It seems an eon ago that I published Progress Report 2, full of careful – agonised, even? – discussion about the options for this Corflu. The Corflu community were lucky, and we just managed to hold Corflu Heatwave – safely, too – as COVID-19 was gathering, just before travel and socialising in large groups were banned under a series of worldwide lockdowns.

Opting for maximum flexibility over just when in 2021 Corflu Concorde should be scheduled seems to have been accepted, and we are living with it. And given the rapid pace of the vaccination programmes in both the UK and the US, the two nations where most Corflu's membership are from, we stand a good chance that come November we will be allowed to meet up again in real life. If we are really lucky, Corflu may be the only supposedly annual convention that will actually happen every year without skipping a year, or going online. Might we be unique?

Two features of Corflu are time-critical, though – the FAAn Awards, which would lose immediacy if not held early in the calendar year whose fan activity is being voted on, and the Business Meeting, whose main role is to give formal approval for the next year's event. A four-month gap between cons would risk the organiser being stymied by uncertainty in negotiating with hotels, as well as making it difficult for fans to plan their travel.

Hence our Zoom Awards Ceremony on Sunday March 28th, the original date for the con. It is in the evening UK time to allow easy participation across all North American time zones.

One other thing: as we can now be more optimistic we will actually get to Bristol, as an extra in this PR there is a little something about Bristol Past. I hope to have something about Bristol Past in each PR. This time round it is about Concorde, but in the next PR there will be something distinctly fannish.

HOTEL BOOKING AND TRAVEL

Now the UK Government has published their "road map" out of lockdown, the likely pace of events is a little clearer. We do not expect the hotel to be able to take bookings till they know for certain they can reopen. This is likely to be clear once the Government confirm the date for full reopening of hotels and other hospitality facilities, in step 3 out of the four in the Government's roadmap. This is pencilled in for 17 May, but depends on progress in reducing the numbers of infections around the country. There will probably be another short PR once bookings are open.

A reminder that our room rates are £100.00 per room per night bed and breakfast single occupancy; £110 per room per night bed and breakfast double occupancy (i.e. £55 per person). Rates quoted by UK hotels are inclusive of any tax.

We may have to wait quite a while longer for the situation about international travel to become clearer. This looks as if it will depend on international agreements on reopening travel corridors, maybe with vaccine passports and other controls. The GOV.UK advice on this indicates it will depend on levels of risk from new variants of COVID, the success of vaccine rollouts both at home and abroad, and other factors to do with safety which will have to be negotiated with other countries. As the rest of the world is lagging behind the US, the UK and a few small but efficient countries such as Israel and the UAE, this is fraught with uncertainty. But it might all be clear if other countries catch up. Who knows?

2021 FAAn AWARDS VOTING AND ANNOUNCEMENT CEREMONY SCHEDULE (PLAGUE VERSION, REVISED)

The Fanzine Activity Achievement (FAAn) awards, fanzine fandom's own honors, are once again being voted for and presented in 2021 for work first published in 2020.

Voting is open to anyone with an interest in fanzines; you do not have to be a member of Corflu or anything else.

Voting Method

The Incompleat Register 2020 contains the ballot form and voting instructions, as well as listings of qualifying zines, fanwriters, fanartists, loccers etc known to the administrator. (See below for further explanation.)

Each category has five slots on the ballot form to record your choices. A first-place choice in any category will get a "bonus point" toward their vote total, i.e. 2 points; all others will get 1 point. The "bonus point" in the voting form below is marked "Top Choice."

You do NOT have to complete all slots or categories. This includes the possibility that you'd rather not have any zine or individual get the "bonus point", in which case you can leave the first slot blank, although this would restrict you to four choices.

Votes may be submitted by post or by email; for email, either append a filled-in version of the voting form as an attachment, or send a list indicating your preferences. For an email list, any first choices should be indicated as such.

Friday March 12 2021 (midnight PST)

Voting ends. Ballots submitted must be received by this point, by whatever means they are sent.

Sunday March 28, 2021 (midday PST, or 8 pm UK BST)

Awards ceremony, which will occur online via Zoom, MC'd by Jerry Kaufman, after which the "results issue" of TIR containing full voting numbers will be distributed. **See page 2 of this PR for the Zoom link.**

Apart from the official ballot, this is also a voters' guide listing the fanzines and contributors for 2020 that I'm aware of, and hence will inevitably be "incompleat". Voters are in no way restricted to the contents of these lists – all votes received will be taken in good faith.

To qualify for a FAAn award, a fanzine should have appeared in the calendar year 2020 (and its cover is thus also qualifying); an individual should have had work which first appeared in a zine published in 2020; a website should have been updated during the year.

CONCORDE'S FINAL FLIGHT TO FILTON

(Reprinted from the website for YTL Arena, the forthcoming proprietors of Aerospace Bristol, where Concorde is now housed. Sadly, the new development of the former Brabazon hangars including the eponymous arena is not due to open till 2 December, three weeks after Corflu Concorde. But it will be a good excuse to come back to Bristol! Our thanks to the YTL Arena team for the info.)

Nearly 18 years ago, the Concorde 216 flew from Heathrow to its final destination, and its birthplace at Filton Airfield.

Thousands of supporters gathered on the streets to see the legendary supersonic passenger jet fly for the final time. The iconic airliner became the most recognisable name in aviation history, known for its sleek design and innovative technology.

Concorde travelled at twice the speed of sound, with a take-off speed of 220 knots (250 mph) and a cruising speed of 1350 mph. A typical London to New York crossing would take a

little less than three and a half hours as opposed to the average eight hours for a subsonic flight.

In the late 1950s, Filton-based Bristol Aeroplane Company began working on designs for the first supersonic aircraft and the British prototype made its first flight on 9 April 1969. All ten British Concordes were built in the Brabazon Hangars, and the turbojet Rolls Royce engines were made across the road in Patchway.

On 24 October 2003, British Airways withdrew Concorde from its fleet, and just over a month later, the aircraft made its final flight. The plane left London's Heathrow Airport, flying out across the Bay of Biscay, soaring over the Clifton Suspension Bridge and then back home to Filton Airfield. Alan Haile, former airport manager at Filton Airfield, remembers the day fondly:

"I was heavily involved in the last flight. I went up to London and agreed the route, suggesting that the aircraft needed to fly across Clifton Suspension Bridge, and we ended up trying to get a route that covered that. I felt really involved, seeing tens of thousands of people all lining across the A38 (which they had to shut that day). You can still see it on YouTube now, with thousands of people all waving their flags, wanting to see Concorde for the last time. That's one of my biggest memories here."

The Concorde Alpha Foxtrot now sits proudly at Aerospace Bristol, the last of the iconic supersonic passenger jets to be built and the last to fly. The birthplace of the Brabazon aircraft and supersonic Concorde will now be repurposed into YTL Arena Complex, an exciting 365-day-a-year entertainment venue for the south west. The Brabazon Hangars offer three individual but interlinked areas:

Central Hangar: YTL Arena – with a capacity of 17,080, the arena will be one of the largest in the UK. The multi-purpose auditorium will host everything from full capacity live music shows, sporting events, family entertainment and comedy shows.

East Hangar: Festival Hall – a flat floor space for trade shows, exhibitions, conventions and other events.

West Hangar: The Hub – a place to eat, work and play. With a visitor attraction, leisure, workspace and food and drink.
