The Blue Bear Necessities

A Convention with Altitude

Even as you read these words, you are 5,280 feet above mean-sealevel or as we like to say, "a mile closer to the stars."

While this is not high enough to cause altitude sickness in most people, some may experience temporary shortness of breath; if so, just rest for a minute. Dehydration is a more serious problem—experts recommend visitors drink at least two glasses more water (eight total) than they do normally. Beverages with caffeine, sugar, and alcohol do not prevent dehydration and caffeine (and alcohol) will have a stronger effect at this altitude. Avoid salty food too. Symptoms of dehydration include feeling dizzy, faint, or nauseous. Denver tap water is perfectly safe and delicious.

New in town? Can't tell your filk from your film? No clue if you support FIAWOL or FIJAGH? Help is at hand.

At 11:30am in CC room 502, Gay Haldeman and Rusty Hevelin will give advice on "How to Enjoy Your First Convention." This is the ideal first stop that can help make the entire rest of the week more understandable.

(And for those of you who can't make the panel — Filk is science fiction folk music. FIAWOL means Fandom is a Way of Life and FIJAGH means Fandom is Just a Goddarned Hobby.

Visitors also may want to take it easy for their first day, not push themselves physically and moderate their alcohol and caffeine intake until their body adjusts.

Being a mile closer to the stars includes our sun, so wear sunscreen with a sun protective factor (SPF) of at least 15, good quality sunglasses, and a hat. Use a lip balm.

Those who are not in good cardiovascular health, older Americans, or experiencing other health problems including diabetes, may experience altitude sickness including persistent headache, flulike symptoms, nausea, loss of appetite, lightheadedness and occasional disorientation, insomnia, and shortness of breath. This may require oxygen therapy. Your hotel should have people on staff who know what to do or who to contact.

The Blue Bear Necessities

Simple Rules for Surviving, and Thriving, at Denvention

Going to a sf Worldcon is like being at Las Vegas, a magical world where time seems to have no meaning. Many fans forget some of the basic needs in their quest to have the most fun possible. So here are some simple rules that will improve everyone's time at the convention.

5:2:1. That's a simple rule to follow. At least five hours sleep, two meals (the con suite doesn't count), and one bath/shower per day. If you don't get enough sleep, you may find yourself nodding off at panels (especially embarrassing if you snore). Food is important so you don't go into insulin shock or have your stomach rumblings be louder than the speakers. And you should remember to drink

lots of fluids. The bathing should be self-explanatory, just imagine hundreds of the great unwashed in a small room in the summer heat.

Another good rule to follow is to experiment. Go to a reading or Kaffeeklatsche by a writer you don't know; you might make a new favorite. Spend some time seeing the city; fans do not live by SF alone.

Use the convention to make friends. If you see someone sitting by him/herself strike up a conversation. Instead of going to lunch by yourself ask if anyone else is interested in coming. This applies to rides back to the airport; you can save money by sharing a ride.

Party etiquette is also key. Obvi-

ously don't overflow into the hallways with alcoholic drinks. Don't take more than you can eat (and leave some for others). If a person's eyes are looking around the room in panic, it is time to find a new conversation partner. And please remember, no still means **no** even at a convention.

Also, please remember that the convention is run by volunteers. If there is a problem, instead of complaining, ask how you can help. The old cliché about catching more flies with honey than vinegar certainly applies. Volunteer to help yourself. And tip the maids each day; don't wait until the day you leave.

Catch a Kaffeeklatsche — Visit Your Favorites in a Small Group

A Kaffeeklatsche is a chance to visit some of your favorite program participants in a small group, ideal for getting to know him or her in a whole new way. It is also great for meeting pros who may be new to you now, but who may become favorites once you have had a chance to talk.

