

Legal

Database policy

Convoy will be deleting its database after the convention, other than to pass on a hardcopy of members' addresses to the next two Eastercons (as has been the common practice since this became possible).

Web Site policy

The only information Convoy will publish about you on its web site, without your explicit permission, is your badge name, membership status, and membership number.

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From the driver's seat

This all began just over a year ago, when I made the mistake of talking in a corridor about how someone had to do something or there wouldn't be an Eastercon in 2007. Now 13 months later we have been through a bidding session and are inviting you to join our Convoy (if you haven't already).

There should be three forms enclosed with this TR. The first is a member-ship form: if you haven't already joined, this one is for you! The second is a volunteer form: we'd really like to have people feeling that this convention is their own, and what better way than to get involved in some bit of it and help that to work well, either in advance or on the day? The third is a Hotel Booking form: that's explained on page 7 of this TR. Copies of these forms are also to be found on our website.

You'll notice that there is a different postal address given on each form. That's because their ultimate destinations are with different members of the committee (Membership, Programme and Hotel). Don't worry about that, though, if you want to send all three forms at once: just send them in one envelope to one address (membership is probably best) and they will be distributed for you among the committee.

Conventions don't happen without a lot of people; as well as the committee many other people are already on board. Behind the scenes many things need to be done; we have already people to help with many things, but will always appreciate assistance, especially over the weekend of the Convention itself.

To try to find out what people really want we have been asking everyone who joins to tell us. The initial results show that the most common interest amongst fans is... books. Well, we will have a dealers' room; we have authors, an artist and an editor as Guests; I also plan to devote quite a lot of the programme to book-related talks and discussion panels. (I hope that is what people mean: if all that is really wanted is a large pile of books to go "ooh" at then we can probably arrange that too).

There is also considerable interest in scientific talks, and talks by experts in various fields. I hope to produce a programme that will have a number of talks by those who know their stuff at the start of each day, and panel items

later in the same day at which ideas from those talks can be discussed. The general plan of the programme is to increase the frivolity as the day goes on and the beer consumption goes up (beer was also rather popular as an interest — surveys tell you all kinds of surprising things!).

There are people already wanting to participate in programme items, and others suggesting items they would like to see. If there is something you want to do, or would like us to do, please tell us via the email addresses on our website, or our postal address which can be conveniently found on our volunteer form. We have less than a year to forge all this into what is wanted, so if you already know that you will come to the Eastercon, we would very much like you to give us support and suggestions; we will then give you a back an Eastercon to remember.

The Hotel

To give its full name, the Britannia Adelphi Hotel, Liverpool.

The interior of the Adelphi is very hard to describe, or at least, hard to do justice to, and photographs cannot convey its *spaciousness*. It is decorated in High Edwardian splendour straight out of the *Titanic*; in the case of some furnishings, literally out of the *Titanic*, because the hotel management of the time managed to buy some items that were not yet ready for her use when she went out and hit her iceberg and so were left orphaned on the shore. I shall be spending a fair bit of my time during the first couple of days of Convoy down at hotel reception keeping an eye on check-in and sorting out any problems that may arise, and I very much enjoy watching people who've never been to the Adelphi before reacting as they walk in.

The people in the hotel actively welcome fandom. The staff like us, the management like us, even the chef likes us. We have had Eastercons there before, in 1988 (Follycon), 1990 (Eastcon), 1994 (Sou'Wester), 1997 (Intervention) and 1999 (Reconvene), and many of the staff who were there in the mid-to-late nineties and got to know and like us us then are still there. When we rang to find out whether the hotel was free for the Easter weekend in 2007, we got the response we expected: delight from the

manager, followed by someone else removing the phone from her hand and saying excitedly, "You're coming back? That's wonderful!", followed by the manager taking back control of her own handset and saying, "What dates?" We gave her the dates. She said, "Oh, no! That's the Grand National!" Not for the first time, we explained that they never run the National on Easter Saturday, but she still had to check with Aintree (why does this happen every time?) and ring back.

