from Dr Greenland's Diary

26 Jun 91

Writing my story for the Novacon special edition. It's one of the bits that didn't quite make it into <u>Take Back Plenty</u>: the origin of Saskia and Mogul, the Amazing Mercurial Zodiac Twins.

I found this note.

they couldn't leave us alone. sometimes we'd be 3 for a while, then we'd fall asleep, and when we woke up we'd be 5 again. We started noticing. one day 2 of us woke up in a lab, and remembered it when we got back. We knew there was another world. anyway, they hadn't matched the things we knew with things around us. We knew there were \underline{x} and \underline{y} and \underline{z} .

Typical Greenland, writing about the subjects of the experiment, not the experimenters. It may be called "In the Garden", which would be nice, because that's the title of the Eurythmics' first album, the one nobody bought, the best one.

Going to get it to play while I work I get sidetracked, by Iron Butterfly's In-a-Gadda-Da-Vida. The connection has to be the title, a corruption of In the Garden of Eden, which their singer was legendarily too stoned to enunciate. When obscure nonsense associations like that suddenly become Very important you know you're on. Bill Gibson thinks they may actually generate the thing, and he may not be wrong.

Ancient history, <u>In-a-Gadda-da-Vida</u>. Part of the soundtrack to my schooldays, along with Traffic and Melanie and Pink Floyd's <u>Atom Heart Mother</u>.

In- a Gadda-da Vida, honey

Don't you know that I'm lovin' you?

In-a-Gadda-da-Vida, baby,

Don't you know that I'll always be true?

Samuel Taylor Coleridge, eat your heart out!

IB vocalist a prime exponent of the Owl Rat school: hairy-larynxed gentleman who, when the drummer kicks up the beat and the lead guitar grinds back in with the dominant riff, grab the mike and growl: "Owl rat!"

It probably went on for hours live. Key bits are the very end, and the bit where the obligatory phased drum solo suddenly delivers itself up via some unusually delicate percussion to the organ, which delivers this eerie, plaintive fugue. Interrupted at one point by harsh scraping squeals like Hendrix doodling with a screwdriver, the fugue returns, undeterred, sublime.

Don't know anything else by Iron Butterfly. Don't want anything else. I want to be swallowed by <u>In-a-Gadda-da-Vida</u>, in all it's cheesy glory. I adore it. Play it four times today, driving the story along.

Actually. I'm not. Not driving anything, that's insidious rockist metaphor. What I'm making is more like coral at this point: skeletal, nubby. Tracking forward and back to this juncture and that, coaxing out another image, another little bud of information. \underline{x} , \underline{y} , \underline{z} . Associating.

Call Jane at Grafton to talk about <u>Take Back Plenty</u> posters, on which the marketing dept. have unfathomably failed to name the Arthur C Clarke Award. Jane's on the phone, so I talk to her assistant. "I'm writing the history of the Zodiac Twins," I tell her.

"That's me, " says Patsy at once. "Gemini".

For some reason, all the way through <u>Plenty</u>, I never even thought about the sign. Maybe I did and forgot. All I remember now is nicking the name Zodiac from <u>Fireball XL5</u>.

"Gemini," I say. "Do you know, I never thought about them."

"Well, I am one," says Patsy.

"Two." I say.

"No, one," she says. "I'm definitely one."

I say: "I thought Geminis were supposed to be indecisive."
"I might be," says Patsy, "but I don't think I am."

Jessica Palmer, author of <u>Dark Lullaby</u>, phones to say she's coming to town. She remembers <u>In-a-Gadda-da-Vida</u>, starts singing down the phone. "Black light," she says. "Whenever I think of that track I think of black light. The Free University at Berkeley, a room full of people with luminous green teeth. I think probably there was a little gnome who used to follow me around with a copy of that album. Whenever I was peaking he'd slap it on the stereo."
