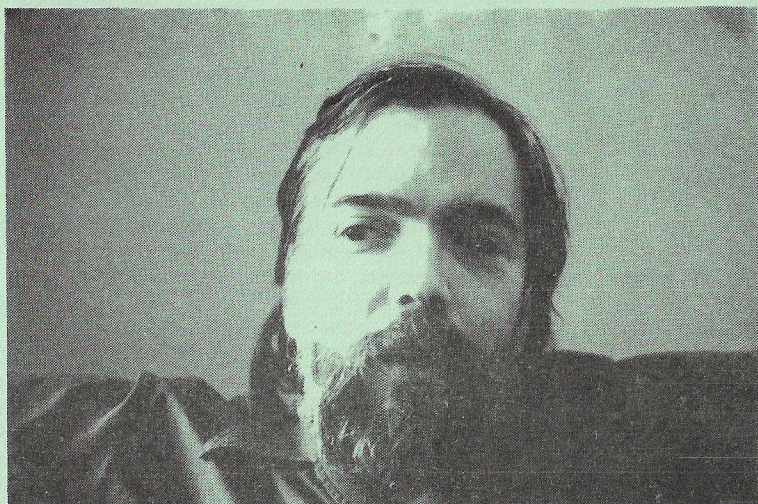

SO HOW TO GET THERE?

Those of you who attended Seacon should have no trouble finding either Brighton or the Metropole, but for the rest of you here are some directions that I hope will help. The hotel is situated on the seafront, virtually opposite West Pier (the one that's falling down; be careful, Brighton has two piers!)

Brighton is easily accessible by all forms of transport.

Train Fast train services leave from London Victoria throughout the day, but additional services run from London Bridge. Brighton station is situated in the middle of the town, a 15-minute walk from the hotel; merely come out of the main entrance and follow Queens Road straight down to the seafront. The Metropole is on your right, past the Brighton Conference Centre and the Grand Hotel. If you want to arrive in style, there is a taxi rank in front of the station.

Car If you reach Brighton via the A23 from London, follow the signs for Town Centre/Seafront and you will arrive at a roundabout on the seafront above Palace Pier. Turn right (otherwise you'll get wet) and half a mile later you're at the Metropole. If you approach Brighton from a different direction, find the seafront road and head for West Pier, which is on the Brighton/Hove border.

Parking: The Metropole does not have its own car park, but there are NCP car parks in abundance. The nearest is just behind the hotel, but reached by turning up West Street a quarter of a mile east of the hotel itself (that is, before you get to the hotel if you're coming along the seafront from the A23). After turning up West Street, turn left, following the signs for the "Metropole" car park. There are also other car parks off this road. The next nearest car park to the hotel is an underground one beneath Regency Square: turn second right after passing the hotel going westwards, and you will find the entrance at the top end of the square. Street parking is possible, though it could prove difficult to find a non-meter space if you don't know Brighton.

YOU'VE MADE IT!

Hopefully, the above directions will get you to the hotel and you will then be ready to commence the festivities.

Registration: Once you have registered with the hotel (if you are staying in it), we would like you to register as soon as possible with the convention. The Registration Desk will be open Friday 10.00 am — 6.00 pm, and on Saturday and Sunday from 10.00 am for as long as necessary. When you register you will receive your Programme Book, name badge and other items such as the Programme Sheet: you will also, if you are a supporting member, need to pay the difference to make you an attending member.

When you have received your convention name badge, please wear it at all times

during the convention. This identifies you — to the convention committee and staff, and also to the hotel staff — as Not A Gatecrasher.

Membership rates: If you are a supporting member and wish to convert to attending at the convention, the rate is £5.00. New members joining at the door pay £8.00.

We regret that one-day memberships are not available.

Decorations, posters: If you have been to recent Eastercons, Channelcon will seem different as soon as you arrive. The Metropole is not the modern, faceless, rabbit-hutch style of hotel we have become used to recently, but a beautiful old building full of style and character. In addition, many of the public rooms have been redecorated recently and so we would make a plea that you treat the hotel with respect. Posters can be put up, but please, only on the notice boards provided or on the wooden panelling (and then only with Blu-Tak, which is available from the Information Desk in the Churchill Room). Unfortunately the hotel suffered quite severe damage during Seacon '79 from posters on walls, and Channelcon will be held liable for any damage so caused. If anyone is found sticking posters on any other walls, they will be charged for any damage, or alternatively the group or organisation being advertised. Following their experiences with Seacon, the hotel staff are very conscious of this problem, and we would appreciate your help in maintaining good relations with them, since the attitude of hotel staff can make or break the atmosphere of a convention.

Hotel rooms: A reminder about two things that should be self-evident, but may need to be restated for some people. Firstly, about unbooked people staying overnight in hotel rooms. This cannot be condoned by the Channelcon committee, and if the hotel staff find this is happening then offenders will have to grin and bear whatever action the hotel take: we can't bail you out! Secondly, convention members are, of course, responsible for settling their own room bills.

THE NECESSITIES (Food and Drink)

First things first — the bars. In addition to the Cocktail Lounge there are three other bars, so wherever you are on the ground floor you will still be within staggering distance of at least one. In addition, there is the Cannon pub, which is next to the hotel and under the same management, although there is no access from within the hotel itself.

