The Arizona Book Festival on Saturday, April 3rd, will feature authors **Ursula K. Le Guin, Alan Dean Foster,** and **Diana Gabaldon** on the main stage with CASFS bringing in **Timothy Zahn** and other local authors for autographing and a special block of programming. **LeGuin** will also be appearing at ASU on Friday, April 2nd.

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SF Tube Talk

TV News & Previews By Lee Whiteside

If its February, it must mean new episodes! We're into the February ratings sweeps which means all the network and broadcast syndicated shows are running new episodes as well as a few cable outlets. There's also a few new shows starting up to check out and lots of news on things coming down the pike over the next year.

First off on UPN, **Enterprise** continues its journey through the Delphic Expanse, finding out more about the Xindi and their threat to Earth. First up is *Stratagem*, where Archer finds himself face-to-face with Degra, the designer of the Xindi super-weapon, and tries to trick him into revealing its location. Next is *Harbinger* where a mysterious alien is found dying in a spaceship and Trip gets a bit friendly with one of the female MACO officers, possibly inciting some jealousy in T'Pol. According to writer **Manny Coto**, this episode "will ultimately reveal a great secret about the Spheres and who built them and why." Doctor Phlox comes to the forefront in *Doctor's Orders*, where he puts the crew in comas to keep them alive when Enterprise encounters a trans-dimensional anomaly. In *Hatchery*, Archer tries to save the offspring of a group of Xindi Insectoids when he discovers their crashed ship on a barren planet. Rounding out the latest batch of new episodes will be *Azati Prime*, bringing the temporal cold war back into the Xindi storyline full force. When Enterprise finally arrives at the sight of the Xindi weapon that is meant to destroy Earth, Archer's mission is thrown into doubt when Crewman Daniels makes a visit. He takes Archer 400 years into the future to show him a conspiracy involving another species planning an invasion of the universe and explains that these creatures are responsible for pitting the humans against the Xindi in the first place.

In a change from previous seasons, there will be 24 episodes produced as opposed to the usual 26 episodes. The producers have decided to run the Xindi storyline through the entire season. They had indicated at the start of the season that they weren't sure how long it would last. My guess is they wanted to go the whole season all but waited until they saw the response to it before committing to all of it. In one interview, **Rick Berman** indicated that "the idea of a core storyline, a continuing storyline that hopefully doesn't get in the way of the standalone elements of each episode, seems to be something that fans are enjoying." They were also planning a ten-episode continuing storyline to get to the end of the season and the completion of the Xindi story arc.

Following Enterprise on UPN, **Jake 2.0**
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continues to impress, bringing in some ongoing government conspiracy type issues along with decent stories. Unfortunately, that hasn't been enough to keep the show from being the lowest rated drama on the broadcast networks, though. So, UPN has rescinded the full season order they had given it and it will end up with only 16 produced episodes. At press time, it is unknown if the remaining episodes will air in February or not. If so, following is info on three of the remaining four episodes. In *Blackout*, Cyber-genius Dumont cons the NSA into letting him out of prison and he uses a device to erase Jake's memory. Dumont's plan is to inject himself with Jake's nanites, but things go awry when Jake realizes that Dumont and his accomplice are not his friends. Confused and scared, Jake runs from both Dumont and the NSA. Next in *Get Foley*, still without a memory, Jake is wanders into a bar with a secret fight club in the back room. Needing money, Jake fights and surprises everyone with his strength. Meanwhile the NSA is desperate to find Jake and Diane is afraid that they will kill him. In *Dead Man Talking*, Jake is injured and his subconscious starts to interact with the computers in the NSA. At first its thought his mind is doing harm, but it turns out he ends up helping the NSA secure a threat.

Over on The WB, **Smallville** and **Angel** continue to be a good combination for The Frog on Wednesday nights. February **Smallville** episodes include *Hereafter*, about a home schooled boy who Clark mentors when he starts going to Smallville High that has visions of death. *Velocity* focuses on Pete for once when he gets involved with Street Racing and his popularity skyrockets. Of course, this is Smallville, so if the emphasis is on cars, some of them will likely explode! Watch out Pete! In *Obsession*, Clark meets a girl who can teleport due to the meteors and when she realizes Clark can do special things, she gets obsessed with him. In *Resurrection*, a man brought back to life has his liver failing and demands to get a transplant from the man in the operating room next door, who just happens to be Jonathan Kent, in the hospital for some tests. Ongoing through these episodes will be a continuing storyline with Adam (**Ian Somerhalder**), who helped Lana with her physical therapy and continues to develop a relationship with her despite some hints that he has some sort of dark secret behind him. Coming up in April will be a return appearance by **Christopher Reeve** as Dr. Swann, who will have a visit from Lionel Luthor that will lead to another meeting with Clark.

Angel kicks off sweeps with the series' 100th episode, bringing back Cordelia for a visit. According to **Joss Whedon** at the TV winter press tour "that's very much kind of an opportunity to sum up and sort of go,

Movie News By Lee Whiteside

As expected, **Lord of the Rings: Return of the King** surpassed the first two movies in box office draw, taking the top spot for several weeks in a row. The movie has been deservedly garnering various awards for both the picture itself and Director **Peter Jackson**. We'll find out how the Motion Picture Academy feels about it at the end of February when the Oscars are handed out. Look for about 45 minutes more footage in the extended DVD version later in the year including an opening 7 minute segment dealing with **Christopher Lee's** Saruman and hopefully some segments showing a bit of the romance that developed with Eowyn and Faramir.

Rumored to be in the works (and an announcement may happen after our press deadline) is a **Babylon 5** feature film. Rumors and other indications are that British film company Winchester Entertainment is working with **Babylon 5** creator **J. Michael Straczynski** on a new film project. **Straczynski** has indicated that he was writing a script for a new **Babylon 5** project of some sort and that there could be an announcement about it by the end of January.

The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy movie is moving towards actually happening. Reports from the BBC Films web site are that **Martin Freeman** (Tim Canterbury on **The Office**) is set to play Arthur Dent and that **Bill Nighy (Underworld, Love Actually)** will take on the role of Slartibartfast. "I'm a big fan of the book and the people who are making it are very cool people and I think they're going to do a good job," says **Nighy**. "It's a really good script. It's really, really faithful [to the book]. All the jokes are there and they're big fat jokes. It's wonderful. And with all the technology we have now, it can not only be a big satisfying comedy but I figure it could be quite exciting as well." Rumors are that Marvin, The Paranoid Android, may be short and have **Warwick Davis** inside the costume designed by the Jim Henson Creature Shop. Look for the rest of the cast to be announced soon.

Gearing up for production is **Batman: Intimidation** which will star **Christain Bale** as Batman and **Michael Caine** as Alfred. Other roles are still to be cast. Rumors are that the movie is set during Batman's early days and takes place mostly in London. It will deal with eternal mad megalomaniac Ra's al Ghul and his daughter, Talia.

The latest Harry Potter installment, **Harry Potter And The Prisoner Of Azkaban**, is in post-production and will hit the theatres this summer. The Harry Potter

franchise gets darker with the arrival of Sirius Black (**Gary Oldman**) and the Dementors - the gaolers at Azkaban, who can conjure up a person's worst fears. Returning are **Daniel Radcliffe**, **Rupert Grint**, and **Emma Watson** and new for this movie are **David Thewlis** (as new Dark Arts professor Lupin), **Robert Hardy** (as Minister for Magic Cornelius Fidge) and **Julie Christie** (as Madam Rosmerta). **Michael Gambon** replaces the late **Richard Harris** as Dumbledore.

Starting to get some notice with its first trailer is **I, Robot**, opening in June. Inspired by the **Asimov** stories, it is set in a near future (2035) where robots are commonplace, it sees Chicago cop Del Spooner (**Will Smith**) investigating the murder of a doctor. An android named Sonny (a CG creation, based on Alan Tudyk) is implicated in the killing, but according to the Laws of Robotics - which states no robot can harm a human - he can't possibly have done the deed. Can robots circumvent their circuitry? And if they can, will they take over the world? Dr. Lanning (**James Cromwell**), the inventor of über-advanced robots is investigated by Spooner, as is head doctor Susan Calvin (**Bridget Moynahan**) - who specialises in the psyches of robots. Directed by **Alex Proyas (Dark City)**, this could be a worthwhile **Asimov** adaptation if they don't play up the humor too much.

After the release of the trailer for **Spiderman 2**, most fans are salivating at the chance to see the whole movie. **Alfred Molina** looks to definitely fit the bill as Dr. Octopus and the action content promises even more than the first movie did. The main question is how much money will it make? The characters have moved on a bit from the first movie, with Peter Parker attending Empire State University with Mary Jane pursuing a modeling career and getting involved with astronaut John Jameson (J. J. Jameson's son and future Man-Wolf). Harry Osborne is still around and is Peter's best friend while harboring his hatred for Spider-Man.

