
Tynecon 74



Progress Report 1 June 1973

Tynecon '74 is the 25th annual British Easter Science Fiction Convention, organised by the North East's Gannet group. The Tynecon '74 Committee are:

Ian Maule, Chairman. Editor of the well known fanzine Maya.

Is addicted to turning duplicator handles.

Ian Williams, Secretary. Past Maya editor; voted no. 1 fanwriter in the Checkpoint Fan Poll this year. Has just finished the first draft of an SF novel. Has a beard which is a neofan.

Robert Jackson, Treasurer. has written amateur SF for <u>Sfinx</u>, the <u>Cxford ficzine</u>. His beard has now gafiated.

Harry Bell, Press Officer and Art Show. Fannish cartoonist voted No. 1 artist in the Checkpoint Fan Poll two years running now. Once - and future? - editor of Grimwab.

Irene Taylor, Special Facilities. Harry's better half; a long time Gannet member.

We have been warned by many people with much experience of organising SF Conventions: Beware the Problems! Well, it's pleasant to be able to report that so far, we have had almost no real headaches or setbacks. In fact things seem to be shaping up well at the moment, which we trust won't lull our rather inexperienced committee into a false sense of security. We're just waiting for the problems which we are sure lie just around the corner... Seriously, we'd like to say to all the multitude who have already offered valuable help and advice: Thanks... and please don't stop!

VENUE

The Royal Station Hotel, Neville Street, Newcastle upon Tyne.

It has been said - often - that the most important factor in the success of a convention is the choice of hotel. We believe our venue has facilities which could not have been better if designed specially for an SF convention. The hotel is one of the finest luxury establishments in the North East; we are fortunate indeed in its location right next to the Central Station and in the helpful attitude of its management. I hope those of you who saw our first Newcastle in '74 flyer will forgive a repetition of the following details about the hotel.

It is a four star 147-bedroom hotel with 214 beds in total; 78 of the rooms have private baths, a few more have private showers, and all have TV if you (God forbid) get bored. All the hotel's convention rooms except the main dining room are on

the first floor next to each other, so you should have no trouble running all over the hotel looking for people. The convention hall itself seats 250 people in comfort; for this we have arrangements for PA, taping, mikes (many), and projection equipment of professional quality in the pipeline. Immediately opposite the convention hall across the corridor are the spacious rooms we will be using as bar and lounge; there are also bars downstairs. The hotel are well aware of our normal requirements as to bar opening times and are prepared to cope. Here I'd like to repeat verbatim a sentence from Ian Williams's first draft: "The price of beer is cheaper than gurgle and is the best and strongest the North can brew." Which is saying something. Exhibition, S&N's special draught, is 17p a pint in the Royal Station's Black Barrel bar. Unlike Newcastle Brown, Ex. tastes fairly innocuous, but it sneaks up on you and... an' ... shplow! Seriously, we warn you inexperienced Southerners that you won't need to drink nearly as much up here. (Sorry; we seem to keep harping on about the price of beer. It's not all we think about, honest!)

We are pleased to announce reduced rates for rooms at the hotel, which are as follows:

£4.00 per night, single room, no private bath £4.50 " with " with " £7.50 " dbl/twin room, no " £8.50 " with "

These are bed and breakfast rates with service charge included; they are liable to VAT. In most cases the reduction from the hotel's normal rates is substantial.

Full English breakfast will be served Buffet style in the Main Dining Room. Instead of providing expensive and rather ill-attended full lunches in the Main Dining Room, the hotel have agreed to open Oscar's Viking Restaurant, which is on the lower ground fioor of the hotel and seats 80, specially for convention members. This would normally be closed to the public over Easter. A variety of hot and cold meals is available there in the range 50p-£1, including a groaning help-yourself cold table at 81p. (The nose of one member of the concom decided while in the restaurant that it wanted to have dinner and that looking round the rest of the hotel could go hang; its owner dragged it out under protest.) We are sure that this will be more suited to the needs of convention members than eating facilities provided in past hotels.

THE CITY

Newcastle, despite the ravages of developers who have torn up rather more of the city than is good for their public relations, is still a city with superb Victorian facades in the shapping streets, and the ancient city wall, cathedral and castle all near the Royal Station. Eating places abound; particularly recommended are the profusion of fine Bengali and Chinese restaurants especially those in the city centre near the hotel. Of course if you want pie and chips that will be around somewhere too.

GUEST OF HONOUR

This being a British SF Convention a British writer is our Guest of Honour. In recent years there has been a trend towards honouring visiting writers, which is fine in itself but has led to a neglect of the greatest talents on our own shores.

Our Guest of Honour this year has been in SF fandom for dot years and has written extensively and brilliantly for fanzines, notably co-authorship of the classic fannish novel The Enchanted Duplicator, reently reprinted in Amazing. In recent years he has blossomed as an SF writer, claiming attention with his superb Nebula-nominated short story Light of Other Days and more recently showing his talent in novels such as "The Two Timers", "Night Walk", "The Palace of Eternity", "Que Million Tomorrows", "Other Days, Other Eyes", and most recently his collection "Tomorrow Lies in Ambush". He also has a high reputation as a witty and perceptive speaker.

Both as a professional writer and as an SF fan we are delighted to welcome as our Guest of Honour:

PROGRAMME

Model competition: we are making a definite announcement of this early in the hope of allowing you more time to plan and build your models, and in the hope of encouraging more people to enter. The competition will be titled "Build a Bem" - this or other beautiful creature for preference, though any science-fictional subject is acceptable. If you would like to enter, please write to:

with a description of your proposed model; he can help with practical advice on construction.

Auctions will be held as in previous years; as always we would be most appreciative of any material you may wish to donate. More details in future PRs.

Films: As I mentioned above, we hope to have projection, screen and sound equipment of professional quality; we will do our best to justify this equipment by showing as many science-fiction films as possible. We will not be showing films or organising any other programme items with a scheduled finishing time after 1 am - to allow, as Ian's first draft put it, "several hours' socialising in the bar without distractions" - and just possibly to allow you to get to sleep without missing anything official.

THE BANQUET

The Banquet this year will see some changes; following complaints about overlong speeches and prizegivings we have decided to shorten the Banquet itself, and some of the ceremonies which would have taken place there will be in the Convention Hall instead, probably at an earlier time during the convention. The meal itself will follow the pattern of previous years; the Royal Station Hotel has a genuinely superior reputation for providing banquets quickly and of high quality. CHILDREN - NURSING CARE

Several people with children who bring them to conventions mention the problem of keeping them amused while the parents attend the programme. We are considering hiring one or two child minders to solve this. The hotel can put aside a room for this purpose; the problem is one of finance so we'd appreciate your letting us know whether you'd like this service and how much you'd be willing to pay per child per day. There will be a questionnaire on this and other subjects in a future Progress Report.

CONVENTION BOOKLET

As this is the 25th Eastercon the convention booklet would be worth keeping for the numerical landmark alone, but we hope to produce a booklet suitable for the occasion. In the past, these have tended to contain relatively insubstantial reading matter

(though there have been honourable exceptions); we aim this year to produce a booklet with enough articles to make it worth reading as a magazine in its own right as well as preserving as a souvenir.