Signup sheets for the Kaffee-klatches will be found at the main information desk near main registration in the CCC. Each day's registration will begin at 9am and end at 5pm. Each hour's signup sheet will be removed 30 minutes before that Kaffeeklatsche begins. Remember

each Kaffeeklatsche is limited to eight, so sign up early. If you're more than five minutes late to a Kaffeeklatsche, your seat may be forfeited. If you find that the signup sheet has been removed from the information desk, and you have not signed up for a particular Kaffeeklatsche, you may check at the Kaffeeklatsche room in the CCC, and see if any seats are still available.

Kaffeeklatsches will be held in Korbel 4E in the CCC. They begin at 10am on Thursday. You do not have to drink coffee (or even kaffee) to attend.

The Masquerade will be held on Friday evening, starting—on time—at 7:30pm. Yes, ON TIME!


The show will be held in the Wells Fargo Theatre in the Convention Center. There are 5000 seats for the audience—so no lines, please—and no waiting. We'll open the



Wednesday Parties Review

The down side of throwing a party at a Worldcon is that you don't get much of an opportunity to go to the other parties. The Buffalogistics launch party had tasty cookies and chocolates and the Scandinavian party was offering aquavit. Both Seattle and Reno threw excellent well decorate bid parties. I was unable to make it to the 8th floor.

Filk Fantastic

Filk is the music of science fiction. It is a cousin to folk music, but practiced in, by, and for the science fiction community. People who write or sing filk are called filkers. They often write parodies of existing tunes or put science fiction lyrics to traditional tunes, but they also write completely original words and music. Songs are frequently about characters and settings from science fiction and fantasy books, movies, and TV, not to mention the ubiquitous computer songs, but everything is fair game for a song. Denvention has lots of filk programming and concerts, so why not give it a listen?

Filk programming at Denvention generally will be of four types: (1) concerts by a single filker; (2) theme circles, where filkers take turns with songs on one theme; (3) chaos open filk, where people sing in random order, making sure everyone who wants a turn gets one; (4) bardic open filk, where everyone sits in a circle and is given a turn to sing, pass, or choose a song or performer that person wants to hear.

Lois McMaster Bujold Romances SF in GOH Speech

Ms. Bujold discussed how she mixed different genres in her books. Her working definition of genre is a group of books in close conversation with one another. Genre is also a marketing category; labels were invented as soon as there were too many books for one person to sort through easily, which probably started 15 minutes after Gutenberg invented his press. These categories can become toxic when they function as walls rather than doors.

She confessed to not knowing where the SF genre was going in the 21st century, because she isn't doing the steering. SF as a genre is always dying and being reinvented by new authors. Most of the time she didn't even know where her next chapter was going, let alone the future of the genre as a whole.

In her cross genre exploration, mystery is Blood Type O, the universal donor, and SF is Type AB, the universal recipient. Romance is a fantasy of love; mystery is a fantasy of justice; and SF is a fantasy of political agency. The different psychology of genre readers gives different results to similar themes. SF runs heavily to coming of age stories where, for instance, the village is burned down and the protagonist then goes on a heroic journey. In romance, the village may also burn down, but the main character's journey is about integration and redemption not about individual empowerment.

Her recent encounters with romance can be blamed on Catherine Asaro's invitation to submit to *Irresistible Forces*, an anthology of romance SF

stories. Fan reaction was interesting; SF fans tended to be tone deaf to the relationships while the romance fans were indifferent to the worldbuilding. She also noted the tremendous staying power of Georgette Heyer, especially for SF fans.

Her approach to writing is to "think of the worst possible thing to happen to the characters and then do it" and the worst possible thing is to force her characters to deal with politics. However, the new Miles book, from which she will be reading today at 11:30am, is packed with politics, worldbuilding, and chickens. Having no other contracts, she has a great deal of freedom to decide what she wants to do next in 2009. There will be two more Five Gods books.

People do not discuss series structure as an art form, but series do different things than individual novels. The Miles books are structured as independent adventure stories in a character's life in real time. In the Chalion books, she made a different God the theme for each book, rather than tie the series to a particular set of characters, which is what readers expect.

