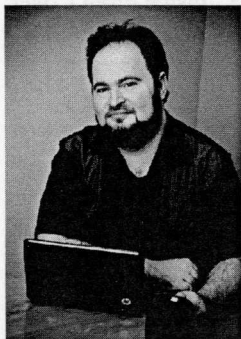

Ari Marmell - Author Guest of Honor



Ari Marmell, Fava Beans And A Nice Chianti

Ari Marmell's name is on a very short list of people whose brains I plan to eat when they die. Don't tell him I said this. I don't want to creep him out. But he just does what he does so well, and I'm hoping some of that will absorb through my gastrointestinal system.

Ari writes fantasy fiction. Lots of people do that, sure. But what he does that's so magnificent, so hard to get right but so good when you do, is find a way to blend the humor and the horror so neither trips over the other or lifts you out of the story. I used to think it was a chiefly British quality that we Americans couldn't emulate – that ability to make you laugh one minute and cry the next and giggle the one after that – that typifies shows like Doctor Who or the better films of Monty Python. But Ari was born in New York and lives in

Texas, so there you go. Maybe he ate somebody British's brain?

It isn't that his work is comedic – I don't really “do” “comedic fantasy” and that would be just as wrong a label to slap on him as it would be to affix to Fritz Leiber or Joe Abercrombie or Scott Lynch – authors with whom he shares some commonalities. It's more that Ari understands that real life, whether tragic or merry, is always a mix of pain and pleasure blended with more than a dash of the absurd. His books are fun, funny, gritty, violent (sometimes extremely so), realistic (in their complex portrayal of human nature), absurd and fantastical, all in equal measure. Whether writing about the not-fully-reformed dark lord Corvis Rebaine, or Creosh the orc, or Widdershins the thief with the god in her head, Ari makes you care about the most unlikely characters. He made me weep for Belrotha the Ogre, for crying out loud!

Ari also has a lifelong affiliation with role playing games, both as a player and as a contributor, working for outfits like White Wolf and Wizards of the Coast. Sometimes critics will complain that of a fantasy work (not Ari's!) that they can “hear the dice rolling.” It's a snotty thing to say when you find out a writer has an RPG background and you are trying to be clever. In my experience (and I've been editing books and stories for twelve years now), writers with extensive backgrounds as either gamers or game developers tend to have the most unbounded imaginations, and they tend to write with the full arsenal of fantasy iconography at their disposal. So you can bet they'll be elves and orcs and demons and goblins and dark lords and (anti)heroes in good measure – all that stuff we pretend to be embarrassed about but really love – only they'll be remixed into a thoroughly relevant, modern, dare I say sophisticated, and delightfully fun book.

Ari is also just a really nice guy. Fun, sweet, considerate, self-effacing. It's an honor to be one of his editors, and the once-a-year or so we get together really isn't enough. I wish I could see him more often, but hopefully that will all change when I eat his brain.

James Owen - Author-Artist Guest of Honor

James Owen is one of the people one meets far too infrequently in life. I remember meeting James for the first time nearly two decades ago—when I was still young and he was a bit younger. He was writing, drawing and publishing *Starchild* then, and was full of grand plans. At that time, because of my involvement with the gaming industry, I'd met many a young person full of grand plans; and more often than not, those plans tended to fizzle and disappoint.

The difference with James is that he was confident beyond his years. He wasn't afraid of failing, either; and learning from failure. James has been very upfront about ventures that haven't quite gone the way he would like. He doesn't, as a lot of folks do, dwell on the circumstances

that doomed him, or the people that screwed him over, but focuses on how he can do things better. And then he does.

I take great joy and delight in seeing James at shows. He still has that youthful wonder and enthusiasm that life tends to beat out of folks. I especially love the way he interacts with his fans. Their eyes, and I'm not just referring to children now, light up as his do. He has the gift of sharing not only his imagination, but nurturing theirs. There is no doubt in any of their minds, after they've spoken with him, that they, too, can find a way to love what they do and be successful at it.

Getting to see James grow creatively has been fantastic. The journey from artist to graphic novelist to novelist is not an easy one. A simple line drawn well can tell more of a story than a page of text. The placement of panels on a page in a graphic novel communicates more than a whole series of chapters. Graphic novels are stories told in mirrors, but narrative novels don't have the reader looking at the mirror, but being on the other side of the mirror, looking out through the reflection's eyes.

I've made the transition the other way which, I think, is easier. Already knowing what's going on in the head of a character, I have to tell an artist what expression to paint on his face, and then put a few words in his mouth. In writing a novel, however, I have to dwell inside the characters head, sharing every thought, drawing every conclusion. It's the difference, in many ways, between writing a maths answer on the blackboard and having to show your work.

