

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#### PROGRESS REPORT 2

HOTEL BOOKING FORMS ARE INCLUDED WITH THIS PROGRESS REPORT - IF YOU HAVEN'T GOT ONE PLEASE LET US KNOW IMMEDIATELY. DITTO FOR THE HOTEL RESERVATION CARD.

Hotel Booking Time, folks - we've tried, yet again, to make it as simple as possible. We know at least one person won't understand it but from past experience we have learned to shoulder that small problem. Please read the form carefully and fill in the relevant details legibly.

Please note that Hotel Booking Forms will only be accepted from those people who have taken out <u>full</u> membership. If you have supporting membership only, you <u>must</u> send an extra 13 to convert from supporting to full attending membership. The Bookings will be processed by Eunice in the order they are received. Her address is Eunice Pearson, Apt 2, 1 Broughton Road, Handsworth, Birmingham 20. These will then be passed to the hotel who will, in due course, send confirmation of your booking. Once the Angus is filled, reservations will be made at an overflow hotel - this year we will be using the Grand Hotel which is a few minutes walk from the Angus. The same special NOVACON 12 rates will apply. (see Progress Report 1 or Booking Form for those special rates).

The convention programme will commence Friday evening and continue through to the early hours of Monday morning. We therefore suggest you book for the Friday, Saturday, Sunday nights, though you may, if you wish, only stay one or two nights. People booking for all three nights will be given preference over those staying one or two nights, when allocating rooms at the Angus. You will also note that on the Booking Form we have provided space for anyone wishing to arrive a day early and/or leave a day late - the Thursday night and the Monday night will be available to NOVACON 12 members at the Special rates.

In addition to the Hotel Booking Form, you <u>must</u> return the Hotel Reservation Card included with this PR. These must be completed <u>and signed</u> and returned, with the Hotel Booking Form to Eunice Pearson, <u>not</u> the Hotel. There is usually one joker who thinks he get beat the queue by sending his form and card direct to the hotel. What happens is, that the hotel put it on one side until we take in the first batch of reservations, we take it back home and put it at the back of the queue.

So, a quick checklist of Things to Do:-

- 1) Fill in your Hotel Booking form legibly.
- 2) Fill in the Hotel Reservation Card provided see opposite for the details required. <u>Remember</u> we require only one card per room - if you are sharing a room, please ensure that only one person returns a card. # Films

## dave hardy

<u>TIME BANDITS</u> (Columbia-EMI-Warner, 110mins). The surprise fantasy hit of 1981/82 - described by STARLOG as "THE WIZARD OF OZ meets ALICE IN WONDERLAND, as told by Monty Python". (It was produced and directed by Terry Gilliam and co-written by Michael Palin). With six zany dwarfs, Sean Connery as King Agamemnon, John Cleese as Robin Hood, and a Map of the Universe showing all the Holes in Time, this film was a critical as well as a box office success. It'll have the tears running into your shoes.

SOMEWHERE IN TIME (UIP, 104mins). Another time story, though it couldn't be more different from TIME BANDITS. Based on the novel BID TIME RETURN by Richard Matheson, this is one to relax with after the previous hectic epics. It stars Christopher (Superman) Reeve, Jane Seymour and Christopher Plummer and is basically a love story: Richard Collier falls for a photograph of a beautiful actress - taken in 1912 - whom he met as an old lady on the night she died. Can he somehow travel back to meet her 'again'? Watch and find out.

BATTLE BEYOND THE STARS (Columbia-EMI-Warner, 102mins). Directed by Jimmy Murakami at Roger Corman's New World Productions studios, this multi-milliondollar space saga has been described as 'a sort of outer space MAGNIFICENT SEVEN'. The peaceful Ak ta are suddenly threatened with annihilation by nasty Sador (not Vader) the Conqueror. Brave young Akira, Shad (Richard Thomas), scours the galaxy to recruit mercenaries (of all shapes and sizes) to help them... An action-packed romp.

THE INCREDIBLE SHKINKING WOMAN (UIP, 89mins). Yes, the balance of the sexes has been equalised again. Pat Kramer (Lily Tomlin), a normal, contented wife and mother, married to an advertising executive, finds that she is (guess what?) shrinking, inch by inch. Instead of being pleased, like most women, that she is losing weight, she tells her physician, who promptly kidnaps her to further his devious plans to control the world. But help is at hand - from Sidney the Gorilla... Oh, yes, didn't I mention? It's a comedy.

THE NUDE BOMB (UIP, 94mins). Another comedy, believe it or not (have you ever seen a bomb with clothes on?). The evil organistation KAOS (go on - pronounce it) broadcasts to the world that it has the power to destroy all known fabrics on Earth unless its demands are met. This one'll scare the pants off you unless it comes true, in which case it won't need to. END OF THE WORLD (ITC, 88mins). Every con should have a serious, thoughtprovoking film, and this isn't ours. But consider the theological as well as the cosmological implications of a remote convent taken over by aliens who have assumed the features of the local priests and nuns. This one stars Christopher Lee - need I say more?

Shorty 1) <u>HARDWARE WARS</u> (Pyramid, 13mins). Now we come to the heavy stuff. See for yourself the legendary adventures of Fluke Starbucker and Ham Salad and their robot friends as they battle with the incomprehensible Dorph Nader and his Steam Troopers (isn't that a rock group?). And may the farce be with you.

