

Where's the Eats?

The easiest, cheapest, and most available food at the Millennium Philcon is at the Reading Terminal Market across Arch street from the convention center. This is an old-fashioned open market with fresh seafood, meats, vegetables, and other groceries sold from individual stands. Additionally, Reading Market has dozens of individual food booths selling everything from ice cream to soft pretzels to fresh lemonade to the traditional Philly Cheese Steak sandwich. Prices are low to moderate and portions are quite large. Try to get a seat at the counter of the Dutch Eating Place for a huge breakfast. Or plan to get your food to go - there's little space to sit and all of it is reserved for purchases from specific vendors.

This takes care of Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, but don't count on the Reading Terminal Market for food on Sunday and Monday. The market will be **CLOSED** Sunday and Monday.

Paying for Entertainment or Putting on an Entertaining Con?

Most of us are used to plunking down our cash and walking in to see a movie or play or listen to a concert. Our money pays for our admission to the entertainment. But the Worldcon - any Worldcon - is a different proposition.

The Worldcon is a cooperative endeavor. It is the (only) annual meeting of the World Science Fiction Society. It is run almost entirely with volunteers who do it because they want to have the best convention they can. Since it is a cooperative effort, it relies on its members for the labor and management.

If you are reading this, you are probably a member of the Society. For the convention to succeed, tens of thousands of labor hours are required, in addition to the money paid for memberships, dealers tables, art show commissions, etc. Each member's share is around 2 hours per convention day. It's those volunteer hours that help us keep the cost of the convention down and differentiate us from the (doubly expensive) professional conventions that use paid labor and contractors for everything from registration to door guards and errands.

I urge everyone to Volunteer. If you aren't already on the program, staff, or gopher lists, you can go to one of the Volunteers desks, and they will find something useful for you to contribute. You'll be helping out your fellow fans and making the convention better.

I am not speaking for the Millennium Philcon. This is true of all our conventions. If we don't put in more than just money, the conventions won't be more than just shows. So join the community. Do your share. Volunteer.

Restaurant Reviews

Joy Tsin Lau Restaurant, 1026-28 Race Street. The entrance may seem a little less than welcoming, but it's quite a nice place inside. There are tables of varying sizes seating up to twelve people. The impressive menu makes up for the fact that I didn't spot a menu displayed outside, and the friendly staff smilingly explained that the soup came in a large bowl and would be more than enough for two. From the chef's choices the Tie Chen Cherry Chicken was really good - it was served in a beautiful dish and tasted wonderful! (Reviewed by Jan van't Ent.)

Maggiano's Little Italy, 1201 Filbert Street. This is the best Italian food I've had in ages! Our party of six showed up a little after 7pm on Wednesday night and were seated immediately. The hostess warned, though, that reservations were definitely needed on weekends (567-2020). The "family style" menu on the front page of the menu was absolutely wonderful at \$22 per person, and the waitress helped us choose a very nice Chianti to go with it. Highlights were the gnocchi in tomato vodka sauce, the mussels, and the lemon salmon. The enormous profiteroles for dessert had a truly delectable dark chocolate sauce. (Reviewed by Mary Morman.)

Behind the Scenes at Reg

Everyone who's picked up a badge knows that there are lines at Registration. That's bound to happen when 3000 people all want to pick up their badges at the same time. Take a look at what's happening behind the scenes where dozens of volunteers are helping Linda Ross-Mansfield of Winnipeg to run the on-site registration. Linda has a few words of advice. She asks you to be patient and to have as much information with you as you can (such as a progress report with your label and a picture ID). Linda says that approximately 1500 new and pre-registered members picked up badges on Wednesday.

If you want to transfer a membership and have only a number, not a name, for the membership you are transferring, please go to Pre-Reg first so someone can find the name associated with your number. If you do have the name, then go to directly to the SOLUTIONS line - yep, that's the long one. To do a transfer you will need your own picture ID as well as a signed transfer letter.

The Pre-Reg lines are moving fast, but the SOLUTIONS line is moving more slowly. Please do be patient. The Registration staff is resolving issues as quickly as they can!

Program participants should first pick up their packets at the Program Participants table directly under the World Science Fiction Society banner on the Bridge. This will give them something to read while standing in the lines at Registration to pick up their badges.

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Filk: That SF Sound

Listen. Do you hear the guitar strumming? Or are bongos bonging? Open the door. Are there people in a circle? And is someone singing a song about spaceships, dragons, or computers? If so, you've stumbled upon the filkers.

