



THE NOVA AWARDS

In 1973 the Gillon Field created the NOVA AWARD for fanzines produced by Science Fiction Fandom, and until 1981 this was presented annually at Novacon to the editor of the fanzine voted 'best of the year'. From 1982 onwards, additional Nova Awards were presented to the Fanwriter and Fanartist voted 'best of the year'. These three awards have been presented annually at Novacon ever since.

The winners at Novacon 20 were:

BEST FANZINE. Judith Hanna and Joseph Nicholas for FTT.

BEST FANWRITER. Dave Langford.

BEST FANARTIST. Dave Mooring.

For a fanzine to qualify for the award at Novacon 21, one or more issues must have appeared between 1st October 1990 and 30 September 1991. For fanwriters and fanartist to qualify, a piece of writing or artwork by the person concerned must have been published in a fanzine for the first time between those dates. For the purposes of these awards, a 'fanzine' is defined as an amateur publication which is concerned with Science Fiction, Fantasy, Science Fiction and Fantasy Fans and/or related subjects, and copies of which may be generally obtained in exchange for other amateur publications or in response to letters of comment.

The fundamental idea of the Nova Awards is that they should be awarded by informed vote. Informed votes come from informed voters, and for the purposes of these awards these are defined as any member of Novacon 21 who has been active in fanzines in Britain between 1st October 1990 and the 30th of September 1991.

"Active in fanzines" is harder to define, but the current definition states that voters must have received SIX or more fanzines during the course of the relevant year. "Fanzines" in this context means different publications, and not different issues of the same fanzine. The various official organs of a group or society will not be treated as different fanzines for the purpose of this rule.

Nova Award ballot forms will be enclosed with the third Novacon 21 progress report, and a supply will also be available at the convention itself. I hope that all of you who enjoy fanzines between now and then will bear the Novas in mind and consider how to cast your votes. In the meantime if you have any queries, comments or suggestions about the awards, please get in touch with the Nova Awards Administrator at the address below.

NOVACON 20 SNOOKER REPORT

The first great injustice ocurred in the first round with probably the hottest player, me, being knocked out by the dark horse, and Mexicon programme Supremo, Colin Harris. (I might add I was cheated of victory by a fluke on a re-spotted black!) Another memorable game of the first round was Dave Ellis' encounter with Gamma. An exceedingly enjoyable game as Gamma was in his usual convention form (he hadn't slept for at least two days and his only sustenance appeared to be of the liquid variety). To no-one's surprise Dave won.

The tie of the second round had to be Critical Wave's Martin Tudor versus Andromeda's Dave Holmes. The match lived up to everyone's expectations — the standard of comedy was high (though, of course, low—brow), while the standard of snooker was even worse than anticipated. Within a mere 6 ball frame they managed to "score" over 100 points between them — the highest score of the tournament (almost all the points being awarded because of foul shots). The other semi final saw the second travesty of justice in the tournament. This year's Nova Award administrator Harry Bond had valiantly battled through three rounds to face, the ever "jammy" Steve Lawson, who had, as usual, reached the semis via the back door and a series of byes (why is it so many people "refuse" to play the man...I think we should be told). Needless to say luck triumphed over perseverance and Steve won. The final was a poor game. Paul Brazier seemed understandably nervous as Steve Lawson played his usual game, but eventually good triumphed, justice was served and Paul won!

The highest break was Paul's incredible 16 (don't laugh, it's higher than the highest break of the Novacon Nineteen tournament! We're dealing with class players here you know...). It is true to say that, as expected, good fun was had by all, although Steven Hendry can breath easy for a while yet. My final words on the tournament — I WAS ROBBED!!
