An Appreciation



I have learned a great deal about writing from Stephen R. Donaldson, and about reading, too. I first became acquainted with his work while in college. I snagged *Lord Foul's Bane* from the University of Vermont bookstore. I was wary and only bought the first book of his trilogy because I didn't want to get stuck with three books if I didn't like the first one.

First Lesson: Don't wait, buy them all, he's that good.

I skipped classes to read the first *Thomas Covenant* trilogy – something I never would have done for a mere mortal author. Those books grabbed me from the first and just sucked me straight into the world of *The Land*. (And getting the flu and becoming feverish during the reading, well, focused delirium can be so much fun!) I wolfed those books down and, in the following years as the new volumes came out, I purchased them in hardback despite working a minimum wage job.

Second lesson: most readers don't get the point.

In talking with readers about Steve's books, I've pretty much found that they love them or hate them, and the touchstone of hate occurs very early on in the first. A lot of readers develop a hatred for *Thomas Covenant* because of an early incident and some of them would tell me, "Donaldson's a bad writer, I just hate his work so. How could he do that?"

What those readers are missing is this: if Steve was a bad writer, they wouldn't have cared. They wouldn't have gotten involved enough to actually hate what happened. It is precisely because Steve is just so damned good that readers *do* care so much and do get involved in the work.

Third lesson: for writers, there's no easy way out.

Steve's books push the readers and the characters and, I suspect, even Steve to the breaking point. They have an intensity that a writer can't create without working as hard as possible to explore new territory, both in himself and in the world he's created. Steve makes a lot of demands on his readers and characters, but it always

pays off. After pages and pages of angst that really gets inside a reader, when he provides catharsis, WOW!

This intensity, and ability to draw the reader in very deeply, is a hallmark of Steve's work. It raises the books above so many others in the various genres in which he writes, and is daunting enough that while many folks seek to xerox Tolkien, no one has the guts to try to match their work against his. It certainly is high praise to be good enough to be imitated, and yet higher to be so good no one dares accept the challenge.

Stephen R. Donaldson is, as you will discover this weekend, a man who is very bright and capable of discussing science fiction and fantasy from a literary point of view, or the point of view of a reader who loves the genres. He has a keen and often very wry sense of humor and a taste for good cigars. He's a thoughtful man who is very approachable, so avail yourself of this opportunity to get to know him and gain some insights into his wonderful work.

Biography

Born in 1947 in Cleveland, Ohio, Stephen R. Donaldson lived in India (where his father was a medical missionary) until 1963. He graduated from the College of Wooster (Ohio) in 1968, served two years as a conscientious objector during the Vietnam War, doing hospital work in Akron, then attended Kent State University, where he received his M.A. in English in 1971.

After dropping out of his Ph.D. program and moving to New Jersey, Donaldson made his publishing debut with the first *Covenant* trilogy in 1977. That enabled him to move to New Mexico.

The novels for which he is best known have received a number of awards. However, the achievements of which he is most proud are the ones that seemed the most unlikely. In 1993 he received a Doctor of Literature degree from the College of Wooster, and in 1994 he gained a black belt in Shotokan karate from Sensei Mike Heister and Anshin Personal Defense.

Having recently completed the five-book, seven-year *Gap* sequence of novels, Donaldson spent quite some time "on vacation." However, he has now returned to work. His next book will be a second collection of short fiction, *Reave the Just and Other Tales*.

Artist Guest of Honor Mitchell Davidson Bentley

I am honestly not sure how I came to know Mitch. You know, it all starts to run together after almost two decades of cons. You got to a con, and suddenly, you realize... people have just materialized in your life. You can go to Worldcon, strike up a conversation and not see that person for a year and at next Worldcon, pick up that conversation where it left off. Mitch is one of those people. And I got to know him from "those conversations."



