Contrivance User Manual

Introduction

Welcome to Contrivance '89! This leaflet includes some vital information about the convention, the hotel and Jersey. Please read it carefully. If you lose it, replacements cost 20p from the Information Desk.

At the back of this leaflet there is a programme, showing what is happening when, and where. This is as accurate as we could make it at the time of going to press, and it absolutely supersedes the programme in the souvenir book. We can't guarantee that there will be no further changes, but where these are necessary we will make every effort to publicise the fact that the programme has altered.

General Notices

If there is anything you want to know that isn't covered below, then you should ask at the Information Desk in the hotel foyer (open daily from 10:30am to 6:00pm). If you have any problems then go to the Information Desk while it's open, otherwise try the Ops Room.

Please remember that all members must wear their convention badge at all times. This is for your own good as well as for Contrivance Security's peace of mind. If you lose your badge, please go to Registration as soon as possible, where they will issue you with a replacement for a nominal fee.

Associate members may enter the Dealers' Room, the convention bar and the banquet (on production of a ticket). Day members are entitled to attend the convention until 8:00am on the morning after they buy their membership. Committee members will be wearing bright orange badges and should be approached with care.

Smoking is not allowed in certain areas of the convention - please observe the notices. Be VERY careful while smoking in rooms in the new wing of the hotel (rooms 601 to 1100) since these are equipped with smoke detectors that automatically call the Jersey fire brigade when set off.

The convention newsletter will be liberally scattered about the hotel at (ir)regular intervals throughout the weekend, containing updates to the programme, articles, gossip, etc. Copies will usually be available at the Registration & Information Desk in the foyer.

Please don't do anything that might damage the fabric of the hotel. For instance, sticky tape or Blu-Tack should only be used on glass or stone surfaces.

Banquet

The Contrivance banquet and awards ceremony is on Sunday night at 8:00pm. Tickets are £9.50 from the Registration Desk in the hotel foyer, and are available from Friday morning till Registration closes on Sunday. There is a limit of 200 tickets, but you do not have to attend the banquet in order to see the awards ceremony, which will be held immediately afterwards.

A vegetarian option (fruit and cheese kebab deep fried in sunflower oil plus vegetables as above) will be available but must be ordered on purchase of your ticket. We have been assured that no animal fat is used in the cooking and that the cheese and the gelatin in the mousse are free of animal products. Anyone who has ordered vegan or gluten-free options for the banquet should say so when buying their ticket.

Awards

Voting forms for the Eastercon Awards and the Doc Weir can be returned to the Registration & Information desk. The winners will be announced at the Awards Ceremony on Sunday night.

Gophers

Any members volunteering to help with the convention should report to the Ops Room (between the Dealers' Room and hotel reception).

Masquerade

The Masquerade (fancy dress competition) will be in the Empire Room on Saturday at 8:00pm. Anyone who wants to take part should notify the Information Desk, and should try to attend the rehearsal which starts at 4:00pm on Saturday. A number of prizes will be awarded at the Masquerade, and while the judges are deliberating, Chris O'Shea II will give a short magic show. There is a workshop on costume-making from 1:00pm in the Club Room (before the rehearsal), where last-minute costume entries may be constructed.

Flash photography will **not** be allowed during the Masquerade itself. However, there will be a photocall at 6:00pm for the benefit of photographers.

Weapons

WEAPONS may NOT be carried at any time during the convention, except at the Masquerade where they must be approved by Gytha North, the Masquerade organiser. If you are in doubt as to what constitutes a weapon, then please talk to any committee member (or ask a member of Security to get a ruling if you can't find a committee member).

Hotel

There is a map of the hotel in the centre pages of this leaflet.

The Hotel de France and the Lido de France (in front of the hotel) form the complex in which Contrivance will be held. The bedrooms in the hotel are numbered in a peculiar manner - rooms beginning with numbers 1 to 5 are in the old block and are accessible via the lifts in the foyer. Rooms beginning with numbers 6 to 10 are in the new block and are accessible via the lifts near the Mainsail Bar (see map).

Rooms in the new block have punched plastic cards as keys, which must be inserted into the card slot of your room lock the correct way round *and removed again* before the door will open. The old block has standard old boring keys.

