Special Summer Session 2006 Edition Planet Earth: Anaheim, California USA

Attention, Space Cadets!

We're delighted you will be attending the Space Academy's special session being offered this summer in Anaheim, CA. Your thorough review of this Cadets' Guide will help you settle in and know your way around from the moment you arrive on the Academy grounds in August.

The Academy is located in the Anaheim Convention Center. All cadets must pass through ADMISSIONS (*Registration*) in the Convention Center lobby upon arrival.

After admission to the Space Academy is complete, cadets are encouraged to head to CADET CENTRAL (Hall A), where they will find the:

ARTS CENTRE (Art Show)

In the Arts Centre, cadets can view, bid on, and buy artwork from across the galaxy -- original paintings and sculptures, jewelry, prints, and more. Talk with artists one-on-one in Artists Alley. See Artist Demos. And more.



ACADEMY BOOK STORE (Dealers Room)

The Book Store carries volumes discussed in Academy classes, gifts to send to family and friends on your home planet, apparel that can be worn during your stay at the Academy as well as after you leave, and other souvenirs of your time there.

QUAD (Exhibits)

The Quad is filled with interesting, informative, instructional, and terribly worthwhile exhibits. You can study displays honoring present and past Academy dignitaries. Refresh your memory about Academy events throughout time and space. Celebrate the wondrous accomplishments of the Space Academy!

Other basic Academy zones include the following:

INSTRUCTION FACILITIES (Programming)

Most Classrooms (Main Programming rooms) are on the second floor of the Main Academy Building (Anaheim Convention Center). Individualized class schedules are the responsibility of each cadet. In addition, H Dorm is home to some Classrooms as well as several focused interest areas, such as Filk Music and Gaming. The Academy offers its cadets nearly 1,000 sessions to choose from. There will be plenty to delight, amaze, and challenge cadets as they build their core competencies and study specialized fields. With graduation only a few days away, most cadets will find themselves spending long hours in the Classrooms, soaking up the considerable wisdom and insight presented by hundreds of renowned Faculty members.

RECREATION (Hospitality)

Cadets can relax between and after classes as well as find food and drink at the Space Port Lounge and Under Belly Bar (Arena Lobby), located between Cadet Central (Hall A) and The Rocket Field (Arena) on the first floor of the Academy. The Academy Hospitality Suite (Con Suite), meanwhile, can be found on the Lanai deck of H Dorm (read on!)

THE ROCKET FIELD (Major Events)

The Rocket Field (Arena) is the site for our major Academy events: the Masquerade on Friday night, and the Hugo Awards Ceremony on Saturday night.

HOUSING (Our Hotels)

Cadets have two housing options adjacent to the Academy: H Dorm (Hilton) and M Dorm (Marriott). Staying on campus puts cadets a moment's walk from the Academy halls. (We're checking city and county ordinances regarding the use of personal jet-packs; at the time this Guide was prepared, it appears that only grounded, wheeled assistance devices are allowed on the Academy grounds.) Both dorms offer private sleeping areas. Staying in the dorms also maximizes cadets' enjoyment of hospitality events hosted each night by their fellow cadets on H Dorm's lanai deck.

Cadets staying off campus and commuting to the Academy are, of course, also welcome to enjoy the classes, hospitality events, and other focused interest areas in H Dorm.

We hope you enjoy your tour of duty this term!

Cadet Operations Guide

Art Show / Art Centre (Cadet Central)

The L.A.con IV Art Show will be centrally located in Hall A of the convention center, with the Dealers Area and Exhibits. Artwork will be displayed on pegboard panels, on tables, and in the print shop.

Special exhibits in the Art Show include the work of Artist Guest of Honor, James Gurney, artists nominated for the 2006 Hugo Awards and the Chesley Art Awards presented by ASFA, a display of fanzine art organized by John Hertz, works from the Illustrators of the Future contest, Student Contest artwork, artwork by our friends from Japan, items for a charity auction to benefit ASFA, and an anniversary display of iewelry by Laurie Edison.

There will be docent tours (including one just for children), artist demos, an artist alley, and "Dueling Easels" between Bob Eggleton and Frank Wu. Please check the schedules posted by the Art Show door for all these activities. And vote for your favorite artist via the Popular Choice Awards.

Artwork will be sold by a combination of written bidding and voice auction. Potential buyers must register with the Art Show staff before bidding. The close of written bidding and the voice auction will be on Saturday. Buyers will be able to pick-up and pay for their artwork late Saturday afternoon or on Sunday morning.

The L.A.con IV Con Suite will be open starting on Wednesday at 2pm, and will close on Sunday at 7pm. The Con Suite is located in Room 310 on the Lanai Level of the Hilton Anaheim. Yes, you are reading this correctly; the Con Suite will be open twenty-four hours a day during the entire run of L.A.con IV! Exhibits / The Quad (Cadet Central)

A broad range of exhibits awaits people entering Cadet Central. The traditional Fan Tables and Bid Tables are there. Plus exhibits ranging from a mock up of the next Mars Rover to the Bridge of the Starship Enterprise, complete with the wax figures of the original crew from Movieland Wax Museum.

