The Borg Invade Las Vegas by Lee Whiteside

The Star Trek Experience at the Las Vegas Hilton has stayed pretty much the same since it opened in 1998. The Klingon Encounter ride has been a popular one, with fans being able to visit the bridge of the Enterprise D from Star Trek: The Next Generation and experience a motion simulator shuttle ride that ends up on a now outdated flight down the Las Vegas Strip. Aside from some updated displays in the History of the Future museum for the last Trek movies and Enterprise TV series, the attraction has stayed pretty much the same. That has now changed with the introduction of the Borg Invasion 4-D that opened in March.

Using current high definition technology, live actors and visual and physical effects, the new ride creates a very realistic Star Trek experience. As visitors tour a futuristic research facility, the terrifying drones of the Borg Collective launch an attack to capture and assimilate guests using 24th century cybernetic technology. The 3D and 4D effects will merge to create a chilling realization as the action culminates in a state-of-the-art theater providing an all-immersive tactile experience for visitors to the attraction. The associated film features Robert Picardo (The Doctor). Alice Krige (BORG Queen) and Kate Mulgrew (Admiral Janeway) as the starship Voyager gets involved with the events. In addition to traditional motion simulator

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techniques, other effects are used (poking, air blasts, moving floors, and surround sound) to create a fuller experience.

Behind the scenes of the visual effects is Threshold Digital Research Labs and a team led by George Johnsen, former Babylon 5 producer, with visual effects artists such as Mojo working on it. They have created multiple 3-D images that are displayed on multiple screens on the ride to give the feeling of being in space and to heighten the tension when the Borg are attacking. According to George Johnsen, in order to make the effects work, they had to invent some new camera and CGI technology. "In order to replicate the way the human eye sees, we literally had to reinvent the way movies are made, from building a new camera for the live-action shoot to the animation and editing process," Johnsen told the Hollywood Reporter. They also developed what they call "infinite focus" which makes the 3-D images look real no matter where the viewer is looking from.

This is also the first Star Trek production to be shot totally digitally, the first multiple angle 3-D production, and the first attraction to use 2K digital cinema projection, which produces the highestresolution digital projection commercially available. "This experience is much like

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SF Tube Talk TV News & Previews By Lee Whiteside

The BBC has announced who will play the lead role in their new series of Doctor Who. It will be British actor Christopher Eccleston. His most recent appearance seen in the U.S. is as Major Henry West in 28 Days Later. He was also in the BBC miniseries "The Second Coming" as Stephen Baxter, which was written and produced by Russell T. Davies, who is doing the same for the new Doctor Who series. In regards to Eccleston, Davies commented "This man can give the Doctor a wisdom, wit and emotional range as farreaching as the doctor's travels in time and space. It's going to be a magnificent, epic, entertaining journey, and I can't wait to start!." Filming is scheduled to start soon in the UK for broadcast in 2005. There is still no word on where it will turn up in the U.S

The fate of the *Star Trek* franchise may be in the hands of the Nielsen viewers during the final batch of *Enterprise* episodes in April and May. Executives at CBS and Viacom have indicated they are not happy with how *Enterprise* has been performing and may elect to go with other programming next year if they feel they have something better to show. With the continued success of America's Next Top Model and their comedies, UPN looks to only have Wednesday night for drama and if there's two new shows they like more, Enterprise may not get renewed or may end up taking a back seat. During March and April, the show has been moved back an hour during repeats so that UPN can showcase their CGI comedy series Game Over. When Enterprise resumes new episodes on April 21, it is expected to move back to it's regular time slot.

New episodes will resume with Damage, following the cliffhanger from the last new episode, Azati Prime, the Enterprise is left virtually helpless with several crew members dead and many injured. They must work together with the crew from an Illyrian vessel that has been crippled by spatial anomalies. In The Forgotten, two high-ranking Xindi offer to stop the launch of their super weapon if Archer can prove they've been manipulated while the crew deals with the loss of a fifth of the Enterprise crew from recent events. E2 has an attempt to use a Xindi subspace corridor leading the Enterprise into a bizarre encounter with another Starfleet ship, an Enterprise from the future! In The Council, Archer approaches the Xindi Council on their home turf to argue why they should make peace and not deploy the planet-destroying weapon on Earth. In Countdown, despite dissenting factions within the Council, the Xindi prepare to initiate's the weapon's arming sequence while Archer crew works to stop it from commencing. According to producer Rick Berman, Zero Hour - the season finale, will not be a cliffhanger but may not fully resolve the Xindi storyline, allowing it to continue into a fourth season, if it happens.

The WB has announced that it will not be renewing *Angel* for a fifth season and made the announcement early so that **Joss Whedon** had a chance to properly conclude the series. The announcement mentioned the possibility of future TV movies, but Whedon has indicated that there is nothing currently in the works. With the advent of the *Firefly* movie (see 24 Frames), Whedon will likely be pretty busy with that for a while. Whether any of the Buffy regulars will turn up to help end the series is unknown. Expect a few surprises, though, when things finish up in late May. When new episodes resume in mid-April, yet another *Firefly* regular will turn up in the Buffyverse with Adam Baldwin (Jayne on Firefly) showing up as Angel's new liaison to the Senior Partners, Hamilton, who is also trying to track down Eve. Angel and crew now realize that their agreement to join with Wolfram and Hart was a mistake and look to figure out a way to get out of it. This includes tracking down Lindsey, who is trapped in hell (or something like it), Other episodes will see a return of Angel's son, Connor, and some of the ramifications of his new life. Gunn will also break up a deal for a sacrifice, likely drawing the ire of the Senior Partners. Also happening will be more with Illyria/Fred where Illyria's hold over Fred's body starts to break down leading to multi-dimensional activities. Spike and Angel will make a trip to Rome, looking for a being called The Immortal who is apparently now hanging out with a certain Slayer. Whether we will actually see Buffy or just fleeting glimpses of someone with a blonde wig is not yet known. Expect somehow for all of this (Illyria, Wolfram and Hart, and The Immortal) to all come together in a surprising way to finish off the series.

Tru Calling has managed to stay on the air despite expected low ratings opposite *Friends* and *Survivor* and will likely be getting a new push from FOX for it's final run of episodes. Beginning in late March, **Jason Priestly** has joined the show as Jack Harper, a new forensic

attendant at the morgue where Tru Davies works. Although he seems like a nice guy, he has a secret that may hinder Tru's ability to go backward in time to save people who die unjustly. Upcoming episodes include The Getaway where Tru is being trailed by a reporter when she is trying to stop a couple on a crime spree. In Death Becomes Her, Tru tries to save an actress who is a bit too successful at faking her own death because she is being blackmailed. Two Pair sees Tru and Harrison try to save two people that get killed in a high stakes poker game. In Rear Window, Tru tries to save the life of a man, Chris, who has had his identity stolen by a woman, now using his name. As the season

Lots of stuff in the news this issue including talk about the hoped for prequel to *The Lord of the Rings*, Comic Films updates and a *HitchHiker's Guide* movie finally.

Following it's sweep of the Oscars, what's left for Lord of the Rings. Well, there is the DVD release of the theatrical version on May 25th and the extended DVD release for the holiday season. But what about that other Tolkien Tale that should be brought to life as the trilogy was? No, it's not the Simarrilion we're talking about, but The Hobbit. Peter Jackson has expressed interest of late of turning the book into a movie. Ian McKellen has been loud and long champing at the bit to play Gandalf one more time. But the movie rights are tied up in a bit of limbo right now. New Line does have the rights to make a movie based on the original book, but MGM (via United Artists) owns the distribution rights. There may also be some parts of the rights controlled by the Tolkien estate. Assuming that New Line is able to make everything come together, the earliest that production could likely start is 2006, after Peter Jackson is finished with his remake of King Kong. Hobbit fans will just have to be patient and they may eventually get rewarded.

As mentioned above, Peter Jackson's next project is a remake of *King Kong* that he's been wanting to do and almost got started before he embarked on his *Lord of the Rings* Odyssey. Jackson had actually been developing this movie back in 1997 when it was shot down by the studios. Now that Jackson has a bit more clout, he is making it next and also enlisting the services of Weta Digital and Weta Workshop. **Jackson** wants to make this a faithful update of the original movie with current technology. The only cast announced so far is **Naomi Watts** as Ann Darrow. Expect more cast to be announced soon as production gets underway. Don't be surprised to see some LOTR alumni in a few roles. Universal has this planned for a December 2005 release.

Walt Disney will be jumping into the epic fantasy arena with a live action production by Walden Media of **Lewis Carroll's** Narnia story, *The Lion, The Witch and the Wardrobe*. Directing will be **Andrew Adamson** (*Shrek*) and it will be filmed in New Zealand and will enlist the services of Weta Workshop. Rumors have **Nicole Kidman** being lined up for a major role, likely the White Witch. Walden Media does have the rights to all of the Narnia books and hopes to make this into an ongoing series. Look for it in fall of 2005.