Filk is the folk music of science fiction fandom. According to filker Nick Smith, "Filk music started off about fifty years ago, when people at science fiction conventions got together late at night in good old-fashioned folk music song circles. Well, some folks got a little silly and started singing song parodies about their favorite SF books and authors. Fans started writing song parodies about themselves or each other... Filk music includes song parodies, original songs, and slightly musical poetry."

There are generally three types of filk singing sessions. Concerts are performances by a scheduled singer or group. Sometimes these are set up as a series of one-shot sings. Bardic filk circles have each person in the circle take turns singing. Chaos filk circles lack rules and singers call "follow-up" if they have a song that follows the theme of the previous singers.

Badge Policy

The Pegasus Awards for excellence in filking are given annually at the Ohio Valley Filk Fest (OVFF). MilPhil is pleased to present this year's nominated songs in the categories of Best Computer Song, Best Creature Song, and Best Filk Song.

If you've never heard filk, give it a try. You may even want to sing along (it doesn't matter if you can't sing, the traditional filksong is sung in the key of Off.) We can guarantee these songs will never be mistaken for the American Pop 40 Countdown.

The Millennium Philcon Committee has the final say as to what constitutes a weapon. Unfortunately, we must reserve the right to revoke the membership of anyone who refuses to comply with this policy. The only exception is for registered participants in the Masquerade, who may wear a weapon, excepting guns and operational lasers, from one-half hour before to one-half hour after the Masquerade. All Masquerade weapons must be affixed to the costumes. Participants in the Costumers' Workshop may also wear weapons, with the same restrictions, while in the workshop.

Party Locator

You are in a maze of twisty passages, all alike...

Many of the parties in the Marriott are on floors six and seven, just above the function space on floors three, four and five. You can beat the elevator lines by using the stairs – but only if you can *find* the stairs.

The Marriott has many staircases, all hidden behind red EXIT signs. Some of them stop at the fifth floor. Some of them skip the lower levels. Some of them spiral around each other like DNA, except that you're always on the wrong helix and are fated to be ejected from the gene pool. Only a few go all the way through from three to seven.

These magic staircases can be found in the corners of the hotel, and are numbers 4B and 2A – you can find the number on the staircase, just inside the door. 4B is near the east elevator bank, and 2A is at the other corner on the east side of the hotel.

Once you've made it to the party floors, many of the corridors are narrow and twisty. In particular, the long corridors connecting the two halves of the hotel are *very* narrow. Please do not form hallway parties. You can avoid the long narrow corridors by using the correct elevator bank to get to your party. For rooms between x51 and x99, use the *east* bank – the bank of six elevators located close to the convention center bridge. For rooms from x00 to x50, use the *west* bank – the bank of five elevators located at the far end of the Marriott from the convention center bridge.

I always knew I'd find some use for twenty years of experience of playing RPGs and mapping weird patterns of rooms and stairways.



WSFS Business Meeting of Aug. 31

Should future Worldcons be able to give a Hugo Award to both a movie and a TV show in the same year? That was the primary issue considered by the preliminary business meeting of the World Science Fiction Society (WSFS) on Friday. A motion to split the current "Best Dramatic Presentation" (BDP) category into two parts – "Long Form" (over 100 minutes; mainly movies) and "Short Form" (mainly TV shows) — will

be discussed and voted on at the main business meeting, scheduled for 10am Saturday in CC103A. All MilPhil members are automatically WSFS members and eligible to attend and participate.

The Saturday meeting

will also consider a proposed amendment to the WSFS Constitution requiring future Worldcons to supply name badges with the member's name in at least 24-point type. This is the first year of consideration for this amendment; adoption requires passage at two consecutive Worldcons.

Up for ratification Saturday, having been initially adopted last year at Chicon 2000, are constitutional amendments dealing with Hugo Award mail (or electronic) balloting and financial reporting requirements for future North American Science Fiction Conventions (NASFiCs). Specifics appear on Page 158 of your program book.

Friday's meeting adopted two motions recommended by the Hugo Eligibility for the Rest of the World (HEROW) Committee, temporarily extending a year's worth of additional Hugo eligibility to works

James J. The Saturday meeting will consider the committee's proposal to formalize the procedure for dealing with such works in future years. Anyone wishing to serve on the HEROW Committee for the coming year should leave a message for business meeting presiding officer Don Eastlake at Marriott 309.

The BDP Hugo category split was proposed by a study committee authorized last year after both the 1999 and 2000 WSFS business meetings were confronted with a small flock of competing motions that agreed two categories were desirable

but disagreed about the manner of splitting them. The 2000 meeting essentially told all factions to get together, iron out their differences, and come back this year with a single proposal. The result is the time-based split. The motion will come up for discussion with several pending amendments to be decided, such as whether to set the boundary line at 100 minutes or some other value, and whether to allow the Hugo administrators greater or lesser latitude to move nominees between categories at their discretion.