First, before I get funny (or try to) the straight talk. Mitchell (by the way, I could never be called "Robert", but Mitch doesn't mind "Mitchell" at all) is one heck of an artist. He's the Consummate Bohemian. What that means I don't know, but somehow that applies to Mitchell. He's always looking at art and learning from it, applying what he's learned to his own works. He's experimenting... making airbrushes do things they don't normally do. His astronomical art is imaginative and a fresh break from some of the "facts & figures" stuff you always see. Okay, he does the traditional "rocks & balls" as well. If there is one thing Mitch has it's rocks & balls. There are always unexpected textures and colors in Mitchell's paintings. And often, he'll work horizontally... a break from the typical "paperback format."

Mitch is one of those people you never know where he'll turn up. And, you know he's there before you even see him...it's that white "Mitchmobile" with "Tomorrow's Fine Art...Today!®" emblazoned on the side, at least it was when I last saw it. I saw it zipping through the streets of Atlanta once! Mitch is one of the best marketers I have ever seen, a rarity with artists.

You also can see Mitch before he's coming with those Hawaiian shirts. You can be rounding a corner in a hallway and suddenly your mind is aglow with colors they haven't seen since *The Summer of Love*. Don't worry, it isn't a flashback. It's probably Mitch.

There are Guys and there are Cool Guys. Mitch is a Cool Guy. He's a blast to hang out with at the con, slinking around to parties. And Mitch isn't a guy with nothing to say. He's an intellectual and a great listener. Lots of people don't listen. They wait to talk. Mitch LISTENS. And thinks about what he wants to say. You can tell he is doing this... he cocks his head to one side, opens his mouth,

slightly sometimes so you can see his tongue over to one side and after a long time he'll start off with, "Okaaay, your point is...." I remember a Dragoncon where we'd hit some party in the wee hours and there was comic book giant Jim Steranko right there in front of us. Well, Mitch, Jim, and I went into a "Testosterone Digression" (politically correct term for "guy talk") that somehow segued into ancient Greek design theories. The talk went from everyday household appliances to the foundations of Grecian culture. I honestly felt like I was in the dialogue of a Quentin Tarantino film. But that's what happens to conversations when Mitch is around.

Other than a love of art, we also share Great Hair. Mitch presented the Best Pro Artist Hugo Worldcon in San Antonio. He got to give it to yours truly. What a blast! Everyone was saying, "All we saw was hair—two guys and lots of hair." If you saw any close-up pictures, we were both in hysterics. I forget why. Everything just seemed sort of funny at the time.

Mitch is a great artist, great friend and a Great Artist Guest of Honor!

Biography

Raised by an artist, Mitchell Bentley, great-grand-nephew of first woman astronomer Maria Mitchell, has been painting professionally since 1989. Although he specializes in astronomical representationalism in oils and acrylics, his work also includes fantasy pieces, abstracts and surrealism. Mitchell maintained a display at the Robert Fields Gallery in his hometown of Tulsa for over five years, and exhibited in the Tulsa co-op gallery, Arts. Ltd. for a year. He has sold and won awards at conventions from coast to coast since 1991. A frequent guest at cons, often demonstrating acrylic airbrush painting, he has appeared as Artist Guest of Honor at four cons in 1995 and 96, and demonstrated at the Triple Conjunction Planetarium Conference in 1993. He also has been accepted into nationally juried mainstream art shows in the five-state region for several years and has received recognition there as well. Commissioned by American Airlines to paint three pieces for the viewing room at their newly remodeled SABRE network command center, his work has also been published internationally by Companion Games and seen in *Scribe* Magazine. Mitchell is a lifetime member and a past Director-At-Large of the national Association of Science Fiction & Fantasy Artists, and former president of the oldest artists' organization in Tulsa, the Tulsa Artists Guild. Dedicated to expanding interest in the infinite possibilities of the universe which surrounds our world, Mitchell's paintings portray colorful vistas of unknown habitats and awe-inspiring phenomena which mankind may yet discover on its journey outward to the stars.

Mojo

Mojo is one of the luckiest science-fiction fans I know. In the years I've known him, he's progressed from a fledgling artist at an unknown computer graphics company to a senior CG supervisor with over five years of work on some of the finest television science fiction ever to his credit.