Star Wars Episode III is well into post production with **Lucas** putting together the initial CGI work with the live action filming. It will pick up three years after **Attack of the Clones** and will detail Anakin's slide over to the Dark Side. There are more and more rumors and indications that Lucas is leaving his options open for Episodes 7, 8 & 9. Actors such as **Peter Mayhew** (appearing a Chewbacca in episode three) have indicated his contract includes options for later movies and various Lucasfilm licensees have indicated clauses of a similar type. While Lucas is not yet admitting to planning additional movies, they are definitely keeping their options open for the possibility.

The **Elektra** movie will film this summer during **Jennifer Garner's** summer break from **Alias**. Marvel executive **Kevin**

'Good lord, we've been doing this for a while, and without being sly and postmodern about it and winking at the audience, really using it as a milestone and having her—because she was there at the beginning—come and say, 'Well, where are you now? Where were you when we started, and where are you now and how do you feel about that?'" In the episode, *You're Welcome*, Cordelia awakens from her coma with a vision of a tattooed man out to get Angel, leading to issues with Lindsey, Spike and Eve. In *Why We Fight*, we flash back to World War II and events in Angel and Spike's life during that time focusing on a trapped German U-Boat that Spike and Angel end up on which leads to a confrontation with another vampire in present day Los Angeles. *Smile Time* sees Angel and company battle evil puppets, characters on a popular children's show. The puppets hypnotize the children through their TV's and either drain their essence or take over their bodies.

FOX's *Tru Calling* will add **Jason Priestley** to the cast for the last seven episodes of the season. **Priestley** will play Jack Harper, a new forensic attendant at the morgue where Tru Davies works. Although he seems like a nice guy, he has a secret that may hinder Tru's ability to go backward in time to save people who die

unjustly. Upcoming episodes include *The Longest Day* that sees a father being killed when robbing a drugstore to be able to pay for medicine his daughter needs. Tru has to repeat the day several times before coming to a resolution. In *Valentine*, Tru tries to stop a serial killer from killing and really ends up trying to keep him from getting killed. In *American Beauty*, Tru has to unravel the poisoning of a beauty contestant in a beauty pageant where she finds ex-boyfriends, blackmail and other red herrings. *Daddy's Girls* has Tru reluctantly joining her father and step-mother Jordan for her father's 50th birthday when they visit New York. Tru's power comes into play when Jordan is killed and she has to save her. In *The Getaway*, Tru tries to stop a young couple on a crime spree. She is also being trailed by a reporter.

Elsewhere on the networks, *Joan of Arcadia* continues to draw in the viewers. Fan sites so far that I've found haven't gotten much advance info. *Charmed* continues to get sillier, it seems, with a 60's episode, an *I Dream of Genie* inspired story and other high concept episodes such as upcoming ones titled *The Courtship of Wyatt's Father* and *The Legend of Sleepy Halliwell*. The WB has already announced a renewal for a seventh season of *Charmed* for next year. For mid-season, look for *Stephen King's Kingdom*

Hospital on ABC on Wednesdays beginning on March 3rd. From the ABC Press release "Using the Danish miniseries *"Riget"* (a.k.a. *"The Kingdom"*) as a point of inspiration, master of horror **Stephen King** gives this story a unique and menacing American touch. King himself describes it as *"ER"* crossed with *"The Shining."* Kingdom is a hospital whose bizarre population includes a brilliant surgeon who lives in the basement, a nearly blind security guard and a nurse who regularly faints at the sight of blood. But when patients and staff hear the voice of a girl crying through the halls and a patient destined for life as a paraplegic miraculously recovers, they are dismissive of any suggestion of mysticism or unseen powers... at their own peril." Starring in the series are **Andrew McCarthy**, **Diane Ladd**, **Bruce Davison**, **Ed Begley Jr.**, and **Allison Hossack**.

FOX has announced a premiere date for *Wonderfalls*. It will debut on Friday nights starting March 12th for at least seven episodes in place of *Boston Public*. The show is described as a "one-hour dramedy about a Niagara Falls tourist-shop clerk whose life is dramatically altered when inanimate figures begin talking to her." Jaye Tyler, played by French Canadian actress **Caroline Dhavernas**, is the underachieving 20-something heroine who questions her

sanity when objects – including toys, cartoons and anything in the form of an animal – begin to talk to her. Each week, the creatures give Jaye cryptic messages, setting into motion a chain of unpredictable events that invariably lead Jaye into the lives of others in need. Created by **Bryan Fuller** (*"Dead Like Me"*) and **Todd Holland** (*Malcolm in the Middle*), and executive-produced by **Fuller**, **Holland** and **Tim Minear** (*"Angel"*), *Wonderfalls* focuses on Jaye as she meddles in, muddles up and ultimately better the lives of herself and the eclectic variety of strangers who cross her path.

CBS's midseason genre entry, *Century City*, will debut on Tuesday, March 16. It is a futuristic legal drama from executive producers **Paul Attanasio** (*"Homicide: Life on the Street"*), **Katie Jacobs** and **Ed Zuckerman**. The series is set in Los Angeles in 2030 and follows the lawyers at a high profile firm who deal in the ethical issues of the near future, cloning, genetic mapping and identity theft. **Nestor Carbonell** (*"Tick"*), **Hector Elizondo** (*"Chicago Hope"*), **Ioan Gruffudd** and **Viola Davis** lead the ensemble cast.

Still awaiting word on when it will air on FOX are *Still Life* (the family drama from the point of view of their dead son). Don't expect to see it until after the latest run of *American Idol* is finished up on

FOX. The WB has now completely dropped **Fearless**. Initially announced for last fall, and then for mid-season, and then for next Fall, The WB has decided that the series about the FBI agent born without the gene for fear just didn't work as a weekly series (and barely worked as a pilot).

The syndication waters will be getting murkier with the announcement that **Andromeda** has been renewed for a fifth season and will start showing up on SciFi Channel with new episodes airing on SciFi a week or so before they air in syndication. This arrangement may start in March when **Andromeda** will likely join the SciFi Friday lineup. There's not much info on the new episodes coming up in February for **Andromeda** or **Mutant X**, though. **Andromeda** has done a better job this season, especially when they follow up on elements set up earlier in the series.

Starting on March 4th, SciFi will debut SciFi Thursday with a lineup geared towards the younger, more hip, audience (yes, **Stargate SG-1** is an older skewing demographic). Returning for a second season will be **Scare Tactics** with more of **Shannen Doherty's** hijinks with friends scaring friends. Debuting will be their new alternate reality series **Mad Mad House**. Five denizens of alternative lifestyles (a Vampire, a Wiccan, a Naturist, a Voodoo Priestess, and a Modern Primitive) host ten "Normals" who will take part in tolerance tests and other activities with one of them being banished each week from the house with the last normal taking home the \$100,000 grand prize. Also debuting that night is SCI FI's first animated series, **Tripping the Rift**. From the SciFi press release "This humorous and scandalously sexy show sends up all things sci-fi. The twisted half-hour follows the adventures of The Free Enterprise, a smuggling vessel led by a stumpy purple alien named "Chode" who, along with his colorful group of misfit shipmates, battles archenemies and new obstacles in space each week. The voice cast includes **Stephen Root**, **Gina Gershon**, "**Stuttering**" **John Melendez** and **Maurice LaMarche**."

Also announced by SciFi as going into production for airing in December is a four hour mini-series based on **Ursula K. Le Guin's Earthsea** stories. Based on the first two books, *Wizard of Earthsea* and *The Tombs of Atuan*, the miniseries is written by **Gavin Scott (Mists of Avalon)**, and is produced by **Robert Halmi, Sr., Lawrence Bender** and **Kevin Brown** for Hallmark Television. As for their **Battlestar Galactica** miniseries that debuted in December, it garnered the third highest ratings for the channel ever (behind the first **Dune** miniseries and **Taken**), even increasing in ratings on the second night. **Ron Moore** is working on developing it as a regular series and options for the actors

have been extended to the end of January to give SciFi more time to decide on picking it up. Indications are that it will go ahead as a series, but with the recent acquisition of **Andromeda**, SciFi may decide they've got enough space shows for now.

Continuing with it's seventh season on Friday nights on SciFi is **Stargate SG-1**. Upcoming episodes include *Death Knell*, where Earth's secret off world base is discovered by the Goa'uld -- and Major Carter goes missing; *Heroes Part 1* where a film crew arrives to document the work of

series, **Stargate: Atlantis**, which will be paired up with **Stargate SG-1's** eighth season on Friday nights beginning in June. SciFi describes the new series as "A whole new adventure with a new team begins in the successful Stargate universe. In this spin-off from MGM Worldwide Television, a secret base left by the originators of the Stargate is found in the most unlikely of places: on Earth, buried within the ruins of the legendary civilization Atlantis. The implications of this discovery lead the team to a distant galaxy, where they find a primitive human

the S.G.C., but may capture more than they planned for when SG-1 is called into action; In *Heroes Part 2*, The S.G.C. comes under investigation after a mission that goes terribly wrong (better get the Kleenex out for this one); *Resurrection* has SG-1 investigate a secret N.I.D. laboratory, where a determined scientist has used cloning technology to create a Goa'uld-human hybrid; with *Inauguration* the newly-elected president must be informed about the Stargate program, and the team confronts the return of an old political foe; and rounding out the season (and partially setting up the spinoff series **Stargate: Atlantis**) will be the two part *The Lost City* where O'Neill and SG-1 go to great lengths to keep the Ancients' knowledge from falling into Goa'uld hands, General Hammond is reassigned by the president himself, Anubis begins a systematic assault on Earth, and the planet's only hope of salvation depends on whether SG-1 can find the Ancients' mythical Lost City.

