CONTRIVANCE LOSES ITS VOTE

For the first time in a decade members of the Eastercon will not be able to vote for the annual BSFA awards. The awards, which in recent years have been both voted for and presented at the Eastercon, will instead be presented at Mexican in May following the usual postal ballot of BSFA members.

Mike Moir, administrator of the BSFA awards since 1986, resigned last year, but was asked to handle this year's awards when no-one could be found to replace him. Unfortunately, by then it was too late for BSFA members to vote in time for Contrivance. There are no rules governing the administration of the awards: Basically, Mike explained, "the awards administrator can do whatever the hell he likes." He also mentioned that he was "glad not to be lugging them [the awards are glass decanters] on the plane to Jersey," and expressed the heartfelt wish that "they find someone else to do it next year."

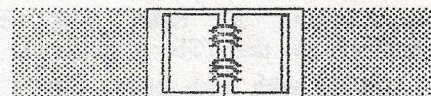
Mexican chairman Greg Pickersgill told Jersey Yarns he only discovered the awards were to be presented at Mexican when he read his February Matrix. He is, however, quite happy to accommodate the BSFA.

The Contrivance Committee have expressed regret at this turn of events, and announced the Eastercon Awards to be voted on by attending members of Contrivance. Ask at the registration desk for details.

£1000 FOR RACHEL POLLACK

Unquenchable Fire by Rachel Pollack won the Arthur C. Clarke Award for best science fiction novel of 1988. Pollack accepted the award and £1000 cheque from judge Maxim Jakubowski at the Groucho ("I don't care to belong to a club that will have me as a member" Marx) Club on 15th March. Brian Stableford's *Empire of Fear* came a close second, and third, American Richard Grant's *Rumours of Spring*. Other shortlisted authors were Michael Bishop, Gwyneth Jones, Lucius Shepard and Ian Watson. Only Pollack and Watson

were present to hear Jakubowski's fumbling presentation. He forgot the title of Grant's novel, and failed to deliver the message sent by Clarke to mark the occasion. The fifty or so people present - including members of the Science Fiction Foundation and of the BSFA, critics Roz Kaveney and John Clute, and judge Mary Gentle - clapped enthusiastically at the first syllable of Pollack's name, obviously both surprised and pleased at the result. "Fairly tedious otherwise..." commented Roz Kaveney afterwards, "...manky crisps".

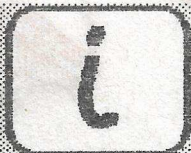
The clock symbol says that something is happening today that you should know about in time. Since today is Thursday and the convention hasn't started yet...

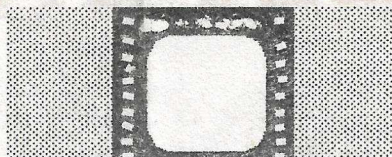

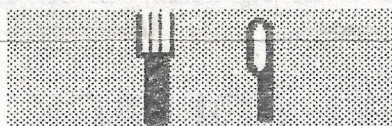

Three course meals are available in the hotel restaurant (Read Me labels it "Breakfast Area") between 7.00 and 9.30pm, but all tables must be booked by phoning 396 on an internal phone or by visiting the cashier in the Atrium.

Le Normand is wonderful: 10/12 Beresford Street. Please book 24 hours in advance as they can't cope easily with large unexpected parties. (Andy Morris and others.)

The Rice Bowl is an excellent Chinese priced at £10 to £15 per head. Greve D'Azzette. (Mike Scott.)

Andy Morris (again, a few seconds later): "Oh God! I Hurt."

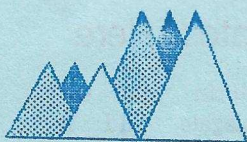
Carole Shetler: "How do you think my nose feels now?"

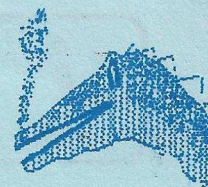

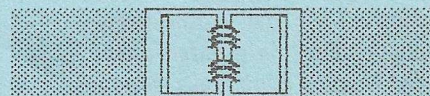

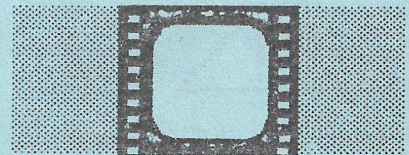
TAFF Delegate is Here

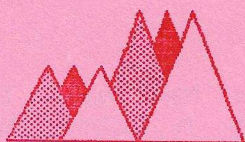

There is a small British contingent: John and Eve Harvey; Bob and Sarah Shaw; and Phil Palmer. Daily temperatures of over 30 degrees C. are forcing Bob to adopt a largely sub-aquatic existence in the hotel's rooftop swimming pool, but he reports he is enjoying a varied programme, including the Guest of Honour John Varley speaking forcibly in defence of Salman Rushdie.

