TV News & Previews By Lee Whiteside

The fall season is mostly underway for the broadcast networks and we've got news and info on all your favorite shows and some more details on the newcomers. There's also lots of development news to report, everything from the long in development *Anonymous Rex* to a new adaptation of *The Flash* for the WB.

The new season of *Enterprise* started in early September with a more uptempo version of its opening theme song. *Faith of the Heart*. UPN is also having *Star Trek* put in front of *Enterprise* for promotional purposes hoping to remind viewers that it is set in the *Star Trek* Universe. With the new focus on the continuing Xindi storyline, UPN is hoping for renewed interest in the series. However, the opening week numbers were comparable to what the show drew for the season finale that introduced the storyline. They will be continuing the Xindi story arc at least into the November ratings sweeps. Upcoming episodes include *Raijin* where the NX-01 crew takes on a beautiful alien slave named Raijin while they work towards a showdown with the Xindi; *Impulse* sees the Enterprise respond to a distress signal from a Vulcan ship in the Expanse which contains insane zombie-like Vulcans; in *Exile*, a powerful telepath makes contact with Hoshi and offers to help Enterprise find the Xindi ... for a price; *The Shipment* sees Archer, Reed and Major Hayes infiltrate a Xindi-Sloth industrial colony to learn more about the weapon of mass destruction that will be used against Earth; in *Twilight*, Archer wakes up to find that the Enterprise is under attack, he is confined to quarters, and T'Pol is now Captain; and in *North Star*, the Enterprise comes across a Wild-West style town in the Delphic Expanse populated by Skagarans and humans (descendents of a Wagon train abducted in 1857). The episode's writer, **David Goodman**, has indicated the episode is intended to pay homage to original *Star Trek* episode like *Spectre of the Gun* where the Enterprise crew came across Earth like settings.

Teaming up with *Enterprise* on UPN on Wednesday nights is *Jake 2.0*. It is off to a fair start in the ratings (holding almost all of the *Enterprise* audience) but once the other networks roll out new episodes, it may not hold up as well. There is no advance info on episodes to report. As mentioned in the previous issue, the behind the scenes crew has a good pedigree and if given the chance, it may turn out to be a good show. At press time all I have seen is the pilot, which shows promise. In talking to *SciFi Wire*, **Christopher Gorham**, said that the show is a

metaphor for coming into your own. "It's kind of discovering yourself," **Gorham** said. "And I think the '2.0' kind of works on that level as well. It's like as you go through life, you're constantly upgrading [and] hopefully not downgrading. And each time you move into the newest version of yourself, there's new problems and there's new rewards, and you kind of have to learn all over again."

Over at The WB, *Angel* is off and running with their new locale at Wolfram and Hart. Following last season's finale that set up their new digs, we've got a few additional changes in store. First of all, Connor and Cordelia are no longer on the show and there's currently no word on if they will be making any appearances. **James Marsters** will be joining the show as a regular, with Spike initially appearing as a ghost or something of that sort. The producers have indicated that there will likely be a visit from **Sarah Michelle Gellar** next spring during February or May sweeps. Another familiar face turning up as a secretary at Wolfram and Hart will be **Mercedes McNab** as Harmony. One of the new semi-regular characters will be Eve, Angel's liaison to the senior partners. Opening episodes of the season include *Convictions*, where Angel deals with Wolfram and Hart spying on him and a client who says he will destroy California if they don't win his case; *Just Rewards* brings Spike fully into the picture as we learn more about the Amulet he used in the Buffy finale while Angel deals with terminating a client who is a necromancer; *Unleashed* brings on a female werewolf named Nina and when Angel must save her when she is captured to be this month's meal at a club that dines on exotic creatures; *Hell Bound* has Fred bring in a psychic in an attempt to help Spike when a spirit who sends other spirits into Hell is after Spike; and the last October episode is about Wolfram and Hart's annual Halloween party where chaos ensues when Lorne's subconscious comes to the forefront.

The opening episodes of *Smallville* will deal with the after effects of the season finale where Clark's acts led to the death of the Kent's unborn baby. Clark has headed off to Metropolis and in the season opener *Exiles*, Clark gets involved with crime boss Morgan Edge (**Rutger Hauer**) who hires him to break into Luthercorp, Jonathan Kent tries to put his family back together and Lionel Luther accuses Helen of

Movie News By Lee Whiteside

Batman is Back! Warner Bros. announced that **Christian Bale** (*American Psycho*, *Reign of Fire*) has been cast in the next *Batman* movie. Director **Christopher Nolan** indicated "he has exactly the balance of darkness and light that we were looking for." Warner Bros. has been silent on the plot of the movie and it appears to be a completely different project from others that had been in development. Rumors are it will involve Ras Al Ghul and be set partly in London. They are aiming for a Summer 2005 release.

As for *Superman*, latest rumors are that director **McG** and producer **Jon Peters** are no longer involved and Warner Bros. is starting over from scratch.

Star Wars Episode Three is wrapping up filming in Australia. There's all sorts of rumors and official and unofficial information about the movie circulating online. There will be a new bad guy in the movie, a light saber duel between Anakin and Obi-Wan, the first glimpses of Darth Vader, and a spectacular action sequence with Yoda according to effects supervisor **Dan Gregoire**. See the SF Tube Talk for more info on the *Star Wars: The Clone Wars* cartoon debuting on Cartoon Network in November.

Joss Whedon will be bringing his cancelled *Firefly* TV series to the big screen for Universal Pictures. **Whedon** will also direct and will incorporate the mythology of the series into the movie but keep it a stand alone effort with an epic feel. Negotiations are underway to bring all of the TV cast back for the movie.

M. Night Shyamalan's *The Woods* (the title will likely change) is in the works for an August, 2004 release. It is set in

rural Pennsylvania in 1897 in a small village surrounded by mystical woods. Starring are **Bryce Dallas Howard**, **Joaquin Phoenix**, **Adrien Brody**, **William Hurt**, **Ashton Kutcher**, and **Sigourney Weaver**.

Also in the works for next summer is "*Alien vs. Predator*", set in the near future where a team of scientists investigating ancient pyramids in Antarctica find Alien face huggers. Once the aliens are uncovered, Predators start showing up to take them on. Sort of a prequel to the *Alien* movies and somewhat loosely related to the Dark Horse Comics line of books and related video games. Directed and written by **Paul W.S. Anderson** (*Resident Evil*, *Mortal Kombat*, *Soldier*, *Event Horizon*).

Halle Berry will be *Catwoman* next summer, with **Sharon Stone** co-starring. Based loosely on the DC *Catwoman* comics, **Berry** plays Patience Price, a Salt Lake City veterinary scientist who becomes Catwoman to fight against the cosmetics company she works for that is a front for the criminal activities of the husband and wife (**Stone**) that run it. Rumors are that **Michelle Pfeiffer** may make a cameo appearance to pass the torch to **Berry**.

