meaghan to rescue Jeremiah and the others from Valhalla Sector. Expect a lot of twists and turns in the second season as J. Michael Straczynski has written the bulk of the episodes with the departure of Sam Egan after the first season.

Cartoon Network will debut The Teen Titans on July 19th at 9 pm ET/PT. As previously announced, the show will feature Robin, Cyborg, Starfire, Beast Boy (aka Changeling) and Raven. The show will be geared towards a younger audience than Justice League and will feature standalone half hour episodes. According to Cartoon Network Senior VP of animation, Sam Register, they wanted a show that would appeal to the younger kids that may not get Samauri Jack and Justice League. The main continuing villain will be Slade, who is based on the comics character Deathstroke: The Terminator. Also causing problems for the teens will be Dr. Light, Thunder and Lightning, Gizmo, Mammoth and Jinx plus a couple of new creations, Cinder Block and Mumbo. The show will be earth based (initial reports indicated they would be fighting an alien menace) and will be set in a fictional West Coast city that's "San Francisco meets San Diego meets Los Angeles" and won't deal with the grown-up superheroes in the DC universe, although Aqualad will make an appearance. The animation will show more of an Anime influence that other recent Warner Bros. superhero efforts.

Debuting on June 26 on Spike TV (the new name for the former TNN) will be a new adult animation block called "The Strip" at 10 pm ET/PT Thursdays. Leading off the block will be the "Ren and Stimpy Adult Party Cartoon" with all new episodes produced by Ren & Stimpy creator John Kricfalusi. Expect things to be even grosser than the original run of the series on Nick at Night. Next at 10:30 pm is Garv The Rat. in which Kelsev **Grammar** ("*Frasier*") stars as the voice of Gary Andrews, a New York attorney who is so unscrupulous and immoral that he wakes up one morning to discover that he's turned into a six-foot rat. Until he

figures out a way to change back, he must contend with being a human sized rat and having to function in the human world. At 11:30 pm will be Stripperella, created by Stan Lee and starring Pamela Anderson, who provides the voice and moves for Erotica Jones, a stripper by night and the superhero Stripperella by later night. Filling out the block will be the original episodes of Ren & Stimpy, airing uncut and digitally remastered.

In the way of industry news, the **Jim Henson** company has finally been sold by the German firm EM-TV. After speculation that Disney, Saban or other media companies would buy what remained of the studio (EM-TV had sold off many of the companies rights), it ended up being Jim Henson's heirs, Brian Henson and his four siblings, that bought the studio back from EM-TV for \$78 million. They had originally sold the company for \$680 million in 2000 on promises that they would have the backing to do more with their Muppet Characters and develop other projects. As it turned out, EM-TV didn't deliver on any promises and pretty much sold off a lot of the valuable assets of the company, including the Sesame Street characters and . Henson does still have the rights to The Muppets, The Muppet Babies, The Fraggles, The Hoobs, Farscape and Bear in the Big Blue House plus the Henson Creature Shop. With their dad's company now back under their full control, Brian Henson plans to work on returning the Muppets to



a successful franchise, following on the success of their *A Very Muppet Christmas* movie on NBC last year. What this means to the future of *Farscape* is unknown, but **Henson** has always been a big supporter of the show and will likely work on bringing it back in some form now that they have control of the purse strings.

Vivendi Universal has indicated they are definitely wanting to sell of their entertainment assets, which include SciFi Channel, USA Network and Universal Television. There are many possible new owners, including **Marvin Davis**, Viacom (who would like to have a Science Fiction Channel they can run *Star Trek* and their other genre properties on), and **Barry Diller**. Look for a deal with someone to be announced within the next month or two.

Just like *Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone*, this is a great transfer. The wizarding world of Harry Potter is as real and believable on the small screen as it is on the silver screen. Depth, texture, and detail all shine in this conversion to DVD.

Harry Potter and the Chamber of Secrets - Audio

When viewing the film in Dolby Digital 5.1 sound it was very good, overall. Action scenes take full advantage of the 5.1 range and depth, especially scenes like the Whomping Willow attack and Battle with the Basilisk very appealing to me. The rear channels didn't seem to get much use except during the action sequences,

making over use of the front channels for a great deal of the film. The John Williams score is mixed well without inappropriate stressing of unimportant elements. Well done!

