There is part two of the dreaded Eights Quiz, and more information on things that will be happening during Follycon. Again, please read over these, as some items will only be happening if the Universal Form indicates enough support for them.

Finally, there are important financial details of all sorts, and a list of members. If you know anyone on this list who hasn't received a copy of this PR by December 1st, or someone who thinks they're a member but who doesn't appear on the list, please let us know. The Easter of 1990

One definite programme item for Follycon is the bidding session to determine the 1990 Eastercon: we already know of one group, Contravention, bidding for this honour (if that's the right word). Although there is no requirement for you to do so, if you are organising another bid, we would be grateful to have as much notice of it as possible. This will make the organisation of the bidding session much easier.



Programming Update

Our programme is starting to rise from the formless mass of chaos, and we think it's going to have a good balance of Science Fiction, Science Fact, spectacular scenery and silly stuff. Notwithstanding this confidence, we are still open to other people's suggestions, so if you have any ideas that you'd especially like to see us do, write (to the usual address) and tell us about them, or they may not happen. Remember that we'll be awarding a membership for the best idea we get.

There are a number of specific items which need a lot of advance publicity, and we would like people to express interest in them on the General Purpose Form enclosed (and if you don't know what that is, go back and read the introduction immediately!). In every case here, ticking the box does not commit you—we just need a rough idea of those interested.

Planetarium

Liverpool Museum has a Planetarium and is conveniently close to (a short walk from) the Adelphi Hotel. If enough people express interest, we will organise a visit during the convention, arranged to avoid clashes with other similar events taking place within the Adelphi.

Writer's Workshop

We are hoping to organise a Writer's Workshop at Follycon, although we cannot make any promises yet. If it goes ahead, it will be held on the Friday and Monday (to avoid clashing with the main flow of the convention). Participants will be required to send in a manuscript for examination and discussion by the other participants and the presiding author. Membership of the Workshop will be strictly limited, and although returning the Form with the relevant box ticked is not a commitment, first refusal will be given to the first replies received. There is also space to indicate if you have not taken part in a Writer's Workshop previously, as we hope to reserve some spaces for people who haven't had the chance to experience such an event previously.

Fancy Dress

The traditional Fancy Dress Parade will be held on Saturday night, and after the impressive display at Conspiracy we hope it will be of a high standard. The weapons policy will be relaxed to some degree for contestants only. Please check **before the convention** with Ann Page or Gytha North if your costume or display involves weapons.

There will also be workshops on costume making and presentation (for which skilled helpers would be appreciated), and you may be interested to know that a British branch of the International Costumiers Guild is being formed at present; we understand that they will be arranging a meeting at Follycon.

Tea Party

In the finest traditions of genteel English Living, Follycon will be organising a Tea Party. In the finest anachronistic traditions of Science Fiction Conventions, it will be held on Sunday evening. The Tea Party will be open to all members of the convention, and entertainment will be provided, hosted by the well-known fan and author Bob Shaw, a sort of 'Sconemaster'. The usual Eastercon awards will also be presented during the Tea Party.

Unfortunately food can only be served to a limited number of people, so please tick the relevant box if you expect you will want refreshments; these will cost £3, for which you will get classic English tea (the meal), with cakes and possibly even cucumber sandwiches. As usual, ticking this box is not a commitment, but priority will be given to the first responses received. Please don't send us money now.

Note to Apa Administrators: We are also planning an event based on APAs in Britain today. (*Editor's Note: these are amateur produced magazines with a limited number of members, who provide contributions which are combined into a regular mailing to all those involved.*) We will get in contact with the administrators of those APAs we can, but would be interested in hearing from any others that we may have missed.

Gordon Dickson

Our American Guest of Honour has been writing professionally since 1950. He is probably best known for his "Childe Cycle" (of which the Dorsai Trilogy forms a part), an ambitious project planned to be a 12 volume epic with 3 historical, 3 contemporary and 6 future historical novels. Its overall driving theme is that of Man's forced progress and evolution. With its often militaristic elements, his writing is often accused of being right-wing, but this is unfair: any ideologies to be found in his work are more complicated than a simple right/left polarity. His writing covers wide areas of the Science Fiction field and includes one of the best fantasy send-ups I have yet read, "The Dragon and the George". He has collaborated with Keith Laumer, Harry Harrison and Poul Anderson. The collaborations with Poul Anderson have been principally the "Hoka" stories concerning cute Teddy bears (and predating Star Wars), who copy the costumes and life-styles of any culture, real or fictional, which catch their fancy. In his serious writing, he has often used aliens to good effect to counterpoint human society, as in 'Alien Art' or 'The Alien Way'.

"Gordy" was a leading figure in the prestigious Science Fiction Writers of America, and has twice served as its president. He was involved in the early days of the Society for Creative Anachronism and is well known in filking circles. He has not previously been a Guest of Honour at an Eastercon, although he has been a guest at many American conventions, and I'm sure he'll be worth the wait.