Blade: Trinity will see **Dominic Purcell** (*John Doe*) as **Wesley Snipes'** nemesis in the third *Blade* movie. Also

killing Lex. In *Phoenix*, Lex returns to everyone's surprise and Clark and the Kents try to put their lives back together while Lionel and Morgan Edge both are looking at the sample of Clark's blood. *Extinctions* introduces a friend of Lana's who has been going around taking out the "meteor-freaks" since one of them killed his father. He gets ahold of Chloe's database and sets his sights on Clark. *Slumber* sees two newcomers in town that move next door to the Kents, a young girl named Sarah and her uncle. Sarah is in a comatose state likely as a result of the meteor shower. When Clark starts seeing her moving around outside, he begins to suspect there's more going on than it appears. In *Perry*, Clark meets up with a reporter named Perry White (**Michael McKean**) who comes to Smallville on an assignment while Lex begins seeing a psychiatrist, Claire Foster. *Relics* sees a story from the 1960's about Jonathan Kent's parents and Lex Luthor's grandparents dealing with a mysterious drifter named Joe. This looks to be similar to the *Roswell* episode where everyone in the cast played characters from an earlier time period to tell a story in the past. *Magnetic* sees a new Freak of the Week with magnetic powers that activate when he is given a MRI after a neck injury he got in a

fight. For more details check out www.kryptionsite.com on the internet. I've even turned up some advanced info on *Charmed* for once. Following the season opener where the Halliwell's dealt with Valhalla and Valkyries, in *Forget Me Not*, Wyatt conjures up a dragon that exposes magic to the world that has to be cleaned up by The Cleaners; in *Power of Three Blondes*, three ditzy sisters (all blond) from the 1920's steal the Halliwell sisters powers in an attempt to take over their identities; and in *Love's a Witch*, Paige gets a new boyfriend, a warlock that has a cursed family. Also on The WB is *Tarzan*, which will likely draw a decent sized audience but hasn't yet generated much online buzz. The most recent news about the show is that **Lucy Lawless (Xena)** will be joining the show as Kathleen Clayton, a publishing magnate and younger sister of **Mitch Pileggi's** Richard Clayton, the acting head of Greystoke Industries. Both Clayton's have their own ideas on how to handle their nephew, knowing that whoever controls Tarzan, controls Greystoke. This addition indicates that the show will not focus exclusively on the Tarzan and Jane relationship but will have a larger scope, thus the dropping of "Jane" from the title. Bringing *Lawless* in will give the show a dynamic similar to what is seen on *Smallville* with the Luthors. The WB has

also signed *Lawless* to a development deal for a possible series for next season, so if *Tarzan* doesn't make it, *Lawless* will likely get a chance to develop something of her own to star in. Starting up on FOX at the end of October is *Tru Calling* with **Eliza Dushku** as Tru Davies, a morgue attendant who gets messages from the dead and wakes up the previous morning with the chance to save them. She also has a brother, Harrison (**Shawn Reaves**), who gets into trouble gambling and a sister, Meredith (**Jessica Collins**), who has drug problems and she uses her second chance to help them out while she is literally running around town. Also regulars are **A.J. Cook** as Lindsay, Tru's loyal and

unsuspecting best friend and **Zach Galifianakis** as Davis, the quirky morgue attendant Tru works the night shift with. A computer geek friend who helps Tru out in the pilot has apparently been removed from the show. The initial batch of episodes include the *Pilot* where Tru firsts learns of her special power when a young woman's corpse says "Help Me" and she has to find out how and why she died and try to save her while dealing with her siblings problems as well; *Putting Out Fires* has Tru try to prevent a fireman's death while saving a family from a fire; *Brother's Keeper* has Tru's brother get involved with a married woman who kills her husband and Tru has to figure out who's telling the truth in the relationship; *Past Tense* sees Tru try to save five men

who are all poisoned at a bachelor party; *Haunted* has Tru trying to save a medical student who is experimenting with recovering suppressed memories through near death experiences; *Star Crossed* has Tru trying to save a high school couple who died in a car crash.

Elsewhere on the networks is *Joan of Arcadia* on CBS, about a teenager named

Joan (Amber Tamblyn) living in Arcadia that has God talk to her appearing as different people. Her father, Will Girardi (Joe Mantegna) is chief of police, her older brother Kevin (Jason Ritter) is recovering from a car accident that disabled him a year and a half ago, her younger brother brother, Luke (Michael Welch), is a computer geek, and her mother, Helen (Mary Steenburgen), is trying to deal with all of them. The pilot shows promise, with God directing Joan to get a job that figures

both into helping with an ongoing serial killer mystery her dad is working on plus giving her disabled brother some encouragement.

Andromeda moves into its fourth season in syndication and will be aired in wide-screen. Gone is Keith Hamilton Cobb as Tyr Anasazi (although he will be making an appearance or two during the season). According to a Tribune press release, Dylan Hunt and crew will work to keep the

operations for several intelligence and security agencies. Like the members of the Mutant X team, she was also the unwitting subject of genetic experimentation. As a result, she can bend light rays to become invisible and manipulate light to use as a weapon. The remaining mutants will learn that they are part of a much larger experiment that Adam had kept them in the dark about.

Over on Showtime, *Dead Like Me* has finished up its first season with no reports yet on if Showtime will pick it up for any more episodes. Taking over the Friday 10 pm ET/PT time slot on October 10th will be the second (and likely final) season of *Jeremiah*. As previously reported, Sean Astin (Sam Gamgee in *Lord of the Rings*) joins the cast as the mysterious Mr. Smith, who talks to God among other strange traits. In the season opening two-parter *Letters from the Other Side*, Jeremiah has come to Valhalla Sector and found his father but it seems Ezekiel was right - his presence may pave the way to disaster. With Markus and Erin also captives of Valhalla Sector's rulers, only Kurdy remains free to try to avert it. In part two, Kurdy meets the mysterious Mister Smith. Reluctantly, they join others from Thunder Mountain in Lee Chen's danger-ridden plan to rescue Jeremiah, Markus and Erin from Valhalla Sector.

Coming up on The Cartoon Network is (finally) the second season of *The Justice League* beginning October 4th. They will air both parts of each two part episode on Saturday nights at 10 pm ET/PT. Opening stories are *Tabula Rasa* where J'onn J'onzz has a crisis of conscience while Lex Luthor gains control of Amazo, a powerful android who can copy the powers of the entire Justice League.