Harry Potter and the Chamber of Secrets – Extras

I don't know how much longer the producers of the Harry Potter series of DVD's can hope to keep the sets at just two discs. In the Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone DVD set, (HPatSS from here on in) seven deleted scenes were available (after a bit of puzzle solving) and in Harry Potter and the Chamber of Secrets DVD set, (HPatCoS after this) there are nineteen deleted or extended scenes available at the touch of a remote button. In HPatSS you can poke about (in a limited way) in several locations at Hogwarts such as the Great Hall, the Library, the Gryffindor Common Room, Harry's Room, and areas of Diagon Alley, such as Ollivanders, Eeylops Owl Emporium, and Gringotts Bank. In the HPatCoS DVD set you get to explore Dumbledore's Office, the Chamber of Secrets, and check out areas of Diagon Alley that were never shown in the film. You can also preview six scenes from the EA Games demo, see trailers from both films, creep into the Chamber of Secrets, escape from the spiders in the Forbidden Forest, create a slide show in Colin's Darkroom, enjoy the many faces of that Renaissance Man, Gilderoy Lockhart, watch an exclusive interview with author, J.K. Rowling and screenwriter, Steve Kloves, and share humorous and interesting moments with the cast as they reveal background information about their characters and secrets of the making of the film.

There also a DVD-ROM segment on the 2nd Disc, but it crashed my computer so many times that I gave up trying to use it, so here's the summery of what's available; "15 special features including: The One VoiceDVD technology will allow users to navigate through the DVD-ROM features and access set top features using only their voices; an animated, interactive Hogwarts timeline; a slider puzzle challenge; printable magic trading cards; jigsaw puzzles, matching challenges, downloadable screensavers and more".

Harry Potter and the Chamber of Secrets – Conclusion

Without having to set up the World of Harry Potter, the scriptwriter is able to bring the viewer into the action quicker and with greater ease. The darker tone to this film will engage older viewers without overly disturbing younger viewers. The things that I would most like to see are a more cohesive way of adding back in the deleted and expanded scenes, adding director and cast commentaries, and cross referencing the background materials and interviews, similar to what was done with the *X-Men* 1.5 DVD, almost like creating a pre-Directors Cut. That would be magic indeed!

Graham **Masterton** could not attend at the last minute because of his wife's health. Not surprisingly, lots of folks were disappointed and some even demanded a refund. Go figure.

Robert W. Walker, Simon Wood. Because my own mother-in-law wasn't feeling well enough to travel she and my wife stayed home while I went to KC on my own. I took a non-stop flight on Southwest Airlines for about 2.5 hours and arrived in the early afternoon on Wednesday. The hotel had an airport shuttle, so I called them for a pickup. I waited about 10 minutes before the vehicle arrived, then only a few more minutes down the freeway to the hotel. The nice woman who checked me in was my focal point throughout the weekend for any questions I had and was quite pleasant, as were the rest of the hotel staff. Since my roommate, a fellow World Horror Society board member, wasn't due to arrive until Thursday morning, I commandeered one of the beds, unpacked my clothes into one drawer of the dresser, zipped through the television channels to get an idea of what the hotel had to offer, did a quick wash-up and headed downstairs to check things out. I was on the 10th floor, one of the

party floors, but wasn't concerned since I sleep deeply.

All of the Hilton's function space is on the first floor. The basement contains offices, fitness center, indoor / outdoor pool and sauna. The function space kind of wraps itself around the restaurant lounge in a U-shape. Pitch Meetings, Film Room and Writers Workshop were up from Café Weatherby and bar. The smoking lobby is in front of the bar while the non-smoking lobby is in front of the front desk. That is mostly the left (north?) half of the first floor. The right (south?) side of the U had Main Programming, Art Show, Dealers Room and more programming. To the right of the turn to DR and Pgm was first floor conference or sleeping rooms for Programming, Green Room and Operations. Hospitality was on the 11th floor with smoking across the hall from non-smoking suites. As the convention transpired most folks found the rooms behind the restaurant to be underutilized and hard to find. Some tables were placed outside Main Programming for Registration and Merchandise Sales. A Voodoo (Message) Board was outside Art Show. Some more tables in a L-shape were near the turn to the Dealers Room or to Con Ops where Worldcons had a presence on Friday and Saturday (Boston in 2004 and KC in 2006 bid). Boston didn't do much other than hand out fliers. KC did quite well in upgrading locals to friend-ofthe-bid status. On Sunday Forrey hung out there to sell some of his stuff and to do autographs.

I didn't spot anyone I knew immediately upon my first sweep, so I visited the restaurant for a late lunch. Since KC is on Central Daylight Time and I am on Mountain Standard Time I was off by 2 hours. So, their 3pm lunch was just about right for me. Traffic was light and I had a quiet lunch, a sandwich and fries, which as acceptable. I found out about the Easter Brunch on Sunday where they were taking reservations already, so I put mine in. 1pm was the earliest I could do it since they were already sold out for the earlier times. I knew there was a WHS board meeting on Sunday from 10am 12noon, so that was just fine. Apparently, they usually hold the brunch in the same room where Main Programming was located, so they planned on holding it in the restaurant and backroom instead.

