
A Conversation with Forrest J. Ackerman

I was at Comic-Con 2005 when I lucked into an opportunity to interview the most celebrated fan – Forrest J. Ackerman. For our younger fen who might not recognize the

name - Forry started out in life with a great love and fascination for all things fantasical and horrific, reading **Amazing Stories** in 1926, back when the genre was known as Scientifiction. He was a literary agent and personal friend for Ray Bradbury; and, he coined the often-still controversial term Sci-Fi way back in 1954. He's been known as



memorabilia. He had magazines, movie props, costumes and masks. He had the Bela Legosi cape and Lon Chaney cape from the Phantom of the Opera. He gave tours of his

amazing collection every Saturday.

Forry was a delightful gentleman although he'd probably laugh at me if he'd heard that. I am intensely grateful for the opportunity to have spent a little private time with him. He considers himself a repository of science fiction history and loves to relate stories. For me, he will forevermore be the name

on the cover of all those Perry Rhodan books I read so long ago. (I thought, for a short time, that Forrest J. Ackerman

September

TV News & Previews By Lee Whiteside

It's the end of the year, which means most of the network shows are in repeats but we've got new episodes of most everything on the horizon for January. December isn't completely barren, since we've got SciFi's annual early December big event, the six hour miniseries The Triangle, Christmas episodes of Smallville and The Dead Zone, and over in the U.K. and on Canadian screens, there's the highly anticipated Doctor Who special episode, The Christmas Invasion. This fall season on the broadcast networks saw the biggest number of new science fiction/fantasy shows to debut in the same year in quite a while. And at press time, all six of the new shows are still on the air with four of them having gotten full season orders before the start of November sweeps. First to debut was Supernatural on The WB, which had a strong debut and has held up well so far and was the first to get picked up for a full season of 22 episodes. The three alien (or whatever they are) invasion shows had also done well overall. Surface has helped NBC to get some momentum going on Monday nights and got a full season order. Invasion has drawn a good sized audience on Wednesday nights with some help from its lead-in Lost. However, not all of the Lost viewers are sticking around to watch Invasion, but it has been doing well enough to be competitive in the time slot and ABC has given it a full season order. Threshold has done decent ratings for CBS on Friday night, and as of press time CBS has ordered three more scripts, which is a good sign of further episodes being ordered. CBS has also started making current episodes of Threshold available online in an attempt to boost awareness of the series. The biggest surprise has been *The Ghost Whisperer*, which has done very well opening up Friday nights for CBS and it has gotten a full season pick up as well. Last, and least, is Night Stalker on ABC. It was the last of the new genre shows to debut and ratings have been fair. Both Night Stalker and Alias have not been giving ABC much in the way of viewers on Thursday night and rumors are that both shows may be headed to hiatus soon. ABC has been doing well on other nights, especially with some of their other new shows such as Commander in Chief, so Night Stalker may be given a chance to hang around a bit longer, but don't be surprised if it is gone by the time you read this. SciFi's big event this year is the six hour miniseries The Triangle. It boasts a few names familiar to science fiction fans, with Executive producers Dean Devlin (Independence Day), Bryan Singer (X-

Men, Superman Returns), and Rocke S. O'Bannon (Farscape). O'Bannon wrote the script based on a story by **Devlin** and Singer. It will air over three nights, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, December 5,6 & 7, with an encore of all three parts on Sunday, December 11th. As you might guess, it deals with the strange events connected with the Bermuda Triangle. Sam Neill is billionaire Eric Benirall, who has been losing his cargo ships and their crews in The Triangle and he wants to find out why. He puts together a team of experts to investigate including Eric Stoltz as tabloid journalist/skeptic Howard Thomas, Catherine Bell is ocean resource engineer Emily Patterson, Michael Rodgers is scientist/adventurer Gruce Gellar, and Bruce Davison is psychic Stan Latham. Lou Diamond Philips plays Meeno Paloma, a boat pilot who experienced The Triangle when on a Greenpeace expedition and has not been the same since. Benirall promises them unlimited funding for their research and a nice paycheck when they solve the mysteries. Things pick up when a jetliner disappears over The Triangle, and each member of the team is affected by bizarre and unexplainable occurrences and the government starts to take an interest in their project, making things take a dangerous turn. Look for lots of promotion for it by SciFi (and via the other NBC/Universal outlets) which will likely make this as big a ratings winner as the Taken miniseries event was a couple of years ago.

That's not all that SciFi has in store for us in December. Saturday, Dec 10th will see the debut of *Painkiller Jane*, a pilot for a

possible series if it gets a good response. It is based on a comic series created by Jimmy Palmiotti and Joe Quesada and published by Event Comics in the mid 90's. The original comic didn't fare very well and attempts to raise the character's profile with crossovers with The Punisher, Hellboy, Darkness, and Vampirella didn't seem to do much for the character, either. But MGM Television picked up the rights and it has made it to the pilot stage. Starring in the title role is Emmanuelle Vaugier as Jane Browning, who is a young Marine officer that gains rapid self-healing powers

Movie News By Lee Whiteside

Joss Whedon's Serenity opened with a not very impressive \$10 million opening weekend and was pretty much gone from the theatres within a month. That doesn't bode well for a followup movie, but once the DVD sales are tallied, there is a chance that there will be more for fans of the series. Whedon is now at work on the script for Wonder Woman and has also sold a script to Universal for Goners, a supernatural thriller that Whedon described as "the story of a young woman's journey that involves a great deal of horror and some heroics."