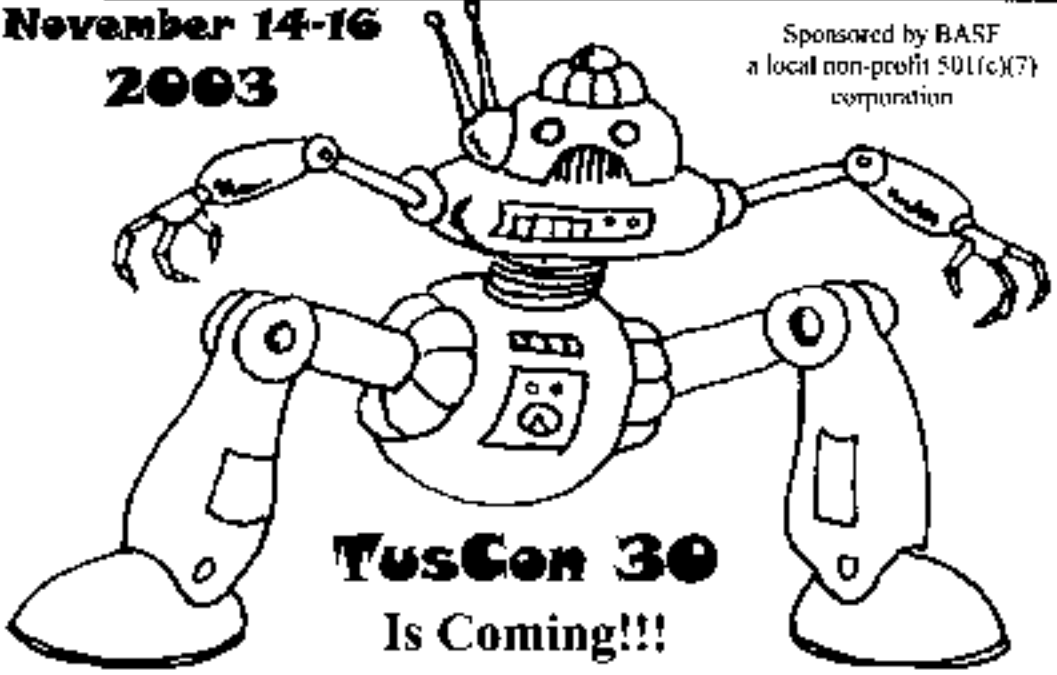
In *Only A Dream* members of the Justice League are trapped in a nightmarish dream world controlled by the evil Dr. Destiny where they are forced to confront their own darkest fears. *Maid of Honor* has Wonder Woman befriend a jet-setting Kasnian princess only to find herself enmeshed in a complex plot of intrigue and betrayal masterminded by the Justice League's old enemy, Vandal Savage. *Hearts and Minds* has John Stewart learn that Katma Tui, his old girlfriend from the Green Lantern Corps, is missing in action. He leaves Earth to try to rescue her from the clutches of the mad prophet known as Despero.

Debuting on November 7th on the Cartoon Network is *Star Wars: The Clone Wars*. The first ten segments will air weeknights at 8 pm ET/PT for two weeks on the network in a five minute block leading off the hour. The shorts tell stories of events that happen between *Star Wars Episode II* and *Star Wars Episode III*. They are produced by Genndy Tartakovsky, creator of *Dexter's Laboratory* and *Samurai Jack*. The remaining ten

episodes in the project will be aired sometime next spring.

Eric Garcia, creator of *Anonymous Rex* and writer of the book that the recent movie *Matchstick Men* was based on has reported on his official website, EricGarcia.com, that production on a two hour pilot movie for the *Anonymous Rex* series has finally been given a green light. The project has been in development for three years with SciFi and Alliance-Atlantis and has been slowly working out the problems of depicting dinosaurs disguised as humans which is a central piece of the premise. According to **Garcia**, the pilot movie is actually based on the story seen in the prequel book, *Casual Rex*, in which Vincent Rubio and his partner, Ernie, go after a back to nature dinosaur cult led by Circe. I'll definitely have more details as they become available.

Former *X-Files* executive producer and Phoenix native **Frank Spotnitz** is developing a supernatural series for the FX network called *The 13th Floor*. The show deals with a lawyer who serves as an advocate for dead people who believe they've been wrongly condemned to hell. **Spotnitz** is working with novelist **Brad Meltzer** and **Steve Cohen** on the series.

The WB has made a pilot commitment for a new series based loosely on DC comic's *The Flash*. **Todd Komarnicki (Resistance)** is writing the pilot and will executive produce the show. The show will be another re-imagining of a comics character with the Flash discovering he can travel very fast when he is fresh out of college. He also has the capability to run backwards and forwards in time.

One more **Gene Roddenberry** project is in development. Former *Star Trek: TNG* producer **Herbert Wright** has found financing for a series based on **Roddenberry's The Questor Tapes**. **Wright** told SciFi Wire that they are still determining if the series will go to a network, cable or into syndication. They intend to start off the season with a full two hour episode with 24 hour long episodes to follow. He expects the series to be ready for the 2004/2005 TV season.

Finally, it's time for the long awaited (or dreaded depending on your viewpoint) preview of the new *Battlestar Galactica* arriving on SciFi Channel in December. This will be a two part, four hour miniseries that will re-imagine the series and is not a continuation of the original series. If it does well, there is a chance SciFi will pick it up as a continuing series. Following an earlier attempt by **Bryan Singer** and **Tom DeSanto** to put together a new version of *Battlestar Galactica* (in addition to **Richard Hatch's** attempts to revive the series with his own ideas), Universal TV and SciFi went to **Ron D. Moore (Star Trek: Deep Space Nine, Roswell)** to come up with his own approach to a new version of the series.

Moore took the re-imagining approach, taking the basic concept but updating it more to today's expectations of what a science fiction show should be. However, in the process of doing so, some of the changes have been met with a fierce outcry from die-hard *Galactica* fans.

Taking on the role of Cmdr. William Adama is **Edward James Olmos**. Adama is in charge of the last remaining *Battlestar, Galactica*, and wants to avenge the deaths of billions of humans but is forced to flee with the remnants of humanity and lead the rag-tag fleet of space-ships to a safe haven away from the Cylons. Leading the remaining humans is President Laura Roslin (**Mary McDonnell**) who was 43rd in succession to be president and finds herself the new President when she is the highest ranking survivor Adama's son, Lee "Apollo" Adama (**Jamie Bamber**), is estranged from his father, having blamed him for the death of his brother, Zak. An accomplished viper pilot, Apollo must work to set aside his grudges to work with his father and others to fight the Cylons and save humanity. Now we come to where things start to be a little different from the original....