It is not just that he has a dream job at Foundation Imaging, creating computer generated visual effects elements for *Star Trek*. No, what makes Mojo special is the fact that he KNOWS how lucky he is, and how important the work is.

Now, this may not seem like such a big deal. But it is. The nature of episodic television production is little short of brutal for everyone involved. Television and film production is a continuous balancing act of time versus money versus quality. Focus too much on any one aspect, and you'll cause the others to suffer. Do THAT too much, and you're out of a job. Trying to stay employed means a continuous mad scramble to keep deadlines at bay while trying to stay on budget. Oh, and while you're at it, see if you can do some cool work that satisfies the artistic requirements of your producers and directors. Even for the best of us, this is a sure formula for stress and burnout.

How does Mojo avoid this sorry fate? In one word: Insanity. Mojo is insanely committed with his work, even under the pressures of television production. I think you can tell by looking at the finished product. Every shot that Mojo is involved with has a little something "extra" in it that another, saner person might not bother with. In most cases, these are little things: a little extra detailing or a little extra time put into lighting, or a slightly more dynamic motion, or a slightly richer texture map, things that you might not really notice on screen. Little things, but over the course of an entire episode, they add up to a LOT of late nights and weekends that you might otherwise be able to spend at home or with friends. Insanity, but insanity that has benefited two different star fleets.

This is not to say that Mojo's entire life is consumed with his work, although one suspects he may think so at

times. Mojo has earned something of a reputation as a party animal, and one has only to look around his living room to realize that he was probably Elvis in a previous life. Or at least, an Elvis impersonator.

Still, Mojo hasn't lost sight of the fact that he started out writing articles for *Starlog Magazine*. As one of the pioneers of the computer graphics revolution in the visual effects industry, Mojo still takes time to offer advice and encouragement to those hoping to follow in his footsteps. He writes a regular column in *NewTechniques* magazine, offering an insider's perspective to those trying to break into the business.

Most of all, Mojo somehow always seems to keep in mind the reason why he got into this business in the first place. He's a fan, and he loves the sense of wonder that science fiction engenders. That's probably why he's able to keep fighting for cool stuff, despite deadlines, discouragement, budgets, and the thousand other things that conspire against quality in media s-f. That's why he's one of the luckiest people I know. And that's why his particular brand of insanity is not insane at all.

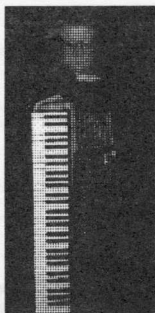
Special Filk Guest Jeffrey Hitchin

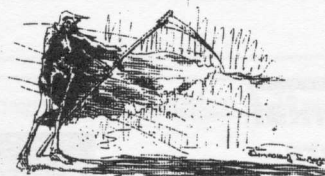

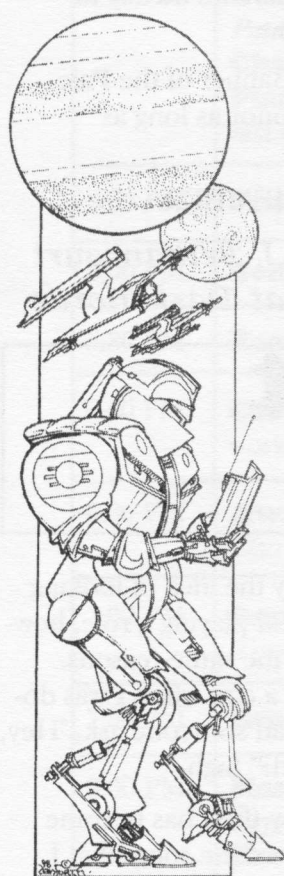
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From the Chair

