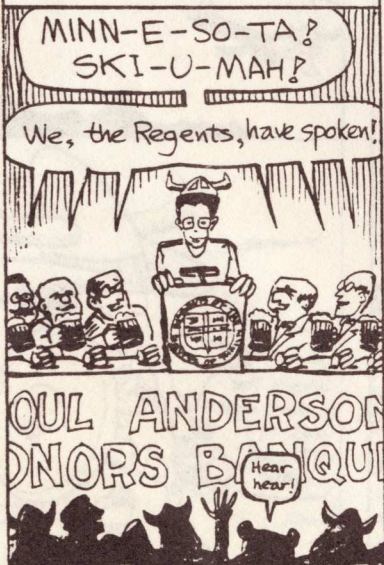
While still in his youth

fans in the MINNEAPOLIS FANTASY SOCIETY.



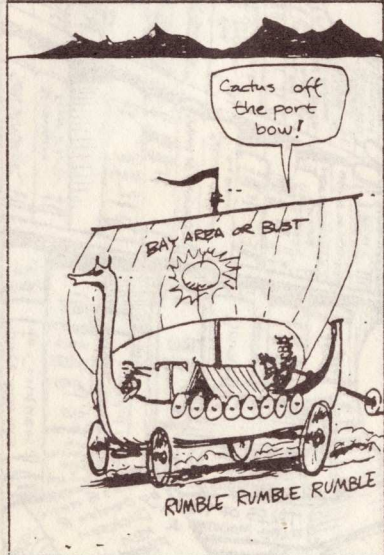
He himself was by this time

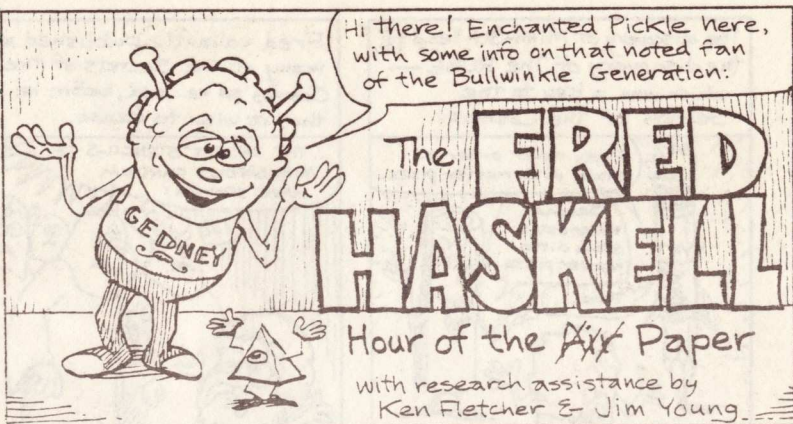

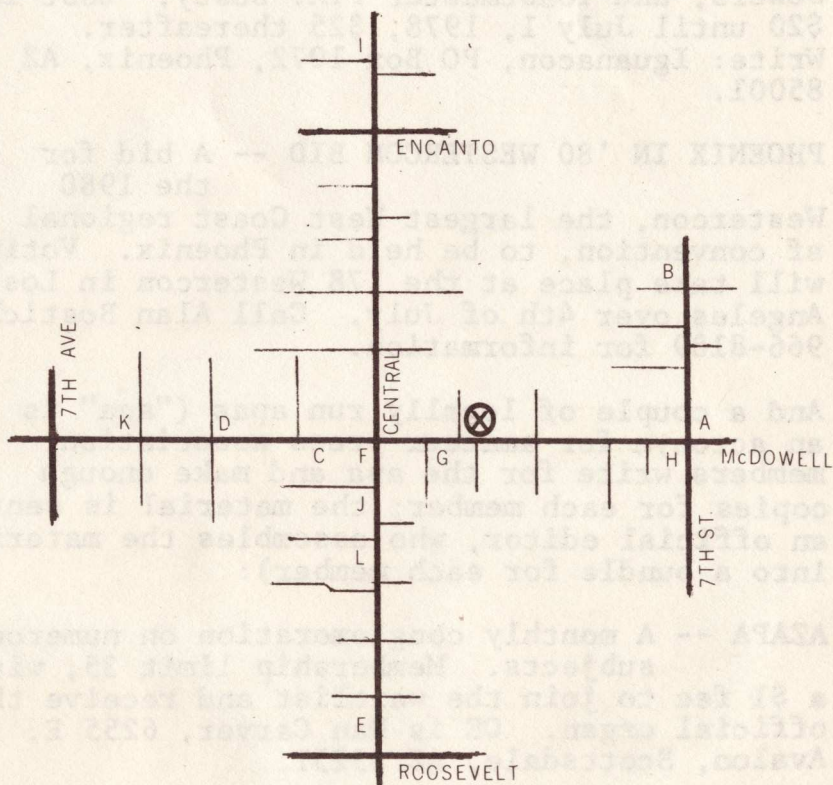

- B. **CARROW'S**, 2026 N. 7th St. 24-hour restaurant-cum-coffee-shop. Moderate prices.
- C. **GREMELKO'S**, 37 W. McDowell. Steak, seafood, cocktails. Priced accordingly.
- D. **JACK-IN-THE-BOX**, 132 W. McDowell. Hamburgers, French Fries, Coke, etc. Play "Where did it really come from?" with their burger meat. Inexpensive.
- E. **JOLLY KING**, **Royal Inn Hotel**, 1102 N. Central. Coffee-shop/restaurant. Prices moderate, food so-so.
- F. **MR. SUBMARINE**, 1524 N. Central. Fast-food submarine/hoagy/torpedo/hero joint. Reasonably good food and prices.
- G. **SAMBO'S**, 101 E. McDowell. 24-hour restaurant-cum-coffee-shop. Closest eating place outside the con hotel.
- H. **SCHAEFER'S COFFEE SHOP**, 545 E. McDowell.
- I. **SIZZLER**, 2508 N. Central. Steak place. Prices reasonable.



- J. SPAGHETTI COMPANY, 1418 N. Central. An extremely good restaurant specializing in spaghetti dishes with a variety of sauces. Has a large wine list and one of the largest choices of imported beers in the valley. Prices very reasonable.
- K. TASTY BURRITO, 502 W. McDowell. Don't bet on it. A lot like Jack-In-the-Box.
- L. TWOLIPS CAFE, 1324 N. Central. Live jazz, sandwiches, coffee, etcetera. Prices a bit high.

The Committee

We have a large and enthusiastic committee with lots of experience. All of us have worked on Boskones, the Boston regional science fiction convention, which draws as many as 1400 people each year. Our committee includes eight past Boskone chairmen and one past Worldcon chairman and we have been actively bidding and working towards 1980 for five years.

The Facilities

Our hotel is the Sheraton-Boston, site of Noreascon in 1971 and the last seven Boskones. The hotel people know what a science fiction convention is like and still welcome us back every year. The hotel has expanded since Noreascon increasing their guest rooms to 1430 and adding more function space.

In addition to the Sheraton-Boston Hotel, we have reserved the connecting Hynes Auditorium which has an addition 120,000 sq. ft. of exhibit space and an auditorium seating over 5000.