Fusion?

The Independent, 25 March 1989: Physicists at the Universities of Utah and Southampton have reportedly sustained a fusion reaction at room temperature for 100 hours. The method uses electrolysis to condense deuterium nuclei inside the metal of a palladium electrode. Researchers in the UK have not managed to duplicate the experiment: Harwell's sensitive neutron detectors have not found any of the expected neutron emission. Ron Bullough, Chief Scientist at the UKAEA, suggest that natural radioactivity in the palladium may explain the results.

Local expert Steve Bull comments: "Successful fusion would require a large input of energy, and it is difficult to see where the energy would come from in this experiment"

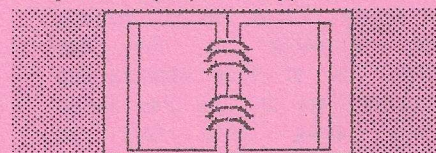

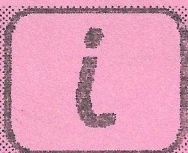


GAMES Co-operative Games Session is on Sunday at 7pm. It has been moved from the basement to Room 1000 (New Wing) because it's cuddlier.

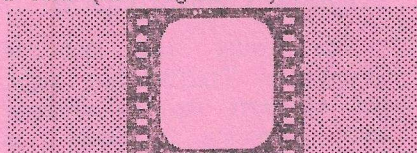

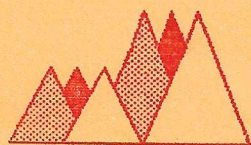
The Drabble Project

The standard of the show was generally good, despite the high number of scratch entries, many made up in the costume workshop during the afternoon, varying from Kim Campbell as Little Girls should be Obscene and not Heard, to Martin Hoare as Roger Perkins! Even the less spectacular entries still had the hook of a good joke.

The winners, however, were obvious and Mike Ibeji and Co. as A Pageant from A Storm of Wings were voted Best of Show unanimously by the judges, a verdict supported by cheers from the audience.

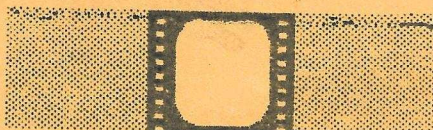
Glutton For Punishment

The performances are good, the SPFX restrained, the archness under control, and Mark Knopfler did the music. Pay attention to the cast list. Peter Cook's role is formally named "Impressive Clergyman", and Paul Badger is the "Assistant Brute", but the innocuous-sounding "Fezzik" is played by real-life Andre the Giant. Take your teddy (or wear it for afters).

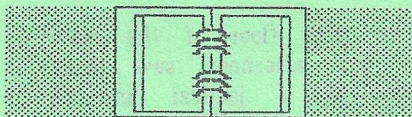
Ian Sorensen, presenting the bid for Speculation, then announced the GoH will be Robert Holdstock.

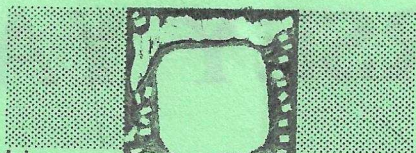

Howard the Duck

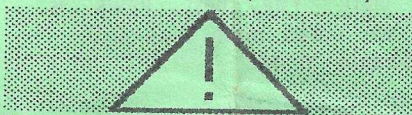

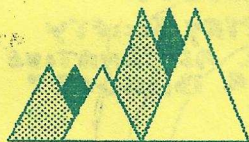

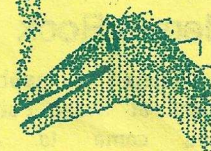

Best Long Text - Terry Pratchett for the Discworld Books

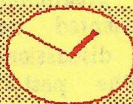
Best Short Text - David Wake and Rob Meades for The Drabble Project

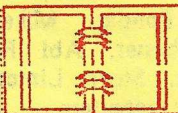

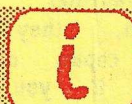
