# Harkins Debuts New Cine Capri With Charlie's Angels & Star Wars

In January 1998 The old Cine Capri went down with Titanic, a big blockbuster with an epic story, and in June 2003 the new Cine Capri debuted with Charlie's Angels 2: Full Throttle, a fast paced, titillating action adventure. Part of the Scottsdale 101 Multiplex at Scottsdale Road and the Loop 101, **Dan Harkins** opened the doors on the new Cine Capri theatre with two charity screenings that raised almost \$50,000 total. Wednesday, June 25th, was a \$50 a ticket charity screening benefitting the Scottsdale Foundation for the Handicapped. For this screening, they had an advance screening of the new Charlie's Angels movie. The real opening for most fans was the next night, a charity screening of Star Wars: The Special Edition that benefitted the Child Crisis Center in Mesa. While those tickets were only \$8, Harkins also donated the money they collected from attendees towards the charity (the June 25th screening saw free refreshments for attendees).

Both nights saw **Dan Harkins** address the full theatre, thanking them for their support in trying to save the original theatre and acknowledge the efforts everyone put in with petitions. During the opening weekend, 15,000 numbered commemorative tickets were handed out to moviegoers, each containing a swatch of

the original theatre's gold curtains. **Harkins** gave ticket #1 to fan ?????, who spearheaded the "Save the Cine Capri" drive and also saw *Star Wars* there over 100 times back in its original run. Garnering ticket #2 was **Pat McMahon**, who was the most notable local celebrity to help with the campaign. Outside of the new theatre in the lobby is a Cine Capri Museum with artifacts and memorabilia from the original theatre and a video reel with interviews and news clips on the original theatre.

So, the real question is, does the theatre live up to the name and memories of the old theatre? Yes, and No. Yes, it has a big screen (slightly bigger and brighter than the original), a dynamite sound system (144 speakers in total), and the gold curtains that open and close around the movie. It also has stadium seating instead of the very gently sloping seating of the original (which was always a problem for kids and short people) and can seat around 600 people. It doesn't seem as big as the original one, which was very spacious with it's large circular auditorium, and being part of a multiplex makes it seem more like the biggest box in the complex, even though it is a pretty nice bix box. Based on the reactions of the early crowds at the charity screenings

## TV News & Previews By Lee Whiteside

We've got the final stretch of the summer season upon us with the dawn of a new fall season on the horizon this time. We've got a new approach for *Enterprise*, lots of new genre shows that might even last more than a couple of episodes, even more *Stargate* in the future, and the second season of *Jeremiah* finally hitting our screens. Throw in some details on the *Battlestar Galactica* mini-series and even some rumors of a *Farscape* resurrection and we've got a full plate this issue.

First of all, we're in the last few weeks of new episodes for cable favorites *Stargate SG-1* and *The Dead Zone* as well as the continuing adventures of Reaper George on Showtime's *Dead Like Me*.

Leading things off is Stargate SG-1, which has been making the SciFi Channel very happy on Friday nights this summer, especially with the return of Michael Shanks as team member Daniel Jackson. Corrin Nemic's Jonas Quinn departed in one piece, so we may yet see him again. The big news is that SciFi and MGM like how well the show is doing that they have committed to an eighth season of Stargate SG-1 and are also moving ahead with the spinoff series Stargate: Atlantis, which may start airing next year along with SG-1 Season Eight. We've got only a few episodes left this summer before the long wait until January, unfortunately. In August look for Avenger 2.0 where an SGC scientist (Patrick McKenna as Jay Felger from last season's "The Other Guys") creates a virus that can shut down a stargate and inadvertently shuts down the entire gate network. Next is Birthright (a Christopher Judge script) has the SG-1 team find a fugitive colony of Jaffa women, who must prey on other Jaffa to acquire symbiotes. Enterprise's Jolene Baylock guest stars as Ishta, the Jaffa temple priestess who gets friendly with Teal'c. Ending the summer season is the first half of the two parter Evolution where Dr. Jackson is taken hostage when he goes in search of an alien device in South America. O'Neill is sent to rescue him, while Carter and Teal'c investigate the appearance of a powerful new enemy. To be concluded in January, most likely. Things to look forward two next year include the two part episode "Heroes" which both Don S. Davis (General Hammond) and Amanda Tapping (Sgt. Carter) indicated at ComicCon was now their pick for best episode of the entire series. In it, a film crew arrives to document the work of the S.G.C., but may capture more than they planned for when SG-1 is called into action. Ending the season and likely setting up the Stargate: Atlantis spinoff will be the two part episode "The Lost City" that has Anubis launching an assault on Earth while SG-1 frantically tries to find the Lost City of the Ancients to have more powerful weapons to fight Anubis with.

Elsewhere on SciFi, *Tremors* has ended its run of original episodes and likely is not being renewed for a second season, although they have reportedly filmed a *Tremors 4* movie along with the series run that will likely turn up on home video in the future. SciFi did renew *Scare Tactics* for a full season of 22 episodes so there will be a few more episodes airing into September. Coming up in the way of original movies on SciFi are ....

The Dead Zone is finishing up it's brief Summer Seven run and will await word from USA Network on if it has been picked up for a third season. The last two episodes of the run are The Combination where Johnny goes public with his vision that a heavyweight contender will be killed in an upcoming fight. All that does is make it into the biggest pay-per-view event of the year. In the season finale Visions, Johnny sets out to discover the secret of a mysterious man who appears to be stalking him, only to discover he has a lifechanging message for him. Hopefully there will be a third season for Johnny to follow on from the likely cliff-hanger ending. Stay Tuned.

SciFi Channel movies over the next couple of months include *Deep Shock* (Aug 9th) in which David Keith and Simmone Mackinnon take on a massive electric eel when their arctic oil drilling team unearths a slimy menace, Absalon (Aug 23rd) has Christopher Lambert as a detective in a near future Earth that is menaced by a disease brought on by the destruction of the rain forests. A scientist who's cure for the disease, Absalon, is murdered and Lambert must take on the evil duo of Ron Perlman and Lou Diamond Philips to preserve the cure. In the last new SciFi movie for the summer, Antonio Sabato Jr. and Angie Everhart star in Bugs (Sept 6). Giant, mutant bugs take over a city's subway tunnels, eating

through any human who crosses their paths! A city engineer teams with a biologist to exterminate the insect problem — but can they finish the job before the queen breeds a new batch?

Over on Showtime, **Dead Like Me** has gotten off to a good start, capturing fans with it's quirky and unique look at death and the afterlife. Featuring **Ellen Muth** as George, a slacker teen who becomes a Grim Reaper and has to work part time to

support herself at Happy Time while keeping her appointments with other people's deaths. It's 15 episode run will continue into September. Upcoming episodes include "Reaper Madness" in which George has her first affair in the afterlife with a living schizophrenic whose disease allows him to see her true form, "Sunday Mornings" where George saves Charlotte from suicide and becomes fast friends only to discover that Charlotte is having an affair with George's father, "A Cook" where Rube takes a part time job as chef at Der Waffle Haus, "Business Unfinished" where Rube and Daisy work a scam on a psychic who is charging people for obtaining messages from the afterlife, "The Bicycle Thief" sees George get a bicycle and a full time job, leaving Happy Time, "Nighthawks" where it's the annual Reaper evaluation, "Vacation" where Rube gives the crew a day off following their evaluations, and "Rest in Peace" where George goes back to Happy Time to get her old job back.

Returning to Showtime on Sept 19th for its second season will be *Jeremiah*, starring **Luke Perry** as Jeremiah and **Malcolm Jamal Warner** as Purdy. When we last saw our heroes, Jeremiah had been captured by his father and those in charge



of the Valhalla Sector with Purdy left on his own. For the new season, Jeremiah must deal with his captivity and the fact that Thunder Mountain has been compromised. Joining the cast will be **Sean Astin** (Sam Gamgee in Lord of the Rings) as the mysterious Mr. Smith. According to Astin in a recent interview "He's sort of an unwitting prophet or a fool. I, Sean, was an actor, a vessel, through which [series creator J.] Michael Straczynski could sort of explore his relationship with God. And the character, you know, claims that God is speaking through him. So it was richly rewarding and stimulating to my own spiritual [nature]. ... I loved it. "Astin will appear in 13 of the fifteen episodes and is contracted for eight more if Showtime elects to pick it up for a third season. However, if it does get picked up, series Executive Producer & showrunner J.

Michael Straczynski has indicated he would not return for a third season. In a recent message from Straczynski he said "I have zero desire to return to a third season of Jeremiah. Showtime was great, no mistake, but MGM [which produces the show] has overall been the most heinous, difficult and intrusive studio I've ever worked for. I've worked for, and had great relations with, Viacom, Universal, Warner Brothers and a bunch more. But I will never, ever, work for the present administration at MGM." So, what does this mean for the current season? According to Straczynski "... none of this should be taken as a diss of the coming season. I honestly think that the second season is miles better than our first season. It's more consistent, takes more chances, it's really a very strong season." During his panel at ComicCon, he indicated that in spite of the

problems with MGM, they were pretty much able to do with the series what they wanted to accomplish.

There's more to genre life than just cable, so let's see what the broadcast networks have in store for us at the start of the new season.