Director **Uwe Boll** is continuing to mine computer game adaptions with **Bloodrayne** scheduled for a January release. He's been busy working on **In the Name of the King: A Dungeon Siege Tale. Boll** was considering releasing the movie in two parts, like **Quentin**

Tale. Boll was considering releasing the movie in two parts, like Quentin

Tarantino did with Kill Bill, but he's decided to put out a 2 hour, 40 minute version when it is released later in 2006, with the DVD release likely being even longer. It stars Jason Statham, Ron

Perlman, John Rhys Davies, Ray

Liotta, Leelee Sobieski, Burt Reynolds and Kristanna Loken (who also stars in Bloodrayne). Statham sets out to rescue his kidnaped wife and avenge the death of his son, taking on the animal warrior Krugs that are controlled by the evil

Another **Philip K. Dick** story is getting the big screen treatment. His story, "The Golden Man", is being adapted as the movie Next. Nicolas Cage stars as a man who can see the future and change it. Julianne Moore is a federal agent who is trying to find him in order to prevent a terrorist attack. Look for it sometime in 2007. Another adaptation is Children of Men, based on a P.D. James novel. It will star Chiwetel Ejiofor (the Operative in Serenity) as the leader of a political faction that wants to control the future of the human race. Michael Caine, Clive Owen, and Julianne Moore also star with Alfonso Cuaron directing. Neil Gaiman's Stardust looks to be heading towards the big screen as well. Matthew Vaughn is in final negotiations to direct and produce the movie, using a script that he and writing partner Jane Goldman produced. In other Neil Gaiman movie news, Dakota Fanning has been signed to provide the voice for Coraline in the stop motion verison of the award winning children's book by Gaiman. Henry Selick is writing and directing. Jon Favreau is the latest director to get involved with the long in gestation adaptation of Edgar Rice Burrough's John Carter of Mars. Writer Ehren Kruger is taking a stab at a screenplay adaptation for Favreau to work with.

The next 007 movie, *Casino Royale*, is moving ahead, having named English actor **Daniel Craig** (*Layer Cake*) as the new James Bond. This will be the 21st official Bond film and **Craig** will be the sixth actor in the role. Filming starts in January.

after being exposed to a biochemical weapon. She becomes an ultra-covert agent fighting crime while struggling to remain free from those who would now use her gifts for sinister purposes. Also starring are Tate Donovan, Richard Roundtree, and Eric Dane. SciFi will likely have another movie or two on Saturdays in January, but as of press time have not announced which ones will air. SciFi Pictures reportedly in the can include Black Hole Terror, Caved In, Fire Alien and Magma.

SciFi has also announced that they have picked up *Eureka* for a thirteen episode series to debut next summer, adding eleven episodes to the original pilot order. The quirky series about a secret think tank in the Pacific Northwest stars Colin Ferguson as U.S. Marshal Jack Carter who becomes stranded in Eureka and discovers there are strange things going on. Also starring are Greg Germann, Joe Morton, Maury Chykin, Erica Cerra and Matt Frewer. SciFi has also ordered a two hour pilot of The Dresden Files from Nicolas Cage's production company, Saturn Films, and Lions Gate Television. It is based on the novel series by **Jim** Butcher about Harry Dresden, a wizard/ detective in a modern day Chicago where the supernatural is commonplace. The pilot was written by Hans Beimler and Robert Hewitt Wolfe, who have a good

track record with various incarnations of Star Trek, The 4400 and Andromeda (the early years) between them. I'd peg this as a good bet to make it to series as long as SciFi doesn't meddle with it too much. Harry Dresden would be played by Paul Blackthorne, best know as Stephen Saunders on the third season of 24. Directing the pilot will be David Carson, who has directed successful pilots such as Deep Space Nine and The Dead Zone as well as the Star Trek Generations movie. SciFi has also picked up the German production Ring of the Nibelungs, which will air next spring titled Dark Kingdom: The Dragon King. It is an English language production filmed in Germany with a script written by Diane Duane and Peter Moorwood. Its loosely based on the Germanic myth about the magic ring of the Nibelungs and the Nordic Volsunga Saga. It stars Benno Furmann, Alicia Witt, Max Von Snydow, Raf Moler, Julian Sands, and Otto West. It was directed by Uli Edel, who directed The Mists of Avalaon, King of Texas and **Purgatory**, all mini-series on TNT among many other TV series including Twin **Peaks** and **Oz.**

SciFi has also announced an official renewal for both Stargate SG-1 (a record tenth season) and Stargate Atlantis. Negotiations are in progress with the actors, however, so its not yet clear if all of the regular cast will return for either

show. As for Battlestar Galactica, rumors are that an official pickup for a third season will be announced soon. Of course, all three series return in January for the second half of their current seasons. If you need to catch up on Battlestar Galactica, there will be a DVD release in December of the first ten episodes of the season. New episodes of Ghost Hunters will reportedly also start airing in January as well, which night is still unknown.

Stargate SG-1 will conclude the Fourth Horseman two parter, with SG-1 working to find a cure for the plague that the Ori have unleashed on Earth. After solving that predicament, in Collateral Damage, SG-1 establishes diplomatic relations with a moderately advanced civilization that has enjoyed generations of peace under Asgard protection. One of their technologies is a Goa'uld memory device that is used to frame Colonel Mitchell for murder, including giving him the memories of the murder. After that is The Ripple Effect, for which not much is known other than it may feature the return of a beloved character and a new Asgard character named Kvasir. It may also be a very confusing episode. Ending things in January will likely be Ethon, which sees Daniel Jackson get into trouble, and when the team tries to help out, they get into

their own bit of trouble. Stargate Atlantis will continue with The Hive, concluding the mid-season cliffhanger. Colonel Sheppard finds himself a prisoner of the Wraith following Ford's attempted suicide attack on a hive ship. In Epiphany, Sheppard finds himself on a planet where time passes more rapidly, with no way to contact his team or return to Atlantis. Epiphany was also written by Joe Flanigan, the actor who plays Colonel Sheppard. In Critical Mass, a beacon is set off that alerts The Wraith to the Stargate team still on Atlantis, and they must race against time to prepare for a Wraith attack and find out who set off the beacon. In Grace Under Pressure, Rodney McKay is trapped in a sinking puddle jumper and a hallucination of Amanda Carter is his ticket to surviving. Battlestar Galactica continues the storyline of the Pegasus when it returns in January. Episodes include one where Adama learns of a pacifist movement within the fleet that is advocating peace with the Cylons. In Black Market, Lee Adama becomes entangled with a mafialike group of criminals when he investigates the murder of a Colonial officer -and is reunited with a former lover. Sacrifice sees a woman who lost her husband to the Cylons take the Cloud Nine lounge hostage, demanding that Adama hand over the Cylon Sharon so that she can exact revenge. And in *The* Captain's Hand, Lee Adama works alongside the increasingly unstable new commander of the Pegasus when a Raptor scouting party goes missing.