You can probably guess where the lost city turns up based on the name of the spinoff

civilization threatened by a sinister new enemy." More on the new series next issue.

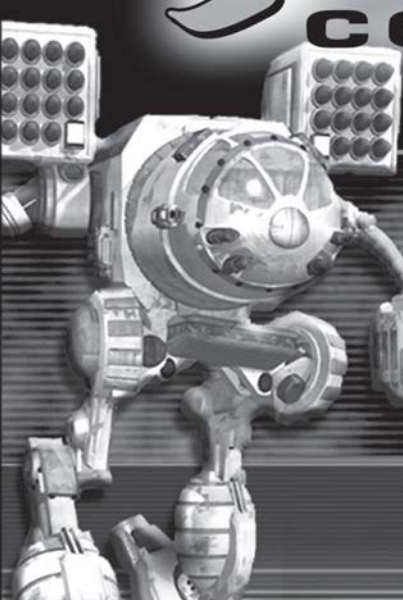
In other cable series, look for **The Dead Zone** to return for its third season on USA Network this summer. **Dead Like Me** has also been renewed by Showtime and will return this summer for its second season. The remaining second season episodes of **Jeremiah** are supposed to air

on Showtime starting in March, but is not certain.

There isn't much updated news on the new **Doctor Who** series. Producer **Mal Young** did do a radio interview where he discussed some of the plans for the series. **Russell T. Davies** has started writing the scripts for 12 or 13 stories and they have a short list of actors they are considering for the role. According to **Young**, "The trick that we have to pull off is stay true to the original spirit of the show and the original character, but make it for the 21st century and a younger audience now who have been brought up watching some fantastic sci-fi films and TV shows. Televisions changed, films have changed so we have to move with the times". Plans are still for production to start later this year with transmission sometime in 2005 on the BBC. Where it will debut in the U.S. is still unknown.

In the way of animated shows, the big event coming up is not the return of new episodes of **Stripperella** on Spike TV (returning to the airwaves on Feb 12th with a marathon of the existing episodes and the first of a new batch of episodes), but the continuation of Cartoon Network's **Star Wars Clone Wars** on March 26th with the remaining ten episodes of the twenty episode micro-series. Elsewhere on the Cartoon Network the second season (or is it really the second half of the first season) of **Teen Titans** continues (with the series now also airing on Kids WB). **Duck Dodgers** is in production for a second season and **Justice League** has been picked up for a third season (with the three part episode *Starcrossed* still to air from the second season).

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The Butterfly Effect
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What if you could go back in time to right a wrong? To renew a relationship? Fix something that was broken?” That is the premise of this movie, that this man has the ability to return to various points in his life to change what went wrong.

Evan Treborn (Ashton Kutcher) is a man with the ability to possess himself in the past. He can use this to change events to avoid situations that scarred his psyche and/or that of Kayleigh Miller (Amy Smart). His focus is his journals, by reading and remembering what happened he can project himself back.

As the movie opens Evan is a young boy with periodic blackouts. We later find out that the blackouts are caused by him later going back to “fix” things. Nothing is ever fixed perfectly and he continually tries to “improve” his life and that of his friends and family. Needless to say, he remembers everything and everyone else remembers nothing.

I enjoyed this movie more for the premise than for the acting. Amy Smart did a wonderful job and I expect a possible Oscar nod for her performance (provided the voters can look beyond her being in “Dude where’s my Perfect Life?”) Watching this movie I kept reminding myself that Ashton was trying to be a serious actor. However I couldn’t bring myself to see beyond his blank stare and his over reacting facial expressions. The rest of the supporting cast was great, and in particular the 7-year old Evan (Logan Lerman) and the 13-year old Tommy (Jesse James) were outstanding.

I give it 3.5 stars out of 5 - **Bob LaPierre**

The Waldorf Conference: Microphones, scripts, and actors

We knew it was a bit crazy, flying to Los Angeles, renting a car, booking a hotel room for one night, eating dinner, shopping at Ikea, attending a play, spending the night and then flying back to Phoenix the next morning. Maybe more than a bit crazy, but we did it anyway and we’re glad we did.

On the morning of November 24th, 2003, Laurie and I left our Vue in a car park, hopped on board the airport shuttle, and made our way through the airport to our gate. Just over a month before I had heard about “the Waldorf Conference”, a radio play that would be performed at the Writers’ Guild of America Theatre in Beverly Hills. It had premiered on October 27, 1993 as a presentation of LA Theatre Works and was broadcast live over KCRW-FM. The cast at that time included Edward Asner as Louis B. Mayer, Shelley Berman as Samuel Goldwyn, Charles Durning as James F. Byrnes, David Ellenstein as William Goetz, John Kapelos as Spyros Skouras, Bill Macy as Barney Balaban, Richard Masur as Mendel Silberberg, George Murdock as Nicholas Schenck, John Randolph as Harry Cohn, Ron Rifkin as Dore Schary, William Schallert as Albert Warner, and John

Schuck as Eric Johnston.

The November 24th production was a benefit for the Hollywood American Civil Liberties Union and the Writers Guild Foundation. Nat Segaloff produced and John de Lancie directed with the following cast, Edward Asner as Louis B. Mayer, James Cromwell as James F. Byrnes, John de Lancie as Eric Johnston, Harlan Ellison as Barney Balaban, Michael Laskin as Mendel Silberberg, Paul Mazursky as Samuel Goldwyn, Kenny Morse as Spyros Skouras, Ethan Phillips as Harry Cohn, Robert Picardo as Dore Schary, Lawrence Pressman as Albert Warner, Jacob Snyder

as William Goetz, and Alan Toy as Nicholas Schenck. Laurie and I had seen most of these actors on television and in the movies, so we were understandably excited to be one row back from the stage.

The day went rather smoothly, excepting the wait for car rental shuttle, and after a late lunch at California Pizza Kitchen, shopping at Ikea, and browsing at Barnes and Noble we left Burbank for Beverly Hills at 6:00 p.m. There was a reception at 7:00 with the play starting at 7:30. We weren’t quite sure how to get there, but we had maps and we were only going about thirty miles, how tough could it be? Damn tough!

The traffic on the freeway was slow, it was nearly impossible to transition from one freeway to the next, and the interior light in the rental didn’t work. It took us ninety minutes to travel slightly over thirty miles! THIRTY MILES! When we did get to the theatre we had some parking difficulty. We rushed into the lobby just as a voice over the loudspeaker was calling for the audience to take their seats.

The plot of “The Waldorf Conference” concerns a meeting that took place on Monday, November 24, 1947 at 11 a.m., when forty-eight of the most powerful men in America secretly met in a suite at New York’s plush Waldorf-Astoria Hotel

These 48 Hollywood studio executives were Kings of their realms, gathered in fear of scrutiny by the House Un-American Activities

Committee. Dispite their violation of the anti-trust laws being used by the government to dismantle the studio monopolies, they had to come to a consensus about how to react to the Communist witch-hunts disguised as the just completed HUAC hearings in Washington, D.C. ; hearings that probed for Communist content in American Movies. In spite of their lack of evidence, the HUAC hearings brought about indictments of ten writers, directors, and producers for refusing to answer the committees questions about their political beliefs.

With bad publicity, box office returns dropping 25% from the year before, and the tension between the west coast showmen and their conservative east coast bankers, these 48 mogels knew that they had to act and act fast. They decided to beat the American government to the punch. They came up with a two-page public statement, the Waldorf Peace Pact, proclaiming that, until Congress could rid the country of Communists, the Industry would do it for them, starting with the “Hollywood Ten.”

And thus began the Blacklist..

Feige told comics Continuum that "The tone of the film will be fun and adventurous, but the villains always fit their heroes. And Elektra doesn't wear a mask or hide her face. It will be unique villains that I think people will recognize and be very excited to see." No word on who else will star in the movie.

Strictly in the rumor category is one that **Sean Astin** is in the running to direct the *Fantastic Four* movie with possible stars **George Clooney** as Reed Richards and **Orlando Bloom** as the Human Torch.

Movie Previews

As usual, there's not much in the way of genre stuff in the theatres at the beginning of the year. Be on the lookout for **Bruce Campbell's Bubba Ho-Tep** (Campbell as a nursing home Elvis who does battle with a demonic Mummy) possibly sometime in March. Also check out the Harkin's Valley Art for a special run of classic movies.

