Hotel: The Hilton Doubletree sits next to St Mary Redcliffe Church, and is a ten minute walk from Temple Meads Station in one direction, and from Bristol town centre in the other. The no. 76 runs from the centre past the hotel. There are maps of the area around the hotel available from the reception desk. More information on finding the hotel is available on their website.

Parking: There is limited parking in the hotel car park. This is free for the day (ignore the machines) and £7.50 to stay overnight. Please come early if you want to secure a space! You will need to give your registration at Hotel Reception. There is also pay and display parking for 170 cars opposite the church. Further afield, parking can be found at Lower Guinea St. near the Ostrich Inn (five minutes walk) and on-street in the area around Queen Square, though this can get busy.

Eating: The hotel bar does paninis and light lunches, and this year will be offering packed lunch style items. Next door to the hotel is the Arc Cafe, in the crypt beneath the beautiful church of St Mary Redcliffe, one of Bristol's most famous buildings. This is a volunteer-run cafe staffed by recovering addicts (so it's all in a good cause) with free wifi, good coffee, and a range of sandwiches, baguettes and hot food (and cake). The Arc Cafe seats about 70 and they are very friendly, though they don't serve alcohol. Across the road is the Portwall Tavern, universally known as the Little Blue Pub. It's easy to find, it's on the far side of the car park opposite the hotel and it's blue. And little. They do pub grub and real ale. Also within walking distance of the Hilton Doubletree is the Hole In The Wall, which is a nice pub that backs onto Queens Square but can get crowded at times so it's advisable to book – not ideal if you're in a hurry but the food is tasty.

Cashpoints: The nearest ATM is at Temple Meads - there are now points on BOTH sides of the barriers! For those coming from the centre, there is one on Prince St., which charges, and a free one slightly further away outside Sainsbury's.

Assistance: If you need help with anything throughout the convention or if you have any particular requirements including those regarding accessibility, please come to the committee desk or approach a member of the con staff, who can be identified by their bright orange lanyards.



Formed in 2011, The BristolCon Foundation exists, in the words of its mission statement, 'to encourage the creation and enjoyment of speculative fiction, in all its forms, with a focus on the West Country and South Wales'. Funded by profits generated by BristolCon, the Foundation provides small grants or loans to assist projects which we hope will bring speculative fiction to wider audiences, help out creators who are just starting out in the genre, and bring new creators to the field. While Bristol has a thriving community of writers, artists and fans, the Foundation aims to reach out to people in the city and beyond, to help them connect with each other at both formal and informal events.

The BristolCon Fringe is funded by the Foundation, and plays host to monthly free reading events, promoting local authors by providing them with a friendly space to read out their work in front of an audience. The Fringe readings are recorded, then broadcast globally on our dedicated podcast.

This year we have supported the launches of Charles (Ian) Millsted's Silence Rides Alone, Pete Sutton's A Tiding of Magpies, RB Watkinson's The Cracked Amulet, and the anthology Fight Like A Girl, which was launched with a mini-con, with a panel from the authors and demonstrations of both armed and unarmed combat. Whatever your project, ask us if we can help!

The BristolCon team is determined to ensure that BristolCon provides a safe and inclusive space. We pride ourselves on the friendly and respectful atmosphere of the convention. We therefore ask everyone to conduct themselves appropriately, extending courtesy and co-operation to all members.

#### Be excellent to one another.



Born and bred in Birmingham (U.K.), Fangorn (aka Chris Baker) began his professional career as a graphic designer. Through a series of fortuitous events (that included an introduction to the world of SF conventions and their art shows) he then went on to produce fantasy and SF art for gaming and book covers, which include works for Robert Asprin's Myth series and the Redwall books by Brian Jacques.

As a result of producing artwork for the graphic novel of David Gemmell's 'Legend', in 1993 he was hired by Stanley Kubrick to produce concept designs for the film A.I. which was in the early stages of development. Despite Kubrick's untimely passing 1999, Fangorn went on to continue working with Steven Spielberg on his version of Kubricks script, that became A.I: Artificial Intelligence.

In the years that followed, Fangorn has gone on to work on over 20 films, which include Road to Perdition, War of the Worlds, Star Wars: Episode 7, Alice in Wonderland, the last three Bond movies and Gravity which earned the design team an Art Directors Guild award in 2013. He also received a BSFA Best Artwork award in 2006.

Although still enaging in film work, much of his creative output is oil painting, sculpting, printmaking and photography. His most recently published artwork is for an anniversary edition of Stephen King's Salem's Lot published by PS Publishing.

He still hasn't decided what to do when he grows up.



## SARAI-PINBOROUGH

Sarah Pinborough is a YA and adult thriller, fantasy and horror novelist and screenwriter. She has published more than 20 novels and has written for the BBC and is currently working with several television companies on original projects. Her recent novels include the dystopian love story, The Death House



and a teenage thriller, 13 Minutes, which has recently been bought by Netflix.

Her next adult novel, a psychological supernatural thriller, Behind Her Eyes will be out in 2017 from HarperFiction in the UK. The book has sold to nearly twenty territories so far and was sold at auction to the US in a significant deal to Flatiron, Macmillan. There are discussions on going with several movies studios about the film adaptation. Sarah hopes this will be her breakout novel. If it's not – she may cry!



## GUESTOF KENMACLEOD

Ken MacLeod was born in Stornoway, Isle of Lewis, Scotland and lives in West Lothian. He has Honours and Masters degrees in biological subjects and worked for some years in the IT industry. Since 1997 he has been a full-time writer. He is the author of fifteen science fiction novels, from The Star Fraction (1995) to The Corporation Wars: Dissidence (Orbit, May 2016), and many articles and short stories. His work has been translated into many languages including German, Turkish, Spanish, Polish and Japanese. His novels and stories have received three BSFA awards and three Prometheus Awards, and several have been short-listed for the Clarke and Hugo Awards. He is currently working on a space opera trilogy, The Corporation Wars (forthcoming 2016-2017).

In 2009 he was Writer in Residence at the ESRC Genomics Policy and Research Forum at Edinburgh University, and in 2013 and 2014 was Writer



in Residence at the MA Creative Writing course at Edinburgh Napier University. He is on the Advisory Board of the Edinburgh Science Festival.