After lunch I killed some time by watching TV and taking a nap, since I had been up late the night before departure trying to get stuff done. I wandered around in early evening and found Hospitality open. Mike McCain, the fellow I met in Minneapolis selling WHC2003 memberships at World Fantasy 2002, was running it and we had a nice chat. He had put out some frozen smoked meat that the Chair, **Dee Willis**, had smoked personally. I ate some as I was hungry and it was good. Sodas, chips, salsa and alcohol were present. I hung out there for a bit before hitting Con Ops to try to find their Party Coordinator (PC), Tina Black. She had reserved a suite for WHC2004 (Phoenix) for Saturday evening and I had to pay for it along with the ice we allegedly had reserved. Once I connected up with her I was told to give the Treasurer, Ann **Donovan**, the party check. When I asked about the ice she said we hadn't reserved any. I corrected her by saying that I had asked for clarification about the number of bags it would take to fill a bathtub. She apologized, told me, and I selected 3 bags. She agreed to give me the pre-con

discount and put me down. I didn't have to pay for them immediately, so that was good. She gave me the party packet complete with instructions on how things worked and a map on where to shop for food and beverages.

I headed over to Registration and found Ann. I gave her the suite check and she was a happy camper. Her sister who was helping handed me my reg packet and I took it up to the room to go through after selecting 4 free paperback books from a pile from Time-Warner. Unfortunately, I had been given someone else's packet, **Michael Williams** (Tech Crew), so I headed back downstairs to get mine. Someone I spoke to in the elevator was flabbergasted that they could give me someone else's since IDs were required. Well, they thought they knew me. Once I got the correct one I checked it for accuracy. My badge indicated that I was the Grand Master Award Administrator, which I was, and got a few comments throughout the con. Besides the Pocket Program they had inserts from publishers and such along with the Program Book. The cover art was by Nick Smith, of course, and former local (Phoenix) GoH Mitchell Bentley had worked on the PB. Not much else was going on so I had dinner, watched TV and crashed.

My roommate rolled in around 8am on Thursday. We chatted for awhile and then I got up to shower and dress. I tried breakfast downstairs and found a buffet waiting which was fairly good. I strolled down the corridor to see what was open. Dealers Room was kind of open, so I strolled through and found folks still setting up. Dealers on the map showed Catalyst Press, W. Paul Ganley, Medium Rare Books, Offworld Designs, Darren Floyd, Meisha Merlin Publishing (involved with putting out local Adam Niswander's horror novels), Yard Dog Press, Otto Filip, Borderland Books, Weird Tales, Edge Books, Lone Wolf, Necro Publications, Marietta Publishing, Alan Clark, Hathaway Studios, MudCat Studios, Pegasus Publishing and some individual bookstores and people. One, **Dave Kaufman**, was selling New Age music by former band members of Tangerine Dream, etc. I bought one from him later in the weekend.

Art Show was pretty much set up with wire frames in either squares or rectangles, much like ChiCon 2000 had at Worldcon, except they draped black velvet behind the wire for contrast. The room could have used more light, but everyone had room to wander and not hit anything. I noticed in the Pocket Program that their Video Room opened at 5pm with Schlock. Later in the weekend they offered *Vampirella*, *Amazon Women on the Moon, The Howling*, *Return of the Living Dead II*, etc. These were shown multiple times during the weekend. Several had to do with folks attending the convention.

Main programming started at 4pm with Roundtable Real Live Chat, Are There Any Taboos Left?, Creating Fiction From Fact and a Reading. Readings occurred every 30 minutes all weekend. Next came Supernatural vs Sociopaths, Crossing Genres, and Opening Ceremonies. Here is where the Mistress of Ceremonies introduced the guests after the Chair introduced her. When she got to Nick Smith he quickly interrupted, said something hard to understand and allegedly witty, and piped down. She just stared at him, threw away her index card

with notes, and said to the audience something like "Well, so much for my notes!" She finished with the rest of the guests and the Vice Chair came up with gift bags for everyone except Quinn. Hers was the GM Award and was on display in the Art Show. That was kind of odd since all guests should be treated equally. I mentioned it to the concom later when they asked what I thought of the con. The theme for KC was Cow-thulu, from H.P. Lovecraft's Cthulhu fame, and that night they had a Casino named after their mascot. Turn Out the Lights finished the evening. I looked for parties and found a couple, but hung out in Hospitality mostly.