Members staying in the new wing should note that smoke detectors are fitted in all rooms - the Jersey fire brigade will be called automatically within 60 seconds of one of these detectors being triggered. If you trigger an alarm accidentally, call Hotel Reception **AT ONCE** and tell them that it is a false alarm.

The new wing of the hotel has been designated a quiet area. Please respect this and try to keep parties, filksings and other noisy gatherings in the old wing.

Note that the hotel check out time is 10:00am.

The hotel swimming pool is open to all convention members, although residents of the Hotel de France will have priority if it gets crowded.

The Lido Theatre and the Cine de France are located in the Lido de France opposite the hotel entrance (see map) - go out of the front of the hotel and follow the signs. A disco will be held in Madison's Night Club, beneath the Lido Theatre, on Sunday night and is open to convention members only. A tour of the £250,000 of disco equipment used in Madison's is available to all interested parties on Sunday. There is also a fitness centre in the Lido de France, open to anyone willing to pay the entrance fee.

In case you should get lost in your wanderings about the island, the Hotel de France is located on the A7 (St. Saviours Road) in St. Helier and its telephone number is (0534) 38990.

Bars

The **Minstrel Bar** is the main convention bar, opposite the Fan Room, and will be open from 10:00am to at least 2:00am on each day of the con.

The **Sovereign Bar** in the Lido de France will be open whenever there are programme items running in the Lido.

The **Century Bar** is the Fan Bar, and is located next to the Fan Room (which is in the Golden Lounge).

The **Mainsail Bar** is open to the public, and will be open standard hours.

Meals

For the four days of the convention, breakfast will be served in the Atrium Restaurant between 8:30am and 10:30am. Naturally, this only applies to members staying at the Hotel de France. Please remember to bring your breakfast tickets down with you in the morning. Breakfast tickets are *not* required outside the period of the convention. Members staying elsewhere should confirm breakfast times and location with their own hotel.

Snacks and light meals will be available in the Atrium Area between 12:30pm and 3:30pm and between 5:00pm and 10:00pm on each day of the convention. At other times coffee and sandwiches will be available in the Minstrel and Sovereign bars. The Atrium Restaurant will be serving dinner between 6:30 and 9:30.

Art Show

The Art Show is in the basement (down the stairs in the new wing, near the Mainsail Bar) and is open irregular hours - consult the programme in this booklet for times. This is a deliberate policy, designed to integrate the Art Show with art-related programme items being held in the adjacent room. No food, drink, smoking or photography is allowed in the Art Show.

Art Show exhibits should be brought to the Registration Desk on Friday, or before 1:00pm on Saturday. Items for the art auction should include details of the artist, medium, person selling the piece and what the minimum acceptable bid is. Any exhibits which are not for auction should be clearly marked as such.

Creche

The Creche is situated in room 131 (in the old wing - see map) and will be open and staffed by the hotel between 11:00am and 12:30pm and between 2:00pm and 6:00pm. Baby sitting is available from the hotel each evening at an hourly rate of £2.75 (£3.25 per hour after midnight).

Dealers' Room

The Dealers' room is open from 10:00am until 6:00pm and is situated next to the Mainsail Bar - no drinks are allowed in the Dealers' Room.

Fan Room

The Fan Room is in the Golden Lounge, opposite the main convention bar (the Minstrel Bar). It will be running its own stream of programming which is listed in the programme in this leaflet. Full details are given on a separate sheet in your registration pack. The Fan Room has its own bar, the Century Bar, next to it.

Games Room

The Games Room is situated on the 1st floor of the old wing and will be open 24 hours a day. A schedule of events will be posted there. Entries for the 100-word scenario competition should be handed in at the Games Room before noon on Sunday. If you would like to run a game, then come to the Games Room early and volunteer.

Auctions

Material for the book auction should be brought to the Registration Desk before 1:00pm Saturday. It should be securely packed and labelled with both the name of the person selling it, and whether the money should go to the seller, to charity (e.g. TAFF, GUFF, Jersey Wildlife etc.) or elsewhere.

Items for the art auction should include details of the artist, medium, person selling the piece and what the minimum acceptable bid is.