1950s toy robots, rockets, and rayguns are on display, as well as exhibits dedicated to our Guests of Honor. Plenty to see each time you pass through!

Book Exhibit & Raffle (Cadet Central)

L.A.con IV is sponsoring a Book Exhibit and Raffle to benefit Reading is Fundamental (RIF) and local Public Libraries. Books, magazine subscriptions, games, and other SF, fantasy, and sciencerelated materials will be on display. The display will be turned into many approximately equally valued packets and raffled off on the last day of the convention. Raffle tickets will be sold throughout the convention, with the drawing at 11:30am Sunday in Arena-1 in the Convention Center. You must be present to win, as packet choice occurs immediately after the drawing.

Worldcon Business & Site Selection

Exercise your right to propose, debate, and vote upon changes to the Hugo Awards, Worldcon Site Selection, and the WSFS Constitution. The four sessions of the Town Meeting of the World Science Fiction Society will take place in Room 201C on the second floor of the Convention Center. Thursday through Sunday, beginning each day at 10am. (Please submit new business to the Convention Office, room AM 15 on the mezzanine of the Convention Center) by 4pm on Wednesday.

Site Selection this year will be open from noon to 6pm on Wednesday, 10am to 6pm on Thursday and 10am to 6pm on Friday.

Kaffeeklatsches (Space Port Lounge)

A more intimate way to get to meet and talk with one of L.A.con's speakers, Kaffeklatsches will be taking place in the Space Port Lounge. They happen at a table with seating for ten; a guest and the first nine people to sign up spend an hour together talking about whatever you all feel like talking about. The tables are roped off, so no one else should come by to interrupt. The Kaffeklatsches are listed in the schedule elsewhere in this book. Sign up at the Information Desk in the Space Academy (Anaheim Convention Center) Lobby starting on Tuesday. As has been the policy for recent Worldcons, you can only sign up for a kaffeklatsch happening within 24 hours of the time you sign up (e.g. a 1:00 Friday Kaffeklatsch cannot be signed up for before 1:00 on Thursday).

Voodoo Message Boards (Cadet Central)

Out near L.A.con IV's Registration desks, you'll find a mysterious set of boards. On these boards is a list of the names of everyone who had signed up for the convention in advance. You can use these boards to send and receive messages during the convention

Go to the boards, find your name, and put a checkmark next to it. This will indicate to people that you've arrived. Anyone wishing to send you a message can write that message and leave it for

you in the alphabetical boxes near the boards. To let you know there's a message for you, they then stick a pin next to your name (thereby the sobriquet "voodoo"). We provide the pins. You pull out the pin and go find your message in the box. Simple. Check the boards every now and then and see if you've got a new message.

Space Cadets: Guardians of the High Frontier Live Game (Green Room, H Dorm)

Come learn to be a Space Cadet! Classes. Adventure. Sashes. Silliness. Something like that... Sign up for the adventure of a lifetime in the *Green Room* of the H Dorm, second floor (between the ballrooms). Lux After Dark (Friday Night)

The L.A.con IV Masquerade presents as its "half-time" entertainment, the Lux Theater Production, Lux After Dark.

Like a sparkling diamond in the velvet curtain of night, the notorious Le'toile Rouge nightclub orbits high above the Space Academy. Embracing the bohemian decadence of turn-of-the-century 1900's Paris, it is a kingdom of nighttime pleasures, where the rich and powerful come to play with the young and beautiful creatures of the underworld. After Dark is the drama that unfolds both in front of and behind the curtain of Le'toile Rouge. A crossroads in the lives of the performers who bring the nightclub to life, theirs is a story of love, hope, music, passion, betrayal, and triumph. And dancing girls. And science fiction references. Free scanning of fannish photos for the FANAC archive will be available during the following times from the opening of the Exhibit Hall each day until 6:00 pm, except Sunday, when we'll close at 3:00.

Furry Fan Lounge

(Salinas/Monterey, H Dorm)

Although it might not be obvious from the explosion of media coverage (good, bad, and strange) given to Furry Fandom in the past few years, this quirky little subset of Fandom has a long history all its own. So what are these "furries" that people are fans of? "Furries" is shorthand for "Anthropomorphic Characters" -- any character in a story (in any medium) that somehow acts like a human being but isn't one. Anything -- from Bugs Bunny and Mickey Mouse to the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles, from Fox and Crow to Usagi Yojimbo, from Mudge the otter to the creatures of Redwall Abby, and from King Kong to the stars of the Lion King... all of them are anthropomorphics, and they have a fandom all their own -- with fanzines, fan fiction, novels, illustrations, comic books, costuming and more. In the early 1980s, furry fans began to gather at cons to hold furry fandom parties -- and before too long, they began to hold their own conventions, some of which now have attendance in the thousands.

