



David M. Weber; The Man, The Myth, The Legend in His Own Mind

I came to meet David Weber about 5 or 6 years ago at a number of different southern conventions. A lot of the people whose opinion I respect told me that I had to give this man a try because he wrote a great yarn. I started out on MUTINEERS' MOON and was hooked instantly. That led me to the first Honor Harrington novel, ON BASILISK STATION. And that my friends is when the addiction started. I became a David Weber book junky and have to wait impatiently for my next Honor Fix.

When I first met David in person, he seemed vaguely familiar to me. Like I knew him, or someone like him. It was driving me crazy until one day he mentioned Mike, his brother. Then it hit me. His brother is Mike Weber, the Atlanta Fan that I had known for over 20 years. Duhhh! And then I took a look at him and realized that he even looked like his brother. Cleaned up and more civilized, but still a Weber to the core. David was recently married to a lovely lady by the name of Sharon. Now Sharon is not a fan, but she does have a warped sense of humor. At their wedding, she had the violinist breakout into the refrains of the Star Wars Theme as they walked down the aisle of the church after the ceremony. My kind of woman. Over the years, Sharon and my wife Linda have become friends. For years, I have called Linda, "She Who Must Be Obeyed!" Now according to David, Sharon has adopted the title of, "She Who Must Be Obeyed in Greenville!" But there is nothing wrong with that because people with



personalities like David [and myself] do need a keeper from time to time and our wives go out of their way to keep us both humble. David and myself found out that we shared another passion other than strong willed women. A passion that will drive an intelligent man to the brink of insanity at times. We both love to play SPADES. David M. Weber Bio

David M. Weber was born in Cleveland Ohio on October 24, 1952, and raised in South Carolina. In 1998 he married Sharon Rice-Weber. His hobbies include pistol and rifle marksmanship, role-playing games, miniatures painting, and war gaming, both historical and Sci-fi.

Since leaving college David has always supported himself as a writer. His first novel, Insurrection (written with Steve White) is set in the <u>Starfire</u> gaming universe making use of the future history he created for the game. Currently he is involved in updating <u>Starfire</u>, a sci-fi naval combat game. for Task Force Games. David's interest in military and diplomatic history coupled with his interest in war-gaming has made military science fiction a natural choice.

David prefers to think of himself as a story-teller and feels the primary function of a writer is to entertain his readers. He feels a writer should always be aware of how his personal values affect his writing. First and foremost a writer should enjoy what he does and share that enjoyment with his readers. The central theme in his work is 'responsibility' and he writes about the kind of people he likes, strong, competent, responsible human beings. Honor Harrington is one of his best known, strong, female characters.

Brett F. Bass - Artist GoH

An Appreciation by John Theisen

I don't actually know Brett Bass. Which sorta kinda works, since I also don't write appreciations—as a rule. Yet I've often seen Bass's works at cons, admired them for at least five years, and am the proud owner of a Bass print. (Note: I don't buy the work of very many artists.) And he does Good Stuff. Thus, this is as much an appreciation of Bass's art as of himself.

What little I do know about Bass is that he (1) lives in Oklahoma City; (2) enjoys Masquerades; (3) can paint incredibly quickly, if/when the mood suits, (4) sounds mellow to work with; (5) comes to cons prepared.

When I think of a Brett Bass piece, the first thought that comes to mind is aircraft. Apropos, for someone whose email address is avartist a and come. (He paints other things too, like cars, but he's probably most well known for doing Good Airplanes.) Some of his best work looks like photo-realism rather than skilled airbrush or another medium. State-of-the-art fighters flying in tight formation, with contrails and impressive nose art. Technical art that also just happens to be pretty to look at for its own sake.

But the one Bass piece I fell in love with was of a 20s era Ford Trimotor. It is idly parked on a wet landing strip, with trees in the background, overshadowed by a massive skyful of intensely black violent-looking stormelouds. The toy-like three-engined plane

looks so very small and fragile against the harshness of the weather, yet even so, there is hope: one tiny pocket of blue sky can be seen. (Since the ground is already wet, perhaps the storm has moved through and clear flying will be possible soon?) In the broadest scheme, it is Man vs. Nature or Technology vs. the Elements—and it struck a chord in me. (I bought it as a gift for my dad, a former single-engine VFR pilot.) "Tri Motor" may not be Bass's most sophisticated work, nor his most exciting/dramatic, but it is romantic. Not quite the right era airplane for ("asablanca, yet I wouldn't be too surprised to see the likeness of Bogart or Bacall stepping down from the ramp onto the runway. And whether you prefer cutting-edge warbirds or civilian "aeroplanes" from a half-dozen decades earlier, you should find something to your taste in Bass's repertoire.

In any event, I look forward to meeting and chatting with the talented man who stands behind this high-flying airbrush. Please join me this weekend in recognizing Brett Bass, CopperCon 19's Artist Guest of Honor, Just—don't try to sell him any vinyl siding.




Brett Bass Bio

Born in November of '61. Brett spent his early years in Houston, TX, where he was introduced to the space program. As he was one to doodle extensively in his early years instead of doing schoolwork, it was only natural for him to start drawing spacecraft. From science fact it was only a short step to sci/fi fantasy, which took off in high school in the late '70s, when Brett picked up his first copy of Heavy Metal. Drawing and painting sci-fi/fantasy subjects for years with no audience was put to an end by a good friend and mentor. Robert "JR" Daniels, JR encouraged and introduced Brett to the sci-fi/fantasy world in the early '90s. Since then, Brett has been active in the Midwest sci-fi art scene He is vice president of the Oklahoma Aviation Artists Association.

Mitchell Burnside Clapp Bio

Mitchell Burnside Clapp is a well known figure in filk. He has won the Pegasus for Best Performance from the Ohio Valley Filk Festival and is noted for the filk "Red Star. Rising" which is a song about the Russian and American space programs. His most well-known work is "Falling on New Jersey" which has spawned many parodies.

Along with a Master's degree in Aeronautics and Astronautics from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology Mitchell also holds degrees in Physics, Engineering and Russian and is a graduate of the US Air Force Test Pilot School. The author of numerous technical papers on various subjects in the area of space transportation, Burnside Clapp was the inventor of the concept of aerial propellant transfer to enable horizontal takeoff-horizontal landing, single stage to orbit space planes. He led the design effort at the US Air Force's Phillips Lab which developed the first such design for this type of vehicle, the 'Black Horse' rocketplane. He then was responsible for presenting this concept to numerous high level decision making bodies and study groups throughout the Air Force, resulting the strong recommendation by the Air Force's 'Spacecast 2020' study that a trans-atmospheric rocketplane be developed for military purposes. Burnside Clapp has flown over forty different types of military and civilian aircraft, and is the only person outside McDonnell Douglas trained to fly the DC-X single stage research demonstration vehicle

Mitchell has been married to T.J. Burnside Clapp since 1989 and they have two children

She also rides, shows, and judges horses, is looking for the perfect part-time job (she's a skilled medical transcriptionist), and spends as much time as she can with her three children and two grandchildren.

Dawn Taylor is a professional psychic; she has been a Tarot reader and spiritual councilor for 15 years. She currently does psychic consultations at the Book Exchange Plus on Bell Road, and readings for several entertainment companies. She's an avid science fiction fan with a particular interest in media; her favorite how is Farscape and she loves all the incarnations of Trek. Other interests include the Renaissance Festival, where she models chain maille.

John Theisen is a regular at Arizona science-fiction conventions; he's been involved in fandom since 1981. Writing credits include products and articles for the SF RPG industry, poetry, and various non-fiction pieces. 