Material not delivered in advance will not be accepted for sale at either Auction. Payments at the book auction and the art auction may be made by cash or cheque. Material bought at the art auction should be paid for and collected at 10:30am on Monday from the Art Show in the Basement.

Time Change

The change from Greenwich Mean Time to British Summer Time will occur at 1:00am on Sunday 26th March 1989.

Restaurants

There should be a separate booklet on local restaurants included in your registration pack. We also hope to feature recommendations in the newsletter on specially good places to eat. Places that we can recommend from previous visits to Jersey include:

Piaf, 35 Hill Street, St. Helier (Phone: 25784): Authentic (and affordable) crêperie with real French cider.

The Nelson's Eye, Havre des Pas, St Helier (Phone: 75176): For lovers of garlic and seafood (in that order).

Pomme D'Or Hotel restaurant, Conway Street (by the harbour): A 5 course evening meal was around £9.50 last year. Good food and an interesting view over the harbour, though not very exciting decor.

Cafe Dodo, Jersey Zoo: Clean, cheap and interesting.

Twigs, Five Oaks: Just up the road from the de France. A 3 course lunch is available for around £4, entrée approximately £2. A 3 course evening meal costs around £8 (1988 prices).

Pubs

The following is an extract from the 1988 CAMRA guide on Jersey. There are also some local brews from the Mary Ann brewery on Guernsey. However, they only produce keg beers for sale on Jersey and are therefore not included in the CAMRA guide.

Grouville.

The Pembroke Hotel, on the Grouville coast road - Draught Bass. A friendly local bar with spacious lounge adjacent to Royal Jersey Golf Club. Near the beach and one mile from Mont Orgueil Castle.

St. Brelade.

La Pulente Hotel, on the B35 - Draught Bass. An unspoilt bar with bar billiards and cosy lounge. At the southern end of St. Ouen's Bay overlooking the beach.

Old Portelet Inn, Portelet Bay - Draught Bass. 17th-century timber beamed farm house with four separate bars and a large children's area - a friendly local above the Portelet beach.

Try also: the **Smugglers' Inn**, Ouaisne Bay.

St. Helier.

Esplanade Bars, Esplanade - Draught Bass. A spacious pub close to the station with a friendly atmosphere and a varied clientele. Has pub games.

Peirson, Royal Square - Draught Bass. A historic pub opposite the seat of government in the town square. Has the scars of the battle of Jersey on one wall. Occasionally has live music.

Try also: **Dog & Sausage**; **Lamplighter**.

St. John.

Les Fontaines Tavern, Route du Nord - Draught Bass. A 14th-century timber-beamed pub - one of the few pubs where Jersey patois is spoken. A friendly local which is ideal for families. Games room.

St. Martin.

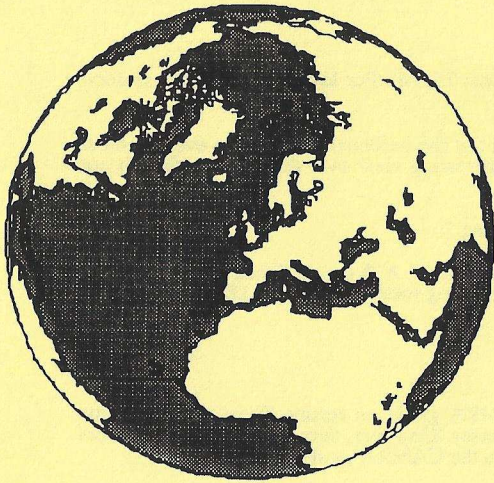
Anne Port Bay Hotel, Anne Port (200 yds from Anne Port Bay) - Draught Bass. A convivial and friendly hotel at the east end of the island with a snug bar.

Rozel Bay Inn, Rozel - Draught Bass. A cosy pub at the bottom of a picturesque valley in an attractive old fishing village by a quaint harbour. Pub games.

St. Ouen.

Le Moulin de Lecq, Greve de Lecq - Draught Bass. A 16th-century working watermill, close to the beach, which serves popular Jersey dishes (not Sunday). Has a children's play area.