Over on the USA Network, there's a A Very Dead Zone Christmas on Sunday, December 4th, in which female psychic Alex Sinclair (Jennifer Finnigan) pays Johnny a surprise Christmas visit and the two work together to solve the mystery of one very lost and confused Santa. This leads them to a group of street kids who are also lost with it all ending up at Johnny's house for the strangest Christmas he's ever had.

The WB will have a Christmas episode of Smallville as well on December 8th, called Lexmas. In it, Clark and Chloe have encounters with "Santa", who may or may not be the real thing, and Lex is undergoing emergency surgery and is near death in the hospital. Coming up in January will be Fanatic, where Lex Luthor and Jonathan Kent are running against each other in an election for Senator, and Lex discovers one of his student supporters is a bit fanatical about him. In Closer, the election campaign is heating up when Lex gets a bomb threat at his mansion. In actuality, it's a pair of bad cops looking to get ahold of the Kryptonian space ship Lex has hidden in a warehouse. Look for some big episodes in February where a major death or two has been promised by the Smallville producers in the 100th episode and subsequent episodes will deal with that aftermath.

Doctor Who gets into the Christmas Spirit with The Christmas Invasion, which will be the first full episode to feature **David Tennant** as The Doctor. It is expected to air on the BBC on Christmas Day and in Canada either the same day or on Boxing Day. In the special, The Doctor and Rose are on the Earth in the near future where they have to deal with the evil Sycorax, who are using robot Santas as part of their evil scheme. Guest starring are Andy Garcia and Penelope Wilton (Prime Minister Harriet Jones). This will not be the first story for **Tennant** as The Doctor, though. There is reportedly a short adventure in the works to be broadcast on the BBC in late November as part of a Children in Need telethon.

Doctor Who recently took the major awards at the National Television Awards show in the U.K., getting awards for Most Popular Drama, Most Popular Actor in a Drama (for Christopher Eccleston) and Most Popular Actress in a Drama (Billie Piper). Needless to say, the BBC was pleased to have their show take those awards instead of a competitor. The big news about *Doctor Who* is that they are planning a new spinoff series to debut in 2006 called *Torchwood*. It will

be designed to air later in the evening and thus able to have more adult content. It will feature John Barrowman as Captain Jack Harkness. According to creator Russell T. Davies, "Torchwood will be a dark, clever, wild, sexy, British crime/sci-

fi paranoid thriller cop show with a sense

of humour - the *X Files* meets *This Life*." He will lead a team of renegade investigators searching for alien technology that

has come to Earth. The seeds for the 13 episode series will be set in early episodes of the second series of *Doctor Who*, but will not directly cross-over. It is planned to air on BBC3 between seasons of *Doctor Who*, likely starting in midsummer and running into the fall. Where it falls in Captain Jack's time line is unknown.

Showtime has started airing the anthology series Masters of Horror, airing a new episode each weekend with a showing on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday night. Kicking off December is *Homecoming*, which is directed by Joe Dante and stars Robert Picardo and Jon Tenney. It is based on short story "Death & Suffrage" by Dale Bailey in which the Presidential Election is swayed by Zombies. Next up is *The Deer Woman*, directed by **John** Landis and starring Brian BenBen as a detective investigating a bizarre series of murders that leads him to believe a mythological Native American creature is behind it all. In Cigarette Burns, John **Carpenter** tells the tale of a film collector attempting to recombine a cursed film that caused it's only audience to go into a murderous frenzy. After taking a break over Christmas and New Years weekend, it should return with the remainder of the 13 episodes in January. Those include William Malone's Fair Haired Child, about a 13 year old outcast kidnaped by strange couple, Larry Cohen's Pick Me Up in which two Urban Legends collide, a serial killer who kills hitchhiker's, and a hitchhiker who kills people who pick him up. John McNaughton directs Haeckel's Tale, based on a Clive Barker short story that is a "sexually charged campfire story with a terrifying twist." Takishi Miike directs Imprint, based on a Japanese horror novel with an American journalist in 19th century Japan on a dark island. Finally, Lucky McKee directs Sick Girl,

which is described in press materials as a "genre-bending lesbian love story about two women and the bug that got between them." I'm not sure that I can add anything to that description.

Indications are that the producers of Masters of Horror are already looking at doing a second series of 13 episodes as well as a Masters of SciFi series, adapting stories by authors such as Harlan Ellison, Ray Bradbury, Robert A. Heinlein, Isaac Asimov, H.G. Wells, and Stanislaw Lem. Ellison and Bradbury will be adapting their own stories, writer Michael Tolkin will be adapting and directing Heinlein's "Jerry Was a Man." An announcement for a series go-ahead is expected soon and don't be surprised if it has J. Michael Straczynski on board as a producer/showrunner for the series. He's recently indicated he has accepted a showrunning gig for a "companion series" if it gets the go-ahead and indications are that it is indeed Masters of SciFi. Whether it will air on Showtime or SciFi will likely depend on how well the ratings hold up for Masters of Horror. In any case, as done with the Masters of Horror series, Masters of SciFi will be a co-

release it on DVD.
With the *Babylon 5* feature movie failing to happen, there doesn't appear to be any new *Babylon 5* productions in the works. However, there is something new for *Babylon 5* fans to look forward to. J.
Michael Straczynski has over the years made a handful of his *Babylon 5* scripts available. Some fans have gone about collecting them from charity auctions and other means. Straczynski has decided to make his entire run of *Babylon 5* scripts

production with Anchor Bay, who will

available through a special publishing effort via the website www.babylon5scripts.com and CafePress.com. He's planning on putting out a total of 15 volumes, collecting all 91 scripts he wrote for the series. In addition to the scripts, he's also writing an introduction and comments for each episode, including memos and other documents relating to the production of the series as well as rare photos from his personal archives. This will be a pretty extensive look at the entire series and hasn't been done to this extent previously. The first volume is around 450 pages and will include the original unfilmed script for the

pilot episode, *The Gathering*, which was changed substantially when it got the go ahead for production.