Now that she has finally married off Miles, the most frequently asked question is "when will Ivan get his own book?" She has no plans for a "first landings on Barrayar" prequel or to go back to Athos. She noted that she was a little unhappy about how she let telepathy into her universe and was not sure she wants to develop that any further.

Help Preserve SF Community's History—Save the Tapes

Denvention received a DVD of Robert Heinlein's 1976 Guest of Honor Speech from Midamericon. It was sent on behalf Margie Lessinger, partner of the late Scott Imes.

Imes spent several decades documenting the science fiction community and its conventions. This DVD of Heinlein is the first time any of this work has been digitized.

Margie is seeking a permanent archival home for Scott's video documentaries. The collection is in a variety of tape formats, including reel-to-reels, and needs to be preserved, digitized, cataloged, and cared for, most likely in a university setting.

Hip Hugo Happenings

By a vote of 40-28, a resolution to drop the Best Semiprozine Hugo passed at Friday's WSFS Business Meeting. The resolution will go on next year's Business Meeting at Anticipation in Montreal for final ratification and take effect in 2010.

A resolution to add a Best Graphic Story Hugo was overwhelmingly approved and will also go to Anticipation for final ratification. In addition, a non-binding proposal was made to both Anticipation and the winner of the 2010 Worldcon to put the Best Graphic Story on their list Hugo list.

Also passed at the meeting, and to be ratified at Anticipation, clarifies the eligibility of works published in electronic and other non-print forms for Hugo awards. One of the effects of this change is that the Best Related Book award would become Best Related Work.

Ratified at the meeting was a change to Best Fan Artist that would allow an artist to be nominated in both Professional and Fan artist categories in the same year. It will take effect next year.

SF Writers Out Themselves as Subversives

On the Friday panel, "SF as a Forum for Questioning Social Norms," prominent SF writers confessed to being subversives.

Nancy Kress said that science fiction is not predictive literature.

Ian McDonald said that SF really is a very conservative literature but gives the most powerful tools for social analysis in all of literature. Writers slip in little bits of subversion.

Jim Morrow said that these days just suggesting that there is more than one side, that those who disagree with you may not be agents of Lucifer, is being subversive. Nancy Kress replied, "By that definition, I'm a subversive."

David Coe said that science fiction can't help but be a reflection of the times in which we live.

And Pat Cadigan said, "There was a fair amount of hostility toward cyberpunk. It really shook up the 'Old Pharts'."

Make the Wonder of Worldcon Last the Whole Year

Denvention will soon be over. But the fun does not have to end. There are many ways to enjoy SF fandom year-round.

Most regions of the U.S. (and other countries too) have their own regional conventions. Leaflets advertising many of these conventions can be found in the Korbel lounge near the newsletter rack. Conventions are also listed in the back of *Asimov's* and *Analog* magazines. Many of these conventions are held by local fan groups that also have regular meetings. Contacting the convention will usually put you in

touch with their sponsors or you can google "science fiction" club and your state or area.

Another way to stay is through fanzines. These personal magazines are available for a nominal cost or sometimes just a selfaddressed stamped envelope. They welcome letters of comment for true two-way communications. list of this year's Hugo nominees includes several fanzines for you to try, or visit the fanzine lounge.

Of course the Internet offers tons of options. The Usenet bulletin board service offers rec.arts.sf.written as well as rec.arts. sf.fandom. Blogs and Live Journals are also a modern way to keep in touch. Many SF

writers, editors, and artists have their own blogs and/or websites available for a visit year-round. Major publishers like Baen and Tor offer extensive online communities.

If no club exists near you, consider starting one. Many bookstores provide space for book groups. Local libraries and colleges also may make space available. You can contact existing clubs for help getting started. Finally, the week of Worldcon

takes considerable preparation. Please consider becoming involved. Contact Anticipation at their table or online.
