WILLY LEY, GUEST-OF-HONOR

This year's guest of honor is Willy Ley, who is that distinctive combination of scientist and science fictionist. He was born in Berlin about 1906 and is now an American citizen. His early studies were in zoology and paleontology and later became active in rocketry. He helped organize the German Rocket Society, leaving Germany in 1934 for America. He is an author of considerable works and considered an expert in several sciences. As a lecturer he is in great demand and this convention is fortunate to have him as a principal speaker.

NOW YOU CAN KNOW, TOO

Last year we stayed awake most of the day and night moving in the thick of things and yet we were frustrated, It was impossible to keep up with all the news, events, rumors and just plain gossip. As a matter of fact, we still don't know all the interesting tidbite about Chicano's affair. Once upon a time we used to know everything worth knowing about the convention we attended, and a lot more not worth knowing, too. So this year we have a solution. For the first time the convention committee is going to issue a daily newspaper containing all the latest about everything-if we can learn about it and find it newsworthy. In those days, we were all of us "far-minded" youngsters with no guiding elders to help us steer our course through adventures among the "pros." And our parents, neighbors and friends considered us eccentric, to say the least. We have been rapidly becoming, in the past decade, "respectable." For those of you who never knew—if you do, you could never never forget—we list the conventions of hy-gone times:

1939—New York—"Nycon" 1940—Chicago—"Chicon" 1941—Denver—"Denvention" 1916—Los Angeles--"Pacificon"

1947.-- Philadelphia -- "Philcon" 1948.-- Toronto--- "Torcon" 1949.-- Cincinnati -- "Cinvention"

1950 Portland, Ore.—"Norwescon" 1951 New Orleans—"Nolacon"

1952-Chicago

The Chicago affair last year was officially "The Tenth Anniversary World Science Fiction Convention and had no nickname, although many, of course, called it "Chicon 2." Likewise this convention here in Philly has no official nickname, but if you'll look hard you'll find "Philcon 2" creeping into one or two of the ada. This could possibly be listed as a "Tradition of Past Conventions" (an article to be found elsewhere in this booklet) but it's been tattered if not broken to we've skipped mentioning it. Who knows, perhaps it will reappear next year?

ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS

An idea which was talked about for many years is this year coming into reality: the Achievement Awards in science fiction. A large range of categories has been chosen to receive recognition and convention members have cast their ballots. As the first year for such an event we all ought to find the results exciting and, we hope, pleasing. The awards themselves have been prepared at considerable expense. If they had been ready before publication of this booklet we most certainly would have tried to print a photograph of one of them. When you see them we think you will agree. It is our hope, of course, that this year's event will be successful enough to merit it becoming an annual affair.

The idea of having a convention this year in Philadelphia began with James A. Williams. As president of the Philadelphia Science Fiction Society in 1952, he was elected chairman of the convention committee. To be a good convention chairman was his final great ambition. He threw himself recklessly into the work of organizing the convention, with the full knowledge that his heart was likely to give way at any moment. And so it did, in March of this year.

Yet we should not feel dismayed that this passionate interest in science fiction was the cause of Jim Williams' death. For as Jim said many times, he felt that for him life really did begin at forty. This was when he discovered the Philadelphia Science Fiction Society, and he felt that the last several years of his life were greatly brightened by the group of friends who surrounded him because of his activities in the club.

TRADITIONS OF PAST CONVENTIONS

The site of the conventions has traveled around the country in a more or less orderly pattern, so that no single region of the country has had the convention two years in a row, and so that the cast and west comis each have gotten a convention once every four years.

Conventions have been operated on a nonprofit basis. The income has gone toward the payment of convention expenses, and any amount in excess has been donated to the next convention and or divided among various fan organizations. Members of the convention committees have worked without personal remuneration.

One of the high points of each convention since 1940 has been a costume party based on orience fictional ideas. By an interesting coincidence, the chairman of the present convention was master of ceremonics of the first such costume party in Chicago 1940; the editor of this program booklet won the first prize at that party; the costume designer is also present at this year's affair.

The auction has been traditional since the earliest conventions. This has two purposes: it gives the fans an opportunity to acquire original magazine illustrations and manuscripts, and it makes up a large part of the convention's cash income.

INTERPLANETARY STAMP ISSUE

An unusual souvenir of this convention is the Interplanetary Stamp Issue—two different sheets of stamps in contracting colors—put out by the convention committee to help defray costs. The greatly praised designs are the work of Russell Swanson of the Art Committee. The stamps are still available for sale at the original price. Unfortunately neither of the two different denominations—one for "Lunar postage" and the other for "Mars postage"—can be used because of technological difficulties which science fiction is attempting to solve.