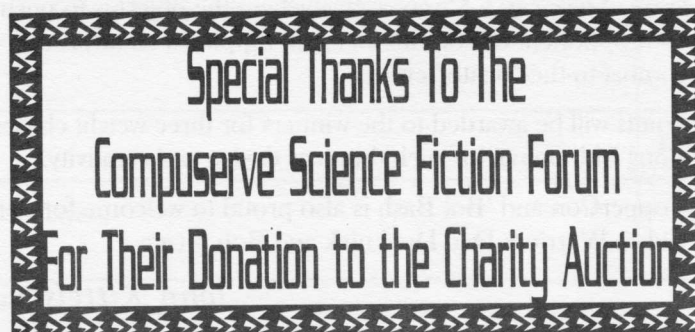

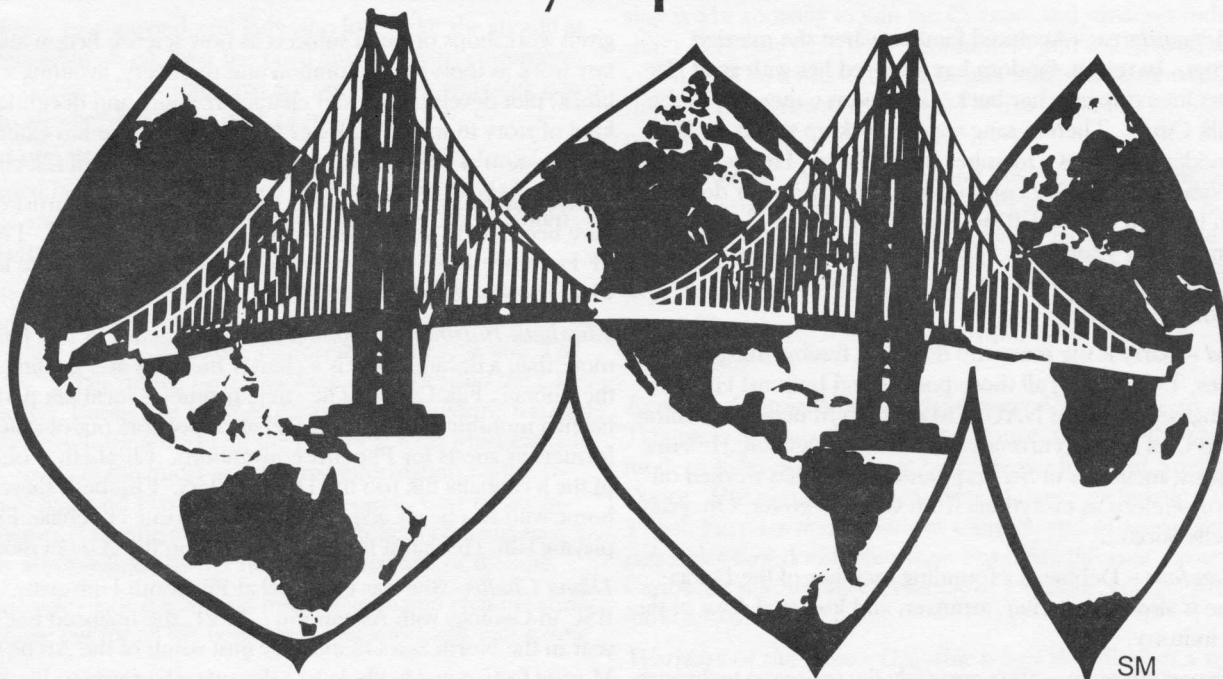

Currently she spends about half her time taking synoptic magnetic observations of the sun, and the other half of her time doing the everyday things to keep the facility running, including helping the visiting PIs, repairing things, keeping necessary items stocked, etc. In her free time, she owns "Andalusians del Sol," a horse-breeding farm where she has 6 purebred Andalusian horses. She also enjoys hiking, reading, and ham radio, and bicycling.

Jeff Bohnhoff - Jeff and his wife, Maya stumbled into filk fandom by complete accident a few years ago. Maya was attending a convention as a professional author and the couple discovered filk. Since Jeff and Maya were already musicians, songwriters, and producers of obvious and rare talent, it was a simple matter to corrupt them into becoming filkers. Jeff's wacky parody lyrics to rock and roll standards such as "Hotel California," "Nights in White Satin," and "Rocket Man" rival the best of Weird Al's parodies. When he turns his attention to completely original material, the beauty of his music is rivaled only by the power of his guitar instrumentals.

