

AUTHOR GUEST OF HONOR

SEANAN MCGUIRE

The thing with writing is... that it's easy, or rather simple. Now, put those pitchforks and torches down! By simple, I mean the writer usually uses their mother tongue and follows an established pattern to create a narrative of rising action, climax, and resolution. Simple, see?



"Simple" like baking is heating ingredients after mixing, or painting is mixing colors to tone and applying to a canvas in shapes that convey things, or... well, you see where I'm going with this. As you should now be aware (if you have not already tossed this aside to plot my murder), I am being purposefully simplistic because we are all here at this convention for the very purpose of recognizing, enjoying and exploring exemplary efforts in creative expressions of all kinds. A simple purpose indeed...

My point is that one of Seanan's greatest accomplishments is that she makes it look easy. Not that it is simple or that she does it easily. Her work reads with an ease and flow that implies simplicity, while communicating sophistication and nuance without belaboring the effort.

Her characters include ballroom-dancing monster hunters, half-fae/half-human female knights errant, folk songs about zombie apocalypses, hypermerchandised superheroes, corporate tapeworms, wildly enthusiastic rodentia and many other curiosities. When listed like that, her creations sound like a collection of random word associations, but each story is fun and sensible to itself and exists in a world where the logic fits and works to support the storytelling, rather than distract you from its flaws.

Her heroes aren't necessarily people you'd want as friends, but you'd definitely want to be on their good sides and hope that you could beg them for help at the very least. You can always trust that they're fighting for their own sense of right, if not avoiding mistakes. It's that simple. They range from prickly to bubbly, but their personalities are many-faceted; they all have depth. Readers feel like the characters have lives outside of their interactions with the story at hand. Even her secondary characters inspire admiration on the part of readers, because they seem to live and breathe so completely.

Seanan McGuire has launched multiple series under two noms de plume (so far) when you include Mira Grant. I think that if she wanted to, she could spend the rest of her days just fleshing out the secondary, tertiary, and other characters from the stories she's already told—her readership is numerous and interested enough for that.

Her worlds are rich and complete, and her writing so clever and subtle, that the reader may remember ambient sounds, smells and textures without obvious mention in the text. This is a writer who knows how to tell a story with implication, leveraging the participation of the reader's imagination. As creative efforts go, this is a gift.


Seanan was the winner of the 2010 John W. Campbell Award for Best New Writer, and her novel *Feed* (as Mira Grant) was named as one of Publishers Weekly's Best Books of 2010. In 2013 she became the first person ever to appear five times on the same Hugo ballot.

Under the inscrutable gazes of her feline overlords in her Northern Californian farmhouse palace, she spins yarns, sings songs, and ponders the imponderable. The fruits of her labor are unique and eminently entertaining.



LOJO RUSSO

And welcoming Lojo back to the US from a two week concert tour in Ireland...

Whether playing festivals or front steps, coffee houses, conventions, or concert halls Lojo Russo connects with her audience in a way few performers can. Her enormous stage energy, powerful voice



and percussive playing style belie her small frame. This little woman puts on one heckuva big show.

Lojo Russo has been orbiting the 'Con biospheres since her first days as the bass player in the awesome classic-jam-rock quintet Cats Laughing. Three of the original members of Cats Laughing–Emma Bull, Steven Brust and Adam Stemple–are best known for their wonderfully crafted SF/F novels. A fourth member wrote 'blue novels' under the pseudonym "Anonymous". Russo retains the dubious distinction of being the only non-published author of that group.

From those humble beginnings Lojo Russo has continued to provide soulful, fanciful and farcical music to her enduring fan. Her novelty album, *Sweet Tooth*, contains the 'Con inspired hits "Orbital Groove" and "Blame It On the Jello". She enjoys long walks on the beach, the smell of Hai Karate and the way bandaid packets spark when you open them.

Making music along the muddy waters from Minneapolis to Davenport for over 15 years, Russo has played in jam bands, Celtic groups, freestyle funk folk and as a solo touring artist. And like the river she moves the music from one genre to the next–powerfully... effortlessly.