At the time of going to press, application for extension of licence has not been completed, but whatever the outcome, the two main convention bars will be open from 10 am — 4 pm and 6 pm — 2 am whilst the convention is in progress. Should there be insufficient demand after midnight, however, one may close. If the hotel are not granted an extension for the whole period, it may be necessary to produce your room key at the bar, but there will still be one bar at least open until 2 am. The third bar is in the Fan Room, and this will close during programme items.

We have negotiated a reduction in prices for the special convention bars, so that draught beer will be 40p a half pint, whisky, vodka and gin 56p per measure and minerals 25p. Prices in the Cannon pub are slightly lower, but as already mentioned, the only access is via the street.

Food: Should you decline the delights of Brighton's numerous restaurants, the Buttery in the Metropole will be open as usual, and if you're on an expense account, so will the Starlit Room. In addition, hot and cold snacks will be available in the Cameo Room between 12 noon and 3 pm each day. The selection will be varied; for example: soup, bread and butter 60p; pate and French bread 70p; hot poultry pie 95p; ploughman's platter 85p; hot dish of the day £1.50. A similar selection is available in the Cannon pub.

A selection of hot meals will be available between 10 pm and midnight in the Primrose Room.

Buffet-style English breakfast is in the Cameo Room from 8 am — 10.30 am.

BUSINESS MEETING

On this subject, the Channelcon committee would like to state that they feel any surpluses should be used to benefit fandom, and that should any surplus be made by the convention, it will be used as follows:

1. To produce a fifth Progress Report containing attendance figures, accounts, Minutes of the Business Meeting, and a statement on how we propose to distribute any surplus still remaining. We have agreement from the Metrocon committee that, should they win the bid for the 1983 Eastercon, they will distribute this PR5 with their first Progress Report which will be sent automatically to all members of Channelcon. As yet no response has been received from the Albacon II committee on this point.
2. The next £100 of any remaining surplus will be donated to existing fan funds.
3. Any remaining funds will be used in some way to benefit fandom. The committee will base their decision on discussions in the Business Meeting, and will announce it in PR5.

Book Room, Book Auction

The Norfolk Room, on the lower ground floor of the Metropole, is being used for the Book Room, and it will be open for dealers to set up their displays from mid-day on Thursday, 8th April. There is direct access to the Norfolk Room from a loading bay off Cannon Place; however, this door will be closed from Friday to Sunday and may not be used during this time.

The Book Room will be open to convention attendees from Friday to Sunday, from 10.00 am to approximately 6.00 pm, and on Monday from 10.00 am until approximately 1 pm. All dealers must have vacated the Norfolk Room by 5.00 pm on Easter Monday. Payment for tables (£10 per table) will be collected on Sunday.

The Book Auction will be held on Sunday from 10.00 am to 11.00 am. A commission of 10% will be charged by the Convention on all sales, except where proceeds are for TAFF or GUFF.

The Art Show will be open from 10.00 am to 6.00 pm on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. For exhibitors who wish their work to be auctioned, the Art Auction will be held on Monday morning from 11.00 am to 12 noon. Exhibitors will also have the option of selling their work on a direct "quick sale" basis during the course of the Convention, at a slightly lower price than the "reserve" price for the auction. The BSFA Award

Formerly known as the British Science Fiction Award, the British SF Association Award was conceived (according to the Encyclopaedia Nicholliana) as a counter-weight to the American-dominated Hugo and Nebula Awards, to honour British authors and British novels that might otherwise have been overlooked. But the practice never seemed to match up to theory: although the Award has gone to some fine works — Bob Shaw's Orbitsville, John Bruener's The Jagged Orbit and Ian Watson's The Jonah Kit, to name but a few — the eligibility rules were changed so frequently that no-one could ever remember what they were (and in consequence soon lost interest in the whole thing), and the winners were sometimes chosen in secret by an unknown panel of judges anyway.

Until 1979, when — under the aegis of those who had taken over the BSFA's governing Council at that year's AGM — the Award was subjected to a thorough shake-up, with organisation and consistency being at last introduced into its procedures.

It has, since then, been given in four categories, for the best novel, short fiction, media presentation and cover artist for the preceding year (as per the Hugos), the sole criterion being that the said items must have received their first British publication or presentation during that year. (It is thus no longer limited to British authors alone, although, unsurprisingly, they do tend to feature more prominently.) It has also, since then, been divided into two stages (again as per the Hugos): a nominating round, in which BSFA members only are eligible to participate, and from whose nominations are drawn the top five in each category to go forward onto the final ballot; and a voting round, in which both members of the BSFA and attending members of that year's Eastercon are eligible to participate.

Meaning, of course, you who are reading this.

The point about involving members of the Eastercon as well as those of the BSFA is simple: it is the only popular award of its kind in Britain, and if it is to be at all representative must therefore have the widest possible voting base. (Although this has to be balanced against the need to identify and maintain its BSFA origins: hence the restrictions at the nominating stage on who may vote.) A cynic might claim that this would only result in lowest-common-denominator mediocrity emerging triumphant over quality, but if past performance is anything to go by this just isn't the case — the 1980 novel winner (the first under the new system), for example, was J. G. Ballard's The Unlimited Dream Company, with Gregory Benford's Timescape sliding to victory last year in the face of stiff competition from such equally worthy contenders as Michael Bishop's Transfigurations, John Crowley's Engine Summer and Keith Roberts's Molly Zero; and when you look at the nominations on this year's final ballot....

Well, you will — when you collect your Programme Book from the registration desk on arrival at Channelcon, you should also receive a ballot form for the 1982 BSFA Award. So use your vote — it's just as important as anyone else's.