Over in the comics world, Warner Bros. is gearing up for Batman Begins with casting set and filming underway starting in early March. Starring as a young Bruce Wayne (aka Batman) will be Christian Bale, Ken Watanabe will be the villain Ra's Al Ghul, Michael Caine will be Wayne's butler Alfred Pennyworth, and other cast includes Morgan Freeman (Lucius Fox), Katie Holmes (Rachel Dodson), Cillian Murphy (Dr. Jonathan Crane), Liam Neeson (Ducard), Gary Oldman (Sgt. Jim Gordon), and Larry Holden (D.A. Fisk). The movie will focus on a young Bruce Wayne shortly into his career as Batman as he travels to London to deal with Ra's Al Ghul.

Elswehere in the D.C. universe, we do have the **Halle Berry** *Catwoman* coming out this summer, with a tenuous connection to the actual comics character. The

progresses, Tru will learn more about Jack, and Jack will learn more about Tru, possibly leading to a major confrontation by the end of the season.

Mid-March saw the debut of Wonderfalls on FOX on Friday nights. There's not much advance info on episodes, though. Here is how FOX described the show in their press release for the series debut: Jaye Tyler is a smart young woman who's having some trouble finding direction in her life. Beautiful and well-educated, she lives in an unlikely place: a trailer park near her parents' home in Niagara Falls. She spends her days as a sales assistant in a gift shop for tourists that overlooks the Falls. But it's here that her life takes a strange turn, when the animal-shaped figurines on the store's shelves spontaneously begin talking and giving her cryptic advice. The show looks to be quirky and fun, if somewhat in the same vein as Joan of Arcadia but with a less serious bent. The series is scheduled to air for seven weeks in the 8 pm MT time slot. Where the remaining episodes will air after that is unknown.

CBS's mid-season genre entry *Century City* also debuted in mid-March on Wednesday nights for a short run. **Nestor Carbonell, Viola Davis, Hector Elizondo, Ioan Gruffudd, Kristin Lehman** and **Eric Schaeffer** star in this futuristic drama where lawyers at the firm of Crane, Constable, McNeil and Montero find that the laws change but that people remain the same. CBS describes the show as "In a time when judges can go before lawyers as holograms, the firm takes on such morally and ethically ambiguous cases as parents suing their doctor for withholding critical results of their unborn child's genetic mapping, and a man accused of robbery when he "steals" back his identity from his ex-fiancé who has uploaded his presence onto all of her electronics. As this diverse group of attorneys find themselves in uncharted legal territory, their cases provide an eye-opening look into issues confronting society in the not-so-distant future."

When Smallville returns in mid-April, it will bring back Christopher Reeve as Dr. Swann in "Legacy". Lionel Luthor has a meeting with Dr. Swann who then warns Clark that Lionel is getting close to the truth about him. According to producer Miles Millar "When we bring Chris back, it's always a mythology episode. He always gives a piece of Clark's mythology, his destiny. So for us, it's always a big moment when he comes into the show. And I think it basically ... sends Clark into a new direction. And it's something that will actually be going into next season. And it will be significant. I think it will be every intriguing for people to hear what he has to say and the information he has for Clark." In "Truth", Chloe sneaks into a LutherCorp lab and is exposed to some kryptonite gas that gives her the ability to

make other people tell the truth, with dangerous results. "*Memoria*" will see Lex having sessions to gain back some of his memories, leading to flashbacks to much earlier in his life. Clark will also undergoes the procedure and have flashbacks to his departure from Krypton. Beyond that, there's not much advance info on the last few episodes of the season. Stay tuned for a likely cliffhanger...

The debut of SciFi's new Thursday lineup has been a success, at least initially. Household ratings numbers for the debut of Mad, Mad House were 1.35 (1.57 million viewers), Scare Tactics season two debuted with a 1.5 rating (1.58 million) and Tripping the Rift debuted with a 1.8 rating (2.08 million), which is the second highest rating ever for the debut of a new series on SciFi behind the debut of Tremors: The *Series*. SciFi is already casting for a second series of *Mad*, *Mad House*, wanting to cast other types of alts such as a necromancer, a yoga master and other offbeat lifestyles. The show somewhat works as a cross between Fear Factor and Survivor, putting the normals through various tests. The initial show didn't have much time to dwell on the day to day lives of the alts, which will likely get featured more as the number of normals decrease. As for Tripping the Rift, it definitely follows in the tradition of the original animated short, but may get a bit old trying to keep up the frenetic pace and bad taste consistently over twenty minutes of

episode each week.

In other SciFi news, *Battlestar Galactica* has been given the go-ahead for a weekly series, main casting has been announced for both the *Stargate: Atlantis* series and *Anonymous Rex* pilot movie, and current episodes of *Gene Roddenberry's Andromeda* have joined the Friday lineup.

After taking some time to work out the details which included extending the actor options a month, SciFi has committed to a weekly series of Battlestar Galactica with an initial order of 13 episodes. The series will be produced in association with Sky One, the UK outlet for the series. Ron Moore will be the executive producer and show runner for the series and has said that the weekly series will pick up shortly after the miniseries left off. "A few days have passed since the miniseries, and we're in sort of a dire situation right from the get-go," Moore said in an interview. "I think one of the hallmarks of the series will be that it's always going to be a tense situation. These people are always going to be one step away from disaster. Which doesn't mean that the Cylons will be attacking them every week. But I think the nature of their situation and the reality of what they're facing out there alone, with most of them left with the clothes on their back and whatever food and supplies they happen to have on those ships when the events of the pilot occur is only, God, the

beginning. And it's going to take a long time for them to get to any kind of stability or normalcy." Moore also indicated he is open to having actors from the original series be part of it with guest roles as new characters and he may revisit some of the storylines from the original series, but nothing has been decided early on.

Stargate: Atlantis's core team will Joe Flanigan (Profiler, Tru Calling) will play Maj. John Sheppard, a courageous and gifted pilot, while Torri Higginson (TekWar) will portray Dr. Elizabeth Weir, head of the mission and a diplomatic relations specialist. Rounding out the cast are Rainbow Sun Francks as Lt. Aiden Ford, an enthusiastic young officer who becomes Sheppard's second-in-command, David Hewlett, reprising his Stargate SG-1 recurring role as astrophysicist Dr. Rodney McKay, and Rachel Luttrell as Teyla, a beautiful young leader among the primitive alien civilization that the Atlantis team encounters. Robert Patrick (Terminator 2, The X-Files) will appear as Col. Marshall Sumner in the two hour opener along with Richard Dean Anderson as SG-1's Col. Jack O'Neill and Michael Shanks as Daniel Jackson. There will be 18 one hour episodes in addition to the two hour opener beginning in July, where it will be paired up with the Eighth season of Stargate: SG-1. SciFi describes the spinoff as: Stargate: Atlantis follows the adventures of the Stargate Atlantis team, which is formed after a secret base, abandoned by the original builders of the Stargates, is found buried in the ice of Antarctica. Their discovery leads to a daring expedition to the distant Pegasus galaxy, where they encounter a primitive human civilization and a sinister new enemy that threatens

human life everywhere. When *Stargate SG-1* resumes in July, expect a few changes there following the season ending cliffhanger. Expect to see a promotion for Jack O'Neill with General Hammond no longer in charge. There will likely continue to be episodes focusing on the other SG-1 team members as well as the return of some other characters such as Carter's boyfriend Pete Shanahan (**David DeLuise**), the Jaffa warrior Ishta (**Jolene Blalock**) as well as now Vice-president Kinsey (**Ronny Cox**).

The Anonymous Rex pilot movie started filming in March for SciFi in Vancouver. Leading the cast is Sam Trammell (Going to California) as Detective Vincent Rubio (who is also a velociraptor) and Daniel Baldwin (Homicide: Life on the Street) as his partner, Ernie Watson, who is also a dinosaur. The pilot is based on the second book in Eric Garcia's mystery/scifi series, detailing the adventures of Vincent Rubio, private eye, who also happens to be a dinosaur disguised as a human. The premise of the show is that dinosaurs didn't die out, they evolved, got smaller, and now live among us disguised as humans with elaborate latex outfits (and lots of buckles). The books go into the underground dinosaur subculture quite a bit and the pilot movie will deal with a back to nature cult that wants to see dinos get back to their roots. The series has been in development for several years and finally got the green light for the pilot movie last fall after the

producers felt they could do justice to the dinosaur disguised as human visual effects needed for the show. On the casting of the two leads, Garcia said "we got to see the two of them test together, and the vibe was electric, which is exactly what you want when you're pairing up two actors who have to spend a good 50% of each show playing off each other. You can really believe, watching these two, that they're old friends, and that **Baldwin** has **Trammell** under his wing -- er, his talon." Look for it to possibly air late in the year or early next year.

SciFi has picked up Gene Roddenberry's Andromeda as part of a deal with Tribune Entertainment that gives SciFi the rights to the first four seasons of Andromeda and makes them the place for the first airings of season five this fall. Currently, Andromeda has joined the Friday night lineup running current episodes the week after they have aired in syndication. This will likely give the show a chance to gain some new viewers who have given up trying to figure out where the show airs locally. The deal also included the three seasons of Beastmaster, which will likely turn up on SciFi soon.

