

About the Committee

Bridget 'Bug' Bradshaw has been active in varied areas of fandom - especially fanzines and APAs - since 1991. Simon Bradshaw got cornered at Imperial College SF society's Freshers' Fair stand back in 1986 and has never quite escaped. A survivor of various behind-the-scenes convention escapades, Seccon is his first experience of actually running a Con and thus having nowhere to pass the buck up to.

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Stephen Baxter

Stephen Baxter was born in Livepool, England, in 1957. After reading mathematics at Cambridge University he took a PhD in engineering at Southampton. He then worked as a teacher of maths and physics, and for several years in information technology, before becoming a full-time author in 1995.

Stephen is the author of nine published SF novels: Raft, Timelike Infinity, Anti-Ice, Flux, Ring, The Time Ships, Voyage, Titan and Moonseed. All of these have been published in the US, and several in Germany, Japan, France etc. His novels have won several awards including the Philip K Dick Award, the John Campbell Memorial Award, the British Science Fiction Association Award, the Kurd Lasswitz Award (Germany) and the Seiun Award (Japan) and have been nominated for several others, including the Arthur C Clarke Award, the Hugo Award and Locus awards. Stephen has published around fifty sf short stories, several of which have won prizes, including the Writers of the Future contest.

By November 1999 his young-adult novel *Mammoth* and his next science fiction novel *Manifold: Time* will have been published in Britain and the US. Both these are the first in three-book series. Stephen's TV and movie work includes the script for Episode 3 of *Space Island One*, broadcast on Sky One in January 1998, whilst *Voyage* was recently dramatised on Radio 4.

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Food

In Stevenage

There are three main areas in Stevenage where you can go out to eat: the Town Centre, the Leisure Park and the Old Town.


The **Town Centre** has no restaurants as such but does feature a good number of eateries suitable for a quick snack. As well as the usual fast food outlets, there are also sandwich bars, fish-and-chip shops and even a Cornish Pasty café.

Stevenage Leisure Park is a recent development featuring a number of restaurants, as well as a cinema, amusement arcades, bowling alley and nightclubs. The bowling alley is worthy of particular note as it has a Real Ale brew pub attached! To reach the Leisure Park, turn left out of the Hotel, then right opposite the 'Edward the Confessor' pub. Go up and long the walkway, through the Arts and Leisure Centre and through the railway station. As well as fast food, the Leisure Park includes the following restaurants:

ITS	Italian, reasonable pizza and pasta.
Aroma	Oriental buffet.
Fatty Arbuckles	American style restaurant with very generous portions.
Exchange Bar	Another American restaurant.

Most of what comprises Stevenage was built as a new town during the 1950s and 60s. The **Old Town** is of a very different style, and features a number of places of its own to eat out. To get to the Old Town, go right and then immediately left out the Hotel, then go past Tesco's and turn right. At the end of the car park is a walkway that takes you over the road and leads up towards the centre of the Old Town. There you will find a number of restaurants, including a couple of Indians, a Chinese and a Bistro along the High Street.