Greg Pickersgill—Fan Guest of Honour

It's likely that some of our members will not be familiar with Greg Pickersgill. By the end of Follycon, they should have a fairly good idea, but here as a foretaste is a personal view of him from our fan room organiser, Jimmy Robertson :

After 20+ years in British Fandom Greg Pickersgill is to be honoured by being Fan Guest at the 1988 Eastercon. Why? Lots of reasons. First off there's his Historical Influence. In the 1970's Gregory wrote and edited some of the finest british fanzines there have ever been. His inability to call a spade anything but created the mythology of the death-dealing fanzine reviewer who reduced fanzine producers to quivering blobs. Labelling Greg and the coalition that was Ratfandom as foul-mouthed crazies was a means of ignoring the genuine effects they were having on how people were assessing fanzines. For some, then as now, fanzines and fandom were 'just a goddamn hobby'; and Gregory has always been a 'fandom is a way of life' man. What Gregory demanded was commitment. No half measures. Your fanzine should be trying to touch its audience. It should be your best effort; anything less was a personal insult. After all, fandom is the people in it, and if you don't treat them with respect you don't deserve theirs. He didn't attack people because they weren't a Willis or a Shaw, but he did have a go at those who expected him to put up with time-serving mediocrity. He was a scourge of 'nice fandom', those who thought that being chums meant that critical faculties got suppressed. For me, his style introduced an immediacy that overcame the limitations of fannish circulation; he made it sound as if it were happening now, as you read it. He single-handedly articulated a morality of fanzines. Many would cringe at the thought, but essentially Greg was a preacher and he preached 'be true to yourself'. He valued clear and honest communication in fanzines and hated fudging. This forthrightness was not universally welcome, and Greg was built up as a demonic figure. This is a role he fits into easily; euphemisms describing Greg include volatile, outspoken and hairy. This, of course, is another reason to honour him—his charisma. He is passionate, enthusiastic, and emotes a lot. At conventions he can always be heard on the stage or in the hall making considered contributions, or badmouthing some personal hate-subject. Either way it's usually stimulating, and people are often caused by him to reach into themselves for difficult answers. This brings us to another reason for honouring him: he's taken to organising conventions and brings a desire for, and commitment to, quality that is often lacking.

For a while he got fed up with conventions and had a spell of TV bank holidays and contemplating the nature of God or Dave Bridges (whichever is the greater), but by the mid-eighties he was popular enough to win a competitive TAFF race. I look forward eagerly to his trip report. The main reason for honouring him, however, is that any contribution he would admit to making to fandom he would consider as its due. You put back when you take out. He is a modest man, and shy; fandom would be the poorer without him.

Our Other Guests

Peter Morwood

Peter is currently the author of three fantasy novels (The Horse Lord, Dragon Lord and Demon Lord) and co-author of a Star Trek novel (The Romulan Way). He can be relied upon to enjoy himself at the convention and to provide entertainment almost incidentally.

Diane Duane

Diane is known for two separate fields of activity. To media fandom, she is the author of two-and-a-half Star Trek novels and two very funny episodes for the Star Trek Comic, and she has been a guest at a couple of major British media cons. To others (though not enough!) she is known for her other four novels. Her two adult fantasies: 'Door into Fire' and 'Door into Shadow' deal with a convincing society (with an intriguing religion) in which bisexuality is the norm. My two favourite, however, are the children's books 'So You Want to be a Wizard' and 'Deep Wizardry'. Diane has the same talent as Diana Wynne Jones for getting caught up in her own enthusiasm for her plot and running away with it. The adult books are available in Britain but you'll have to get the children's books as imports. If you do you'll be very well rewarded—Diane is already one of my favourite fantasy writers.

Fox is originator, artist and co-scriptor of "Redfox", a British independent comic, which has recently won an Eagle award for best new comic. He has attended Eastercons previously as a fan and expects to have even more fun as a guest.

The Follycon Art Show

This is the bit for all you artists out there—the art show—which gives you the chance to share with fans and fellow artists alike your own visions of the universe, future, past and present. We at Follycon wish to take this opportunity to invite you to display your work in what already looks to be a promising show, with several special interest bits still undergoing humming and hawing at this stage. Be your speciality painting, models, sculpture or any other form of legal lunacy, we would like to hear from you soon. If you are interested, then please write enclosing an SAE for an entry form or to get more information from Kev Dixon c/o the usual Follycon address.

Even if you do not want to display your work in the regular art show, you still might want to enter our special charity competition on the theme of 'Future Lifecraft', in which you can let your ideas run wild exploring the possible evolution of rescue vehicles of land, sea, sky, space or whatever. All entries will be displayed in a special area of the art show and negotiations are underway for the publication, with accompanying text, of all entries in a special release book, the profits from which will go to the Royal National Lifeboat Institution. The maximum size of all entries is A3. For further information, contact Kev Dixon as above.

Filling in the Forms

Please fill in all of both of these forms, even information you think we already know, as it reduces the risk of facts going astray; this applies particularly to offers of help and to personal details. The first of these (the Hotel Booking Form) will be used to determine room allocations for the Adelphi Hotel during the convention, and the second (the General Purpose Form) is used for everything else.