Russo's style of music has always been a little bit of everything because she's always played a little bit of everything—bass in a psychedelic rock band, mandolin in a Celtic group and guitar in every kind of funk, folk, jazz and jam combination you can imagine—usually taking the lead. This variety of music and performance styles allows Russo to tailor her shows to her audience without compromising her music. Russo's not-so-traditional blend of roots, blues and Americana gives her music an old-timey feel with a contemporary perspective.

The road is a long, strange, wonderful trip indeed and Russo loves every minute of it. She's been touring as a solo performer for a number of years mostly throughout the Midwest, heading out to the coasts when time and tide allow.

Russo's artistic and musical professionalism has proven time and again that she is the right fit—no matter what the program. Over the years Russo has worked with such diverse acts as Cowboy Junkies and Marshall Crenshaw to Pieta Brown and Ferron.

Lojo Russo is the kind of artist who is also an entertainer. She doesn't just play at her audience—she plays with her audience. Her boundless energy and infectious enthusiasm for her music is apparent to anyone listening and everyone watching.

SARA BURRIER

Sara Burrier grew up in Iowa, and despite everyone's impression that all lowans are farmers, grew up to be an artist. In order to achieve that dream. she came to Minnesota and attended the Minneapolis College of Art and Design. After Minnesota and Iowa. she headed off to the Glasgow School of Art in Scotland (because, Scotland!). Along



the way, she developed a passion for encouraging creativity in herself and others.

Sara enjoys personal challenges, such as teaching how to draw manga but not succumbing to that particular addiction, and recently blogging about drawing a fun mermaid portrait every single day until she has enough to fill a coloring book. The mermaid challenge draws its inspiration from Ariel (of Disney's *The Little Mermaid*). This recent challenge will hopefully be a successful successor to her Pixie Fairy coloring book.

Looking over Sara's portfolio, it becomes apparent that fairies are one of her favorite things to design, draw, and paint. Going to a level familiar to Minicon attendees, she has built and sewn her own fairy outfit to wear to a fairy-focused convention.

Coming back to challenges, Sara teaches Manga drawing, but tries to keep away from doing too much (one wonders what too much really means) to prevent becoming addicted to it. There are worse habits with which to become obsessed. She is passionate about connecting with and teaching the younger generation. Sara can be found teaching at Des Moines Art Center, so if you are from that area, check it out.

Sara is an illustrator of children's books and author of *The Pixie Fairy Coloring Book* and *Watercolor Fairy Art*. Her own work is focused on brightness and peace, inspired by birdsongs and plant life, and she is especially passionate about connecting with young people through art. In Des Moines, in addition to being an artist and author (as if that were not enough), she teaches Manga and fantasy styles of painting and illustration.

She has studied fairy tales and folklore, which may or may not influence her fondness for superhero movies. As a side note, despite the Convention Chair's many requests, Sara has remained adamant that art focused on Fairies, Angels, Nature, and Peace should not include Zombies.

MUSIC




ART SHOW

Smoking: FYI for out-of-towners, Minnesota is smokefree in all public places, but there are designated smoking areas outside. Please direct further questions to the hotel.

Help and Information: Ask at the registration/volunteers/info desk while they're open, or after hours at the consuite or bar. Also look for department heads or wandering concom members.

Emergencies: In case of emergency threatening life or limb, please call 911!



CODE OF CONDUCT

Principles: Minn-stf acknowledges that interpersonal relationships in social settings are complex. Not everyone likes everyone else, and not everyone agrees with everyone else. Disagreements, friction, and vigorous debate are expected. However, interactions that become hostile or coercive do not have any part in a healthy social environment and Mnstf commits to addressing problem behaviors.

Harassment is difficult to define, and attempts at an exact definition are subject to rules-lawyering, so we won't attempt to do that. However, repeated unwelcome behaviors are mostly likely to be construed as harassment. If someone asks you not to touch them, not to talk to them, or not to refer to them in a way that they find objectionable, and you persist in doing so, you may be harassing them. Actions that are sufficiently egregious (assault, truly hateful language, and comparable actions) fall under this policy, even if only one occurrence has been noted. In the end, harassment is judged primarily by the person who feels harassed, and actions are more important than intent.

