# Tynecon 74 Progress Report 3 January 1974



Everyone's having some trouble with the energy crisis, but it hasn't hit Tynecon much; I only notice it when I have to come up into a freezing cold bedroom to type this! We don't expect any trouble getting printing done, or getting the usual souvenirs made; nor with the present rules regarding the consumption of electricity. I also hope that none of the combatants in the current disputes want to allow this situation to continue long into the spring. Anyway, we'll see. In reassurance to Southerners with rather fewer commuter trains than usual I would point out that I have seen many Inter-City trains, almost all of which are running punctually but empty because no-one has trusted them. It's still easy to get to Newcastle.

### HOTEL

The hotel is filling up fast; double rooms are almost all taken, but there are still plenty of single and twin rooms left. If you want to be sure of a room in the Royal Station itself it would be as well to book soon. We have made sure that keys are available for each occupant rather than just each room; this is an improvement on many previous hotels.

The hotel, like the Convention, are willing to take cheques but would prefer them backed by a Credit Card or Cheque Card where available. In payment to the Convention for anything other than membership or Banquet tickets, all cheques from private individuals must be backed by cheque card or credit card. Payment for your room will be made direct to the hotel; payment for Banquet tickets will be to us.)

The situation regarding parking is not as black as reported in PR2; there are in fact eleven temporary parking spaces directly in front of the hotel entrance, suitable for unloading. When you arrive please do not leave your car in these places for the duration: longer term parking is available in the Manors multi-storey Car Park about half a mile away, which will be open over Easter and will be pointed out on the map which will be enclosed with PR4.

### PROGRAMME

Most of the programme items and times are now fairly settled, and we feel we have achieved a good balance between SF and fannish discussions.

Because of the long journeys many of you will be making there will be no programme items until 2 pm Friday, when there will be a film; the Chairman's Welcome follows at 3.15 pm and then everything gets under way. We have nothing except films on the Monday either for the same reason; as a result the two-and-a-half days in between are well filled:

On all days there will be half hour coffee breaks morning and afternoon, with an hour and three-quarters each for lunch and dinner. (Remember that the fine Viking Restaurant on the lower ground floor of the hotel will be open; you should find this quickest, easiest, and best.)

Interpolated in these gaps will be the Auctions; any fanzines or books you wish to sell will be most gratefully received.

### Convention Photograph:

On Friday evening a Convention Photograph will be taken. When this is taken we hope to see everybody in the Convention Hall bar none; this will thus be a proper pictorial record. Proofs will be available on the Sunday so that people can order copies.

### Discotheque:

The talk goes on till 10 30 Friday, when the Poetry Soiree starts; then on Saturday evening after a multitude of panels the film starts at 9.30, and finishes at 11 leaving a full hour or more before the Fancy Dress Parade at midnight. During this hour, and after the Parade finishes, there will be a Discotheque in the convention hall; this will not be a loud mindless noise, but will play what we trust will be relatively intelligent music relatively quietly. Don't forget to be getting your Fancy Dress ready — there are only 12 weeks left!

## British Worldcon discussion:

Sunday starts with the BSFA AGM, which is followed after coffee by a discussion period about Future Conventions at which bids are to be made for next year's Easter Convention. During the same period Malcolm Edwards, Pete Weston and Peter Roberts will be asking for everyone's help for our next British Worldcon, of which they are the present bidding committee. This is an idea which the Tynecon Committee thoroughly supports — it is about time there was a British Worldcon, and there are no better three people in England to head our bid.

### V.I.P:

We are delighted to announce that Roger Zelazny is planning to attend Tynecon during his forthcoming trip to England.

### CONVENTION FILMS

We are planning to show five films during the Convention. Of these, three have already been booked and will, barring acts of God, the Post Office or the projector be shown: Slaughterhouse-5, The Cat People, and Son of Kong. Another two are on order: The Omega Man and Creature from the Black Lagoon. There will probably also be some other shorter films.

### BANQUET

Our Banquet tickets are not all sold yet by any means, but they are going well; if you want one don't be slow or you may miss out.

To improve the haphazard seating arrangements of past Banquets and to allow the hotel staff to know who has ordered wine and who hasn't, we will be putting a Seating Plan up by the registration desk which you will fill in as you register. We will be asking non-tipplers to try to keep together in small blocks, but not on a completely separate table; this is a compromise between sociability and sheer practicability for the staff.

### PHOTO COMPETITION

Photos or groups of photos are welcome for this; they can be on either science fictional or fannish subjects. They will be displayed either in the Art Room, the Convention Hall, or on the first floor foyer, and a ballot box will will be beside them; the most popular will receive a prize.

# THE DR. A.R. WEIR MEMORIAL AWARD, Easter 1974

Who... was 'Doc' Weir?

A fan: a schoolteacher, who came to fandom late in life, with a keen interest in both science fiction and fantasy, who enjoyed participating in many facets of SF fandom. He helped to get the infant B.S.F.A. on its feet

corresponded with a considerable number of fans and wrote scholarly and entertaining articles for their fanzines, was an active Cheltenham S.F. Circle member, and attended Conventions, where his talks were programme highlights.

What... is the Award?

A goblet: inscribed with the names of past winners, and held for a year; and a signed certificate, suitable for framing.

How... is the winner chosen?

By you: the award is not given for any specific activity, but for things in general — the Award should go to the person you think most deserves it. There is no restriction on whom it may be given to: it does not have to be a member of the B.S.F.A. or of the Convention. By tradition, it usually goes to a fan whose activities for fandom have not been previously honoured, so a list of previous winners is given for you on the voting paper. Voting is kept secret — only the winner's name is announced.

### TOLKIEN FESTIVAL IN '75

I'm asking you out there to consider the idea of a Tolkien Festival to be held in conjunction with Eastercon '75. With only scads of help from a handful of people in England, and the Eastercon '75 Committee, whover they are, it can be done; since I said it could be done, I offer to try and do it. Some reasons for picking Eastercon '75: I agree that a full con on Tolkien is just not possible, especially since I live in Italy. A tribute to Professor Tolkien should be made, but in order to cut down the organisational requirements, I can best do it in conjunction with another con. In order to get international participation one needs lead time and a time when an interested party can travel. There are few holidays which coincide in different countries. and Easter is one of them. There is simply not enough time to do the programme justice for Tynecon, and Novacon is an impossible time for most persons living outside England. As to where, that is up to whoever is putting on Eastercon '75. If the Con Committee sees fit to choose someone from the committee or the area for the task of putting this together, I pledge to give him or her my utmost support. Please keep this in mind and let us discuss it at Tynecon.

I am also willing to serve as the nexus for suggestions and comments on the Tolkien Memorial Award to be given at future Worldcons, probably beginning at Melbourne in '75.
