#### YOUR HOTEL BOOKING FORM

HOTEL BOOKING FORMS ARE INCLUDED WITH THIS PROGRESS REPORT - IF YOU HAVEN'T GOT ONE PLEASE LET US KNOW IMMEDIATELY. DITTO FOR THE HOTEL RESERVATION CARD.



To save time at NOVACON itself, we've included a section on the Booking Form for you to convert your supporting membership (you should have paid £2 so far) into full attendinding membership (a further £2.50 per person). This total of £4.50 is the full amount of Attending membership and you will not be asked for further registration monies at NOVACON 10. Hotel reservations will NOT be processed unless the full £4.50 has been paid.

We trust that the Booking Form is self-explanatory - these will be processed in the order they are received by Krystyna (address at bottom of Booking form). DO  $\underline{\text{NOT}}$  SEND THEM TO THE HOTEL.

Although the convention will not commence till Friday evening, many fans like to arrive the night before and get relaxed before the con starts - the Thursday night has been included to cater for this. The convention will run through till after midnight on Sunday so we recommend that you stay on the Sunday night. Anyone requiring to stay on the Monday night as well should include this in the Special Requirements section.

The Hotel Reservation card should also be self-explanatory but there is no need to fill in all the boxes. An example is given below of the required boxes you should complete. YOU MUST SIGN YOUR CARD.

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IMPORTANT NOTE: ONLY ONE CARD PER ROOM IS REQUIRED. If you are sharing a room please make sure that only one person returns the card - this should be fairly simple to arrange as most of you will know who you are sharing with. If you are one of those people who are unable to arrange a partner, but want the hotel to arrange it for you, please indicate this clearly on the Hotel Booking Form.

Please return your Booking Form/Reservation Card <u>as soon as possible</u>. Rooms will be allocated strictly in the order that we receive the bookings. You will receive confirmation from the Hotel in due course. Once the Angus is filled reservations will be made at the overflow hotel, the Centre Hotel in New Street. The same room rates will apply. (see Progress Report 1 or Booking Form for rates)

So much for the form filling instructions. If some of you are wondering why we go to such great lengths to explain how to fill these forms in, we suggest you take a spell on a convention committee - you'll be amazed at the variety of ways people interpret fairly basic things - in the past, we've ended up with people booking two rooms when they only wanted half of a twin through to people who find the Booking Form totally incomprehensible. Add to that the comedians out there who deliberately fill in wrong things, and being Secretary on a Con committee becomes a nightmare. Of course, they're the first ones to complain when anything goes wrong with their booking - well, if they will book rooms for Mr & Mrs K Kinnison and forget which name they used this year, they deserve to end up in the overflow!

#### ONLY NON-MEMBERS ALLOWED!!

It's amazing how things get distorted. At NOVACON 9 you may remember we held an Open Forum to discuss the future of NOVACONs - the committee were looking several years ahead and trying to decide whether to let NOVACONs grow in the way Easter conventions have grown or to attempt to keep the numbers down to a reasonable figure. The Open Forum was a way of hearing your views and finding alternative methods of keeping those numbers down, if that was what the majority wanted. An overwhelming majority expressed a desire to stay at the Royal Angus rather than move to a larger hotel outside Birmingham, leaving the committee to decide on any method of limiting numbers, if the necessity arose. So it was with a great deal of surprise that I read in MATRIX 29 Rob Jackson's review of Jeff Suter's fanzine PERIPHERY 2 where he states "...criticism of the (now aborted) half-hearted attempt to restrict attendance at NOVACON 10 on the grounds that such restriction is elitist." Now I haven't seen PERIPHERY 2 so I don't know the extent of that criticism but my surprise was more of Rob Jackson's acceptance that there had been any attempt to restrict attendance! Were Rob and Jeff Suter at the Open Forum that I chaired?- or did someone else hold one without telling me! It was not decided or announced at NOVACON 9 that there would be any limitation to NOVACON 10 attendance.

If you would like to know more about the Magnum SF list and our full plans for 1980, The Publicity Department, Magnum Books, North Way, Andover, Hampshire, would be happy to help you.

