TV News & Previews By Lee Whiteside

Coming up over the next couple of months is the final stretch for the SciFi Friday shows and NBC's *Surface*, a new SciFi miniseries, the arrival of *Doctor Who* on US TV, and even more.

On the cable side, we're into the home stretch for SciFi Friday, with Stargate SG-1, Stargate Atlantis, and Battlestar Galactica heading towards their season finales in mid-March. SciFi also has their usual crop of Saturday night movies as well as the US premiere of a new miniseries. The biggest news for SciFi is that they have picked up the rights to air the new Doctor Who series, having bought the first series of 13 episodes with an option for the second series. The show will start airing on SciFi Friday in mid-March at 9 pm, most likely on March 17th, the weekend following the end of the current season of the Stargate's and Galactica.

Leading off February for Stargate SG-1 is Ethon, where Daniel is captured and imprisoned on a planet under control of the Ori, and the Prometheus gets caught up in a lot of trouble when SG-1 tries to rescue him. In Off the Grid, the SG-1 team is investigating The Lucian Alliance on a planet and get captured and things get even more complicated when the Stargate on the planet vanishes. The SG-1 team gets assigned a seemingly menial job of giving some diplomats (including Robert Picardo's Woolsey) a tour of an off world research base in The Scourge, only to have a carnivorous bug species get loose and threaten everyone. In Arthur's Mantle, Mitchell and Carter get shifted to another dimension, much like what happened to Daniel in the Crystal Skull episode. They work to try to get back to their proper dimension as well as find a way to help track down Volnek, who lead a devastating attack on the Sodan. March sees SG-1 ramp up to the season finale cliffhanger, with many threads from the season coming together. In Crusade, SG-1 is contacted by Val Mal Doran (Claudia **Black**), who tells them of her life undercover since she was transported to the Ori

home galaxy back in the episode *Beachhead*. She also warns them of an impending Ori invasion and has another surprise for them as well. Bringing things full circle for the season will be *Camelot*, where SG-1 discovers the village of Camelot and must work their way past Merlin's security systems to obtain an ancient weapon to use against the Ori. Unlike recent seasons when it wasn't a certainty that *SG-1* was returning, with the knowledge that there will be a Season Ten, expect a really big cliffhanger at the end of this one.

Out in the Pegasus Galaxy, the Atlantis team kicks off February in The Tower, where they discover an Ancient created control tower much like the one at the Atlantis base. It has been used to repel Wraith attacks, but the ancient gene is deteriorating in the local protectors and Colonel Sheppard is caught up in a political battle with the local lords when they realize he could help produce a new generation of protectors. In The Long Goodbye, two pods are discovered in space that contains the minds of two alien beings. When they take over Weir and Sheppard, they continue their ages long conflict against each other. Coup D'Etat sees an Atlantis team go missing on a seemingly non-hostile world and when the main Atlantis crew investigate, they discover a coup in progress by the Genii. Conner Trinner (Trip Tucker on Enterprise) guests stars in Michael as a lieutenant with amnesia who discovers he's really a "cured" Wraith. The Atlantis team attempts to evacuate a doomed civilization from a planet threatened by a super-volcano in Inferno. However, things really heat up when the stargate gets destroyed. In the Atlantis season finale cliffhanger, the Atlantis team joins up with a Wraith faction lead by Michael (now being played by Brent Stait - Rev Bem from Andromeda) who offers concessions in exchange for their help in fighting a Wraith civil war.

Battlestar Galactica ramps things up in the final episodes of season two, most likely ending on a nasty cliffhanger. First up in February is Scar, where the Galactica deals with a cylon raider ship that keeps attacking them in a hit and run pattern. Sacrifice sees a woman who lost her husband take the Cloud Nine lounge hostage, demanding that Adama hand over the Cylon Boomer to avenge her husband's death. The Captain's Hand has Lee Adama working with the unstable new commander of the Pegasus to investigate the disappearance of a raptor scouting party. In Downloaded, we learn more about the Cylon society when a dying Cylon's consciousness is downloaded into a new body and we see things from the Cylon point of view. To finish up the season will be the two-part Lay Down Your Burdens where the Galactica is

2005 ended with the triple whammy of Harry Potter, Narnia, and King Kong. Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire opened strongly with the largest box office so far for opening weekend of the four Potter movies and looks to hit the \$300 million mark domestically. *The* Chronicles of Narnia opened up strong and continued to hold up well at the box office through the holidays and looks headed towards the \$300 million mark as well. King Kong opened less than expected and may make it to \$250 million domestically; making it somewhat of a disappointment compared to some expectations. However, all three have done well worldwide and more than likely will make money despite their \$150 million plus budgets. For the whole year, the last Star Wars movie, Revenge of the Sith, topped everyone with \$380 million box office domestically and Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire taking the worldwide gross honors with \$852 million.

Coming up in 2006, there aren't any of the franchise blockbusters in store, but there are a few things that will likely draw a lot of viewers to the theatres. May sees the third *Mission Impossible* movie, which may have to counter **Tom Cruise's** increasingly strange behavior, and the third *X-Men* movie. There is also the movie adaptation of one of the biggest selling novels of the last few years in *The DaVinci Code*. June will bring the anticipated return of the Man of Steel to the screen in *Superman Returns* and July brings back **Johnny Depp** and **Orlando Bloom** in *Pirates of the Caribbean: Dead Man's Chest*. The big holiday fantasy movie this year will be the movie adaptation of **Christopher Paolini's** *Eragon*.

The fifth Harry Potter movie, *Harry* Potter and the Order of the Phoenix, has started filming in England. For casting the character of Luna Lovegood, they've put out a casting call looking for an unknown to play the role who is one of Harry's classmates in the fifth book. As expected, with the success of the first Narnia movie, Disney is gearing up another visit to the magical land, planning on adapting Prince Caspian. A script is in the works with production planned for later in the year. Sam Raimi is on board to produce and direct an adaptation of **Terry Pratchett's** award winning young adult Discworld novel, The Wee Free Men for Sony Pictures Entertainment. Look for him to start work on it after he finishes up Spider-Man 3.

More adaptations of young adult fantasy is in the works. Warner Bros. has (Continued on page 6)

shocked when the Cylons offer a peace proposal to end hostilities provided the humans make some concessions. Needless to say the concessions aren't very popular options and it wouldn't be that exciting of a season three if they came to a peace accord with the Cylons, would it?

SciFi continues with their latest SciFi Pictures in February, starting February 11th with House of the Dead 2: Dead Aim, where zombies overrun a college town and a squad of soldiers is called in to take care of them. They are racing against time, trying to obtain a tissue sample from a first generation zombie to be able to find a cure for the infection and keep it from spreading. Starring is Emmanuelle Vaugier (Smallville, Painkiller Jane), Victoria Pratt (Cleopatra 2525), rapper Sticky Fingaz, and character actor Sid Haig. February 25 sees another natural disaster epic (in the wake of Magma: Volcanic Disaster in January) in Disaster Zone: Volcano in New York. After some illegal geothermal energy experiments get out of control, a lava flow is generated under Manhattan and it's up to a group of New York City sewer workers to save the city from disaster. Starring is Michael Ironside, Alexandra Paul, and Costas **Mandylor**. There's no word as of press time what SciFi has in store for Saturday nights in March, but it's a good bet it will involve some sort of mutation, natural disaster or an alien invasion of some sort.

After the SciFi Friday season finales, U.S. fans who haven't already seen the new *Doctor Who* series will finally get their chance to on the SciFi Channel. At press-time it's not clear if SciFi will air multiple episodes to kick of the series, so I'll preview the first few episodes that should air on SciFi at the end of March/beginning of April.

The last we saw the Doctor was in the ill-fated FOX TV movie starring Paul **McGann** in 1996. As the new series starts, we meet Rose, working in a dreary job in a Department store who sees her life change when she meets a mysterious man who saves her from some shop dummies that have come to life. Thus starts, Rose, the first episode of the new era of Doctor Who. He's recently regenerated, but we don't know from what or many details about what has happened to him since the last time we saw him. He's discovered a threat to London from the Nestene Consciousness, and soon Rose, her boyfriend Mickey, and her mother Jackie all get caught up in the adventure. When Rose is offered the chance to travel in time and space, she takes The Doctor up on his offer. In the second episode, The End of the World, The Doctor takes Rose far into the future when the Earth is about to die in front of a gathering of alien dignitaries. When things start to go wrong, Rose and Doctor work to save themselves and others while Earth is

disintegrating before their eyes. In the third episode, *The Unquiet Dead*, they travel to Cardiff in 1869 and meet Charles Dickens and come across some mysterious ghostly activity at the local undertakers. After that is a two part episode introducing an alien threat to Earth in modern day London, the Slitheen! More on current happenings with *Doctor Who* on the BBC later in the article....

