OUT AND ABOUT

Stevenage is a schizophrenic town - the new town doesn't bear thinking about, but the old town has a certain charm. In the new town you'll find all the old favourites in the shopping line such as Dixons, WH Smith, C&A, Tesco, M&S and so on. No restaurants of note unless you're a McDonalds freak. But there is the indoor market with a nice little Indian food & spice stall, and there's the outdoor market just 200 yards from the hotel.

The Old Town

Find the old town by using the bridge behind Tesco. Continue straight along the road when you get off the bridge and this turns into the High Street. About a 10-15 minute walk.

Restaurants

The choice is either Indian or Chinese, but all pretty good (well, we've tried the Chinese, the Indians look OK). The restaurants are all along the High Street in the Old Town and are listed in the order in which you reach them from the hotel. The Indian restaurants all have similar prices, for example the meat rogan varies between £3.80 and £4.10, tandoori chicken can be found for around £4.95.

Dew Drop Inn Looks like a converted café but offers an OK standard of

Chinese. Set menus start at £12, business lunch on Saturdays for

£5.80.

Mohan Tandoori No, this one's not Chinese. Looks reasonable from the outside, as

does the

Bombay which is just across the road.

The Jade Garden offers a rather more up-market, somewhat OTT decor but

surprisingly is not that much more expensive than the Dew Drop.

The set menus start from £12.80.

And, finally, there's the

Taj Mahal which isn't Chinese either.

Public Houses

The High Street has a generous smattering of real-ale pubs, all of which are Greene King. The first one you come to is The Chequers. Skip the Coach and Horses, of which the CAMRA guide says, "very loud disco music; without ear defenders nobody has got close enough to the bar to see what beers are on". The Red Lion and the White Lion . . . If you wish to escape from the terror of the Greene King, see John and if you're really nice he'll show you his CAMRA guide. You have to be very, very nice for him to open it, however.

Bookshops

Well, there's only one that we've noticed, although there may be more. John can't remember the name, but he was combining it with the pubs field trip and they refused to sell him a pint. He thinks it's roughly in the area of the Red Lion.
