

John Warley

I first encountered John Herbert Varley (Herb to his friends, John to his book covers) in his first published story: "Picnic on Nearside" in the August, 1974 F&SF. The story was difficult to forget, but the author's name did slip my mind. I rediscovered him in 1977, while reading the Hugo nominees. He had a couple of stories up that year for Best Novelette ("Gotta Sing, Gotta Dance" and "The Phantom of Kansas", he lost to Asimov), and had already distinguished himself as being the first person ever to come in second for the John W. Campbell Award twice. He had two more stories nominated for Hugos in 1978 before winning both a Hugo and a Nebula for "The Persistence of Vision" in 1979. Since then, he's had other works nominated for Hugos and Nebulas, including his novels TITAN and WIZARD.

What about John Varley the man? Well, he was born in Texas, and is stereotypically tall. He's in his thirties, and I've heard women describe him as "a hunk." He's also quite soft-spoken. Nowadays he lives in Oregon with his wife and children. When he's not writing, he collects stamps (American) and tropical fish. He has also confessed a weakness for electronic games, but an even greater fondness for old-fashioned pinball. He's left-handed, and we all know about those kind of people.

He's also a feminist. His stories show it, all the time. No, his women aren't always strong, perfect heroines, but then neither are his men. He has created plenty of female protagonists able to cope with whatever life throws at them. And in a John Varley story, life can throw some pretty odd things.



He has said, "I believe that people will all benefit when any group is allowed to break out of the limitations imposed on them at birth." That philosophy is reflected in his amazing Eight Worlds Series (which includes his first novel, THE OPHIUCHI HOT-LINE); another series involving Anna-Louise Bach, a Police Chief on the Moon (she plays a small role in his recent story "Blue Champagne"); his Titan Trilogy (TITAN, WIZARD, and the not yet released DEMON); plus other intriguing stories. Many of these have been collected in two anthologies, THE PERSISTENCE OF VISION and THE BARBIE MURDERS. His other postulate is that one of the main points of science fiction is "to speculate, and realize your speculations will miss the mark by a wide margin. Because the future (beyond just the next few years) is totally imponderable." Varley has speculated, and while his futures may or may not be on the mark, they would be extraordinarily

interesting places to live.







of the name of Clifford Simak. His stories have been appearing in books and magazines for the past 50 years—that's more than 200 short stories, some 25 novels and 9 collections. And this is just the science fiction; Cliff has written some Westerns, and spent 47 years of his life as a newspaperman. His skill with words has garnered him several awards: skill with words has garnered him several awards: Hugos for "The Big Front Yard," "Grotto of the Dancing Deer," and WAY STATION; Nebulas for "Grotto of the Dancing Deer" and the Grand Master of SF; Jupiter Award for A HERITAGE OF STARS; International Fantasy Award for CITY; the Headliner Award for the "MINNEA-POLIS STAR Program on Information on World Affairs," and Best Idea of the Year Educational Award for the "MINNEAPOLIS TRIBUNE Science Reading Series." Oh yes, and twice Clifford Simak has been the Guest of Honor at the World Science Fiction Convention (1971 and 1981).

I doubt that any reader of science fiction is ignorant

But enough of Simak, the writer...what about Cliff, the person? the fan?

Cliff has been reading SF for longer than he has been writing it. He was a member of the original Minneapolis Fantasy Society, back in the late 1930s and early 40s, when Gordy Dickson moved to Minneapolis from Canada. Among the other members of that group were Carl Jacobi and Donald Wandrei. Cliff has been a fan longer than most of us have been alive.

When I first met Cliff in the spring of 1976, I was immediately taken by his kind manner. "A gentleman and a gentle man" was the phrase I coined at the time to describe him, and it is still true. Cliff is friendly and open. He is kind and accommodating. Like many of the characters he writes about, Cliff has a respect for all forms of intelligence, from dogs to humans to robots to aliens.

You too will find him a Gentleman and a Gentle Man. And wish him a happy 53rd wedding anniversary. He and his wife Kay will have been married 53 years this Tuesday (April 13th).







In later Callahanecdotes he still writes about what he knows about - caring. He believes that humans will actually get their shit together one day, and things will begin to make sense at last. And in the stories he writes, and the music he plays, and the happy look of life on his face -- by Jake -- he can convince you of it too. "When you share joy there's more of it." So this weekend, share a little music with Spider

Robinson, and go home with a <u>lot</u> of joy.







Whether you're here from South Minneapolis or Evanston, Illinois, this is likely the first time you've ever spent any time in Saint Paul, so let me tell you about it.

Pigs Eye Parrant (he was Canadian, eh) wasn't very well liked by the Garrison at Fort Snelling, so when he was thrown out, he walked down river and started a little village here that was named after him. An early Minnesota rah-rah type with no sense of humor changed it to Saint Paul, and the rest is history (and history is bunk, as Henry Ford used to say).

In travelling abroad in Saint Paul, remember that as in travelling to Canada, a passport or visa are <u>not</u> necessary, just carry your birth certificate or valid driver's license.

Starting at the hotel, if the wind changes and the air gets a little, er... 'fetid', shall we say, that's just the Pigs Eye Sewage Treatment Plant downstream (to the <u>left</u> as you face the river) of the city. It's just about the only acknowledgement of our civic founder, so if he raises a stink once in a while, maybe you'll understand.


Across the street facing the River, you might notice a small brick building looking like a subway kiosk to you easterners - that's the top of the county jail. It's built into the river bluffs, and that's the top of perhaps an eight story complex.



If you turn right upon leaving the hotel, the next block is Saint Paul's City Hall - one of the best examples of Art Deco architecture in the nation.
Built fifty years ago, the interior is really grand: the lobby is done in black marble, and is back-lit to better show off the sixty-five foot statue of the Indian God of Peace (carved from white Mexican onyx). This still remains the largest onyx carving in the world, and shouldn't be missed. While over there,

check out the carved brass doors on the elevators, One more block in that direction (west) along Kellogg Blvd. is the Minnesota Museum of Art, not as well

known as Minneapolis' Walker Museum, but hey...



On the north side of the building is a strange fountain, if it's turned on in early April. It's a six by six foot area where water trickles down like

rain - it's weird and wonderful.


the Radisson Plaza.

Back at the hotel, if it's cold or you're lazy, the Saint Paul Skyway System (the first such system - Minneapolis copped it from us) will take you four blocks through the heart of the shopping district to our new city park 'under glass' at Town Square. This is like a greener version of Chicago's Water Tower Place, and it's an official city park, but to the chagrin of the local businessmen, hit with the special assessments to take care of it. It's an interesting place to walk around in - shops, water falls, trees, color, the ubiquitous glass elevators. Here is where you'll find the wrong Radisson Hotel in Saint Paul,

From here, it's one block to Minnesota Public Radio's HQ (Our Lad Garrison Keillor works here), and two blocks to both the Science Museum and the World Theatre (The Prairie Home Companion broadcasts from here).

So there you go - Saint Paul, Minnesota - just thank god you missed the Saint Patrick's Day celebration a few weeks ago; after all, you didn't really want to drink green beer, did you?