When she rang back she offered us a rather attractive bed-and-breakfast room-rate: £35 per person per night sharing a twin or double room, and £42 pppn in single occupancy of a room. There's a £20 per night supplementary charge for the rooms with four-poster beds (four of these) and the rooms with jacuzzis (nineteen of these), all of which are double rooms. Children under the age of 12 sharing a room with two adults will not be charged for their bed, only for breakfast. Infants lodge free with their parents, and if the hotel is given advance warning a cot can be provided.

The Adelphi has at present 402 bedrooms, and our ideal position is to fill them all so that everybody in the hotel over the Easter weekend is a member of the convention. Eastercons have done this before, and we feel confident that with a bit of goodwill and a following wind we can do it again. This time, they assure us, they won't be letting rooms to anyone but us (least of all rooms next to the Norwegian room-party) until the standard cut-off time of 21 days before the first day of the convention; they have reserved 400 rooms for our exclusive use, and the remaining two are the ones they keep back for emergencies like floods (which we aren't planning to cause this time, naming no names!) If we fill all the bedrooms, the hotel will close its doors to the public completely, none of the bars or restaurants will allow anyone in who is not wearing a convention badge, and we will have the place to ourselves. So if you think that having the exclusive use of the Hotel is a Good Thing, let us know by booking your rooms sooner rather than later, please.

This hotel doesn't just look good, its function space is very well suited to our purposes. The main lounge (78'x40') is in the centre of the building, and is an ideal place for sitting around chatting; everyone you know is likely to go past at some point during the day, because all the rooms on that floor either open onto it or have their entrances within about forty feet of it.

Two large function rooms (70'x35' and 56'x38') open directly from it, one on each side, and there are two smaller rooms (each 38'x38') off two short corridors from it at one end; at the other end of the lounge there is a marble-floored, pillared hypostyle (40'x30'). Off to one side of that, another of the large function rooms (54'x41') is just beyond the Real Ale Bar (which is situated where it is because the marble floor makes it easier to keep the ale well, or so they tell me). At the far end of the hypostyle from the main lounge is the main hall (80'x65'), complete with curtained stage. All these rooms are fully wheelchair-accessible from the lounge.

The restaurants are below the lobby and the main lounge, and in one of them, Jenny's, we will be served not only a breakfast that has on previous occasions actually offered **more** choice than is standard when they are not hosting the Eastercon (I know because I have been there when the convention wasn't) but also the convention lunch at a price of £5 per person for two courses, and the convention supper at £8.95 per person for three courses. Sandwiches and filled rolls will be sold at the bars during the day at £1.50 a round, and pizza from £2.99 will also be available in the pizzeria.

There are two covered, lock-up parking areas with attendants, adjacent to the hotel, and a weekend charge of £15.00 is being offered for vehicles parked in these. There are in the region of 150 spaces available, apparently, so these will have to be booked in advance. (See the Hotel Booking Form.)

In the basement there is a Health Club with a swimming-pool; members of the convention who are staying in the Adelphi will be offered membership of the Health Club for a special rate of £5 for the weekend.

All in all we are fairly pleased with the deal we are being offered, and we're sure that you will be too.

Hotel Booking Information

Hotel Booking Forms are enclosed with TR1, and additional forms can also be printed out from our website. We have reserved the entire hotel for Easter 2007. Bedrooms at the Adelphi over that weekend can only be booked by members of Convoy, and only through the convention.

If you book your room now (joining the convention too, if you haven't already), you will be given priority when it comes to the allocation of rooms. We are going to give a First Priority on hotel bookings made before TR2 is sent out some time in November.

