



Who Is Who This Issue

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SF Tube Talk TV News & Previews By Lee Whiteside

As has been the case for the last few years, summer is the prime season for the cable channels running SF and fantasy shows to crank things up and this year is no exception. SciFi, of course, has the return of the two Stargate series and the new series Eureka; USA Network is bringing back The 4400 and The Dead Zone while we've got Blade on Spike and even a few semi-genre shows on other networks. We've also got news on what the Broadcast networks have planned for the fall and the scoop on what shows will survive the merger of The WB and UPN turning into The CW. Of course, there's also the latest news from across the pond on Doctor Who and a few other shows of note

The first two Fridays in June will see SciFi finish the first season of the new **Doctor Who** with the two part *Bad Wolf/ Parting of the Ways* that sees The Doctor, Rose and Captain Jack return to Satellite Five and discover that there's something sinister going on behind the scenes of the lethal reality shows that are happening (and which they get trapped in). The ratings for the show on SciFi have been good, but not blockbuster. Considering the show is airing in the midst of repeats of other SciFi shows, it is expected that SciFi will pick up subsequent seasons and give the show a higher profile.

Before the weekly original dramas start up in July, SciFi will be having a couple of new movies in June. First up on June 10th is *Black Hole*, where a particle accelerator in St. Louis creates an artificial black hole that starts destroying the city and also creates a rift in time and space that an energy creature uses to come into our world, creating even more havoc. Kristy Swanson and Judd Nelson star. June 24th brings us Android Apocalypse where Scott Bairstow is an android hating working man who ends up being sent to a penal colony after getting in a barroom brawl. His transport is attacked by mutants and he ends up stranded in the wilderness with his android captor and they must both work together to survive. Look for SciFi to unleash two more movies on the world in July, but what they will be is not yet known.

Starting in June on Tuesday nights will be *Extreme Championship Wrestling*, a spinoff of the *World Wrestling Federation* that SciFi intends to be in tune with the SciFi lifestyle. Showing up on SciFi in July will be *Dark Angel* in a four hour block on Monday nights and *Dead Like Me* in a two hour block on Tuesday nights preceding *Eureka* and *ECW*.

Returning on July 14th will be *Stargate SG-1* and *Stargate Atlantis*, both an hour later than last year. Beginning on

July 28 will be episodes of the canceled ABC series *Night Stalker* at 8 pm ET/PT. Missing will be *Battlestar Galactica* which will not return with new episodes until October as SciFi looks to expand their new shows to a year round schedule.

Stargate SG-1 returns with the continuation of the Ori problems in Flesh and Blood. The Ori begin to invade Chulak, the Jaffa planet, and Vala and Daniel try to deal with the new Ori leader, Adria, Vala's daughter, who has been rapidly aged by the Ori. Morpheus is next and sees the SG-1 team on a mission where they all are overcome by a need to sleep while Vala deals with a psychiatrist. In The Pegasus Project, Daniel and Vala travel to Atlantis to search for information on Merlin's weapon to defeat the Ori and find out more than they anticipated while the rest of the team is on a mission with the Odyssey. Atlantis begins season three with No Man's Land which picks up where season two ended. Connor Trinneer returns as the Wraith Michael (after having a scheduling conflict in the season finale). Joining the cast on a regular basis is Robert Picardo as Richard Woolsey who has been assigned to Atlantis to review Dr. Weir's command decisions. In Misbegotten, Dr. Beckett finds himself trapped in an asylum when the inmates take it over. In Sateda, Ronon Dex is captured by the Wraith and brought back to his home world where he is forced to be a runner again.

Debuting on Tuesday July 18th with a two hour premier is SciFi's newest drama, *Eureka*. It has been described as a cross between Northern Exposure and Twin Peaks and is an attempt by SciFi to expand beyond the traditional science fiction drama associated with the channel with a healthy dose of humor and quirkiness. The fictional town of Eureka is in the Pacific Northwest and is a seemingly ordinary town to the casual observer. U.S. Marshall Jack Carter (played by Colin Ferguson) crashes his car in Eureka while transporting a teenage runaway. When a child disappears in the wake of an accident caused by one of the town's eccentric residents, Carter works with the local sheriff (Maury Chaykin) and a Dept of Defense agent (Salli Richardson) to investigate. In the process, Carter discovers Eureka is a secret government think tank with a lot of mystery, conspiracy and other secrets are hidden here.

SciFi's latest reality series, *Who Wants to be a Superhero?* will debut on July 27th for a six week run where **Stan Lee** and the producers of reality series such as *Meet My Folks* and *Who Wants to Marry My Dad?* search for the latest superhero concept. Eleven finalists will live together in a secret lair living as their superhero creations and will be tested each week with competitions designed to prove who will make the best superhero.

Movie News By Lee Whiteside

The Omen (June 6) - Just when you thought it was safe to go back to the movies, we find out that the Anti-Christ is making a comeback. Directed by John Moore, you can revisit the heartwarming tale of Damien as he helps prepare the world for Armageddon in this new remake of the 1976 movie. Seamus Davey-Fitzpatrick is Damien, Julia Stiles and Liev Schreiber are the unwitting parents. Also starring are David Thewlis, Mia Farrow, Peter Postlethwaite, and Michael Gambon. Note that in a special marketing plan to commemorate June 6, 2006, the movie is opening on a Tuesday (6-6-06).

Cars (June 9) - Pixar's latest CGI action adventure film is about race cars. Lightning McQueen is a hotshot rookie race car traveling to the Piston Cup Championship in California. He detours through the town of Radiator Springs on Route 66 (nothing demonic about two 6's) where he runs into a bunch of offbeat characaters (all cars, of course) who help him on his life's journey. Voice cast includes Owen Wilson, Paul Newman, Bonnie Hunt, Cheech Marin, Larry the Cable Guy, Richard Petty, George Carlin and more. Garfield's A Tale of Two Kitties (June 23rd) - Bill Murry is back as Garfield and when Garfield's owner, Jon, takes him to England, the fat cat is mistaken for a lookalike cat that has inherited a royal castle. Jennifer Love Hewitt takes time out from talking with Ghosts to reprise her role as Liz and Breckin Meyer returns as Garfield's poor owner, Jon Arbuckle. Billy Connolly is the evil Lord Dargis, who wants to turn the castle into a resort. Click (June 23) Adam Sandler starts as a workaholic architect that comes across a special remote control that is able to actually control his life. When the remote control starts taking over his life, he realizes what he's been missing. Also stars Christopher Walken, Kate Beckinsale, David Hasselhoff, and Sean Astin.

Superman Returns (June 30) The longawaited return of Superman to the big screen, directed by Bryan Singer, this is one of the most anticipated movies of the summer. Will it live up to the hype and expectations of the fans? We'll find out on June 30th. Relative unknown Brandon Routh looks the part of the last son of Krypton as well as his alter-ego Clark Kent. Kate Bosworth is Lois Lane, Kevin Spacey is Lex Luthor, Frank Langella is Perry White, and James Marsden is Richard White, Perry's son and Lois's love interest. Marlon Brando appears as

(Continued from page 3) The winner will be featured in a new comic book created by *Stan Lee* and will also be featured in a SciFi channel original movie. To help kick off the new series, SciFi will debut *Stan Lee's Lightspeed* starring Jason Connery, Lee Majors, Daniel Goddard and Nicole Eggert on Wednesday, July 26th. Connery is Daniel Leight, who is able to move at light speed after an accident that crushes his legs and exposes him to radiation.

Also debuting on July 27th is the long in development animated series *The Amazing Screw-On Head*, about a robot in the civil war that has multiple heads it can use to disguise itself. SciFi will also be running a British series *Garth Marenghi's Darkplace*, a satire on 80's horror TV shows produced for Channel 4 in the UK last year.