Lost Skeleton of Cadavra - As an homage to the ultra-low-budget, drive-in-friendly, science fiction movies of the 1950s and early 1960s (think **Ed Wood**, or the sort of movies spoofed on MST3K), this is the unlikely story of a meteor shower that deposits an ore called "atmosphereum" in the hills outside Los Angeles in 1961, attracting the scientific interest of a heroic scientist who hopes to use the scientific value of the ore for his science project (redundancy intended), and whose wife joins him on the expedition. What he soon finds out is that a pair of aliens (from the planet Marva in outer space!) are also after the atmosphereum as fuel for their space ship (out of which a dangerous space mutant has escaped). Also in the area is an evil scientist exploring the mysterious Cadavra Cave, reportedly home to the legendary Lost Skeleton, who discovers he also needs the atmosphereum to revive

the *Lost Skeleton of Cadavra*; and along the way, he uses the Marvan's transmutatron ray to meld four local animals into a beautiful mate for himself... *Scooby-Doo 2: Monsters Unleashed* The sequel to the 2002 hit that translated the lives of Fred, Daphne, Velma, Shaggy and



Scooby to the big screen as a live-action comic adventure. Starring: **Matthew Lillard, Sarah Michelle Gellar, Linda Cardellini, Freddie Prinze Jr., and Seth Green.**

Club Dread - A comedy sendup of serial killer movies. At Club Dread, an alcohol (and other substances) drenched swinging-singles-style island resort off the coast of Costa Rica, the festivities are interrupted by the presence of a machete-wielding serial killer, so it's up to the staff (the Broken Lizard guys who made "*Super Troopers*") to try to stop (or at least hide)

the bloodshed before they lose all their business (and of course, their swank jobs). Stars **Bill Paxton, Kevin Heffernan, Paul Soter, Steve Lemme, and Erik Stolhanske.** *Agent Cody Banks 2: Destination London* - **Frankie Muniz** returns as Agent Cody Banks. A rogue CIA agent (and Cody's own trainer) has stolen a top secret mind-control device, and Cody has to go undercover in London to get it back. Posing as a student at an elite music boarding school, Cody has to keep other kids from discovering his true identity while infiltrating covert hideouts, tracking his target - and practicing the violin. With all-new gadgets, high-flying comedy, a wisecracking new handler (**Anthony Anderson**), and a hip British Secret Service counterpart (**Hannah Spearrit**), Cody has to fight the toughest enemy possible - the very man who taught him everything he knows.

Dawn of the Dead - Yes, a remake of the classic horror film. As the United States is turned upside-down by a strange plague-like event in which millions of corpses walk the earth as blood-thirsty zombies (with the recently-deceased that the zombies kill usually returning as zombies themselves, multiplying their number), a small group of survivors of the onslaught, which include a nurse (**Sarah Polley**) and a police officer (**Ving Rhames**), try to find shelter and protection within a massive shopping mall in the mid-sized city of Everett, WA. What they don't reckon on is that the zombies still have some sort of residual memory, and *everyone* loves going to the mall, right? Realizing that their time is running out, they decide to make another attempt at flight, to a presumably un-zombie-infested island, but to do so, they'll have to get past thousands of zombies in-between... Starring **Sarah Polley, Ving Rhames, Mekhi Phifer, Michael Barry, and Lindy Booth**

complete with fierce red skin, a tail, a giant armored glove, and two large circles where his horns should be (if they ever grow back, Hellboy is quick to break them off). Now, the adult Hellboy, an investigator of the paranormal, is sent on a mission that brings him back in touch with the evil genius that started it all... that Nazi wizard (and just who is *he* anyway?). Accompanying him along the way are other agents, including Liz, a pyrokinetic woman Hellboy has feelings for, and Abe Sapien, a mysterious amphibian hominid... Stars **Ron Perlman** (Hellboy), **David Hyde Pierce, Doug Jones, Karel Roden, Jeffrey Tambor** and directed by **Guillermo Del Toro**.

Anyway, right to it... On the local front, **Alan Dean Foster** reports that he recently submitted a novelization of the upcoming Universal film, “The Chronicles of Riddick” starring Vin Diesel, the novel will appear from Del Rey, May 2004, the film in June. He also sent in the last two books of the TAKEN trilogy to Del Rey, “The Light-Years Beneath My Feet” and “The Candle of Distant Earth.” He is currently working on the outline for a massive near-future novel titled “Sagaramanda.” And this month, he’s off for Venezuela and Guyana to look for anacondas... We’ll see him back in Arizona in time for CopperCon24 as our GOH, I expect. **Michael Stackpole** tells me that the last book in the DRAGONCROWN WAR series was published in December. He’s working on the first book in a new fantasy series, titled “A Secret Atlas” which should appear fall/winter of 2004 and he has a contract for a new MechWarrior: Dark Ages novel due in 2005. **Jennifer Roberson** is finishing up “Karavans,” the first volume in a new fantasy series. She recently contracted with Five Star Books for a short story collection featuring most of her shorter works that have appeared elsewhere. She also has a novelette that blends the Robin Hood legend with Merlin appearing in a fantasy romance anthology titled “Irresistible Forces” plus a murder mystery/fantasy hybrid in an anthology titled “Murder Most Majickal.” **Jacqueline Lichtenberg** is leading her usual hectic, exciting life (through which I live vicariously....) - she has several of her SIME-GEN books back in print (too many to list here), an article in “Seven Seasons of Buffy,” edited by Glenn Yeffeth, April will have a trade paperback release of “Dreamspy” and in July she has a new SIME-GEN title coming out from Meisha-Merlin, titled “To Kiss or To Kill.” She’ll be at a CreationCon in Phoenix on Feb 15th AND... she might be in TREKKIES 2. From sunny Tucson, we heard from **Dennis McKiernan** that his next book to be published from Roc Books is “Red Slippers: More Tales of Mithgar” which is the final MITHGAR book and is a collection of short stories and a couple of novelettes and a novella (for those who count words...) and he promises that it ties up some, but not all, loose ends from **(Cont’d on page 9)**

Catherine Wells just sold a book of fairy tales to the church market, "Parable Time" from Augsburg/Fortress due in 2005; it is a collection of fables in the style of Mexican folk tales. She's also been doing a lot of fun research on 11th century Scotland for a project about the origins of King Macbeth, it's going to a second reading by a major publisher right now - let's all cross our fingers for her. Up north, in chilly Flagstaff, **Doranna Durgin** reports 2003 was a pretty intense year with the release of four books: "Angel: Impressions", "Angel: Fearless", "Mage Knight: Dark Debts," and "Femme Fatale." She also had a story in the "Space, Inc." anthology, plus the re-release of "Barrenlands." Next year we should see "Khamsin's Heir" and "Exception to the Rules" plus several anthology stories. "Rules" is for a new line of women's fiction, where she, happily, gets to play with the same kind of strong female characters she's used in her previous work.

From even further north, **Kevin J. Anderson** checks in from Colorado. He has been proofing the galleys of the third volume in his SAGA OF THE SEVEN SUNS, titled "Horizon Storms" and has written the first draft of Book 4, "An Ocean of Worlds." The graphic novel prequel to the series, "Veiled Alliances," was just published by Wildstorm/DC Comics. And for those diehard DUNE fans: he and Brian Herbert have delivered the final manuscript of "Dune: The Battle of Corrin" to Tor Books and Hodder & Stought in the UK. And the list goes on: Kevin is writing the novelization to the film "Sky Captain and the World of Tomorrow" for Penguin-Putnam. With Rebecca Moesta, he wrote a humorous four-issue comic series, "Grumpy Old Monsters" for IDW. The first two issues are already in

comic stores. Back down in New Mexico, **Fred Saberhagen** is just turning in "Rogue Berserker" to Baen and has signed with Tor to do a sequel to "Empire of the East" connecting it to the BOOKS OF SWORDS. (I imagine a lot of fans will be excited about that one.) (NOTE: I would love to hear from more writers in New Mexico, I know there's a lot of you out there.)

From California, we hear from **David Brin** who says his new graphic novel "The Life Eaters" is in bookstores now. This hardcover extends his novella, offering chillingly plausible insight to what the Nazis might have really been up to, during WWII. It's getting great reviews! He also has a short story collection, "Tomorrow Happens" which includes 2

Uplift stories. On the side, David has started his own software co., filing for patents in the field of real time 'meeting ware' or 'chat.' If you're interested, check out www.holocenechat.com. And, finally, he teases us with his next novel: Hint...they swim. They talk. They fly... **Larry Niven** tells me that "Ringworld's Child" should be out in June from Tor

Jinxed, Hexed, or Cursed:
The second part of how I
ruined Harlan Ellison's return
to Arizona,

We weren't in Dogpatch, but in Glendale, there weren't dark rain clouds, but bright blue skies, and I wasn't the Al Capp character, Joe Btfsplk, but I felt just as jinxed. An automotive accident had just occurred as I was transporting Harlan and Susan Ellison to a speaking engagement at Glendale Community College and I sat in my Saturn Vue, stunned.

Harlan wasn't stunned and he confirmed that Susan and I were both okay. He then got out and assessed the damage and let me know that the other driver was making calls including one to the police. I got on the cell phone, called my wife, Laurie, told her what had happened, and gladly accepted her offer to come and transport the Ellison's to G.C.C. I was on hold with the Glendale Police when two patrol cars pulled up. I followed the officer's directions and had moved my vehicle to a gas station on the North side of Glendale Avenue, with the other vehicle following suit.