SciFi has also given the green light to a miniseries production of Ursula K. LeGuin's Earthsea, adapted from the first two of LeGuin's famed Earthsea-trilogy novels: A Wizard of Earthsea and The Tombs of Atuan. The script will be written by Gavin Scott (The Mists of Avalon) and will be filmed in New Zealand. Earthsea follows the tale of a reckless youth destined to become the greatest sorcerer that the mystical land of Earthsea has ever known. When the young wizard Ged discovers that he possesses infinite magical powers, he seeks to master the ancient arts. As he journeys to manhood, he will combat dragons, fall in love, cross death's threshold, and ultimately wield the power to reunite a kingdom. SciFi has scheduled it for their December event airing

Debuting on SciFi in June and airing

over five straight nights will be *Five Days* to Midnight. The story revolves around college professor J.T. Neumeyer, who stumbles upon a mysterious briefcase containing a police file filled with details of a gruesome murder — his own. The file, complete with photos of his bullet-strewn corpse and a list of suspects, indicates that the shooting will take place in five days. Though skeptical at first, J.T. realizes, when events begin to mirror those in the report, that the file is real and time is quickly running out. He has only days to solve the mystery of his own murder and hopefully change the course of the future. Leading the cast as Neumeyer is Timothy Hutton. Nicole De Boer will play Chantal Hume, the wife of Brad Hume, the brother of J.T.'s deceased wife. Angus McFadyen will take on the role of Roy Bremmer, a shady figure and a suspect in J.T.'s future murder. Randy Quaid plays Irwin Sikorski, a homicide detective whose aid J.T. enlists. The cast also includes **David McIlwraith** as Brad Hume and Kari Matchett as Claudia Whitney, J.T.'s girlfriend, who has a mysterious past.

Andromeda will resume new episodes in mid-April, leading to a two part finale in late May. Episodes will also run on SciFi on Friday nights as mentioned previously. Since they weren't sure if they were going to go to a fifth season when filming the season finale, two different endings were filmed. The one not used will likely end up on the DVD release in the future. Episodes for the rest of the season include "Lost in a Space that Isn't There" where one of the crew betrays Dylan and the Abyss strikes out again against the Andromeda, "Abridging the Devil's Divided" where an enemy from last season makes a comeback in a big way and draws Harper into his plot. (Written by Gordon Michael Woolvett), "Trusting the Gordian Maze" with Peter DeLuise is the guest star (no other info released), "Asymmetry of Imperfection" which is a Rommie episode that has all the incarnations (the AI, hologram and ship) working with and

against each other, "Time Out of Mind"

where we get a glimpse of Beka when she was a little girl, and the two part "*The Dissonant Interval*" where fans should get out their hankies. It is describe on the official bulletin board by a crew member as "There are some great, great character moments in this. **Kevin Sorbo** and **Lisa Ryder** deserve some sort of award, everyone does a great job but those two really stood out (to me). I won't spoil this one, all I can say is "sometimes you have to lose the battle to win the war." Very emotional, the music used is Mozart's "Requiem"."

Finally, there's a few more things in the works for the networks, some of which may get announced for the fall schedules (projects that have been green lighted are noted).

Empire (ABC) Historical drama about the power struggle in Rome following the death of Julius Ceasar - Stars **Jonathan Cake** (*"The American Embassy"*) and **Santiago Cabrera** (*"MI-5"*). ABC has already ordered at least eight episodes.

Lost (ABC) - J.J. Abrams (Alias) created show about a group of plane crash survivors stranded on a Pacific island. Stars include Dominic Monaghan ("The Lord of the Rings"), Ian Somerhalder ("Smallville"), and Jorge Garcia ("Becker").

Medium (NBC) Drama about a woman (**Patricia Arquette**) who struggles to balance her psychic abilities with her family life.

Revelations (NBC) - Deals with the final showdown between God and Satan as foretold in the Bible's Book of Revelations. Six episode limited series.

American Dad (FOX) Animated family comedy from **Seth McFarlane** (*Family Guy*)that focuses on Stan, a right-leaning C.I.A. agent; his wife; their two kids, including a liberal daughter; a housebound alien named Roger; and a french-speaking goldfish.

Mr. Ed (FOX) - A re-imagining of the 1960's comedy **David Alan Basche** taking over the Wilbur Post role and **Sherman**

Hemsley as the voice of Mr. Ed. Also stars Sheryln Fenn as Wilbur's wife.

Point Pleasant (FOX) - Drama described as a cross between "**Peyton Place**" and "**The Omen**" that takes place in a town shaken one summer when a mysterious girl washes ashore.

Spellbound (FOX) - A romantic comedy about a male witch who falls in love with a mortal, creating family turmoil.

Dark Shadows (WB) An updated version of the classic 1960's gothic soap opera (also remade in the early 1990's on NBC). This looks likely, especially following the cancellation of *Angel* and the ordering of six additional scripts.

Global Frequency (WB) - Adaptation of DC/Wildstorm comic about an independent defense intelligence organization connected by a worldwide telecommunications web that uses ordinary individuals as agents around the world to fight black ops projects, unexplained phenomena and other problems the government agencies have struggled with. Probably too complex a premise for them to make it a series...

The Robinsons: Lost in Space (WB) Update of the 1960's series. Stars **Brad Johnson** (John Robinson), **Ryan Malgarini** (Will Robinson), **Jayne Brook** (Maureen Robinson), **Adrianne Palicki** (Judy Robinson) and **Mike Erwin** (Don West). There is no Dr. Smith but there is a robot. John Woo and Doug Petrie are producing. The WB is likely to go for a series if the pilot looks good.

Silver Lake (UPN) Aaron Spelling drama that revolves around a record store owner who uses his psychic abilities to communicate with the dead and help them resolve issues they left behind.

Dead Lawyers (SciFi) - A drama about a law firm on earth composed of dead lawyers, all trying to right miscarriages of justice in order to redeem themselves. Stars **F. Murray** *Abraham* and **Sean Patrick Flanery**.

The Coven (Lifetime) A drama about a group of modern-day witches.

Frankenstein (USA) - 21st century take on the classic "*Frankenstein*" story as the doctor and his monster are discovered in present-day Seattle. Scripted by **Dean Koontz** with **Martin Scorsese** producing.

Superman movie seems to be back in limbo for now with a major rewrite in the happening and most of the previously identified production personnel going off to other projects. Wonder Woman is the only other DC property with any likelihood of happening anytime soon but it has mainly been rumors about Sarah Michelle Gellar or Charisma Carpenter in line for the role. Don't hold your breath on that one.

One DC related project is getting made, though, *Constantine*. It is based on the DC/Vertigo comic book *Hellblazer* and written by **Kevin Brodbin**, **Mark Bomback** and **Frank Capello**, *Constantine* tells the story of irreverent supernatural detective John Constantine (**Keanu Reeves**), who has literally been to hell and back. When Constantine teams up with skeptical policewoman Angela Dodson (**Rachel Weisz**) to solve the mysterious suicide of her twin sister (also played by **Weisz**), their investigation takes them through the world of demons and angels that exists just beneath the landscape of contemporary Los Angeles. Caught in a catastrophic series of otherworldy events, the two become inextricably involved and seek to find their own peace at whatever cost. Look for it to hit the screens in September.

On the Marvel front, we've got *The Punisher, Spiderman 2* and *Blade: Trinity*, and *Man-Thing* coming out this year. Next year will see *The Fantastic*

Four, Elektra, Iron Man, Ghost Rider and Luke Cage all planned for 2005. According to Marvel Studio's Avi Arad, planned for 2006 are X-Men 3, The Hulk 2, Namor, The Punisher 2, plus Iron Fist, Black Widow and Deathlok as possibilities. Don't expect to see a third Spider-man movie until 2007, though. Marvel is also looking into bringing Captain America and Nick Fury to the big screen as well.

On the adaptation front, the movie version of *Douglas* Adam's Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy is finally going forward with filming starting in April. It is based on a script from **Douglas** Adams with a rewrite by Karev Kirkpatrick(Chicken **Run**) and will be directed by Garth Jennings (first time movie director from the "Hammer and Tongs" music video and commercial production team). Starring as Arthur Dent is Martin Freeman, Mos Def (Ford Prefect), Zooey Deschanel (Trillian), **Bill Nighy** (Slartibartfast), Sam Rockwell (Zaphod Beeblebrox), and Warwick Davis (Marvin the Paranoid Robot). Also in line for a new adaptation is

new adaptation is *Logan's Run. X-Men* producer/director **Bryan Singer** will direct a remake of the 1976 movie *Logan's Run* for Warner Brothers and producer **Joel Silver. Singer** says that he will bring the mandatory death age down to 21 as it was in the original novel. According to **Singer**, "This deals with a utopian society, but also with the obsession of youth and mortality." The script is currently being written and they hope to have it in theatres in 2005.