Friday brought more interesting stuff. Self Promotion and Marketing, An Hour With Mort Castle, The Long Dark Road Ahead: The Future of Horror, Short Fiction Writing It, Selling It, Reading It. Look What's Happened To Dracula, The Art of Horror, Teenage Angst, Make Your Own Mask Hands-on Workshop, Overlooked Masterpieces of Horror, Learning From the Past, HWA: The Coming Years, Writer's Workshop Section A Part 1 of 2, The Making of 13 Ĥorrors, Don't Stop!, Small Press, An Hour with Forrest J. Ackerman, Reviews: Doing Them, Getting Them, Surviving Them, Urban Fantasy The Next Frontier?, An Hour with Laurell K. Hamilton, Giants of the Genre, Pixels vs Paper, Horror in the Gaming Industry, Just One More Story in a Bucket o' Guts, Hollywood Dreams (or Nightmares, As the Case May Be), How Not To Be A Starving Artist, Mass Autographing and Reception, Morbid Curiosity Open Mic Night, Dance of the Macabre Masked Ball, Flash Fiction Contest and Druid Ritual.

I attended the Artists Reception and found all the wine and cheese gone. Devoured. Ravaged. Fortunately, they had a big container of soft drinks and I found something to sip while wandering the reception. I managed to meet a couple of artists that I had not met before and say hello to a few I did. Later, I noticed that more wine had appeared (and disappeared), but no food left but crackers. So, I hit Hospitality before entering our party suite which just happened to be down the hall from my room. Earlier I had gotten keys for me and **Doreen** so we could begin decorating. We also stored all the party supplies in the corner of my room so we could move them in easily. That we did pre-reception, so at 9pm we opened the doors to anyone interested in hearing about WHC2004 and WFC2004 next year in Phoenix. There was some problem with the party signs downstairs from the hotel, so the con was consolidating them onto a board of sorts, but each other floor had fliers

In Hayao Miyazaki's magical Kiki's Delivery Service, we follow Kiki (voiced by Kirsten Dunst), a 13-year-old girl who leaves her family on the night of a full moon to spend her first year as an apprentice witch on her own. With her trusty cat Jiji (voiced by Phil Hartman) by her side she flies off to find the perfect spot in a faraway city. Once there she is befriended by a bakery owner (voiced by Debbie Reynolds) who helps her start her own business, a high-flying delivery service and Tombo, (voiced byMatthew Lawrence) a boy who dreams one day of flying, struggles with the temporary loss of her magical abilities, and finally gains much in the way of self-confidence

This DVD release contains two discs. Extras include Introduction by John Lasseter, Behind The Microphone - voice talent featurette with Kirsten Dunst and Phil Hartman, Original Japanese trailers and the Complete Japanese story boards. I don't know if the VHS version has any of the extras but it is dubbed in English.

Kiki is one of those wonderful family experiences, a picture that doesn't speak down to kids or up to adults. I throughly enjoyed this film when I received a VHS version for review several years ago. I am so glad it has been released on DVD since the tape finally wore out from being played repeatedly. *****Castle In The Sky Pioneer, 125 mins, G DVD \$29.99, VHS \$19.99

We begin with a chase through a flying ship, with all the passengers going after the young girl, Sheeta (Anna Paquin), a young princess. She jumps overboard to avoid capture and is rescued by her powerful crystal necklace which floats her down to safety in the legendary skykingdom of Laputa. She is rescued by Pazu (voice of James Van Der Beek), a young resourceful boy who works in a small mining town. Pazu and Sheeta share the common goal of finding the fabled island of Laputa, the castle in the sky, to fulfill Pazu's dreamquest and learn the secrets of Sheeta's clouded heritage. They team up to outrun the military and a band of pirates. The pirates are led by hard-bitten matriarch Dola (voice of Cloris Leachman), and are a rowdy yet dumb group of brothers who are after Laputa's treasure. The military is led by the evil but civilized Muska (voice of Mark Hamill), who is after Laputa's secret powers to make himself ruler of the world. They all race to get to the abandoned castle of Laputa, which has been overgrown with vines and plant life and whose only inhabitants are animals and the robots who take care of the magical garden. As the three groups converge on the castle Sheeta must discover her past and use her ancient knowledge to save Laputa from destruction

The DVD has 2 discs and the extra features include "Castle in the Sky" introduction by John Lasseter; Complete story boards; Behind the microphone with James Van Der Beek and Cloris Leachman; and the Original Japanese trailers. I don't know if the VHS version has any of the extras but it is dubbed in English.