Harlan was talking to one of the officers and I was still trying to make sense of what had happened. After a brief time, one of the officers asked me how fast

the other car had been traveling and I answered 50 m.p.h. The officer asked me a few more questions and then went to confer with the other officer. I was beginning to regain my composure and I had the presence of mind to take some pictures of the other driver's vehicle, taking note of the damage to his car from previous accidents. His white 1984 BMW 318i had damage to the front, side, and passenger mirror that were preexisting to our run in. As far as I could tell, rubber from my tire on his passenger door and a slight crimp that made the door a bit difficult to open were the only areas damaged on his car. My Vue was sporting a few scratches and some of his paint near the front bumper. I took more photos.

A few minutes later, Officer Rico approached me with a request from the other driver (who we'll call Mr. Ham) for money to compensate him for the damage to his car. Laurie hadn't arrived yet and I was anxious to get going so I asked Mr. Ham what amount he had in mind. He countered by asked how much I would give him. I told him \$20, thinking to myself that I shouldn't pay him anything for hitting us, but wanting to get the Ellison's to G.C.C. as soon as possible. Later, several people told me that I should have offered him \$100, but hindsight is 20/20. Mr. Ham said he wanted \$500 dollars. To say that this attempt at extortion made me

indignant would be an understatement and I said I wouldn't give him \$500 for the entire car. Mr. Ham said he wouldn't give me \$500 for my vehicle and that's when the officer interrupted and asked us to remain civil. My wife, Laurie arrived, so I walked away to calm down and to see that the Ellison's and their belongings were transferred to my wife's car and I watched them drive away.

With the negotiations between Mr. Ham and myself at an impasse, the officers moved off to confer. A few minutes later, I received a ticket for an Unsafe Lane Change Section 28-729.1 and I was on my way to G.C.C. I found out later from Laurie that Harlan was outraged on my behalf, throwing aspersions on Mr. Ham's driving ability and his moral compass. Have I mentioned how much I love Harlan? I arrived at G.C.C. and parked, heading to the room provided by Hannes Kvaran of the Speakers Forum. Laurie was waiting there, outside in 100 plus degree heat, concerned and anxious about my well-being. Have I mentioned how much I love Laurie? She made sure that I was okay, I got something to drink, and then she headed back to work. I got to the room, set up what turned out to be defective camcorders, and listened to Harlan speak.

After his talk, Harlan was incensed that I had received a ticket. As I drove the three of us to dinner, I was getting a bit incensed myself and when Harlan offered to return to Arizona and bear witness I accepted his offer. It was no longer about the \$131.00 fine or a couple of points on my driving record; it was about the principal of the thing. I began to feel a bit better.

Of course, nothing can ever go smoothly or as planned. Harlan is a busy man and conflicts between his schedule and the court dates began to crop up. The Days of Repentance began with Rosh Hashanah on September 27th and ended with Yom Kippur on October 6th. October 7th was out because Harlan and Susan were working on the election that resulted in Arnold Schwarzenegger becoming the Governor of California. I'm sure they tried their best, but you can't win them all. On October 14th, Harlan was scheduled for some surgery. I appealed, Harlan appealed, and a friend of Harlan's who was a prosecutor in Los Angeles appealed, all to no avail. After two continuances, the court wouldn't budge: the court date was set for October 14th, 1:30 p.m., Courtroom #1.

I asked Harlan not to miss his surgery, I asked him to write a statement that I could give to the judge. No. He said he would bear witness and he would be at Sky Harbor Airport on October 14th. I told him he was going to too much trouble, I didn't want him put out this much to come to my aid and I released him from his promise. He told me that keeping your word when it's easy doesn't mean

anything; your word only has substance when things are difficult. I have mentioned that I love Harlan, haven't I?

I appreciated Harlan's commitment and I didn't want to let him down when he was going to all of this trouble to come to my aid, so I started preparing my defense. I returned to the scene of the accident, made observations, took photos, and made measurements. This activity clarified for me what happened: Mr. Ham had been driving between 48 and 60 m.p.h. in the Turn Only lane prior to entering the Left Turn Only lane. I was in the right, Mr. Ham was in the wrong and I would build a case to prove it!

October 14th was another hot, clear day and Harlan's plane would arrive at 10:55 a.m. I left for Sky Harbor in plenty of time and arrived to find several levels of the parking lot full. Spiraling up the ramp, I reassured myself, patting the folder of photos and opening statements that would prove my case. I got off on the 4th level and eventually found a parking spot about a thirty-second walk from the elevator. I couldn't see the dark rain clouds beginning to form over my head.

Once inside the terminal, I headed for the Arrivals monitor and confirmed that the plane had not yet arrived. I took advantage of the delay and returned to the monitor with an empty bladder and clean hands. It was now after 11:00 a.m. and, according to the monitor, the plane still hadn't arrived. I paced a bit, looked about me, and indulged in some people watching. The time was now 11:15. It was then that noticed that the monitor showed Flight 146 had arrived. Odd, there was no noticeable increase in the traffic of passengers leaving the gate area for the main part of the terminal. The time was now 11:20. What's that? Did I just hear my name? Where's the white paging phone? Hello, yes, did you just call for a Shane Shellenbarger? You did? What was the message again, please? Baggage area? Thank you!

I head for the elevator, regret not using the escalator, and eventually make my way to the baggage claim, all the while scanning for Harlan. Soon, I spotted him making his way toward me and not long after that we were driving out of the airport.

Our first stop was at the home of local author, James Sallis, where Harlan surprised Sallis with a boxed set of jazz CDS. Next, we went in search of a luggage repair shop to fix a broken zipper on Harlan's case. After several failures, we chanced upon Tony's Shoe Repair at Park Central Mall. The craftsman had the zipper properly fixed and we were quickly on the road and headed for the Glendale courtroom. When we arrived in downtown Glendale we still had some time to kill, so we walked through an antique shop where Harlan picked up a brooch for Susan.

Laurie met us in the lobby of the courthouse and we proceeded through the

metal detectors and found our way into Courtroom #1. This was a hot day outside and the air-conditioning wasn't working in the courtroom, so we began to suffer. It was worse for Harlan, not being acclimated to the heat and having come from the cooler clime of California. Laurie and I were beginning to worry for his health. We weren't alone, as Officer Rico asked after Harlan when he left to get some water.

After what seemed like forever, the court clerk appeared and confirmed who was present. Eventually the judge appeared and after another hot forever, Harlan, Officer Rico, and I sat before the judge. I didn't get "that sinking feeling" immediately. The judge questioned the three of us, allowed me to make a statement and question Officer Rico, looked at the evidence I had submitted, and asked some more questions. Harlan, I believe, started to get "That sinking feeling" about the time I started to present "my case." Harlan attempted to come to my aid several times, but the judge prevented him and I wasn't sharp enough to realize that I had probably seen a few too many courtroom dramas on television, I had bogged down the judge with too much detail, and that I would have been better off if I had followed the principle of K.I.S.S.: Keep It Simple, Stupid. The sinking feeling came when the judge told me that I had "almost convinced her." Laurie told me later that a man in the gallery turned to her and commented that I had too much time on my hands. Joe Btfsplk dark rain cloud unleashed a downpour all over my parade. I have met the enemy and he is me.

Harlan and Laurie left the courtroom and I waited in line to pay my fine. I thought about what I should or shouldn't have done while I waited for the court clerks to grind through the rest of the queue. Eventually, I paid the ticket, bid goodbye to Laurie, and found Harlan at the Lenny's Burger next to the courthouse. I'm used to Harlan not hesitating to speak his mind, so when we had driven back to the I-17 and he hadn't told me what he thought, I asked. He hesitated, so I assured him I could take it and I wanted to know. He told me that I had acted like a fanboy, overthinking the situation and piling on unnecessary detail when I should have giving a simple, straightforward account. I agree and I hope that there isn't a "next time" to put his advice to the test. I can't say that I regret trying to win my case. If you don't try you'll always wonder, what if? Also, I guess I didn't completely ruin Harlan's return to Arizona. He hardly berated me at all when I spoke to him in November after his performance in "The Waldorf Conference."

The Costume Closet



The Villainous Jacket by Randall Whitlock

What is the well-dressed SF Villain wearing this year? If it's any year since 1962, when "Dr. No" hit the big screen, the answer is probably a well-tailored Nehru Jacket.

The Nehru Jacket is named for Jawaharlal Nehru, who served as prime minister of India from its independence from the British Empire until his death in 1964. The jacket is a perfect blend of traditional south Asian styles with western business suits. Nehru jackets were briefly popular in the west during the middle 1960's, most likely associated with the Beatles' well-publicized interests in meditation, sitar music, and other things Indian.

The Nehru Jacket and its less well-fitted cousin, the Mao Suit, have been worn by many familiar bad guys from film and television, including Dr. No, Ernst Blofeld*, The Master, and their perfect parodies, Dr. Evil and Mini Me. Vandal Savage wore the style in a 2003 episode of the animated "Justice League." The reader can doubtless recall many other examples.

