ROOM RATES REDUCED!

For all those of you who are frantically stuffing pennies into your piggy banks in readiness for Channelcon — stop at once. After further discussions with the Metropole Hotel we have managed to negotiate even lower room rates than those announced at Yorcon. The new rates will be:

£13.50 per night for a single room

£12.50 per person per night for a double/twin room

(The previously announced rates were £16.00 per person per night in any sort of room.) And remember, these prices include buffet English breakfast but will be subject to VAT (the Metropole do not charge Service).

As far as I know, this is the first time recently that a Committee has been able to renegotiate a price with a hotel once one has been fixed. Not that we are blowing our own trumpet, but it might be a point for future committees to remember. Once the bid has been won, you are in a much better bargaining position than beforehand, so it can't do any harm to try to renegotiate terms.

For those who do not know the Metropole, it is a beautiful Victorian hotel standing on the seafront at Brighton — look out of your window and watch the West Pier sink into the sea before your very eyes! Being an older-style hotel, it has the advantage of many more single rooms than the more modern ones Eastercons have used in the past, but all 332 bedrooms are fully modernised and each has its own colour TV and private bathroom. Should we fill all 580 beds in the Metropole, her sister hotel, the Bedford, is approximately 100 yards away.

As to the general area, the hotel is a few minutes' walk away from Brighton's main shopping centre, together with Preston Street — one of the best streets in the country for cheap varied restaurants. In addition, Brighton has numerous pubs catering for all tastes — but you must try the local real ale — Harveys — brewed at Lewes. Not that I'm in the slightest bit biased!

JOHN SLADEK

Three of us sat around a bare table in a bare room. We were discussing a story I had written. The first person said some things that were trite, obvious, petty — they might have tidied up the story but they would not have made any significant improvement in it. The second didn't say much, but what he did say seemed to me impossible.

Some weeks later, walking down the street, I suddenly understood what he had been getting at, I saw how I could make the changes, and I knew it would improve the story no end.

The place was the Lumb Bank Science Fiction Writers' Workshop some summers ago; the second person was John Sladek.

I remember the day I arrived at this remote Yorkshire farmhouse being introduced to someone: "Oh, and this is John." I nodded to what I thought was a fellow student, and wondered when we'd get to meet the tutors. To those of you who tend to get mental images of what "a writer" should look like, I warn you now: John Sladek looks less like a writer than anyone I've ever met.

But don't let the appearance deceive you; John Sladek is one hell of a writer. Don't take my word for it; you can find out how good he is simply by going away and reading — his novels, for instance, like The Muller-Fokker Effect or the recent Rod-erick; or his collaborations with Thomas Disch; or his superb parodies in The Steam-Driven Boy; or his hilariously damning examination of fringe cults in The New Apocrypha; or his detective novels like Black Aura; or his many excellent short stories; or....

But this is not a catalogue. Stillless is it a piece of literary criticism. If you want to find out about Sladek the writer it is easy to get hold of copies of his books. No, I'm supposed to be introducing Sladek the Guest of Honour, the person you're going to be meeting when you get to Channelcon.

However, the writing does provide some clue to the man. If nothing else, titles like Keep the Giraffes Burning and "Elephant with a Wooden Leg" indicate a sense of humour, and I'm sure we'll be the beneficiaries of his wit at Brighton. He is good company; I remember him at Lumb Bank passing the wine bottles around with the rest of us. And he is easy to talk to; all you have to do is go up to him and say hello. It might help if you are pressing something alcoholic into his hand, but that probably isn't absolutely necessary.

In short, I think we can look forward to a damned good Guest of Honour. Look out for his speech; it is sure to be one of the high spots of the convention. And look out for him in the bar and at the room parties. I've enjoyed the times I've spent in the company of John Sladek — I think you will, too.

ANGELA CARTER

We are delighted to be able to announce that our co-Guest of Honour at Channelcon is to be Angela Carter.

Angela Carter is one of those rare writers who have succeeded in using the freedom of the fantastic without being labelled a genre writer. She has managed to transcend the barriers that all too often cut science fiction off from the rest of liter-



ature, winning accolades from many diverse quarters. Her second novel, The Magic Toyshop, won the prestigious John Llewelyn Rhys Memorial Prize, and she won the Somerset Maugham Award for Several Perceptions in 1968.

Brian Aldiss and Harry Harrison recognised her worth as a writer of science fiction by including a story of hers, "The Executioner's Beautiful Daughter", in one of their Year's Best SF collections, no. 8. Many of you will have enjoyed the BBC radio play "Vampirella", broadcast some years ago, without realising who the author was.

Those of you who have encountered Heroes and Villains (recently reprinted in paperback), The Infernal Desire Machines of Doctor Hoffman, The Passion of New Eve or the collection Fireworks will need no introduction to Ms. Carter. For the rest of you, we hope at last to introduce you to an excellent writer who perhaps hasn't enjoyed the recognition she so richly deserves within sf.

If you haven't read any of her books, you have a treat in store; her books are rich in Gothic imagery and erotic undertones that make them a very enjoyable read. If you haven't met her — and few of you will have, since this is her very first science fiction convention — you have an even bigger treat in store. She is lively and amusing in person, as those of you who saw her recently on Terry Jones's Paperbacks will know. We hope you will make her welcome.

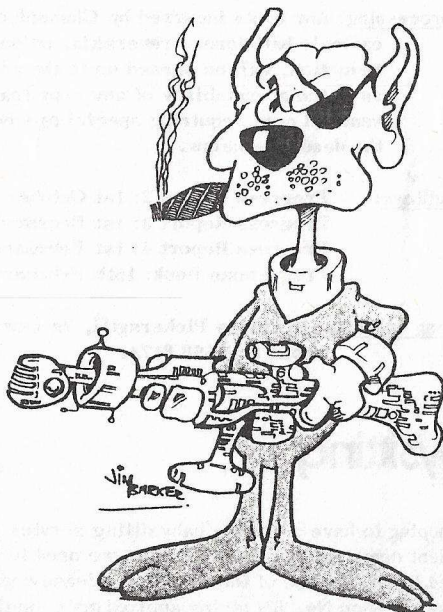

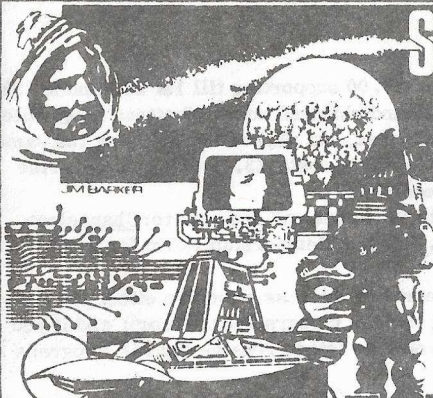