We know that this far in advance not everyone will be sure precisely which nights they will want to spend at Convoy, but the number of nights you have asked for can be increased or, in the worst case, reduced closer to the time of the convention; no actual allocation of rooms will be made until November. What is important is that you will have put down a marker for a particular type of room, and so made sure that you'll get what you ask for. This matters most in the case of rooms which are most limited in number: rooms specifically intended for wheelchair users, single rooms, and rooms with a jacuzzi.

The booking form itself is pretty straightforward. Apart from obvious things, like "Please write legibly" and "Don't forget to sign it", the only point that needs making is that this form will be seen by the hotel staff, so if there is anything you don't want them to know about, don't put it on the form: put it on another sheet of paper (and don't forget to put your name on that sheet of paper, or in three months' time I won't know who wrote what).

"Special requirements" should include information about such things as allergies, dietary needs, and refrigeration for medicines or infant formula; bathtubs full of lime jello will **not** be provided unless you can show real need.

The hotel booking form can be sent in with your membership application form to the convention address, to save a stamp, if you are sending both at the same time. It will be forwarded to

Peter Dickinson

Who am I? A seventy-eight-year-old Englishman, born into the impoverished gentry and educated in largely useless subjects. (My elder son arrived before the midwife. I'd have given all the Greek irregular verbs for one class in practical obstetrics.) Stumbled into journalism, reviewed crime novels for a while, had an idea for one of my own, got stuck, had an SF-ish nightmare, turned it into an adventure story hoping to unblock the crime book, and they're both still in print. I was then about forty. For the last fifteen years I've been married to the writer Robin McKinley (q.v.).

Why should people read my books? Not for me to say. There are fifty-odd of them, and at that rate you'd think some of them must be rubbish, but apart from a mistaken attempt at a pop-up book I'm not ashamed of any of them. They're pretty varied - crime, straight adult novels, one adult SF novel, and a whole range of YA and children's books: several of which involve an element of fantasy in a realistic world (a girl who may or may not be able to faith-heal, a boy with erratic telepathic powers); some are high fantasy; some straight SF. The categories don't mean much to me. My last crime novel had as a "detective" a dying woman, paralysed and almost speechless; my current fantasy is seen from the point of view of a small

baby; the technical constraints and imaginative challenge are much the same.

Particularly in fantasy I like to make things work. Taken-for-granted magic dissatisfies me. What is it? Where does it come from? The answer in ANGEL ISLE is that it is a seepage of sub-atomic particles from a parallel seven-dimensional universe. The theory behind it reconciles the strong and weak interactions and does away with the need for the Higgs boson. I hope to win a Nobel Prize for Physics with it.

Robin McKinley

Robin McKinley is a homeopath, a tower bell ringer, a piano player and a gardener.

She also writes fantasy. Her first novel was **BEAUTY**, a retelling of Beauty and the Beast, which serves as a subtitle, since she never came up with a satisfactory title. Fortunately when she rewrote Beauty and the Beast *again* almost twenty years later, she was married to her Plot Factory Title Finding writer husband, Peter Dickinson, and *he* named it, **ROSE DAUGHTER**.

Her other novels include the two (so far: yes, it's been a long wait, sue me) Damar novels, THE BLUE SWORD and THE HERO AND THE CROWN; THE OUTLAWS OF SHERWOOD, which is a retelling of Robin Hood, only there are women in his merry band, please brace yourselves; DEERSKIN, which was negatively inspired by the emotional dishonesty of Perrault's "Donkeyskin"; SPINDLE'S END, which is a retelling of "Sleeping Beauty" in which that wet of a princess is the person who stays awake and does it herself. Her latest novel is SUNSHINE, which, after living thirteen years in England, was her first American novel. SUNSHINE has vampires in it (and sex and bad language: very distressing, so her postbag tells her, to readers who think her books are supposed to be suitable for Great-Aunt Gladys and precocious 11-year-olds). At the moment she is working on a book about a teenage boy, but try not to worry, the other main character is a girl, she's just not human.