The plain and austere style of the jacket still looks futuristic, even though it's more than 60 years old. The look is perfect to convey a villain's "I'm a genius and deserve to rule the world" attitude. I'm tempted to include double-breasted, tight-collared coats like those worn by the "Star Wars" villains Grand Moff Tarkin and Count Dooku, but these cuts seem to owe more to the military uniforms of the late 19th Century.

I recently had the opportunity to examine a genuine Nehru Jacket loaned by

friend and 60's survivor Pete Manly. This example, seen in the photograph, is made of a brown cotton corduroy with a patterned satin lining. This one has hip pockets, an inside pocket, a back vent, a row of five leather shank buttons, and sleeve buttons. Most of these features are optional. I've seen others with no visible pockets or buttons, or with a breast pocket. The cut of a Nehru Jacket is the same as a conventional single-breasted sport coat, with tailored shoulders and light shoulder pads. The only real difference is in the collar. Sport coats have their front closures folded over to form lapels. Nehru jacket fronts continue upward to a close-fitting band collar.



How do you get a Nehru Jacket? Here are three good possibilities:

1. Buy one. Genuine jackets from the 60's turn up frequently on e-Bay while newly made jackets can be found on Halloween costume web sites. Check out "Austin Powers" fan sites.

2. Make one. Any published pattern for a sport coat will work. Just skip the lapels and substitute a simple band or "mandarin" collar on a circular neck line.

3. Alter One. Obtain a used suit from a thrift store. Narrow-lapel styles work best. Press out the lapels, add a couple more buttonholes and buttons, then remove the original collar. Substitute a band collar in matching fabric. Some cuts don't even need the collar changed.

The possibilities for hall costumes are unlimited. Get yourself a Nehru Jacket in white, gray, or black and accessorize with a cybernetic monocle, a skin-tone skullcap, a metal glove, painted scars, etc. and you're ready to conquer the universe. The pool of man-eating crocodiles is optional.

Hellsing 3 and 4 continues the story of the Hellsing Organization’s war against the undead.
In *Search and Destroy* the organiza- tion suffers major losses in battle and almost half the members of the Royal Order of Religious Knights get killed. As a result, Sir Integra, Hellsinger, Arucard, and Seras go on the hunt for the perpetrators. The suspects include the Vatican’s Iscariot Organization and whoever is making the “freak chips” that turn humans into second-class ghouls.
In *Eternal Damnation* the Hellsing Organization makes its last stand against the unknown traitor. While Sir Integra recovers from a vampire attack, it is revealed through a series of flashbacks how she became the head of the Hellsing
Meanwhile an army of ghouls, vampires, and “freaks” lays siege to the Tower of London and even though the British Army is helping the final battle is between Incognito and Arucard
A must have for any *Hellsing* fans. If you liked the *Trigun* series, you will love the Hellsing series which is top-notch vampire Anime.
The closing titles announce that the

Released first as a movie, *X:1999*, in 1998 and then as a TV series in *X* tells the tale of two groups of supernaturally powered warriors who battle to shape the future. The Seven Dragons of Earth swear to purge humanity from the world, while the Seven Dragons of Heaven are the last hope of all mankind. One young man holds the key to Earth’s destiny – but to choose the side of good, he may spell doom for all creation. *X (One)* and *X (Two)* were reviewed in Volume 13 Issue 5. Now we review the rest of the set.

X (Three) finds the Dragons of Heaven and the Dragons of Earth in Tokyo. Fuma’s father, mortally wounded by Nataka, leaves a cryptic message for his son – “You are Kamui’s twin star.” Following the funeral, Kamui and Kotori are attacked by Seishiro, a Dragons of Earth assassin but Fuma manages to save both of them. Meanwhile, Sorata and Arashi search for Subaru, another member of the Dragons of Heaven who arrives from Kyoto.
X (Four) - Through flashbacks we see Yuzuriha and Kamui learning to deal with their psychic powers during their child- hood. Kamui’s mother told him to become strong to protect the people he loves and this leads him to the decision to become a Dragon of Heaven and protect the Earth, rather than a Dragon of Earth who would destroy humanity.
X (Five) - When Kamui made his decision to become a Dragon of Heaven, destiny forced Fuma, Kamui’s ‘twin star,’ to become a Dragon of Earth. The newly awakened Fuma breaks into a hotel and takes Kakyo Kuzuki, the dreamseer for the Dragons of Earth to Kanoe. There he joins Yuto and Satsuki, Nataka is freed from his glass jar and . Seishiro and Kusanagi follow him meaning all seven of the Dragons of Earth have gathered. At the same time, the seven Dragons of Heaven gather and Princess Hinoto and the other “Dreamseers” wait to see if the future they have seen comes to pass.
X (Six) - The attack on Tokyo be- comes more brutal as the conflict between the Dragons of Heaven and Earth esca- lates. The fate of the world depends on who is right - Dreamseer” Princess Hinoto, who insists the future is already deter- mined and unchangeable, or Kamui, who says he can mold the future to his will. Meanwhile each team is left with only six

members; when Subaru kills Seishiro and a romance begins between Yozoriha and Kusanagi, although they’re on opposite sides.
X (Seven) - The battle between the Dragons of Heaven and Earth rages with deadly consequences, as Seiichiro, a Dragon of Heaven, secretly challenges Yuto. Karen discovers his plan, putting Seiichiro to sleep, heads to the battlefield to fight Yuto herself in a deadly duel that leaves both the Dragons of the Earth and the Dragons of Heaven down to five players each.
X (Eight) - The final confrontation between Kamui of the Dragons of Heaven and Fuma, now the Kamui of the Dragons of the Earth Everything will be decided at Tokyo Tower, site of the only remaining barrier field. As Kamui unseals the divine sword and prepares for the final clash, he wonders - can he return Fuma to normal and protect Earth all at the same time?
The Future has been predetermined, you will want all eight *X* DVDs. *X (Four)* is a bit slow, *X (Five)* gets a bit better. *X (Six)*, *X (Seven)* and *X (Eight)* are great. - **Craig L Dyer**
Chobits 4: Love Defined

Chobits follows 18-year-old farm boy Hideki Motosuwa, who finds a uniquely powerful Persocon (human-like robots that have achieved cellphone-like status and popularity) in the trash. At first she can only say “Chi”but soon she begins to learn new words and ideas at a tremen- dous rate. Hideki and his various friends spend their time working, studying and trying to find out who and where Chi is from; and if she is indeed from the legendary class of Persocons called Chobits. *Chobits 1: Persecon*, *Chobits 2: The Empty City* and *Chobits 3:Darkness Descends* were reviewed in Volume 13 Issue 5.
In *Chobit 4 - Muddled Relations* the first episode finds everyone, from Shinbo and Hideki’s cram school teacher, to co- worker Yumi, to Minoru and several Persocons to Hideki’s landlady go to Minoru’s beach house for the summer’s last outing.
The other episodes find Hideki’s life becoming much more stressful as his grades and bankroll headed south and then he loses his wallet. Even worse, there’s no food, he having trouble concentrating due to hunger and a really big exam is coming up. Chi, who has been working at the local pastry shop, decides to help out and use her money to buy groceries, then learn how to cook.
In *Chobits 5 - Disappearance* Chi gets kidnapped on her way to work at Tirol. Chi has been kidnapped by a creepy computer geek. Tirol’s manager Ueda helps Hideki

Ueda fell in love with an early-model persocom and when her hard drive started to fail, she began to lose her memories of their life together, even down to basic details such as his name. When he tries to have her repaired, he is told that the job will cause her to lose all of her memories, completely and irrevocably

There are still some moments that give me pause but overall this series is entertaining enough to overlook them. If you overlook the sometimes slightly sexist tone and focus on the issues of identity and relationships this is a wonderful series. The story begins with Bob the Tomato, Dad Asparagus, and four veggie kids on their way to a Twippo Concert. But then Bob runs into some trouble with the van, leaving them stranded at a seafood (or "seafoo") restaurant. There, they meet "The Pirates who don't do anything"

(played by Pa Grape, Mr. Lunt, and Larry the Cucumber) who tell the story of Jonah to the vanful of grouchy veggies.

Jonah (played by Archibald Asparagus) is a stubborn prophet who refuses to tell Nineveh (the "bad" guys) to "stop stealing, stop lying! and especially, stop slapping people with fishes!" Instead, he decides to run away from Joppa and flee to Tarshish. But God has another plan in store for Jonah, and he finds himself in the belly of a whale. After spending three

days and nights in there, praying for God's forgiveness, the whale heaves Jonah back onto dry land, and Jonah gives the message to Nineveh.

The second disc in this set contains a plethora of extras including: several commentaries, music videos, a storybook, karaoke, some games and hidden easter eggs.

Overall this is a good family film. It portrays a good message without being heavy handed. If you have kids or grandkids this should be added to your collection. - **Stephanie L Bannon**

From Disney's popular *Pooh* television series come three cold-weather stories.

