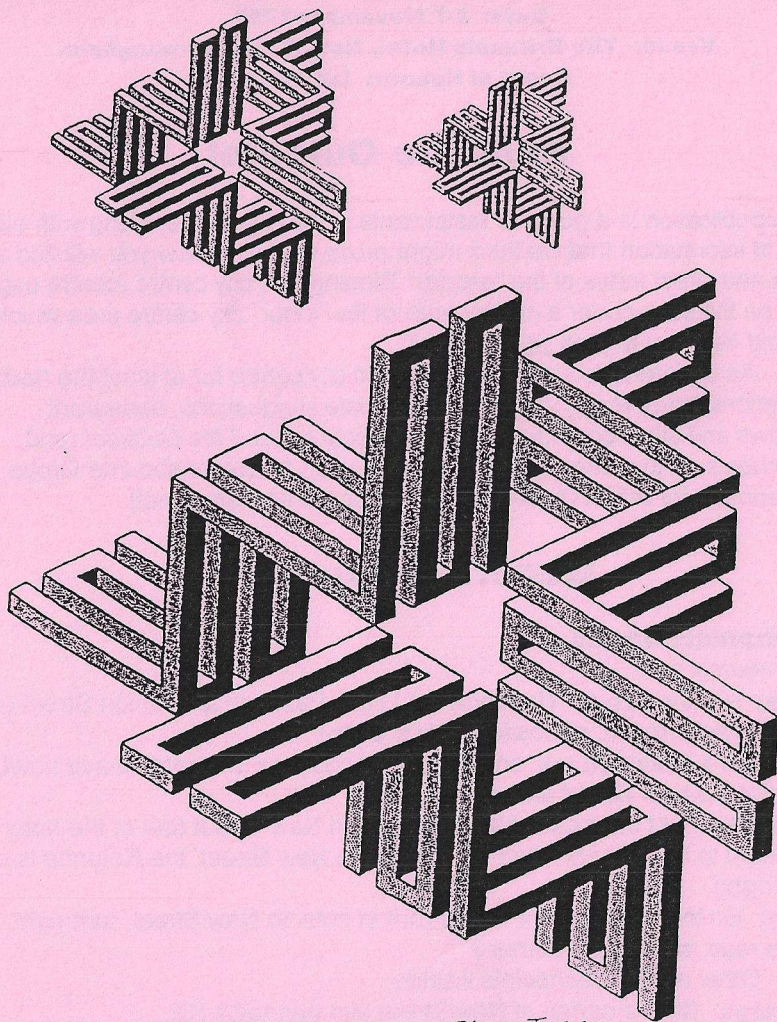

Dave Lally's Programme

Some little time ago the British Film Institute (BFI) did a survey amongst the Film Industry regarding the 100 best UK Films of all time (e.g. winners included BRIDGE ON THE RIVER KWAI, ICE COLD IN ALEX etc.)

More recently the BFI (which also covers TV) did a similar survey amongst 1,600 people within that industry (both in front of and behind the camera, academics, writers etc) and released its 100 UK programmes survey on 5th September at a reception. Excerpts of sf shows from that 100 will be shown this weekend.

Dave Lally (one of those polled in the survey) reports below – and his own full choices will be on display at the con:

The BFI's own TV Unit Staff (most of whom I know well) themselves whittled down over 60 years of UK TV output (BBC – later BBC1: 1936-, ITV: 1955-, BBC 2: 1964-, C4: 1982- and that upstart "C4+1/2" {C5}) down to about 650 programmes divided over six categories. These were: Single Drama (plays etc), Drama Specials/Series, Comedy, Youth, Factual, Lifestyle and finally Light Entertainment. They also included a separate, overseas category (i.e. all non-UK).

Those polled had to vote for up to 30 programmes – with a minimum of three in each of the six categories: the other 12 votes could be spread around any others as one wished (and one could also "write-in" shows not already listed).

There were some surprises – both sf and non:

Within non-sf, comedy progs like FAWLTY TOWERS (no. 1) and MONTY PYTHON both came well up along with HANCOCK and ONLY FOOLS & HORSES. Other non-sf shows like HOUSE OF CARDS/BETWEEN THE LINES etc. Also did (deservedly) well.

Within sf, DR WHO came top in that genre, whilst THE AVENGERS, THUNDERBIRDS, EDGE OF DARKNESS, QUATERMASS & THE PIT, etc. all did well. Even a very old show (about which, when it was broadcast in 1955, there were House of Commons questions): 19844 appeared well up. Oddly enough, my own favourite THE PRISONER came 101 overall (quite an appropriate number for a Big Brother type show) and within its own Series/Series classification, came No. 28. The overall winner was FRASIER.