Coming up on SciFi at the end of March is a new four hour miniseries that looks to be worth catching, in part because SciFi had nothing to do with it's production! The German produced Dark Kingdom: The Dragon King is based on the German myths that are the basis for the Wagner Rings Cycle opera as well as inspiration for Tolkien's Lord of the Rings (which is what SciFi is promoting). The production is English language and not dubbed and it's original title as it aired in Germany is Ring of the Nibelungs and there is a good English language website for it up at http://www.ring-of-thenibelungs.com In fact, it was one of the highest rated TV movies in Germany and it also won the DIVA award for best TV movie on German TV for 2004. It was directed by Uli Edel, who directed the Mists of Avalon miniseries for TNT, and Edel co-wrote the screenplay with Diane Duane and Peter Moorwood. Starring are Kristanna Loken (Terminator 3: Rise of the Machines), Alicia Witt and Benno Fuermann. SciFi describes the movie as a "fantasy love story, where Eric (Furmann) is a young blacksmith who is unaware that his true identity is actually Siegfried, the orphaned heir to a conquered kingdom. When a comet impacts the earth, it sets off a chain of events setting Eric on the path to his true destiny. His adventure begins with a chance encounter with his true love, the Norse warrior Queen Brunhild (Loken). Next he becomes a hero to the Burgunds after he slays the much-feared dragon Fafnir. His reward for which is an ancient treasure trove the beast had long protected - the treasure of the Nibelungs. Eric ignores warnings of a curse placed on the treasure, an act that ultimately endangers his love for Brunhild and the reclaiming of his birthright."

According to Diane Duane, on her Out of Ambit blog, "Peter and I are, of course, both clear that what we did isn't the pure Nibelungenlied...even if you could figure out what that was, as there are about six different versions of the story, and a number of ancillary but notreally-part-of-the-poem myths. Any version of this epic brought to the screen is going to be the result of a long, long series of compromises. We made the best compromises we could, under the circumstances. (And, by the way, nothing positive enough can possibly be said about our friends and production partners at Tandem Communications, who were a solid support to us and a never-ending



help in times of craziness all through the five years we worked together on this thing.)" If you don't want to wade through all the ads and promos on SciFi, Sony Pictures Home Entertainment will be releasing it on home video shortly after it airs. SciFi will broadcast it on Monday March 27 & Tuesday March 28th and likely run all four hours the following Sunday evening.

There's more news about the Dresden Files pilot that was filmed for SciFi late last year. It is based on the Jim Butcher novel series about wizard Harry Dresden, the only wizard listed in the Chicago phone book. Robert Hewitt Wolfe and Hans Beimler co-wrote the screenplay, based mostly on the first Dresden Novel, Storm Front, in which Harry Dresden deals with catching a black mage that's caused some horrific deaths that the Wizard White Council thinks Harry may have committed. Starring as Harry Dresden is Paul Blackthorne, best known for playing Stephen Saunders in the third season of 24. Valerie Cruz is detective Connie Murphy, Rebecca McFarland is tabloid writer Susan, Joanne Kelly (Jeremiah) is the vampire Bianca, Conrad Coates is White Council enforcer Morgan, and Raoul Bhaneja is Murphy's partner Raoul Bhaneja. They haven't yet revealed who the voice of Bob is, though. You'll note a few differences in the characters from the book, which is

partly due to conflicts with real people's names (which is fine in a book, but not for TV) and the resulting casting for a character. Author Jim Butcher had this to report on his website (www.jimbutcher.com) after visiting the set during filming: "In speaking to Robert and Hans and dozens and dozens of other people, I realized something really neat: they care. Over and over, I heard from the folks there: "most of the time we're working, it's just a job. But on this set, everyone thinks we're doing something really neat, and it shows in their work." Which was really exciting. I mean, it's amazing enough that I get to say "they're making a movie of my book!" But it's looking like I'll get to say, "they're making a GOOD movie of my book!" which is far more rare." Butcher also indicated he made comments on the script and they listened to him and made some changes. That's definitely not something Ursula K. Le Guin had the chance to say about SciFi. According to **Wolfe**, once a producer's cut is delivered to SciFi, they will decide if they want to make it into a weekly series or just air it as a movie.

Back to the broadcast airwaves, *Smallville* kicks off February with *Vengeance*, where Clark meets up with a masked, leather-clad, female vigilante named Andrea, who has similar powers to Clark and has been fighting crime in

Metropolis. When Clark and Chloe stage a mugging, they catch her and discover she's one of Chloe's co-workers at the Daily Planet! Next up is *Tomb*, where Chloe is possessed by a young woman who committed suicide ten years ago. When Chloe is institutionalized as a result, she learns about an orderly with a secret hobby. Cyborg brings in another DC universe character with a Smallville twist in Cyborg, from the pages of the Teen Titans. Lex Luthor brings Victor Stone to life by putting his brain in a cyborg body. In Smallville related news, the response to the Aqua episode was so good, that The WB has commissioned a pilot featuring Aquaman. Starring as Arthur Curry will be actor/model Will **Toale** who has acted in a few minor roles on TV and in movies and also done a stint in a New York stage production of A Streetcar Named Desire. According to press reports, Curry is in charge of a dive shop in southern Florida, and lives with his adopted father, an officer with the Coast Guard. The Florida Keys and the Bermuda Triangle will be the backdrop for the series, which will explore Arthur's discovery of his water based powers and quest to protect the oceans.

Elsewhere on the WB, *Charmed* continues to slide in the ratings and it's

not likely it will be back next year. Supernatural is still doing well, bringing scares to both Tuesday nights and Sunday nights (in a repeat of the previous Tuesday's episode). But with both series, there's not much advance information on what they will be doing. CBS dropped Threshold after it tanked on Tuesday nights when it switched time slots with Close to Home. ABC pulled The Night Stalker in the middle of a two-parter in November. SciFi quickly picked up the rights to repeat the series this summer, including the episodes that didn't air. The Ghost Whisperer has continued to do well for CBS on Fridays and Invasion has held up with respectable ratings for ABC and looks to be having its storyline pick up speed. NBC's Surface got an order for additional episodes from NBC, but it was only for enough to get it into early February, where the show's season finale (and possibly the series finale) will air. It has also been repeated heavily on SciFi.

Some of the biggest news in regards to network fare is the agreements between ABC and NBC/UNiversal to make episodes of current TV series available to download at Apples iTunes. ABC started things off, making episodes of *Lost, Night Stalker*, and *Desperate Housewives* available the day after they aired. When ABC pulled the plug on *Night Stalker*, iTunes made the unaired episode that concluded the two-parter available. NBC/

Universal shortly followed, making available episodes of *Battlestar Galactica* and *Surface*.

Back on cable, production has completed for the pilot movie for the *Blade* TV series that will air on Spike TV starting in June. **David Goyer**, who wrote the three *Blade* movies, co-wrote the pilot with comics scribe **Geoff Johns**. The opening story is set in Detroit, and stars



Kirk "Sticky" **Jones** as Blade the Vampire Hunter. **Nelson Lee** is Shen, who

develops new weapons for Blade to use in his efforts. Spike has only indicated that it is a TV movie so far, but if it does well, it will likely spawn a series.

Over on the other side of the Atlantic, ITV has gotten back into the SciFi arena with the science thriller Eleventh Hour, a four part series starring Patrick Stewart (TNG's Picard and the X-Men's Xavier). Stewart plays professor Alan Hood, emeritus Professor of Physics now serving as Special Advisor to the government's Joint Sciences Committee. He and his Special Branch bodyguard, Rachel Young (played by **Ashley Jensen**), are tasked to "to seek out or respond to any human crisis arising out of, or offering a threat to, current scientific endeavour." The series is written and created by Stephen Gallagher and has its roots in a novella he wrote for an **Ellen Datlow** edited anthology, The Dark. Each installment is a stand alone movie length story. Storylines include the pursuit of a maverick cloner, tracking down the source of a decades-old hybrid pox, dealing with radical medical technology, and the discovery of a hidden army and a wide-ranging global arms fraud. It currently has not yet been sold to a US outlet, but I would expect that with Patrick Stewart in the lead role, some cable network will pick it up relatively

Even though the second series doesn't hit the screens on the BBC until April,

there was plenty of *Doctor Who* at the end of the year in the UK. Kicking things off was a special segment recorded for the BBC's Children in Need charity telethon in November featuring **David Tennant** and **Billie Piper** in a scene aboard the

in the third Doctor's era. As expected, the special ended with the Doctor and Rose ready for new adventures.

The BBC also produced a special interactive story, *Attack of the Graske*, that was made available on the BBC's interactive service. Viewers were able to make choices on what would happen next and help guide David Tennant's Doctor on

a solo adventure. It was well received and got a lot of use by BBC viewers with the capability to use it.

