There are letters on your mailing label in the top right corner that indicate your membership status:

ATND = Attending Membership

SUPP = Supporting Membership

CHLD = Child Membership

If more than one membership is associated with your name and address, the main notation will be followed by a plus sign, a number, and the letter "A" or "S" to indicate whether the additional memberships are Attending or Supporting.

Badges

A fannish use-name is OK so long as it only contains ASCII characters. Yes, your badge name can be Galadriel; but, no, it can't be Galadriel in Elvish.

Child Memberships

Child rates are for those 12 and under who use con services; babes in arms staying with their parents are free.

Live Outside the US?

To avoid extra charges and difficulties with currency exchange or international money orders, members living in countries other than the United States may register ahead of time without enclosing payment, and then pay the registration fee current at the time they registered, in US funds at the door. (If you are not preregistered, you will be required to pay the standard \$70 at-the-door fee, regardless of country of residence.)

Hotel

Minicon is moving this year to the Millennium Hotel Minneapolis, 1313 Nicollet Mall, Minneapolis, MN 55403-2697.

The Millennium is a beautiful, newly remodeled hotel at the south end of the Nicollet Mall. It's on the skyway system - convenient if the weather is bad. There are plenty of excellent restaurants just down the block, as well as a good one in the hotel. It also has 10baseT Ethernet in the bar and in many of its rooms, a lovely pool, and wonderful views of the Minneapolis skyline and Loring Park. The Millennium has a spectacular consuite—it's even got its own geodesic dome!

Room rate are:

\$79 for a standard room, single/double/triple/quad, double-double or king;

\$199 for a suite.

You can reserve your room either by telephone or on the World Wide Web.



To register by phone, call the hotel at (612) 332-6000 or (866) 866-8086 and mention Minicon or give them our group code, 1677, to make sure you're getting the right rate.

To register on the Web, go to http://www.millenniumhotels.com. Select the hotel name "Millennium Hotel Minneapolis" then click on "Using a USA Rate Code? CLICK HERE for Access." Don't click "Go" or it will attempt to search world-wide for a code it won't find. Once you have selected "US Rate Code," you'll see a form asking for dates and numbers of people, with a box to the right that says "Group/Event ID"; into that box type 1677; then click on "Begin Search." This will bring up the Minicon members' welcome page with directions to the hotel and other details. At the bottom of the page click on "View Rates." Next to the 79USD in the middle of the page, click on "Select." This will produce a page with your room and rate information and details about the guarantee and cancellation

policies; once you have read it over, check the box next to "Accept Guarantee/Deposit & Cancellation Policy, then click "Enter Guest Info." The next form will allow you to complete your reservation, including any special needs or preferences. If you register on the Web, your printed confirmation will include a coupon for a discount on dinner or Sunday brunch at Nic's, the hotel restaurant.

There are a limited number of suites available, and we will try to locate parties in the same area. If you would like to have a suite or you're interested in hosting a room party please let us know at hotel@minicon.mnstf.org (or by mailing to Minicon 38, PO Box 8297, Lake Street Station, Minneapolis, MN 55408, attn: Hotel).

Parking

If you're registered in Minicon's group with the hotel, the Millennium is offering a \$6.50/day rate with unlimited in/out privileges. If you are not staying in the hotel, the rate is \$13.00/day; no provision for in/out privileges is made for those not staying at the Millennium. There is additional ramp parking two blocks away in the convention center ramp at similar prices to the undiscounted price, and there is limited metered parking on the street. Meters are not enforced on Easter Sunday, but are enforced otherwise.

Directions

The hotel is located at the corner of 14th Street and the Nicollet Mall. Directions are available on the Web using your favorite map site or from the Millennium site, or you can call the hotel at the numbers above.

Come to Minicon, Stay for Corflu

This year brings us an extremely rare conjunction of fannish conventions. The 20th incarnation of Corflu, a convention for fanzine fans, is happening one week after Minicon, and less than 300 miles away. Yes, Corflu 20 will be held April 25 - 27 in Madison, Wisconsin.


Let the Programming Fit the Time — and Space


Art Show