SciFi has announced a few new things in development, including a *Battlestar Galactica* prequel series *Caprica*, that will be set 50 years before the current series and show how the Cylons came to rebel against their creators. When the series returns in October, expect even more web content including webisodes that will feature supporting characters and show events from their perspective and expand the overall story of the series. SciFi has also announced they have picked up *The Dresden Files* for a weekly series, ordering an additional 11 episodes and it will debut in January.

For this winter's big miniseries event, SciFi will debut the eight hour limited series *Motel Man*. It sees homicide detective Joe Miller stumble onto a motel room key that unlocks the door to a motel room that contains mundane objects that possess strange powers. Joe learns that other groups are trying to obtain some of the items and when his daughter disappears in the motel room, he becomes the focus of a police investigation.

SciFi has debuted an online broadband video channel dubbed The Pulse that will feature special video content including complete episodes, uncut movies, online pilots, and lots of behind the scenes video. SciFi will also bring back their film festival show *Exposure* and will have a weekly news show. According to SciFi Executive VP David Howe, "SCI FI Pulse' delivers on our commitment to exploit new digital opportunities for our audience to enjoy and get involved in our programming. Our broadband Channel is primed to be the category killer destination for genre content on the Web and will further strengthen our relationship with our viewers, building an even bigger online community." SciFi has also experimented with non-genre programming including a block of Law and Order: SVU that reportedly did better in the ratings than their regularly scheduled Thursday night movie repeats. Spike TV will debut their initial entry into genre drama with **Blade** starting with the two hour premier on Wednesday June 28th. Kirk "Sticky" Jones stars as Blade, the half vampire, half human vampire hunter based on a Marv Wolfman comic creation that has had a successful run as movies featuring Wesley Snipes. While investigating the vampire house of Chthon, Blade forms an alliance with former military vet Krista Starr (Jill Wagner), who has been investigating the murder of her twin brother. There's not much advance information on the show's episodes, however, they have made it known that Blade will be riding a Harley-Davidson VRSCD Night Rod Motorcycle in the show.

Returning to the USA Network in June will be The 4400 and The Dead Zone (for likely its final run of new episodes). First up is The 4400, which picks up on June 11 where the previous season left off where year old Isabelle has just transformed into a twenty year old (played by Megalvn Echikunwoke). Isabelle's father, Richard (Mahershalalhashbaz Ali), must deal with his daughter's sudden transformation and an even more surprising change in his wife, Lily (Laura Allen). Meanwhile, Tom (Joel Gretch) and Diana (Jacqueline McKenzie) pursue a radical 4400 organization called the Nova Group that has launched attacks against Dennis Ryland (Peter Coyote) and the other bureaucrats that they perceive as threats. The Dead Zone returns on June 18th with Johnny attempting to find a way to stop Greg Stillson from marrying Miranda Ellis, who Johnny believes is in grave danger if she goes through with the marriage while a political crisis develops that will bring Stillson closer to the White House. Johnny will continue to use his powers for good as he also tries to learn more about his role in the Armageddon he has foreseen. In upcoming episodes, he will take on a dangerous escaped convict, join a cult to try to prevent a Waco-like catastrophe, pose as a thief in order to keep a museum robbery from going bad; and investigate an apparent hate crime only to discover that the victims and the perpetrators are not who they appear to be, and multiple visions from an attacker, a victim and a rescuer wreak havoc with his own sense of reality and identity in one episode.

ABC Family will delve into the genre arena for two new series this summer. June 26th sees the debut of *Kyle XY*. Matt Dallas stars as Kyle, a mysterious teenage savant who is discovered wandering in traffic and put in an institution. Psychologist Nicole Trager (Marguerite Macintyre) brings Kyle home to stay with her family and as Kyle begins to show signs of brilliance, they work to solve the mystery of his origin. Seems a bit like a teenaged *John Doe* to me. Debuting Sunday July 23rd is *Three*

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Moons Over Milford that is set in the small town of Milford that will reflect the world's reaction to a cosmic explosion that is threatening Earth's existence. It focuses on the Davis family and their reactions to the news with **Elizabeth McGovern** as mom Laura Davis, **Teresa**

Celentano as her daughter Lydia, **and Sam Murphy** as their 17 year old son Alex. Also starring are **Nora Dunn**, **Samantha Quan** and **Rob Boltin**.

The broadcast networks have announced their plans for the next season, although they are always subject to change. NBC kicked off the network upfronts by touting their corporate initiative, dubbed "TV 360" which will cover all of their networks, both broadcast and cable, that will expand their programming beyond their broadcast and cable outlets to the online broadband world. In addition to webisodes and special features like that planned for SciFi's Pulse web site, NBC Universal will also be setting up a series of FirstLook.com websites for each of their channels, debuting selected episodes online of their regular series. This will include SciFi, USA Network and NBC.

On the genre side of things, NBC has renewed *Medium*, has not renewed Surface, but has picked up the series Heroes for the fall. Heroes will follow the lives of a group of ordinary people who discover they have extraordinary powers. It is an ensemble cast that includes Greg Grunberg as a down on his luck beat cop who discovers he can hear peoples thoughts, Milo Ventimiglia is a young man who believes he can fly, Leonard **Roberts** is a prison inmate who can teleport himself outside of his cell, Havden Panettiere is a high school cheerleader who is indestructible, Santiago Cabrera is a drug-addicted artist who can paint the future, and Masi Oka is a young Japanese man who can stop time through sheer will power. Sendhil Ramamurthy is a genetics professor in India who learns of a secret theory of his father's that there are people with special powers in the world and that they have an ultimate destiny, to save the world. NBC plans to have a lot of associated online content including a regularly updated online comic to add to the back story of the events and the characters. Look for it on Monday nights this fall. NBC has also picked up for midseason the series Raines that stars Jeff

Goldblum as the eccentric LAPD detective Michael Raines who has the unique ability to be able to converse with the dead, allowing him to help solve their murders. Also starring are Matt Craven as Raines' boss Captain Daniel Lewis, Dov Davidoff and Linda Park as fellow officers Remy Boyer and Sally Lance, and Luis Guzman as Charlie, Raines' former partner and conscience. Look for it on Sundays in mid-season after Sunday Night Football completes its run.

ABC has not renewed Invasion. For their fall lineup, ABC has not picked up anything genre related for new shows. They have indicated that for the next season of *Lost*, they plan to run the episodes in two blocks, avoiding repeats of the show. It will debut in October and run for seven episodes, returning likely in February for an uninterrupted run through May. ABC has already announced a pickup for the IDT Entertainment series Masters of Science Fiction, although their commitment is for only four episodes. The show was conspicuously absent during their upfront presentation. I would be surprised if the show gets much of a promo push when ABC decides to air it. Regardless of its likely limited run on ABC, IDT is planning on producing an initial batch of six episodes while developing a full slate of thirteen scripts. Initial scripts likely to be produced include Heinlein's "Jerry Was a Man" with Michael Tolkin writing and directing, John Varley's "Persistence of Vision" scripted by Michael Cassutt, Harlan Ellison's "Discarded" co-scripted with Josh Olson, Robert Sheckly's "Watchbird" scripted by J. Michael Straczynksi, and Ray Bradbury doing the script for his story "Dark They Were, and Golden-Eyed". Other scripts in the work include Edmond Hamilton's "What's it Like Out There?", Asimov's "The Last Question", and Harry Harrison's "A Criminal Act". It looks like it will be a well produced, well-scripted series when we do finally get to see it.