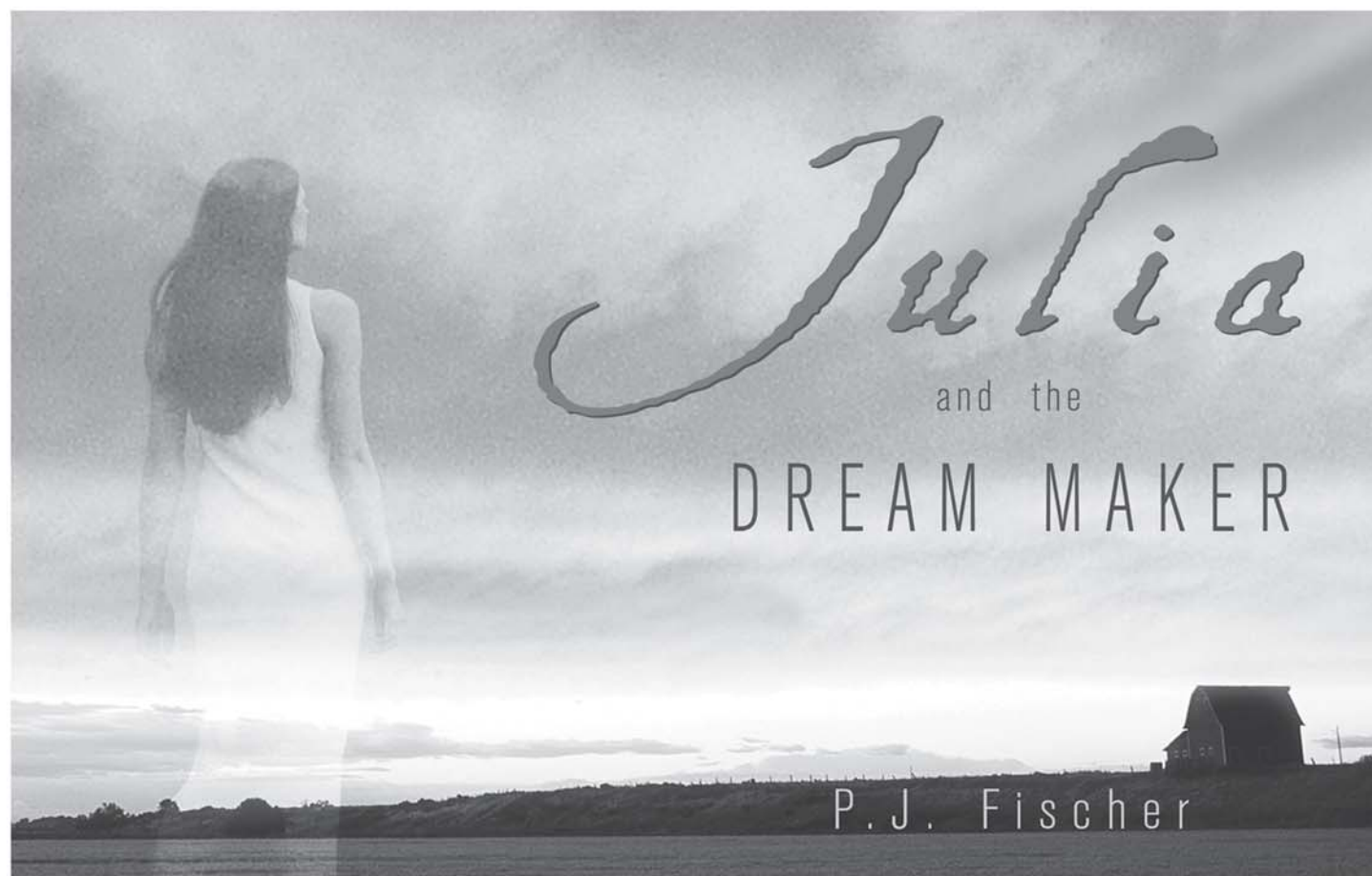
In *Groundpiglet Day* the gang in the 100 Acre Wood gets rather confused, thinking that Winter is over when in fact, it's just about to start. The second story was originally aired as a holiday special and finds Rabbit's rushing about defeating the true purpose of the holidays in *A Winnie the Pooh Thanksgiving*. The third story, *Find Her, Keep Her*, follows Rabbit when he adopts a wayward bird.

The basic premise of this series is simple. Japan is about to be invaded by aliens, and the Defense Forces needs to find a way to defend against aliens that are so cute that the military leaders are afraid that they'll be accused of bullying if they attack the aliens. The solution they come up with is to create a team of three 8 year old girls to fight them because, of course, the girls are even cuter than the aliens. The girls are all granddaughters of the Chiefs of Staff, their immediate commander is their home room teacher, and the student council president is really a spy for the aliens. The girls themselves get

along well with each other but their grandfathers carry the traditional inter-service rivalry into this situation as they tend to argue at the drop of a hat about whose granddaughter is the cutest.

Each disc holds 7 episodes, which sounds like a lot, but each episode is approximately 12-14 minutes long. The series is rated for all ages but anyone much older than 8 or 9 is probably going to be a bit bored. On a personal note there is something mildly odd about grandfathers rewarding their 8 year old granddaughters with weapons (alien and domestic) and flashy uniforms in a series that is obviously aimed at that age group or younger. Last year when the Shuttle Columbia broke up over Texas, no doubt many of you saw the second man to walk on the moon, Edwin Aldrin, on TV reading from a poem that brought him to tears.

That "poem" was in fact a song by Dr. Jordin Kare, called "Fire in the Sky," and it's just one of the songs included on this fantastic compilation, put together by the fine folks at Prometheus.

Theme albums like this always run the risk of getting boring. The trick of keeping your interest for more than two or three songs is to make sure they are different enough in subject matter to keep you thinking and entertained. To this end, "To Touch the Stars" delivers in spades.

The bulk of these songs are already known to filk fans, but what makes this well-performed, well-produced CD so great is that these performances are excellently done and will attract interested ears from a much larger audience.

The CD kind of follows a logical space trip that just keeps going and going. We start with a couple of songs about ships taking off, followed by a couple of songs about the Apollo mission, then on to Mars, etc.

The music ranges from typically folky performances to rock and roll, best exemplified here by "I Want To Go To Mars," by the Birdwatchers.

Most of the songs are performed by

Bay Area musicians Kristoph Klover, Karl Franzen and various musical pals. Gunnar Madsen, from the a cappella group The Bobs, appears on two songs, Leslie Fish's bright and bouncy "Surprise!" (about Sputnik) and finishes off the album with the ska rave-up, "Dance on the Ceiling," also penned by Fish. (What can you say? Leslie writes good space songs. Five of the songs here are hers.)

Nationally-known entertainer Christine Lavin even contributed a song to this project, the eight minute science lesson "If We Had No Moon," which actually told me a couple of things I didn't know about the big rock and I imagine it might surprise you, too.

From a performance standpoint, this CD pulls no punches. Klover, Franzen and many of the others are veterans of several Bay Area folk and traditional music bands. They know their stuff. Producers Klover and Eli Goldberg know how to mix things so that the vocals stand out, which, if you listen to most CDs today, appears to be a lost art.

Should you buy this if you're not a filk fan? Only if you enjoy good songs with a great message, and played well. If you don't, there's always Britney Spears.

Definitely pick this up.

(By pure coincidence, I received this CD the same day George W. said we ought to send people to Mars. I'm all for it, as long as he's first and it's a one-way ticket.)

In Our Book

The Bastard King
by Dan Chernenko
Roc Fantasy, \$14.95, 448 pgs

I believe this to be another first novel effort, I couldn't find any other titles by the author. Its not too bad for a first novel. The story is essentially a study of what would happen if there were two kings and they were both good. Lanius is the king by heredity; although his reign is somewhat tenuous since he is considered to be a bastard and not entitled to a throne. This is the authors first problem if no one thinks he should be king then why does the author imply he is allowed to continue to reign as a figurehead to keep the populace happy? The second king, the true power, is a soldier/sailor. Grus was in charge of the navy when he is called to the capital to repair the damage done by incompetent generals in defense of the country. Grus was supposed to be the loyal general to Lanius mother, the Regent, but she feared his popularity and attempted to assassinate him. In retaliation and personal defense, he decided he would be safer and more able to defend the kingdom if he were king. So he did. He kept the boy-king alive which was a departure from standard "overthrow the king stories. He even married his daughter to him when they were old enough. Lanius is an intelligent, studious child and young man. He much prefers rooting around in musty, old archives and raising rare animals to the necessities of actually being the ruling king. Although he hates not being the only king and he hates Grus for being the real power, the truth is that he isn't really unhappy or mistreated. Grus, on the other hand, never believed he wanted to be king and that circumstances

forced him into it. However, once he had it he found "it was good to be king." Grus is basically an ethical person but ruthless because he believes the kingdom comes first. The period from Grus taking control of the kingdom and Lanius becoming a man is a bit vague and unproductive. The fun in the character development really begins after Lanius marries Grus' daughter. The author departs from the formula story and explores what being a king means to each man and how they feel about their roles. Chernenko also spends considerable time with Grus' personal relationships with his mistress and wife. While most kings get to do whatever they want, Grus is answerable to his wife and dreads her discovering the truth. This was kinda fun to work through. But the character development is really the only fun in this story.