A few quick production notes: Spike TV has announced that rapper/actor Kirk Jones, aka Sticky Fingaz, will star in the upcoming Blade TV series. Jones was a regular on the just canceled FX series, Over There. David Goyer is producing **Blade** and co-writing the pilot episode with comic & TV writer Geoff Johns. Also staring are Jill Wagner, Neil Jackson, Jessica Gower and Nelson Lee. The series is expecting to debut next June on Spike TV. The FOX network and Warner Bros. Television are developing a series based on the *Terminator* movies. It would tell the tales of Sarah Connor and her son, John, following the events of Terminator 2. Lifetime has given the goahead for a pilot for *Scarlett*, about a New Orleans horror writer that discovers what she is writing about it real. It was scheduled to start filming the Monday that Hurricane Katrina hit, so it got delayed. Filming of the pilot did happen at the end of October in Natchitoches in north central Louisiana. The delay did not lose any cast members. Rebecca Gayheart (Dead Like Me) stars as Paula Sackett, pen name "Scarlett', a successful young horror novelist who buys an old French Quarter mansion in New Orleans. Also starring are Kristen Dalton (The Dead Zone), Lyndsy Fonseca, and Michael **Duvert.** According to producer/writer **Robert Hewitt Wolfe**, Lifetime is really behind this series, and worked to help with the production delays caused by the hurricane to make sure it still happens.

Richard Kelly (Donnie Darko) is directing Southland Tales, a science fiction apocalypse movie set in the near future in Los Angeles on the eve of the end of the world. Dwayne "The Rock" Johnson stars as Boxer Santaros, an action movie star with amnesia who joins up with Seann William Scott (a policeman and a mysterious twin brother) and Sarah Michelle Gellar (porn star Krysta Now) in a momentous day in 2008. Kelly is developing web sites and graphic novels to tell some of the back story and expand it beyond the movie (and to help build anticipation for the movie). It is also hard to describe with **Kelly** indicating it is a comedy, but also that ""we wanted to try to make a film that's sort of conveying the feeling of frustration and unease, I guess, that a lot of my friends are feeling about a lot of things that are happening right now in the world and to sort of tell it in the most entertaining, fun way possible." It looks to be a pretty ambitious project and worth keeping an eye on. Kelly has also obtained the rights to the unpublished Richard Matheson story, The Box, which was adapted into the Twilight Zone episode Button, Button in the 1980's version. In it, a couple is offered \$200,000 if they push a button on a box that will cause someone they don't know to die.

Dec 2 Aeon Flux - Charlize Theron brings to life the acrobatic assassin, Aeon Flux. It was originally a series of short films on MTV back in the 80's that left most viewers trying to figure out what was going on. Frances McDormand also stars as Aeon's handler, and likely delivering some exposition to explain things. After a virus has decimated humanity and the remaining humans are all living in one city, Aeon is brought in to help settle the political conflicts by assassinating the current government leader. Look for lots of action and skin tight outfits.

Dec 9 - The Chronicles of Narnia: The Lion, The Witch, and the Wardrobe -Disney takes a stab at live action (with lots of CGI) fantasy with a big budget adaptation of C. S. Lewis' second Narnia book, The Lion, The Witch, and the Wardrobe. It tells the story of four kids during World War II who are sent to the country to get away from the bombings of London. They discover a magical wardrobe that takes them to Narnia where they get in the middle of a conflict between the evil White Witch and the Lion Aslan. Visual effects are handled by Weta, who did The Lord of the Rings trilogy, and it was filmed in New Zealand, so it should look very good.

Dec 14 - King Kong - Following the enormous success of The Lord of the Rings, Peter Jackson wanted to make his dream project, a big budget remake of King Kong. He's turned the original 1930's movie that ran 100 minutes into a 3 hour blockbuster extravaganza. Jack **Black** is Carl Denham, **Naomi Watts** is Ann Darrow, and Andy Serkis provides the motion capture reference for the big ape as he did for Gollum in the LOTR movies. Unlike the 1970's remake, Jackson has set the movie in the 1930's, hoping to recreate the atmosphere of the original movie. It looks to be the big hit of the holiday season.

Jan 6 -Bloodrayne - Based on a computer game, it is set in the 18th century in Romania and tells the tale of Rayne, whose father was a vampire and her mother was human. Needless to say, she has superhuman powers and when she sets out to find her father, Kagan, she discovers that he is looking for three Talismans that will give him enough power to throw the Earth into darkness and he will rule the world. Kristanna Loken (Terminator 3) stars as Rayne, with Ben Kingsley, Meat Loaf, Billy Zane, Udo Kier, Michael Madsen and Michael Pare also starring. It is directed by Uwe Boll and according to him, the movie is a prequel to the game, giving Rayne's origin.

Jan 20 - Underworld: Evolution - If you haven't gotten enough vampires for one month, there's the sequel to Underworld with Kate Beckinsdale and Scott Speedman returning as the vampire and werewolf lovers to take part in the big battle between the vampires and lycans. We also learn about what started the ageold feud giving Bill Nighy a chance to reprise his role as Viktor from the original. If you liked the first one, you should be able to sink your teeth into the sequel with no problems.

Forry started the conversation with an invitation to visit him any Saturday from 11am to noon in Hollywood at 4511 Russell Ave. Even if the collection isn't what it used to be, there's still Forry. He's been visited by people from around the world - including two sisters from Transylvania, fans from Japan and China, and one from Tibet. By his exact count, Forry has seen the film "Metropolis" one hundred and two times. At one time he employed two young technicians to spend 18 months and 600 hours and reconstruct the Metropolis robot for him. Forry said he's tempted to take it with him to his crypt but instead that he would probably donate it to the Seattle Science Fiction Museum. They already have over 100 pieces from Forry's personal collection; one of the pieces he gave them was the original manuscript of a story that actually went into space "Skylark of Space." At one time, long, long ago - there were little stickers made that said "Science Fiction League" that were used to publicize science fiction books. Forry had the last ones on earth and donated them also to the Museum. In Germany, in a science fiction film museum are twenty-five more of Forry's collection. At one time, Forry's collection numbered 50,000 books, and 200 sets of science fiction magazines. I could tell it broke his heart to have his collection broken up.

He told me a story about a small amateur magazine published by a young science fiction fan. Hugo Gernsback, editor and publisher of the world's first science fiction magazine "Amazing Stories," noticed the little publication and was impressed by it. He invited the young editor to his office and was astounded to find the man was only a young boy of about 16; but he really knew his stuff. Gernsback offered him a job as assistant editor. Charlie Horning and Forry had been corresponding (back when that meant hand-written letters) and Charlie told Forry - "Imagine, Forry! I'm the managing editor of Wonder Stories!" 'Course, Charlie had to first go home and ask his parents if they would let him.

