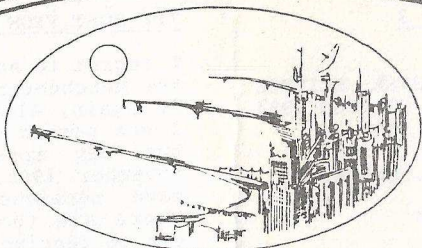

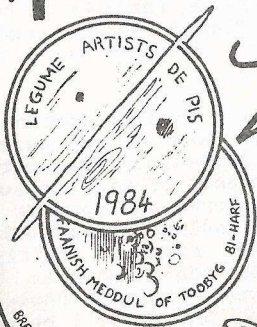

THE 35th BRITISH EASTER SCIENCE FICTION CONVENTION and EUROCON 1984 - COMBINED INTO SEACON '84!

AT THE METROPOLE HOTEL, BRIGHTON

APRIL 20th to 23rd 1984

Welcome to our third Progress Report, a little slimmer than the first two, but as time progresses, publishing schedules approach more rapidly and thus there is less to say. However, we've crammed in as much information as we can into these twelve pages and I'm certain that it'll prove useful to you.

A lot of things are happening right now, and the Seacon committee is perhaps busier now than at any other time throughout the three years since we held our inaugural committee meeting. A lot of water has flowed under the bridge since then, but we feel extremely confident in the way everything is gelling together and we know we'll be giving you something special this Easter.

THE POST FROM MANCHESTER

I regret to say that it looks as if the Manchester Post Office has done it again. Although Progress Report 2 was posted out to everybody in a two day spree in mid to late November 1983, a number of people have received it very late and there are those we know who have yet to receive it at all.

We are doing everything we can to rectify the position - indeed this PR will be going out from Birmingham, but I think that it's important that you know of the difficulties we have experienced. I have formally complained to Manchester Central Post Office, but have had very negative responses. As a result, a number of you may not have received our Hotel Booking Form in time to return it to us before the January 1st 1984 cut-off deadline. There is a separate item about this elsewhere in this PR, but suffice it to say, to avoid any difficulties, we are sending out with this PR a further form to everybody. Please don't send it back to us if you've already confirmed!

This matter of Postal problems is of particular note to our European Members and those from the Americas - there is plenty of time to submit your Booking Forms and you can rest assured that Pauline Morgan will be allocating the rooms as fairly as possible. We can't promise that you'll get your personal choice of room or hotel, but we will be doing all that we can to see that nobody is mis-treated.

HOTEL INFORMATION

A number of people have responded with their booking forms, but there is still a reasonable amount of

space left in both hotels. One thing to remember though is that whilst the Metropole is the main convention hotel, the Bedford is the only hotel to provide tea and coffee making facilities in the rooms. If this is a vital consideration to your personal preference, do let us know.

The room rates are:

Metropole: £16.10 per person per night for a double or twin. There are no singles left at all in the Metropole, so if you have yet to return your booking form, please bear this in mind.

Bedford: £14.95 for a double or twin room per person per night and £16.10 for a single.

All these prices are inclusive of V.A.T at 15% and a full English Breakfast. There will be no service charge.

There are also numerous cheaper Bed & Breakfast houses and small hotels within walking distance with rates starting from as little as 5 per night. In addition, there are a number of self-contained holiday flatlets on a self-catering basis. For full details of these it is advisable to book via the Brighton Tourist Board, and when returning your booking form, simply indicate this preference and we will send you a detailed brochure.

CONFESSIONS OF A REGISTRATIONS SECRETARY - PAULINE MORGAN

I have always liked names. I used to collect them; long lists - boys names, girls names, Indian tribes, names of boats. When I found fandom, lying around in Oxford in 1969 and looked in the Programme Book, I realised that here was a potential source of names. I tested the water as Chairman of a Novacon (2) and an Eastercon (1977), but when John Brunner suggested combining a Eurocon with an Eastercon and expected the membership to rise above a thousand I saw my chance. As registrations secretary, I thought people would send me their names. And they do! And money as well...

At first they arrived slowly, three or four a week. But now, five months before the convention (Pauline, of course, wrote this in 1983! - helpful Editor), the postman daily drops nine or ten envelopes onto the mat. The names are coming! Looking down the growing columns I find a fascination in them; very ordinary names and exotic ones, famous authors, infamous fans, the weird, the invented and the unpronounceable.

Now the booking forms are beginning to wing their way back to me like homing pigeons, it is essential to clear the mail regularly. On Wednesday nights Chris goes off teching and I am left alone with the week's pile. My pen is poised to write out the first membership card when the telephone rings.

"I haven't had a booking form yet"

"Spare beds for children?"

"Can I register 11 silly names?"

"Do you speak German?"

"Is Thursday night the one between Wednesday and Thursday or Thursday and Friday?"

"Can you give me exact details of the Programme?"

It is only the callers who ring at 8.30 on a Saturday morning that receive sharp treatment.

When the last letter has been replied to, the last PR sent out (if I have any left!), the cheques counted and entered in the paying-in book, I survey the clutter. The letters get filed, the membership data-bank (a column of cards two feet high) is added to.

Stamps, torn from their envelopes for donation to some unknown but worthy cause, sprawl raggedly across the desk and are gathered up and stuffed into a packet. Used envelopes litter the floor. I look around the room. Eighty beady eyes watch me. Each Gerbil gets one envelope and the air is filled with the sound of scratching, scrabbling and gnawing as the paper is reduced to minute pieces. The next day brings another mail delivery and there are more names to add to the list. Who, I wonder, as I pick up the paper-knife, will it be this time?

KIDDIECON

The creche is coming together nicely now. We've already had a number of people saying that they will make use of it, but in order to assess the programming and logistics of organising all the youngsters, if there are any other potential users, please let us know as soon as possible.

There is no obligation to use the creche once you have put your name forward, so even if you only think you might use it, still let us know. 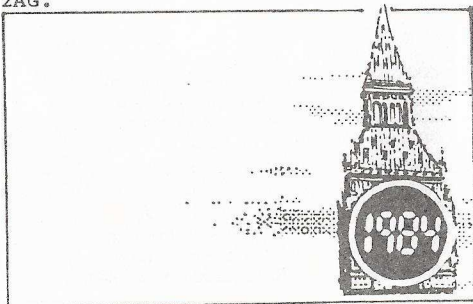
BOOK DISPLAY - Publishers, please let us have your material!

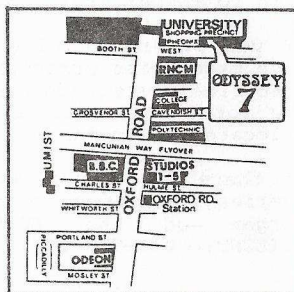

The idea is that the "adopter" should look after the "adoptee" during the con in a way agreeable to both parties: sharing a hotel room, perhaps, or providing somewhere to stay; taking meals together and so on. It would further international relations, too, if the "adopter" could entertain the visitor for a time before or after the con - take him or her to other fannish gatherings or just to their own home.