CBS has renewed Ghost Whisper and is returning almost its entire schedule, opening up two hours by dropping their Sunday night movie. In the genre field, they have picked up *Jericho*, which is about a small town in Kansas following a major nuclear assault on the US that has destroyed most of the major cites in the country and left the small town isolated from the rest of the world. It will deal with how they react to the possibility of life without civilization as we know it. The ensemble cast includes Ashley Scott, Gerald McRaney, Alica Coppola, Erik Knudsen, Kenneth Mitchell, Lennie James, Michael Gaston, Pamela Reed, Skeet Ulrich, and Spraque Grayden.

FOX has not picked up anything in the genre arena, setting adrift the pilot *Beyond* about JPL's response to a global Volume 16 Issue 3

crisis. The only thing of likely interest will be the summer 2007 reality series *On the Lot*, which will be a competition series for filmmaker's with Dreamworks TV and **Steven Spielberg** involved. FOX's My Network TV has sprung up to provide programming to stations left behind in the UPN/WB merger and has nothing of interest to genre fans, programming trashy tele-novellas six nights a week for two hours.

Finally, we've got The CW rising from the ashes of UPN and The WB and it looks like **Alex Luthor** took the two networks and bashed them together to make a new one (see DC's *Infinite Crisis* comic for the reference). The new network will be a mix of shows from the old networks, with *Smallville* and *Supernatural* surviving to be the lone genre series on the new network, the *Mercy Reef* pilot about a young Aquaman was left out to dry and was not picked up for a series. As usual, *Smallville* left things in a pretty dire state with the entire cast in peril of some sort, especially Clark.

Overall, this season has fewer new

two parter by Matt Jones, The Impossible Planet/the Satan Pit, where the Doctor and Rose visit a nightmarish alien world that is compared to Hell in one press description, Love and Monsters by Russell T. Davies which has been described as an offbeat episode that will feature a fan-created monster, the Abzorbaloff, Fear Her by Matthew Graham which is rumored to be about ghosts and/or the 2012 Summer Olympics (or both), and the season finale two parter by Russell T. Davies, Army of Ghosts/ Doomsday, that sees the Cybermen awakened in our universe and in combination with something else from the Doctor's past (Daleks? the Gelf?). threatens the Earth. Expect a major season ending cliffhanger for the 2nd season finale. Production has started on the Doctor Who spinoff series Torchwood that is scheduled to start airing on the BBC in October. Not much information has been leaked beyond the initial casting reports. Indications are that the series will be very adult and is not intended for kids

In the animated TV world, Kid's WB will remain Kid's WB even with the demise of The WB. The CW decided that the Kid's WB brand was strong enough that they should not change it. They will be dropping Pokemon and Yu-Gi-Oh! in favor of more domestically produced series. Returning will be The Batman, which will see the addition of Robin to the lineup with appearances by Batgirl and villains such as Harley Quinn, Black Mask, Killer Moth, the Everywhere Man, a brand-new Clayface, the Joker, Penguin and Riddler, New this season will be the long rumored Legion of Super Heroes series. It will be in a different continuity from the other DC Animated series with Superboy joining with Lightning Lad, Saturn Girl, Brainiac 5, Phantom Girl, Bouncing Boy and Timber Wolf in weekly adventures. According to the Kid's WB press release "Together, this unlikely Legion of Super Heroes bands together to defend the rights of all free worlds and uphold the laws of the newly formed United Planets. That is, if they don't kill each other first. LEGION OF SUPER HEROES combines humor with highstakes, grand-scale super heroics to create the ultimate sci-fi, super hero fantasy for kids of all ages. Each episode of this fastpaced, character-driven action comedy will pit Superboy and the Legion against otherworldly threats and adversaries who challenge the team on both super heroic and emotional levels." Also debuting will be a new Scooby Doo series, Shaggy & Scooby-Doo Get a Clue!, Scooby now has Scooby Snacks with nano-technology that allow him to become almost anything (a giant magnet, a towering robot) and a Mystery Machine that can morph into any mode of transportation.

genre entries to look forward to on the broadcast networks (NBC two (one midseason), CBS one, ABC one (limited series), with FOX and The CW each at zero).

Over in the UK, the second series of *Doctor Who* has been well received, both critically and in the ratings. Remaining in the season that will be broadcast in the UK in June and July are the

Jor-El via unused footage from the Christopher Reeve movies and Jack Larson and Noel Neill, Jimmy Olsen and Lois Lane from the 1950's TV series, make cameos. In the movie, Superman returns from space after an absence of several years to find that Lois has moved on with her life and that his arch-foe, Lex Luthor, is planning to make sure Superman isn't around to thwart his plans for global domination.

Pirates of the Caribbean: Dead Man's Chest (July 7) Captain Jack Sparrow (Johnny Depp) returns in a new adventure sparked by the realization that he owes a blood debt to Davey Jones. Jack derails the wedding plans of Will Turner (Orlando Bloom) and Elizabeth Swann (Keira Knightley) as he drags them along on his latest adventure.

A Scanner Darkly (July 7) Another Philip K. Dick movie adaptation, this time in animated form. Keanu Reeves stars as a reluctant government recruit spying on his friends and delves into the world of drugs, multiple identities and questions of who can you really trust. Limited release. Lady in the Water (July 21st) M. Night Shyamalan's latest fantasy starts Paul Giamatti as Cleveland Heep, a building manager who rescues a mysterious young woman (Bryce Dallas Howard) from danger. He discovers she is actually a character from a bedtime story who is trying to get back to her world. Heep soon discovers that he and his fellow tenants are now also characters in the bedtime story that has come to life and that he has fallen in love with her.. They must work to protect her from the creatures that are trying to prevent her from going home. **Clerks II: The Passion of the Clerks** (July 21) Kevin Smith revisits Randall and Dante ten year's after the first Clerk's movie to find that they have moved on to new horizons, Mooby's, a fast food empire. Jeff Anderson (Randal) and Brian O'Halloran (Dante) return, along with Kevin Smith (Silent Bob) and Jason Mewes (Jay). Expect lots of pop culture references and foul languange.

My Super Ex-Girlfriend (July 21) Uma Thurman is Jenny Johnson, who is also the secret identity of the superhero G-Girl and Luke Wilson is her unknowing boyfriend. When he dumps her for being too needy, she uses her powers to make his life a living hell. Directed by Ivan Reitman.

Monster House (July 21) This animated movie with Robert Zemeckis and Steven Spielberg producing is about three kids who discover a neighbor's house is really a monster. They must find a way to stop the house and save the neighborhood. Voice cast includes Steve Buscemi, Maggie Gyllenhaal, Jon Heder, Kevin James, and Jason Lee.

Hello everyone! I'm fresh from my first Nebula Awards weekend...wow, what an experience. Made a couple new contacts so you might be seeing a couple more new names show up soon... got one right away for this issue...

First up is K.D. Wentworth who just got back from Tempe where she attended her third Nebula Awards as a Short Story Finalist. She has finished a YA western fantasy and is now working on a sequel to "The Course of Empire" with Eric Flint for Baen. She has stories upcoming in Weird Tales, Twenty Epics, Baen's Universe, and Realms of Fantasy. She will be teaching at the Writers of the Future Workshop again this year with Tim Powers in August. Speaking of Tim Powers – Tim was spare in his contribution this time but he tells me that he has a novel coming out from HarperCollins in July, titled "Three Days to Never." It's about supernatural modern-day consequences of Einstein having lived in Pasadena in the early 1930s. Sounds like typical Powers... I can hardly wait. Also from California, Larry Niven updates us with the news that "Building Harlequin's Moon" (with Brenda Cooper) is out in paperback. "The Draco Tavern" is still available as a hardback. Ed Lerner and he have finished "Fleet of Worlds", set mostly on the Peirson's puppeteer homeworlds. It's with Larry's agent, Eleanor Wood, and two publishers have bid, but nothing concrete yet. "Inferno" (with Jerry Pournelle) is due online through Baen Books. They'll publish a slightly revised version when they publish the sequel, currently called "Inferno 2: Escape from Hell." That is not far enough along to nail down a pub date. Larry & Greg Benford are both moving, if slowly, on "The Bowl of Heaven." And Larry & Steven Barnes are at work on "The Moon Maze Game."