Forry has always been very interested in the universal language of Esperanto. He's fond of telling anyone about the importance of Esperanto. For those who don't know: Esperanto is an artificially created language. A language that is simplistic and easy to learn, a language that has no national identity and that could enable anyone from any nationality to speak to one another. A vehicle for world peace—or so its creator, Dr. Ludwig Zamenhof of Warsaw, Poland who invented the language in 1897, hoped. Forry's website mentions quite a few SF authors who have had an interest in the language. He spoke a few words to me and explained that he was afraid it was too late for the language. I didn't ask him for an explanation, I felt he meant it was too late for the world to embrace the language. He did mention that he had the opportunity to instruct some half dozen interested souls in speaking it.

I turned the conversation to the first WorldCon – July 4th, 1939. Forry's younger friend, Ray Bradbury, was dying to attend this first World Science Fiction Convention. Forry loaned him the money to ride the Greyhound Bus for 3-1/2 days and nights to get to the convention. There were 135 attendees but only 28 of them could afford to attend the banquet – at \$1.00 a plate! And one was expected to tip 10 cents. Forry reminisced a moment about the 2cent stamp that was on the mail that arrived at his home every morning at 11am …and again at 2pm… every day! Sunday delivery cost an extra 10cents.

Forry was, of course, the originator of the term SciFi. And while I'm sure most people who know Forry also know the story - I'm going to repeat it here for any new fen who might not know it. He relates that he was driving his car in 1954 and listening to the radio. A mention was made about HiFi (an antique sound system) and since the term science fiction had been on the tip of Forry's tongue since 1929...well, Forry looked up in the rearview mirror and stuck out his tongue. And there, on the tip of his tongue, were tattooed the words "scifi." His wife looked over at him and told him "Forget it, Forry. It'll never catch on." And, of course, today we have the SciFi Channel... Harlan Ellison apparently hated the term immediately. He ranted about it and at one time, told a captive audience that they should never use such a heinous term... one that sounded like two crickets screwing. Forry laughed and told me that Harlan must've had his head in the dirt to be able to hear two crickets screwing. Later that year, Forry was at a WorldCon in Australia. This comment was repeated (probably in their program book) and was defined as the sound of two crickets mating. A young Australian fan came up to Forry with a button that he had made and proudly presented it. It said "I love copulating crickets."

I asked Forry what was the first instance of its usage. He related that the term turned up three times on the cover of Playboy describing a story within the

covers. Then, the first time the term was used in a film was for "The Day the Earth Caught Fire." Forry wrote a column for a magazine called "Imagi-Nation" and used the term generously in his articles. It's too late, he says, to try to eradicate the term. It's a household word now. It was even used to describe the great Heinlein and Asimov when they passed away.

I've always wished I could've been around when fandom started. Forry was there. He related that when Charlie Horning was managing Wonder Stories, he asked Gernsback to sponsor something called "The Science Fiction League" and Forry was Honorary Member #1. Back then, fans wrote to the magazine to comment on the previous issue. These letters were published with their addresses. Pretty soon after that, fans started corresponding with each other. The first fan who ever wrote to Forry was Linus Hogenmiller from Farmington, Missouri. Forry remembers that he was so excited about it, that he immediately wrote three letters in response. Later in the conversation, Forry mentioned that Clifford Simak had told him that the first fan letter he'd ever gotten was from...Forry.

Forry left me with the story that he's currently taking a daily tablet and that the manufacturers guarantee that he will live to be 125. They can't yet point to someone who's succeeded in doing so but Forry's decided to check 'em out. He stated that if it didn't work out, he's going to demand his money back.

I hardly know what to say about Barry's passing.

We've all known he was ill with pancreatic cancer since LepreCon.

He shared a room with Greg Brown and I at TusCon last year - when he knew things were not right but had not yet been diagnosed.

Barry was one of the first people I met in fandom here in Arizona, and there were times when he and I were pretty close because we were both book dealers. He did a lot to show me the ropes, to introduce me around, to help me get involved with fandom.

We had really met for the first time at CopperCon 6 in 1986.

I remember going to Universe 87 at the LA Airport Hilton and having a dealers table right in front of Barry's back in the days when his mother attended the conventions with him.

As most of you may know, I am neither shy nor reticent. But the first panel I ever did at a convention was a panel on collecting books, and my fellow panelists were Barry Bard and Bruce Farr. I remember it very well because it was a panel on which I could not get a word in edgewise.

Through all the years I owned Adam's Bookstore, first on Cave Creek Road, and then down at Tower Plaza Mall, Barry was one of my key book suppliers.

But, in fairness, Barry was not an especially close friend - any more or less than he was the friend of thousands of other people in fandom.

We didn't call each other when we had flat tires. We didn't go out to bars together. We didn't double date.

Barry couldn't have spent that kind of time with me.

Barry had a lot of friends, and he spent a bit of time with all of us.

But I always enjoyed Barry. I identified with Barry. I was always

pleased to see him and to have a moment to talk with him. But even when we had a little time to just sit and chat, his mind was busy with a thousand other tasks.

Barry had cornered the market on energy. The man was a dynamo, a brash, humorous, caring, responsible, intelligent bundle of everything good in fandom.

I will never - for the rest of my days - attend a convention without thinking fondly of Barry.

And conventions in general - let alone our local conventions - will be less rich, less memorable without him.

I know that there are those who will step in to fill the gap - to try to honor his memory by helping to fill the empty place and do what they can. The task is a big one.

When I look around my house, I see little reminders of Barry everywhere - a pin, a button, a ballcap, a tee shirt, a gigaw promoting something or other.

I collect original art and books, so the one thing I didn't ever have much interest in was movie posters - not that they aren't cool, but because there is no wall space in my house. But I don't think I will ever see a movie poster without thinking of Barry. I shudder to think of how many tons of oversized paper the man hauled across the country.

Locals who did not know him well probably have no idea how his passing impacts conventions from coast to coast. He was, it seemed, everywhere - from DragonCon to World Fantasy to World Horror to ComicCon. He was not just our procurer - he was The Procurer.

I called him right after LepreCon when I first heard how serious his illness

I sat with him briefly at Breakfast at CopperCon just last month.

