


Jim Hines is THAT Jim Hines. No, not the Olympic medal winner from the late 70's or the Ob/Gyn running for Governor of Michigan (who is trying to unseat incumbent Rick Snyder - who is not me). THAT Jim Hines. The one who went viral



with his gender-switched Photo by Terri LeBlanc

recreations of sci/fantasy book covers. The BEST Jim Hines, as far as we're concerned.

A lifelong Michigander, Jim has been published numerous times: over 50 short stories, 12 novels, and over 500 (by his count) rejections. His first novel, *Goblin Quest*, was described by Joss Whedon as "Too f***ing cool for words." Not a bad start!

Within those novels are a trilogy about the aforementioned goblin and his pet fire spider, a four book series about princesses which has been described as "Charlie's Angels as a Grimm's Fairy Tale", and a four book series about a magic-wielding librarian from northern Michigan.

His current series about a group of space janitors and plumbers trying to save the universe from apocalypse(!) begins with *Terminal Alliance*, due out in November of this year.

His writing has been nominated for and won several awards, including the 2012 Hugo Award for Best Fan Writer. However, Jim is quick to stress that he has often learned more from rejection than success. Not that he doesn't appreciate his achievements, but becoming a better writer involves a considering a lot of criticism and growth, and nothing gets you more self-reflection than a series of refusals.

The Hugo Award was in direct acknowledgement of his work generating attention and discussion around the portrayals of women on the covers of scifi/fantasy books. Originally a blog post, it soon snowballed into several other blog posts and eventually a calendar that raised over \$15,000 for Aicardi Syndrome Foundation.

With a degree in Psychology and a Masters in English, he has made a life with his wife, 2 children, and 2 cats. His wife and children seem supportive and tolerant of his obsession with writing. The cats, however, are openly disdainful and frequently spend their time trying to dissuade him towards more constructive efforts like petting them


BROTHER GUY CONSOLMAGNO

Brother Guy Consolmagno was born in Detroit and received his BA and MA at MIT and then his Doctorate at the University of Arizona.

After spending years as a working researcher and astronomer, a "voice of conscience" made Photo: Unknown Source



him wonder why he was "wasting my time doing astronomy when people are starving." He made the decision to join the Peace Corps. While he was serving in Kenya, he not only discovered that he loved teaching, but that "people in Africa are curious about the stars too."

He joined the Society of Jesus (also known as the Jesuits), took his vows as a brother, and was assigned as an astronomer to the Vatican Observatory and curator of the Vatican Meteorite collection.

In September 2015, he was named by Pope Francis to be the Director of the Vatican Observatory.

His research is centered on meteoroids and asteroids. He travels between the Vatican's meteorite collection in Gandolfo, Italy and the Vatican's telescope on Mt. Graham near Tucson. Arizona with scientific adventures to Antarctica and other places. In 2000, the International Astronomical Union named an asteroid (4597 Consolmagno) after him. Its nickname is "Little Guy." On July 2, 2014, he was awarded the Carl Sagan Medal for

"outstanding communication by an active planetary scientist to the general public" by the American Astronomical Society.


He is the author or co-author of eight books. His book on basic astronomy, Turn Left at Orion: Hundreds of Night Sky Objects to See in a Home Telescope - and How to Find Them has sold over 100,000 copies and is one of the most popular astronomy books of all time.

He has also written several books on the relationship of faith and science, such as God's Canvas, God's Mechanics, and Would You Baptize an Extraterrestrial?.


He has appeared at a wide variety of venues; from science fiction conventions, to scientific symposiums. NPR shows and the Colbert Report. all to have informed and informative discussions. about his reverence for science and faith.

As part of the Vatican's science outreach, Guy has been a guest of many sci-fi conventions over the years and considers himself "pretty much a nerd," so he should fit right in with us.

Guy will be very busy all weekend with various panels, so there will be lots of opportunities to hear from him

Have you ever wanted to experience your favorite book, movie or television show for the first time, again?

If you do, Mark Oshiro is your enabler.

Mark Does Stuff. Specifically, Mark Reads your favorite books,





This gives you the opportunity to look over Mark's shoulder and experience your favorite stories, for the first time, through his eyes. You can watch (or read) as he analyzes the text, pours out his soul on his blog or laughs, cries or yells at the camera. Mark mixes humor, critique and a sense of wonder, to give you a new appreciation for your old favorites.

Here's what he does in his own words from a 2012 interview with The Daily Dot:

"I've learned to distill it down to one sentence, which is: I run an online book club where I'm the only person who's never read the book. Everyone else knows it, and they're watching someone else discover a fictional world. It's a celebration of fandom, and I like the idea of saying, 'Hey, let's have this space where we can not only enjoy the experience of reading a book, but actually talk about all the different things that it brings up, either intentionally or unintentionally, and lots of subtext."

Mark started this wonderful journey in 2009, when he posted reviews of *Twilight* on Buzznet.

He hated the series. But his wry sense of humor and scathing comments connected with a lot of people and grew an enthusiastic audience for him. From there, he moved on to the *Harry Potter* series, which he loved.