Maya Kaathryn Bohnhoff - Maya is addicted to writing speculative fiction. For this, she blames her father, who let her watch *The Day the Earth Stood Still* at the tender age of six. She is the author of four fantasy novels and a smorgasbord of short fiction that appears in *Analog*, *Century*, *Amazing Stories*, and *Interzone*. She is a member of the dreaded *Analog* MAFIA (Making Appearances Frequently in *Analog*). Her novels are *The Meri*, *Taminy*, *The Crystal Rose*, and *The Spirit Gate*. While writing fiction is her true passion, Maya also writes and performs both filk and original music with her husband, Jeff. Maya has participated as a mentor in writers' workshops; lectured on the subject of writing science fiction and fantasy for writer's groups, business organizations and schools;

given workshops on such subjects as how science fiction and fantasy work as tools for exploration and discovery, avoiding writer's block, plot development and characterization, and deciding what kind of story to write. With her husband, Jeff, she has extended her participation at convention to the after-dark world of filk circles.

R. Merrill Bollerud has this to say: "I am a jeweler/artist/designer, have been for 18 years. My business name is SolTerra. I've been a SF Fan since 1957, and I co-published 2 *Trekzines* in the late 70s while living in England."

Elizabeth Burnham - Elizabeth has been active in Filk fandom for more than a decade. She is a charter member and guiding force of the Phoenix Filk Circle. The circle promotes local filk performers, hosting monthly get-togethers and also sponsors out-of-state performers as guests for Phoenix conventions. Elizabeth is one-third of the a cappella filk trio the Duras Sisters. Elizabeth shares her home with two newly acquired felines and one chocolate Frisbee playing lab. Her latest filk song is based on the *X-Files* movie.

Diana Challis - She was educated at Plymouth University with a BSC in Geology with Astronomy. At 21, she financed her MS by a year in the North Sea Oil industry (just south of the Arctic Circle.) Moving from a wet hellhole to a dry one, she came to Phoenix in 1992. She graduated with an MS Planetary Geology from ASU in 1997. She is currently assisting Galileo Mission SSI team at ASU in data analysis and education outreach.

Joseph Collins - He has a Bachelor of Arts and Master's Degree from Fordham University in New York City. His one-act play, *The Elephants' Graveyard*, was awarded second place in a playwrighting contest sponsored by the New York City Department of Cultural Affairs. Joseph has over twenty-five years in the mental health field as a clinical social worker and as an administrator of a mental health program. His interest extraterrestrial and study of UFOs has lead to *Galaxy Seven*, his first published novel.

Pat Connors - Patrick Connors has been selling custom buttons at conventions for over ten years. Since he's in the Dealers' Room anyway, he's in his third year as CopperCon Dealers' Room Liaison. In addition to all that, he plays the Town Crier at the Arizona Renaissance Festival, and has been seen juggling at the Robin Hood Festival in Nottingham, England. He also publishes the webzine *Alien Wine Connoisseur*. When he has time, he goes to the river and falls out of kayaks. To pay for all of this fun, he argues with (and sometimes writes about) computers.

GiGi Dane - Gigi has this to say about herself: "I'm an area fan for the past 20 years and have been involved in many conventions in many capacities—most recently as Chairpirate of CorsairCon VI. I am a member of the Corsairs as Quartermaster of Carnifex. I am also an aspiring writer who receives many encouraging rejection slips for my short stories. I was a member of Adam Niswander's group and have taken it over since his departure two years ago." She's also a charter member of CASFS, and is a lifetime dues-paid member.

Dan Danknick - Dan has hand-built and competed robots in the international Robot Wars competition for three years, winning the middleweight title in 1996. A graduate of UC Irvine as an applied

physicist, he makes his living as an embedded software engineer, most recently working on a new animation control system for Walt Disney Imagineering. Other recent credits include the implementation of an official *X-Files* movie website, robot consultation on the upcoming movie *Software*, internationally published magazine articles on robots and their builders, and four software patents. Dan is married and lives in southern California.

Dan DeLong - Dan is Rotary Rocket's chief propulsion engineer.