First off is UPN, which has been fighting lower ratings for its lone returning drama, Enterprise and sees it going head to head with The WB's Smallville this fall with a new series, Jake 2.0, following it. As we saw in the season finale, Captain Archer and the crew of the Enterprise have a more real and immediate threat to Earth to deal with from the Xindi, which killed millions (Including Trip's sister) in an unprovoked attack (albeit brought on by information from the future that Earth would destroy them). To kick off the new season, the Enterprise is heading into Xindi space with an independent T'Pol wanting to explore her emotions and different outfits and hairdos, a lot of extra marine/security types (Military Assault Command Operations, or MACO) and a new mandate to find the Xindi and prevent any future attacks from happening. At the recent Television Critics Association press tour, Bakula indicated for Archer that "the idea of being the peaceful 'We-come-infriendship' [guy]...that guy is gone."

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SF Tube Talk (Cont'd from page 4) Producer Rick Berman indicated that the temporal cold war and the Suliban definitely haven't gone away and will be an integral part of the Xindi storyline as it develops.

The new season of *Enterprise* will start early on September 10th, getting a three week jump on *Smallville*. Opening episodes for the season will be "*The Xindi*" where six weeks into the Delphic

Expanse, Captain Archer and his crew learn of a Xindi working at a mining colony, and set out to track him down and gain information about the mysterious antagonistic race. We'll meet several types of Xindi aliens, including humanoid, sloth, reptilian and aquatic. In "Anomaly", Enterprise starts experiencing the effects of spatial distortions pervading the Delphic Expanse, and falls victim to predatory aliens taking advantage of the

crippling conditions. "Extinction" sees the appearance of an alien that can take the form of Enterprise crew members and "Enemy Advances" has Archer, Reed and Trip reportedly head into an alien bazaar in search of information on the Xindi and a formula for synthesizing trellium.

Following *Enterprise* and also debuting on September 10th is *Jake 2.0*. The series stars **Christopher Gorham** (*Popular*) as an NSA computer technician

who accidentally gets

injected with nanotechnology which gives him superhuman abilities. Yes, it's been done before and sounds pretty lame, but from watching the pilot, it might be worth watching (assuming you can also watch or tape Angel at the same time). The series was created by Grant Scharbo, Gina Matthews and Silvio Horta, who were also responsible for the underrated The Chronicle, late of the SciFi Channel. Joining them as showrunner is David Greenwalt, who cocreated Angel and also produced ABC's "Miracles". Also joining the staff is veteran genre writer Javier Grillo-Marxuach (Charmed & The Chronicle). With this group of behind the scenes talent, the show definitely has promise. As producer Horta told Zap2it.com, "This relies on whether people like Jake and Jake's journey through life as a superhero, how he grows into one. End of the day, it's Jake on a date with a girl, having to keep his powers under wraps and still kill the guy in the next room." Over on The WB,

Over on The WB, Smallville kicks off its new season on October 1st in it's new time slot picking up several months after the events in the second season finale with a two part season opener set mostly in Metropolis. Clark has been in Metropolis for several months when Lana comes to town looking for him. A new character from the Superman comics, Morgan Edge, head of the Intergang crime syndicate and Clark may be working for him. For more details and up to date spoilers, check out the web site www.kryptonsite.com.

The WB also has "Charmed" returning for its Sixth season on Sept 28 with a two hour opener and has "Tarzan" (formerly "Tarzan and Jane" debuting on October 5th in the following time slot. I've seen the pilot for "Tarzan" and it does a fair job of updating the Tarzan mythos to modern day New York, they have a lot of work to do to keep it from just being a rehash of Beauty and The Beast (expect he's not disfigured and is a real hunk). I hope to have more info on this series next issue. Watch for Mitch Pillegi (X-Files) as Uncle Greystoke who definitely has different ideas on what should be done with his nephew.


Returning for it's fifth season on October 1st on The WB will be *Angel*. Picking up where they left off last season, Angel and company are now in charge of Wolfram and Hart. Things to look for early in the season are Spike's ex girlfriend has turned up in Los Angeles and gets a job at Wolfram and Hart, the entity at the top floor takes a special interest in Gunn, Lorne has all of W & F's employees sing for him, and somehow or another, **James Martsters** joins the series as Spike (or some form thereof).

Over on FOX, the **Eliza Dushku** series *Tru Calling* won't debut until after the World Series on October 30th. How long it will last on Thursday night is unknown. Other debut dates are *Alias* (ABC - Sept



28th), Joan of Arcadia (CBS-Sept 26) and "24" (FOX-Oct 28th). Pushed back to midseason are Fearless (The WB), Wonderfalls (FOX) and "Still Life" with the limited run series "Stephen King's Kingdom Hospital" scheduled for February on ABC.

genre series are Andromeda, Mutant X, She Spies (sort of genre), and Starhunter (as Starhunter 2300) plus the syndicated run of season six of Stargate SG-1. There's not much in the way of details leaked about Andromeda other than the old news that Keith Hamilton Cobbs Tyr Anasazi will not be a regular in the new season (but may make a couple of appearances). Following in the tradition of other Tribune produced series, Mutant X will get an overhaul with it's third season. John Shea (Adam) will only be a "special recurring character" and Lauren Lee Smith (Emma) will not return. Joining returning cast members, Victor Webster (Brennan), Victoria Pratt (Shalimar) and Forbes March (Jesse), will be Karen Cliche as Lexa Pierce, who was the unwitting subject of genetic experimentation gone awry and as a result, has special powers that allow her to manipulate light in amazing ways. According to a Tribune press release "Everything the Mutant X team thought they knew about their world and Sanctuary no longer applies. They learn, both through Lexa and their missions, that they are part of a much larger experiment than their leader, Adam Kane, had led them to believe. Just as the team thinks they're starting to put the pieces of the puzzle together, Lexa makes them realize once again how naive and sheltered they have been. "Those Tribune folks just love to use the reset button.

Starhunter will continue as Starhunter 2300 with Clive Robertson taking on the lead as Travis Montana, with Michael Paré not returning as Dante Montana. Returning will be Tanya Allen as Percy Montana, Murray Melvin as Caravaggio (hologram), and Stephen Marcus as Rudolpho. Also joining the cast is Dawn Stern as Callista Larkadia. Expect more of the same from this low-budget, late-night Canadian import. She Spies looks to continue with their tongue firmly in cheek style of stories and, of course, Stargate *SG-1* season six (the one without Daniel Jackson) is the first season to run in syndication following it airing on basic cable, not pay cable. It will be interesting to see how the show's syndicated ratings hold up this season.

In the news and rumors department.... While the FOX network has given up on *Firefly*, Joss Whedon and Fox Entertainment hasn't. A DVD set of the entire series including the three unaired episodes, bloopers and other features is scheduled for December release. Whedon is also in the process of writing a script for a feature film featuring Captain Mal Reynolds and his crew and there is apparently interest from FOX in making a theatrical movie. Time will if we see the Serenity up on the big screen. We'll definitely have the chance to watch the full series on DVD.

The latest word on *Farscape* is "no comment". That's the official word from

Brian Henson via producer Rick Manning at the recent San Diego ComicCon in response to rumors that a miniseries continuation of *Farscape* was in the works. The Jim Henson Company is in the process of being bought back from the German company EM-TV by **Jim Henson's** kids, headed by **Brian Henson**. They have indicated that once they have control of their own destiny they definitely plan to try to resurrect *Farscape* for television in some manner. There's no

word if SciFi will be involved or if another cable channel is interested. My hunch is that The BBC may be the driving force since the series did very well in the U.K. Once control of the Jim Henson Company is formally transferred in early August, I'd expect some sort of formal announcement about the future of *Farscape*. By the way, SciFi and USA network are currently part of very public auction of Vivendi Universal entertainment assets. Possible future owners of SciFi include Viacom, NBC, MGM and several media moguls. How this will affect the current leadership at SciFi is unknown.

Blake's 7 is in the news of late and may finally see a resurgence. Reports are that a group lead by Paul Darrow (Avon in the series) have bought the rights to the series from creator Terry Nation's widow and are working on arranging financing for a series that would pick things up 25 years after the series ended, with only Avon still around.

Of course, coming up is the 40th Anniversary of the first telecast of **Doctor Who** on the BBC in the U.K. So, will we see new Doctor Who on the television finally? Not this anniversary, unfortunately. The BBC will be doing an official fully animated online series featuring Richard E. **Grant** as the Ninth Doctor. The Scream of the Shalka, written by popular Doctor Who author Paul Cornell, will be a six part adventure

that will be broadcast on the BBC's online BBCi website starting in mid-November. According to **Cornell**, this is a fully approved new incarnation of The Doctor and that is only the beginning. If this does well, expect to see more stories and maybe even a live-action version. There will definitely be new BBC books based on the Ninth Doctor as well.

Finally, it's time for the long awaited (or dreaded depending on your viewpoint) preview of the new *Battlestar Galactica* 

arriving on SciFi Channel in December. This will be a two part, four hour miniseries that will re-imagine the series and is not a continuation of the original series. If it does well, there is a chance SciFi will pick it up as a continuing series. Following an earlier attempt by **Bryan Singer** and **Tom DeSanto** to put together a new version of *Battlestar Galactica* (in addition to **Richard Hatch's** attempts to

revive the series with his own ideas), Universal TV and SciFi went to Ron D. Moore (Star Trek: Deep Space Nine, Roswell) to come up with his own approach to a new version of the series. Moore took the re-imagining approach, taking the basic concept but updating it more to today's expectations of what a science fiction show should be. However, in the process of doing so, some of the changes have been met with a fierce outcry from die-hard Galactica fans.