Lt. Kara "Starbuck" Trace (**Katee Sackhoff**) is an accomplished viper pilot, a loner, rebellious and always hungry for a good fight. When the Cylons launch their sneak attack on Kobol, she finds herself at the core of the Galactica's combat team defending the last of humanity. Lt. Sharon "Boomer" Valerii (**Grace Park**) is a young pilot, recently graduated from flight school. Besides having to come to grips with putting her abilities to the test, she also adopts a young orphan, Boxey. Dr. Gaius Baltar (**James Callis**) is an evil genius who has designed the defense systems for Kobol. His affair with what he thinks is a corporate spy, Number Six, leads to the downfall of humanity when he

learns that Number Six (**Tricia Helfer**) is not really a beautiful and sultry woman but an advanced Cylon android. Even though Baltar escapes with the Galactica, Six is still with him due to a memory chip implanted in Baltar's brain. Finally, Col. Paul Tigh (**Michael Hogan**), Galactica's Executive officer and Adama's right-hand man, is ill-tempered and an alcoholic, and believes that his wife is cheating on him.

SciFi has been heavily promoting the

series and it will air on Sunday, December 7th and Monday, December 8th. It is their big event miniseries for the fall and it will likely draw a large audience of viewers and more than likely will spawn a weekly series or additional mini-series. I'd suggest you watch it for what it is intended, a re-imagining of the whole thing and not get stuck on the changes made to it. Of course, having the original series released on DVD this fall will invite those comparisons....

The **Ray Bradbury** short story, ***A Sound of Thunder***, is getting the big screen treatment by director **Peter Hyams**. It expands the short story about a hunter going back in time to hunt dinosaurs and changing the timeline to that of a DNA researcher played by **Edward Burns** who is using time travel to reconstitute extinct wildlife. The time travel trips lead to evolution going berserk. Also starring is **Ben Kingsley** and **Catherine McCormack**.

Fall Movies Preview

It's coming into the fall holiday season. This means a bunch of horror movies in time for Halloween and then all the big holiday blockbusters in November with December likely taken over completely by ***Lord of the Rings*** (all three movies). Here's a quick look at the genre movies opening over the next couple of months.

House of the Dead - A group of young partiers head to a remote island in the Straight of Juan de Fuca for a promised "mother of all Raves". The Texas Chainsaw Massacre - A remake of the original. Expect lots and lots of blood and gore.

The Singing Detective - A movie version of the offbeat 1986 BBC TV miniseries by **Dennis Potter** about a delusional writer who reworks the story of his first novel in his mind while bedridden. Stars **Robert Downey Jr., Robin Wright Penn, Mel Gibson, Katie Holmes**, and **Carla Gugino**.

Gothika - **Halle Berry** finds herself a prisoner in the mental institution where she works with no memory of how she ended up in her situation. She must fight to regain her sanity while dealing with a vengeful spirit using her as an earthly pawn. Also stars **Penélope Cruz, Robert Downey Jr., Charles S. Dutton**, and **Bernard Hill**.

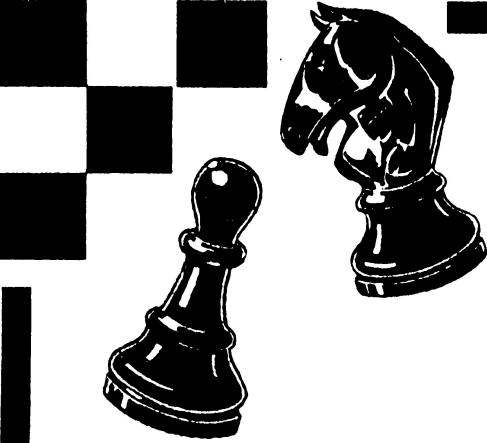

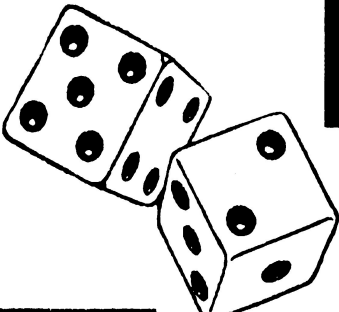

We Are Such Stuff, As Dreams Are Made Of

Is our own fate free will or predestined? How do you know if you are dreaming or truly awake? These are some of the questions explored in Mesa Community College's season theatrical opener, **LIFE IS A DREAM** by Pedro Calderón de la Barca, October 9 through October 19, 2003. **LIFE IS A DREAM** was written by 17th Century Spanish playwright and ordained priest Pedro Calderón de la Barca. During the height of Spain's Golden Age of Theater, Calderón was one the leading playwrights of that century, serving as the court dramatist for King Philip IV. Born January 17, 1600, Calderón began writing plays at the age of 23 after studying law at the University of Alcalá and the University of Salamanca. LIFE IS A DREAM is one of his better known plays that was written and produced between 1635 and 1637 (sources vary). His was an active life, coming from a good family with money and connections, gaining a solid education that included the Jesuit College in Madrid before law school. He served in the military for some ten years (stationed in Italy and the Low Countries), then became a Knight of the Order of Santiago in 1637. Twelve years later, Calderón entered the priesthood, rising to become the Superior of the Brotherhood of San Pedro in Madrid. He died May 5, 1681.

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Musical Note

This is kind of an odd album for **Al**. Or as he calls it, **AL-bum**.

For one thing, you get the feeling that he had problems finding any songs out

there worth parodying this time out. But that's okay, because it forced him to write some decent songs of his own, and with one or two exceptions, these rank among his best originals.

Case in point: '*Hardware Store*.' Lyrically, it's about a guy who just CAN'T WAIT for the new hardware store to open. (Reminds me of my wife. Personally I can't stand those places.) It culminates with a well-edited litany of things you can buy in a hardware store (okay, 'automatic circumcisers' is a stretch) sung at about a

thousand miles an hour, but clearly enough that you can understand every word. (It reminded me of the old song '*Life is a Rock but the Radio Rolled Me*' by **Reunion** from the '70s.) That in itself is amazing. But the arrangement, particularly the female choir, is FAN-TAS-TIC. Syncopated background singers add their countermelodies to the chorus. It's fun and well done.

From there, jump straight to the track called '*Bob*.' It's a parody of how **Bob Dylan** writes and sings, but the ingenious-

ness of it lies in the lyrics. Study the lyrics, people. And remember: **Lisa Bonet** ate no basil. (That's the best line in the song.)

If you don't get what's going on in '*Bob*,' then you're REALLY not going to get what's going on in '*Genius in France*,' but the fact that **Dweezil Zappa** appears on it should give you an idea. Pretend for a minute that **Al** had been given the opportunity to write a song with **Frank Zappa** before **Frank** left on his final tour. Lyrically, it gets pretty nasty and self-deprecating for the song's protagonist (I couldn't help but think of **Jerry Lewis** throughout this thing, although it just as easily could apply to French "icons" like **Charles Aznavour**, **Serge Gainsbourg** or even **Gerard Depardieu**), but musically, if you know your **Zappa**, this song is a minor masterwork. Musical FZ references abound, from obvious nods to '*In France*,' '*I'm the Slime*' and '*Dog Breath in the Year of the Plague*' to basic 'Zappaisms' like sudden tempo changes and low-voiced, recited lyrics.