Emily Devenport - Emily is the author of six novels: *Shade*, *Larissa*, *Scorpienne*, *EggHeads*, *The Kronos Condition*, and *God-Heads* (released April 1998). Her short stories have appeared in *Aboriginal SF*, whose readers voted her a Boomerang Award, as well as the *Full Spectrum* anthology and *Asimov's SF Magazine*. She is currently at work on three new novel proposals. She is married to writer/artist Ernest Hogan.

Chris Dickenson - Chris is one third of the a capella filk trio The Duras Sisters, who have two CD's available from Dandelion Digital, *Masquerading as Human* and *Rubenesque*. The Duras Sisters specialize in original media-inspired music characterized by rich harmonies and dynamic arrangements. Chris is also a Fan-Q award winning fanzine author and former editor of the *Star Trek* fanzines *Eridani*, *Haven*, and *Beyond the Farthest Star*. Co-conspirator on numerous Not Ready For Warp Speed Players scripts and script adaptations, she is also an active member of the Not Ready For Warp Speed Players troupe.

Craig Dyer - Lord Craig of the Whitecliffs, as he is often known, can usually be found at cons accompanied by several large, white, wooden ammunition chests, in which he keeps a generous supply of homemade vodka-based cordials. He combines the spirit of a vintner with the showmanship of a low-key P.T. Barnum, as he joyfully discusses the ingredients and watches the pleasure on the faces of his (new and long-held) fannish friends. In the real world, he is a highly proficient computer techie for the Maricopa County Community College District, an ardent player/collector of RPGs and collector card games, owned by numerous cats, dogs, and ferrets, and hailed as a generally pleasant fellow.

Marycileen Flanagan - Marycileen began costuming at the tender age of eight when she attempted to make a papier-mâché horse for her jockey "character" to ride on Halloween. Since then she's advanced to costuming live horses and their riders as part of the *Once Upon a Time* and *Life of the Party* parade groups. After this fourth generation native Tempean graduated from Texas A&M with a BA/BS in English (and a minor in genetics), she entered the work force as a professional costume designer for the ASU Department of Dance. The author of several articles and poems published in small-circulation horse magazines, she is currently an English teacher at Tempe High School where she sponsors both the Creative Writing Club and the Literary Society (reading club) and sometimes teaches science. In her "copious amounts of spare time" she breeds Appaloosa and Walkaloosa horses and is (herself, not contracted out) building a house/ranch.

Dr. Laura Freas - An illustrator for *Analog*, *TSR*, *The Easton Press*, and other science fiction magazines and books, Laura received ASFA's Chesley Award in 1990. She is a morning drive announcer for the commercial all-classical music station, KKHI AM & FM in San Francisco. She is an award-winning costumer, founder of the [San Francisco] Bay Area

English Regency, a past President of the Southern California Early Music Society, a founder of the Collinsport [*Dark Shadows* Festivals] Players, and has been a judge of the Illustrators of the Future Contest.

Nancy Freeman - Born in Tacoma, Nan gave up her career as a pickle sorter to become a successful systems engineer, ex-belly dancer, and 'unidentified musical phenomenon.' A familiar face on the Phoenix acoustic circuit, she has been compared to Kate Bush, Ray Bradbury, Emily Dickinson and Nietzsche -and frankly doesn't see the resemblance. She has two albums out, *Anchored to the Wind* and *Logick*.

Alan Gutierrez - A graduate of Art Center College of Design, Alan has been doing SF & F book covers for 15 years. So far, he's done about 250 covers and interiors for books and magazines. His latest book cover is for TSR's *Forgotten Realms* series called *The Dream Spheres*. He has a wife, Rhonda, and daughters Rachel and Monica, and has been living in Sedona since 1986.

Diana Gabaldon - Diana is the author of the recent New York Times bestseller, *Drums Of Autumn*. *Drums* is the fourth book in a series that started with the time-travel classic, *Outlander*, and continued with the award-winning *Dragonfly In Amber* and *Voyager*. The best-selling series chronicles the adventures of twentieth-century nurse/physician Claire Randall and her eighteenth-century Highland lover, Jamie Fraser.