Action: If someone tells you to stop something they perceive as harassing behavior, stop right away. If you tell someone to stop something you see as harassing behavior and they don't, you may tell us. If you don't feel comfortable telling someone to stop harassing behaviour, you may also tell us. We want to make sure everyone is heard so that together we can make Minicon a healthy, fun, enjoyable experience for everyone.

Reporting: To report violations of this code, whether or not action is desired, either contact the Code of Conduct Committee at (612) 414-8651 or go to the registration desk and ask the staff there to call a designated responder. If the registration desk is closed, call the number posted on the desk. During the hours posted on this sign, we will answer calls immediately. Outside these hours, you may leave a voicemail and we will respond when registration opens the next day.



WHAT IS MNSTF?

It's the Minnesota Science Fiction Society, variously abbreviated MnStf, Minn-STF, MN-STF, and other variants. It's the non-profit group that brings you Minicon. Each year, the MNStF board of directors approves the next Minicon chairperson and looks after the continuing needs of the convention.

Minstf does more than just Minicon. It also runs a small convention each year in the fall, mainly for the purpose of having something like Minicon, but without all that pesky programming and stress. This sort of convention is known in fannish circles as a relaxicon or a fallcon. Ours changes name frequently.

Besides running conventions, Minnstf's major activity is holding two parties (officially known as "meetings") per month, generally at members' homes. It's possible that you find the idea of showing up at a new person's home uninvited a little intimidating, but guess what? ... You're invited!

These meetings involve copious conversation, food, dinner expeditions, games, music, knitting, or all of the above. Meeting locations are published in MnstF's monthly newsletter, *Einblatt*, available at mnstf.org/einblatt. You can also sign up for our events and discussion mailing lists at mnstf.org.

We usually also have a couple of special meetings: the picnic and the pool party. The pool party is held in the winter, usually at the Doubletree; the picnic is in July. Check *Einblatt* for details.



How do you become a member of MnStF? It's easy! If you ever attend a meeting, you're a member. If you sign in at seven meetings in a year, you become a voting member for that year and can help choose the Minn-Stf board.

THE MNSTF PICNIC

Enjoyed the convention and want more? Meet new friends that you'd like to see again? Join us for our annual picnic on Saturday, July 16, at Minnehaha Falls in Minneapolis. We will be at Picnic Area #2, north of Godfrey Road. "X" marks the spot on the map. (Don't use the park map for driving directions! The roads don't connect like that—Ford Parkway goes *over* West River Road, but it looks like an intersection on their map.)

Join us for an afternoon cookout filled with gaming, socializing, and fun. There will be a grill going throughout the day, so bring something for the grill, or a dish to pass, or a game to play. The picnic will start around noon and last until dark. Hope to see you there!



VOLUNTEERING



Minicon is entirely volunteer-run. No one is paid for helping; even the convention chairs and all the department heads pay full price for their memberships. This keeps our membership rates down, but also means that we need your help. Think of Minicon like a big party: some of us are hosting the party, but we're all in it together.


How to help out? Well, we're a pretty informal bunch. If you see something that needs doing—perhaps a bowl of chips is empty, or a programming room doesn't have enough chairs—see if you can get it done. If you're not sure how, ask the department head or nearest person who seems to know what's going on.

If everyone pitches in just a little bit like this, the convention will run very smoothly. We also have some more formalized volunteering with scheduled shifts for art show, checking badges at the consuite, and possibly a few other areas. There will be a sign-up sheet at the registration desk.

Would you like to get more involved in Minicon? Minicon is organized by the Minicon concom (convention committee) over the course of the year.

How do you get to be on the concom? Well, if you start showing up to meetings, you're a concom member. Or, to put it another way, we don't really know who's on the concom, but when forced to make a list, we write down whoever we remember being at concom meetings.




WHERE DOES THE MONEY GO?








MINICON 51 PROJECTED FINANCES