Taking on the role of Cmdr. William Adama is **Edward James Olmos**. Adama is in charge of the last remaining Battlestar, Galactica, and wants to avenge the deaths of billions of humans but is forced to flee with the remnants of humanity and lead the rag-tag fleet of spaceships to a safe haven away from the Cylons. Leading the remaining humans is President Laura Roslin (Mary McDonnell) who was 43rd in succession to be president and finds herself the new President when she is the highest ranking survivor Adama's son, Lee "Apollo" Adama (Jamie Bamber), is estranged from his father, having blamed him for the death of his brother, Zak. An accomplished viper pilot, Apollo must work to set aside his grudges to work with his father and others to fight the Cylons and save humanity. Now we come to where things start to be a little different

Professor Freeman told me that the presentation is not only for the students of the two colleges, but is open to the community at large. For the community, Kvaran said that Ellison will be speaking at the GCC Student Union Lounge at 12:30 P.M. and Freeman stated that Ellison will be speaking at EMCC in the Community Room at 6:00 P.M. EMCC students will hear Ellison speak at the Center for Teaching and Learning from 9:30 – 11:00



Ellison's speaking engagement. The other academic involved in the project is Hannes Kvaran, GCC faculty member in economics and mathematics. Kvaran's Learning Grant in 1999 brought Ellison back to speak in the Phoenix Metro area for the first time since he served as Guest of Honor at the 1978 World Science Fiction Convention, IguanaCon.

Entitling the talk, "Dreams with Sharp Teeth: Weaving Biting Commentary Into

and two preview screenings (T3 and LXG) in the opening weeks, it is definitely now THE place to see a big action movie. Look for the studios to follow up on that, making sure their big movie is showing in the Cine Capri. There is one thing to look out for that is yet to be unveiled at the new theatre, though, the digital projection system that is installed. None of the initial movies that have screened have been available in that format. Maybe they can put *Finding Nemo* in there later in the summer when things slow down. All in all, the theatre is definitely worth the drive for a big movie.

## Cine Capri Memories by Lee Whiteside

But what about the original Cine Capri theatre at 24th Street and Camelback? The theatre opened in the 1966 with CinemaScope in mind and usually had just two showings a day and even had a dress code. Later it was able to show 70 mm films on its big screen and it was the first local theatre to get Dolby Sound. When the original Star Wars came out, it was the only theatre screening the movie for over a year (well before the days of movies opening on 3,000+ screens nationwide). It had many premiere screenings over the years and special events like the "Sit Long and Prosper" Star Trek movie marathon in 1992, In the late 1980's, the theatre was not kept up as well and was losing business to all the new multiplexes sprouting up. Dan Harkins took over the theatre in 1988 and fixed it up some, but couldn't get a long term lease on the property to commit to a major renovation. As it turned out, the landowners decided to have it torn down for an office complex and despite an emotional public campaign (collecting over 250,000 signatures) to save the theatre, it was shut down in January 1998, with it's final showing being the movie Titanic.

For my Cine Capri memories, I've seen a lot of movies there over the years, always wanting to catch them on the big screen if possible. My first memorable experience was seeing a charity preview screening of The Empire Strikes Back in 1980, getting to see it a day before everyone else. The movie was very impressive in 70 mm on the big screen there. I've waited in line outside the theatre for many other movies on the opening night or weekend, a lot of times going with a large group of friends and saving one of the wide rows in the middle so that we could all sit on the same row. One memorable opening was for *The Lion* **King**, where they had a cage with lions from Out of Africa on display. It became a running joke with some friends to what they would have in a cage for the next big

movie (Trekkies for a Star Trek Movie? Martians for Mars Attacks?). For the final screening of *Titanic*, I went with several friends to pay tribute to the theatre one last time (I hadn't even seen the movie yet). It was sad to see the curtains close for the last time and many people hung around taking pictures and grabbing what pieces they could for souvenirs.

From Michael Sigmon Fallai: "I saw Star Wars here in 1977... I was 12, stood in line in the July afternoon heat to see a matinee show. I saw the restored Lawrence of Arabia back whenever that was. Glorious! The only way to see a David Lean masterpiece. I saw Titanic the final week or so before it closed. Glad I did. Seeing a movie at the Cine Capri was a show. The multi-screen complexes of today are like going to the airport."

From Tom Tuerff: "The Cine Capri was where you went to see movies that were IMPORTANT. My fondest memories: 1. Seeing "Star Wars" in the Cine Capri, before it was STAR WARS. No waiting. It was the summer after my freshman year of college and I honestly was not that excited about seeing it. Then I saw it. WOW. 2. Walking out after the end of "Empire Strikes Back" and revealing to my wife the sudden realization: "Mark my words: Leia's Luke's sister!" I had to wait three years to settle that bet... 3. "Aliens." Big. Huge. Scary. Boo. 4. Last movie I saw at the Cine Capri: Starship Troopers. I remember it was in kinda shabby shape since they knew they were gonna tear it down. I still look for the theatre when I drive past 24th and Camelback. That big black behemoth made a much bigger statement architecturally than that mostlyvacant overpriced office building that's there now. '

From Diane Elliott: ``I saw the Original'

awesome, you should check them out, you'll have a blast) watching the **Kevin** Costner version of the "Robin Hood" legend, \_The Prince of Thieves\_. When Costner's character of Robin Hood appeared on the screen, and this supposedly Middle English dude started talking in a Cornbelt American accent, there was nothing in the world like having 999 people around you, sharing in the laughter. I was in the last crowd of people to ever watch at the Cine Capri, and it was an extremely sad night. The movie was Titanic, fittingly enough; and not just because of the movie's theme. \_Titanic\_ was big and expensive and impressive, and burned itself into the imaginations and culture of the nation. I can think of no more fitting movie to go out on.'


From Shane Shellenbarger: "It's Tuesday, May 24th, 1977 and my luck has taken a turn for the worse. The good side of my luck was winning two passes from a radio station for a sneak preview of some film called "Star Wars", but the bad side of my luck is that I can't get anyone to go with me. Work, prior commitments, general disinterest, and other excuses are all given and they leave me disheartened: who will I discuss the film with if no one will go? Finally, after nine "no's" I get a "yes" from Curt Stubbs, a literary science fiction fan I've worked with on several conventions. 
From John Wheeler: My most abiding memories of the original Cine Capri revolve around Star Trek the most. The time I went to the Star Trek Marathon back in '91 and we all watched the movies back to back. The time when the club was doing a presentation at Star Trek "Generations" and we had Jimmy Doohan on hand to see the movie. The Cine Capri was a throwback to an era in Movie history when it was a more personal feel. Not the 30 screen mega-complex you now have. It reminded me of when I was a younger person. The office complex that now sits where the Cine Capri once was is not progress to me. The Cine Capri was a bit of history. Now it is history. The slick new one is undoubtedly NOT going to be the same. It can't be. Such a shame.

And finally, from Jim Strait: While most people are avarice to be first in line at any movie, the last showing at the Cine Capri was different. The last single great theater. I don't know who the first person in line to see the first showing was those many years ago, but I was the last person in the line for the last showing at the Cine Capri. There were stragglers that wandered in later after me, and possibly a slight 2 or 3 person bottleneck or two later might have occurred, but when the crowd started to move into the theater for the last time, it all ended with me. I got the ticket taker to sign my ticket as such.

Through the years anxious crowds flocked to THE theater of choice to see the new feature that obsessed them. To some one who hasn't felt it, the feeling would be silly. But the rush was always emotional matched to physical as you go through that door into that large lobby. This is it! This is what I've been waiting for, this is THE movie in THE theater here and now.

## I'm Just Wild About Harry / The Trouble With Harry

I, along with about 8.5 million fellow readers, have been patiently (okay, anxiously) awaiting the release of "Harry Potter and the Order of the Phoenix" since I finished the last page of "Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire" in 2000. So what do you do when you want to recreate that feeling of excitement at reading the adventures of characters you've come to love? You reread the books, you listen to the excellent dramatizations of the books by Jim Dale, and you wait.

Fast-forward three years and the day arrived: June 21, 2003. I pre-ordered the book as had about 5 million of you and I realized that I had a problem: vacation. I was flying to Seattle at 7:30 a.m. on Saturday, June 21st. I knew that the book I'd pre-ordered wouldn't arrive until after I was gone and I really, REALLY wanted to read "Harry Potter and the Order of the

Phoenix" while I was on vacation. Did I want to show up at a bookstore at midnight, wait with the masses until my number came up and I'd be allowed to buy the book I'd been waiting three years to read? No, not really. I didn't want to get three hours of sleep, disrupt my wife's sleep, and then be too tired to read the book on the flight. Since I was going on a cruise, I wouldn't have the opportunity to buy a copy of the book except at the airport and I was reluctant to pay \$29.99 plus tax. So now what? There were some grocery stores and a certain big box store that would be open before we headed to the airport so I made some calls and I found that the staff wasn't sure if they had the book, would have the book, or when they would be able to put the book out on display. What now?