Joe Haldeman sent me this from Florida: Bicycling Hadrian's Wall was a wonderful trip. The trail wasn't quite finished; he and his wife were among the first dozen to try out parts of it. A certain amount of rain and mud, but also blue skies and the wonderful English countryside, and fascinating Roman ruins. Last month they took a two-week cruise to Italy, Egypt. Watch for a travelogue on his website, http://home.earthlink.net/ ~haldeman/travel.html, once he gets the new computer system to cooperate. Joe is still cranking on "The Accidental Time Machine," which he hopes to deliver before he goes off to teach at Clarion in mid-July.

September will be a busy publishing month for **Christopher Golden**. Del Rey will publish "Witchery: A Ghosts of Albion" novel, the second in the series he writes with Amber Benson. Ace will publish "Stones Unturned," the third book in the MENAGERIE series that he writes with Thomas E. Sniegoski. Earlier the same month, Signet will release a trade paperback edition of one of his older novels, "Straight on 'til Morning," with a new introduction that Chris wrote, and a short story, "Runaway," that's sort of a prequel to the novel. He has also had two novellas published in limited edition recently—"The Shell Collector," from Cemetery Dance, and "Bloodstained Oz," which he wrote with James A. Moore for Earthling Publications. Christopher & Sniegoski are currently at work on "Crashing Paradise," the fourth MENAGERIE novel. The second book in the trilogy THE VEIL, which is entitled "The Borderkind," will hit from Bantam early next year. Next summer, Bantam will also publish a hardcover novel he did with Hellboy creator, Mike Mignola, called "Baltimore, Or, The Steadfast Tin Soldier and the Vampire." He just finished it this month, and Mike is doing more than a hundred illustrations to complement the text of their story . . . and even to help tell the story.

And from the Midwest, I was happy to hear from Selina Rosen who, with Laura Underwood, sold their gonzo mystery entitled, "Bad Lands," to Five Star Mystery and it should see print in 2007. Selina's science fiction/horror/ adventure novel "Strange Robby" will be released in June of this year by Meisha Merlin publishing, in a hardback and softcover trade edition. She is currently working on editing the next "Bubbas of the Apocalypse" anthology, "Houston, We've Got Bubbas," and writing the second Holmes and Storm mystery in collaboration with Ms. Underwood tentatively titled "Bad City." While from New Mexico, I have news from Walter Jon Williams. Walter has been concentrating on short fiction lately. He's written the novelette "Resurrection Day" for "Escape From Earth" an anthology edited by Gardner Dozois and Jack Dann. He's delivered the novelette "Pinocchio" to Jonathan Strahan for his anthology "The Starry Rift." And he's working on another, as-yet-unnamed story for yet another Gardner Dozois anthology, "The New Space Opera." And, perhaps most importantly: Walter is Guest of Honor at Westercon 59, Conzilla, July 1-4 in San Diego.

I have only one UK contribution this issue; from **Brian Aldiss** who just got back from Croatia, and *yes*, the Croats also hold conventions. He was GoH because two of his books were being published in translation: "Non-Stop", his first SF novel and, more amazingly, a travel book he wrote on Jugoslavia, "Cities & Stones." On its first appearance in 1965 it was banned in Belgrade. Brian said to the present publisher (a war hero), "But the book's ancient." He replied, "We regard it as history." "History," Brian lamented," I must be getting old..." At the moment, his time is devoted to compiling a "Science Fiction Omnibus" for Penguin Books, scheduled for 2007, lecturing and trying to prepare his journals for publication. He has a story coming up in Asimov's, while the Overlook Press has just accepted a new novel, "Harm!" set in the future, but about present-day torture by British and American forces.

But I have lots from some of our authors in Canada. I welcome Ed Greenwood to our fold. From his farmhouse in rural Ontario, Canada, it's (as usual) swords & sorcery time. He's hard at work on the 2nd book in the KNIGHTS OF MYTH DRANNOR trilogy, "Swords of Dragonfire," to be published in hardcover by Wizards of the Coast in 2007. The first KNIGHTS book, "Swords of Eveningstar," will be published in hardcover in August of this year, and goes back in time (in the popular Forgotten Realms fantasy setting) to when teenagers, hungry for adventure in the uplands of Cormyr, first got together, won their charter, and set off on the road to become a famous adventuring band. Ed's also working on "Warrior of Niflheim," to be published in hardcover by Tor Books in 2007; the first in a new series set in vast subterranean kingdoms. In 2006 and 2007, he'll have short stories or novelettes in several anthologies, including "It Came From The Swamp" in Astounding Hero Tales (an anthology of new pulp adventure tales, from Hero Games), "King Harrowhelm" in Heroes in Training (from DAW Books), and "Beowulf and the Wraith" in Further Tales of Beowulf - Champion of Middle Earth (from Carroll & Graff / Avalon Publishing). Ed's "really big news" must still remain secret for the time being, but when he sends me an update, as various projects reach the "can be talked about" stage, I'll pass it on.

And, from one of my favorite Canadians (actually, an all-around favorite), Robert Sawyer: Robert J. Sawyer recently launched a new blog at sfwriter.com/blog.htm. He sold serialization rights to his next novel, called "Rollback", to Analog, which will publish the full text of the book in four parts starting in the October 2006 issue; Tor's hardcover will follow in April 2007. Rob's novella "Identity Theft" is a current Hugo finalist, and a sequel, entitled "Biding Time," has just appeared in the DAW anthology "Slipstreams" edited by Martin H. Greenberg and John Helfers. In the last month, Rob has optioned film rights to his novels "Mindscan" and "The Terminal Experiment" and his short story "The Shoulders of Giants." Just a polite reminder that nominations are now open for the Hugo Awards. If you had a membership in last year's World Science Fiction Convention in Glasgow or this (Continued on page 7)

(Continued from page 6) year's World Science Fiction Convention in Los Angeles, you're entitled to nominate. The works Rob has hopes for are: In the Novel category: "Mindscan" from Tor Books. In the Novella category: "Identity Theft" (from Down These Dark Spaceways.) He'll be Writer-in-Residence at Odyssey, a six-week-long science-fiction and fantasy writing workshop in New Hampshire being held June 12-July 21, 2006. And he'll be facilitating his usual week-long SF&F workshop at the Banff Centre for the Arts September 18-23, 2006. http:// www.sfwriter.com/workshop.htm And, as an editor, he's just acquired novels by Terence M. Green (Sailing Time's Ocean) and Matthew Hughes (The Commons) for his Robert J. Sawyer Books imprint at