But please pop into Severn Room and watch a few clips on video.

Art Show

This year the Art Show will be on the 2nd floor in the Chilter, Featured artists include Jim Barker, David A. Hardy, Tim Groome and Sue Jones.

In addition, however, we will be launching our CD ROM art show which will feature the work of Meraylah Allwood, Ian Brooks, Jackie Burns, Dave Carson, Claire, David A. Hardy, Colin Langeveld.

We invited artists to write briefly about the work they have supplied on CD ROM:

Claire:

My space art site (<http://www.cthisis.btinternet.com>) was generated by a recent interest in space scenery and astronomy about over a year ago. Also being interested in science coincided with my inspiration, and enabled me to produce some of the visions I had in store, that I was later able to express with the use of computer technology. Although I was only using a simple computer art format initially for my website, the medium was another adventure from the beginning, and the creating of my site right to this day has left me with more than a fare share of new ideas! The pictures were more or less to do with my experimenting with the techno tools of the computer so they vary in theme. Some are my idea of what the outer regions of space is like in an imaginary sense. e.g. Globular Storm, while some are my view of space from what we see now. e.g. Jupiter with Io. I am always hoping to create new pictures that will eventually make more people imagine, not just by looking at what's there, but by also seeing what might be.

David A. Hardy:

The images on my CD-ROM include 'favourite' ones from the 70's or earlier, painted conventionally and scanned from slides, up to recent work produced digitally. Among them are my latest cover for F&SF (July 2000) -- my 51st, the 50th being my first digital for them -- and for ANALOG, not yet published. Also the latest incarnation of 'Marshmallow Moon?', which appears on the cover of REALITY DUST by Stephen Baxter (who, incidentally, is writing the Foreword for HARDYWARE, a book about my work to be published in 2001 by Paper Tiger, for which Chris Morgan is writing the text. Stephen says he has been a fan [of mine] since 1972!)

Also included are two of my most recent *paintings*, both about 3 x 4ft on canvas, done for an exhibition currently being held at A.T.Kearney in Berkeley Square, London. I'll be glad to explain more to anyone who asks (and buys me a pint?). And the piece I did for Electric Eggs, which aids access to cons for the disabled -- the only appearance here of Bhen.

[Any of the above are available as one-off, photo-quality inkjet prints, for a basic £30 for an A3 - plus postage if necessary- contact Dave for details, although a few are already available as prints, and indeed are in the Art Show.]

Colin Langeveld:

I decided to make the leap into the digital world after being surprised - indeed, frightened - by the high quality of work at the 1999 Eastercon artshow I felt that there was little chance of me competing these standards. There was, however some comfort when I discovered that a large majority of them had been 'computer rendered'. I had previously been experimenting with Photoshop 5 so I had some idea where to go from there.

I use Truespace and Amapi 3D, to create my spaceships and cities: Bryce 4, for scenery and Poser 4 for humans, aliens dragon, horses etc. For complicated figures, foreground scenery, or textures, I usually return to the old fashioned brush and paint, the results then being scanned into the rendered picture. Everything is finally brought together by the application of Photoshop 5.

Drink

The main convention bar is the Malvern and Malvern Bar on the 2nd floor (please note that the smaller section, the Malvern "Bar" is a no smoking area). In addition, this year we will be using the Warwick bar on the 9th floor. Opening times are as follows:

The Real Ale we have arranged for the Britannia to supply for the weekend is Holdens XB or Railway Bitter (4.18%) which will cost £2.20 per pint, this will be available in both 2nd and 9th floor bars.

In addition the Hotel have arranged supplies of both oak conditioned strong and medium sweet ciders especially for the con – these will also be on sale from both the 2nd and 9th floor bars.

Happy Hour Prices will be available from 6pm-8pm – these are £1.50 per pint for draught (not real ale) beer, £1.80 single spirit and £1.80 bottled beers.

All drinks will be at standard rates at all other times.

For the convenience of members who prefer wine the hotel have agreed to sell bottles (and some half bottles) over the two bars at restaurant prices!

Wheelchair Access by Pat McMurray

As you will have noticed the main entrance to the Britannia comprises a revolving door, leading to a small landing at the top of three stairs down to the ground floor reception. There is also a fire exit which can be opened from the inside, which leads to the same small landing. It appears possible to get an ordinary manual or powered wheelchair through the fire exit onto the landing. The hotel have a ramp for the three steps which they will lay down for the weekend. The fire exits are alarmed, but we'll ask them to switch the alarm off for the weekend. In the nature of things they will almost certainly forget to do these things, and switch the alarms on and take the ramp up at every shift changeover, but we shall do our best.