Finally, in the TV to film realm, there's lots of action happening. **Joss Whedon** has the green light for a movie based on his *Firefly* TV series about a group of spacefaring renegades. The movie will be called *Serenity* (which is the name of the ship, which is a Firefly class) and will feature the cast from the TV series. According to **Whedon**, "The movie is

bigger, more epic than anything you can do in a series." The movie will be set about six months after the events in the TV series. Whedon will direct with filming starting in June.

Rumors and a few facts are still floating around about a possible *Babylon 5* theatrical movie. J. Michael Straczynski has been writing a script for a *Babylon 5* project of some sort, but is not able to admit what it is until it gets formally announced by the production companies

involved. Rumors are that it will be a theatrical film produced in England. Where it will fit into the Babylon 5 storyline is unknown. It's name is unknown, however Straczynski has indicated an abbreviation for it **B5: TMoS**. As he said in a recent posting, "The only things I can say right now about **B5:TMoS** is that now that all the correct agreements have been signed, sealed and delivered, the draft has gone in, met with great enthusiasm all around, notes have been received, and the next draft is in process and has to be delievered within two weeks so that certain other steps can be set into motion. I still can't tell you what it *is* because that has to come from the proper people through the proper channels at the proper time...but I can tell you a few cases of what it *isn't*...it isn't a novel, or a short story, a comic, an animated series, a radio drama or a stage play. Beyond that, deponent sayeth not.'

Also starting filming this summer is a movie based on Bewitched, with Nicole Kidman as Samantha Stephens and Will Ferrell as Darrin Stephens. Also just announced is that Kevin Smith will be writing and directing a Green Hornet movie set for release in August 2005. Smith says the movie will be a serious approach and true to it's source.

Movie Previews for April and May

The year's genre movie season is kicking into full gear over the next two months. April features with two comic adaptations and the conclusion of Quintin Tarantino's Kill Bill. May picks up more steam with A Universal Monsterfest, an epic fantasy, a sequel to one of the biggest non-Disney animated films, and Roland Emmerich's look at the end of the world.

Hellboy - When a Nazi mystical experiment goes awry in 1944, the target of a wizard's spell, the child of Satan, Hellboy, is wrenched from his home, and adopted by the U.S. agents who intercept his arrival. Raised as a force of good, Hellboy grows up to be a full-fledged demon in the form of a man, complete with

fierce red skin, a tail, a giant armored glove, and two large circles where his horns should be (if they ever grow back, Hellboy is quick to break them off). Now, the adult Hellboy, an investigator of the paranormal, is sent on a mission that brings him back in touch with the evil genius that started it all ... that Nazi wizard (and just who is *he* anyway?). Accompanying him along the way are other agents, including Liz, a pyrokinetic woman Hellboy has feelings for, and Abe Sapien, a mysterious amphibian hominid... Stars Ron Perlman as Hellboy with David Hyde Pierce, Doug Jones, Karel Roden, and Jeffrey Tambor.

Ella Enchanted - Ella (Anne Hathaway of "*The Princess Diaries*") lives in a fanciful and magical world where all children are given a "gift" from a fairy Godmother at the moment of their birth. Little Ella's birthright is the gift - and curse - of obedience. As a result of this unfortunate circumstance, Ella cannot refuse any command, and is often left at the mercy of unscrupulous personalities. In a bid to regain control of her life, Ella goes on a quest to free herself from this mysterious curse. Ella must outwit a kingdom filled with ogres, giants, wicked stepsisters, talking books and evil plots. And, if she's lucky, she may find love along the way. Also stars Joanna Lumley, Cary Elwes, Minnie Driver, and Steve Coogan.

Kill Bill Vol 2 - An assassin called the Bride is shot down, with child, by her employer, Bill and other members of their assassin circle, at her wedding. Everyone at the wedding is shot as well, and Bride receives a bullet to the head, that keeps her in a coma for five years. Emerging from the tranquil state, the Bride wakes up pissed off, soon setting out to seek revenge on her former master and his deadly squad of assassins. One by one, she kills the various members of the assassin group. She saves Bill for last. The second half of Quentin Tarantino's three hour movie that was split in half. Part two sees Uma Thurman's Bride confronting David Carradine's Bill. Expect even more

action than the first half.

The Punisher - Frank Castle (Thomas Jane) is a man who has seen too much death in his life, first as a Delta Force Op and later as an FBI special agent. He has managed to beat considerable odds, and is finally moving out of the field and into a normal life with his wife and son. On his final assignment, Castle plays his undercover role perfectly, but the operation spins out of control. This places the FBI on the wrong side of Tampa businessman Howard Saint (John Travolta) and his glamorous wife Livia (Laura Harring). Notwithstanding their glossy social profile, the Saints are no genteel Florida couple; behind their copious wealth are violent beginnings, underworld ties - and a chilling capacity for brutality. Castle's worst nightmare is about to come true, as Howard Saint and his lieutenants unleash hell at the Castle family reunion. But Castle, to his everlasting torment, survives. Drawing upon all he has learned in 20 years, Castle sets in motion a brilliant plan to punish the murderers. He takes up residence among in a dilapidated tenement building on Tampa's industrial waterfront, where his fellow tenants include Joan (Rebecca Romijn-Stamos), a waitress at a nearby diner who is trying to put her life back on track. Castle's neighbors become his last link to the idea of human community and warmth. It is this makeshift family - forgotten men and women with no one to protect them - who enable Castle to find the one thing he least expects: redemption.

Godsend - After their young son, Adam (Cameron Bright), is killed in a freak accident, a couple (Greg Kinnear, Rebecca Romijn-Stamos) approach an expert (Robert De Niro) in stem cell research about bringing him back to life through an experimental (and illegal) cloning and regeneration process. When Adam comes back to them, however, he's... different

Van Helsing - Set in the late 19th century, monster hunter Dr. Gabriel Van Helsing (Hugh Jackman) is summoned to a mysterious land in East Europe to


Troy - Legolas & Boromir Alert! In 1193 B.C., Prince Paris (Orlando Bloom) of Troy stole the beautiful Greek woman, Helen (Diane Kruger), away from her husband, Menelaus (Brendan Gleeson), the king of Sparta, setting the two nations at war with each other, as the Greeks began a bloody siege of Troy using their entire armada, led by Achilles (Brad Pitt), that lasted over a decade. Also stars Eric Bana as Hector, Sean Bean as Odysseus, Peter O'Toole as Priam, and Brian Cox as Agamemnon. Directed by Directed by Wolfgang Petersen and based on some poem by some guy named Homer. Look for a sequel called **Odysseus** if this does well...

Shrek 2 - Picking up exactly where the first movie left off, this movie takes us to the kingdom of Far, Far Away as Shrek (Mike Myers) and Fiona (Cameron Diaz) return to her homeland to tell her parents (John Cleese, Julie Andrews) the good news. Not everyone is happy to find her married to an ogre, with the most irate in this group being Prince Charming (Rupert Everett), who was supposed to be the one who lifted Fiona's curse. We're also introduced to the mysterious Fairy Godmother (Jennifer Saunders), and a bar called the Poison Apple, where the villains of the fairy tale world hang out, including the great ogre-slayer, Puss-in-Boots (Antonio Banderas). Yes, Eddie Murphy is back as well, making a donkey of himself again.

The Day After Tomorrow - This movie takes a big-budget, special-effects-filled look at what the world would look like if the greenhouse effect and global warming continued at such levels that they resulted in worldwide catastrophe and disaster, including multiple hurricanes, tornadoes, earthquakes, tidal waves, floods and the beginning of the next Ice Age. At the center of the story is a paleoclimatologist (a scientist who studies the ways weather patterns changed in the past), Professor Adrian Hall (Dennis Quaid), who tries to save the world from the effects of global warming while also trying to get to his son, Sam (Jake Gyllenhaal), who was in New York City as part of a scholastic competition, when the city was overwhelmed by the chilling beginnings of the new Ice Age. In addition to all of the other challenges Dr. Hall faces, he's also going against the flow as humanity races south to warmer climes, and he's nearly the only one going north. Produced and directed by Roland Emmerich (Independence Day, Godzilla).

Harry Potter and the Prisoner of Azkaban - It's based on the third book by J.K. Rowlings. Starting during the summer before Harry's third year at Hogwarts, this is the adventure that happens when he has to go on the run after an incident where he was unable to control his anger ... getting on a bus, he hears about Sirius Black, a renegade wizard who was a Prisoner at Azkaban. What Harry doesn't suspect is that Black escaped to look for ... him. Everyone will be back except for Richard Harris, who passed away after the second film. Michael Gambon takes over the role of Dumbledore and Gary Oldman is Sirius Black.

Also coming out later in the summer are The Chronicles of Riddick (June 11), bringing back Vin Diesel's Pitch Black character of Riddick for the first of several

when stereo went to surround sound," Johnsen said. "You'll never go back again."