Opening up series two on the BBC will be *New Earth*, where The Doctor and Rose return to the far future and meet up with Cassandra (from "*The End of the World*") and find a "plague farm" in the guise of a nightclub run by evil cat people. In *Tooth and Claw*, they must protect

Tardis that followed directly from the regeneratation seen at the end of the first series. The official debut of Tennant's 10th Doctor in *The Christmas Invasion* was on Christmas day on the BBC and on Boxing Day in Canada. Viewers got to see how Rose, her mother Jackie, and her boyfriend Mickey all dealt with the fact that The Doctor was a changed man. We also got a bit of info about *Torchwood*, which is the spinoff series airing later this year on the BBC. The Doctor wasn't too happy with the government's resolution to the Sycorax invasion threat, much as The Brigadier's handling of the Silurians back

Queen Victoria from an alien threat while visiting historic Scotland. *School Reunion* is the highly anticipated return of Sarah Jane Smith (Elisabeth Sladen) and K9 (John Leeson) along with a guest starring appearing by Anthony Stewart Head. In the episode, they discover a mysterious school overrun by the alien Krillitanes. In the rest of the season, The Doctor and Rose will visit the court of Louis XIV, deal with the Cybermen on an alternate Earth, and take on an evil creature called the Abzorbaloff, a creature designed by a fan (via the children's show Blue Peter).

On the animated front, reports are that

Cartoon Network has opted not to pick up Teen Titans for any more episodes, so the new episodes that just finished airing in January are likely the last new episodes to be produced. There is a direct-to-video movie, Teen Titans in Japan, that is in the works and if that does well, there could be more adventures in the direct-to-DVD format. As for Justice League Unlimited, after airing four episodes from the latest season in September, the show has been noticeably absent from the Cartoon Network schedule. Reports are that the show will return to the Cartoon Network sometime in late spring or early summer, although it could show up earlier. Upcoming episodes include a Hawkman centered episode called Ancient History, and Far From Home, where Supergirl is kidnapped and taken to the 31st century where she meets the Legion of Super-Heroes including Braniac 5 and Bouncing Boy. Reports are that this will also be the last season of Justice League, leaving only The Batman in production to represent the DC Universe. There are

For Marvel fans, there is a new animated version of *Wolverine and the X-Men* in the works with no word on where it will air yet. **Jason Netter** of Kickstart Entertainment is producing the series and **Greg Johnson** is story editor. **Johnson** also served as story editor on the *X-Men: Evolution* series and also wrote four upcoming direct to video Marvel animated movies (*Ultimate Avengers*, *Ultimate Avengers 2*, *Iron Man* and *Doctor Strange*) which is a new line of Marvel CGI movies that will be released on a roughly quarterly basis starting with *Ultimate Avengers* on February 21st.

It will start filming soon in Vancouver and is scheduled for release right before Christmas.

The long in development *Watchmen* movie based on the **Alan Moore** comic has been picked up by Warner Bros. after Paramount dropped it. Warner Bros. will not be using the script that was in development and will start over with a new writer and director, which has yet to be lined up.

Daniel Craig is lined up to play James Bond in the next 007 movie, Casino Royale. However, they are still searching for the next Bond girl. Ellison named Grand Master by SFWA

The Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America have named author Harlan Ellison a Grand Master and he is being honored at the Nebula Award Weekend on May 4-7, 2006 at The Tempe Mission Palms Hotel, 60 East Fifth Street, Tempe, Arizona. SF writer William F. Nolan will serve as the 2006 Author Emeritus and Connie Willis has agreed to fulfill the role of Toastmaster.

Born in 1932, Ellison made his first sale to *Infinity Science Fiction* in 1956 with the publication of "Glowworm." In a career spanning fifty years, Ellison has won eight and a half Hugo Awards, three Nebula Awards, two Edgar Awards from the Mystery Writers of America, six World Fantasy Awards, in addition to their Lifetime Achievement Award, and five Bram Stoker Awards from the Horror Writers Association, including their Lifetime Achievement Award.

As a champion for writers, Ellison took internet giant AOL to court when they would not police their websites to prevent the dissemination of copyrighted material. In addition, he also helped launch the Comic Book Legal Defense Fund. His work has garnered accolades from fans worldwide and from such authors as Isaac Asimov, Jack Williamson, Robert Silverberg, and J. Michael Straczynski.

Born in 1928 in Kansas City, Mo., William F. Nolan has sold more than 1500 stories, articles, books, and other works. While best known as the co-author with George Clayton Johnson of the novel, "Logan's Run", Nolan's work has included a broad range of material, including mysteries, science fiction, fantasy, horror and westerns. On his own, he wrote the novels "Logan's World," "Logan's Search," the novelette "Logan's Return," and the pilot script for the "Logan's Run" television series. His work has earned praise from such writers as Stephen King, Ray Bradbury and Joe R. Landsdale.

In addition to being an author, Connie Willis sings soprano in a Congregationalist church choir.

My First (and Last) Week with the Apple iPod Video

My wife, Lauren, and I have a unique arrangement when it comes to giving gifts. I tell her what I want and she lets me buy it. I am reasonable with my requests (usually) and she hardly ever says no (usually.) I never worry about the size, or wonder if I will use a gift certificate before the store deducts service charges or dormancy fees. I talk to her about what I want, get the go-ahead, and make my purchase. Thus, I found myself the proud owner of a 60 GB Apple iPod for \$389.87 from Sams Club. While Apple doesn't call its new fifth generation iPod a Video, I will christen it the iPod Video in order to differentiate it from the iPod Photo, the Nano, the Mini, or the Shuffle.

I could hardly wait to get the iPod out of the box and start stuffing the units 60



GB hard disk drive full of audio and video. Audio wasn't difficult after I discovered that I needed to update the software on both iTunes and the iPod Video. I was soon pumping mp3's of audio books, music, and podcasts into the unit and started working on getting video into the iPod Video. Then I hit a wall. After several hours of searching on the internet, I discovered that Apple didn't want me to put video on my iPod. Well, not exactly. Apple didn't want me to put any video onto my iPod that they hadn't SOLD (at \$1.99) to me. I found that none of the free video podcasts such as Diggnation, DL.TV, or Rocketboom would play on the iPod Video without spending time downloading the file, converting the download to a mov file, or changing the resolution to 320 by 240, and then uploading it to the iPod. I find this is all very time consuming and a bit hit-or-miss.

One alternative is the Creative Zen Vision, which beats out the iPod Video 2.5 inch screen with its 3.7-inch screen. Recently recommended by tech guru, Leo Laporte, on a gift giving guide segment of Live with Regis and Kelly, the Zen Vision and Vision M (which just won the "Best of CES" award in mp3 and portable video category and also won the overall "Best in

Show" award) series of audio and video players can be organized by an iTunes-like piece of software called the ZenCast, available at www.creative.com. The Zen Vision supports AVI, DivXTM 4 & 53, XviD4, MPEG-1, MPEG-2, MPEG4-SP, WMV9, and Motion-JPEG. The iPod Video supports m4v, .mp4 and .mov and their tutorial recommends that you buy QuickTime 7 Pro (\$29.99) to convert video files.

Disregarding the cost of the iPod Video, Apple is miserly with the accessories they supply: Ear bud headphones, USB cable, Dock Adapter, and leatherette case. They leave out a separate power supply (\$29.00) and A/V cables (\$19.00) to connect your iPod Video to a television. I found that it was necessary to keep the iPod in its case or the mirror finish case back would smudge and the view screen was at risk for scratches. Imagine watching a movie with a line diagonally across the screen, forever!

Apple did get the jog wheel right and it's the best thing about their product. If

(Continued from page 1) everything she could find from then on. Every writer, she told me, is influenced by everything they read. However, she does credit five particular authors in the dedication in her latest book "A Breath of Snow and Ashes": Charles Dickens, Robert Louis Stevenson, Dorothy L. Sayers, John D. MacDonald and P.G. Wodehouse. A sterling selection.

Diana doesn't write small... books, as her fans well know. Her tomes measure from the 600 pages of her first book, "Outlander," to a massive 979 pages in her latest. And her legions devour every word. But how does such an effort evolve? Well...she tells me - slow at first since she doesn't really know much about the story yet. She doesn't know what will happen or what the historical timeline will be. In "Breath.." for example, she picked a particular battle that took place during the American Revolution in North Carolina. An obscure little battle of which probably no one outside of N. Carolina or scholars had ever heard. But it was an important battle to the story. Diana also had to consider through whose eyes she would portray the events. This isn't something I'd considered before as simply a reader. Choosing the viewpoint is a very important consideration by the writer. Evaluating each prospect and what it would lend to the story probably takes up quite a bit of time. I asked her how much chronology the next Outlander book would take. She had no idea at this point as she has just started the story. She said it could be the last book or there might be another after it.