James has managed to do that, and do it successfully. He's also made the third transition, from being an entertainer to becoming a teacher. I think that nurturing side was always there, but hidden by humility. How can you presume to teach when you realize you're still learning. But with his success, and with realizing how his work is touching people, his confidence moves into this third realm.

I dearly wish I could be there this weekend, both to spend time with James and to learn from him. You'll just have to soak that extra time for me, and I guarantee you will be the better for it.

Patrick Conners -Fan Guest of Honor

Probably having a bowel movement. The smell from my prison often had that effect on animals, like they thought they could one-up the stench below.

More humans. I needed to hurry.

My belly close to the sewage bank's grime, I slunk to the ladder. My body straddled over the vertical bar as I wrapped the talons of eight webbed feet around every other adjoining rung. Step by slow step, I crept upward.

I'd nearly come level with the boy's head when he became aware of my presence.

"Oh my, oh my, oh my...", he keened, scrambling through the bent grate.

I didn't need mounds of treasure or a mountain fortress. Bryson's victory over fear meant more than a measly horde. And I had helped. This felt majestic.

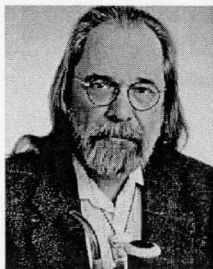
I couldn't help myself. I stuck out my forked tongue, kissing him along one cheek. Then I vaulted into the air.

Adam was also the author of the critically acclaimed The Sand Dwellers, The Cost of the Cure and The Repository. At the time of his death he was working on a new novel.

Born in Flushing, New York in 1946, Adam came to Arizona in 1977. During his lifetime Adam was a writer, an actor, a Vietnam vet, a bookstore owner, a past president of the Central Arizona Speculative Fiction Society (CASFS) and a minister in the Macro Society Community Church of the Macro Society Community which he helped create. He was a regular on the local convention scene and with his long time friend, Mark Boniece, founded MythosCon, a tribute to H.P. Lovecraft, in 2010.

In recent years Adam's health had declined and he died April 12, 2012 at the VA Hospital in Phoenix AZ.

Jeff Moriarty

Dr Melissa Morris is the Assistant Director for the Center for Meteorite Studies at Arizona State University. She is a past Goldwater Scholar and was one of the first Exploration Postdoctoral Fellows in the School of Earth & Space Exploration at Arizona State University. Dr. Morris has been a visiting assistant professor in the Physics and Materials Science Department at Missouri State University, as well as a lecturer in the School of Earth & Space Exploration at ASU. Dr. Morris's research focuses on star and planet formation, in particular the use of astrophysical modeling to determine conditions during the birth of planetary systems. Her particular interests include hydrodynamic modeling (including radiative transfer) of protoplanetary disks and disk processes during planet formation, mainly through the application of mineralogical data of planetary materials. The oldest known material in our own planetary system can be found in meteorites and, by combining meteoritic data and the results of astrophysical modeling, Dr. Morris endeavors to further our understanding of the conditions that existed in the early solar nebula and exist in extrasolar disks today.

David M. Nelson is a Planetary Geologist, currently working as a Research Analyst for the Lunar Reconnaissance Orbiter Camera at Arizona State University. Since 1994, I have been involved in geology-related research, remote sensing, and planetary mapping. I have included in my research data from several Mars missions including Viking Orbiter, Mars Global Surveyor, Pathfinder, and Mars Odyssey. As part of my current Lunar research, I am using high resolution images to locate and map out small structural features (fractures, ridges, and crater) on the Moon. In my limited spare time, I teach at Glendale Community College and I write SF/F as a hobby.

Janeen O'Kerry Growing up in the military, I've lived in many places -- California, Germany, Washington D.C., Texas, Ohio and now Arizon. And like many writers, I've held a number of different jobs -- everything from computer programmer to horseback riding instructor to medical transcriptionist.

He is also the Director of the NASA Planetary Aeolian Laboratory at the Ames Research Center in California. David is currently performing research in volcanology and planetary geology, with a focus on planetary mapping, geochemical, and remote sensing studies. His research has included computer modeling of seismic wave propagation through planetary interiors, visible and near-infrared spectroscopy of the lunar surface, planetary geologic mapping of the satellites of Jupiter and the planet Mars, computer modeling of the physical and geochemical evolution of lava flows in a variety of planetary environments, and petrologic study of lava samples from Mount St Helens. He was involved with NASA's Magellan Mission to Venus and Galileo Mission to Jupiter. He is a Co-Investigator on the European Space Agency's Mars Express orbiter mission, and he is currently serving as a Participating Scientist on NASA's Dawn Mission to asteroid 4 Vesta. David is the immediate Past Chair of the Planetary Geology Division of the Geological Society of America, has served on several NASA committees including the 2007 Jovian System Observer Science Definition Team, and is currently a steering committee member of the NASA Outer Planets Advisory Group. Dr. Dave is a life-long Star Trek fan, and a four-term past president of the United Federation of Phoenix, Phoenix Arizona's Star Trek and general sci-fi fan club. Letter From the CopperCon Operations Team,

The CopperCon Operations Team is here to help you enjoy your CopperCon experience. We will act as a buffer between convention members and the hotel staff and the public. Please keep in mind that Arizona does have laws concerning alcohol consumption, use of illegal substances, and public nudity. Please use common sense and think before you do something. If an action will get you into trouble in the real world, it will probably get you into trouble at CopperCon.

