No, the Treasurer has not absconded with the funds, here, at last, is the first OMPACON Frogress Report.

Following our successful bid to organise the 1973 British Science Fiction Conference, a diverse Committee has been formed, comprising:-

- Ken Cheslin (Stourbridge) Chairman and, in his own description, General Dogsbody.
- Fred Hemmings (Slough) Secretary/Treasurer, Conference Booklet Compiler, Hotel Liaison Officer, Printing Organiser and taker-over of things, like this report.
- Gerald Bishop (Leeds and Exeter, depending on the season)
   Publisher Liaison Officer, Film Organiser and
  Projectionist Extraordinary.
- Mike and Pat Meara (Derby) Art Exhibitionists, Huckster Liaison Officers and Auction Organisers.
- Brian Robinson (Manchester) Press Officer and writer of a Progress Report lost somewhere in the post.
- Terry Jeeves (Sheffield) Artist and crumbling mansion owner.
- Dave Rowe (Wickford) Another Artist and vegetarian Viking.

The decision, that OMPA should bid for the 1973 Conference was not finally taken until a meeting at the Blossoms, last Easter, although the original suggestion had been made some months previously. We had a hotel, we thought, and since the majority of us were new to Fandom, let alone trying to organise a Con, the problems appeared to lie somewhere between minor and non-existant. How little we knew; and how quickly we learnt. Fortunately, our Chairman had done it all before and Gerald Bishop had contacts in the film and publishing worlds, while, on the art side there were Terry Jeeves and Dave Rowe. For the rest of us it was a matter of common sense, hard work and a lot of talking to people who knew more about it than we did ourselves. In that last category I should like to make special mention of Peter Weston who has supplied much 'technical advice'.

There exists a great Fannish tradition of leaving virtually everything until the last possible moment, to date, the

OMPACON '73 Committee have been no exception to this. However, some traditions are made to be broken and we feel eleventh hour action is on of these. This first Progress Report is emerging somewhat late but the next should appear in no more than eight weeks, providing full details of hotel and town, while the third should include the booking form and come out before the end of October. That is is we don't have a rush of enthusiasm and include it with number 2. Our reasons for considering sending the hotel booking form out so early are two-fold; first because we feel that those registering early should have first crack at the accomodation and second because we're going to try and arrange with the hotel that room parties happen some distance away from, for example, sleeping children and that sort of thing takes time.

## VENUE

After considerable investigation the possible hotels have been narrowed to three, one of which has been classified 'Prefered' and another 'Emergency Only'. No final decision has yet been made but since both the first and second choice hotels are in Bristol and negociations are progressing favourably the conference seems almost certain to be held there; only a major snag arising in the near future can prevent it.

Situated almost at the mouth of the river Avon, Bristol has very good communications, both home and abroad, road rail and air links being available. Motorways have made access from East, West and North extremely simple, while the much shorter routes to the South have a network which isn't at all bad. The main railway station, Temple Meads, has a frequent service with trains connecting to most parts of the British Isles; nearer the date we hope to provide a list of suitable trains from the more major towns. Finally there are air services, both from Bristol and Cardiff airports (the latter only about 40 minutes distant), to most of the countries in Europe; here again we hope to print details nearer next Easter.

# PROGRAMME

We may be a little behind in obtaining a hotel, owing, as

they say, to circumstances beyond our control but we intend catching up quickly once this is settled. Lack of certainty about Conference accommodation makes it difficult to work out an exact programme and as a result of this approaches to possible speakers have not yet been made. However, despite this problem, a provisional programme has been written; this contains some traditional items and some which, so far as the Committee are aware, have not been covered before, at least not the way we intend doing it. We are not forgetting that you will have ideas too, the Committee is neither proud nor omniscient, if there is something you would like to see, either new, or a repeat, let us know, after all, it's your Con. I say let us know but do it quickly while there is still time to make changes, organisation takes time.

One of the things we shall be trying for is greater audience participation. We have heard many complaints of being lectured at, we hope to cut this down by having more panels than individual speakers but that is not enough, participation is the foundation of enjoyment and it is the latter which constitutes our target.

As regards films, we think it about time those which are genuine Science Fiction had a bigger share, so we'll be scouring the world, or at least England, for the most suitable. The target here is SF and fun with less of monsters and fantasy (but don't be suprised if you see some, especially in the fun section), while the ghoulie and ghostie group will definately feel the pinch.

# GUESTS OF HONOUR

The position of Guest of Honour is not something given out lightly, yet one must make a choice. To start with you think, 'who would I like to see', but then practicalities intrude. Several people deserve the honour and although no approach has been made at time of writing we have people, both Pro and Fan in mind for the positions; as soon as something is settled we'll let you know. Watch this space!