When a book is new, the writing goes very slowly as she is working out the story line and doing research. She'll write every day to keep inertia from building up. As the book grows, she'll achieve what she refers to as a 'walking pace' which is two pages a day. But Diana doesn't do rough drafts; so before she moves on to a new scene, the previous scene must be finished. But towards the end of the book, when her research is done and she is just filling the gaps between scenes, the book has achieved what she calls 'critical mass' - plus the folks in New York are pressing her. At that point she'll be working 12-15 hours a day and that will take some two or three months. An exhausting period, to be sure.

And even with all this effort, Diana still manages to have more than one project going at the same time. Before her fiction success, Diana would take any project that would pay – research for the University where she worked, grant proposals, articles for magazines, and training seminars. And she discovered that she had a 'sticking' point in her writing – it was about two-thirds of the way down a page. At that point, she would switch to a different project and work on it until she hit that 'sticking' point. Then, she would switch back and Page 8

find that she could continue on the previous project. So, she could continue working for several hours on multiple projects. This is, she states, still a good modus operandi for her. She has the next new *Outlander* book plus she has a contract for two more *Lord John* novels and she has a contemporary mystery novel that she's been working on for some time (although it hasn't yet achieved 'critical mass.') The next Lord John novel is titled "Lord John and Brotherhood of the Blade" and one after that will be "Lord John and Haunted Soldier."

Lord John was actually a total accident. Back in 1998, she was asked to contribute to a British anthology titled "Past Poisons", a tribute to Ellis Peters. She didn't have the time to research an entirely different period of time so she knew it had to be in the 18th century and since she didn't want to involve her major characters in a side story that might impact the greater story; she took a minor character from the Outlander series -Lord John. That story was titled "Hellfire." As her American fans began to hear of that story, they wanted it and more. So, she decided to write a couple more short stories with the intent of collecting them all in a single book. So when she had "Lord John and the Private Matter" nearly done, she told her publisher she had this short story. Of course, by Diana's standards, its modest 300 pages was only a short story but the publishers were happy to point out that it was really a normal sized book. Then, she got an offer to contribute to a fantasy anthology, "Legends II", which produced "Lord John and the Succubus," a novella. Eventually, when "Lord John and the Private Matter" was released as a paperback, it included the short story "Hellfire." She also has a contract from Random House to produce a collection of short fiction. ".. Haunted Soldier" will be released in Germany in February 2006

(the Germans really love her), and the collection of short fiction in the summer. "...Brotherhood..." will come out in the US in the fall of 2006; and hopefully, followed by "..Haunted Soldier," although Diana can't say for sure. Chronologically, "..Brotherhood.." is followed by "...Haunted Soldier."

Laying her stories aside

for the moment, we talked about her trips to Highland Games-type events. I asked her if her interest preceded the *Outlander* stories or were a result of them. She started attending when they were convenient and meeting people. She ended up in a business relationship with a vendor who would bring her books to the event and pay for her expenses to attend if she would sign books at his booth. This lasted for several years until both he and Diana retired from it. Diana still attends local Highland Games events in Arizona but doesn't go to any outside the state anymore.

2005 was an incredibly busy year for Diana – several book tours in Germany, Canada (including a writers conference) and the US, a lecture at the Smithsonian in D.C., multiple book releases, and tearing out the whole back end of her house. She went through both Thanksgiving and Christmas without a kitchen following on the heels of the book tour. There was something about enchiladas on the outside grill for Christmas dinner... Thinking of this, and how little time she's probably had with her family or to write, I was even more appreciative of her time with me. So I imagine she'll be saying 'no' to invitations in 2006... She doesn't intend to leave home much, 2006 needs to be much more low-key, she told me with a chuckle.

Diana has a wickedly subtle sense of humor. She compared a book tour with being a political prisoner: you are removed from your home and familiar places, separated from your loved ones, moved willy-nilly at others' direction with no choice in the matter, strip-searched on a daily basis by the TSA, routinely deprived of food and sleep and on top of all that, you're interrogated repeatedly by strangers who ask the same questions day after day, city after city – apparently hoping you'll crack...

Her fans love her... she gets gifts all the time. I asked her what the best thing was she ever received. She has a group of fans called the Ladies of Lallybroch some of them are part of a group called the Lally-Quilters and this past year, they gave her a quilt made especially for "Breath..." – a beautiful blue and white creation with each block containing a snowflake or snowflakes with accents of grey and black to symbolize ashes. And the strangest gift, I asked? Well, that, she laughed, had to be the international collection of toilet paper. Near the end of writing "Fiery Cross", she was asked by one of her fans if she could sign some bookplates. She agreed but said she couldn't do it right away and could the fan please remind her again a little later. Diana joked with her that at the moment she only had two brain cells left and one of those was trying to remember to buy some toilet paper. Apparently, the woman shared that conversation, because the next thing Diana knew was that FedEx was disgorging about 40 rolls of toilet paper from all around the world – Dutch, Japanese, Australian. They followed up this year with Venezuelan toilet paper to add to her collection.

Diana has a wonderfully low, warm voice with a bit of a whiskey-type roughness to it. The woman is very personable and incredibly generous with herself for her fans. Any time I've seen her talk, she'll talk non-stop for an hour or more. You can tell from listening to her anecdotes, that she is a born story-teller. If you ever have a chance to meet her in person, don't pass it up. And in the meantime, stop by her website. She writes a lot of it herself and you'll get a good dose of her personality.

Pro Notes

Happy New Year everyone! I hope everyone had as good a year as I. And you all have my best wishes for a great 2006. I have a few new voices this month. And, as ever, you can always let me know if there's an author you'd like me to contact. So let's get to it...

I tracked down Anne Bishop in snowy New York. She's a favorite author of mine. Her BLACK JEWELS series is simply fabulous. Anne tells me "Sebastian," the first book in the EPHEMERA duology, is coming out on February 7, 2006 in the US and in March 2006 in Australia. It's her first US hardcover, which is very exciting. She also has two of the BLACK JEWELS books scheduled to come out in Germany this year, and the Black Jewels Trilogy is going to be published in Portugal. In terms of writing, she's finishing up "Belladonna," the second book in the EPHEMERA duology. Just a little north, in the backwoods of Maine, I heard from James Hetley. A new favorite of mine, James has three books published, one of which is reviewed elsewhere in this issue. "Dragon's Eye," came out from Ace last November. This is only distantly related to his previous "The Summer Country" and "The Winter Oak," being set in the same fictional Maine but without the Celtic mythology and otherworld connection. Reviews have been favorable, including a starred review in BOOKLIST. A sequel, "Dragons' Teeth," is due out from Ace in November 2006. He is now working on a fantasy detective noir, working title "Signatures" as a change from the previous works.

And from the other side of the country, in California, I found **Kim** Stanley Robinson and he's working on the third and concluding volume of his global warming trilogy, which started with "40 Signs of Rain" and continued just recently with "Fifty Degrees Below." The latter was released last November, and got good reviews in the NY Times, Washington Post, and the Times Literary Supplement in England, among other places. While promoting the book in the DC area, he gave a talk about it at the National Science Foundation, which is where much of the novel takes place. He'll finish the book by this coming June, and Bantam Books and HarperCollins in UK plan to publish it in early 2007. He's going to be an online guest of the Clarion Foundation's online chat for Clarion supporters, to be found at http:// the clarion foundation.org/ That will happen on Thurs, February 23rd, 2006, at 9 PM EST. He is also going to be a guest at the annual Jack Williamson tribute and conference, at East New Mexico University, on March 1, 2006. He will be a featured speaker at the 25th Annual **International Space Development** Conference, held May 4-7, 2006, at the

Sheraton Gateway Hotel in Los Angeles, hosted this year jointly by the Planetary Society and the National Space Society. Mostly he'll be holed up at home writing, which is really his favorite part anyway. Another Californian, and a regular here, is Larry Niven. Larry says he's working sporadically on four collaboration novels. "Inferno" (the sequel to Dante's Inferno, written a quarter century ago with Jerry Pournelle) gets a rewrite, and its own sequel which is currently in Jerry's hands. There's been a lot of sinners since 1977... Ed Lerner came to Larry with the ambition to write a novel set in the Fleet of Worlds from "Ringworld". They're halfway through. You're going to learn a lot more about Pierson's puppeteers than

you ever needed. And Greg Benford came to him with a structure of RINGWORLD scale and an astounding back history. It's their first collaboration, but it's a natural. Greg's first story used the plot structure from Larry's "Becalmed in Hell". Larry and Steven Barnes are working on a fourth DREAM PARK novel with considerable research. It'll be set on the Moon. Plus, "The Draco Tavern", from TOR, is now on the shelves. These are thirty or forty years of ultra-short stories set in a spaceport bar in Siberia. Larry's planning to get to the next Nebula Awards. It's been too long... {We're certainly looking forward to seeing you in Arizona this year!}

Ben Bova hailed us this month from Florida. He finished "Titan," then wrote a high-tech thriller for Tor, titled "The Green Trap." "Titan" will be out in March, "The Green Trap" in autumn 2006. His agent is negotiating with a Hollywood producer team who wants to make a movie of his novel "Mars." He received the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Arthur C. Clarke Foundation "for fueling Mankind's imagination regarding the wonders of outer space." And he'll be

Guest of Honor at Bubonicon in Albuquerque in August, and in residence at Arizona State University as a Distinguished Scholar in the fall semester. {Welcome to Arizona!} William Dietz, in Washington, reports that the second volume of his RUNNER duology (mentioned in the last column) was delivered last October. Kenneth Bulmer Howard Devore Cynthia McQuillin Robert Sheckley Gerald Neal Williamson

Henry Kenneth Bulmer January 14, 1921 - December 16, 2005

UK writer and fan Kenneth Bulmer died peacefully on December 16, 2005 following a long illness. He was 84.

