(Starts around 2:00 pm)

Angus Deayton, quizmaster of the TV show, is often referred to as 'The Thinking Woman's Crumpet', so we naturally chose as our quizmaster his fannish equivalent, Rob Hansen (Brian Burgess was unavailable). Correct answers will be awarded two points each while answers which are wrong but sufficiently witty or amusing may also be awarded a point at the discretion of the quizmaster, whose decision in these matters shall be final. Those contestants hoping to predispose the quizmaster toward favourable decisions on their behalf are advised to ply him with drinks in the bar beforehand. ### OUT AND ABOUT

Stevenage is a schizophrenic town – the new town doesn't bear thinking about, but the old town has a certain charm. In the new town you'll find no restaurants of note unless you're a McDonalds freak. But there is the indoor market with a nice little Indian food & spice stall, and there's the outdoor market just 200 yards from the hotel. The old town is found by using the bridge behind Tesco.