General Operations Policies for CopperCon:

- 1) If you are concerned with your safety or the safety of another please contact the Operations Office, a Operations Team member, or any CopperCon Committee or Staff member. We are here to help you and to insure that you have an enjoyable convention experience.
- 2) Please feel free to contact Operations at anytime if you have any questions about the convention or need any assistance.
- 3) Have fun and be courteous of your fellow CopperCon attendees.

Badge Policy:

- 1) Your badge shows that you are a member of convention. Convention attendees are required to have their badge displayed so that it is visible and readable at all times.
- 2) A badge is required to access all convention programming and function space. Badges may not be shared with or loaned to anyone.
- 3) Acceptance of the badge releases the convention from all liability in the event of accident, damage, or theft while on convention premises.
- 4) The badge remains the property of the convention until the close of the convention and must be surrendered on demand.
- 5) CopperCon 31 reserves the right to refuse admission to or to eject any person whose conduct is deemed in the sole discretion of the CASFS Board to be unsafe or disorderly.

Weapons Policy:

- 1) ALL weapon like props MUST BE TAKEN TO THE OPERATIONS OFFICE for review and peace bonding. CopperCon Operations reserves the right to refuse permission to carry any prop.
- 2) All owners of weapon like props will read and sign a copy of the CopperCon Weapons Policy, which will be then kept on file in the Operations Office for the duration of the convention
- 3) Absolutely NO Horseplay with weapon like props will be tolerated.
- 4) No firearms are allowed at the convention at anytime for any reason. Any violation of this policy will result in revocation of membership and removal from the convention and convention venue.
- 5) Bladed weapons such as swords and knives are permitted provided they are kept in a hard sheath and peace bonded.
- 6) All weapon type props will be carried or worn in such a manner so that other individuals in the convention venue are not at risk to be struck by the prop.

Operations & Policies, cont.

7) Unsheathed or non-peace bonded bladed weapons are not permitted at any time. Any person carrying a blade in an unsafe manner or any non-peace bonded or unsheathed blade will be asked to store the item in their room or vehicle for the remainder of the convention. Further offenses may result in the item being confiscated until the end of the convention, and the attendee could face further action by CopperCon Operations.

Room Party Policy

1) Private individuals and groups are welcome to hold parties near, around, and/or during CASFS events. (Most often, these are parties held in privately rented hotel rooms at and during CASFS conventions.) CASFS has no control over these parties and thus is not responsible for any activity at them.

2) Those holding parties at CASFS events are reminded of Arizona's laws concerning alcohol and illegal substances.

3) Parties must be registered with the convention office no later than 2pm on the day they are held. Your room must be located within the "Party Area" in order to be registered. If you plan to hold a party please inform the hotel that you need to be in the "Party Area" when making your reservations. For CopperCon 31 it is strongly recommended that you request a room on the first or second floor. Contacting our hotel liaison as well is strongly suggested.

4) Parties held at CASFS events that allow non-event members to participate may not be registered or placed within our "Party Zone". If a party, whether within our "Party Zone" or not, allows non-event members to participate they understand that by doing so they forfeit the right to discounted convention hotel rates nor will the convention act as a buffer between the party and hotel security.

Violations:

Any convention attendee violating any weapons or security policies and procedures will be referred to operations for appropriate action, which may include, but is not limited to the following:

- * Verbal cautioning.
- * Badge punching to track verbal warnings; 3 punches = revocation of membership.
- * Confiscation / removal of weapons or props.
- * Removal from programming / event.
- * Revocation of membership and removal from the convention and convention venue.
- * Local law enforcement authorities may also be notified at our discretion.

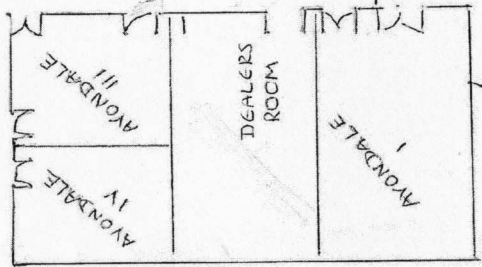