Putting this all together makes for a pretty impressive ride. It uses some of the techniques seen in Terminator 3D with actors in the audience crossing over to the 3D screen with the Borg characters and joining in the action. The screen effects are very realistic, and when your damaged shuttle is pulled into the Borg Cube with a tractor beam, the various effects simulates the action quite well. When The Borg starts trying to assimilate the audience, the added effect in the seats add to the experience. The ride also can handle more people at a time (approximately 50) as opposed to the 27 with the Klingon Encounter. However, with a larger crowd, more room is required for the larger group, making things move a bit more slowly. The nice thing with the original ride, is it is a small enough group of people, that they can move quickly and can get into a smaller, more confined space, especially a turbolift. Also, being on one side of the group means that you may not see all that is going on with the Borg attack.

In case you are wondering what this new ride will set you back, it is now \$29.99 admission, which gets you one ride on each of the two rides, the original Klingon Encounter and the Borg Invasion. No all day or multi ride passes are currently available. That does ensure that people will generally take both rides, which will give them a chance to see how much difference six years of technology can make on the ride experience.

Having recently returned to L.A. after a couple of years in Las Vegas, Sam was a an activemember of the Vegas SF Association (VSFA) and recent member of SNAFFU (The Southern Nevada Area Fantasy Fiction Union). As a longtime resident of LA, he has attended the LSFS scores of times over the past 30 years and longtime member of LosCon. Samattended every LosCon through the 70s and 80s.

To know Sam was not necessarily to love him, however, it CAN be said that to know him was most certainly to excite much passion. Sam has left many friends behind, but he was never one to leave you wondering where you stood with him. There are those, with whom he clashed. Although he made a living as a typesetting and layout professional, he was most proud of his Fan publishing credentials. In this regard, he would certainly agree that even bad publicity is good publicity.

Sam has been in Fandom since attending St LouisCon in 1969, cochaired Volume 14 Issue 21 by Las Vegas' own Joyce Worley. St LouisCon was Sam's first SF Con and he went on to become well known by scores of Fans across the country. Sam was a diehard anarchist Libertarian, he considered those who join the Libertarian Party to be "sellouts" to the cause. In 1969, the Libertarian Party was formed at a political convention in St. Louis, MO during the same weekend as St LouisCon. Sam traveled to St. Louis from NYC to attend this seminal event in Libertatian Politics and took advantage of the opportunity to attend the WorldCon (and he was hooked).

Sam went on to attend cons across the country and even made it to a WorldCon or two in Europe, he was originally from Edmonton, Alberta, Canada. In his 20s he went to NYC for Graduate School and also attended a school in Madison, WI. Sam was a founding member of the SF Club at NYU and participated in other NYC Fan Clubs.

Sam pubbed his ish 101 times weekly over a two year period in the 70s. New Libertarian Weekly attracted much attention due in part to its uniquely regular publication schedule and in part to its hard hitting policy of giving voice to all factions within the Libertarian movement. Its slogan, "Everyone appearing in this publication disagrees", celebrated this practice.

New Liberterian Weekly contained much news about such SF notables as Robert A.Heinlein and other material of interest to SF Fans. In fact entire issues were devoted to SF as a way to influence the culture in a Liberterian direction, in the tradition of Orwell, Bradbury and Huxley.

Sam has also pubbed his ish, Daily FreFanzine, designed to compete with the official daily organ of the given Con. Sam pubbed Daily FreFanzine each day of every con he attended since its inception at the El Paso Westercon.

Sam leaves behind a brother in Edmonton and his son, Samuel Konkin IV, in addition to those in his chosen Fan and Libertarian families.

The Waldorf Conference: Microphones, scripts, and actors - Part 2 By Shane Shellenbarger

To briefly recap, it was the evening of November 24th, 2003, and my wife, Laurie, and I were attending a benefit for the Hollywood American Civil Liberties Union and the Writers Guild Foundation, "The Waldorf Conference", a radio play performed at the Writers' Guild of America Theatre in Beverly Hills. The show was written by Nat Segaloff, Daniel M. Kimmel & Arnie Reisman, produced by Nat Segaloff and Directed by John de Lancie with the following cast: Edward Asner as Louis B. Mayer, James Cromwell as James F. Byrnes, John de Lancie as Eric Johnston, Harlan Ellison as Barney Balaban, Michael Laskin as Mendel Silberberg, Paul Mazursky as Samuel Goldwyn, Kenny Morse as Spyros Skouras, Ethan Phillips as Harry Cohn, Robert Picardo as Dore Schary, Lawrence Pressman as Albert Warner, Jacob Snyder as William Goetz, and Alan Toy as Nicholas Schenck.

The cast was excellent, quickly weaving a tapestry of words and emotions that drew the audience into a willing suspension of disbelief. Soon, the theatre was gone, the stage was gone, the microphones disappeared and the illusion of twelve men fighting for survival and wrestling with their ethics became real before the eyes of the audience. There was no intermission in this play of approximately ninety minutes and no interruption would have been welcome. Without the distractions of costumes, set design, sound effects, and all of the elements that make up a "fully staged production," the audience was able to contribute elements

of their own vision to those of the writers, director, and actors. "*The Exonerated*," a play by Jessica Blank and Erik Jensen concerning death row inmates who were innocent, is also a 'staged reading" that allows the actors and the audience to concentrate on the performance. Less, in both of these plays, is definitely more

The passion of the actors brought to life twelve men condensed down from the forty-eight movie studio executives who met on November 24th, 1947 to decide the fate of the movie industry in the United States of America. As audience members, Laurie and I were amazed at the talent amassed on the stage before us. Visions of Lou Grant, Neelix, The EMH Doctor, and Q faded as the talented actors supplanted the characters they are best known for with the motion picture moguls of a bygone era. Harlan Ellison proved that his acting is as worthy of note as is his writing. Outstanding in this superlative cast were Ed Asner as Louis B. Mayer and Robert Picardo as Dore Schary. Their battle of words and wills on that stage gave insight and substance to the real men they portrayed.

After the play, we spoke to Susan Ellison who had seen the play with friends. While waiting to speak to Harlan Ellison, Robert Picardo (The Doctor on Star Trek: Voyager) approached us and graciously thanked us for our support. We were speaking to the Ellison's when I asked Harlan to do me the favor of introducing Lauren to Ed Asner. Harlan agreed and called out, "Hey, Eddie, I've got some people I want you to meet!" "What is it now, Ellison?" asked Asner, who turned in our direction as we approached. "For some reason, my friends Laurie and Shane Shellenbarger want to meet you. Don't ask me why," replied Ellison. Asner turned to us, "You need a better class of friend," he joked, shaking our hands and creating an unforgettable moment in our lives.

We spoke to the Ellisons for about thirty minutes more when Harlan said, "I suppose that since you came all the way from Phoenix you want to go out with us?" I fought down the urge to say, "You bet!" and instead I remarked that he looked tired and it was perfectly fine if he wanted to call it a night. Ellison allowed as how it had been a long week as well as a draining day and he welcomed the opportunity to go to bed early. Laurie and I walked the Ellisons to their car where we said our goodbyes. As Laurie and I drove back to our hotel room near LAX we reveled in experience and felt not a little remorse that the night and the performances by those actors would only be contained in the memories of we few fortunate folks.

Musical Notes by Tom Tuerff

Balticon Tapes -- 1978-2003 *** Kludge CD-120

Filk recordings, as a rule, run the gamut in quality, as well as coincidence. More often than not, if a filker gets recorded at a convention, it is only because somebody has brought a handheld recorder, or an old cassette recorder with questionable batteries, and recorded the proceedings as they occur.

Of course, these tapes usually sound terrible, but it doesn't keep fans from passing them around.

Which is what makes "Balticon Tapes" all the more remarkable. Most of the performances here were recorded over a 25-year period by Scott Dorsey of Kludge Audio (note to Scott sign your liner notes next time!), who started recording filk on an old Nagra tape deck in 1978, and basically hasn't stopped. He's gone to Balticon, the annual Baltimore SF convention, every year since or has tracked down cuts from other tapes if he was missing something.

This is a remarkable 2-CD set. For the most part, the songs have been wellengineered to sound as if they're coming from the same source. You can't tell (usually) what time period any song is from by just listening to it.

(Come to think of it, you can't tell that by reading the liner notes, either, which don't date the songs at all.)

What this CD does, better than anything, is show to filk snubbers that a typical filk session is not song after song about Mr. Spock's nose hairs. There are some straight-ahead folk songs on here, totally original stuff about nothing in particular, and everything in between.

Standouts Leslie Fish's take on the old standby, "Which Side Are You On," Duane Elms's interpretations of his own "Dawson's Christian" and "Falling Down on New Jersey," and several tunes from the ever-goofy Michigan songwriter extraordinaire Tom Smith.

Dorsey went out of his way to choose an incredible lineup of different performers and song titles. This is a very entertaining set. Look for it the next time you're at a con CD table and give it a shot.

With Joe Bethancourt, you get what's promised, 18 banjo tunes and a lot of Joe's bizarre, between-song humor. (Those of you who remember when Joe played out at the now-defunct Funny Fellows may want to whip up a toasted-roll hoagie and a brewski, with a side of chips, served in a red plastic basket, before popping this on for full effect.)