This, too, is a great family film. I highly recommend this whole set to everyone. - **Stephanie L Bannon**

*****Spirited Away Pioneer, 125 min, 13 up DVD \$29.99, VHS \$19.99

A petulant, ten year old girl, Chihiro (voice by Daveigh Chase) and her greedy parents are on the way to their new home when they enter into an alternate reality. Passingthrough a tunnel they find what they think is a deserted amusement park. Her parents stuff themselves until they turn into pigs, and Chihiro discovers they're trapped in a resort for traditional Japanese gods and spirits. Chihiro is advised by a boy named Haku (Jason Marsden) to request a job from Yubaba (Suzanne Pleshette), the greedy witch who rules the spa. She gets a job as a cleaning girl in a devil-filled onsen (Japanese bath house), where she contends with eightlegged spider-men, gorgeous sky-dragons, and a silent, love-struck wraith and purges a river god suffering from human pollution, rescues the mysterious No-Face, and befriends Yubaba's kindly twin, Zeniba (Pleshette again). The untapped qualities Chihiro discovers within herself (resolve, bravery, and love) keep her from being corrupted by the greed that pervades Yubaba's mini-empire and enables her to aid Haku and save her parents

The DVD extras include: "Spirited Away" introduction by John Lasseter; The art of "Spirited Away"; The Nippon television special - The Making of the Film; Select story board-to-screen comparison; Behind the microphone with Suzanne Pleshette and Jason Marsden; and Original Japanese trailers. The most interesting extra feature is the Nippon Television Special on the making of Spirited Away. The camera crew was allowed to film Hayao Miyazaki at work. It's fascinating to watch the visionary director explaining how individual movements should be animated, and even

performing the little dance the frog-master does to welcome the No-Face to Yubaba's bath house.

***** Treasure Planet Disney, 95 mins, PG DVD \$29.98, VHS \$24.99

The basic story has captivated children and adults for generations. Now Disney has taken *Treasure Island* into space in this animated version.

Jim Hawkins (voice of Joseph Gordon-Levitt) is a young man who has grown up reading tales of pirates and adventures on the high seas. He stumbles upon a dying man who hands him a map and warns him to "Beware the cyborg" shortly before he passes on. It is a treasure map to the fabled Treasure Planet, a distant world where hundreds of space pirates have stashed their loot a distant world where hundreds of space pirates have stashed their loot. Certain this is the adventure he's been dreaming off, Jim and his friend Dr. Doppler (voice of David Hyde Pierce), join the crew of the spaceship R.L.S. Legacy and Captain Amelia (Emma Thompson) as they set out to find the fabled Treasure Planet. He soon becomes close friends with Long John Silver (voice by stage veteran Brian Murray), the cyborg cook of the Legacy who even has an artificial Cuisinart arm. Soon Long John Silver reveals his plans to Jim - plans that include instigating a mutiny and attempting to take control of the ship. When Jim refuses to take part in the mutiny he soon finds himself attempting to defend law and order against a spacecraft full of reckless men.

The DVD extra features include a Visual Commentary, audio commentary, a Family Menu, a Behind-The-Scenes Menu, Deleted Scenes, an Alternate Ending, the RLS Legacy Game, a virtual 3-D tour of the ship including a challenge to the ultimate treasure hunt, Disney's Animated Magic, Behind the scenes with Walt Disney Feature Animation Chairman Roy Disney, DisneyPedia: The Life of A Pirate Revealed, Fun and interesting tales of the age of piracy, a Still Art Galleries, Character Galleries, Animation Featurette, Dimensional Staging, Merging 2D and 3D Worlds, Music Featurette and a Music Video

I missed *Treasure Planet* in the theaters since the trailors weren't all that exciting. All I can cay now is that I'm sorry I didn't go see it and I don't understand why it didn't do better in theaters. This is a wonderfully entertaining version of the Treasure Island story. *** Sailor Moon S: Heart Collection 5 Pioneer, Uncut, 145 min, 13 + DVD \$29.99

This is the fifth DVD of six in the Heart Collection series. Physical features of the DVD are 6 episodes, English and Japanese language versions, and a reversible cover: one side with story summary and features, the other purely pictures. The menu of this DVD focuses on Sailor Mars and the

extras section includes her character bio with an assortment of pictures. The extras section also includes the original Japanese opening without credits.

Evil continues to threaten the earth in the form of a mysterious Silence, alluded to by the outer Sailor Scouts Uranus, Neptune, and Pluto. Meanwhile Rei's premonition of destruction grows stronger and she can nearly make out the face of the figure standing above the ruins of the city, holding a glaive. Slowly pieces are falling into place to reveal who and what the Messiah of Silence is and the Sailor Scout of Destruction: Sailor Saturn.