Calgary's Red Deer Press. And almost lastly, but certainly not leastly... is Spider Robinson. Some time ago, in issue 15.3, May 2005, Spider announced that he was writing a Robert Heinlein book. Well, it's finished! It's going to be a Spider September. In his "relentless quest to ensure that there are plenty of Christmas gifts for your loved ones, friends, and strangers you want to impress, I have broken the publishing industry to my will, and caused them to issue five of my novels at once, that month!" First and foremost, obviously, is "Variable Star," his collaboration with Robert A. Heinlein. Spider relates: "I think I pulled it off: it's some of the best writing I've ever done." Tor's giving it a nice cover, and there's going to be a publicity supernova on release. (At this point, I feel...well, imagine you've just finished arranging, producing, recording, mixing and pressing the first new John Lennon album in nearly 20 years, starting with some low-fi mono cassette tapes and a few scribbled lyrics, and you're pretty sure it's something he would have liked a lot....and it will be four more months before anybody but you and a few friends have heard it.) Next, Baen Books will finally release the paperback edition of Spider's latest solo novel "Very Bad Deaths." It's the first book in a new sf/ mystery series, about an Odd Trio of misfits who thwart crime in present-day Vancouver BC, with frequent flashbacks to the 60s, and it contains the creepiest villain he's ever written. He's just about to start the second in the series, "Very Hard Choices." Spider is excited about the series because it lets him sound off about both the Good Old Days, and the Brave New World that has ensued. Finally and by NO means least, Baen will also be reissuing THE STARDANCE TRILOGY in a single hardcover volume for the first time ever. That's all three of the novels that he wrote in collaboration with his choreographer wife, Jeanne Robinson, about zero gravity dance and

its pivotal role in human evolution: "Stardance," "Starseed," and "Starmind." Their original novella "Stardance" won the Hugo and Nebula, assorted other portions of the trilogy were Hugo finalists, and he thinks it's some of the best writing he's done yet, like "Variable Star." A close friend of the late Virginia Heinlein recently stunned Spider & Jeanne by telling them it was Ginny's favorite series, and one of Robert's favorites too.

I'll wrap up with a couple of our local Arizonan authors, Jennifer Roberson and Alan Dean Foster. Jennifer's new book is in the stores, titled "Karavans." This novel, one in a series, is the first new world Roberson has created since the very popular SWORD-DANCER series. And Alan's "Sagramanda," a novel set in a city of 100 million in near-future India, will be published by Pyr Books in October. "The Candle of Distant Earth," the third and final book of THE TAKEN trilogy, will be published by Del Rey in June. "Trouble Magnet," the next FLINX & PIP adventure, will appear later this year, to be followed by "Patrimony." Del Rey will subsequently publish "Exceptions to Reality," his 7th collection of short fiction. And, "Quofum," a standalone COMMONWEALTH novel; and "Flinx Transcendent," a big novel that resolves everything Flinx has been up to in the course of all his preceding books and adventures. Also appearing in various venues will be an assortment of short fiction, notably the novella "Mid-Death," in the collection of original novellas "Forbidden Planets," from the SFBC, and the ICERIGGER novelette "Chilling," in Baen's Universe.

Our resident experts in podcasting science fiction, Michael Mennenga and Evo Terra, rarely have time to catch their breaths. They have formed a new company called FarPoint Media (http:// <u>farpointmedia.net</u>) which is acting as sort of an "incubator" for creative people interested in podcasting, blogging and more. What started out as simply The Dragon Page has now morphed into 13 (as of this printing) different podcast properties. Best selling author Tracy Hickman has already signed on with FarPoint, and together with Mur Lafferty they are hosting the Parsec Awards to recognize excellence in fiction podcasting. Ten awards in multiple categories will be awarded at this year's Dragon*Con convention in September. If you're interested in the world of podcasting science fiction and fantasy, these are the guys to talk with!

The basis for "The Last Stand" is that a pharmaceutical company has found a "cure" for the mutants. Of course Magneto (Ian McKellen) does not view this as a cure and declares himself the cure for mankind. Prof Xavier (Patrick Stewart) has a more tolerant view. Mutants are offered the cure when clinics are opened and the clinics are picketed by other mutants who believe that no mutant should take the cure (looks like what we have seen on the news at abortion clinics). Jean Gray is reincarnated into Phoenix (Famke Janssen), more powerful than ever, and a struggle begins between Magneto and Prof Xavier to try and convince Phoenix to join their side culminating in a scene that is quite intense with some exciting special effects. The Beast's role is played by a new actor to the X-Men films (Kelsey Grammer) who holds a new government cabinet position named "The Department of Mutant Affairs". Given the current illegal immigration debate this seems quite appropriate. Wolverine (Hugh Jackman)

gives us a great performance and some laughs. To anyone who dislikes San Francisco there is much enjoyment when the Golden Gate bridge is slightly dislodged in another very existing special effect. simple answer. How else, he asked me, do you account for the incredible rise in evangelical Christianity and other very simplistic forms of religion? Perhaps, I mused, because the world has gotten so complicated that people grab onto anything that might make just one part of their life simpler. He agreed but did caution that it wouldn't make their life any easier; and in fact, might complicate it. It could make one technologically sociologically schizophrenic. Lee really just wants people to think. He's been faced with a reader asking him why he has made conflicting statements and accused him of being hypocritical. He wants to be clear that what he tries to do is raise questions. So when his characters say conflicting things, it's not necessarily Lee's viewpoint, but that he is simply raising valid questions.

Moving along, I asked him if he ever worked on multiple projects. Not exactly, he answered. He only creates one book at a time; although, that adds up to about 2.5 books a year... So, while he might be writing one book, he'll also be editing a second and checking galley proofs on a third. At the pace he's set for himself, I was curious if he ever took time off. Maybe a week between, he said. Well, what did it feel like not to be writing? He admitted that he does get a little antsy if he's not working but not too often as there are always stories to be written. How does he research or does he need to? Well... there is the researcher who buries himself in research and then goes to write the book, and then there's the writer who researches as he goes, as Lee does. He's

continually doing research; whether its technical journals or periodicals, nonfiction as he tries to stay current in a lot of fields.

His work encompasses both science fiction and fantasy - how does he distinguish between the two? His answer was pretty surprising. He points out that all writing, even non-fiction, is still truly fiction. No biography is ever the complete truth - they reflect the literary judgement of the writer, so in that sense, the biographer is just as much a fictionalist as a novelist. Every writer picks and chooses what stays and what goes - after all, the reader isn't interested in mundane bits of information that are unessential to the main story or theme whether it's fiction or non-fiction. Editing real life makes a better read.

I was curious if Lee had much demand for short stories. In the past few years, he has been asked to contribute more. About 3 or 4 years ago, he was first asked to contribute a short story due to his experiences in Vietnam, when he was a pilot, to an anthology named "In the Shadow of the Wall." Then Andrew Greeley asked him to write an Irishthemed story called "Emerald Magic." Then the offers came more often; mostly notably a "taboo-breaking" story for "Flights: Extreme Visions of Fantasy." And he's working on others right now. One will be for "Future Weapons", and the one for Baen's Universe will be a Recluce novelette.

Lee thinks he's a bit hard to categorize – his short stories and novels are significantly different, his readers tend to gravitate towards his Recluce or Spellsong stories, or his science fiction stories, or his Ghost books. His short stories are 'quietly unsettling.' I think Lee is happiest when he can challenge his reader.

There are 13 published Recluce novels (and he's working on #14) - an intimidating number of books to me. Not so, he assures me. They are not a continuing storyline. They cover 2000 years, 15 different cultures, and 5 continents. No more than two books are about the same character. They aren't even all written in the same tense. Should I read them in chronological order or published order? Well, obviously, Lee would prefer that they are read in the order published (written.) However, if the reader wants to know the chronological order they can find that on his website. Since Lee does have a fairly long set of books in a series, a couple of series actually - I asked him if he thought writers should keep a series alive as long as the fans want them or if the writer has the responsibility to end a series when he/ she no longer has anything new to offer. The latter, he said firmly. He's been asked if he would write more Spellsong books and he says, while it's not impossible, it's very unlikely as he doesn't know what

more he could add to that universe. On the other hand, Recluce with the broad span of time, geography and culture is a wider field with lots more opportunity. While he would like it if readers would read as many of his books as they can, he'll be damned, he said, if he'd 'blackmail' his readers into reading every single book in a series just so they can reach the 'end of the story.' Recluce wasn't written as one big story. Each book stands alone. They're about life, they are not about 'getting to the end of the story.'