The parodies? Eh. I'm 45 years old. I've never heard the **Eminem** song **Al** parodies here and don't care to. And it's about TV shows, very familiar territory that **Al** keeps going back to over and over and over.

Same goes for the parody of a song by **Nelly**, whoever she is, who apparently is so illiterate she can't spell the word 'here.' (The song **Al** parodies is called -- and I'm not making this up: "*Hot in Herre*." With two "r"s. Our educational system is going in the toilet.)

However, thanks to my teenage sons, I am more than familiar with the songs **Al** plays in his '*Angry White Boy Polka*,' and as usual, **Al** shows just how stupid some songs really are when you reveal them to be easy to dance the polka to. (When he starts singing '*Fell in Love with a Girl*' by **White Stripes**, I just about wet myself.)

So if you're a **Weird Al** fan, get this. If you're thinking about becoming a **Weird Al** fan, you might want to get a couple other discs first. And if you do buy this album and you don't know who **Bob Dylan** or **Frank Zappa** are, take some extra money to the CD store, boy. You got some learnin' to do.

CopperCon 23 Chair’s Report

CopperCon 23 happened over September 4-7 and a good time was had by all. Things kicked off on Thursday with activities for pre-registered members. First up was Author Guest of Honor **Connie Willis** doing a reading from her upcoming Christmas story in **Asimovs’** where **Everywhere** is having a White Christmas. I’m sure everyone there will be buying the issue to see how it all ends up. Next was a special event with our **Farscape** guests, **Lani Tupu** and **David Franklin**, providing commentary to go with some **Farscape** clips and the episode “*Into the Lion’s Den Part II*” where Captain Crais (**Lani Tupu**) sacrifices himself. The two actors enjoyed seeing the clip collection, which included the first appearances of their characters (**David Franklin** had no recollection of filming the scenes in his first episode) as well as some other highlights from the series for their characters. During the episode, they didn’t say as much, since neither of them had really seen it completed and enjoyed watching it. They did spend some time afterwards talking with the fans about the episode and answered some other questions.

Friday started off mid-afternoon with panels and question and answer sessions from first **David Franklin** and then **Lani Tupu**. Saturday daytime saw panels and presentations by all of our guests. Some highlights during the day were **David Mattingly’s** workshop on digital painting, **Mark Greenawalt’s** latex body painting turning a model into an elvish work of art, **Connie Willis** joining in a panel on **Near Death Experiences** and finding out how prolific **Mike Willmoth** and **Randall Whitlock** are with puns on **The Dubyas** pun panel. **Larry Warner** gave a fun filk concert and **Lani Tupu** and **David Franklin** did a Q&A session together and visited with fans and signed autographs in the dealer’s room. We had Space Science panels featuring our local expert **David Williams** plus **Louise Kleba** from the

Kennedy Space Center and had many other authors and artists taking part including several from outside our area such as **Tee Morris** and **Kevin A. Murphy**. Finishing off the afternoon was the charity auction which raised \$2,170 for out two charities, **Reading is FUNDamental** and **ACTOR (A Commitment To Our Roots)**. We’d like to thank everyone who donated items and especially everyone who opened their wallets for this event. It is the largest amount we’ve raised in a charity auction in recent memory.

Saturday night was the Masquerade which had a good turnout of participants and a full house in the audience. Best of show was **Duel of the Fates** with **Steven Colston** as a very impressive Darth Maul. Other impressive costumes were **Parry Norton’s Sven the Viking King**, **Kevin O’Conner’s Sentinel Soldier**, and **Judy Mowbray’s Lady of the Masquerade**. There were also plenty of parties including Westercon 57, LosCon, The Dark Ones for DarkCon, San Diego Westercon ’06 Bid, and The Corsairs. The most popular one by far was the one put on by Xcentricities, who were set up to show off their line of corsets and other interesting clothing. Reports are that a certain **Farscape** actor (named David) was hanging out and being very helpful with people trying on the corsets. Look for Xcentricities to be back for future conventions in the area.

Sunday started off with **Barry Bard’s** movie previews, which looked very good on the projection system that was set up for it. As always, there were lots of movie promotional goodies for those in attendance. **Alan Dean Foster** made it to the con for a short time on Sunday, signing a few books and joining a panel before heading on to the airport. The day ended with the end-of-con panel which garnered mostly praise from the attendees and participants present.

Foster has committed to being Author Guest of Honor for CopperCon 24 next year, joining Artist Guest of Honor **Todd Lockwood** and Local Author Guest of Honor **Catherine Wells**. Based on the reception for the **Farscape** actors at this year’s convention (and the good time they had with us), there’s a good chance we may have more media guests next year.

Overall the convention was a success with a bit over 600 memberships in total. I personally received many thanks and notes of appreciation during and after the convention. Our guests were great and were very available to chat with attendees. **Connie Willis** spent a lot of time chatting with fans when she wasn’t on a panel. **Connie, David Mattingly** and his wife, **Cathleen**, also judged the masquerade. I enjoyed the time I got to spend with them during the convention. I’d like to thank everyone who attended and participated and especially the committee, staff and volunteers who made the convention happen.

Comic-Con Limited Edition: In Search of the Elusive Collectable By Shane Shellenbarger

“You can’t always get what you want.”
Rolling Stones

As I’ve done for nearly every year since 1973, I was headed for the San Diego Comic-Con. This year I had in tow my wife, Laurie, and her mother, Bobbi. My friend, Terry Hanks, had hoped to go, but while hope can spring eternal, finances can often throw up roadblocks. “Anything I can get you?” I’d asked. “Well,” said Terry, “There are a few things I was going to try to get the first day . . .” He e-mailed me the list with corroborating photos and I was good to go.

After arriving in San Diego on Thursday, July 17th, we checked into the hotel, registered at the convention, and then we began our search, our treasure hunt, if you will. Little did we know that the treasure hunt would turn into more of a scavenger hunt.

I’ve told you before how big the programming areas are: There is 204,114 sq. ft. of meeting room space, comprised of 72 meeting rooms, and there are two 40,000 sq. ft. ballrooms. The thing that you need to know is that the Exhibit Halls are even bigger. In September of 2001, Exhibit Halls D-H were added, more than doubling the size of the Hall to it’s present size of 525,701 square feet, or about 100 miles if you could walk each foot. This place is big, huge, ample, massive, gigantic, enormous, capacious, and humungous! Believe me, it is large. The first thing that we learned was that you don’t want to travel through the Exhibit Halls in order to travel to your destination. If your plan is to walk from exhibitor’s table to exhibitor’s table, you don’t have much choice, but we had three specific exhibitor’s (old school definition: dealers tables) areas that we needed to get to: Electric Tiki Design at 4631, DC Comics at 2731, and Hasbro at 3515. Fortunately for us, Hall H wasn’t being used this year, so there was that much less Hall to walk. With the press of people, each with their own agenda, random directional choice, and often expanding costumes, our progress was slow. If I were to set out on such a mission today, I’d walk through the Lobby area that runs along the North side of the Halls and then enter the Exhibit Hall at the doors nearest the booth I was seeking. I didn’t and that was Mistake #1.