Bulmer was one of science fiction's most prolific writers, publishing over 165 novels and many short stories under at least 22 pseudonyms. His best know work is the Dray Prescot series written as Alan Burt Akers. There were 52 novels were published in the series, though 15 of them were published only in German.

Bulmer was also active in UK science fiction fandom. He published the fanzines *Star Pride*, *Parade*, Juggernaut, *Steam* (with Pam Bulmer) and others. and was President of British fandom's first amateur press association. He was the first person selected by the Trans-Atlantic Fan Fund (TAFF) to travel to North America in 1955 and in 1974 he was made a Life Member of the British Science Fiction Association.

Howard Devore, L.A.Con IV's Fan Guest of Honor, huckster, storyteller, and long time fan passed away on Saturday, December 31, 2005

In addition to *The Twilight Zone*, he wrote for the TV series *Captain Video* as well as 60 short stories that were read aloud by Basil Rathbone on Monitor Radio. He was fiction editor for Omni magazine for two years and was a visiting scholar at the Artificial Intelligence Lab at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1983. In 1991, Sheckley received the Raymond Z. Gallun award for contributions to the genre of science fiction.

Gerald Neal Williamson April 17, 1932-December 8, 2005

Gerald Neal Williamson, who wrote horror as J. N. Williamson and Julian Shock, died December 8, 2005 at the Riverwalk Village nursing home near Indianapolis.

The Costume Closet



Get Medieval on Your Pop-Up by Randall Whitlock

Okay, this column is as much about renfaire home improvement as it is about costumes. Think of a tent as your outermost layer of clothing.

Pop-ups are those simple opensided pavilions you see at every kind of picnic and street fair. They are based on easy-to-assemble aluminum, plastic or steel frames. The most sophisticated frames collapse along pantograph joints into compact bundles. One person can pop one up in a few minutes, hence the name. They are marvels of modern materials technology. That's the problem.

As a costume crafter, I participate mainly in renaissance faires and medieval reenactment events. Modern is not the right look. With a little work, however, a pop-up can be made into a proper medieval pavilion.

Open-sided pavilions were used in period. A noble couldn't be expected, after all, to be exposed to the hot sun while enjoying a tournament or directing a battle. What is it about pop-ups that makes them look too modern for the rennies? I see three condemning characteristics – overly sharp or square lines, modern framing materials, and synthetic fabric tops. All of these are fairly easy to disguise.

The Castle

One of the easiest disguises to build (especially if you don't sew) involves making your pavilion look not like a pavilion at all, but a castle tower. Simply cut panels of lightweight plywood to cover the lower portions of the tent top. The upper edges of the panels are cut

into square crenellations like a castle wall. Paint the panels to resemble stonework, apply faux bricks, or start out with faux brick paneling. Support the panels somewhere above the bump-yourhead level with wooden legs and bind the legs to the legs of your pavilion, helping to conceal the metal. Since most pop-ups are about ten feet wide, it will be most convenient to make the panels in two sections (left to right) for each side of the pavilion, for a total of eight panels on a four-sided pavilion. These flat side panels make a good surface to display signs and heraldry for your business, guild, or performing company.

The Drape

Another no-sew option is to drape your pavilion with cloth or greenery pinned together. I've seen a belly dance performing troupe do this with bright colored lames and satins on the outside of the pavilion and carpets and cushions inside. The result looked kind of like the inside of Jeannie's bottle. Very effective.

Another performing troupe created a faerie bower effect by wrapping the pavilion legs in flower and leaf garlands and draping the top with artificial leaves and flowers.

The most extreme example of the drape disguise I've ever seen involved a merchant who had no pavilion at all. He had signed up for the faire at the last minute and had never done a medieval event before. Fortunately he was a dealer in oriental rugs. He covered his van and tables with the carpets. I don't think the guests knew he was hiding an entire vehicle. On the other hand, I don't think the park staff were very happy with the wheel ruts.

The Over-Shell

My favorite disguise method is to build a new cloth outer shell which covers the original tent frame and shell. To build this overshell, mimic the pyramid shape of the original shell by building four triangular side panels.


First, measure your pavilion. You'll need the total width of each side. Surprisingly a nominal 10-foot pavilion is only about 117 inches on a side, three inches short of ten feet. This is a good thing – it makes suitable fabric easier to find. Take this figure, divide it in half, and add one inch for seam allowances. Call this the base B. On my tent 117/2 + 1 = 59.5 inches, conveniently just less than a standard 60-inch bold of fabric. I rounded my B figure up to 60 inches to make cutting simpler.

Measure the distance up the middle of a side panel from its base to the peak of the tent. Call this the altitude of the triangle A. On my tent this is 67 inches.

Measure the length and circumference of the legs. Save these figures for later.

Lay out four layers of fabric. Each layer's length should be equal to A plus one yard. The extra yard allows the panel to hang down below the edge of the triangular portion of the tent roof, completely concealing the original tent roof.


Measure one-half yard from each end of the fabric and draw a diagonal line as shown. Cut through all four pieces of fabric along the diagonal line as shown. You now have eight pieces of material shaped like a triangle with one extended side.

Sew the pieces together straight-side to straight-side and



bent-side to bent-side to form a pyramid-shaped tent top.

Finish the bottom edge of your new tent roof. This provides an opportunity to make the tent look much more medieval-ish. You can finish the edge with a fringed trim, available from upholstery stores.

My favorite edge finish is to cut the edge along curves to form "dags." There's nothing that looks more medieval. Dags can be any shape and those found on clothing become very complicated indeed. I make my dags by building a half-circle pattern about 12-inches wide, then using the pattern to lay out cuts evenly spaced along the tent edge, as shown. Once the dags are cut, finish the tent edge by turning under and sewing.



Space dag cuts evenly along each side.

Mount grommets in pairs at the corners of the corners of the tent shell. Suitable grommet kits are available at upholstery supplies stores and camping stores. Pass cords through the grommets to tie the tent over-shell to the tent legs.

Fabric Considerations

The pyramid-shaped over-shell described above requires about 11.5 yards of 60-inch wide fabric to make. You have many choices of fabric. If you leave the tent's original shell in place (concealed by the over-shell) your fabric does not have to be very heavy since it does not have to support its own weight. My first over-shells (made from used bedsheets) lasted for years. There's an old SCA trick that involves building a pavilion from a military surplus training parachute.


Your fabric should have a natural look. The whole point is to cover up that plastic-looking material the tent came with. Broadcloths, twills, and triggers are suitable. I've done well with the sportswear solids that turn up in spring clearance sales. Your material should be able to take some sun and rain without the colors fading or running.

Machine-washable is good, but may bow to other considerations. For example, I know a greyhound adoption group that uses a beautiful shell built from two contrasting colors of upholstery brocade with the same weave pattern. The use of two or more colors for adjoining panels is called "particoloring." It's another feature that screams medieval. I used alternating panels of blue and yellow to achieve this effect on my own pavilions.

What do you do if your favorite fabric is not available in 60-inch widths? You'll have to alter the pattern. You can insert a triangular gusset in the middle of each side wall, or you can run the fabric sideways and divide each panel into top and bottom portions. This will take a bit of strategy, different for every project.

Leg Covers

If they look too metallic, the legs of your pavilion will need to be covered. The simplest way to do this is to build "leg warmers." Cut four pieces of fabric equal in length to the legs and a bit wider than the circumference of the leg.



Add a triangular gusset in the middle.



Divide the tent vertically and run the fabric bolt sideways.

Finish the ends of the fabric strips and sew the sides together to form a long tube. Add some cord to one end so the leg warmer can be tied to the tent frame.

Some types of pop-up have long extensions to the shell that run down the legs. If your tent has these, you should mimic their shape by making long rectangular extensions of your over-shell. These are tied around the outside of the legs with cords.

As mentioned above, you can cover your tent legs with leaf and flower garlands from florist supply companies.

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

steroids complete with 'roid rage. His deliberate concealment of data prevented Jor-El from convincing the ruling council about Krypton's impending doom. The creators of *Smallville* have since borrowed this origin story, "spiking" it with a black, gooey nanotechnology twist.