He can go from silly ("Cindy Cindy") to serious ("Lonesome Water") at the drop of a hat, and have you hanging on every note. And while he usually stays away from being political, even his pro-gun song, "Me and My 30.06," makes fine points that even a gun-control activist can't really argue with.

Joe doesn't get out to local cons much anymore, so if you need a banjo fix, I suggest going to random-factors.com right now and picking this up.

Haunted History By Dawn Mullan

When visitors first enter the Pioneer Living History Village, they see the dirt and desert landscape with preserved, refurbished, and sample buildings scattered about the property exhibiting Arizona's Territorial days. What visitors may not realize is that the grounds are alive with history in more ways than was specified on the website. Walking around from building to building, some visitors have seen and heard unexplainable things as well as had strange feelings when entering a few of the buildings on the property

At least four of the museum's buildings give even the most skeptical visitors a weird sensation. Two of these buildings have had recent sightings. The Opera House, the two story building near the entrance, has had a specter of a woman in 1800's period clothing seen in one of the upstairs rooms. At another building, strange occurrences abound when one morning a security guard wrote in the log about someone leaving a light on, though there is no electricity or any other light source connected to this particular building.

While investigating the village, there was no problem finding the four buildings that had sightings just by the

feel of the land. Something, or someone, pulls you toward these residences. The other motivating factor, the feeling of being watched as you move through the buildings and property.


The Opera House looming large seems to watch visitors even from afar. Walking into the first floor, the heavier the place feels toward the stage. Though no orbs came from pictures taken at the stage, other pictures taken in the reception area of the hall do reveal that orbs were watching us investigate.

The Victorian House northwest of the entrance is open to visitors, but the home was only for observation as the rooms were sectioned off by ropes. Several investigators noticed on a light breeze day at the back of one of the rooms with no air current that the curtains moved by themselves on the far side of the wall. On my visit, I felt as if a presence was there of a small child and when I went out the back door onto the porch, a small voice murmured to me. Another investigator heard a dog barking in that vicinity, but there are no dogs on the property only penned chickens, wild rabbits and other natural desert wildlife.

Jack's House stood the farthest to the north and west on the property and was intriguing since one of the other investigators saw the shadow of a child sitting at the kitchen table. Peering through a window, this investigator found a vase with plastic flowers that had been dumped on the floor from a nearby bookcase even though no visitor is able to get into the house. Only one open door with bars is given to see the old furniture inside but this gate is padlocked. Readings on the temperature gauge showed erratic shifts bolting across the room like a small child running back and forth in front of the door as if to play with our meter.

The historical museum is also full of wonders and items from Arizona's Territorial past from the 1880's to 1912 including a blacksmith, bank, jail, teacherage, church, dress shop, gun fights and fascinating pioneer objects from scissors to eyeglasses. Learning about the west and how far Arizona has come since Statehood is a truly unique and exciting experience. Though, if you like your history haunted, well, the Pioneer Living History Village has that too.



Pointless Meanderings by Brandon Huigens

After returning from the Alternative Press Expo in San Francisco this past February (my first time as an exhibitor at a comics convention), one might suppose this article would be relative to that subject-anyone that knows me knows that APE has become the single event I look forward to each year. However, for this issue of ConNotations, I was given an opportunity to write about something more important than my own experiences as a comics creator. So, APE next time, folks

This time learning how to create comics, as relevant literature, in school. And not at an elementary level.

Personally having the time to only attend class in small segments, I recently learned of an amazing opportunity to learn about comic books and sequential art at a collegiate level. The class is the first of it's known kind in the country a course exclusively dedicated to teaching students how to write in the field of comics. Most comics creators will tell you that in general college (and sometimes art schools), instuctors are rarely supportive of creative aspirations in the field of comic books and graphic novels. That said, there have been boundless opportunities for artists to attend schooling about the visual artistic aspect of comics, such as the renouned Joe Kubert School of Cartoon and Graphic Art. What there haven't been, though, are how-to write comics classes.

Enter Phoenix College Creative Writing professor Hershman John.

Mr. John, a familiar face to any comics retailer in Phoenix the last decade, is owed a debt of gratitude from every comic fan that's ever dreamed of writing a Spiderman or a Batman story, or a comics story about a troubled relationship, but wasn't sure how to go about doing so. How does one script a comic for an artist? How much does continuity really matter to my stories? Where does one go for reference? These were some of the questions I personally had, having self-published and never having to work with an artist or on any characters that required extensive research.

Recently, I was able to talk a bit with Hershman John about the course he's teaching, his love for comics, and how it's time for comic books to stop being ignored as literature. Enjoy!

Brandon Huigens: What prompted you to approach the PC faculty about teaching comics scriptwriting?

Hershman John: What prompted me to create the class basically was my love for comics. I have been reading comics for about 22 years now. My journey first started as a Christmas present, three consecutive issues of the Teen Titans. Ever since then I was hooked. I spent every nickel and dime of any money I have ever received on comics since. After high school, I went onto college and received a degree in Creative Writing-in the area of poetry.

BH How did that educational and teaching experience in other literary fields develop into your wanting to teach people about how to write comics?

HJ I couldn't ever forget my roots. Along with reading poetry and poetic theory, I

had my latest copy of

Superman or the X-

Up to this point, I was teaching a combination of composition, creative writing (poetry) and some American Indian Literature, but I have always had the desire to teach my abilities, and understanding the process of comics is one of them

Growing up, going to school, I first learned everything I knew from reading comics. However, it was never taught. Not in high school, not in college, not even in the real world. The only places I ever saw others passionate about this subject was the local comic book store or the major comic book conventions. I would love to have studied literature through reading graphic novels, or take a creative writing course in comic book writing. But, alas, there were no such courses at ASU or the

community colleges. As a result, I took it upon myself. I approached our **Creative Writing** program and suggested the concept. I was told "it sounds like a great idea.' So came my first

proposed course in Creative Writing CRW 271 Introduction to Comic Book Writing. This is the first such course I've ever heard of-I've even gone on line to many universities to check out their course schedules and found no similar class. I was trying to find a

successful course that someone else was doing, but there were none. I had to start from scratch and just began developing and imagined if I was a student in such a class, what would I like to learn about?

With the first course in the new PC course catalogue, would anyone sign up? That I didn't know. A week before school started I found out that the course was full. And this was a late-start course too. I was surprised as only a few new creative writing classes ever get enough students to make it a "go" for the course. But, here I

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> was with a new course in my hand and it was full.

BH Why do you feel comics are only now, after years of publication, receiving more merit/consideration as a relevant, worthwhile form of literature?

HJ I feel comics are only now being viewed as literature as they have stood the test of time since World War II and the Depression. Furthermore, Maus has gone onto win the Pulitzer Prize, something unheard of for a work of this type.

Like I said before, I would have like to have learned some of my literature from

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comic books. For example, I consider Stan Lee / Steve Ditko's run on Spider-Man, a great American novel. I have enjoyed the Watchman and grittier stories that followed. I like the creation of the many characters in Comic-dom and consider them greats. Greats like Steinbeck's characters from the Grapes of Wrath or Toni Morrison's Beloved. Maus, Superman, The X-Men, Fathom-these are my classics.

movies comes more notoriety of [comic book] characters. The characters have become living icons for the many comic book companies out there. It's rare to see many of our "literary" classics become big icons like Superman. However, many of the comic book superheroes/villains achieve this level. It is a level where their stories should become worthwhile literature.

BH Since the initial class has been a success so far, what are your future plans for classes of this nature, at Phoenix College and elsewhere?

HJ I guess initial success means that the class met with the required amount of students and no one has dropped yet. I notice each week, the students are interested in learned how Stan Lee, Devin Grayson, Michael Turner, and Brian Michael Bendis writer their stories. How do they do it? Well, this is the class for you.

BH What are your future plans regarding teaching comics writing? HJ My future plans are to create new courses in Comic Book writing. I will teach an Intermediate Comic Book Writing course in Spring 2005, open only to students who have completed the Introduction to Comic Book Writing course. Be on the look out for this. I also plan to develop a literature course where we spend our time studying graphic novels like The Watchmen, Maus, Ultimate Spiderman, Wonder WomanThe Hiketa... We read and react and write on the greats or drawback of comic books. One day, after the success of the courses, I'll develop a Graphic Novel Literature course.

Along with the success, I'm trying to get some courses started at ASU, as well. The idea of teaching comic books, I believe is essential to creative writing. It is a genre that has been universally ignored, unlike poetry, fiction, non-fiction, playwriting, music, etc.

BH What makes writing comics unique? **HJ** Comic book writing is so different from any creative writing genre. It's different in its ideals and format. It may follow some elements of play/screen writing, but it does not follow the rules.

Comic book writing is detailed in dialogue and history. It is riddled with staying true to characters that have been in over 200 serialized issues. It is a genre for someone who loves to read comic books. This genre is very collaborative, unlike other genres like poetry, which is very personal and private. It is unlike fiction writing, which likewise is private, and takes years to write a book. Comic book writing is quick...3-weeks for a script. A lot of collaboration goes on between the editors, the writers, and the artists. Ideas are bounced back and forth; as a result, comic book writing is not a private journey. I know the word about this course is getting out as I am giving a workshop at the University of Hawaii, in Hilo, on this very topic. My presentation is called "Taking & Teaching Comic Book Writing."