There were several suggestions from the floor, such as only allowing previous NOVACON attendees to register for future cons, invitation only and other ideas guaranteed to kill NOVACON immediately. None of which were even considered by the committee. We did say that we would not be taking any registrations at NOVACON itself - in fact we are not taking registrations after October 1st. This is not solving the problem of too many attendees but more a method of reducing the work on the committee at the event itself. By October 1st we will know the total number of registrations and can print the Programme Book accordingly without having to print extra copies for possible walk-ins. In the past, this has resulted in committees finding ways of disposing of unwanted Programme Books for years after (Programme Book for NOVACON 5 anyone?). Drawing a line at October 1st may or may not change the number of attendees. It will make things easier for the committee - it will put a stop to fans ringing up the night before the convention to see if you can get them in the Con Hotel because they'd forgot to send in a Booking Form. The committee will still have the last minute problems but at least we will be trying to cut down the things that can cause problems. If by any chance we had 700 registrations for NOVACON 10 then we possibly would be forced by the Hotel to limit attendance - the place just isn't that big and that figure would be way beyond the Fire Regulations limit. But we're not likely to get that many registrations - we hope! Every convention runs the risk of having too many people its never happened yet (though we must have been very close at SEACON) and if it did happen, the committee would have to find a method of limitation. Every committee is aware of this possibility - this isn't something NOVACON invented. By discussing it openly we thought we'd get sensible suggestions that we could consider. Which is, in my memory, exactly what happened. I just don't undertand how someone got the impression we'd implemented 'elitist restrictions' or how another person accepts this and states that it is 'now aborted'. Comments, anyone?

#### PROGRAMME NOTES

As mentioned in the last PR, NOVACON 10 will, we hope, run like a 'Best of NOVACONs' - items from previous NOVACONs that have proven to be very popular together with new innovations, like,....

#### SLIDE SHOW

We'll be running a slide show of photos from previous NOVACONs and we need YOUR HELP. Martin Hoare will be putting together a short programme item and requires any unusual, interesting, amazing, funny photos you may have of people at NOVACONs - has anyone got a shot of the collapsing table that was laden with crockery at NOVACON 4, for instance? We need your photographs, slides, etc. If you have got anything of interest, please send them to Krystyna at the address at the end of this PR. Please pencil your name on the reverse/edge so that we can return the items to you.

#### DISCO/FANCY DRESS

The disco this year will again be on the Saturday night. This year it will be run by ex-BSFA Secretary Graham Bullock who, if memory serves me right, ran the disco at NOVACONS 5,6 & 7. This year we are incorporating the Fancy Dress into the Disco. We will not be having the traditional 'parade'. Instead, we hope that everyone attending the Disco will be wearing Fancy Dress and we'll be giving spot prizes for the best costumes. Prizes will be the usual bottles - full. For the benefit of photographers there will be a special area in which photographs can be taken.

#### FILMS

In addition to WIZARDS, FIGURES IN A LANDSCAPE, SANTA CLAUS CONQUERS THE MARTIANS and DEATHRACE 2000 (we now have confirmation on that) we are attempting to get the Ed Emshwiller short classic RELATIVITY plus the short animated anti-war film shown at NOVACON 4, ATTENTION.

One or two people have mentioned to me that they don't believe there is a film called SANTA CLAUS CONQUERS THE MARTIANS! It is true! It was featured in the book THE 50 WORST FILMS OF ALL TIME - and guest of honour Brian Aldiss points out that there is another SF film featured in the same book - INVASION OF THE GIANT TOMATOES. If we can track that one down,it will be shown next year or whenever - NOT at this convention, though. Have some pity on the projectionist!

#### OTHER ITEMS

Other programme items will include the popular SF University Challenge from last year. New questions, new teams (well, almost). Can the Surrey limpwrists win again? See panel below for details. The ever-popular Jack Cohen will be giving one of his talks on Aliens - not-to-be-missed. Dave Langford will have returned from his TAFF trip and will delight us all recapping on the bizarre events encountered in America. Phil Strick will be putting together a programme of rare film clips. Eve Harvey will be chatting to 3 guests. There will be another debate and a panel discussion on "How to Sell Science Fiction to a DALLAS-loving Public" - anyone wishing to participate in this item should volunteer their name to Joe Nicholas (address at end of PR).