No matter his diagnosis, he remained Barry, coping with adversity, undaunted by seemingly hopeless odds. His only concession was admitting that CopperCon would probably be his last con actively in the dealers room.

I miss him.

I know his pain is ended.

All I can do is offer my prayer that he has graduated from this life into another challenging realm where his boundlessly energetic spirit will have worthwhile and meaningful new tasks to perform and where even angels will be impressed.

There could be only one.

Comic-Con International: The Greatest Show On Earth By Shane Shellenbarger

I've annually commented on Comic-Con International (or The San Diego Comic-Con, as I've called it since my first trip in 1973), detailing the number of attendees (over 104,000 in 2005), the square footage of the Exhibit Hall (re: A Dealers Room of over 460,000 sq. ft), and tracks of programming (17 when all rooms were in use). If you haven't been to the convention since it moved to the new Convention Center on Harbor Drive you couldn't imagine how it's grown. I've seen the convention move from Harbor Island to the El Cortes Hotel to the old Convention Center near City Hall and my mind still boggles at the enormity of how the convention has grown. Can you say GIANORMUS? I knew that you could.

Now that we've established that the Comic-Con isn't size-shy, let's look at some factors to consider before you make your journey to the holy land in 2006.

Planes, Trains, and Automobiles: Give me a ticket for an airplane; I ain't got time to take a fast train, so the song goes. You might want to give serious consideration to the pros and cons of these modes of transportation. San Diego is known for its morning fog and in 2005 my plane circled the airport for over an hour waiting for the ceiling to raise enough to prevent us from plowing into the side of a tall building. Trains can be a fun diversion, a tedious monotony, or a prohibitive waste of money, depending on where in the country you're coming from. I rode the 357 miles from San Diego to Phoenix with a friend in about 8 hours, with a couple of breaks thrown in. One year I rode the 120 miles from San Diego to Los Angeles on the Sunday evening of the convention and it took us over 5 hours. I've never ridden a Greyhound or Trailways bus, but if it is anything like my high school senior class trip to Disneyland, I don't recommend the bus.

Hotels: Room rates have gone up and room rate gouging was the talk of the town in 2004, with room rates increasing 3-5 times their highest rack rate. Be smart, shop around, and don't wait to the last minute. Comic-Con negotiates rates and hotel information will become available in January. Go to <u>WWW.Comic-Con.Org</u> and look for the hotel link for more info.

Transportation In Town: If you are staying at a hotel along the Comic-Cons free shuttle route, remember that you may be competing with everyone in your hotel for a seat. Don't expect to walk out of your hotel and onto a shuttle. The closer you get to the time the Exhibit Hall opens at 10:00 A.M., the longer you'll have to wait for a shuttle. When the Hall closes for the evening, there is a flood of

humanity jockeying for position. Plan accordingly.

If your placement along the shuttle route puts you in the unenviable position of watching as full bus after full bus drives by, you might want to consider a city bus or trolley pass for the week.

Trying to get to the Convention Center by car can be problematic. Traffic around the area gets worse as the day wears on (automotive, pedal-cab, and pedestrian) and once you get there you might not find a parking spot, especially during Padres game days at Petco Park. Using the Park-N-Ride spots near the trolley lines may be your best bet.

Food: While there are concession areas in the Exhibit Hall, I wouldn't consider those a healthy choice. Depending on your specific dietary needs, I'd recommend a balanced breakfast, a lite snack at the convention, and a fine dinner as far away from the Convention Center as you can get. If you choose to ignore my advice and load up on junk food while wearing an "I Live To Eat" t-shirt, don't come whining to me that you missed that must-see programming event because you were becoming familiar with the Convention Center plumbing. You've been warned!

What To Wear: Be comfortable. Wear comfortable shoes and be mindful that it is often warm outside of the Center and cold inside the Center. If you want to walk around in your Vampirella costume, great (that doesn't apply to you, Comic Book Guy) consider checking a change of clothes at the Bag Check.

Recuperation: Do your best to get enough rest. Sleep deprivation doesn't enhance the convention going experience, it dulls it. Consider taking an extra day off between the time you return from the con and going back to school or work.

Somebody up there really likes me. This time I get to review part 2 of the "Paths of the Damned" and a source book for the Empire.

Spires of Altdorf Warhammer Fantasy Roleplay \$24.99, Black Industries, 95pp

This is the second part of the "Paths of the Damned" series. Set oddly enough in Altdorf, this adventure introduces the history of the "largest city of the old realm". The first read through gave me pause, I have to agree with the note that this is not meant for novice gamemasters. There are three story lines and incredible amounts of role-play.

I found the complexity of the story lines caused me to have to reread the book several times. The adventure requires the players to find the second artefact that contains the essence of the Daemon Xathrodox, find out how to destroy it, and do so.

The complexity makes this difficult to play but the rewards are great. Five stars out of five - **Bob LaPierre**

Sigmar's Heirs Warhammer Fantasy Roleplay \$29.99, Black Industries, 127pp

Subtitled a guidebook to the empire, This volume contains new careers, a history of the empire, laws, religions, cults, and descriptions of every important city in the empire. Throughout the volume there are small sections with local sayings and other flavor pieces.

I found the information to be presented in a usable format, organized by region and city. I had a hard time putting it down as I enjoy learning about the world I play in. I'm looking forward to anything else they put out. This volume should go a long way toward helping gamemasters create adventures for players playing everything from first careers to extremely powerful adventurers. This is extremely well thought out and should be among the best gaming books of the year. Five stars out of five. - **Bob LaPierre**

Warhammer 20,000 Blood Angels DEUS ENCARMINE by James Swallow Black Library, 2004 \$6.99, 251 pp.

Rafen and Arkio are Space Marines Blood Angels. They are a rare battle pair of brothers. Yet, things like an enemy invasion, revenge, honor, insults, rivalry, plots, being in a team to retake two planets, and only one controls an artifact made their family relationship a bit difficult

This book is the first of the *Blood Angels* series.

Even though I am not familiar with Warhammer 40,000 game, I enjoyed the complex twists and turns of this tale between two brothers. Recommended to space war gamers in a bleak science fiction future. - **Jeffrey Lu**

Warhammer 20,000- "Fifteen Hours" by Mitchel Scanlon Black Library, Great Britain 2005, \$6.99; 254 pp

This is Mitchel Scanlon's first novel. His writing is about one of the dark future wars of Warhammer 40,000.