If you have a scooter or large trolley which cannot get through the fire exit, the revolving door can be completely folded back to allow very good access. I have been shown how to do this, and intend to train every gopher and anyone else who's interested in it, how to do it. The hotel have shown every sign of being helpful and friendly, but best to be prepared. I would expect that the ramp will be down and the doors open most of Friday afternoon as the dealers come in and out as well.

The hotel has 11 floors -- ground floor reception, Mezzanine bar area, which we probably won't use, 1st floor restaurant which we will use, 2nd floor main con bar, art show, Ops and registration, 9th floor dealer's room, smaller bar and programme room. All other floors are bedrooms and there are bedrooms on the 2nd as well.

There are three lifts to each floor -- two public lifts and one staff lift. There are also fire escape stairs between all floors and public stairs between the ground, mezzanine and first floors. Both public lifts and all public rooms appear both

wheelchair and scooter accessible. We've calculated that it will take ten minutes for the entire membership to travel by lift from the second to the ninth floor -- we have 15 minute intervals between most programme items. The staff lift can be used by the membership, but appears very difficult for wheelchair access -- I'd stick to the public lifts.

All the public areas on each floor are flat, with no stairs. Many of the doors are on springs and may prove difficult to open without assistance. Most entrances to public rooms are double doored and will be left open where possible. The artshow and dealers room appear large enough that they should not be crowded and manoeuvring should be reasonable.

The hotel has certain bedrooms they provide to people with access difficulties. None of them are fully accessible. All the bedroom doors are standard width, but they can remove the bathroom doors, if requested. I would suggest contacting the hotel in advance to make doubly sure they are aware of any potential difficulties. I believe wheelchairs will be able to get into the rooms, but I don't think scooters will be able to. It should be possible to get the hotel to take care of a scooter and recharge it overnight.

Novacon Table

The Novacon Registration table will be open:

The International Beer Tasting

On Sunday night from 8pm we will be hosting the latest in a long series of Novacon Beer Tastings, using the ever-popular BYOB (bring your own beer) format. To get the ball rolling the convention hopes to have two local beers on draught from Leicester's Hoskins & Oldfield's microbrewery: a strong dark mild, Midnight Express and Hob, their award winning standard bitter, as well as a few interesting bottles - the rest is up to you!

To take part, all you need to do is bring at least THREE bottles of your favourite British or foreign beer to the convention and check them in at the Novacon Registration desk when you arrive. In return you will receive a technicolour "BEER BADGE" which will entitle you to drink the beer at the Tasting on Sunday. Alternatively, you can also take part in the Tasting by buying a BEER BADGE for £4.50 from Novacon Registration.

All Novacon members are welcome to attend the Tasting. The convention is supplying an assortment of exotic and/or unusual non-alcoholic drinks at the Tasting, which will be free to everyone, but only those with BEER BADGES will be entitled to drink the beer. For further information contact the Beer Tasting Organiser, Tony Berry, in the bar, or ask at the Novacon Registration Table.

[Please remember, although we have come to an arrangement with the Britannia regarding the Beer Tasting, this does not extend to you bringing in your own supplies of drink elsewhere during the con. The Hotel can and will charge corkage to people smuggling food or drink into the hotel!]

R.N.I.B. Raffle

If you wish to purchase tickets for the annual raffle in aid of RNIB's Books for the Blind Project, Anne Woodford will be selling them around the con, but tickets will also be available from the Novacon Registration table -- Saturday onwards. In a change from established tradition, prizes will *not* be given out as the draw is made

at the Award Ceremony. Instead prizes will be available for collection from a table set up in the Warwick bar *after* the ceremony.

We have a wide variety of prizes which will be displayed near the Novacon registration table from Saturday onwards. These include a 'rare' video (official) copy of the German TV's 'Spacelight' (four programmes about David A. Hardy's work); a signed copy of the Drunken Dragon Press hardcover edition of Eric Brown's TIME-LAPSED MAN & OTHER STORIES; several signed Colin Greenland books and J.R.R. As we are sure you are aware Novacon, like most conventions in Britain, is run by volunteers and we can't have too many of them! So if you are willing to help out at the convention -- anything from moving chairs to helping with tech ops or working on the programme, please contact Chris Murphy, in the Ops Room.

Registration and Operations will be in the same place as last year, first on the left as you come out of the second floor lifts. Like last year we shall be operating a fascist 'tidy' Ops Room policy, with designated areas for stuff to be stored and no non-essential furniture (or people). However, you will still be able to leave coats and bags in Ops on request and **at your own risk**.

No Smoking

We would appreciate it if you refrained from smoking in designated "No Smoking" areas such as: the Stafford/Dealers' Room (apart from dealers), the Chiltern/Art Show, the Malvern Bar, and the Gloucester/Main Programme.

Dire Warnings