Does he have any new ideas or series breaking ground in his mind? He's still writing the Corean Chronicles and just finished 'Soarer's Choice,' the 3rd book in the second trilogy which will publish in November 2006. There will be, undoubtedly, a new series in the future but Lee hasn't thought of it yet. Which made me wonder who his audience is...are they different for each series? He believes he has a very diverse audience: romance readers, mystery readers, science fiction readers, as young as 11 and as old as 80, blue-collar and PHDs. What they all have in common is that they are people who like to think.

E-books are a controversial medium. Lee thinks they run against people's proclivities. People tend towards that which is the easiest and cheapest. Paper books are obviously low-tech while fancy electronic readers are getting more and more consumer friendly, lightweight and inexpensive. But the high-tech readers will still always cause the owner to spend more time and effort protecting his investment; while if a paperback book is forgotten on a plane, it doesn't become a crisis. Books don't require batteries or power supplies. As long as you can see the page, you can read the story.

Finally, I wanted to ask him about his experience with SF conventions. With his schedule I guessed he'd restrict his attendance; obviously, a writer at a convention isn't...writing. Oh, yes, he answered – no more than 5 or 6 a year. Well that was a bit startling...I though 5 or 6 would be a huge amount for a working author. And he's still more prolific than many other writers! There are two conventions that he tries to hit every year: World Fantasy and his favorite local con, Conduit, in Salt Lake City.

When we talked about whether he wrote for personal pleasure or if he tailored his work for the publisher, he had difficulty answering...it's a blurred issue, he explained. He has a lot of things to say that are worthwhile but if he can't write an entertaining story it doesn't matter because no one will read it. On the other hand, he doesn't write merely for entertainment – empty entertainment isn't what he wants to produce. Again, we're back to Lee's need to push people to *think*. And although he may not always succeed, it's always his goal.

40 Years of Star Trekking Across The Universe

It was Friday September 27, 1968. I had just turned twelve-years-old the day before and I was about to violate my parentally enforced bedtime in order to see Mr. Spock turn traitor. I snuck down the long, carpeted hallway, past the kitchen, slowing as I approached the relative openness of the living room. Peering around the corner, my ear caught the caught the familiar NBC theme signaling the beginning of a television show. I moved quickly to my first cover: a high-backed, turquoise colored lounge



chair. From this vantage point, I could see the 25-inch color television in the Family Room. I caught the fading image of the NBC peacock and the words "In Living Color" as it was soon replaced by a black, star-strewn field, with the U.S.S. Enterprise moving diagonally from left to right, with Dr. Leonard McCoy giving a troubling medical log entry about his concerns that Captain Kirk was under a great deal of strain. I settled in to watch "The Enterprise Incident."

You know the story; at least you do if you're a follower of Kirk, Spock, and "Bones" McCoy. Kirk takes the Enterprise into the Romulan Neutral Zone under the cover story of a nervous breakdown. A Vulcan Death Grip, some plastic surgery, and a stolen cloaking device later and the Enterprise set Warp Drive for home. Oh, and Spock gets the girl in the form of the exotic Joanne Linville as the Romulan Commander. I also made my escape, cloaking myself behind various pieces of living room furniture during the commercial breaks and heading back to my room under Full Warp as the Enterprise and the sea of stars through which she traveled faded from the

As I lay in my bed, replaying in my mind's eye the adventure I had just witnessed, I could not know that would be the last television season for the NCC-1701 Enterprise and her crew. The cancellation of *Star Trek* was not a death, of course, but the slumber of a sleeping giant.

Star Trek has been the backdrop for a major portion of my life. Before I bought my first video tape recorder (a Panasonic ¹/₂" reel-to-reel vtr in 1976), I wired the speaker of the family television so that I could use my compact cassette recorder to tape the audio of the show. I've since supplanted those audio tapes first with the complete series on Betamax tapes in 1987 and again in 2004 with the DVD boxed sets. I have no plans to purchase either a Blue-Ray nor a HD-DVD set. You've got to draw the line somewhere. That's not to say I haven't spent my fair share on Trek merchandise. I had to replace the model of the Klingon Battle Cruiser my sister broke when she was swinging at my brother, didn't I? And who among us hasn't purchased two or three or twenty variations of the Playmates or Galoob or Mego series of action figures, or the paperback books, the posters, 35mm film clips, soundtracks, Christmas ornaments, plates, decks of cards, board games, video games, arcade games, pinball machines, or marbles?

I've also done my time in the fan community as a promoter of Star Trek. In the late 70's, I was a member of the U.F.P: United Federation of Phoenix. I've worked on Star Trek conventions as both staff and committee. I'll admit to having attended a Creation Con or two, although I do prefer the less structured, homespun chaos of a fan-run convention. In the early 80's, I met my wife through the U.F.P and we've just celebrated our 20th Wedding Anniversary; nearly twentyone years after seeing Walter Koenig and Mark Leonard portraying the middle aged Tom Sawyer and Huck Finn in the stage production of "The Boys in Autumn." In 1982, I was staffing a San Diego Comic-Con dealers table when the convention was held in the old El Cortez Hotel. I was encouraged by my "friends" to do my Pavel Chekov impression. "Keptin, Keptin, firing photon potatoes," I exclaimed, to the perceived delight of my "friends." Little did I know what I had actually been afforded was the opportunity of embarrassing myself in front of Walter Koenig who was one table away. He looked up from the merchandise he'd been perusing, looked me in the eye, smiled slightly, and walked past the table without comment. Not nearly so embarrassing, was the time in 1987 when Comic-Con has held at the old convention center across from the Civic Theatre in downtown San Diego. Harlan Ellison was on a panel and I asked him if Volume 16 Issue 3

he had any plans to write for Star Trek: The Next Generation. I don't recall if his response was, "Hell NO!" or it may have been "Bloody unlikely!", but I would direct you to his book, *City on the Edge of Forever* for a more detailed explanation.

Koenig wasn't the only member of the original cast with whom I've had a close encounter. I've seen William Shatner perform selections from his album, *The Transformed Man* at Arizona State University's Gammage Theatre in the late

70's. I attended Houston Con in 1975 and discovered during an autograph session that Jimmy Doohan was missing the middle finger of his right hand, but the most inspiring presence to me was that of Gene Roddenberry when he spoke at Mesa Community College in the early '80's. Roddenberry believed in the community of man, humanity showing tolerance for other political, religious, and sociological ideas and ways of living. He was able to convince the audience that he believed in Infinite Diversity in Infinite Combinations.

"The franchise," as Star Trek has been called, has had its vicissitudes. both financially and artistically. The original series was canceled in 1969, but syndication and Star Trek: The Animated Series began the first revival in 1973. By 1979, at an estimated cost of \$35 million, Star Trek: The Motion Picture kicked off the movie run, grossing approximately \$139 million. The most profitable of the ten films (and generally considered the best) is The Wrath of Kahn, which grossed an estimated 8.82 times its budget. The decline (definitely financially, and in my opinion artistically) began with Star Trek V: The Final *Frontier*, which cost an estimated \$27.8 million, but only grossed \$70.2 million. However, the worst financial return on investment (and most likely the nail in the film series coffin) was the \$97.5 million gross after 2002's Star Trek:

Nemesis cost \$70 million to make.

While *Enterprise* has taken the heat for the demise of the franchise, all of the series sequels have had their detractors and growing pains. Many *TOS* fans initially resented *Star Trek: The Next Generation* for not making use of the original cast and for perceived poor quality scripts. Appearances by DeForest Kelly, James Doohan, and especially Leonard Nimoy somewhat mollified the detractors. Scripts of the caliber of "Measure of a Man", "The Inner Light", "Below Decks", "I, Borg", "The Drumhead", and "Chain of Command, Part II" proved that TNG could rise above the standard fair of dramatic television. *Star Trek: Deep Space Nine* premiered under the cloud of suspicion that it was a Paramount clone of *Babylon 5* and *Star Trek: Voyager* hadn't even left space dock before Geneviève Bujold pulled out,

being replaced by Kate Mulgrew in the role of the captain.