To sum up this book is a mixture between "Catch 22" and "On The Western Front."

The title summarizes the life expectancy average time of a new recruit of the Imperial Guard in battle. This is the life of one raw recruit named Arwin Larn. The alien enemy he fight will be the Orks. (Somewhat similar to the fantasy, Orcs, but with modern tactics and weapons.)



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

Visit Trinity, South Carolina, a small town with more chills than charm. Sheriff Lucas Buck (Gary Cole) won't let



anyone- including local doctor Matt Crower (Jake Weber) or the determined Gail Emory (Paige Turco) - stand in the way of his evil plans.

Marking the tenth anniversary of its broadcast debut and packed with all 22

episodes, including four "lost" ones never broadcast on network television, American Gothic's eerie storylines of intrigue and suspense are sure to hold you captive!"

Includes 15 deleted and extended scenes and four episodes that never aired on network TV.

I only caught a few episodes when this was on TV and was disappointed that I didn't get the chance to see them all. My disappointment is over.

In the town of Trinity the Sheriff is truly the devil in disguise. Lucas Buck rules his town with a morbid playfulness, setting up moral dilemmas for the inhabitants and punishing those who fail and those punishments can be a killer, literally.

Also in Trinity is a 12 year old Caleb, who may or may not be Buck's son. Buck wants Caleb to join him, Caleb's dead sister wants Caleb to resist (she visits him regularly) and the town is caught in the struggle between the two.

The writing is superb, as is the acting, directing and filming. The disc sometimes skip, it would appear that Universal didn't expend as much care as they could have in producing this set, but I still recommend this as a wonderful, quirky series that didn't get the chance it deserved 10 years ago. - Stephanie L



I picked this up because the name Sam Raimi was on it and I am quite pleased I did so. This is the kind of horror I enjoy - creepy and scary without graphic gore.



As they mass at various locations a beam comes from the sky and when it is gone, so are all the people - nothing but charred dust is left behind... they have been harvested by the aliens.

As Professor Quatermass, wonderfully portrayed by Sir John Mills, searches for his runaway 16 year old granddaughter who has joined the Planet People he learns the truth and sets out to find her and stop the aliens





When this series was first broadcast in 1988 it was one of my favorites. The first episode sets up the premise quite neatly, "first contact" between the Earth

and the planet Mortax had occurred in 1938 and then 15 years later, in 1953, the Mortaxians had been defeated by Earth in an interplanetary war, both dates neatly tying in with Orson Welles' 1938 radio broadcast and the 1953 George Pal film. The series then resumes the story 35 years later. The alien survivors from the 1953 war were preserved in huge storage drums at various nuclear waste disposal sites alongside the storage drums of real nuclear waste. As time passed the bacteria that had stopped the aliens in 1953 have been killed off and now the aliens are beginning to revive and escape. They meet up with their leaders and plot to finish conquering the earth. In the series the aliens have the ability take on their appearances of humans by absorbing their bodies. They are indistinguishable from real humans until they start to sort become deformed before they melt into a puddle of goo.

Our heroes are Dr. Harrison Blackwood (Jared Martin), a research scientist that was the first person to believe the aliens were still alive. He is joined by microbiologist Suzanne McCullough (Lynda Mason Green), paraplegic computer expert Norton Drake (Philip Akin), and a Native American military officer Col. Paul Ironhorse (Richard Chaves), the team sets up headquarters at a secret military base and set out to save mankind.

The second, and final, season wasn't as good but the first season is as enjoyable as I remembered. This is a highly entertaining, intelligent series that combined good plot lines with adventure and character development. - **Stephanie L Bannon**


Are you living in a cave?

Time-travelers are *not* as rare as the ivory-billed woodpecker.

We also continue to get the intriguing daily ins-and-outs of life on Fraser's Ridge, which provides the very delicious meat of this almost 1000 page novel. I especially enjoy the details of the 20th Century Claire doctoring (and attempting surgery with volatile homemade ether) with 18th Century herbs and devices.

There is so much drama and humor and terror. And sometimes, all in one day!

Carpe Demon: Adventures of a Demon Hunting Soccer Mom By Julie Kenner Berkley Books, \$12.95. 360 pages

Somewhere hidden in the Vatican is the headquarters of the Forza, the arm of the Holy Church which trains and sends out the Hunters. The Hunters are assigned to dispatch Demons, vampires and other escapees from the depths of Hell. Each Hunter is assigned an Alimentatore as advisor and henchman.

Most Hunters die young, but a few survive to retirement. One such, Kate Connor, survived and retired into domesticity with one of her fellow Hunters. We find her some years later still wallowing in domesticity, having lost her first husband. She has remarried to Stuart Connor, an up and coming lawyer who wants to be County Attorney. They are a family of four including her daughter, Allie, 14, from her first marriage and their two-year-old son Timmie.

Into this blissful scene come demons and no Hunter but Kate is available. Demons have intruded into the heretofore demon-free San Diablo even into the sacred precincts of the Petfood aisle of the San Diablo Wal-Mart. There are demons in her kitchen, in her backyard, in the local retirement home where an elderly Hunter has mysteriously appeared.

Can Kate trust her strange Alimentatore? Can she figure out what the chief demon, Goramesh, is after? Can she do this without ruining her husband's career and losing her place in local society .Perhaps she can, given the help of one good friend, her daughter and others.

The activities of this over-the-hill Demon Hunter/Soccer Mom are a delightful blend of off the wall humor and serious drama. Recommended. – **Gary Swaty**

My only caveat, is that I wish she would move on to some other construction base for her books. I enjoy the way she puts a magical spin on the facts of history and her characters are really meaty and delightful. I am just wondering if she is going to go all through British history this way. The novels are becoming a bit predictable and too similar.

Chris Longknife: Mutineer By Mike Shepherd Ace Books, New York, 2004, Paperback, 389 Pages

She was one of those Longknifes. Her family was an albatross around her neck. Her father, the Prime Minister of Wardhaven, her mother the political hostess and her military hero grandparents and great grandparents were a constant problem. She escaped into the Navy and became an Ensign on her own merits. On her first assignment she was supposed to lead a group Marines dropping on a mission to rescue a child. She was supposed to die, but survived through luck and natural leadership skills. But why were the kidnappers equipped with top secret high tech mines and electronics

that hadn't even been issued to the military yet? Also the value of that materiel far exceeded any possible ransom. Something else was going on. She couldn't quite believe that the whole episode was created to kill her.