The forms contain space for all the information we should need to know from you, but please feel free to write to us about anything else you think we should be told, at our usual address. This applies particularly to dealers, who should write to us with details of their requirements after checking the financial details on p.9.

... or hand them to a committee member. This is also the address if there is anything on the Forms that you have any questions about. You can also write to us if there is anything you don't know when you send in the forms, or if you change your mind about anything. We have extra copies of both Forms if necessary.

The first section of both forms is for personal information: filling in the whole of the rest of them won't help if we don't know who sent them in. There is also space on the General Purpose Form to indicate if you are converting from Pre-supporting or Supporting membership to Attending at the same time (details on p.9). Please remember that we can only accept hotel bookings from Attending members of the convention.

The Hotel Booking Form

We expect the Adelphi to hold all members of Follycon, but the numbers of some kinds of rooms are limited, so it is to your benefit (as well as ours) to book as soon as possible. Please return the Hotel Booking Form even if you do not want a room, as negative information is still useful.

Most of the form should be self-explanatory; please just tick the relevant boxes. One exception is in choosing the type of room you want: for this, please mark your first choice, second choice and so forth. This includes a possibility for "Not Staying In Hotel" if none of the remaining choices are suitable. The Adelphi need to know in advance if you will be arriving after 8pm; if you expect to, please fill in your estimated time of arrival, and we also suggest you phone the Adelphi and let them know a few weeks before Follycon. If in doubt, put a late time down. Remember that the programme will be running from Friday lunchtime until Monday afternoon, and please do notice that money for hotel rooms will have to be paid **on arrival**.

If you are planning to share with someone, please could you both fill in forms accordingly and send them back to us. Finally, please bear in mind that people asking for quiet rooms will be expected to be quiet themselves.

This Form also includes space for you to indicate any special requirements or disabilities you may have. This could include being wheelchair bound, needing special pillows or an unusual diet. If you will need any special assistance during the convention, please let us know and we will do our best to help.

The General Purpose Form

This Form begins with information on the creche: if you (or of course your children) will want to be making use of this, please let us know the details, such as their ages, so we will know what to provide. There is likely to be a charge for this. Offers of help with the creche would also be appreciated, of course.

The next section is where you can offer to help during the running of Follycon, and give details of how you'd like to do it. For those of you who are unfamiliar with conventions, this is a very good way to get to meet people, and we certainly appreciate the assistance. Filling in this section of the form will not commit you, it's just so that we know who to get back in touch with.

There is room on the Form for you to indicate when you will be available, and to specify what you'd prefer to help with and what skills you have. Possible areas to help include films, art show, fan room, the convention newsletter, games, programming, creche or just general running round being useful. Examples of skills we're interested in include medical knowledge, familiarity with duplicators, knowledge of Liverpool, being good with children, having a driving license or general technical ability. This last is particularly important: we need a variety of people, from those very familiar with operating projectors through to slightly-skilled box-watchers, and we are willing to give some on-the-spot training to people if they want it. Of course, even if you can't think of any relevant skills you have, we're still interested in hearing from you: a convention such as this is run at all levels on volunteer help. Please note that Thursday and Tuesday will be exclusively concerned with setting up and pulling down the convention: on other days we'll want people to carry objects round, buy drinks, mind rooms, fetch people and do other things besides.

The next section is concerned with programme items and the art show, and is explained on pages 3 and 5 of this Progress Report.

This leaves only the note on coach travel. If enough people respond, Follycon will organise coach trips to the convention from London and Glasgow. These will leave in the morning on Friday 1st April and leave Follycon on the afternoon of Monday 4th April. The cost will be less than £25 per head, depending on the response we get. Ticking either of these boxes (both would be silly) does not commit you in any way; it is simply a way of us finding out if there is enough interest for it to be worth organising these trips. There will be more information on this in Progress Report 3.

Awards


This is a brief guide to the various awards that are presented at the Eastercon. If you want more information on any of these awards, or have information on any other award you would like to see presented at Follycon, please contact us.

The **Arthur C. Clarke** award is given annually to the best science fiction novel published in the preceding year, as selected by a panel of experts.

The **BSFA** awards are nominated by members of the British Science Fiction Association, and voted on by the members of the BSFA and the Eastercon. The categories are Best Novel, Best Short Story, Best Art and Best Media Presentation. In order to be eligible, works must have received their first British publication in the preceding year.

The **Doc Weir** Award is given to a fan, not for any one noteworthy achievement, but more for overall worthiness. It showed signs of dying out a few years ago, but is now rather more healthy. Voting is by secret ballot of the members of the convention.

The **Ken MacIntyre** Award was sadly not given last year. It is for the most worthy piece of fan art appearing in a fanzine published in the year under consideration and is voted on by a panel of judges. There will be a special display of entries in the Art show, and in order to qualify a piece of art should be displayed along with the fanzine it appears in. As there is often a lack of entries for this award, this year the term 'fanzine' shall be deemed to include such impure beasts as apas and convention publications.