Laurie (my wife) suggested we try Osco, Walgreens, or just suck it up and pay full list price IF the book was available at the airport or in one of the gift shops on board the cruise ship. Since we had arrived at Friday and the options were limited, we went with that plan. Saturday arrived; we loaded up the car and headed over to the 24 hour Osco. When the cashier finished with the only other patron in the store, I asked about the book. She thought for a moment and told me to wait. The cashier disappeared into a locked room, and I waited anxiously with Laurie speaking soothing words to calm me down. The cashier reappeared with a rather large blueblack book. How much, I asked? \$19.99 she replied. Sold, I said!

I didn't spend an inordinate amount of my vacation reading "Harry Potter and the Order of the Phoenix", but I did find moments here and there and by the time our plane had landed in Phoenix (Arizona, that is.) I was up to page 679. I finished the remaining 191 pages over the next couple of days and I began to digest what I'd read and I began to form an opinion about the entire Harry Potter series to date.

When I'd finished "Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone," I was quite taken with the young Mr. Potter. Despite great adversity and overwhelming odds, Harry (with some help from his first true friends) overcame his enemies and triumphed. And after I'd read, "Harry Potter and the Chamber of Secrets," I appreciated Harry's loyalty to his friends, his determination to prove Hagrid's innocence, and his bravery while seeking to save Ginny Weasley. In spite of the accusations that were flying around Hogwarts about Harry being the heir of Slytherin, Harry, Ron, Hermione, the Sorting Hat, and Fawkes the Phoenix defeated Tom Riddle aka Lord Voldemort. "Harry Potter and the Prisoner of Azkaban" dealt with darker subjects, blind hatred and prejudice, but it also extolled patience and compassion. By the time of the fourth book, "Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire," J.K. Rowling was writing about death not on a vague or abstract level, but on an immediate and personal level, a pretty weighty subject for a "children's book."

From this point on I'll be writing about material in "Harry Potter and the Order of the Phoenix" that will be considered S\*P\*O\*I\*L\*E\*R\*S!

You have been warned!

Harry is beginning to bug me a bit by this book. Consider all that he has gone through up to this point and you'd think that he'd "get it", "it" being "the bigger picture." Harry subscribes to "The Daily Prophet" but he only scans the headlines and doesn't dig deeper for hidden clues to what Lord Voldemort is up to. He hides in a bush under the Dursley's living room window, but he can't be bothered to read the paper? Harry needles Dudley, but he can't take Dudley commenting about Harry's nightmares about Cedric's death? You'd think that he'd have a bit thicker skin. Hermione, Professor McGonagall, and others warn Harry to tread lightly around Dolores Umbridge, but he doesn't heed them and he gets to "enjoy" two rather gruesome and painful detentions with her. Is his stubbornness to be commended or are his actions more exasperating than laudable? Harry's temper and his inability to curb his tongue make it very easy to believe the misinformation that "The Daily Prophet" is spewing about him being mentally unbalanced. The fate of Sirius will weigh heavy on Harry and I don't believe that we've yet seen him reach his boiling point. Hermione seems to "get it" for most of

the book. She understands that Harry shouldn't be left to stew about being excluded from the information loop by the Order of the Phoenix. She's perceptive enough to understand that Umbridge is Fudge's instrument for spying and manipulation at Hogwarts. She knows how to fight a propaganda war by using Rita Skeeter, she suggests and organizes the formation of the Defense Association. Hermione is smart and has become shrewder in this book then ever before. So why does she throw common sense out the window when she tells the centaurs that she wanted them to drive off Umbridge?

Ron is given the opportunity to move out from Harry's shadow in this book. Being made Prefect and Keeper gives Ron a chance to prove himself TO himself and to build up his self-esteem. He makes many of the same mistakes he's made in previous books and invents a few new ones, but he seems to be on the far side of the stubborn anger that Harry is hitting with a full head of steam.

Despite these qualms and others too numerous to list here, I liked "Harry Potter and the Order of the Phoenix." Granted, I didn't get warm fuzzies when I finished the book, but there were moments that gave me a smile and I know that I'll be right there in some line some where when J.K. Rowling completes the next installment in the adventures of The Boy Who Lived.

In beautiful San Diego, California, July 17th – 20th, 2003, ComicCon International opens to hungry collector, comic book, and cartooning enthusiasts alike. The Exhibitors' Hall is lined wall to wall with new and exciting products. Many exhibitors giving away samples of role playing games, comic books, postcards, posters, books –some are autographed with a wait in line. Raffles and lotteries are being won daily by elated winners. With favorite television, movie, and comic books stars gracing the list of participants and panelists, this year's ComicCon is as breathtaking as it has been in years past.

The highlights for ComicCon are innumerous. Wil Wheaton discussing his nonfiction book in the panel "From Cradle to Keyboard" is motivational. Mr. Wheaton is a quick-witted and fun-loving young man; the panel would not have been the same without his humor. Stargate SG-1 actors Amanda Tapping and Don S. Davis are happily surprised to find a legion of fans awaiting their arrival. Many supporters are patient to wait in line to hear the actors' presentation and the chance to win prizes. Previewing some rough footage, the crowd is happy with their performance and awaiting the release slated for the fall.

## Videophile

The Day The Earth Stood Still Fox Home Video, 92 mins, G VHS \$9.98, DVD \$19.98

The Day the Earth Stood Still is one of the all time classic science fiction movies of all time. The story is simple enough, a spacecraft lands in Washington, D.C., carrying Klaatu,(Michael Rennie)a messenger from another world who has come to warn to the people of Earth to cease their violent behavior. Predictably enough people panic when he lands and a nervous soldier shoots him. Gort, his large robot companion, destroys a few weapons and tanks before the Klaatu can stop him. Collapsing he is taken to a human hospital as world leaders and their armies debate what to do next.

As people worldwide panic Klaatu escapes from the hospital and finds refuge in a boarding house. There he meets a mother Helen (Patricia Neal) and her son Bobby (Billy Gray) and through them he learns about humanity.

This DVD release is to be commended. The movie has been fully restored and the extras are great. The Commentary by director Robert Wise and Nicolas Meyer is wonderful and the 70-Minute "Making the Earth Stand Still" Documentary is full of details. Others extras include the Movietone Newsreel (1951), a Restoration Comparison, 5 Still Galleries, the Shooting Script and the Theatrical Trailer. There are, apparently, no extras on the VHS edition.

This is a classic and should be in every science fiction fan's collection. I can not recommend this highly enough. - **Stephanie L Bannon** 

## The Haunting Warner, 112 mins, G DVD \$19.98

The 1963 version of The Haunting bears virtually no resemblance to the glitzy, special effects filled version released in 1999. Indeed, this version is vastly superior. While both versions are based on Shirley Jackson's novel *The Haunting of Hill House* the Robert Wise version remains one of the greatest haunted house movies I've ever seen.

The movie begins with a voice over that tells us all about Hill House's dark history of death and ghostly possession. Soon four daring guests arrive to investigate. First to arrive is Eleanor Vance (Julie Harris), a shy vulnerable woman who is racked with guilt and grief over the recent death of her mother. She is joined by Theodora (Claire Bloom), who has acute extra-sensory abilities, and Dr. Markway (Richard Johnson), an anthropologist who is conducting a study of the house. The last two arrivals are playboy Luke Sanderson (Russ Tamblyn)

and finally, Markway's jealous and headstrong wife (Lois Maxwell).

The spooky house is anything but welcoming to the visitors and reacts with strange noises (everything from muffled crying to deafening pounding), unexplained writing on the walls, a door that seems to breathe and a spiral staircase that seems to have murder on its mind. And soon it becomes clear that while the house wants the others to leave, it wants Eleanor to become one of its permanent residents.

Filmed in black and white and lacking anything like today's glitzy special effects, this film's growing sense of terror comes from the psychology of the characters and Wises' use of sound, camera angles and the power of suggestion. Much like the shark in the original *Jaws*, what you don't see is much more terrifying than anything a film maker can put on screen.

I am thrilled that this is finally available on DVD. The extras include a commentary by Julie Harris, Claire Bloom, Russ Tamblyn, director Robert Wise, and screenwriter Nelson Gidding as well as Theatrical trailer(s), a stills gallery and a "Things That Go Bump in the Night" essay. This classic is an absolute must for any true fan's collection. - Stephanie L

## The Thing From Another World 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Edition Warner Home Video, 87minutes, NR DVD \$19.98

In our group I have a reputation for loving schlock. To a degree, *The Thing* 

From Another World qualifies with its rather unusual alien (James Arness as sort of a giant carrot) but for its time (1951) this was one of the most influential science fiction movies ever filmed. While it was redone with a bigger budget, bigger stars and spiffy special effects in 1982 this version is still enjoyable as well as being Howard Hawk's lone science fiction film.

The story is familiar, military men are sent to an Arctic research station where scientists have reportedly found a space ship frozen under the ice. The ship blows up when they try to retrieve it but they do manage to save the body of its pilot, which they take back to the research station. When it accidentally thaws the group is faced with a blood thirsty monster

who begins to kill them one by one.