Sharyn November

Sharyn November is currently Senior Editor for Viking Children's Books and Puffin Books, as well as the Editorial Director of Firebird. Her many authors include Lloyd Alexander, Charles de Lint, Pamela Dean, Carol Emshwiller, Nina Kiriki Hoffman, Diana Wynne Jones, Graham Joyce, Conor Kostick, and Tanith Lee. She has edited two anthologies for Firebird: FIREBIRDS, called "the best fantasy anthology of 2003" by The Year's Best Fantasy and Horror (17th edition), and the just-published FIREBIRDS RISING. She was named a World Fantasy Award Finalist (Professional Category) in both 2004 and 2005 — in 2004 specifically for Firebird, in 2005 for editing.

She has played in a variety of bands (songwriter, lead singer, rhythm guitar), and maintains an extensive personal Web site at www.sharyn.org. She drinks a lot of Diet Mountain Dew and likes to cause chaos in her wake.

Memberships

At the time of going to print, memberships of Convoy cost:

£45 for full Attending

£22.50 for Supporting

£22.50 for Junior (aged 5-14 years on 5 April 2007)

Free for Little (aged under 5 on 5 April 2007) (£1 for a badge)

Presupporters will be given a £2 discount on these prices.

Membership rates will rise after June 30th 2006.

Because we have only one year instead of the usual two in which to gather members and work out the budget for the convention, we have set the membership rates at the price they would usually be one year out from the convention instead of having a cheaper rate for those who join earlier rather than later; we don't have an "earlier" to have the cheaper rate in. If it turns out that we have been too alarmist, we'll work out some way to give extra value for everyone's money!

We do need as many members as possible as soon as possible, so that we can begin to get a feel for what size of convention we shall be running. None of the usual curves applies in Convoy's case, and we are rather more in the dark than conventions generally are when we are working out how much we can afford to pay for tech, for additional guests, for the gopher drinks budget, and so on.

We are asking all of you reading this to join as soon as you can if you plan to come to the convention at all, and if you plan to come yourself, tell your friends, and bring in another couple of people. This is a shameless membership drive. We need you, and we need your help, if we are to run the best possible Eastercon. We want to fill the hotel.

Badge Names

Some people don't like to have their own names on a membership list or a badge, for a variety of reasons. We are happy for you to use a distinctive other name for these purposes. The key word is "distinctive" A common Christian name on its own will not do, even if it's the way you want to be

addressed at the convention. There are two reasons for our needing people to have badge names that are unique to one individual. One is that on the membership list, it doesn't help anyone to see that someone called "Joe" has joined, because that might not be their friend Joe but some completely other Joe they don't get on with. The other is that the badge itself serves to identify individuals to the security staff as members of the convention, and if you lose it somewhere they're better able to recognise that the random stranger wearing Joe Bloggs' badge isn't that person than they are to realise that he's not "Joe".

On-The-Door Memberships

One way to prevent any undesirables from gaining access to the Adelphi is to ensure that it is made hard, if not impossible, for them to take out day membership of Convoy. We don't want to make any genuine fan's life difficult, but we are trying to eliminate any possibility of non-fan opportunists spoiling things for us all.

Anyone applying for membership on the door, whether for the weekend or for a single day, will be asked to give the name of a member of the committee, or a member of the convention known to the committee, who will have to come to Registration and vouch for them in person. If this is not possible for whatever reason, applicants will be asked to produce proof of both residence (a utility bill less than three months old, a driving licence, or similar) and photographic identity (passport, driving licence, or similar). All documents must be originals; we will not accept copies. We will note on the application form what document types have been checked.

Membership will not be sold to anyone who cannot fulfil these conditions.

If you know anyone who intends to turn up at Convoy on the day, please inform them of this policy so that they can avoid hassle at the door. We would urge residents of Liverpool who already know that they want to come to the convention to join in advance anyway; apart from anything else, this will be considerably cheaper.


