# C.J. Cherryh

This is an author to look forward to. We belive that Cherryh will be an interesting aquaintance for European fans. Through the tast two decades she has produced more than 40 books.

In fact, Cherryh's main strengths are probably her strong sense of language (she has worked in education as a Classics teacher), and her tremendous ability to convey the sheer intricacy of anything from high-level political intrigue to alien gender differences. Cherryh describes an elaborate and thorough future universe, often refered to as the Union-Alliance sequence. It is a pleasure to watch her mind at work in her fiction; against a solid framework of traditional space sf, she weaves a very impressive tapestry of individual, personal stories. Furthermore, she has written quite a few original nonderivative fantasy novels in a medieval setting - an impressive achievement in itself, these days! And these Middle Ages are not the usual Pollyannaish, fairy-tale-influenced pablum - Cherryh's Dark Ages are really Dark! There are many of us who consider C.J. Cherryh's work in fantastic literature among the two or three most impressive of the last two decades.

C.J. Cherryh won the John W. Campbell Award as most promising new writer in 1976 — and has more than fulfilled that promise. Among her later prizes are: The Hugo Award for best novel twice, for *Downbelow Station* (1982) and *Cyteen* (1989), as well as a short story Hugo for "Cassandra" (1979).

# Brian W. Aldiss

What can be said about Brian Aldiss that hasn't already been said? He is one of the big names in both the British and the international SF world. He is a productive author, a renowned critic and an anthologist.

Ever since the 1950s, Aldiss has been among the most notable creative forces shaping fantastic literature. In his extremely varied output of fiction you will find few completely traditional SF stories, but plenty of intriguing new rethinks of old ideas, as well as some of the most impressive work of the British New Wave of the sixties.

Brian Aldiss has also written quite a few stories which belong outside of sf altogether, and he is one of the chief rediscoverers of the Gothic tradition relating to sf. both in fiction and critical writings. The most influential of these works of fact is probably The Billion Year Spree (1973), a general history of the genre, later expanded as The Trillion Year Spree (1986). Both as inerary editor of the Oxford Mail and in many other publications. Aldiss has proved a perceptive reviewer of science fiction. He is probably the foremost literary influence in Britain within the sf genre for several decades - and it is both a pleasure and a privilege to be able to welcome him to Norway!

Aldiss won the Hugo for the novel "Hothouse" in 1962. In 1965 he was awarded the Nebula for his short story "The Saliva Tree". The first in his trilogy about Helliconia: "Helliconia Spring", won him the 1983 John W Campell Memorial Award.