One theory for the current death of Star Trek on television maintains that it isn't the quality of the programs as much as the quality of the venue. The theory holds that by appearing on the also-ran



UPN network, Enterprise was doomed from its inception. With WB and UPN networks merging into the CW Network, there does seem to be some credence to that theory. Another theory maintains that the fans had been sold a bill-of-goods concerning the level of technology in Enterprise, which was set 150 years before Star Trek: The Original Series. The transporter was originally supposed to be used exclusively for cargo, the ships top speed of Warp 5 put the Klingon Home World only four days away from Earth, the ships charged hull plates were just a mechanical version of ST:TOS energy shields (no mention was made of the navigation deflector), the grappling hook substituted for the tractor beam. Another concern of fans was the alien races encountered. Denobulans, Suliban, and other races introduced in Enterprise never appeared in TOS or any of the other series. Doubtless, many factors led to the decline of fan and Paramount executives' interest in Enterprise. There are many paths to failure and far fewer lead to success.

With over 700 television episodes in syndication, ten feature films, and thousands of comic books, novels, nonfiction books, and fan projects, Star Trek will continue to have a vast audience until the next revival when the sleeping giant awakes and the next generation of writers and fans boldly go where no one has gone before.

Forty years ago, on September 8th, 1966, Star Trek debuted on television screens across America, forever changing the landscape of television and science fiction. But days earlier, the show's creator, Gene Roddenberry, flew to Cleveland, Ohio and the 24th World Science Fiction Convention to preview his new series for the science fiction fans gathered there.

The Costume Closet




Costume

A doughnut can solve many problems. This is Homer Simpson's basic philosophy, but it also has applications in hatmaking.

Many hats worn through history and fantasy are mainly a circle with a hole for your head. The pattern is easy to make.

First, measure the circumference of your forehead just above the eyebrow. For most adults, this number is in the 21 to 25-inch range. Find the radius of the circle with the same circumference as your forehead by dividing the circumference by 2 Pi. Call this number "R." My forehead circumference is 23 inches so 23 / 2(3.14) = 3.66 inches.

Find a suitable piece of light cardboard for your pattern. A pizza box works well. Use a drawing compass to



scribe a circle of radius R. Scribe a second circle outside the first with the same center and a radius of 6 inches. This size is good for relatively floppy renaissance hats. If you wish to make a somewhat closer-fitting hat, like a contemporary military beret, use a smaller radius of 5 or 5.5 inches. Cut out the inside and outside circles to make a doughnut-shaped pattern.

You can use your doughnut pattern to make many kinds of hats.

Berets Modern berets are made by stretching a hood of heavy felted wool over a mushroom-shaped block. This is rather specialized work. Fortunately, you can fake a beret quite well with your doughnut. Lay out your pattern on a suitable fabric, such as heavy felt or the felted wool used to make overcoats (SAS is a good source in the Phoenix and Tucson areas). Lay out and cut one solid disk for the crown and one donut for the underside. Sew the two pieces together then turn the hat rightside-out. If you want a lining, sew a second hat of lighterweight material and slip it inside your hat shell without turning it rightside out. Pin the hat and lining together along the head opening.

Cut a rectangular strip of material about two inches wide and a bit longer than your forehead circumference. This will be the headband of your beret. Finish the ends of the band by turning under and sewing. Fold the band over along its long axis to form a one-inch strip and sew the raw edge to the head opening of your hat. Since the resulting headband is hollow, you can slide a ribbon into it to create a drawstring for size adjustment.

Berets are good for many costume looks, including military. Berets are part of contemporary US Army uniform and the uniforms of many other fighting forces in the real world and the worlds of science fiction. Make a white one for a starship captain from David Weber's "Honor Harrington" continuity. Make your beret out of lighter, floppier material for medieval and renaissance looks.


Tams are simply slightly floppier berets with a "toorie" (yarn pom-pom) mounted in the center of the crown. Suitable pom-poms can be purchased in hobby stores. So can the kits to make your own. Tams are often made of tartan (scotch plaid) fabric for a Scottish or golfer look. Center your doughnut pattern at some suitable intersection of stripes in the plaid. The earliest tams were knitted and knitted tams are frequently seen at renfairs and highland games. Solid-color tams were worn by some UK military units during World War II (See Alec Guinness's men in "Bridge on the River Kwai.") The characters in G. Harry Stine's "Warbots" series wore a blue tam with a yellow toorie.

The Balmorral is a Scottish style which is a variation on the tam. It's made of heavy woolen fabric like the beret, but includes a toorie at the top, trailing or tied ribbons at the back of the headband, and a patch of ribbon called a "cockade" on its underside. The cockade is positioned between your left eye and your left ear, in the same place as the unit patch on a military beret. A Scotsman's clan badge is worn pinned through the cockade.

Flatcaps are popular at renaissance fairs and variations on the style are seen in many portraits

from the period, including Henry the Eighth, Lorenzo DeMedici, and Leonardo DaVinci. To make a simple flatcap, cut four disks of fabric. One of the disks is solid, to form the crown of the hat. The other three disks are doughnuts. One is sewn to the crown piece along its outside edge. Sew the other two doughnuts together along their outside edges then turn them rightside-out. This will form a brim for the hat. Sew the brim to the crown along the edge of the head opening. Heavy velvets and brocades are suitable for renaissance flatcaps. Flatcaps are often worn with brooches, feathers, and other affectations.

An American in England Part Eleven: Three War Museums. **by Jeffrey Lu**


Smoke-stack-sized cannons from a battleship greeted me in front of the Imperial War Museum in London. I entered

Inside, I saw reminders of WWI and WWII - one-man submarine, tanks, airplanes, rockets, artillery pieces, and other weapons of destruction. They were relics of the past. Three of them I recognized immediately: the V1, the V2, and the Spitfire. The V1 and V2 were rocket versions from Hitler's Germany. The Spitfire was the hero from "The Battle of Britain." The lion of Britain during WWII was Winston Churchill.

Being curious, I later rode the subway and walked to Churchill's Underground War Rooms and Churchill's Museum. I entered a dark, cramped hallway that led into the maze of rooms. I began to appreciate the sounds of sirens and old British radio shows, underground. In the gift shop, I grabbed a coaster with Churchill's face and words, "Never Give Up." I paid and paused. I can still hear the WWII sirens blaring. I exited slowly with a smile and a victory sign- 2 fingers in a V-shape- on my right hand. **Next:** Final Words on England



In Our Book

Harrowing the Dragon by Patricia A McKillip Ace Books; \$23.95; 310 pp

This is a selection of 15 short stories by renowned fantasy author Patricia McKillip. They span the years from 1982 to 1999.

The title story is a nifty beginning to this collection, being an unusual tale of a huge dragon holding an island in thrall with eternal winter and of course, the brave soul who frees the island.



The tales in this collection run from really great to okay—like most story collections. McKillip's strongest asset is her writing style and use of words which really quite carries you along. She describes things beautifully; i.e.: "She had no names for the trees, only pictures in her head that each wood scent conjured: some were dark and bristled, green all year; others stood pale and slender, wore leaves like lace and rustled with secrets at every breeze." This is a simple description of a character's ability to smell trees in the story "Ash, Wood, Fire."