My logic was to start at the furthest

point and work our way back toward the programming arena. We entered at Aisle 2700 and headed toward Aisle 4600, three salmon awash in the chaotic white water river rapids comprised of comic book fans of every shape, size, and complexion. Bobbi had been to other conventions, but never to a San Diego Comic-Con and never to an Exhibit Hall of this enormity, so I periodically needed to stop, retreat, and gently pry her away from the toys, comic books, posters, or anime that had captured her attention. I was quickly losing “favorite son-in-law” status.

After what seemed like hours, we spotted our quarry, Electric Tiki came into view. The people attending the booth were pleasant, and after a bit of searching they located the maquette of Little Dot in a blue dress, only 50 available at this convention for the price of \$40.00 each. Imbued with the thrill of completing our first quest, I made Mistake #2, I asked to buy three Little Dots, one for each of us. I wasn’t going to keep any for myself, but I was



sure that Terry wouldn’t mind having two extra figures, perhaps to trade or sell with other collectors. Perhaps I should call this Mistake #2 and #3, because after I convinced the dealer to sell Laurie, Bobbi, and myself each one of the Harvey Comic Book Heroine figures, he agreed provided we paid in cash. I readily concurred and plunked down \$120.00, gathered up the three boxes, and headed to the second stop, Hasbro on Aisle 3500. We’ll come back to Mistake #3.

Hasbro wasn’t a booth so much as it was a block of approximately 36 booths. We fanned out (as much as three people can fan out) and started asking the employees where we could get the silver Boba Fett. “You can’t get that here,” we were told. “You have to go to the Star Wars Fan Club Booth.” We headed in the direction indicated (back the way we had just come from, of course) and we eventually found the line. Well, we found the middle of the line, so we backtracked until we found the end of the line, near the South end of Aisle 4800. The problems were these: LucasArts were only distributing 300 figures each day and their booth

(the front of the line) was in the middle of Aisle 4200. Doing the math, we tried for a more sure thing: the Batman figure at the DC block between Aisles 2900 and 2700, taking us past the Hasbro block of booths.

The DC block had multiple lines, snaking in all directions. We'd get into a line and then ask our fellow travelers what we were in line for. After several false starts, we found the right line. "Wow," I thought to myself, "This line is going fast. They must have an efficient method worked out." Little did I know, DC wasn't selling the Batman figure yet, they were only stamping badges and distributing tickets for a raffle that gave you the CHANCE to buy a figure after 2:00 p.m. We got our badges stamped, took our ticket stubs, and Laurie and Bobbi headed back to the Boba Fett line and I left to attend programming.

I found out later that when the ladies went looking for the line it had all but disappeared, so they stepped up to get into the short line near the LucasArts booth. "Sorry," the Jedi costumed woman stated, stopping them, "but the limit has been reached for today. Comeback tomorrow." Nobody sees the Great and Wonderful Wizard of Oz, not nobody, not no how!

At around 4:30 p.m., Laurie arrived to hold my seat in the "From the Cradle to the Keyboard" panel and I followed Bobbi back to the DC block. They had both been able to buy the Batman figure and they had confirmed that my number had come up, as well. When we made it to the head of the line, I presented my badge, ticket stub, and asked if they took credit cards. "Nope, sorry, but it's cash only," said the DC employee, smiling as he took the twenty dollar bill. Quickly adding in my head the \$120.00 for the Little Dot figures and the \$60.00 for the Batman figures, Mistake #3 reared its ugly head: I hadn't counted on needing so much cash. Fortunately, I was able to borrow money from Bobbi and I repaid her later.

Friday dawned overcast and somewhat foggy. We got ourselves together and headed to the Exhibit Hall, Laurie and Bobbi to get in line first thing and me to take a sharp right and head for programming. At this point it should occur to you that I have a very understanding and somewhat indulgent wife and mother-in-law and you would be right. The two ladies were going above-and-beyond the call of duty. Laurie and Bobbi arrived at the Exhibit Hall doors only to be directed to the Sails Pavilion, the center section on the upper level. They trudged more than

half the length of the convention center, went upstairs, and sussed out a better way. They wound their way through the Exhibit Hall along the south wall, banded together with other intrepid souls, and found the line. They worked their way along the line until they found a costumed Jedi at the end. "Are you the end of the line for the Boba Fett figure?" Laurie asked. "Yes," he replied. They moved to get behind him. He stopped them with a word, "No, I'm the end of the line. They aren't selling anymore figures today." Other plans prevented further attempts. This prevented us from making Mistake #4: Not knowing when to cut your losses and give up. Thus, that was most definitely that.

When we got home and I'd shipped Terry his figures, Mistakes #2 and #3 came back to haunt me. By buying Terry two more Little Dot figures than what he'd asked for, I caused him more work. He needed to prepare ads and put up for auction the two Little Dots that he had no need for. I had strapped myself for cash by getting caught up in the thrill of the hunt and not sticking with his original request for a single figure. Fortunately, he was able to unload the figures and made a tidy little sum. Alls well that ends well.

While checking out Terry's auctions

on e-bay, I got curious. Were there other limited convention collectables? This is what I found: There were nearly fifty convention exclusives, everything from Hulk, Ultimate Spider-Man, and yellow shirt Captain Kirk by Art Asylum, Mezco's Dick Tracy Meets The Blank Mez-it's 2-Pack, to a Thundarr Action Figure with Glow-in-the-Dark Sword by Toynami. If you are one of those collectors who want to "collect'em all", I wish you luck, all the luck in the world.

Arucard saves a special police operative, Victoria, from death by turning her into a vampire. Working together they an army of vampires as well as her newfound hunger for blood.
This series is rated 16+ for it's violence, sexual situations, and language. This is not for anyone who faints at the sight of blood. It's a bloody graphic violent story and a good one at that. If you liked *Vampire Hunter D*, you will love the *Hellsing* series. - **CLD**

*** **Hellsing 2: Blood Brothers**

Continuing the series *Hellsing 2: Blood Brothers* finds Arucard, Victoria and the Hellsing Organization facing two threats, a traitor in their midst and a TV reporter who wants to expose the Hellsing organization. Then the Valentine Brothers, Jan and Luke, lead their army in an attack on headquarters, which ends in a wave of violence. Yes, it is a bloody graphic wave of violence.
While it's not as good as the first DVD, it still worth watching. This second DVD sets the stage for the next two volumes in the Hellsing series, *Search and Destroy*, and *Eternal Damnation*. Both will be reviewed next time. - **CLD**

**** **X (One)**
Pioneer, 100 mins 16 up
DVD \$29.98

X is a manga series, turned into a movie and then into a TV series. *X (One)* contains the first three episodes of the TV series plus a bonus Episode 0 that gives an overview of the entire series, however you may want to skip Episode 0 as it could spoil the series' plot for you..