The lack of extras on this 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Edition is disappointing but it is till a must for the serious science fiction fan's collection. - **Stephanie L Bannon** 

## The Omega Man Warner Home Video, 98 mins, PG DVD \$19.98

Continuing this issue's theme of classic science fiction films we come to The Omega Man starring Charlton Heston as the last human left on earth.

The ultimate biological weapon, a deadly plaque, has swept across the world leaving two groups of survivors; a small band of humans who are immune to the plaque and a group of vampires. The infected humans are led by Mathias (Anthony Zerbe) who is a charismatic man set on destroying all the non infected humans on earth. Robert Neville (Charlton Heston) has developed a vaccine while trying to gather the uninfected survivors together. While the uninfected try to protect themselves by night from the growing group of infected plague victims (Check out Rosalind Cash as his Afrohaired, gun toting girl friend) it becomes a race to see if humanity will survive.

The DVD extras include Theatrical trailer(s),an Introduction by screenwriter Joyce H. Carrington, Paul Koslo ("Dutch"), and Eric Laneuville ("Richie"), as well as two featurettes, "The Last Man Alive: The Omega Man", and "Charlton Heston: Science Fiction Legend".

I am a sucker for the end of the world scenarios that were so popular in the 1970's and this is one of my favorites.

While it isn't "great art" it is a fun and thought provoking outing that is a welcome addition to my collection. - **Stephanie L Bannon** 

## Buffy The Vampire Slayer Season 4 Fox, 999 mins, NR DVD \$59.98

This six disc set brings us the complete fourth season of *Buffy the Vampire Slayer*. This 22 episodes of this season took Buffy into new territory, she started college, got a new boyfriend, Riley, went to frat parties, learned her best girl friend Willow was gay, and, oh yes, discovered a secret military project that was experimenting on demons and vampires.

Season four showed that Buffy could not only survive the loss of several main characters (Angel, Cordelia, Wesley) she could get better. This season also brought us the return of Spike (who developed a crush on Buffy), added vengeance demon Anya as a full-time cast member and saw the brief return of Faith. This season also includes the Emmy-nominated "Hush," in which weird "Gentlemen" rob Sunnydale of its collective voice, and, in this nearly dialogue-free episode, Buffy and Riley finally come face to face with each other's hidden identities.

The extras on this set are also impressive with commentary by Joss Whedon on 'Hush' and 'Restless', by Joss Whedon, Marti Noxon, and Seth Green on on 'Wild at Heart', by writer Doug Petrie on 'The Initiative' and 'This Year's Girl' and by Jane Espenson on 'Superstar'. Also included are a Season 4 Overview and the

### Battle Beyond The Stars New Concorde 103 mins, PG VHS \$14.98, DVD \$19.98

This space opera version of *The Seven Samurai* is definitely a B-film complete with cheesy special effects but it is still a fun romp for a lazy Sunday afternoon as Roger Corman delivers clever dialogue (script by John Sayles) and some surprisingly good performances.

Our story finds the evil dictator Sador (John Saxon) threatening the planet of Akira with his super weapon, the Stellar Converter. Akira's pacifist population is unfit to fight Sador but young hero Shad (Richard Thomas) decides to fight back even if no one else will. He borrows the ship of notorious mercenary Zed the

Corsair and goes off to recruit a band of mercenaries, each of whom has a personal reason to join the fight. He manages to hire a lizard-like humanoid (Morgan Woodward), a space cowboy (George Peppard), a zaftig female warrior (Sybil Danning), and brooding killer-for-hire Gelt (Robert Vaughn, reprising his Magnificent Seven role). With its strong cast, script by John Sayles and Roger Corman touch *Battle Beyond the Stars* (including space ships designed by *Titanic* director James Cameron) is a delight for repeat viewers as well as newcomers.

The DVD has been digitally remastered and features commentary by scriptwriter John Sayles and assistant production manager, Gale Anne Hurd (*Terminator 2* producer) as well as theatrical trailers. - **Stephanie L Bannon** 

## Highlander Season One Anchor Bay. NR DVD \$89.95

The first Highlander the film, starring Christopher Lambert as Connor MacLeod hit theaters in 1986. Six years later we got Highlander The Series starring Adrian Paul as Duncan MacLeod, a clansman of Connor. For those unfamiliar with the premise, Highlander (both movies and series) tell the tale of a race of Immortals

who battle one another throughout history. They compete by taking the heads of other Immortals, thus gaining all that Immortal's knowledge and power, with the ultimate goal being to be the last one standing. "There can be only one!"

This set of 9 discs brings us the complete first season, all 22 episodes, in their longer form (48 minutes) which includes footage shown in Europe and Canada but not in syndication here in the USA. Each episode has commentary by producer Bill Panzer as well as "Watcher" notes. Disc 8 includes nearly 20 minutes of Bloopers while disc 9 has all the first season scripts in Flash format. Additionally there is a half hour documentary that was used to promote the series before it debuted in 1992.

This is a must have set for the Highlander fan. While this set was released last year on the Official Highlander site, www.highlander-official.com, reports seem to indicate that the Anchor Bay version is a higher video quality and much less expensive plus it is a more compact package.(With the original Davis/Panzer release apparently all the disks had their own box which made the entire set an most a foot wide, just a touch smaller than the original VHS box set ) In checking the site today I note they are selling the Anchor Bay DVDs now for the stated \$89.95 price.

Season 2 is being released on July 29,

2003, too late for this issue, but it will be reviewed in a future - **Stephanie L Bannon** 

Winnie the Pooh, A Very Merry Pooh Year Disney, 65 mins, G VHS \$22.99, DVD \$29.99

Winnie the Pooh Bear and his pals in the Hundred Acre Wood celebrate Christmas and New Year's Eve in two adventures. In the first one Winnie plays Saint Nick to his friends after he fails to get their wish list off to Santa. In the second story the gang changes identities as Piglet inherits Tigger's hop and Eeyore becomes a cheerful honey lover.

DVD extras include "Covered in Snow" game, "New Year's Eve party countdown, Song selection, Sing Along feature and an Enchanted environment

Joyride Artisan Home Entertainment VHS, \$19.98, 92min, R 1996 release to theatre 2002 release to DVD

This movie was obviously released to DVD after the lead, Tobey Maguire, started becoming well-known. It actually is a better film than I anticipated. Maguire always had the talent we recognize today. The story was rather mundane and trite but I enjoyed it. Maguire is the son of a motel owner, Wilson Cruz is his buddy and Amy Hathaway is a voluptuous young blond whose father is pimping her out of a motel room. Christina Naify is the hit woman who's checked in to do in a local doctor who sexually abused women. Maguire is bored and fatalistic about his prospects for leaving the town. One night while he and Cruz are drinking, the three kids decide to go on a joyride but his

friend's car won't start. Maguire decides that taking the car of that strange woman in room 7 would be a thrill. When they stop later, they discover the body of the local doctor in the trunk with a bullet hole in his head. Now, life has gotten real serious as they contemplate whether to return the car or keep it and what to do about the body. Plus they have to dodge the questions of the local detective who discovers the body after they dump it. There are some enjoyable scenes where Maguire stands up to the hitwoman, simply because it won't make any difference in his life. While I didn't anticipate Naify's solution to all their problems with the law, I did see the end coming even while I enjoyed it. -

## Interview Small Press Creator : Jeff Brown

Welcome back. This is the second small-press creator interview being done in accordance with my February trip to the Alternative Press Expo. Enjoy!

This time around, we're featuring an incredible new talent that cemented a permanent place on my bookshelf with an amazing little book about the exhilaration and desperation of needing someone:

Clumsy. That talent's name is Jeffrey Brown.

Brown is a young man that recently took the independent comics world by storm with his very first published work-the graphic novel **Clumsy**. His debut was so impressive that he was nominated for the prestigious Ignatz Award for Best New Talent; the good guys at Top Shelf jumped at the chance to begin publishing his material at the behest of indy comics superstar James Kochalka Superstar, whose right-on description of the book bears mention:

"...Clumsy is the story of a new relationship and it's stunning in its' realism and honesty. The frailty of the drawn line perfectly matches the human frailty portrayed within the story. It's just so damn human. This is my favorite graphic novel ever. Even if Jeffrey Brown never draws another line again, he has already won a permanent place in my heart. Still, I want more."

The following is an interview with Jeffrey Brown; you'll find his take on art refreshing, his sincerity extraordinary, and room on your own shelf for a book with Jeffrey Brown's name on the binding.

**Brandon Huigens:** Where are you from, and how old are you? Where did you attend college and what did you study?

Jeff Brown: I'm originally from Grand Rapids Michigan, though I've lived in Chicago for about 2½ years now. I'm 27. I first went to a small college in Holland, Michigan, [and earned] an Art Major/ English Minor. Then I sat around in Grand Rapids for 3 years trying to figure out what art was and what I wanted to do with it. I decided to go to The School of the Art Institute of Chicago, thinking I'd become a fine artist, painter type. I finished my MFA there last year, although I stopped painting and started drawing comics halfway through

**BH**: How long have you been creating comics? Are you working at another job?

JB: I've been drawing comics forever, off and on, but always one-panel things, one-page things. Clumsy was the first real comic I drew so I've been doing comics for a couple years. Yeah, there's not much money in comics if you're not doing superhero stuff-I manage the music department of a major book store retail chain store in a Chicago-area suburb (I won't say which chain here, since I don't want to get in trouble if I'm not supposed

to associate them with my comics or something like that).