I like this version of Lex Luthor too. He manages to be both the evil scientist of the old comics and the evil tycoon of more recent stories.

There are plenty of appearances by popular DC characters, including Supergirl, Dr. Fate, The Flash, Lobo, Steel, The New Gods, the Legion of Super Heroes, and the Green Lantern Corps (Kyle Rayner is the main GL, but look for Jon Stewart in a group scene and Hal Jordan's name in the aircraft graveyard.)

There were 54 half-hour episodes in the series and the first 36 of them are included in volumes One and Two. Volume Three, with the final 18 episodes, should be out by the time of this publication. Each volume is printed on one single-side and one double-side DVD. I'm not too fond of double-side DVDs. It's a missed opportunity for cover art.

Special features include commentary tracks by producers/artists/directors Bruce Timm, Paul Dini, Alan Burnett, Dan Riba, and Glen Murakami on several episodes; a pop-up trivia track on one episode, and making-of documentaries on several topics. Volume One came with a free movie pass that expired in August (Gee thanks!). On the upside, Volume Two came with a matted collectible reproduction animation cell.

Volume Two includes the three-part episode *World's Finest*, which was previously released as *The Superman-Batman Movie*.

Superman has been animated many times. Not since the Max & Dave Fleisher cartoons of the

1940s has he been animated so well. - **Randall Whitlock**

***** Geneshaft - Complete Collection Bandai, 325 minutes, 13+ DVD \$49.98

Synopsis: By the mid-23rd century humanity regulates itself via genetic programming. To control male aggressiveness the ratio is 1 male to 9 females while the overall manipulation is an attempt to breed a new human race by breeding to enhance those skills that will benefit mankind. Every male that reaches a position of power also has a female Register to watch his activities and intervene if they think there is a problem.

Our story finds Earth threatened by an enormous ring which suddenly appears between the earth and the moon. While Earth is able to use the prototype warship *Bilkis* to destroy the ring the question



remains, who sent it? Lord Sneak, in defiance of the Earth's ruling cabinet, orders the crew to find the aliens that launched the ring. The Shaft, piloted by Mika, Mir, Remmy, Tiki and Sofia set out to find the answer.

This Japanese TV series, that came out in 2002, has been very popular in Japan and the USA. There are only 13 Episodes, originally aired in the US on Tech-TV in 2003 and later on G4.

The computer graphics and anime drawing styles are done well. And of course the genetic engineered women and men that save the earth have to learn how to have feelings for each other. Even as they work out the bugs of the Shaft they learn to get along as a crew. The concepts of this series is what sets it apart from the rest. That is why anyone can jump in to this series at any place and it holds your interest. A very enjoyable series, worth watching over and over again.

Batman: The Animated Series Volume Four Warner Home Video, 521 minutes, NR DVD \$44.99

Volume Four of *Batman: The Animated Series* represents the return of my all-time favorite comic book TV show after an approximately two-year hiatus. During the hiatus, the show moved from Fox Kids to the newly-created Kids WB network and the creators produced the first season of *Superman: The Animated Series* (see above). These episodes were produced in parallel to the Superman series and most originally aired as part of *The New Batman/Superman Adventures* in 1997 and 1998. The DVD settings allow you to choose which version of the opening credits are shown.

The creators seized the opportunity to redesign the characters somewhat, using their Superman experience. Some of the new designs are impressive, the new Scarecrow is way scarier and the new Penguin is finally free of that Danny DeVito look from the Burton films. I'm less fond of the new Riddler and Killer Croc lines. Bats' new look has a bulkier



utility belt and no ring-around-the-bat on his chest. Batgirl is now a full-fledged member of the team. Dick Grayson has graduated to become Nightwing and there is a new Robin who combines characteristics of Jason Todd and Tim Drake from the comics. There are hero guest appearances by Supergirl, The Demon, and a Freakazoid!-like new version of The Creeper. The guys were clearly starting to think about a Justice League series.

The DVD set includes 28 episodes on four single-side disks with commentary tracks on three of the episodes and *Arkham Asylum File* with discussions on the redesigns of the villains.

If you have all four volumes of Batman: The Animated Series, you still don't have the whole story. There were three stand-alone movies produced. Batman: Mask of the Phantasm was released to movie theatres during the first run of the series. Batman: Sub-Zero was released to video between seasons three and four and includes the last appearance of Dick Grayson as Robin. Batman: Mystery of the Batwoman was released to DVD in late 2003 and can be considered the last episode of the series.



The Batman, which currently runs on the WB, is a completely separate continuity by different creators. It's okay in its own way, with good background drawings and a catchy Batman Five-Oh surf guitar theme song. IMHO, it does not reach the high standard of writing set by Batman: The Animated Series.


Gargoyles The Complete Season 1 Walt Disney, 294 minutes, NR DVD \$22.99 Gargoyles Season 2 Volume 1 Walt Disney, 596 minutes, NR DVD \$39.99

Gargoyles tells the story of a clan of Scottish gargoyles. In 994 they were betrayed by a friend. Almost all the



gargoyles were killed and the remaining six cursed to remain stone day and night until the castle rises above the clouds. Skip forward a thousand years to Manhattan where millionaire David Xanatos rebuilds the gargoyles Scottish castle stone by stone on the top of a skyscraper. At first the Gargoyles think he is a friend but soon realize he is using them for his own nefarious purposes. The six gargoyles are the leader Goliath, wise elderly Hudson, the mechanically inclined Lexington, happy go lucky Broadway, teenage-rebel Brooklyn, and the dog-like gargoyle, Bronx. Later we are introduced to Demona, Goliath's bitter mate and Elisa Marsa, a police officer, who becomes a good friend to the Gargoyles.

The first set includes all 13 episodes from the first season including the five part *Awakening* that introduces the gargoyles through the season ending



Reawakening in which Demona and Xanatos, combine science and sorcery to build a gargoyle out of rubble left at the castle.

The second set contains the first 26 episodes of season 2 running from *Leader* of the Pack through Kingdom and includes the four part City of Stone and the three part Avalon, both of which explain more of the gargoyles background

This is an incredibly enjoyable series. While it holds the attention of younger viewers it has much to offer the adult viewer. The characters are well defined, better defined in fact than many a hit night time drama. The gargoyles are far from perfect and are just as likely to make mistakes as the humans. From Goliath himself who nearly loses himself to his anger and his desire for revenge to the villain David Xanatos whose fear of growing old and dying feeds his desire for immortality - these characters are fully three-dimensional, so much so that they almost seem real.

The stories cover everything from straight forward adventures to organized crime to Shakespeare with touches of virtual reality, magic, mythology, the past, present and future.....

The first set has two extra features. First up is *The Gathering of the Gargoyles*, a fascinating short piece that takes us to a Gargoyles fan gathering in Canada and lets us see the impact the show has had on its fans. The second extra is the *Original Show Pitch By Greg Weisman*, a totally entertaining bit of footage that was the original show pitch used to sell the series to network.

Se two extras are episode introductions from co-creator Greg Weisman, Audio commentary on the four part *City of Stone* and *The Gathering of the Cast and Crew* (which I confess I have not viewed yet)

These sets, in fact the entire series, is highly recommended. I look forward to the remaining 26 episodes of season 2 and the final 13 episodes that make up season 3. - **Stephanie L Bannon**



In Our Book

The Coyote Kings of the Space-Age Bachelor Pad by Minister Faust \$14.95, Del Rey, softcover, 531 pp

I read this book for the title; I'm a sucker for unusual titles. I spent most of the 531 pages trying to figure out if this was the dumbest book I'd ever read or a gift from a genius.



Our two protagonists are black and the author is black – I'm not. Our two protagonists are fen and so is the author, obviously – me, too. If there were black cultural references that I missed – so be it - it didn't detract from the story at all. However, if I hadn't understood the fan references, I would have been lost. Our two boys are a bit lost – life has dealt them some severe setbacks and they huddle inside their bachelor pad and grouse about how lousy their lives are. Yehat builds amazing machines and Hamza finds things and people. One day, they meet a woman. This woman is unlike any other woman Hamza has ever met. She might even be able to help him forget the woman who completely stalled his life; Yehat hopes so...at first. But as events get weirder and weirder, Ye begins to believe the woman is nothing but trouble. She needs Hamza to find something for her – something lost for 7,000 years, something that will change humanity, something for which the bad guys will do anything to have for themselves.

And the bad guys? Boy, oh boy, these guys define 'bad.' They're also fen. They call themselves the Fan Boys and argue Star Wars and Star Trek trivia. They also have superpowers...