The series pits the Seven Dragons of Heaven (the good guys) against the Seven Dragons of Earth (the bad guys) to decide the fate of Earth. Kamui Shiro is being watched by both sides since his psychic powers may well will tip the scales and seal the world's fate so both sides want to recruit him. Reluctantly Kamui becomes involved though his involvement soon puts those he cares about in danger.
This is a wonderful dark fantasy with an intricate plot and plenty of character development. In some places it is a little bit hard to follow the plot but all in all I enjoyed this DVD. This is a very good series that holds your attention from start to finish. - **CLD**

**** **X (Two)**
Pioneer, 75 minutes, 16 up

As the Seven Dragons of Heaven assemble in Tokyo, Yuzuriha and her dog spirit Inuki, Arashi and Sorata Hinoto learn that Kamui is the key to the upcoming battle that will take place between the Dragons of Heaven and the Dragons of Earth. The fate of the world depends on whether Kamui joins the Dragons of Heaven or the Dragons of Earth and so he walks out on everything.
More questions are answered, but Kamui still has even more unanswered questions. *X Two* is just as good as *X One*. The *X* series is really worth getting. There are six DVD's out so far and I've heard that eight may be the total number of DVD's. - **CLD**

***** **Armitage: Poly Matrix/ Armitage Dual-Matrix**
Pioneer (2-disc set), 180 mins, 16 up
DVD \$39.98

This special set contains both *Armitage III: Polymatrix* and the *Special Edition of Armitage Dual Matrix*. These are stories about technology and emotion, about love and hate, but ultimately about a human on the edge of becoming a machine and a machine who is about to become human.
In *Poly Matrix* it is 2179 and: Mars has been colonized by Earth. The population consists of humans and "Second Types" robots that were made to do the menial tasks humans won't do. But there are also "Third Types" that were made by an underground nationalist force; illegal humanoid robots that look and behave exactly like humans. These "Third Types" have been living peaceful on Mars's until; Rene Danclaude declares war on them, kicking things off with a massacre
Thus arrives Naomi Armitage, an undetected "Third" who is a cyber-punk Martian cop in hot pants, with an attitude as deadly as her gun. Her partner, Ross Sylibus, hates robots since his previous partner was killed by one. When he is injured he receives a cyernetic replacement for his lost limb, making him kin to the "monsters" he hates, and thus begins to realize that there is more to being human than flesh and blood.
Ross joins Armitage in her fight against D'anclaude and together they try to discover why the 'Third Type' robots were created to begin with..

Chobits is the latest series from the female artists' studio Clamp that brought us *X* and *Cardcaptor Sakura* and while is another tale about the geek who meets a lovely, female android don't expect it to be the playful, innocent fun you find in *Cardcaptor Sakura*. It is more adult in its theme thus earning a 16+ ranking from Pioneer. Feminists will need to look past the obvious in this series (such as boobly jokes) and focus on the issues of relation-

ships and identity or take a pass. *Persocom* introduces us to 18-year-old Hideki Motosuwa, who leaves his family's farm and travels to Tokyo to attend prep school. 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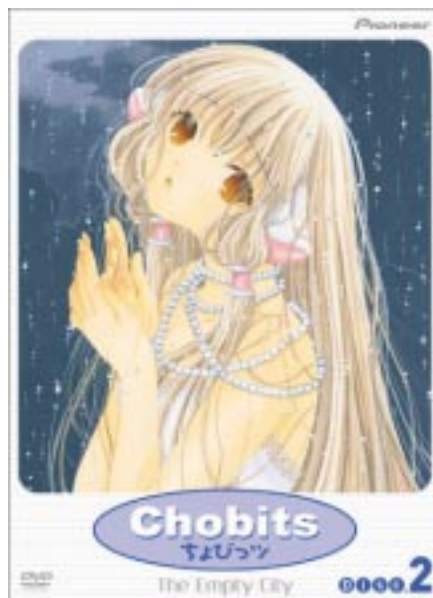

Love's Savage Bindings

You see them next to the checkout at any grocery store, those steamy historical fantasy novels whose covers feature a buxom maiden in a passionate kiss with some un-shirted body builder, both of their long hair streaming in the breeze².

These books are called "**Bodice Rippers**" because they inevitably include a scene where our sensuous-but-not-too-far-from-innocent heroine and the desert

prince, pirate captain, wounded confederate soldier, or other dashing-but-socially-unacceptable leading man lose control and tear out of their period costumes for several pages of sweat-soaked literary exposition.

Now wait just a whale-boning minute here!

Bodices and corsetry for most of these historical periods were marvels of structural engineering, with stiff boning, sturdy stays, and strong cordage. This is the eighth novel in an open series, with the ninth already announced for 2004. Take the following TV series and mix them together: *Buffy the Vampire Slayer*, *Stargate*, *Earth Final Conflict*, and you may get this storyline. By this novel, World War Three has ended and Earth defeated the remnants of aliens who were the gods of Atlantis and Egypt. Traces of the aliens and their powers remain, such as five vampires, including the original Dracula. This novel tells their own story, ranging through history from ancient Egypt to conclude in the present. While the undead vampires were many influential conquerors of the past, I get the impression this is their first appearance in the series, a sideline to the world war that is over. Their story wraps up in this book, while the next one is subtitled *Legend*. That could be about anything or anyone. Many paranormal pop-culture icons get tied into this series, like King Arthur's sword Excalibur and Area 51 and Nazis and foo fighters and the Holy Grail and a secret society of Watchers and haven't we seen all this before? That's OK, it's still fun to see it all tied together yet again. - Mike Griffin

Bit At Large

This story is a brave attempt to project the reader into a personal relationship with the characters. It feels a bit haphazard, the author bounces us very rapidly between characters and scenes. Jo follows her sister into the other world without knowing how she did it. Brian and Jo's lover, David, follow both women only to fall victim and become

Shadows and Lights
By Anne Bishop

I hope you have been reading these books by Ms. Bishop. She is the author of the *Black Jewels Trilogy* and *“The Invisible Ring.”* These are rich tales of the Fae, humans and the “wiccanfae” (witches) who live in Sylvalan.

The Fae are arrogant and reclusive and live in a land removed from Sylvalan called Tir Alainn. They enter the mundane world through magical roads, usually to dally amorously among the wiccanfae and humans. And when they are done, they return to Tir Alainn.