In spite of the new developments in these six episodes and the series winding to a close, there is a definite lack of suspense. These episodes feel just like all the rest with some plot development thrown in. Sailor Moon has always captured a fun sense of adventure, however, and that is still true here. There's lots more posing, good fighting evil, morals to each episode, and a cute, sitcomish humor. I enjoyed watching this DVD, but more for following the developments in the story and the development of Hotaru's character than being entertained by the plots of each episode. Heart Collection 5 ends leaving you wanting the next and last DVD to find out how everything comes together. - Jennifer

**** Magical Girl Pretty Sammy Pioneer, 325 mins, 13+ DVD \$44.99

In Magical Girl Pretty Sammy, Sasami meets a strange lady named Tsunami. Tsunami tells Sasami that she has been chosen to be a Magical Girl. Sasami, now as the new Magical Girl, faces love-love-monsters, crazed computer nerds and weird green blobs. To top it off, Sasami must face a mysterious rival named Pixy Misa, who serves Ramia, a Tsunami rival in ruling the Magical World. Amazingly enough, Pixy Misa is Sasami's best friend, Misaou.

* Sorcerer On The Rocks ADV, 60 mins, 15 up DVD \$24.98

This is a stand alone story set in the same world as the hit fantasy series *Sorcerer Hunters* but from what I am told there is no similarity between the two.

Sorcerer On The Rocks is the story of an abusive sorcerer, Shibas Scotch, who hunts down other sorcerers for money, a bounty hunter in other words. He is accompanied, well actually served, by Kiss, a werewolf elf girl, Genmi, a junior warrior with a crush on Shibas, and the curvaceous "Sister of the Gold Cross" Gin Fizz, a nun (who wants to redeem him).

The characters are not particularly likeable, the relationship of Shibas to the girls is nothing but abusive. While the animation is superb the plot, if there is one, is just an excuse for a lot of T&A and the ending leaves one feeling that this was a pilot for a series that was mercifully not made. *Sorcerer On The Rocks* is rated 15

up for nudity, violence, violence against women, sexual humor, alcohol and tobacco use. It will certainly appeal to 15 year old boys (and those who haven't grown past that age). Even the Hunt game seems geared to juvenile male interest with belching males and girls in baths encountered on the path to slay to the monster. The rest of us would do better to go out and buy *Sorcerer Hunters* and give this one a pass.

The Costume Closet



Facepainting and Costuming By John T. Wheeler

As people have seen over the last two years, facepainting and bodypainting can be very valuable tools in costuming. They help to accentuate the transformation from a "normal" person into something exotic and totally different. That is what I do as a Facepainter, I transform people. I make them "not me".

You can completely transform yourself with makeup to be virtually unrecognizable, to be someone or something else. Even when you look in a mirror, you don't see you. That will help with the role of the character in the costume because "you" are not there anymore.

Think of it this way. Take the tiger lady I did at the Sunspree for a CopperCon.

That was 90% paint in the effect, with a sheer swimsuit to hide the naughty bits. But it was a "wow" piece, so people told me at the time.

It was inexpensive as well: One palette of orange, one palette of black, one palette of white, two "sealers" to prevent sweat from ruining it, and that was it. The palettes, which were used completely, were \$16 each. I don't know about the swimsuit, it wasn't mine. The point is that a costume like that was less than \$100 total

You can make it even simpler. Last year's CopperCon masquerade winner (a visual parody combining "Attack of the Clones" and "The Dukes of Hazzard" - Ed) included "Daisy Dooku," done with a \$6 palette of Lime Green and a sponge. The costume costs were not incurred by me, but my partners said they were inexpensive. The point again was that we got a bigger effect by using inexpensive face paints. Would the Twi'lek Daisy have looked as good without it?

You too can take your costume to a new level with facepainting and bodypainting, and it's not that hard. The brands I recommend you try out, because everyone has their favorites: Snazaroo (which I use), Mehron (I like them too), and Fardel. Ben Nye is more of a theatrical makeup, but has its uses mostly for Hollywood-type stuff.

There are only a couple of places to get this stuff in town. Easley's (5th & McDowell, Phoenix) is by far the biggest.



Mardi Gras Costumes (McDonald & Granite Reef, Scottsdale) is the other. I order a lot from the manufacturers, directly off their websites.

Facepainting and bodypainting can be very useful tools in the transformation of a costume design from something plain into "wow" with little expense in cash, but more expense in time. Additionally, it's fun. That's why I am a Facepainter: because people pay me to have fun.