**BH**: What kind of career goal do you have regarding comics?

*JB*: Hm. I don't think of it as a career. I've always drawn and made art and I think I always will. What I like about comics is that I can communicate with so many people, and I guess one goal I have is to break over into an audience that doesn't normally read comics.

**BH**: Why did you start creating comics? How has the experience been overall?

JB: I started drawing comics because I wasn't happy with my paintings, and the faculty at SAIC didn't like my paintings. I was fed up with what I perceived to be excessive bullshit, posturing, fakeness, etc. in the "art world"...I didn't see much humanity in the work of most artists and somehow, comics suddenly became a way to achieve the most honesty, to be unironic...I wanted to make art that was as human as possible.

**BH**: You've succeeded in that...Your self-published graphic novel **Clumsy** is extremely personal and detailed, and it has a profound effect on your readers. Describe what the book is about and how its' success has affected you both personally and professionally.

**JB**: Clumsy is about celebrating being in a relationship, including the down times but mostly the good times, although we broke up before I finished it, and I just rewrote the 4 pages of breaking up over the phone. It basically describes the relationship and the feelings involved through snippets, fragments of memory, all jumbled up in the way we remember things like relationships. The success has been extremely encouraging in terms of making art, and has been satisfying in how I've been able to affect so many people. It's also helped me make more work-that is, in terms of being able to make more copies of books and getting wider distribution.

**BH**: Do you still talk to Theresa (Jeff's ex-girlfriend that **Clumsy** features) at all? Do you know how she feels about **Clumsy**?

*JB*: Um, we've talked off and on, though off for a while now...ever since she started dating this new guy and I got weirded out because he had been kind of a friend of mine, by coincidence. She liked Clumsy, although sometimes I worry about what she thinks of the attention it's getting.

**BH**: Since you mentioned that you and Theresa broke up before you finished Clumsy, were you going to publish it with a different ending?

*JB*: The only thing that changed was the 4 page story "The End," which was originally something about us seeing a movie together or something, which would've totally changed the whole book, probably. But the stories that follow "The End" were already set.

**BH**: Was it difficult to put those feelings and moments on paper and share them?

JB: It wasn't as hard as you'd think. I've always been a bit of an introvert, so this was kind of a cathartic release to express all this emotion that I had been trying to express in my art before but never quite getting it right. I just put down whatever I thought and felt; it's like-I think Mark Twain said this-you don't have to remember if you tell the truth? So with Clumsy, I was just honest, so I didn't have to edit.

**BH**: Do you ever feel awkward around people that have read the book, knowing so much about your personal experiences?

JB: Sometimes. I try not to think of the book being about me. It also depends on how the reader reacts; the more comfortable they are, the less awkward it is, and I've had friends who didn't want to touch the thing, but my parents and brothers have read it. My oldest brother told my Mom he liked Unlikely (my next book) better because it had less sex in it. And of course, there's so much that's left out in the book, it's misleading to think you know me just from Clumsy...there was more to the relationship than I could show, and there's more to me, and I've changed since then...

**BH**: The book reminds me so much of my own relationships, mostly my first significant one, as I'm sure many people have told you-are you happy so many people can relate, and has anyone said anything about it that's really stuck out in your mind?

*JB*: Yes, I'm both happy and surprised that my own unique experience seems to be so universal...it never ceases to jar me when people pick out some little incident and say that's EXACTLY what they went through.

**BH**: Did you begin your career self-publishing? Do you now have a publisher?

JB: Yes, Clumsy was self-published, and then Top Shelf was distributing it...they've actually taken me on...they're putting out my next book Unlikely this summer and I'm assuming they'll publish more of my projects. I'm also doing stories for different anthologies, some self-published, some from other publishers like Drawn & Quarterly. I do still have other projects I will definitely self-publish...

**BH**: It's amazing that you self-published a graphic novel to begin you career. Have you been nominated for any awards, and have you won any?

**JB**: I was nominated for the Ignatz Award for Promising New Talent last year, but I didn't win.

**BH**: Do you keep a daily comic diary? If so, do you plan on ever putting them into a collection?

**JB**: I don't...so much of my work is like diary anyway, but with a little perspective...

**BH**: What would you like fans to know about you and your comics?

**JB**: Um....I don't know. I'd like the fans to get whatever they can out of my work, and they don't really need to know

anymore than what's there.

**BH**: What's been your best experience in comics?

*JB*: Meeting other cartoonists has been great, especially guys like Chris Ware, but just as much lesser knowns like the other guys on www.theholyconsumption.com...meeting fans has been fun too, and finding out people you've never seen have crushes on you is kind of cool...

**BH**: What are your plans for 2003 as far as comics releases? What do you currently have out?

*JB*: Currently out are **Clumsy** and **IAm Going To Be Small**, which is a collection of gag like funny stuff. Coming out in July is Unlikely, a 256 page book about losing my virginity to my first girlfriend. If I have the money, a limited edition book called **Any Easy Intimacy** will be out this fall, and I do mini comics on a limited basis, usually just for conventions that I go to.

**BH**: Man...Unlikely sounds great! Where on the web can fans find your work, and where can retailers order your books from? Do you have a website?

**JB**: Retailers can go through Diamond or Top Shelf for my major releases; everyone can shop at theholyconsumption.com which showcases my work and 3 other great Chicagoarea cartoonists who have mostly been self-publishing so far. It's a website created by my friend Paul Hornschemeier to sell his comics along with mine, plus those of Anders Nilsen and John Hankiewicz. We're all Chicago area cartoonists, all up and comers, who have mostly self-published so far. It's all about great comics. We rotate weekly with "Sunday Services" which showcases sketches and upcoming projects, and you can buy fun stuff like shirts and things

**BH**: Have you read comics all your life? If so, who've been your influences? Do you have any influences outside of comics that come out in your work (or don't come out)?

JB: Yes, as long as I've been able to read. Influences: Chris Ware, Dan Clowes, Julie Doucet, James Kochalka, Chester Brown, Joe Matt, Moebius, Art Adams, Debbie Dreschler, Adrian Tomine, John Porcellino, um, there's more that I can't think of right now, I'm sure. Outside of comics, David Shrigley, Raymond Pettibon, Egon Schiele, and above all, Charlotte Salomon, who did this incredible work called Life? Or Theatre?

**BH**: James Kochalka has been instrumental in promoting your book, even going as far as helping convince Top Shelf to publish your work. How did you meet James, and how has your guys' relationship been?

**JB**: I just sent him books, and he liked them. I met him at SPX last year, and I did a one page strip for the Free Comic Book Day issue of **Peanut Butter & Jeremy**. We don't keep in touch too often, but I love his work, and he's been a great help in spreading the word about my work.

BH: Where will your next few appear-

ances be?

*JB*: I'll probably be at the San Diego Comic Con in July, and for sure will be at the Wizardworld Chicago in August. I also have plans for an Unlikely release party at Quimby's the last weekend of July...

BH: What's Quimbys?

*JB*: Quimby's is one of the best alternative comics shops in the world and its here in Chicago. Their website is, I think, www.quimbys.com or something obvious like that. Chris Ware did all their signage and they don't really carry any mainstream stuff, plus they carry tons of 'zines and self-published mini comics.

**BH**: What kind of music, movies, and television are you into?

JB: I like cheesy WB shows like 7th Heaven which is hilarious, Dexter's Lab and The Powerpuff girls, Farscape, Ed, Blind Date, Judge Mathis...I watch entirely too much TV. Music, I like indie/alternative rock stuff - yoLaTengo, Low, Elk City, Polyphonic Spree, Cat Power, Built To Spill, Modest Mouse, Elf Power, Microphones...I have over 600 CD's, which is also entirely too many...movies: anything by Wes Anderson, Terry Gilliam, and David Lynch...

**BH**: Pretty nice and developed tastes...a buddy of mine is always talking about Cat Power. So how much time per day do you spend drawing and creating comics?

*JB*: I spend probably an average of 3 hours a day actually drawing, and then I'm

always thinking about stuff, plotting or figuring out how to draw a particular panel or story.

**BH**: Okay-that's it. Thanks for the great interview, Jeff!

Upon arriving in San Francisco, the first person I met that was going to the APE Convention was Jeffrey Brown, in the hotel lobby where we were both staying. We had a very quick and casual conversation; if it were a movie, that meeting would've been some fantastic foreshadowing, because Jeff and **Clumsy** ended up being my favorite and most significant memory I have of the trip. On Sunday, the last day of the convention, I approached Jeff and asked him to do a sketch for mejust something with him in it. It is easily the best five bucks I've ever spent. This is

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## In Our Book

One Knight Only by Peter David Ace, 384 pages, \$23.95

This is the long-awaited sequel to Peter David's novel *Knight Life* about King Arthur being alive in the present day (along with Merlin and Lancelot with Guinivere having been reincarnated as his wife Gwen) and running for political office. The original novel was re-issued last year in an updated and expanded hardback version that is now available in paperback which is recommended reading, but not required, for *One Knight Only*.