But events in Sylvalan have escalated downhill and an evil manifested by the Inquisitors, called Black Coats, are killing the witches because they think they are a blight upon the land. As a matter of fact, they have also spread a doctrine of making womenfolk utterly beholden to the men in their lives and have their actions and their tongues curtailed. The Inquisitors have even begun to burn books and artwork created by women.

But it is the witches the Inquisitors really want to eradicate because the witches anchor the Old Places, which are imbued with magic to the human world and usually have paths called “shining roads” that allow the Fae to enter the human world. And all magic to the Inquisitors is anathema.

The Fae, who sound like very arrogant elves, all gorgeousness and powerful realize that their world is being threatened by the death of the witches. However they do not want to lower themselves by helping, dismissing the witches as expendable supporters of Fae desires and wishes.

Of course, there is an exception to this arrogance: a Fae couple, The Bard and The Muse.

“Shadows and Light” deals with their desperate race through Sylvalan to stop the destruction of the witches and with them, the Old Places and access to Tir Alainn. As well as make the people aware of the insidious plot of the Inquisitors.

The Inquisitors speed up their attacks on the witches and the Old Places. The Bard and The Muse, Aiden and Lyrra, having given up on trying to persuade the Eastern clans of the Fae for help, turn to their estranged Western clans. These clans have remained apart from the other clans and not much is known about them. Aiden and Lyrra discover that the Western clans may hold the salvation of all of Sylvalan.

Bishop is a very enjoyable writer. Easy to read and a great hand with developing her characters and their environment, all colored with a nice dry sense of humor

and a wonderful lusty sense of life. She tells a compelling story that cares the reader effortlessly to the end. - **Sue Martin**

Shadows Over Baker Street

Shadows gather and Holmes and Watson face a raft of new foes. The Necronomicon with all that it portends comes across from Innsmouth. Visitors from Miskitonic University arrive and Strange Creatures from Dimensions Beyond crawl through the London Fogs and invade the Hinterlands of Britain. From the pens of some the finest Horror, Fantasy and Science Fiction writers living today come new tales. These are tales of Holmes and Watson with the true flavor and ambience of Lovecraft.

Contributing stories were Neil Gaiman, Elizabeth Bear, Steve Perry, Steven-Elliot Altman, James Lowder, Brian Stableford, Poppy Z. Brite / David Furguson, Barbara Hambly, John Pelan,

The severest criticism that can be mounted against this anthology is that in the main it adheres too closely to the original format of the Sherlock Holmes stories. Of course this is unfair since it sets out to be an anthology of Sherlock Holmes stories set in the Cthulhu Mythos. Except for Neil Gaiman who turns the whole concept of the anthology on its head and Elizabeth Bear’s fine Irene Adler piece, the stories are just good well written tales of Sherlock Holmes which might have come from the pen of Conan Doyle himself. But they didn’t.

Those who expect new stories typical of the authors will be disappointed. These are Sherlock Holmes stories narrated by Dr. Watson. One story uses the ship Dracula traveled to England in as a frame,

but does not involve the Count or any of the characters in the Dracula novel. It is just an unrelated event occurring at the same time as events in the novel. The back drop of the beached ship lent added enjoyment. Other uses of Victorian backdrops and characters are there to be found by the observant reader. The book is fun. I recommend it. – **Gary Swaty**

Duel
Terror Stories By
Richard Matheson

This Anthology is an interesting and fairly representative collection of Matheson’s short fiction. There are no notes in the text, but I recognize a number of them as having been dramatized, notably *Duel*, *Little Girl Lost*, *Shipshape Home*, *Third from the Sun*. All of these were wonderful stories when I read them and made excellent film dramas.

They are typical of the spare technique used by Matheson to achieve his affects. Usually the horror is achieved not by piling up numerous awful events but rather by choosing one bad thing and going with it. In *Shipshape Home*, it was the Janitor with his third eye. In *Third from the Sun* it was the fear of being caught and stopped. In *Lover when you’re Near me*, it was the awful realization of who the Lover’s mate was. In *Being*, it was the waiting to be consumed. A single idea in every case artistically executed to achieve the impact. He uses the same technique in his TV and Movie scripts.

This volume will have to do until they come out with the Matheson’s Complete Short Fiction: The One Volume Edition. Recommended. – **Gary Swaty**

The White Dragon is part one of *In Fire Forged*, a two book sequel to *In Legend Born* and will be completed with the release of *The Destroyer Goddess* in December, 2003.

It is a time of change for the island nation of Sileria. Having formed a fragile alliance to overthrow the Valdani under the leadership of Josarian,”the Firebringer”. The alliance disintegrates with the Waterlord, Kilorans magical slaying of Josarian beginning a take over of Sileria. Josarians sworn blood brother, Tansen must form a new alliance to combat the Waterlord, and make way for the new leader foretold by the destroyer goddess, Dar, through the guardian, Mirabar. Every character is fleshed out, and almost anyone will find a character they can identify with. The Savage Caves

In A Spell for Chameleon, Bink has no apparent magic in a kingdom that exiles everyone that doesn’t evidence magic by age 25. After an adventurous quest to the Good Magician Humphrey, neither Humphrey, or Beauregard the Genie can identify what that magic is. Although Humphrey writes a note to the [senile] King, declaring he does have magic, Bink is exiled to Mundania.

There he begins his second series of

adventures with The Evil Magician Trent in which nothing is what it seems. In *The Source for Magic*, the King wants to know what the source of Xanth’s magic. He sends Bink, and his companions out on a quest for truth. Harried by an unseen creature determined to stop them, and having allies become enemies it will become a battle of wits and luck to prevail.

In *Castle Roogna*, Millie the former ghost had taken up being the Nanny to Bink and Chameleon’s son Dor. But the sprightly Millie pines for the Zombie Master, Jonathan. To help Millie, Dor embarks on a journey to get the elixir that will restore Jonathan to full life with Millie. It, too, is an adventure filled with Xanthian surprises.

The first three Xanth novels, classics in their sub-genre, have less word play than the later novels, but does make a splendid way to spend a rainy afternoon. - **Pam Allan**

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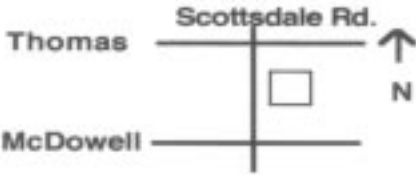

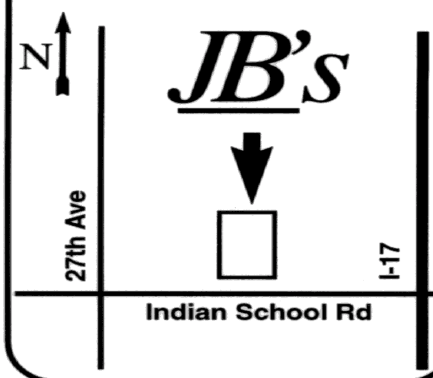