In Our Book

Nebula Awards Showcase 2003 Edited by Nancy Kress ROC trade paperback, 231 pp., \$14.95

The cover sums it up well: the year's best science fiction and fantasy chosen by the Science Fiction Writers of America. We get a novella by Jack Williamson, novelettes by Kelly Link and James Patrick Kelly, and short stories by Severna Park and Mike Resnick. The excerpt from Catherine Asaro's novel 'The Quantum Rose' breaks off at a point guaranteed to send you to the bookstore if only to look up the next sentence. Part of her Skolian Empire series, the story combines gothic romance with science fiction. It starts with the royal heroine's unwilling marriage to a mysterious stranger whose face is always covered. In their wedding carriage, "she brushed the hood back from his head and nearly screamed." Hey, it really is science fiction. Besides stories, we have short essays surveying every subgenre, lists of nominees and past award winners, and an informative introduction and Betty Ballantine appreciation. Only six stories is too few to be a representative anthology. This isn't that, it's the best of the best. -Michael Griffin

Demontech: Onslaught By David Sherman Del Rey N.Y. 2002 Paperback \$6.99 &

Imagine a dimension close-by to ours where magic is strong. Imagine also an evil ruler who wishes to conquer his world. He has his magicians cast about looking for books which give him an edge. What do they get a complete set of U.S. Army Technical Manuals. The magicians set to work to figure out how to use magic to get the devices in the manuals to work. Thus: Demontech.

Imagine a second much smaller country with its Magicians casting about looking for something, anything to counter this menace. They conjure and conjure and suddenly there appears before them a United States Marine Corps Gunnery Sargent in full ceremonial regalia. He becomes Lord Gunny and creates the Frangerian Marines. His book, "Lord Gunny Says" becomes the Bible and Training Manual for the Corps. Every Grunt has a copy.

Our story concerns two Grunts, isolated from their units in a far country who must face the hated enemy in impossible numbers and somehow survive. Haft and Spinner must form a Corps of their own. They do it almost accidentally as they acquire allies along the way, some of them encumbrances, some of them helpful. They are just Grunts. Gradually they learn and grow into the leaders they must be. They acquire

Fletcher, an Archer, golden Alyline, a Dancer, Xundoe, a Demontech Magician and many others. These became the Corps they learn to lead. It might not have been what Lord Gunny planned but it was effective.

Additionally romance rears its ugly head making difficult the lives of Spinner and Haft. Between Alyline and Doli, Maid Primrose and Maid Marigold, not to mention Zweepee, their lives are complicated indeed.

Our heroes fare northward seeking a port that can take them back to Frangeria. They are still on this trek at the end of book Two with the enemy in hot pursuit.

I recommend this to anyone who likes Military fiction and is willing to slog through a number of volumes before reaching the end of a very long novel. Personally I love it.—Gary Swaty

Operation Roswell by Kevin D. Randle \$25.95, TOR, 432 pp

This is yet another attempt to convince us that "the truth is out there." The author is "an authority on alien abduction" and is now trying to offer another spin on what really happened in 1947. The twist, and I admit it is new, is that an over-zealous Army General actually shot down the craft that crashed in Roswell. The ramifications of this action are hinted at but never really explored. It might have made a more interesting story

had the author done so. Instead, we follow an Air Force fighter pilot who is tasked to escort the remaining live alien from Roswell to a secure facility in Nevada. Most of the story is very standard fare and there are few surprises. Besides the spin behind the reason for the crash, the author introduces one other new idea that is made from whole cloth. I was hoping for a more thoughtful exploration of the "facts" that most UFO adherents believe, crafted into an entertaining story. What I got was a juvenile-level stock UFO monster story. There is no character development, very short chapters (3 to 5 pages) and an annoying tendency of the author to use the exact same word over and over and over again. All his characters "grin" and they do so in every chapter; they don't smile in varying degrees nor do they ever frown. The only facial expression he allows them is grinning. I found this extremely tedious and strongly suspect that no editor ever actually finished this book. Unfortunately, I did finish the book; mostly because it took no actual thought to do so.- Catherine Book

The story is told well in de Lint's wondrous simple prose. The illustrations are elegant. The book is a wonder and a delight, an object of marvelous beauty. - - Gary Swaty

Deathstalker Legacy by Simon R. Green ROC, 472 pages, \$23.95

The Paragons are the finest protectors of law and order in the universe, and Finn Durandal was the finest of all Paragons. If you don't believe me just ask his publicity agents, they will tell you it's truly true. But when Lewis Deathstalker is named King's Champion Finn Durandal is out raged and only the overthrow of the king will do for revenge. And so starts Deathstalker legacy by Simon R. Green. Set in the Deathstalker universe but two hundred years after the Deathstalker trilogy Deathstalker Legacy is a stand alone first book of a new set of characters. Its to bad Mr. Green could not come up with a new story to go with them. As in the first trilogy you get an improbably amoral sociopath as the villain, a young idealistic youth falsely accused of capital offenses forced to run for his life while trying to save the galaxy at the same time, and a Quest for a mythical individual out of history who can miraculously save the day. Sound familiar? If you have read the first three Deathstalker books it should. While I found Deathstalker Legacy mildly enjoyable my advise to anyone who wants to get it is to wait for it to come out in paperback. Lacking new ideas or plot twists this book is just not worth the \$23.95 that they want for it. -William B. Whitmore