The book is peppered with genre references; from Star Trek to comics to games. The characters are defined by their genre leanings. I liked the character development; it was a bit confusing at first but it turned out to be part of the

An Accidental Goddess by Linnea Sinclair Bantam Spectra, New York, 2006, 434 Pages, \$6.99

At a critical time when the Khalaran Confederation was facing extinction at the hands of the Fav'lhir, a military advisor was sent to them from the powerful and mysterious Raheiran nation. This advisor, one Gillaine Ciran Rothella Davre, a Raheiran Mage, or as they titled them -Kiasidira, helped them to organize their fleet and assisted them in developing strong technologies. She also partied endlessly, attempting to be one of the guys. In these parties she created for the amusement of all aphorisms about life and behavior basing them mainly on the sayings and teachings of her sentient Crystal Ship, The Serendipity. It was all good drunken fun.

Then the final battle came. The newly formed fleet defeated the ordinary Fav'lhir fleet but she and The Serendipity had to face down the last desperate strike of the Fav'lhir Mages in their great Crystal Ship. Both disappeared in a great battle. She saved them all and thus was born The Lady Kiasidira, a new goddess in their religion. Her Aphorisms became holy writ, her data tablet containing the first eight was a holy relic along with various personal items and many pictures.

Three hundred and forty-two years

later, The Serendipity, appearing to be a damaged tramp freighter is discovered adrift close to Cirrus One, an old space station which was being revitalized as a new Jump Gate leading from the Cirrus Quadrant into the Heart of the Khalaran Confederation at Traakhalus Prime. Gillaine is found unconscious on the ship's bridge. She awakens in the sick bay of Cirrus One. She immediately does an out-of-body-EVA and is appalled to discover a temple and other monuments to the Lady Kiasidira. Thus begins our story.

She soon meets and falls in love with Rynan Makara, Admiral of the Sixth Fleet, discovers that the Fav'lhir are on the move again and her own chief priest, Rigo, is one of them. She must act. Rynan must not find out who she is. But can she save the Khalaran Confederation and keep her love? Is her presence there 342 years after her supposed sacrifice pure chance? Or was it planned?

She discovers that she now faces a revived line of Fav'hlir Mages of possibly great power. She and the Admiral work to gain sufficient strength and overcome treachery in high places at Traakhalus Prime. Can their love survive the gradual revelation of her origins and status?

The novel is well crafted. I could not put it down. I will not spoil it by saying more. Read and enjoy. - **Gary Swaty**

Kitty and the Midnight Hour by Carrie Vaughn Warner, 288 pages, \$6.99

So, last night when I should have been doing all those pesky things like paying bills I decided to peruse the "to read" pile for something more interesting. I hit the jackpot with Ms Vaughn's debut fantasy novel. Part fantasy, part mystery this is exactly the type of novel I enjoy. Once I started I couldn't put it down.

Kitty, a late night DJ on a local Denver radio station is still coming to terms with being a werewolf and assessing her place in the pack. One evening she inadvertently turns her radio show into a late night talk show for the supernatural much to the dismay of both her pack leader Carl and local vampire head honcho Arthur, who hires a hit man to kill Kitty on-air. Talk about a ratings boost!

Toss in pack problems as Kitty becomes more alpha and less subservient to the pecking order, a murder mystery involving an apparently supernatural serial killer, a bounty hunter who specializes in supernatural prey (including his unfulfilled hit on Kitty) who is now helping Kitty search out the murderer, a mysterious traveling faith healer who promises to cure the werewolves and vampires of their afflictions, a mysterious clandestine government program, the unique problems surrounding how to tell your mom you can't attend a cousin's wedding held on the morning after the full moon without also telling her you are a werewolf, and, oh yes, the growing success of her radio talk show as it reaches more markets via syndication since her on air confession that she is a werewolf.

The supernatural people in her world are neither the infallible or the noble misunderstood characters often seen in such literature, the pack leader has some very human weaknesses and he has the same type of issues with his mate that many a human male has. The police are intelligent instead of being one-dimensional bad guys and even the fanatics (on both sides of the fence) are believable instead of easy stereotypes.

This is the first of a series, the second book *Kitty Goes to Washington* is excerpted at the end of this story, and I look forward to more of Kitty's adventures. Highly recommended - **Stephanie L Bannon**

The Year's Best Science Ficiton: Twenty-Second Annual Collection edited by Gardner Dozois St Martin's Griffin, XL+663 pp., \$19.95

As per the cover blurb: "more than 300,000 words of fantastic fiction"! That is 28 stories from 28 authors from 15 sources. A good spread: six from Asimov's magazine, five from SCIFI.COM, four from F&SF magazine, two from the Between Worlds anthology, and all the rest from single sources. The editor also provides a 30 page summation of the field, introductions to each story, and a 10 page list of honorable mention stories that you could look up if you want more of the best of 2004. Definitely a great annual survey of the field, as its 14 Locus Awards attest. - Mike Griffin

Marque and Reprisal by Elizabeth Moon \$24.95, Del Rey/Ballantine, 324 pp

This is a sequel to "*Trading in Danger*." Normally, I won't review a sequel without reading what went before; but this one slipped by me until I'd already read the first couple chapters. Oh,

well...as it turns out, it stands alone quite well

Kylara Vatta is the daughter of an interspace shipping magnate, a bit naïve, but still a pretty tough ship's captain. Ky is plagued by self-loathing for what she discovered is a personal joy in killing. She fears her beloved father's reaction when he discovers what his little girl has become. That turns out to be a wasted fear when her father and most of her family are wiped out by enemies unknown - but determined, apparently, to destroy the Vatta family shipping enterprise. Ky is joined by her 'bad girl' cousin, Stella, and Stella's ex-boyfriend, Rafe – a rogue, a charmer, and, quite possibly, a spy for the bad guys. Financed by their Aunt Gracie's habit of baking diamonds into her fruitcakes, they hire mercenaries to help them track down who is disabling interstellar communications and to rescue surviving family members.

This was a very competent spacemilitary story. I don't personally care much for hard-core, military SF; but this one had just enough without sacrificing character development. I was very satisfied with Ky's growth and motivations. Stella's development was a bit rushed but would probably have cost the author another fifty pages without improving the story measurably. Rafe is still a bit unknown and that's alright as I expect to learn more about him in the next book. I actually have a little problem with the title. While the title would seem to define the book, Ms. Moon never actually got around to either of them. The Marque that Ky holds – a letter authorizing her to be a pirate on behalf of a world's government – was never used, and while Ky used a little Reprisal against a nasty family member, it didn't seem to me to be sufficient or even against the true perpetrators. I'm counting on the next book to hold true to this title and give me the whole story. - Catherine Book

Fledgling by Octavia Butler Seven Stories Press, New York 2005, Hardback 317 Pages \$19.96

Vampires are not what we thought. There are no Undead. Vampires are not parasitic. They are symbiotic. They are a separate race which has coexisted with mankind through its entire history. Some vampires believe they came here from another planet as suggested in their 10,000 year-old holy book. Others believe they evolved on Earth in parallel with mankind. Whatever the truth of this, vampires and their symbionts live among us today as they always have. Their symbionts live far longer than unaffiliated humans.

In the Pacific Northwest one young vampire Chori, our Fledgling, awakes alone in a cave, blind and badly burned

with a severe head injury. She remembers nothing of who she is. She suffers terrible agony. After a while a creature of some sort enters the cavern. She seizes it, drinks her fill in blind hunger and consumes some of its flesh. She then begins a rapid regeneration and largely recovers over several days. Her memory, however, is lost forever. She leaves the cave one night and finds nearby a burned settlement comprised of a number of dwellings. There are no bodies, only ashes.

She salvages clothing and finds shelter with a construction worker in a nearby community. He becomes her first symbiont. Returning to the site she meets her father who has come to investigate what happened to Chori and the Matrilineal group she lived with. It is decided that Chori is to go to her father's home the following Friday. Friday comes and her Father does not come to get her. Investigation shows that her father's group has also been destroyed, burned just as her mother's. She has to regroup. With the help of her friend and two surviving symbionts from her Father's settlement, Chori sets out for California and the only settlement the surviving symbionts know about. Somehow she must discover what happened. Who is killing vampires? Is it humans? Other vampires?

Octavia Butler has done it again. As in The Parable of the Sower she uses simple narrative to build a compelling and believable tale of courage and determination. - Gary Swaty

The Winter Oak by James A. Hetley \$14.00, Ace Books, softcover, 295 pp

Mr. Hetley's second outing is just as satisfying as his first. His characters seem to be in the same room as me – quite fascinating. I can actually hear their voices. He gives satisfaction and value in less than 300 pages that takes other

authors 600 pages to accomplish. I long for more time with Jo and Maureen but I'm afraid that might ruin the charm of the story. James is a gifted storyteller and maybe some stories are best told succinctly.