On her second mission, an ill organized mercy and relief effort, she was dropped into chaos and again rose to the occasion bringing out the best in her commander and the ill trained troops. She inspired the locals to overcome total anarchy and rise to face the necessities of survival. Here, too, she was supposed to die. She also suspects that unknown forces created the Eco disaster that made the mission necessary. Deep interstellar skullduggery seems likely, but what can a mere Ensign do?

On her third mission Kris must face the Moral dilemma of when is it proper to use her name and leadership skills to oppose a dangerous Commander whose actions could bring chaos and war to hundreds of worlds. What is right? What does she want? Is she willing to endanger her career and life? If she did nothing, likely no blame would attach to her after all she is a mere Ensign.

Kris is a complex and very real character with many strengths and weaknesses. She had an early brush with alcohol and tranquilizers and has self doubts as a result. She suffers survivors guilt since losing her little brother to kidnappers. She has issues with her famous relatives. The other characters are equally well developed. I recommend this book highly.

The next two are also in print, *Kris Longknife: Defiant* and *Kris Longknife: Deserter.* – **Gary Swaty**

Lint by Steve Aylett Thunder's Mouth Press/Avalon Publishing Group, \$14.95, 225 pp.

A satirical delight for any science fiction fan, especially fans of Philip K.

Dick. This purports to be a critical biography of the life of pulp writer Jeff Lint, who supposedly lived from 1928 to 1994. He graduated from the pulps to hang out with the Beats, then to crank out scifi novels for the big publishers like Ace, then became popular with the 60's acid rock crowd, then had unhappy flirtations with Hollywood, including the cartoon series Catty and the Major. His comic book series The Caterer destroyed a publisher. He failed writing a Star Trek script and the screenplay Kiss Me Mr. Patton, which was later filmed as the war story Patton. Returning to New Mexico and remarrying a young wife, he became a cult figure while writing his more mature works like the Arkwitch trilogy, acclaimed yet incoherent garbage. Some scifi reviewers have been put off by this book, and wonder about the author's motives. I think it's a love-hate affair. Consider that the cover is printed upside down, which literally stands the genre upon its head. If you know the life of P.K. Dick you will get a lot of in-joke references, but the style is hilarious regardless. Every single page made me smile, and most made me laugh at least once, which hasn't happened for too long. - Mike Griffin

Deep Simplicity By John Gribbin Random House, \$24.95, 275 Pages.

I had not read 40 pages into this wonderful explication of mathematical chaos and complexity when John Keats' song of joy to Chapman popped into my mind. Keats could not read Greek and yet he loved the classics. He had previously only read Dryden's stilted Rhyming couplet version. When he read Chapman's version he was overjoyed and wrote a sonnet about it. I have sort of borrowed his words to express my appreciation of Gribbin's work. The overview he provided caused my earlier studies of the topic to leap into much clearer focus. I recommend it to all aspiring and recreational mathematicians. My joy is

The Magical Worlds of Narnia: A Treasury of Myths, Legends and Fascinating Facts By David Colbert Berkley Books, New York 2005, Trade Paperback, 186 Pages, \$14.00

This book styles itself as "A Treasury of Myths... I suppose it is, but it fails in several important ways. It has no organization and no theme. It is an hodgepodge of essays in MLA [Modern Language Association] format. It has a bibliography and footnotes in the back of the book. It has no index. The only hope of locating an item of interest is the table of contents which is not always descriptive.

That being said the essays are a well written series of short snippets in a vaguely chronological order. They are interesting and fun to read. They explore the development of the series and major symbols used. They delve into Lewis's life and show how events therein influenced Narnia at various stages of its development.

While little new ground is broken, the author presents the material clearly and with a fresh and somewhat different viewpoint. His suggestions for additional reading on the points he explores give the reader guidance should he or she wish to delve deeper. Lovers of Narnia will appreciate this. – **Gary Swaty**

The book is an action packed and full of interesting characters. [Of course, I'm fond of Pouncer and the other moncats.]....Worth the read. - **Pam Allan**


A Choir of Ill Children by Tom Piccirilli Bantam Spectra, \$5.99



Musty Tomes

Out of Their Minds by Clifford Simak 175 pp., 1970

First of all, thanks to the book discussion group for putting me on to this, even though I can't attend. My take on this gem: such an original scientific premise from a pastoral science fiction writer. A next level of evolution has occurred, as unforeseeable as any level would be to a dweller below. The mental energy of the human collective unconscious has generated a new dimension of reality, wherein all the creatures of fantasy live: myths, monsters, heroes, story characters, et al. You may have seen this result before, as in Silverlocke, Riverworld, Mythago Wood, Roger Rabbit, or at least one episode of every Star Trek series. While he preceded most of these, Simak was not the first, just one of the best at it.

The tale: a homecoming journalist and young schoolmarm fall in love while trying to survive the perils of this new dimension. An imp is trying to kill them, while the Devil wants the man for ambassador to the real world. The focus is on the man's adventures, with the schoolmarm in the background, so female

readers won't find any inspiring role models here. But the tale is a fine trip through the Land of Imagination, including a couple chapters on the battle of Gettysburg.

Simak did miss one scientific detail, although he described it with telling accuracy. The Devil enchants the real world to disable electricity, and scientists declare it impossible. Yet it seems identical to the effects of a nuclear bomb's electromagnetic pulse, although Simak didn't realize it. His description of the looming social breakdown is an excellent quick read on the subject.

Why did the Devil do it? He demands that we cease creating cartoon characters, for we are ruining his dimension with them. His confrontation with the President and Cabinet in the White House made me laugh. More surprises delight the reader. Don Quixote turns up as a major player, putting Simak on the coattails of what is considered the first modern novel, now celebrating its 400th anniversary. His could be considered the last of a Quixote trilogy, right after Man of La Mancha, which debuted on stage 5 years before Simak's novel. Cervantes' Don Quixote is about a thousand pages long, whereas some fault Simak for coming to an abrupt ending. It worked for me. - Mike Griffin