Diana holds two graduate degrees in science (M.S in Marine Biology [Scripps Institution of Zoology], Ph.D. in Ecology [Northern Arizona University]) and spent a dozen years as a university professor with an expertise in scientific computation before starting to write fiction. In addition to her novels, she has written scientific articles for biological journals, worked as an editor on the MacMillan *Encyclopedia Of Computers*, founded the scientific-computation journal *Science Software Quarterly*, and written numerous comic-book stories for Walt Disney.

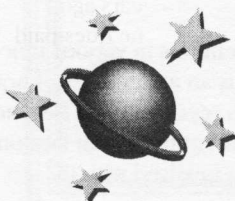

His articles, short stories, book reviews, illustrations, and cartoons have appeared in *Amazing Stories*, *Different Worlds*, *Penthouse Hot Talk*, and *Science Fiction Age*, among others. "The Great Crater Hop" will appear in a forthcoming issue of the children's magazine *Spider*. Check out his cybergonzo



thriller, *Brainpan Fallout*, available online in *The Red Dog Journal* (www.senselessbeauty.com/hogan). Lately he's been working on a detective novel, projects concerning dinosaurs, corrupting the youth of today, and making sacrifices to Xochiquetzal, the goddess of creativity, and Yacatechutli, the god of intertribal trade. He lives in Phoenix, with his wife Emily Devenport, Boomerang Award winner, author of many novels about tough girls on rough planets, and the now-on-sale *Godheads*

Sharan Hoyle – Sharan has been active, mostly behind the scenes, in putting on conventions for the last 8 years in Phoenix. She is best known for her talents as a dresser (Give her a can of hair spray and your hair will stay in place through gale force winds.) and her two granddaughters, Jessica and Jazzmin.

Aleta Jackson – Aleta has been a space development nut case involved in the aerospace field for most of her life. It's all Robert Heinlein's fault, of course. Pete Manly – Pete is a physicist, astronomer, aviator, writer of nonfiction and fiction, and an amateur historian.

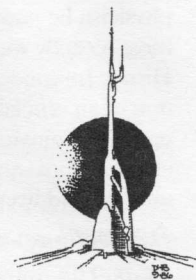

Alice Massoglia – Alice has worked conventions in various functions at local, regional and national levels, is an avid reader of both hard science fiction and fantasy (along with mysteries and Regency romances), a book dealer, and has been parenting kids in fandom since 1976. Milly McCloskey - Milly says, "I'm a retired schoolteacher—35 years and still have all my marbles! Sold my horse farm in New Jersey and moved to Arizona October 1989, wanted to move back to New Jersey June 1990 (122 degrees not acceptable). Stuck it out and have adjusted nicely. Spend my time now researching and writing about medieval military history, gardening and taking care of my Koi pond. I live with my Shih Tzu, Jenghiz Khan, seven Koi and 1 fat goldfish."

Beverly Metevia - Beverly is a long time fan of SF who has just recently returned to the Phoenix area. She has 18 years of experience in journalism, including 10 years as a newspaper editor.

Adam Niswander - is the author of *The Charm*, *The Serpent Slayers*, and *The Hound Hunters*, collectively called *The Shaman Cycle*. *The Sand Dwellers* is his fourth published novel set in Arizona. M&M Publishing plans to publish his fifth novel, *The Repository*, in 1999. He freelances genre articles and reviews to magazines. He is married to Jo Webber, and they live in Phoenix, Arizona, with a bunch of cats and a fat rabbit.

Janeen O'Kerry - Janeen is the author of two romantic fantasy novels: *Lady Of Fire* and *Queen Of The Sun*, both from Leisure LoveSpell. 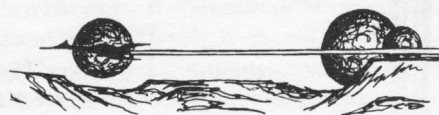

Catherine has done extensive research for a novel on the historical King Macbeatha of Scotland, and is in the midst of gathering information on the Israelite kings Saul and David for another project.
