Otherwise, the fanzine(s) with the lowest number of first place votes will be eliminated, and the next preferences on those ballots redistributed to the relevant titles. I'll keep going until one of the contenders has got more than half the available votes.

### DAY RATES!

#### **BANQUET**

Since Corflu is in the UK in 2025, we wanted to offer at least one traditional British experience. (No, not that. Or that – what are you like? Or the other thing you don't even dare to mention.)

The Corflu 42 banquet will be a Sunday lunch, scheduled for 1 pm since breakfast is already included in the rate at the Chequers.

By 'Sunday lunch' we mean a plated two-course meal (main and dessert) rather than a buffet, with three options including a vegetarian dish for the main course. We'll provide more information in PR4 and ask people attending the con to tell us by the end of March which main course you want (or if you won't be joining us for the meal at all) plus any food allergies or intolerances of which the hotel should be aware.

# Electronic Travel Authorisation for the UK

Starting on 8 January 2025, travellers from non-European countries including the USA, Australia, and Canada will be required to apply for permission to enter the UK through a new scheme known as Electronic Travel Authorisation (ETA).

After several delays, the UK ETA application portal officially opened for non-European travellers on 27 November 2024. and travellers with trips planned to the UK next year can now apply via the UK ETA mobile app or walking.

While most applications are approved the same day, it can take up to 72 hours.

The UK government is in the process of fully digitising UK borders by the end of 2025. Soon, all visitors to the UK (which includes England, Scotland, Wales, and Northern Ireland) who aren't UK or Irish citizens will be required to receive advanced approval through an ETA or an eVisa, a system that UK visitors to the US are already familiar with.

There were rumours in the UK press that the system had been delayed beyond April 2025, but at the time of writing this has not been verified on the UK government websites.