BH You've mentioned something about asking a major comics company to provide incentive of some sort to your studentscould you elaborate on that? **HJ** This summer I'm going to try to develop some partnerships with comic book companies and hopefully some thing more in the way of sponsorship could come about.

But, I won't know anything until I propose and speak to different people at the different comic book conventions. Keep your fingers crossed, I guess. BH What should students expect of your class? Do interested parties need previous knowledge of specific comics? HJ What should you know before taking my comic book writing course Well, anyone can take the course. However, the course is based first on the superhero genre. You should have some foundation of reading comics. You should have some love for writing. Come to the class with your knowledge of your favorite comic book heroes / villains.

Our texts include Ultimate Spiderman (vol. 1 trade paperback), Wonder Womanthe Hiketa (trade paperback), and a text on comics scriptwriting called Writers On Comic Script Writing. All three of the books delve into understanding the genre of comic book writing. I encourage anyone who wants to become a comic book writer, or who just wants to be in a classroom full of your peers who love comics, take the course. Come and enjoy this new and unique learning experience. **BH** Thank you, Hershman. Amazing what passion and drive can do. I'm taking this course right now, and I love it.

In just a short time thus far, Mr. John's class has been extremely helpful. It provides a much-needed forum - a sounding board, for ideas about every-thing from scripting format, to how to write believable dialogue, how to use the revisionist myth technique, and even how to communicate with an artist. This initself is helpful in that the consensus is of your serious creative peers in an educational environment, not in a book, and not online where one can't be sure of other's intentions.

These tools, and more, have proven immensely valuable to me personally thus far, as I am currently developing a property for a comic book company, and scripting for a penciller is required.

Which tools have worked specifically? Well, for that, you'll have to take Hershman John's class.

For those interested, the next course offering at Phoenix College will be Fall 2004 for CRW 271Introduction to Comic Book Writing. The class will take place Tuesday night, late start, 12 weeks, 600 – 920 pm.

Also of note Spring 2005CRW 271Intermediate Comic Book Writing, Tuesday night, late start, 12 weeks, 600-920 pm. AND CRW 271Introduction to Comic Book Writing, Thursday night, late start, 12 weeks, 600-920 pm. Check the Phoenix College class schedules for correct times / start dates.

(Remember only those who have completed the introductory course are allowed into the intermediate course.)

Frank T. Hopkins (Viggo Mortensen) and his Mustang, Hildago (T.J.) entertain in Wild Bill Cody's Wild West Show but Frank does more drinking there then entertaining the audience as he tries to run away from the past. While he was a dispatch rider, he gave important instructions to the cavalry and leaves. Instead of disarming the Native Americans, the soldiers over-reacted and killed everyone in the tribe. Hildago hearing the initial scuffle turns the concerned Frank around and heads them back to the scene of the gunfire. Frank is mortified believing he had assisted in the massacre. From then on Frank is an unproductive member of society taking in more liquor then doing his job as an entertainer.

Considerable time passes before two men confront Frank and Bill Cody. Insulted by the show's claim that Frank T. Hopkins is the best endurance rider in the world, the two men challenge Frank to the ultimate test: a three thousand mile race across the Arabian Desert called the "Ocean of Fire" against the purest bred horses in the world.

On this journey, Frank must not only fight for his pride and honor but for his identity. Only Hildago and Frank's courage will be able to sustain them both against the harsh sun, lack of water, sand storms and treachery. Though the race brings Frank back to himself, he embraces who he is only in his darkest hour. Being half Native American and hiding his heritage from the white culture of the time, Frank comes to terms with his ancestry. In doing so, he becomes whole and wins more then money can buy.

Even though this movie is "based on a true story," this statement may not be accurate. Frank T. Hopkins wrote Hildago and his adventures but there are no records confirming any part of this story that can be found. Don't see this movie based on historical significance; see this film for its adventure, cinematography, heroics, and of course, Viggo Mortensen. -**Dawn Mullan**

A dream sequence opens the film as Elizabeth Swann (Keira Knightley) at the age of ten sails on a ship with her father, the Governor, to the Caribbean Fort in Port Royal on the crossing from England. Soon enough, Elizabeth sees a parasol floating on the water then a boy about her same age. Upon calling the attention of the crew the boy is brought aboard just in time to see the merchant vessel in flames.

Waking but for a moment the two children exchange introductions. Passing out again the boy is in Elizabeth's care as such she notices the pirate's medallion around his neck and hides the trinket from the crew. Curiously Elizabeth glances toward the ocean to see the ghostly ship of the Black Pearl sailing away into the unknown. With that, Elizabeth wakes with a start and brings out the medallion from a secret compartment in her bureau drawer. Taking the medallion with her to the ceremony for the Commodore, she faints in her new tightly-fitted dress and lands in the ocean below the fort.

The ship returns that night to reclaim its gold, but not before the pirate, Captain Jack Sparrow (Johnny Depp), saves Elizabeth from the ocean, is arrested, escapes, and confronts Will Turner (Orlando Bloom), the boy who was saved from the merchant vessels eight years prior.

After the encounter with Will, the pirate captain is again caught and put into a jail cell awaiting his execution as the Black Pearl comes for its bounty. Pirates raid the settlement of Port Royal, taking Elizabeth and leaving with their gold. Will doing his best to fight the pirates is rendered unconscious and upon his waking he boldly makes a stand to find Elizabeth but is turned away by the Commodore and the Governor. Will then goes to the jail to enlist the assistance of Captain Sparrow. Following Sparrow, the two commandeer one vessel, the Dauntless, to trick the fleet to giving him another, more speed worthy vessel, the Interceptor.

Unable to catch the pair, the Commodore watches Sparrow and Turner sail away with a ship of the fleet in his sabotaged vessel. Next the two ship stealing comrades go to Tortuga to find a crew and then speed off to rescue Elizabeth, but not before Will discovers he is the son of a pirate. Unsure of his feelings, Will is mired with hatred for pirates and the actions of becoming one in order to save his childhood love. Then the real fun begins . . .

Freaky Friday (12/2003) Disney, 97 mins, PG \$24.99 VHS, \$29.99 DVD

In *Freaky Friday*, teenager Anna (Lindsay Lohan) and her forty-something psychiatrist mom Tess (Jamie Lee Curtis) have sunk into a rut of frustrated bickering—until a magic spell causes them to switch bodies. Suddenly Tess finds herself faced with the perils of high school, while Anna has to cope with her mother's patients and her fiancee (Mark Harmon).

This is the third version of this film which is based on the Mary Rodgers book. It was filmed in 1977 with Barbara Harris and Jodie Foster and then again as a made for TV film in 1995 with Shelly Long and Gaby Hoffman. This update of the original film is masterfully done. 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In Our Book

Lord of Snow and Shadows by Sarah Ash Bantam Spectra, \$21.95, 480 pps.

Boy, this was a fun and entertaining read. My kind of fantasy. Magic, strange locales, costumes, castles, and romance too.

I have not read Ms. Ash before, but if this book is any indication, I shall seek her other novels. She writes very well and her descriptions are wonderful without being over done.

This is the story of the poor farm boy who will save the galaxy---no wait, sorry, wrong tale! Anyway, this is about a young man Gavril Andar, a genteel portrait painter, who lives in a warm southern clime called Smarna with his mother. And he falls in love with one of his commissions, Astasia Orlov, daughter of the Grand Duke. But of course, he is not in her class.

Shazaaam! Everything changes, when news reaches he and his mother that his mysterious (and hitherto unknown) father has died. His father, the Drakhaon, has been murdered, making Gavril the next Drakhaon of Ashkendir, an icy

land to the north.

Before Gavril can think, he is kidnapped by his father's right hand Bogatyr, Kostya and taken to Ashkendir. There he finds himself embroiled in dark secrets, blood feuds, mysterious alchemical workings—and his rather frightening heritage.

And then there's a young woman named KiuKiu, a kitchen drudge in the "kastel" Drakhaon—who is also more than she appears. She discovers she has not only an unexpected heritage as Gavril does, but an unexpected talent that just might save Gavril, and Ashkendir.

There are plenty of folks, of course, who do not want Gavril to survive as the next Drakhaon. We have a prince with delusions of being emperor. We have a conniving court lady Lilias, who claims she is carrying Gavril's half brother---but is she? Lilias is playing several ends against the middle. There is a spymaster (Count Velemir) manipulating the strings of several characters. There are even revolutionaries stirring the populace. (shades of Lenin!)

Gavril, confronted by a world he does not understand well and dealing with people with several agendas, works hard to keep his humanity in all the machinations swirling around him.

I loved it.

The whole world of "Snow and Shadows" is based loosely on Imperial Russia. Prince Eugene sounds very much like Peter the Great, even to the building of Peterhof (Eugene calls his palace Swanholm). There is the land of Muscobar (Muscovy?) and Mirom (St. Petersburg?) on the river Nieva (the Neva?). There are pseudo Russian names and titles and the hierarchy sounds very tsarist.