A couple of her tales are derivative: "The Lion and the Lark" is an interesting version of "Beauty and the Beast." And "Star Crossed" is what might have followed the end of "Romeo and Juliet." McKillip tells the story of a soldier engaged by the Prince of Verona to uncover the cause of the unusual murders in the Capulet's vault. And though I am sure it is just coincidence, as I read "The Witches of Junket," all I could think of was "The Witches of Eastwick."

My favorite story was a basic love triangle between a man and two women: Plain Gerda who is married to gorgeous Kay, who then meets with the scintillating Neva, all icy, sharp corners who entices the foolish Kay away. Called "The Snow Queen," it also is derivative (obviously), but I found the characters and the plot interesting and piquant nevertheless.

The one thing that I find frustrating, and it is not just with McKillip's stories, but a great many short stories, is that they are such *little* candies: Sweet at the beginning, a quick taste of the middle, and then, they're gone. And some of the endings in this collection are just sort of a smoke screen of lovely vague verbiage hiding an unexceptional finish.

But if you are a fan of fantasy short stories, I am sure this will be just your book. Otherwise, I'd stick to McKillip's novels. - **Sue Martin**

Path of Blood by Diana Pharaoh Francis Roc, 452 pp, \$7.99

Path of Blood is the concluding volume of the *Path of Fate* trilogy.

Chaos rules in the kingdom of Kodu Riik. Plague ravishes the population. Armies of Aare slaughter everything in their way to put a madman in power. The rift between the kingdom and Cemamahual widens as uncontrolled magic threatening to destroy every living thing.

Only Reisil and her goshawk Saljane have a chance to breach Mysane Kosk and seal the fracture.. With here lover Yohuac, Reisal must cross the war torn land and undergo trials to control the magical symbols, to balance the warring magics created by the power mad sorcerers and reclaim the land.

Francis has created a unique fully realized fantasy world that combines classic fantasy with coming of age. Worth the read, with one of the most stubborn heroines to ever meet her destiny. Save a few hours because it is hard to put down. -**Pam Allan**

The Year's Best Fantasy and Horror, Eighteenth Annual Collection Edited by Ellen Datlow, Kelly Link, and Gavin J. Grant St. Martin's Griffin Pub., cxxviii + 480 pp., \$19.95

Forty-four stories from as many authors and almost as many sources; the only repeats I noticed were two from F&SF magazine and four from SCI FICTION. Plus, almost a hundred pages of genre overviews in 2004: fantasy, horror, media, comics and graphic novels, anime and manga, music, obituaries, honorable mention stories not in this anthology. Fantasy has certainly kept up its literary quality besides its wondrous, fantastic imagination that one might presume comes from the trashy-pulpy gutter instead. Some stories manage to combine such disparate elements successfully. For example, Stepan Chapman's 'Revenge of the Calico Cat' seems to mix the crime noire into pure fantasy. An afterlife for animals is a city full of crude violence, gangsters, and a giant calico cat and gingham dog that chase and alternate killing each other every night. The intro blurb describes it as "A surreal and surprisingly moving tale of balance and destruction." For all that, I

The animals in the story are doomed by their decisions in their earthly lives. Are we? How's that for literary quality mixed into pulp? And in a pure fantasy story, no less. Yes, this anthology shows us quite an interesting genre. It ain't all just fairy tales any more – but then it never really was, was it? - **Mike Griffin**

Slipstreams Edited by Martin F. Greenberg and John Helfers Daw, 307 Pp. \$ 7.99

Slipstreams is an anthology of stories that cross genre lines, melding Science Fiction, fantasy, mystery, westerns, romance and horror,

Here we have a mountain man tackling an aggressive demon using Yellowstone park as a feeding ground, a butchers widow who encounters a dybbuk with a serial killer past, the last survivor of his race searches for a planet where he can replace what was lost, and Nick St. Clause becoming a PI, trying to find the killer of Jack Frost. These are only a fraction of the stories that tickle the imagination and truly can be called Speculative fiction.

This an ideal book for pocket or purse, to read on break, or pass the time in a waiting room. It is a well edited anthology with no room for boredom. - **Pam Allan**

The Clone Republic by Steven L. Kent ACE, \$7.99, 384 pg.

Private Wayson Harris was a clone. But like all of the other clones that make up the Unified Authority's military he has been programmed to think that he is an orphan who was brought up in a military orphanage. Now out in the real world his first assignment is to a backwoods, or I should say a back sand dune, planet assigned to a unit of misfits and has bens. His confusion only deepens when people start trying to kill him. But when a full fleet admiral stats taking a hand in his career he Knows that he is in REALLY DEEP DOO DOO. Stir in the beginnings of a civil war and you have a very interesting adventure story. Of course with all the loose ends that the author leaves it is obvious that he has a sequel planed.

While I liked this book I am really not ready to start another series. I hate waiting a year to three years for the next book. Unless Mr. Kent has already written the whole series and convinced the publisher to release them at, say 2 month intervals this is not a series that I am going to be looking forward to. Sorry Mr. Kent, you are a good writer but I have to just say NO to another series. - William B. Whitmore

Bridge of Dreams by Chaz Brenchley Ace, 409 pp, \$24.95

Bridge of Dreams is the first volume of a new series by the author of the *Outremer* series.

For a thousand years, the city of Sund stood independently, withstanding the Marisi, but the Marisi used black sorcery to build a bridge over the walls that poisons all in its shadows. Now called Marisi-Sund, Magic is outlawed in the former nation of water mages. The populace is ground into poverty and fear. A few would rebel as one of the few remaining water mages teaches an underground school. Issal, a poor water seller and thief is found and recruited to the school

In Maris, Jendre is the daughter of a general, married to the Sultan, but he is injured soon after their wedding night. She manages to save him. But he is poisoned and Jendre is a threat to the new ruler.

In this first volume, the two stories run parallel and set us up for changes to come. If Brenchley's characters were not so compelling, his world so complete, one could cavil at the open endings, Instead the reader is anxiously awaiting the next volume to see what's coming . If you liked the *Outremer* series, you have to read this. - **Pam Allan**

Eclipse by K.A. Bedford EDGE Sci-fi and Fantasy publishing \$14.95, 309 pg.

James Dunne is a new graduate of the Royal Interstellar service Academy off to

his first ship, HMS Eclipse. Having always dreamer of being a spacer he is eager to be off. Unfortunately all is not well in the world. Mr. Bedford has created a world of real people and disposable

people with out really explaining which is which, and it appears that a person can switch from one to the other with frightening speed and fatal results. His military is the worst horrors of the British boarding school system run amuck. Midnight beatings and rapes are normal forms of punishment for pissing off a superior. And all of his characters find this normal and accept it with resignation as "just the way the universe is."

This is Australian Sci-fi at it's worst. This book bills itself as "a taut Psychological thriller set in the claustrophobic confines of a starship." I found the story dull and uninteresting. After 105 pages I simply could not muster enough interest to finish the book. I do not recommend this book... - **William B.** Whitmore

Elzith, the sage, sees clearly: a city burning, a search for faith, and a way that can save the world from the plague, but it will take all of them, and their companions to bring about the change.



City of Saints and Madmen is a collection of short stories set in the fictional city of Ambergris by the author of *Veniss Uderground*.



The epic ties up more threads than a needlepoint sampler with lots of action,

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

It is the fifth year of the war of Man vs the Watermots. The men attacking the





some tricks up his sleeve.

Bunch has created a complex world full of real people, and lots of action. A hard book to put down. Although the novel stands alone and the ending appears complete, I personally hope he finished the third volume before his passing in 2005. I'd like to read it. This one deserves a place in your library as well as being a whopping good read. - **Pam Allan**


But not everyone loves The god of love. Unity is one who wants to assimilate Jalaeka and every other living soul in any universe. Can Love save the universe as the gods collide.....?