The new novel picks up the story several years later, where Arthur is now President of the United States and trying to deal with terrorist threats to the country while his long time mentor, Merlin, is a statue in the Rose Garden and his aide, Lancelot, is missing. Through flashbacks we learn of the events that catapulted Arthur to national fame and left Merlin a statue. A terrorist attack following Arthur's State of the Union address leaves Gwen in a coma and Arthur in shock. Meanwhile, Lancelot has discovered the location of the Holy Grail in it's current form which is being held by the original High King, Gilgamesh, on a remote island in the Florida Keys. Arthur sets out to exact revenge on the terrorist leader and retrieve the Grail so that Gwen can live, but will he succeed or die trying?

As you can see by the summary, the novel covers a lot of ground, bringing the reader up on what has happened since the first story, introducing the new characters and situations and showing how the national spotlight has made things difficult for Arthur and Gwen. David also works in plot elements mirroring recent real-world events with the terrorist leader, Sandoval, playing more than a minor role in the overall story. Having the real world events echoing in this story makes it more serious of a novel than the first one and there are also consequences to the actions the various characters take, but it is not lacking in humorous moments which David is very good at. The dilemma Arthur finds himself in following the terrorist attack on his wife and the decision he makes to avoid a war makes you wonder what our real-life president would have done in a similar situation (albeit without magical assistance available).

If you enjoyed the original novel, you'll be glad to revisit these characters once more. If you haven't yet discovered Peter David's fantasy work, this would be a good place to start. - Lee Whiteside

Talon of the Silver Hawk (Conclave of Shadows Book One) by Raymond E. Feist Eos, 400 pages, \$24.95

The latest Raymond E. Feist novel set in the fantasy world of Midkemia is somewhat of a departure from his prior novels. It concentrates mainly on a central character, a young boy, Kieli, Talon of the Silver Hawk, who is the lone survivor of a

mountain tribe massacred by an army controlled by the evil Duke of Olasko. He is taken in by Magnus, a powerful sorcerer, Robert de Lyis, a man of wealth and Caleb, a hunter/warrior and taught how to fight as well as how to function in high-bred society so that he can be used as a weapon in the fight against evil by the secret organization called The Conclave of Shadows.

While prior Midkemia and Riftwar novels were more of an epic feel with lots of characters and epic quests, this novel is told mostly from the point of view of Talon. When we first meet him, his is a naive boy who has been orphaned and had been left for dead. We follow along as he learns to fit into a more normal lifestyle while still retaining his wild edge. He is taught many skills including hunting, fighting, cooking, how to be a servant, painting and other more high-bred traits, and also given a painful lesson in love. All of this is orchestrated by the Conclave to prepare him for a grander destiny that they are keeping a secret from him. By the end of the novel, he is a suave sportsman, fighting to survive in a major sword fighting championship where some of his opponents are more interested in making sure he doesn't win that putting on a fair

Readers of Feist's other Riftwar novels should enjoy this one that gives you a different perspective on this fantasy world. There are a few familiar characters with Pug, Nakor and Miranda being the most notable. They still take a back seat to the story of Talon's growth and maturing into the hero he has become by the end of the novel, ready to proceed into the next installment of the series. Prior knowledge of Midkemia is not a requirement for this novel and might actually help in following along with Talon's perspective on the events that transpire around him. - Lee Whiteside

Devil's Bargain by Judith Tarr ROC, 385 pages, \$16.00

This is a lovely fantasy story set in the Holy Land during the Third Crusade. Sioned, an illegitimate child of a Celtic princess and the late King of England, is commanded by her brother, King Richard the Lionheart, to help save his crusade. Pulling strings in the background is Eleanor, King Richard's tyrannical mother,

who is well-trained in magic but given to the dark side. She has made a pact with an evil sorcerer, to assassinate Saladin, the Sultan who opposes Richard. Sioned has magic even though she is untrained. While with Richard, she meets Saladin's brother, Saphadin, and her heart is lost to the enemy. She also meets a mysterious lady, Safiyah, who begins to train her in magic. The forces of magic, Sioned, Saphadin and Safiyah, experience bonds that transcend the politic forces that cause them to be enemies. Together, they must find a way to defeat the evil sorcerer who will cause them all great pain and distress. Along the way, Sioned acquires the protection and assistance of a great host of jinn. It is also Sioned who must brave the evil sorcerer's refuge to steal the talisman to save her brother. A very enjoyable read..- Catherine **Book** 

Magic: The Gathering Odyssey Cycle Book II: Chainer's Torment By Scott McGough Wizards Of The Coast, Inc. pb: 2001, 311 pages., \$6.99

The stage is set and pit is ready. For fighters death is not a high price to pay for possessing the magical and powerful orb called the Mirari. Even though most individuals who touch the orb become insane, still an infinite numbers flock to win the mystical energy for themselves. This book is an extension of the role playing game of the same name; Magic: the Gathering. The storyline revolves around Chainer, a young dementia caster and pupil of Skellum, who allies himself with Kamahl, the barbarian from the Pardic Mountains. Together the two men enter the pit fights.

As the fights commence, other threats emerge. Recovering from his failure at obtaining the Mirari, Ambassador Laquatus begins his quest to acquire the artifact once more. However, he has a new enemy, Llawan, Aboshan's widow who is determined to sit at her dead husband's throne once more. A new leader of the Order, Major Teroh gathers his forces against the Cabal. No more will he allow the Cabal to influence Otaria or Kamahl to live.

Meanwhile Ambassador Laquatus allies himself with Chainer and the Cabal. Hungry for conquest, he desires the throne and Mirari, even though betrayal of his loyalties is his only way to secure his ultimate goals. The tension mounts between Laquatus and Llawan to the brink of Civil War. In the end Llawan wins as she cuts Laquatus off from mercantile commerce and he is faced alone in his defeat.

Kamahl's sister and former mentor; Jeska and Balthor respectively; search for Kamahl but find instead Chainer's powers have expanded far beyond his mental capacity. Slowly with the use of the Mirari, Chainer is losing his grasp on reality. Kamahl is faced with a terrible decision to choose between friendship and Otaria.

Scott McGough has a firm grasp on the characters, plot and magical references for a satisfying book. Entertaining book even for non-magic folks, the role playing novel is full of plot twists and turns. In the future I hope this author expands his repertoire to include the science fiction universe as well as the RPG format - **Dawn Mullan** 

Magic: The Gathering Onslaught Cycle Book I: Onslaught By J. Robert King Wizards Of The Coast, Inc. pb: 2002, 312 pages, \$6.99

Another book in the Magic: The Gathering saga finds that Kamahl has won the powerful orb, Mirari, for himself but at a great price. While on a quest for revenge, his sister Jeska is transformed by Braids into Phage -a dangerous pit fighter. The two women join the Cabal to craft a great coliseum.

Kamahl desperate to save his sister faces great odds to restore her. Jeska as Phage destroys a powerful illusionist's only love, the beautiful Nivea. In mourning for his love Ixidor's dreams came to life creating an angelic creature named Akroma. Together the two plot to avenge the death of Nivea and kill Phage. Kamahl finding his sister as Phage and allying himself with the Cabal, the barbarian fights the darkness that is Phage until Jeska can reclaim her mind.

Once Jeska returns, the darkness that was Phage unleashes itself onto the world and begins devouring life as deathwurms. Knowing that there was only one chance to save the world, Jeska takes back the darkness into herself becoming Phage once more.

Kamahl did not want to lose his sister again but wavers under her insistence and

wisdom. Indeed Jeska is right, Kamahl had saved himself and the woman she once was. Now Kamahl had to let her go and for himself find peace among the forest.

J. Robert King writes cleanly and deliberately as he fleshes out all the characters into a neat and concise plot. This book was a joy to read even to those people not familiar to this role playing world. - Dawn Mullan

Star Wars New Jedi Order Force Heretic I: Remnant By Sean Williams & Shane Dix Del Rey pb: 2003, 413 pages, \$6.99

The last trilogy of the New Jedi Order, Force Heretic I: Remnant is book 15 in the series. With their first strong victory over the Yuuzhan Vong in the near past, the New Republic changes its color and mission to become the Galactic Federation of Free Alliances, or simply the Galactic Alliance. Since the Yuuzhan Vong war, the New Republic has struggled to defend itself from the enemies within and out of its borders. With the Empire and Chiss as well as other factions separate and aloof, the New Republic found little backing to its cause against their new enemy. However this challenge is one of many that need to be addressed and a new government to solve these issues. In order to accomplish this task the Galactic Alliance wants to bring the diverse populations of their galaxy together into one coalition to provide a sound government, safer environment, and collective military.

The series begins with the Galactic Alliance needing to reform its communication system and former military strength in order to win the war. Han and Leia with Jaina, Jagged Fel, Tahiri and the Twin Suns Squadron decide to investigate the worlds taken by the enemy and develop a plan for the future re-establishment of communications. Luke, Mara, Jacen, Danni, Saba and

Tekli travel to the Outer Regions. Searching for a lost, but living planet identified as Zonama Sekot by Vergere, the Jedi led by Mara and Luke set out in the Jade Shadow only to find a weakened Empire. All the while Nom Anor living with the Shamed Ones begins to unravel the system he once invoked without question. The Yuuzhan Vong outcasts who worship the Jedi could be his salvation.