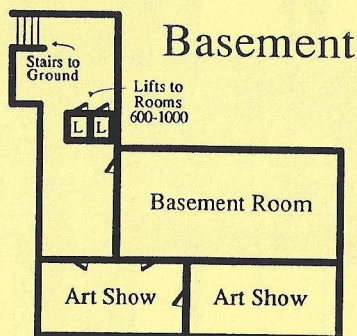
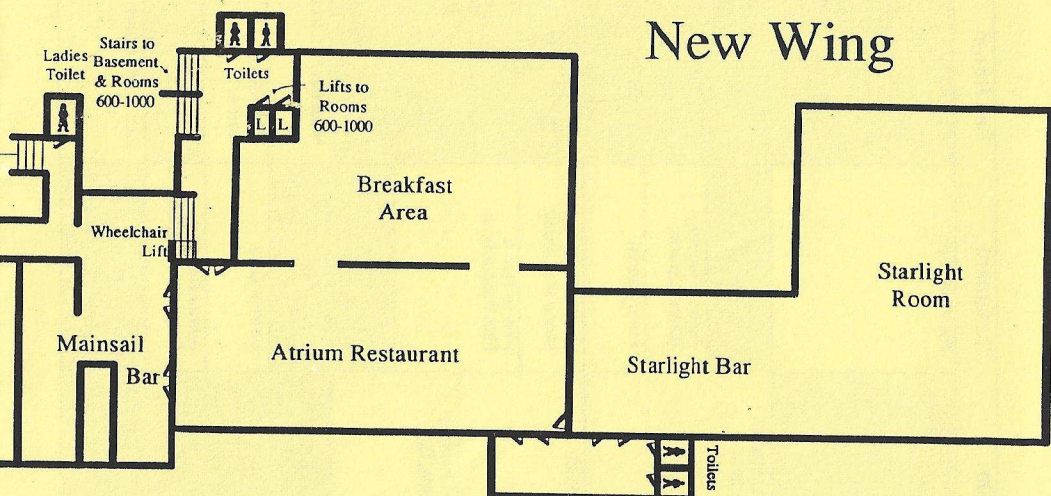
Map of the

Drabbles Room 1000 5:00pm A drabble is a short story in exactly 100 words, no more, no less. Rob Meades, David B. Wake and Roger Robinson explain the history of this obscure literary form and solicit contributions from workshop participants for the second collection of 100 drabbles, soon to be forthcoming from Becon Publications. BEMs and JCBs Lido Theatre 7:00pm Bridget Wilkinson and Sylvia Starshine have created a set of alien artifacts, brought back by an unmanned probe. The panel and the audience have to guess the sort of the beings that would use them, and what they might be used for. An intriguingly different sort of programme item.

Holland In 1990 Empire 7:00pm Kees van Toorn tells us how the 1990 Worldcon in Holland is coming along. **Thwing Room 1000 7:00pm** The Society of Jomsborg the New presents one of its discussion meetings under

the leadership of Mike Abbott. The topic is John Crowley.

Cover Stories Empire 8:00pm What makes a good book cover from the point of view of the publisher (Jane Johnson) may not quite fit in with what the author (Terry Pratchett), the artist (Judith Clute) or the book-seller (Roger Peyron) think. Chair - Barbara Mascetti.

Pie In The Sky Lido Theatre 9:00pm Our panel of foodies take a look at the topic of space cuisine: how to feed the asteroid belt a balanced, interesting diet; losing weight when you're already weightless; cooking in zero-G and the effect of Coriolis force on soufflés. Plus, of course, building a centrifugal still or using vacuum distillation to make space moonshine. Chair - Keith Armstrong-Bridges, with Simon Beresford, Julian Headlong, Nick Later and Bernie Peek.

Cities In Write Empire 9:00pm The panel look at memorable cities in Science Fiction and Fantasy and discuss the ways in which their authors have evoked the atmosphere of the city. Chair - Anne Page, with Iain Banks, M. John Harrison, Diana Wynne Jones and Steve Limon.