#### AUCTION

In addition to the above goodies there will be the usual Auction of items donated by you. Any old paperbacks, magazines, posters, etc that you no longer want will be gratefully received. If you really want to support the convention, you can always donate some expensive goody like that first edition LORD OF THE RINGS you always intended to replace with a new mint copy.

We'll also auction rare items for you. You get 90% of the amount raised - the other 10% goes to the convention funds.

NOW is the time to start sorting out items for the auction!

#### THE ART ROOM

The Art Room will again be in the Lower Angus. If you have material to display, we'll be pleased to see it. If you wish to put it into the Art Auction, the convention will take 10% of the amount raised - you get the other 90%. Marsha Jones will be once again in charge of the Art Show and the Auction. #### BRIAN ALDISS IN REVIEW

As many of you are aware, the Birmingham SF Group produces a monthly newsletter which is distributed to all members of the BSFG. It has recently featured two reviews, both by Chris Morgan, of new books by our Guest-of-Honour. Those reviews are reprinted here with Chris Morgan's permission.

LIFE IN THE WEST (Published by Weidenfeld & Nicolson at £5.95 - 310pp)
This is a novel of contemporary life, rich in wit and wisdom. Thomas Squire, an upperclass Englishman in his late 40s, has become a respected pundit on the subject of
popular culture following his TV series FRANKENSTEIN AMONG THE ARTS. He has been
invited as guest of honour to an international conference on future culture at Ermalpa
(a thinly disguised Palermo) in Sicily. But this time of greatest success is also, for
Squire, the time of greatest upset and soul-searching. His marriage seems to be
breaking up and he may be forced to sell Pippet Hall, the home of his family for
centuries.

Although Thomas Squire's problems are central to the novel, Brian Aldiss uses them as a pretext for commenting upon many facets of present-day existence. Chapters are set at the Ermalpa Conference alternate with flashbacks of Squire's earlier life. Culture, in its various manifestations, gets a good deal of space, beginning with an episode of FRANKENSTEIN AMONG THE ARTS and continuing through various papers presented at the conference on such subjects as science fiction and pin-ball machines. There is a heavy seasoning of politics, particularly at Ermalpa, where almost all the delegates (most of whom are well-to-do accedemics) profess a kind of phoney Marxism; an exception is one of the Soviet delegates, Rugorsky, an anglophile.

This is an indulgent novel; Brian Aldiss spends much time describing things which, I felt, are important to him. Fortunately these things are interesting to the reader, and are put across with such a sure descriptive touch accompanied by shafts of irony and wit that one cannot fail to be entertained. Even so, this is a long, discursive book with little action, intended for the intellectual rather than the person who wants an easy read.

ENEMIES OF THE SYSTEM (Published by Granada at 95p - 124pp)

For some time now it has been obvious that Brian Aldiss is not writing SF as an end in itself, but using it as a tool, as a means to other ends. Here he adopts the trappings of SF to present a satire on communism. A million years hence, Homo sapiens has been replaced by Homo uniformis. The principle of Biological Communism has, via genetic engineering and bottle-grown babies, produced what its inhabitants agree is a utopia. But some are more uniform than others, and a group of upper-echelon comrades has been awarded the privilege of a holiday on the planet of Lysenka II (so called, it gradually becomes clear, because its inhabitants have devolved according to the eccentric genetic theories of the notorious Russian biologist Lysenko). From the start their uniformity does not prevent them from arguing over what are to the reader fairly minor points of communist logic. On a sightseeing trip in the wilds, the road collapses beneath one of the motor coaches, leaving its passengers stranded, out of contact with civilisation and surrounded by savage animals. What do they do? They hold a meeting to elect an action committee. Later, as they struggle to survive without the help of their utopian system, their conditioning begins to break down. This is a fairly slight book, due partly to its paucity of pages and partly by the way in which characterisation and background are subservient to dialectic, but a witty one. Chris Morgan.