Jo and Maureen are sisters with an inhuman heritage. In the last book they discovered this heritage and traveled to the land where others of their kind live, plot and kill. Maureen and Brian stayed behind in the Summer Country and freed slaves - human, plant and animal. Jo and David returned to Maine but found that their lives were still anything but simple. They've both been fired from their jobs and the police are very interested in the whereabouts of Maureen and Brian especially in light of the blood found on Jo's kitchen floor. But Maureen is still battling her own personal demons and Brian has apparently disappeared. Their biggest mistake was probably leaving Fiona, Brian's sister, still alive. This witch puts a new definition on evil and she'll make a pact with the last Dragon to kill her most powerful rival, Maureen. The Dragon, by the way, has the most fascinating character development in the story. Brian is a Pendragon which by definition means more than family; he has spied, fought and killed for the mysterious ruling circle without questioning. But, innocently, he has now stumbled upon a secret for which the Pendragons will kill him. Can Maureen survive without Brian's love and will her fragile sanity be strong enough to save herself and the Summer Country? Will Jo be able to live with the consequences of her own actions and will David's love be stronger than his very real fear that the woman he loves more than life could be his death? -**Catherine Book**

Dies The Fire by S. M. Stirling ROC, 483 pages, \$23.99HB, \$7.99 pb

From the back cover: "The Change occurred when an electrical storm centered over the island of Nantucket

produced a blinding white flash that rendered all electronic devices and firearms inoperable - and plunged the world into a dark age humanity was unprepared to face..."

Michael Havel was flying over Idaho en route to the holiday home of his passengers when the plane's engines inexplicably died, forcing a less than perfect landing in the wilderness. And as Michael leads his charges to safety he begins to realize that the engine failure was not an isolated incident..."

Anyone who knows me knows I love end of the world scenarios and this book delivers all that I like about the genre. After reading this book S.M. Stirling goes on my "must read" authors list along with Eric Flint and Harry Turtledove.

The characters, both good guys and bad guys, are well defined, the action is totally believable and the plot is a page turner.

Dies the Fire does a very good job of showing how difficult simple survival can be during a widespread social collapse. People who normally wouldn't even say hello to each other are forced to come together and work towards the common goal of survival. The two major characters, Michael Havel and Juniper Mackinzie, are first followed separately with each of them approaching survival with a philosophy rooted in their individual lifestyles: Juniper is Wiccan, Michael is ex-military. Even "bad guy" Norman Arminger's choices are shaped by his past as a history professor, urban anthropologist and medieval recreationist. Over the course of about a year we follow these three groups until the climactic confrontation at the end.

I ended up reading this cover to cover in one sitting and as I reached the end I found myself wanting to know more about both the survivor groups and how they faced the future. Luckily for me The Protector's War was next in my "to read" pile. Highly recommended. - Stephanie L Bannon

> The Protector's War by S.M. Stirling **ROC, 496 pages, \$24.95**

From the inside cover "It's been eight years since the Change rendered technology inoperable across the globe. Rising from the ashes of the computer and industrial ages is a brave new world. Survivors have banded together in tribal communities, committed to rebuilding society. In Oregon's Willamette Valley, former pilot Michael Havel's Bearkillers are warriors of great reknown. Their closest ally, the mystical Clan Mackenzie, is led by Wiccan folksinger Juniper Mackenzie, the Queen of Witches.

Their leadership has saved countless lives.

But not every leader has altruistic aspiration. Norman Arminger, a medieval historian and scholar rules the Protectorate. He has enslaved civilians, built an army, and spread his forces from Portland and throughout most of western Washington State. Now he wants the Willamette Valley farmland, and he's willing to wage war to conquer it.

And unknown to both Northwest Pacific factions is the imminent arrival of a ship from Tasmania bearing British soldiers..."

This book takes up the story about 8 years after the Change. Juniper and Clan Mackinzie are welcoming newcomers to their area, the Bearkillers under Mike's leadership are building a strong society and while Mike is enjoying fatherhood, his wife Signe is beginning to have suspicions about the parentage of Juniper's son Rudi. On the "evil overlord" front: Lord Protector Norman Arminger is gearing up to invade their lands and add them to his empire.

Added to the mix is Sir Nigel Loring, former SAS colonel. The book begins in England where the Change has caused the same type of mass chaos, disease and conflict as we found in the Pacific Northwest. Loring was one a band of soldiers who helped the Royal Family escape and subsequently return to establish order but when he suggested that Parliament be restored he was imprisoned. Escaping from prison, Loring, his son Alleyne and Sergeant John Hordle travel to the Willamette Valley in a journey that takes them past pirates and cannibals as well as giving the reader an idea of how the rest of the world outside the Willamette Valley is dealing with the Change. Once there the Englishmen meet the three major survivor groups and join in the preparations for the coming war.

The characters have grown since the previous book, the action moves along at a nice pace, the various plot lines and characters are followed leading to the ending which sets up the next book in the series, A Meeting at Corvallis. My one quibble with the book is the rather graphic (and more than one) descriptions of dogs and horses being killed. Call me silly but that bothered me and made it hard for me to finish the book. However, even with that problem I find myself wanting to know more about the future of Michael, Signe, Juniper, Astrid and the rest. -

Babylon 5: The Scripts of J. Michael Straczynski

There have been script books for a good number of TV shows released in the past few years. From Buffy, the various incarnations of Star Trek, and others, they've generally covered a few episodes and not been very comprehensive. A lot of screenwriters have sold individual scripts at conventions and through their web sites. There are also various vendors that sell scripts as well, online or at cons, mostly without any official arrangements with the screenwriter. With the

Screenwriter's Guild rules making it possible for a screenwriter to sell copies of their scripts, it is possible for them to arrange for publication without having to work with studio licensing departments and such. Babylon 5 creator J. Michael Straczynski has recently embarked on a project to print all of the scripts he has written for Babylon 5 (92 total) in a fifteen volume series being published through Café Press.

For the series, Straczynski is publishing the final draft of each episode that he wrote for the series. Scripts that he did not write are not included. For each volume, Straczynski is writing a multi page introduction about that time in the series as well as several pages talking about each episode included. In most volumes, there are also pictures from Straczynski's personal archives as well as memos from that time period showing some of the communications he had with the studio and the crew. With each book

containing seven scripts and the additional material, each volume will be 450 plus pages long. They are being offered via the Babylon5Scripts.com web site via Café Press. Straczynski is also offering various other items (shirts, caps, mugs, and pillows) with Babylon 5 Quotes on them via Babylon5Quotes.com.

The first three volumes have been released and cover roughly the first season and a half of the series, including the original pilot movie. The first volume includes the earliest version of the pilot script, The Gathering, which was the one that was used to sell the series, but not what was actually filmed (the final script will be in a later volume). It is interesting to see how things changed from the original conception, including small things like character names to bigger things like the introduction of Kosh's life mate. In the introductions and episode commentary, Straczynski talks in detail about the process he went through to get the series going and what changes were made between the pilot and the series. The memos include information about episode premises that never came to be (like the sequel to Harlan Ellison's Outer Limits episode, Demon with the Glass Hand) or characters that never made it to screen (The Boss, downbelow's big crime boss).

In volume 2, which contains the second half of the season one scripts, Straczynski covers how he set up the arc within the first season, why Londo's hair came to be the way it was (and the problems that caused down the road), some of Straczynski's thought processes for Morden's "What do you want?" question and the other big questions asked throughout the series, and a lot of good behind the scenes information.

Volume 3 covers the first half of the second season, which saw the introduction of John Sheridan following the departure of Commander Sinclair. Straczynski discusses the changeover of the show's lead character in detail and what went into creating the character of Sheridan (originally called Strider) and the process they went through to find the right actor for the part. He also discusses the addition of Starfury pilot Warren Keffer to the cast as an appearement to the network and what he really wanted to do with the character (in addition to killing him off at the first chance he had). This volume includes the script for The Coming of Shadows, the first of two Babylon 5 episodes to win the Hugo award, for which Straczynski was very appreciative.

Throughout the volumes, Straczynski includes many personal stories about himself, from life events that influenced him and some of the storylines that came up in the series to behind the scenes stories about the cast and crew including the Babylon 5 coincidences that kept cropping up. He also makes heavy use of footnotes, from giving additional

information or background to little tidbits like his naming the toilets after the TV Guide critic, Jeff Jarvis, that panned the pilot. The photos add to the volumes, although they were left out of volume 3 due to the extra commentary dealing with the changes made for Season Two. The main bulk of each volume is still the scripts. Reading the scripts gives you additional enjoyment of the episodes and also gives you more insight into what was seen onscreen and what was indicated in the script.

The books themselves are standard print-on-demand quality and are only available in soft cover. Once the series is complete, they will remain available for a limited time, making them a limited edition publication. Each volume is available at a discount for a limited time upon its release. Once you sign up for their mailing list, you likely will receive some Café Press coupons that can get you additional discounts if you take advantage of them.

This is a must have collection for die hard Babylon 5 fans and something that casual fans or those interested in scriptwriting should look into. The insights into the production and creation of the series greatly add to the value of the collection beyond the printing of the scripts. - Lee Whiteside