In this novel, I especially enjoyed the romances between Danni and Jacen –he needs something to bind him to the universe except philosophy- as well as the romance between Jagged Fel and Jaina, who needs positive reinforcement to keep her from the Dark Side of the Force. On the other hand, Tahiri has an intriguing storyline as she fights the mental brainwashing the Yuuzhan Vong implemented before Anakin Solo's death and the other personality that keeps creeping into her consciousness. The story should become pretty interesting trying to tie up these loose ends by the end of the trilogy.

This book is about average for the New Jedi Order Series but the storyline has a few slow places. Though a rough start for the Williams/Dix team, I am confident the pacing will pick up in the second novel. - **Dawn Mullan** 

Star Wars New Jedi Order Force Heretic II: Refugee By Sean Williams & Shane Dix Del Rey pb: 2003, 397 pages, \$6.99

The last trilogy of the New Jedi Order, Force Heretic II: Refugee is book 16 in the series. Our heroes and nemeses begins where the last storylines ended: the Jedi searching for Zonama Sekot, a team investigating communications breakdowns, and the Yuuzhan Vong resisting shame. This novel serves to bridge the gap between conflict and resolution.

Again, our heroes in their quests find that sometimes what is on the surface is ( Cont'd on page 20)



In Our Book (cont'd from page 19) not what lies underneath. Teaming up with the Empire, the Jedi led by Luke and Mara enter the Unknown Regions where the team encounters the Chiss. Unfortunately, the Chiss believe the Jedi's search is a lost cause. Even though the Chiss feel the time expended on the quest is futile, the hosts humor their Jedi guests by letting them search for Zonama Sekot in their paper resource library.

On the other side of the galaxy, Han and Leia's group finds Bakura at odds with itself. The Bakurans and P'w'eck, the Ssiruuvi slave caste, are joining forces. The positive side this alliance would shield the races against the Ssiruuvi and Yuuzhan Vong. The negative side is that not everyone on Bakura is content with the idea. The political and social repercussions have begun with protests and rebellions sprouting up on the planet. Of course, Han and Leia find out what lies

beneath the differing factors between the three races as the Yuuzhan Vong have their spies amidst the fury too.

Speaking of whom, Nom Anor continues his power quest among the Jedi worshipers in the ruins of Coruscant and takes on a slave of his own. The Supreme Overlord is having difficulties. Supply line problems left Coruscant untransformed completely by the Shapers and the lower caste churned in resistance as their heresy grew. Shimrra now realizing that the heresy has gone too far and that a new threat has risen with the power to destabilize the Yuuzhan Vong hierarchy.

A solid novel by the Williams/Dix team as the story evolves from conflict into a mysterious semi-solution. Not to say the authors give anything away, but the references make for good questions about the trilogy's conclusion. For instance, Tahiri and Riina of Domain Kwaad what will happen to these two distinct person-

alities? What of the Zonama Sekot? Is it friend or foe? How could these two factors lead to a resolution to the Yuuzhan Vong war?

This trilogy slow to start has picked up hopefully to a good resolution in the third installment. - **Dawn Mullan** 

## Future Wars edited by Martin H. Greenberg and Larry Segriff, DAW Books, 317 pages, \$6.99

My, isn't this a timely anthology. Ten authors wrote all-new stories: Barry Longyear, James H. Cobb, Kristine Kathryn Rusch, William H. Keith Jr., Kathleen Massie-Ferch, Bill Fawcett, Ron Collins, Robert J. Sawyer, R.J. Pineiro, and Robin Wayne Bailey. Apparently these stories were made just for this book, as there are no prior publication credits. The topic is not treated as the standard military genre glorification, but rather as a part of the human heritage. As the cover blurb says, "the many possible ways in which conflict may be carried out, resolved, or avoided in the future." These future times vary from later in this century to uncounted years away in galactic cultures. There's even a sequel story to H.G. Wells' Time Machine, told from the morlock point of view. There's enough action for any space opera, but more to these tales than mere escapism. You don't have to be promilitary or antiwar to enjoy them, just curious about a sad feature of humanity. -Michael Griffin

## The Machiavelli Interface by Steve Perry Ace Books, 197 pages, \$5.99

This is the fourth in a five-book series, yet is apparently the last of three that Ace is reprinting. It came out in 1986, and is now part of Ace's fiftieth anniversary output. Author Steve Perry is a New York Times bestseller, and it shows. While you can't avoid knowing you're in only part of a story, that part is interesting on its own. This is a tale of an evil galactic confederation overthrown by an elite corps of bodyguards called matadors. They have an oriental-like martial art called the 97 steps, and they're marksmen with nonlethal darts that incapacitate people for six months. This book focuses on their charismatic leader's battle with the evil ruler, and also on a top matador squad of three women and three men. While there's no explicit sex, the ruler is a child molester and some matadors are lesbians. There is lots of explicit violence. If you want action combined with in-depth character studies, try this one. - Michael Griffin

## The Firebrand by Marion Zimmer Bradley ROC, 593 pages, \$15.95

The Firebrand is an interesting retelling of the story of the Trojan war from the point of view of the women. Treated as possessions by the men in their life, manipulated like chess pieces by the gods they have a lot of resentment. This resentment manifests itself in their efforts to change the course of event for their own purposes. The Firebrand is an interesting new twist on a very old story. It is a well written fast paced story that I enjoyed reading and I am sure all of Ms. Bradley's fans will enjoy it as well. - William B. Whitmore

## The Steerswoman's Road by Rosemary Kirstien Del Ray, 653 pages, \$15.95

This book is a single volume re-release of the first two novels in the steerswoman's saga. Our hero, Rowan, is a steerswoman. This means that she travels the land asking and answering Questions. For hundred of years steerswomen have wandered the land with no problems. So why are the wizards trying to kill Rowan? All she has done is to ask questions about some blue gems that she found. The quest to answer that question will take her from the heart of a wizard's fortress to the wild land of the frontier, and the answers she finds reveals a secret that is impossible to believe.

The Steerswoman's Road is an interesting action adventure novel with a novel plot twist. The characters are well developed and very likable. This is the second time I have read these books and I enjoyed them as much the second time around as I had the first. I strongly recommend this book. - William B. Whitmore

## The Lost Steersman by Rosemary Kirstein Del Ray, \$14.95, 432 pages

This is book number three in the steerswoman's saga. Rowan is searching the records of the steerswomen's archives for clues as to the location of the head wizard's fortress. Thinking that she has found a clue to the location she goes into the Black Grass land and finds the unexpected. The planet has a native sapient life form! Oh how this complicates the problems faced by Rowan. How do their presence complicate the ethics of routine bioform clearance? Where is the head wizard? How will the outskirters continue to find red grass for their herds?

The Lost Steersman is a good novel but it would be best to read the first two novels first. Ms. Kirstein is an excellent author. This book is well written, colorful and imaginative. I liked this novel, and

Elena has gone for R&R to A'loa Glen. Along comes Harlequin Quail, a spy acting as Jester [or is it the reverse] arrives telling them they have one month to counter certain doom. One Weirgate remains. The Dark lord will use it to usher in a reign of evil without end. Hunted by the Dark Lord and his followers, with betrayal on all sides, the faithful companions will find that love and magic will be tested to the breaking point.

With shades of Robert Jordan, *Wit'ch Star* has all the elements of classic fantasy. It also has distinctive details and well drawn characters that make well worth reading. But save a couple evenings. At 544 pages, with no excess words, it will take some time to finish. - **Pam Allan**.

The Union representatives are vexed and exasperated by the rulers of the planet but still they must try to bring the people of this world into the Union for it is the only place in the galaxy where man has met the ENEMY and not been exterminated in the most horrible manner.

Enemies is a fast paced novel of intrigue and suspense. It's references to things which happened in *Belarus* are well explained. The characters readily engage your sympathy and I would gladly recommend this book. It is a good stand alone novel and an even better sequel. - William B. Whitmore





## **Musty Tomes**

## When Harlie Was One By David Gerrold Ballatine Books, Inc., 247 pp Out of print

I think this book rightly belongs in the category of cyberpunk. H.A.R.L.I.E. is a Human Analog Robot Life Input Equivalents computer. He is the computer that can think and learn; therefore, the author argues, he is essentially human. Our hero, David Auberson, is HARLIE's psychologist. David is forced by the corporation that built and owns HARLIE to justify the expense of continuing the project. In other words, the bookkeepers want to kill HARLIE. David challenges HARLIE to devise a profitable reason for his continued existence. HARLIE gives them G.O.D., a Graphic Omniscient Device. This computer would be able to answer all questions. ALL questions, including the one about our existence.

The author presents a clever story where you have to determine who is second-guessing who - the scientists or HARLIE. HARLIE is much more than the scientists know, which is very insulting to the scientists since everything HARLIE is and can do was programmed by the researchers. Gerrold doesn't give his scientists much intelligence when their creation can do things that take them by surprise. Past that, the fundamental question is, I think, whether we should do a thing just because we can. Should we build a computer that can answer all our questions? What would that do to us? Gerrold glosses over that question, preferring instead, to focus on the miracle of HARLIE's awareness.

I enjoyed this story, despite how dated the technology and references were. In fact, it was amusing to read while considering where the technology was in 1972; at times, prophetic. It won a Nebula for Best Novel in 1972. - Catherine Book