Shorty 2) <u>CLOSET CASES OF THE NERD KIND</u> (Pyramid, 12mins). What mysterious force could turn mild-mannered sewage worker Roy Dreary into a total twit? This is the revised version, complete with mashed potato, a famous French scientist, an over-sized xylophone (all together now - 'soh la fah fah, doh'), and, of course, UFO's.

lst Prize: a bottle of Venusian Hikk Cup (Scotch) 2nd Prize: a bottle of Aldebaran Hyazakyte (wine)


3) Fantasy/Horror (any medium)

### <sup>8</sup> Nova Awards

Venerability comes fast in fandom, not only through the hellish pace and gruelling drinking: in some quarters I seem to be regarded as a white-bearded sage who alone recalls the moment when the Nova Award was first carted down the slopes of Sinai. Actually I had nothing to do with the Nova for its first four years...despite which my file on the damned thing is thicker than a Piers Anthony trilogy, or even a Piers Anthony protagonist.

In the beginning the Brum Group saw that the field of British fanzine awards was void (apart from the informal CHECKPOINT - now the informal ANSIBLE poll); and the spirit of the Brum Group brooded on the face of its beer, and said, "Let there be the Nova Award." And it was so. In those days the winning fanzine was decided by a select committee of famous fans, and from 1973 to 1976 the committee-chosen Nova Awards were presented with great ceremony, ritual, pageantry and insobriety at each Novacon. (The complete and updated list appears in each programme book, enabling this particular lazy sod to omit the details here.)

But all was not well. Fanzine editors gathered in the bar saying things like, "Who are these committee members that they should judge us?" Committee members gathered in the bar saying things like, "We can't agree," or "Well bugger it, I wouldn't have joined this committee if I'd known my own fanzine would be made ineligible." NOVACON 7 committee members gathered in the bar saying things like Stan Eling's "How about a bit of electoral reform, Dave?" or Dave Langford's sodden response, "OK."

After a period of research, consultation, guesswork and hangovers which would have made a Parliamentary Standing Committee on Procrastination look positively efficient, the Nova Rules took form, were engraved for all eternity upon slabs of imperishable duplicator paper, and were at once forgotten. The most important bits survive in the wording of the ballot forms, the award now being more or less democratic and the select committee having been utterly abolished with the exception of something very select called the Nova Committee. (Are you beginning to see how bureaucracy works?) Your merry NOVACON 12 committee - also frightfully select, but nothing to do with the Nova Committee, of course - now feels that a word or two about these mysterious Rules would be in order.

The fundamental idea of the Nova as it's been run since 1977 is that it should be awarded by informed vote. The informed votes come from informed voters, defined as Novacon members (anyone who is anyone in British fandom surely goes to Novacon) who've been active in fanzines some time in the year or two preceding the relevant Novacon. "Active in fanzines" is a bit harder to pin down, but for the sake of clarity our rules define this as having produced one or more fanzines, or having contributed articles/artwork to two or more, or having had letters of comment printed in three or more. This rather tedious definition merely shows the difficulty of capturing fannish intangibles in print. So: huge piles of ballots appear on the Novacon registration desk (the previous experiment of sending out copies with a progress report having produced excitingly huge responses such as two postal votes); it would be a good idea to think about your vote in advance should you qualify, but forms can be completed and handed in up to the very last moment - this being when the registration desk closes on Saturday evening. Don't forget. All too often, after the announcement, certain individuals have gathered in the bar saying things like, "Bloody hell, I'd have voted but I thought so-and-so was already a dead cert to win" In the words of the ancient sages, too late is not soon enough.

But who are these three fans who alone of all the convention are not gathered in the bar? Who are these pathetic outcasts who sit forlorn and almost sober, staring glumly at wads of paper covered with illegible scrawls? You've got it: the Nova Committee, three supposedly knowledgeable fans who check qualifications and count votes, all the while watching one another like slightly bloodshot hawks to ensure that utter fairness is maintained even when votes for fanzines produced by Nova Committee members come under scrutiny.

The voter has merely to list up to three favourite British fanzines in order of preference - and since 1981 there's also the option of listing up to three favourite British fanwriters and fanartists in addition, the original fanzine Nova having been diversified by the ever-megalomaniac Brum Group. Channelcon this year saw the launching of SF Fandom's newest award - COFF (The Concrete Overcoat Fan Fund). 'Cough up for COFF' posters were placed around the con, and several notable fans were approached to get publicity for this new award. But none wished to be involved. Who can blame them? This is the Award no-one wants to win. It is this fact that sets COFF apart from other awards.

COFF will be awarded every year to the fan judged by fandom as most deserving to be embedded in concrete and thrown into the nearest canal. As the regional water authority deem this to be a navigational hazard, there will be a symbolic presentation. The winner (loser?) will receive, for one year, the magnificent COFF trophy of which it was said at the Channelcon Art Show, "This is an exhibit?"

The rules for voting are amazingly simple. You may vote for anyone you like (or dislike, if you prefer), you may vote as many times as you wish. <u>BUT</u> each vote must be accompanied by a lOp piece (or two 5ps, etc). Proceeds will be donated equally to TAFF and GUFF.

There is a place to vote provided at the bottom of the Hotel Booking Form. Other slips will be available at NOVACON 12. Don't waste your vote!

Proceeds at present have reached the magnificent total of £8.10 with no one individual having more than 12 votes. But block voting and cartels could soon change that position. There must be <u>someone</u> you would like to see embedded in readymix!

No wonder then thatwhen my Nova Award Rules Procrastination Committee finally delivered this vast document, strong men like Rog Peyton reeled, clutched at wads of fivers for support, and gasped: "I wanted something that would go on one small page..." They said the same of Stephen Donaldson, you know, and with more justification - and look at