This is a meaty, rich novel. And with plenty of wonderful sections full of fire and ice and dramatic battles.

This is also (of course) the start of a series and I say, bring them on! - **Sue Mar-tin**

Flinx's Folly by Alan Dean Foster Del Rey/ Ballantine Books Hard Cover \$24.95

This, the eighth book in the ever popular Flinx of the Commonwealth series continues his journey of discovery to find out who and what he is and where he comes from. Foster begins the story with Flinx being wheeled into the emergency room. We later find out the reason is that he along with several others were struck unconscious. We also find out that there are new enemies searching for him, the Order of Null. The Order is composed of beings who are awaiting the "Great Emptiness" that awaits. It is apparently a sentient entity of evil. I like the Order; they are very calm collected individuals, who believe Flinx must die to allow Death to come for us all. Flinx is the key to stopping this but he doesn't know how.

Flinx also returns to his great crush Clarity Held. He explores his thoughts and feelings about her and how it affects his future. Her current boyfriend has reservations about Flinx and her feelings for him. Pip continues to protect her master and friend, but new ways are found to avoid her lethal venom. Unlike most of the series this one is more of a bridge and you need to know something of the other books to get it's full impact. That said I think it answers almost as many questions as it poses and is an important piece of the story. - **Bob LaPierre**

Matrix Warrior: Being the One by Jake Horsley Thomas Dunne/St. Martin's Griffin Books, 223 pp. \$13.95

"Perhaps one in a thousand of those who see the movie will recognize or even notice its true message," writes the author, citing it as the method to unplug yourself from the illusion of consensus reality, to take control of your own life and destiny, to become a free person like the movie's hero Neo. This is a nonfiction work, reading popular philosophy out of the trilogy. It's written in a hip, informative, easy-toread style.

The author cites Carlos Castaneda and Philip K. Dick as his inspirations while he analyzes The Matrix. Let me just say that the only movie I've ever seen that resembled PKD's work so much that it seemed directly written by him is the Oscar-winning '*A Beautiful Mind.*' But I suppose you can achieve enlightenment from herd mentality if you follow this book, or does that make you part of the author's herd? Ahhh, philosophy. - **Mike Griffin**

The Rough Guide to The Lord of the Rings Paul Simpson, Helen Rodiss, Michaela Bushell, editors Penguin Books; 304 pp. \$12.95 US

The Rough Guides are better known for their travel handbooks than for literary expertise, so the reader might be justified in mistaking this pocket-sized volume for a bit of fluff tossed off to ride the Peter Jack-

son wave. On the contrary, the contributors obviously love their subject and have employed TARDIS technology to pack 300-odd pages with fact, folklore, and trivia. Included are a biography of Tolkien; the books, their influences, and journey to publication; the screen adaptations; criticism and pop-culture (Leonard Nimoy, anyone?); and yes, a tongue-in-cheek chapter devoted to sightseeing and accommodations in Middle-Earth.

Surprisingly, the Rough Guide to LOTR goes into more detail than most books of its type. For example, any survey of Tolkien will mention his friendship with C. S. Lewis, but few discuss their differences. The pop-culture section includes communes and long-forgotten bands that came out of the Great Tolkien Scare of the 60's. The chapter titled "Locations" covers England and New Zealand, but also influential places from Tolkien's childhood in South Africa. Numerous references, mostly on-line, provide pointers to more in-depth information on just about every subject covered.

What makes this book an especially fun read is its breezy and occasionally cheeky voice. The photo-caption writer in particular seems to be under the influence of whimsical mushrooms – unfortunately the many movie stills lose something when shrunk to 2X3.

The Rough Guide is the LoTR book to buy if you only buy one. It's also handy when you want to look up a quick fact without digging through your entire Tolkien reference library. - Nancy L. Freeman

The X President by Philip Baruth Bantam Books, 370 pp., \$11.95

I wish I could say this is the weirdest book ever written about recent ex-president BC, but it isn't. Let's say it's the most favorable weird book about him. Baruth is critical of him, but from an objective viewpoint, not going to the extremes of partisan politics. It's truly speculative fiction, blending mainstream realism with science fiction of the time travel type. Sally, a college professor and biographer of 109-yearold BC (he's never named, it's just BC), is sent back in time to change history. For BC's anti-tobacco policy led to US tobacco companies flooding the third world, which caused world wars. The USA is losing to China, and a secret military project drafts Sally. Her teammates: a hard riding colonel man in charge, a seductress to lure young BC, and James Carville (?!?). Target years: 1963 and 1995. What's weirdest about this novel is that it could all be true: BC didn't cause the tobacco wars in his term, so our timeline has avoided that disaster. That's just part of the fun, satire, and seriousness. In this time of presidential campaigns, this is the perfect read. -**Mike Griffin**



Musty Tomes

Conjure Wife by Fritz Leiber reprinted in "Dark Ladies", Tom Doherty Assoc., Sep 1999 Reviewed by Catherine Book

I usually try to bring you books that I feel are classics; stories that I think are still worth reading. This is, of course, my own humble opinion but then so is this review. *Conjure Wife* is 50 years old this year and eligible for the Retro-Hugo. It doesn't deserve it.

The story is simple: very successful, very lucky college professor believes he has a wonderful, lucky wife; right up until he discovers she's a witch and has been charming his life. He demands she stop everything and destroy all the charms. (Anyone see a TV show here?) As soon as all the charms are destroyed, terrible things began to happen to him. This is when he discovers, to his horror, that three of his colleagues are also unknowingly married to witches - witches who are out to destroy him to advance their husbands' careers. And, they have diabolical plans for his now defenseless wife.

The story is too simplistic and the writer takes full advantage of 210 pages to discourse on the nature of men and women and of rationalism vs. mysticism. Perhaps the subject was still fresh enough in 1953 to interest the reader but I don't enjoy pages of lecture. I want to see character and plot development. I want to enter the book through the writer's words and live with the characters. The thing that really offends me, though, is the writer's treatment of women in general. I know, that in 1953, the ideal that was touted in schools and women's magazines was to be the perfect wife. The definition of which was essentially "to find happiness in your virtual slavery." In this, Mr. Leiber faithfully reflects his times. The women are venal, stupid and jealous. They are incapable of rising to nobility and, in fact, have never even been able to advance their 'craft.' The women are portrayed as too jealous to teach their daughters so the knowledge is fragmented and women practice it alone rather than share with their sisters. All their efforts

are for the benefit of their man, with the notable exception of one particularly nasty witch who wants it all for herself. It takes the rational men, working outside of their experience, to find the key to "higher witchcraft" that saves our happy couple. The closing scene is reminiscent of hundreds of B-mystery movies. Blecchh!.

For Us, the Living A Comedy of Customs By Robert A. Heinlein Reviewed by Randall Whitlock

You've undoubtedly read the standard bioblurb that Robert A. Heinlein was inspired to write his first short story, "Lifeline," by a 1939 writing contest in Thrilling Wonder Stories. What few people knew was that RAH had already written a complete novel. That novel, *For Us, The Living* was finally published in late 2003 after literally being rediscovered in a grad student's garage.

Perry Nelson is a young naval aviator, killed in a 1939 automobile accident. He awakens in a new body (the How and Why are never explained) to find the year is now 2086 and American society has undergone many, many changes. Guided by kindly Diana, he explores this new culture and learns to leave his 20th century prejudices behind.

As pointed out in the thoughtful foreword by Spider Robinson and enlightening afterword by Robert James, this is a classic Utopian novel, inspired by the likes of Bellamy's Looking Backward and Wells' The Sleeper Awakes (RAH had an autographed copy of the latter). Utopian novels are generally as dry as a communion wafer, and surrounded by just as much preaching. Heinlein's flair for dialogue, apparently the first of his writing super-powers to develop, saves this novel from such creeping dryness. You still get the preaching, but you'll probably shout "Amen" to some of it. (My metaphor is ironic since the preaching is often against the political power of organized religion.)

Heinlein fans will find much familiar in For Us, The Living. RAH used many of its concepts and future history in his later work, including Scudder's theocratic dictatorship from "If This Goes On," the economic system of "Beyond This Horizon," and the justice system of "Coventry."

I felt a strange sense of role reversal as I read For Us, The Living. You see, I read (and hopefully grokked) most of Heinlein's work when I was between the ages of fourteen and eighteen, starting with the juvenile novels he wrote in his forties. These works, planted in my high school library by some blessed subversive, profoundly influenced my personal philosophy. Now I'm in my forties and reading a work the grandmaster wrote in his own younger days. I perceive some naiveties in this future vision that certainly wouldn't have appeared in his later works, those written after he saw how the New Deal politics of 1939 played out in the long run.

I greatly enjoyed *For Us, The Living,* but I would not recommend it for beginning readers of Robert A. Heinlein. Read a bunch of his better known works first, then come back for a fresh glimpse into the mind that would redefine science fiction forever.