Saturday's meeting will also feature elections to the Mark Protection Committee, charged with guarding all WSFS service marks (such as "Worldcon") from infringement, abuse, or misappropriation. All three incumbents have been renominated; other nominations will be accepted from the floor.

For security reasons, you'll be asked to check belongings, but keep a pen with you to bid on art and vote for best professional artist and best amateur.




As longtime art-show volunteer Tom Schaad pointed out, there will be something to fit both your taste and your pocketbook.



History of Worldcon Exhibit

It's the rare and lucky fan who has attended SF cons since The Beginning. For the rest of us, there's the Worldcon History display. Located in PCC Exhibit Hall B, between the doors and the art show, it's a fascinating accumulation of memorabilia by Fan Historian Bruce Pelz.

Sixty-two boards hang from 36 panels, chronicling Worldcons and NASFICs from 1939's Nycon I (New York) to 1999's Aussiecon III (Melbourne) and Conucopia (Anaheim). Up front is a display case containing several Hugo awards, plus mugs, tankards, medallions, and crab-smashing hammers; after that are tables with program books, binders full of mailings, and T-shirts. The final item is a huge blowup of a Hugo Banquet photo from 1959's Detention in Detroit; attendees are invited to label any diners they can identify. Mike Resnick led an anecdoteladen tour on Thursday; Leah Zeldes Smith leads another on Sunday at 2pm.

WSFS Business Meeting, Sept 1

Hugo Awards for Best Dramatic Presentation will be given in two categories – Long Form and Short Form – beginning in 2003 at TorCon 3 if a proposal adopted at Saturday's WSFS business meeting is ratified next year at ConJose.

WSFS also provided for reminders "early and often" to each future worldcon that name badges must be easily readable, with member names in at least 24-point type. And it set up a process for extending Hugo eligibility to works originally published outside the USA in one year but not widely distributed within the USA until a later year.

Two Constitutional amendments passed on from Chicon 2000 were given second approval and thus become part of the WSFS Constitution. The first specifies that Hugo balloting have postal mail a required option and electronic mail a permitted alternative. The second requires future North American Science Fiction Conventions (NASFiCs) to meet the same financial-reporting requirements as worldcons.

The meeting will convene again Sunday at 10am in CC103A and will feature announcement of the 2004 worldcon site. The Mark Protection Committee will meet immediately after adjournment. Ben Yalow, Kevin Standlee, and Tim Illingworth were re-elected to that committee Saturday.

The BDP Hugo proposal was changed to set 90 rather than 100 minutes as the boundary between Long and Short Forms and to specify that times would be based on a work's "first general release". Next year's Hugo administrators were asked to report on what the ballot would have looked like if the BDP split were in effect for dramatic presentations of 2001.

der how to fold a banzai headband properly? Mr. Yoshiro Kiriyama amiably demonstrated the art for us.

The Prydonians of Prynceton offered tasty homemade goodies such as rum balls, oatmeal/M&M cookes, and something we had never tasted before: Rita Humphrey's pecan squares, a delightful dessert of graham crackers coated with a soft pecan brickle. Boston in 2004 again hosted a vibrant gathering, offering another night of fresh shrimp, petit fours, antipasti and blue f**kers, a place where everyone knows your name and you can get an extra shot of blue. Torcon 3 displayed a variety of Ontario wines and beers. Scott enjoyed the chocolate coconut Napoleons while Kurt savored the fruit salad with Devon custard.



The 62nd Worldcon will be Noreascon 4, to be held Sept 2-6, 2004, in Boston MA. The chair is Deb Geisler. Boston won the Site Selection by 364 votes over Charlotte NC.

Departing slightly from tradition, apparently, the Guests of Honor at Noreascon 4 will be split between Pros and Fans. The Pro Guests of Honor will be Terry Pratchett, creator of the *Discworld* series of novels, and Philip Klass, bka William Tenn, the great satirical short story writer. (This is a much-deserved honor for Mr. Klass, who is a gentleman of true class, and one that he should have enjoyed years ago.) The Fan Guests of Honor are Jack Speer, "fandom's first historian and prophet of Foo," and Peter Weston, a UK fan and rocketmaker.

The site for Noreascon 4 will be the Hynes Convention Center in downtown Boston, with the main hotels being the Sheraton Copley Place and Sheraton Boston. Other hotels will also have rooms blocked. Even though the convention





Bryan Bailey won the Starcraft tournament.