Guardian of the PromiseMerlin's Descendants #4 by Irene Radford \$24.95, DAW, 544 pages

This book starts with the latest generation of the descendants of Merlin as teenagers. Eager to prove themselves each sets out in a different way to claim the title of Pendragon. Deirdre, daughter of Griffin and Roanna, goes off to Paris to combat werewolves, while Donovan's daughter Betsy seeks the heritage through the power of blood magic. Hal, Donovan's son, has the hardest battle for he fights the beast within us all. Who will prove worthy of the title of Pendragon?

Set in Elizabethan England just prior to the sailing of the Spanish Armada this book is a delight to read. Ms. Radford is an excellent storyteller who brings this turbulent time to life in a way modern readers can truly enjoy. The characters are believable, the plot is well thought out, and the action sequences well written. This book is a fitting end to a good series. While I enjoyed this book, strong sexual content may offend some readers. - William B. Whitmore

The Long Hot Summoning by Tanya Huff Daw, 413 pp, \$6.99

The Long Hot Summoning is the third book of The Keeper's Chronicles.

Diana Hansen has finally graduated....from high school, and can get on with life. Diana is a Keeper with the ability to reweave possibilities of time and space to keep the balance between the forces of Light and Darkness. So who would guess that her first summoning would land her in the shopping mall from Hell with her trusty sidekick Sam, now a cat..formerly an angel. When she calls in her sister Claire, and her cat Austin [always a cat] for reinforcements, they find a lot more than they expected in the "otherside' mall. Toss in a reviving evil mummy, and her bewitched archeologist, an archeological intern who belongs in Scooby Doo, Buffy the Vampire Slayer injokes, Arthur, the Eternal king, with a round table of street kids turning into elves. You have the wildest graduation party-cum -war in any malls history.

This is a rollicking romp combining urban fantasy and action you will really enjoy. - Pam Allan

Bitter Waters by Wen Spencer Roc, 308 pp, \$6.99

Bitter Waters is the third in the Ukiah Oregon series.

Ukiah Oregon is unique. He has accelerated senses. Raised by wolves, domesticated by two women, and trained by a private investigator as detective and

tracker. And that's the normal part of his life. With his alien senses, he is brought in to help police on a series of kidnappings, but that brings him to the attention of a rogue agent from Homeland Security and the Temple of New Reason, who kidnap his son. Not fully recovered from the last time he was killed, He will get killed again as he pursues his son, and tries to save the world...again.

The story is a good blend of action, science fiction and mystery. The pace is fast and engrossing the characters are well rounded. It is a real page turner and hard to put down. It's a keeper. - **Pam Allan.**

The Eyes Of God by John Marco Daw, 779 pp, \$6.99

The Eyes Of God stands alone. Although not shown as series, a future hardcover's title suggests it is a spin off or second in a series. Akeela, the young king of Liiria, has made peace with the enemies in a war that had gone on for years. He is given the daughter of the other king in marriage. Cassandra is beautiful and accomplished. And Akeela falls in love. He assigns Lukien, his foster brother and the champion of Liiria to bring his bride to him, and to be her protector. They fall in love, betray Akeela, and are found out and revealed by a jealous knight. [shades of King Arthur] Cassandra develops a deadly illness and Lukien is sent to a mythical kingdom to get a magical amulet to save her life. He gets it, but kills the wife of the owner. As a result the cure carries a curse: the person saved will live, but no human eyes may look upon her. Lukien is then banished. Sixteen years later, Lukien returns to Liiria and the kingdom of Akeela the Mad to rescue Cassandra and warn the Jadori of an oncoming invasion. The matching amulet is found to be in the fairy tale kingdom Of Grimhold. Akeela wants it. Cassandra. fears that a gentle people will be wiped out. She dies, but Lukien rides to warn the Jadori and Grimhold of the invasion. He will protect what he may. He

is joined by Baron Glass and a clubfooted and handed library apprentice who, unknowingly, is a signed member of Grimhold.

This is a complex, multi-layered book with unexpected twists and turns. The characters are three dimensional rife with flaws, desires and dreams. The military aspects are well handled, the virtues and failings well defined. This is a keeper, even if the thought of one more Arthurian volume engenders the need for Maalox. Buy it...it is a darn good read. - Pam Allan