Since then, he has expanded his reading to cover over 50 books and added television to his repertoire. He didn't watch television much as a kid, so for him, it really is a whole new experience.


Mark has made "Doing Stuff" into a full-time career. He spends his days reading and watching. He lectures regularly, does readings and appears as a Guest of Honor at science fiction conventions. Topics range from his own work, to work he's read or watched, to racism, the Queer experience and inclusion and representation, to poverty and homelessness, and more.

Mark has been nominated for a Hugo award in the Fan Writer category in 2013 and 2014. He has written several articles for different magazines and collections, including *Uncanny Magazine* and *Indivisible*. He was the non-fiction editor of *Queers Destroy Science Fiction* and the co-editor of *Speculative Fiction 2015*.

He has also just sold his first book. His YA novel will be coming out for all of us to experience for the first time, very soon.


The AckerMonster Chronicles! (2013)





POLICIES

Weapons: Prop weapons or costume pieces must be secured and pose no danger to others. We reserve the right to prohibit any such items from our function rooms. And remember: You kill it, you eat it.

Smoking: FYI for out-of-towners, Minnesota is smoke-free in all public places, but there are designated smoking areas outside.

Harassment: If you need help with a problem where someone is violating our Code of Conduct (see below), or not taking "no" for an answer, call us at (612) 408-1060, and we will help find a solution. This phone is answered all day and most of the night. If we don't answer, leave a voice mail message or text, and we'll respond as soon as we can.

Emergencies: In case of an emergency threatening life or limb, please call 911!

CODE OF CONDUCT

Minn-stf acknowledges that interpersonal relationships in social settings are complex. Not everyone likes everyone else, and not everyone agrees with everyone else. Disagreements, friction, and vigorous debate are expected. However, interactions that become hostile or coercive do not have any part in a healthy social environment and Mnstf commits to addressing problem behaviors.

Harassment is difficult to define, and attempts at an exact definition are subject to rules-lawyering, so we won't attempt to do that. However, repeated unwelcome behaviors are mostly likely to be construed as harassment. If someone asks you not to touch them, not to talk to them, or not to refer to them in a way that they find objectionable, and you persist in doing so, you may be harassing them. Actions that are sufficiently egregious (assault, truly hateful language, and comparable actions) fall under this policy, even if only one occurrence has been noted. In the end, harassment is judged primarily by the person who feels harassed, and actions are more important than intent.

If you tell someone to stop something you see as harassing behavior and they don't, you may tell us. If you don't feel comfortable telling someone to stop harassing behaviour, you may also tell us. We want to make sure everyone is heard so that together we can make Minicon a healthy, fun, enjoyable experience for everyone.

GET INVOLVED

WHAT IS MNSTF?

It's the Minnesota Science Fiction Society, variously abbreviated MnStf, Minn-STF, MN-STF, and other variants. It's the non-profit group that brings you Minicon. Each year, the MNStF board of directors approves the next Minicon chairperson and looks after the continuing needs of the convention.

Minstf does more than just Minicon. It also runs a small convention each year in the fall, mainly for the purpose of having something like Minicon, but without all that pesky programming and stress. This sort of convention is known in fannish circles as a relaxicon or a fallcon. Ours changes name frequently.

Besides running conventions, Minnstf's major activity is holding two parties (officially known as "meetings") per month, generally at members' homes. It's possible that you find the idea of showing up at a new person's home uninvited a little intimidating, but guess what? ... You're invited!

These meetings involve copious conversation, food, dinner expeditions, games, music, knitting, or all of the above. Meeting locations are published in MnstF's monthly newsletter, *Einblatt*, available at mnstf.org/einblatt. You can also sign up for our events and discussion mailing lists at mnstf.org.

We usually also have a couple of special meetings: the picnic and the pool party. The pool party is held in the winter, the picnic is in July. Check *Einblatt* for details.

How do you become a member of MnStF? It's easy! If you attend a meeting, you're a member. If you sign in at seven meetings in a year, you become a voting member for that year and can help choose the Minn-Stf board.

And, as always, remain calm.

VOLUNTEER!

Minicon is entirely volunteer-run. No one is paid for helping; even the convention chairs and all the department heads pay full price for their memberships. This keeps our membership rates down, but also means that we need your help. Think of Minicon like a big party: some of us are hosting the party, but we're all in it together.

How to help out? Well, if you see something that needs doing —a programming room that needs more chairs, the art show staff needs a break, or consuite needs some prep help —jump in! If you're not sure how, ask the nearest person who seems to know what's going on.

If everyone pitches in, the convention will run very smoothly. There will be a sign-up sheet at the registration desk. Here's a chance to use your mad skills!





WHERE DOES THE MONEY GO?


MINICON 51 FINANCES

Minicon 51 returned more money to Mn-StF than projected, primarily because of an unexpectedly low hotel bill and GoH expenses being much lower than the initial projection.






MINICON 52 PROJECTED FINANCES