Hidden Empires - Cities And Civilizations In Fantasy Cinema Lido Theatre 10:00pm Since the beginnings of cinema at the end of the last century, filmmakers have recreated cities and civilizations from legend and literature - from George Méliès and Fritz Lang to Jean-Luc Godard and a present-day generation of Hollywood writers and directors - filmmakers that have built 'kingdoms of the imagination'. A talk by John Alexander, illustrated with film clips.

Asterix The Gaul (Empire 11:00am Friday)
Charles de Gaulle's very animated ancestor.

Blade Runner (Lido Cinema 5:00pm Saturday - 35mm)
Bogart translated into the 21st century. The stunning realisation of a future city is what makes this film, which has relatively little to do with the Philip K. Dick book.

Bucket of Blood (Overnight)
One of Roger Corman's most appalling quickies, about an earnest dimwit sculptor who 'immortalises' the local cat in clay, then works his way up to the higher mammals.

Crazy Family (Empire 10:30am Sunday)
This is how all family dramas should be. A manic Japanese comedy a la Monty Python, about a nuclear family who sort out their relationship problems with ant poison, baseball bats, power drills and the kitchen utensils.

Dr Phibes Rises Again (Overnight)
Camp horror movie directed by *Avengers* director Robert Fuest, which culminates in Vincent Price rowing a funeral barge for his dead wife down the river Styx while singing "Somewhere Over The Rainbow".

Fossil (Empire 2:00pm Sunday)
"The present is intolerable. The future looks bleak. Take me back. Please." A 15-minute short film by John Alexander. John has given us two talks on other people's films: here is one of his own.

Howard The Duck (Empire 10:30am Monday)
When is a duck not a duck? When it's a turkey!

Inferno (overnight)
Style is just about everything in this shock-a-rama from Italian maestro Dario Argento, with only a slender supernatural murder-mystery plot to get in the way of the amazing special effects. What style though, with visuals and soundtrack guaranteed to take your breath away. The music to this horror film set in New York is by Keith Emerson.

Moontrap (Lido Cinema 3:00pm Friday - 35mm)
A chance to see a preview of a new science fiction film, starring Walter Koenig (Chekov from *Star Trek*). This is being provided by the UK distributors Cineplex, who will give am presentation on the film before the showing. Set on the moon in the near future, this is in the tradition of *Aliens*.

Mr Vampire, part III (Lido Cinema 4:00pm Sunday - 35mm)
A wild blend of *Ghostbusters* and Chinese superstitions. A sequel only in number to *Mr Vampire*, this phantasmagoria of things which go bump in the Asian night features a resourceful villainess with a penchant for using lizards instead of Coca-Cola cans.

Not Of This Earth (Empire 7:00pm Monday)
Science fiction, horror, and bags of humour spice up this no-budget flick from the prolific Roger Corman. This film about aliens seeking blood donors on Earth ought to be more widely known. It contains a great cameo performance by Dick Miller which will be appreciated by all door-to-door salesman victims. A sense of fun helps to watch this one.

Orphée (Empire 3:00pm Monday)
Cocteau's magical reworking of the Orpheus and Eurydice legend, blending Greek mythology with Cocteau's own personal mythology. The symbolism and images have been much borrowed by other directors, most recently by John Carpenter in *Prince of Darkness*.

The Princess Bride (Empire 9:00pm Sunday)
None too serious heroic fantasy from the William Goldman book. There's a hero in disguise, a damsel in distress, fiendish villains, giants, as well as a Marxist-Leninist critique of the effects of feudalism on the enslaved proletarian masses.

The Seven Faces of Dr Lao (Empire 6:00pm Sunday)
Engaging fantasy of Western town brought to its senses by parables performed by mysterious travelling circus. Tour-de-force for Tony Randall who plays a multiplicity of roles.

She Demons (Overnight)
Mere words are not enough to describe the awfulness of this film. Suffice it to say that Yuppies + Wild Women of Wong + Nazi Stormtroopers all meet up in the mad scientist's laboratory on Robinson Crusoe's island. Wonderfully inept.

Sleeper (Empire 11:00am Saturday)
This venture into SF was arguably Woody Allen's last 'pure' comedy before he went over into intellectual/autobiographical self-analysis. Partly a tribute to the old silent slapstick films, it contains the ultimate in banana-skin jokes. Great fun.