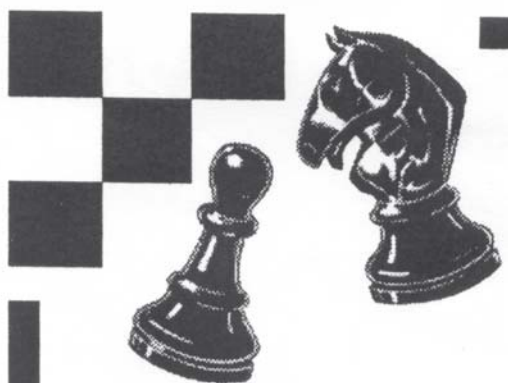
Now, for the rest of the story. The kingdom is beset by enemies, of course. One of the enemy countries is ruled by the "Banished One," a fallen god. The title of the story refers to an object of great power, the Scepter of Mercy, which was captured by the Banished One hundreds of years earlier. Lanius and Grus often bemoan the fact they do not have this wonderful device without explaining what they could do with it if they did. Their history seems to have no explanation of what the Scepter means and why they believe they can defeat the Banished One with it. Near the end, there was a spark of interest when Lanius discovers something about the Banished One's origin but it didn't add to our understanding. Since this is touted as a trilogy, it will obviously take two more books before they can capture the thing. I have a hard time imagining what the author will do with the next book if they don't go get the Scepter right away. If they do, then I have a hard time imagining what the third book will be. Or, it will be a long, tedious journey through two books to find this marvelous object. Either way, I'm not sure I care enough about Lanius and Grus to find out.

On Crusade:

More Tales of the Knights Templar
edited by Katherine Kurtz
Aspect/Warner Books; 294 pp. \$6.50

There are 10 tales in this book, plus a prologue and an epilogue, as well as a partial bibliography and notes on the authors.

This is a pretty eclectic collection of tales, most set in the times of the Crusades (roughly 1095-1270) and some set in contemporary times. The most notable modern story being Ms. Kurtz selection, one dealing with Adam Sinclair, her psychiatrist Knight Templar.

I liked all the tales in the book. Some of course, were better than others. The weakest one being by David M Honigsberg and Alexandra Elizabeth Honigsberg about a kohain of the Law, a Jewish tailor in Paris who guards a mystical treasure wanted by the Christians. It's not a bad tale, it's quite fascinating, actually. It just ends a bit abruptly as if the authors, worried about the length, just tied it up in a hurry.

The modern tale by Debra Doyle and James D MacDonald is a little too "Sam Spade, Private Eye" for my taste. I mean it works, but its sort of apples and oranges for me: making a world where all the bad guys and good guys are some form of religious order or religious baddie. It seems a bit of a forced marriage to me.

The other stories are really excellent. Andre Norton's "Stonish Men," and "Blank Check" by Diane Duane are especially fine.

Between the tales are nine interludes by Kurtz with intriguing bits of history of the real Knights Templar.

This is a great historical fantasy collection and I recommended it highly. - Sue Martin

Children of the Shaman
by Jessica Rydill
Roc Fantasy, \$6.50, 355 pgs

This is a very good first novel, remarkably so, in fact. Rydill creates a sort of "post apocalyptic world although we never find out exactly how this world comes into

existence (possibly an ice age). It seems to be populated by two main ethnic groups. The Wanderers and the Franj. The Wanderers are unashamedly from Jewish stock and the Franj (read Frank) are undoubtedly French. The events are driven by a situation on the border between the 'real world' and the magical land of La Souterraine. The 500-year Great Cold has ended and the Railway People are building a tunnel under the forest of Aldemar to the unexplored reaches beyond. But people are dying mysteriously. Annat and Malchik are Wanderers, their mother dead and their aunt ill. They are sent to their father, a Shaman of some repute. He has been called to investigate the mysterious deaths at the railroad and takes the children with him. Annat, his daughter, is also a shaman but untrained. The story is pretty standard fare of good magical forces forced to confront unrestrained evil. The fun is guessing how Annat will fare and how her brother fits into the picture. I also enjoyed the word

origin game the author plays. For instance, the word for the telepathy that Annat and her father use is "sprechen" which is German for "to speak", countries are mentioned with ancient names such as Neustria and Zyon, and, of course, the Wanderers are outcasts because legend puts the blame on them for killing the Son. There is a great legend of two women/goddesses who ruled peacefully until one disappeared. The one left became a demon and turned men into her creatures. This demon goddess is the great enemy of the story. And although this is, as I mentioned, pretty standard fare the author handles it quite well. She is a very good storyteller and I enjoyed the journey.

Opening parts of five new fantasy and science fiction novels from Roc Books. Rachel Caine's 'Ill Wind' is my favorite, a

saucy, amusing fantasy, book one of the Weather Warden series. Djinn and magic are real in our contemporary USA, and one lady who can control winds is running for her life. In a post-apocalyptic USA, frontier communities battle scary monsters in E.E. Knight's 'Way of the Wolf, Book One of the Vampire Earth' (full review in issue Vol 13 no 6).

Two stories tell of a far future when Earth relates to other planets. S.L. Viehl's 'Blade Dancer' concerns a crossbreed illegal alien, a catwoman athlete exiled from Earth (also reviewed in issue Vol 13 no 6). In Jay Caselberg's 'Wormhole', Jack is a psychic detective hired to investigate the disappearance of a mining crew on a faraway planet. Finally, Diana Pharaoh Francis' 'Path of Fate' seems of the Darkover-Witchworld variety, with a young woman chosen for special powers by a telepathic goshawk. All five excerpts are well written and promise lots of action. -Mike Griffin

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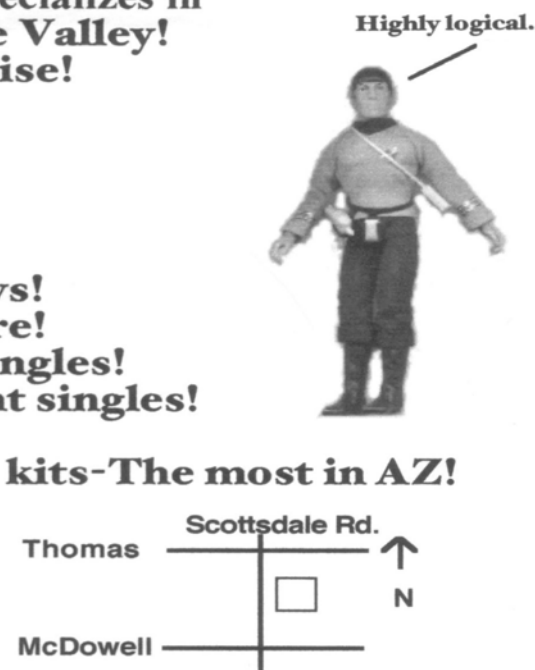

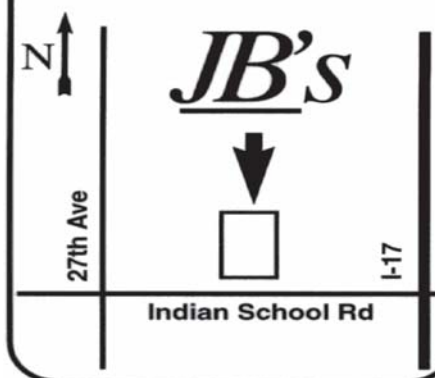

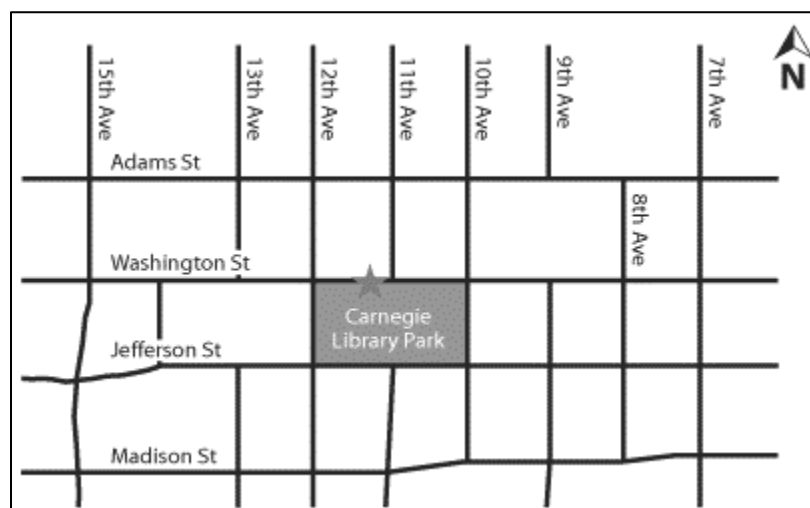

 on arts and crafts, storytelling and
 costumed characters.

The wide variety of exhibitors
 include booksellers, publishers,
 libraries, literary organizations,

 for every interest and level of
 reading.