In 2006, we're celebrating the 20th anniversary of the first Furry Fandom Parties with the return to Worldcon of the Furry Fandom Lounge, once again on the Concourse Level in the Hilton. This time around, we feature two rooms: A Display Room of Furry Fandom's finest materials (from costumes and fanzines to convention memorabilia, and more!) and the Furry Fandom Lounge for the best in furry-related programming — including art and costuming how-to presentations, furry discussion groups, favorite animal meet-points, and of course a Furry Fandom reception to celebrate all we've seen in the last 20 years. The schedule's here in the Pocket Program. Make sure to drop on by!

I.A.T.S.E. Local 790

I.A.T.S.E. Local 790 presents their first annual exhibition: The Art and Artistry of Hollywood's Illustrators and Matte Artists. A film and other types of visual entertainment usually start with an idea, which is then rendered into words, which then needs to be turned into images, so it can be communicated to a group of people, who will then realize those concepts in some way so they can be recorded onto media, and shared with the world. Local 790 Members are responsible for these images and you, the members of L.A. con IV, are the first to see a public exhibition of their work. Enjoy!

Unfortunately, due to legal complications too messy to go into, the cast of Fellowship! regretfully had to cancel their performance shortly before the convention. They – and we – are very disappointed but, due to the circumstances, could not be avoided.

Weapons Policy

It is the policy of L.A.con IV that no real or realistic projectile weapons may be carried anywhere within the convention except during the masquerade or specially approved events.

The use of a weapon during the Masquerade or during a programming event must be approved by the Masquerade Director or the Programming Coordinator respectively. No weapon of any kind may be drawn or wielded in any area of the hotel or convention space.

L.A.con IV defines a weapon as any object designed to cause damage, or any replica of such an object, or any object that the Committee determines to pose a risk to the safety of others or to personal or hotel property. The Committee reserves the right to alter or amend this definition and the right to impound weapons for the duration of L.A.con IV. Failure to put a weapon away (or check it with Ops until you leave the convention for the day, if not staying at the hotel) is grounds for immediate revocation of membership without refund and expulsion from the convention. Dealets who sell weapons must securely wrap each item at the point of sale and provide customers with a copy of these rules.

We at L.A.con IV know that most people who would like to carry weapons are sensible and careful individuals. However, we must keep in mind liabil-

ity, legal issues and our relationship with the hotel. The safety of you, the members, must outweigh any other consideration and it is with this in mind that these policies have been formed.


Attention all Space Cadets!



So please join us! We will be happy to assist you in finding the right position to heighten your experience as a volunteer.




SPACE ACADEMY - CONVENTION CENTER - LEVEL 1





For your convenience, the Program Grids are printed separately from this volume. That way, you can either use both this book and the gridsheets, or take a quick read of which panels you'd like to attend, then leave this book in your bag and just carry around the grid sheets. It's up to you!

Included within the program listings are all panels and autograph sessions, the contents of our filking, young adult (Chaos Space Pirates) and film programs, the two rock dances, the kaffeeklatsches and readings. Printed separately in their own sections at the end of the book are our children's

program (Adventurer's Club), the SF Asian Action Film program, the anime program and the contents of our gaming schedule.

FACILITY NAMES and ROOM LOCATIONS

As noted in the Cadet's Guide to the Academy (which you should have read by now; shame on you if you haven't, they worked awfully hard on it!), the Anaheim Convention Center is called the Space Academy, the Hilton is the H Dorm and the Marriott is the M Dorm.

The pocket program uses these naming conventions in our listings. The following is a guide to interpreting the room listings, with examples:

CC-xxx Convention Center or Space Academy

H-xxx H Dorm or Hilton

M-xxx M Dorm or Marriott

In the Convention Center/Cadet Central, the Arena is the main dome building, with Arena 1 & 2 as rooms adjacent to it. Art Show/Art Demo

functions take place in the Art Show. CC-CSP-Zone refers to the Chaos Space Pirate Zone and CC-SPL is the Space Port Lounge; both are located between the Arena and Cadet Central (Hall A) which is also where the Kaff (Kaffeeklatsch) tables are. Autograph Areas are located inside Hall A with the Dealers, Art Show and Exhibits. Rooms CC-201 to CC-213 are on the upper floor above the Hall A Foyer (where Registration is).

In the Hilton, it's easier. The Pacific ballroom and the Space Cadet Academy are on floor two; the H-ConfRms (or Conference Rooms) are on floor three; and the other locations are all on floor four. (H-StaMonica, by the way, is Santa Monica.)

The Marriott is the easiest; we'll be using the Salon rooms for the Blood Drive and the Gold Key rooms for the Children's SF contest.

If you get lost or have any questions about finding your way around the facilities, stop by the Information Desks. They're located in the Convention Center and in the Marriott.

THE INDICES

As noted above, the indices are there for your

reference; they refer to programs by type, themes, participant lists, plus all the autographs, readings and kaffeeklatsches that you can comfortably get away with during one weekend. The numbers refer to the numbers before each program item in the listing, which are in sequential order. Easy, buh?



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
